Request to the State Board of Government Innovation and Cooperation for a Waiver from MN Statutes 245.4711 and 245.4881

WHEREAS, the State Board of Government Innovation and Cooperation has announced the availability of waivers from administrative rules and the availability of temporary, limited exemptions from enforcement of state laws; and

WHEREAS, application for a waiver of temporary exemption may be submitted at any time to the Board; and

WHEREAS, MN Statutes 245.4711 and 245.4881 and Department of Human Services Rule 79, parts 9520.0900 to 9520.0926, require that Individual Community Support Plans and Functional Assessments be completed every 90 calendar days, impeding case managers' ability to provide direct services to adults with serious and persistent mental illness and children with severe emotional disturbance.

MISSION DIRECTED BUDGET SAVINGS

The Deputy Administrator gave a brief history on the reasoning behind implementing the Mission Directed Budget Savings program. The program was introduced to give incentives and challenges to department heads to look at saving money and to think about the future instead of just next year's budget and the "spend it or lose it" philosophy. She indicated that in 1994, departments saved over \$2.5 million. The Mission Directed Budget allows departments with savings to retain 25% of their savings and an additional 25% of the savings was allocated to a countywide pool. The 1994 general savings pool has \$676,900. Fifteen projects totalling \$1,042,000 were considered by the department head group. The group recommended projects totalling \$429,200 which would leave \$247,700 in the savings pool.

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board Correspondence was received and placed on file.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Flooding in the Grant Township Area

Commissioner Hegberg stated he attended a meeting with the City of Hugo on Monday night concerning the elevation of Hay Lake and School Lake. These lakes have risen 11 feet in the past 10 years. The City of Hugo has raised a couple of the roads in the past, and currently County Road 57 is under water. He indicated that the City of Hugo has a plan, along with the Browns Creek Water Management Organization, to correct this situation. He is requesting staff to look into the availability of funds to help fund that study. He stated there will need to be an emergency pumping permit to pump one of the lakes just out of Withrow, and that Hay Lake and School Lake will need a longer term solution. He indicated that it doesn't appear to be a real major expense, unless the trout have to be protected, but there is an emergency and those environmental requirements could probably be waived. He would like staff to take a look at this as rapidly as possible to alleviate this situation. He stated that there are several homes with septic systems and basements under water.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that he had two calls over the weekend begging for help in a situation occurring a little south of where Commissioner Hegberg was referring to. He indicated that he got in touch with the Public Works Director and the garage was opened up and people were directed to come in and get sandbags. He received a letter from Lauren Fariss, a resident of Grant Township, asking the Grant Township Board for a meeting to discuss a proposal for pumping the water. The area that he toured had approximately 12 houses and each house had a minimum of 12 inches of water in the yard, some had water in their basement, and the septic systems were failing.

The Public Works Director showed the Board pictures of flooding in that area. He stated that the flooding is due to the high amount of rain this area has received over the last several weeks and a large majority of these issues are in the Browns Creek Water Management Organization. The issues are whether the water will drain away in a timely manner or whether or not it should be pumped. The meeting requested by the Grant Township residents will ask the DNR to see if pumping will be allowed. He believes the meeting is tonight at 5:30 p.m. in the Grant Township Hall primarily to talk with the Grant Township people in this particular neighborhood to see if there is a solution that will deal with their immediate problem which is flooding roads and septic systems. Ultimately, the Water Management Organization has to see if they can come up with a total solution to this problem.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that the people he talked with were concerned about a possible freeze, which would cause a lot of damage to their basements. He stated that he understands this is a Grant Township and DNR problem, but if there is any way the County can get some kind of solution -- whoever is responsible -- it would be good for the residents.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that the Browns Creek Water Management Organization has seen this problem coming. They met this spring and thought they had a possible solution and hoped to implement it much faster, but they didn't expect the 19 inches of rain in the last month. They were also tied down with all kinds of environmental issues. He believes that with all this rain, some of those requirements need to be waived and get the problem solved.

Commissioner Peterson asked if the Water Management Organization had authority to tax, assess property? Commissioner Hegberg stated this is a joint powers agreement between Grant Township, Hugo, and May Township. They get their money from the Town Boards, so the Town Boards can tax and give the Water Management Organization the money.

Commissioner Peterson asked if the County could loan money to the water management organization to be paid back at a later date? Commissioner Hegberg indicated that he thought that would be part of the request, but also in the past when County Roads were under water the County found some funds to help in some cases. The Public Works Director stated they have taken the initiative to solve the problem relating to County Road 57 near Withrow school. It was his opinion that the Water Management Organization has to deal with this, and since it's not a watershed district and each one of the municipalities is contributing to that water management organization, the local unit of government can help solve the local problem. In terms of County involvement, he feels that the County can become a facilitator only to the extent that the County may know people in the State government that they can contact. Right now it's the Water Management Organization's responsibility.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that eight counties in northern Minnesota are getting money for flood damage, so obviously there's money out there. Commissioner Hauser suggested that since the Water

Management Organization is a joint powers entity they could apply for State grants or other kinds of relief to help them implement the plan should they ever get it started.

The Public Works Director stated that water management organizations are loosely joined. They don't have the resources for staff and consult everything out. Eventually, that becomes very expensive.

Commissioner Hauser stated she agrees with the Public Works Director that this is the responsibility of the water management organization and the towns. And just as we have advocated or not advocated in other areas of interest, she believes it would be better to allow them to work it out. If there is some way the County can facilitate their decisions, then the County should stand ready in that regard, not to do any meddling around with their plan, they're responsible for solving this problem.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated he brought this up because the people who called him on Saturday were frantic, their septic systems weren't working. They tried everywhere to get the help and nobody would help them. Somehow they got a hold of him. Commissioner Hauser stated it seemed to her that there are emergency procedures in place in the Sheriff's Office rather than involving the Public Works Department. She stated she was sure they could stimulate the same kind of action, so it sounds as if the Towns are without knowledge or help on how to handle their citizen's emergency requests.

Commissioner Hegberg stated it was a question on where to get the sandbags. There was not any place available to obtain those sandbags other than a government entity.

Other Commissioner Reports

Commissioner Peterson gave the Public Works Director a memo on a meeting on local access issues regarding the Wakota Bridge. She also stated there will be a meeting of the Sustainable Communities, an AMC subcommittee, on August 31, 9:00 a.m. at AMC. Goodhue County will be presenting their strategic planning process. She thinks this would be a good meeting for some people in our County to attend that it would be the next logical step for the County to look at in what they are doing to implement the comprehensive plan.

Commissioner Hauser and Engstrom presented an update on the AMC Policy Committee meeting. Among the items discussed were: Fiscal reform in the State of Minnesota and that Counties be more involved in these discussions since they are the chief deliverer of some of these services; Dealing with corrections money with a possible unified funding approach to try to get a handle on moving toward one system for funding correction dollars to the counties instead of the three different systems currently in place, Russ Reetz, Court Services Director, is working on this plan; and Discussion on wetland policy and establishment of a joint committee of the environmental and transportation committees to present this issue to the legislature next session. Commissioner Engstrom asked that the County Board

look at the proposal that the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources has drafted on the wetland

conservation act.

Commissioner Abrahamson informed the Board that Jim Brekken, 911 Board Executive Director, will

be retiring. Also, the 911 Board is considering one Commissioner appointment from each County

rather than the two, three or four Commissioners appointed now.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn,

seconded by Commissioner Hauser and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 4:30 p.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser and Hegberg. Absent none. Chairman Abrahamson presided. ;and WHEREAS, said applicant has set forth in his application that Joseph A. Jansen is the owner of Lots 10, 11, 12, 13, 19, 20 and 21, Block 29, Wildwood Manor, Washington County, Minnesota (hereinafter the "Property"). Title to the Property was acquired by Joseph A. Jansen on May 3, 1989 after the administration of the estate of Ebba Jansen, when Joseph A. Jansen and his siblings divided several real properties among themselves. Unfortunately, after the transfer of the Property to him, Joseph A. Jansen never received tax statements and, therefore, tax payments were not made.

Mr. Jansen was diagnosed with malignancy of the larynx with extensive bilateral metastic disease to both sides of his neck on February 23, 1994. His illness was long standing even before its diagnosis. As a result of poor health, Mr. Jansen has been unable to attend to the concerns of this property or to even participate directly in this application to the court. Copies of medical records evidencing his medical condition are attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibits A and A-1.

On May 14, 1990, the Property were bid at tax judgment sale for the delinquent taxes for 1989. Notice of this sale and of the expiration of the redemption period was apparently mailed via certified mail on May 3, 1993. However, notice was not sent to Joseph A. Jansen. Rather, notice was mailed to A. Thomas Jansen who had acted as co-personal representative of the Estate of Ebba Jansen.

A copy of the certified mail envelope indicates that the certified letter was returned to the Washington County Auditor/Treasurer on June 1, 1993 without having been received by anyone. (See Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein.) At the time of the May 3, 1993 notice, the total due to redeem the Property would have been only \$2,149.49 as is evidenced by copies of the notices which are attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit C.

On July 13, 1993, Joseph A. Jansen went to the County Auditor/Treasurer's office to pay 1993 taxes. (A copies of two of the tax payment checks are attached hereto as Exhibit D.) However, while he was at the Auditor/Treasurer's, no one advised him of the delinquent taxes, the tax judgment sale, or the expiration of the redemption period. Nor did they mail the certified letter to his address which they received on that day and which was clearly identified on his personal checks.

The notices of expiration of redemption which were apparently mailed on May 3, 1993, stated clearly "That the time for redemption of such lands from such (tax judgment) sale will expire 60 days after service of notice and the filing of proof thereof . . " Furthermore, publication of the

delinquent properties occurred on May 24, 1993 in the Stillwater Evening Gazette. A copy of the publication listing the Property is attached hereto as Exhibit E.

Since no one had received the notices of expiration of redemption, the certified mail was returned to the Auditor/Treasurer's office, and the publication did not occur until May 24, 1993, the 60 days had certainly not expired on July 13, 1993 when Mr. Jansen was present at the county offices. Had he been informed at that time, redemption would have been possible without forfeiture of the Property.

Therefore, the undersigned, on behalf of Joseph A. Jansen, respectfully requests an order of this Court extending until September 15, 1995, the period of redemption of the Property and ordering the Washington County Auditor/Treasurer to immediately accept this Court's order and waive all penalties and interest which have accrued since July 13, 1993.

WHEREAS, the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project Board wishes to educate both haulers and generators of the position of both Counties that the use of the Newport Facility is the best option for processing waste; and

WHEREAS, the Project Board has approved the Expanded Public Education Plan to promote the integrated solid waste management system; and

WHEREAS, a portion of the expanded plan will be implemented in 1995 for which additional funding is required; and

WHEREAS, the Expanded Public Education Plan activities scheduled to begin in 1995 may not be sufficiently completed in order to encumber the remaining funds in the 1995 budget for Advertising and Promotion at the end of the year; and

WHEREAS, the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project Board recommends that funds be transferred from the Resource Recovery Project's Fund Balance to appropriations to finance the 1995 portion of the Expanded Public Education Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes Ramsey County Budgeting and Accounting to appropriate \$59,200 from the Resource Recovery Project Board fund balance to the Project Board Administration budget for Advertising and Promotion and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the Resource Recovery Project at the end of 1995 to reappropriate any unencumbered balance in the Advertising and Promotion account to the 1996 budget in order to have funds to complete the expanded public information plan.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

APPOINTMENT TO THE HOUSING AND REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Commissioner Engstrom informed the Board that his appointment to the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority, Mary McConnell, has resigned, and he is requesting that he be appointed to fill the unexpired term. Commissioner Peterson indicated that Ms. McConnell is a recent appointment. She is also concerned that the Board has had difficulty finding women to serve on committees and now the Board is replacing a woman.

Commissioner Hauser moved to accept the resignation of Mary McConnell to the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board and that Dave Engstrom be appointed to fill the unexpired term to December 31, 1995. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion.

Commissioner Hegberg asked the question "Can a Commissioner be appointed to the HRA Board?", and he stated he feels very strongly that a Commissioner is elected and is responsible to their electorate. He also indicated that he may or may not agree with a Commissioner being a part of the HRA Board, but he thinks that County Commissioners have a right to be appointed to the HRA Board if they choose to, and that is why he is seconding the motion.

Commissioner Peterson asked the County Attorney if the County assumes more liability when a County Board member is sitting on the HRA Board? The County Attorney indicated that it is entirely legal for this Board to appoint one of its own members or all of its own members to that Board if it so wishes. He stated that is a policy consideration; although, as the County Board's legal advisor, he believes that the County is increasing the potential liability of the taxpayers of Washington County, but it is certainly within the Board's right to make those appointments.

Commissioner Engstrom stated he is asking for the Board to confirm his appointment. One of his reasons is that he wants to protect the County's interest. He would like to see that the HRA establishes a policy whereby HRA employees would need to wait a year or two before working for vendors or consultants of the HRA. He also believes this Board needs to examine who is appointed to the HRA Board, what qualifications they have, and prior involvements with vendors or consultants of the HRA.

Commissioner Peterson read a letter from her appointment to the HRA Board, Phillip McMullen, resigning from the HRA Board and requesting her to consider appointing herself to fill out his term. She stated now there are two vacancies on this Board and that this was a crucial time, with a major report coming back in September, and she is concerned that the process is being interrupted.

Commissioner Hauser indicated that Commissioner Engstrom has been sitting on the HRA Board as a Commissioner liaison and knows the history and the workings of the HRA as they sit as a Board. She stated that of all the persons who would seek that office at the moment, Commissioner Engstrom is

probably uniquely qualified among this County Board. The rest of the Board has not been privy to as many meetings, even though the Board members may have attended from time to time. It does assure some continuity. Commissioner Hauser stated she felt sure that Commissioner Peterson would be diligent about finding a person to fill the other open spot on the HRA Board.

Service That

Commissioner Hegberg asked Commissioner Peterson if she would be willing to serve on the HRA Board until a replacement could be found? Commissioner Peterson stated she would be very concerned about the liability for the County with two Commissioners sitting on that Board, but she is also concerned that her district has representation. She indicated that she has talked to a couple of people, and will continue to discuss this with them, but if no one has agreed to take the position by HRA's next meeting scheduled for September 12 she would like to be appointed. She will also talk to Commissioner McMullen to see if he would consider staying on until the first of October.

The Board Chairman stated there was a motion and second on the floor.

The County Attorney suggested that the motion be bifurcated. It was the consensus of the Board that the original motion be bifurcated.

Commissioner Hauser moved to accept the resignation of Mary McConnell from the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hauser moved to appoint Commissioner Dave Engstrom to the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board to fill an unexpired term to December 31, 1995. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser and Hegberg; Abstain, Commissioner Engstrom.

The Board discussed appointing a Commissioner liaison to the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board. It was Board consensus to discuss this matter at next week's Board meeting.

APPOINTMENT TO THE PARKS AND OPEN SPACE COMMISSION

Commissioner Hauser moved to appoint James Dockendorf, Oakdale, to the Parks and Open Space Commission to fill an unexpired term to December 31, 1995. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING - COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE Amendment to the County-Wide Juvenile Curfew Ordinance #115

Doug Johnson, Assistant County Attorney, Juvenile Division, presented a brief overview of the amendments to Ordinance No. 115, the County-wide Juvenile Curfew Ordinance. He indicated that 1995 Minnesota Session Laws Chapter 226, Article 2, Section 1 authorizes the inclusion of juveniles under the age of 12 and 17 year olds. The amendment would involve including these age groups in the ordinance.

The Board Chairman opened the public hearing and asked for comments from the audience.

Harvey Anderson, owner of two bowling centers in Washington County, stated he had a question with regard to administration of this curfew and the changes proposed. He stated he was worried about his responsibility as a proprietor and that it was hard to tell who's 11 and who's 12. On Saturday nights after the movies let out it gets very busy and it's hard to keep track of who should go home when. The younger children have no ID's. He also asked what was the harm of them being at the bowling centers in the first place, they are having fun. If he kicks them out at a certain time because of age, they may not go home but hang around in the parking lots and get mad. He asked who enforces the ordinance, is it him? If he doesn't enforce the ordinance what happens to him? He feels that bowling is a nice wholesome thing to do and it's becoming more popular with the young people.

Commissioner Peterson indicated to Mr. Anderson that she and Commissioner Hauser had some of the same questions he asked when this ordinance was enacted. She stated that they were going to give this ordinance a one-year trail and revisit it next year. She noted that every city in the County supported this ordinance, so it was difficult for her not to support it also.

The Board Chairman asked for further comments; none were heard. The public hearing was closed at 5:10 p.m.

Commissioner Hegberg thought that the amendment should not include 17 year olds. He stated some 17 year olds have graduated from high school and this may be going a bit overboard.

The County Attorney indicated that to continue with the ordinance the 12 year olds need to be included. He wanted to make the Board aware of the fact that in all likelihood Anoka and Ramsey Counties are going to include 17 year olds; Hennepin and Dakota have already included 17 year olds. He would strongly recommend that 17 year olds be included in the ordinance.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to amend the ordinance amendment under Section 3 (C) to state: "It is unlawful for a juvenile, age 15 and 16, to be present in any public place or establishment within Washington County:". Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted with a 4-1 vote

as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser and Hegberg; No, Commissioner Engstrom. The County Attorney was directed to prepare a resolution adopting amendments to Ordinance No. 115, County-wide Juvenile Curfew Ordinance, for next week's Consent Calendar.

METROPOLITAN MOSQUITO CONTROL DISTRICT

Joe Sanzone, Executive Director, Metropolitan Mosquito Control District, presented the 1996 Mosquito Control program and budget.

HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

The Assistant County Attorney presented a brief update regarding the SW-1 site ownership and action to record the contract for deed for formal transfer of title of the 110 acres of SW-1 property to the City of Lake Elmo. He also recommended that the County Board not enter into binding arbitration with the City of Lake Elmo as was requested by the City of Lake Elmo in their August 7, 1995 letter.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to approve the County Attorney's recommendation to not enter into binding arbitration with the City of Lake Elmo regarding ownership of the SW-1 Site. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hauser moved to authorize staff to go ahead with a binding agreement between the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency and Washington County as operator of the SW-1 site, and leaving the City of Lake Elmo as owner of the SW-1 site to deal with the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

A short recess was taken at 5:45 p.m.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Patricia Cowilder, Job Training Division, presented the final report on the Job Training Partnership Act 8% Education Coordination, Frontline Women Project.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Public Works Director presented a brief overview of the Washington County Cost Participation Policy for Cooperative Highway Projects. He indicated that written comments were received on this proposed policy from the following cities: City of Oakdale, City of Cottage Grove, City of Stillwater, Stillwater Township, City of Oak Park Heights, and the City of Woodbury.

The following individuals spoke against the proposed Cost Participation Policy and Cooperative Highway Project:

Janet Roberts, Councilwoman, City of Oak Park Heights, stated that the County has a responsibility to provide County roads that serve a County function. She requested that this plan be brought back to the drawing board and not put double taxation on municipalities.

Barry Johnson, Administrator, City of Woodbury, stated that this policy is an improvement over other draft policies in the past, and agrees with the Board that a written policy is needed. However, the City of Woodbury believes that further improvements could be made. 1) The County has a responsibility to provide a county highway system; 2) The proposed policy has the effect of shifting costs from the County to the city; and, 3) Potential loss of development to other counties and states. He requested that the Board take no action of this draft policy, that the policy be further revised, and that the County and the Cities go beyond the issue of the policy itself and work together to develop a common strategy for how to provide more adequate funding for road systems.

Dave Johnson, Supervisor, Stillwater Town Board, echoed the comments previously given. He urged the Board to step back and rethink this policy. If the roadway has County significance, then the dollars should come from the County as a whole.

Commissioner Hauser moved to adopt the Washington County Cost participation Policy for Cooperative Highway Projects. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted with a 4-1 vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser and Hegberg; No, Commissioner Engstrom.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The Deputy Administrator presented an update on discussions held at an earlier workshop regarding the proposed 1996 budget. Adoption of the proposed 1996 budget will take place at next week's Board meeting.

The County Administrator announced that the Metropolitan Council will be conducting a tour of the north metro area and Chisago County on September 13 at 2:00 p.m. He indicated that there are a couple of seats remaining if any of the Commissioners are interested in attending.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg asked the County Attorney the following questions regarding the Housing and Redevelopment Authority: 1) Can the County Attorney attend HRA meetings which take place in closed session? 2) Can the County Attorney's Office proceed as a representative if a civil lawsuit would develop?

The County Attorney stated that if he were invited by one of the Commissioners in the performance of that Commissioner's County duties, and he can assist in that capacity and there was no objection from the entity holding the closed session, he would be happy to perform that responsibility. With regard to the interest to the County Attorney's office in the day-to-day management or litigation or internal affairs of a separate entity, he thinks that the County Attorney's Office would not have any authority or responsibility.

Commissioner Hegberg asked is there anyone else that the County should notify per law of any investigation and the results of investigations? The County Attorney stated that since the County Attorney's Office has no involvement or knowledge or understanding of any investigations that may or may not be proceeding with regard to the Housing and Redevelopment Authority, we would have no responsibility for notification.

Commissioner Hauser stated that a letter was received from David L. Paraduea, Minnesota Zephyr, requesting a meeting to discuss a variance from the County Zoning Ordinance. She suggested that a letter be sent to Mr. Paraduea advising him to take this matter up with the Department of Health, Environment and Land Management as they could provide the proper process to address his request.

The Board discussed the possibility of moving up the public hearing set for September 26 to consider an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance regarding reviews by the Planning Advisory Commission on amendments to Zoning Ordinances. Staff will investigate this possibility.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Engstrom and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 7:15 p.m.

WHEREAS, because of their lack of maturity and experience, juveniles under the age of twelve are particularly susceptible to becoming victims of older perpetrators. The younger a person is, the more likely he or she is to become a victim of crime. While parents have the primary responsibility to provide for the safety and welfare of juveniles, Washington County has an interest in preventing juvenile crime, promoting parental supervision and providing for the well-being of the general public.

WASHINGTON COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. _116_

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE WASHINGTON COUNTY JUVENILE CURFEW ORDINANCE #115

The Board of Commissioners of Washington County ordains:

SECTION 1:

The Washington County Juvenile Curfew Ordinance #115 is hereby amended as follows:

Delete Section 3 in its entirety and replace with the following language:

SECTION 3: PROHIBITED ACTS

- (A) It is unlawful for a juvenile under the age of 12 to be present in any public place or establishment within Washington County:
 - (1) any time between 9:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday and 5:00 a.m. of the following day.
 - (2) any time between 10:00 p.m. on any Friday or Saturday and 5:00 a.m. on the following day.

- (B) It is unlawful for a juvenile from age 12 through 14 to be present in any public place or establishment within Washington County:
 - (1) any time between 10:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday and 5:00 a.m. of the following day.
 - (2) any time between 11:00 p.m. on any Friday or Saturday and 5:00 a.m. on the following day.
- (C) It is unlawful for a juvenile, ages 15 and 16, to be present in any public place or establishment within Washington County:
 - (1) any time between 11:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday and 5:00 a.m. of the following day.
 - (2) any time between 12:01 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. on any Saturday or Sunday.
- (D) It is unlawful for a parent or guardian of a juvenile knowingly, or through negligent supervision, to permit the juvenile to be in any public place or establishment within Washington County during the hours prohibited in paragraphs (A) (B) and (C) of this section.
- (E) It is unlawful for a proprietor of an establishment within Washington County to knowingly permit a juvenile to remain in the establishment or on the establishment's property during the hours prohibited in paragraphs (A) (B) and (C) of this section.

If the proprietor is not present at the time of curfew violation, the responding officer shall leave written notice of the violation with an employee of the establishment. A copy of the written notice shall be served upon the establishment's proprietor personally or by certified mail.

SECTION 2:

The Washington County Juvenile Curfew Ordinance #115 is hereby amended as follows:

Delete Section 5 in its entirety and replace with the following language:

SECTION 5: PENALTY

- (A) Violation of Section 3 (A), (B) or (C) will be prosecuted pursuant to Minn. Stat. §260.195 and will be subject to the penalties therein.
- (B) Violation of Section 3 (D) or (E) is a misdemeanor and will be subject to the penalty set forth in Minn. Stat. §609.09 (3).

SECTION 3:

Effective Date: This Ordinance shall be and is hereby declared to be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.

WHEREAS, Dakota County has been designated to continue to act as the project administrator and fiscal agent for the MATCHS systems development.

Excellence in Service Week

Agreement with City of Lake Elmo for Cleanup of SW-1 Landfill Site

The County Administrator presented a brief overview and conditions for a proposed agreement with the City of Lake Elmo for the cleanup of the SW-1 Landfill site. Mayor Wyn John, City of Lake Elmo spoke in favor of the agreement.

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve the agreement with the City of Lake Elmo for cleanup of SW-1 Landfill site and authorized the County Board Chair and Administrator to execute the Warranty Deed and make the payment of \$213,000 to the City of Lake Elmo upon final execution of the binding agreements with the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent.

Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board Appointment

Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the resignation of Phillip McMullen from the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent.

Commissioner Peterson moved to appoint William A. Buth, Cottage Grove, to the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board to fill an unexpired term to December 31, 1998. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent.

Guardian Ad Litem Program

Judge Howard Albertson presented reports to the County Board regarding the Guardian Ad Litem program with a recommendation that the program be separate from the Court system. He indicated that this was a unanimous decision and recommendation from all the Judges. Board action on this recommendation will be brought back for discussion at a later date.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson informed the Board that she will be attending a Dual Track Airport meeting this afternoon. The Metropolitan Airports Commission has recommended that there not be an off-site remote runway. She indicated that Dakota County is concerned that this land will be placed into a "bank" and it will not be available for development for the future leaving the citizens of Dakota County in limbo. She suggested that Washington County may want to support Dakota County's activities to bring this to a closure one way or the other. The County Administrator indicated that he would contact Dakota County and ask them for any written recommendation or policy requests that they are considering and then bring those back to our Board for discussion.

Commissioner Peterson informed the Board of the following events: Candlelight march in North St. Paul at 6:00 p.m. sponsored by VFW Post 1350 for the POW's and MIA's; The Board of Innovation will be hosting meetings with cities in Washington County on October 5 and November 7; and, on September 25, there will be a hearing in Cottage Grove School District talking about transportation issues in the metro area.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked the County Attorney to look at State Statue 343.11 regarding financial support for animal shelters in the amount of \$4,800. He indicated that he has met with the St. Croix Animal Shelter and that they brought this statute to his attention. The County Attorney stated he would look at the statute and report back to the Board through memorandum with regard to the County's position on mandated financial responsibility.

Future Meetings

The County Administrator updated the Board members on future meetings: 1) The meeting with May Township and Metropolitan Council set for November 2 to discuss Square Lake Park, will be noticed so all Commissioners may attend; 2) Meeting with Park and Open Space Commission to discuss use of park fees with possible dates of October 10, 17 and 19; 3) Public Hearing for the Comp Plan scheduled for October 3. Commissioner Engstrom requested that the continuation date for that public hearing be scheduled for October 10 instead of October 4 because Yom Kippur begins on October 3 at sundown, and goes through October 4. He is requesting the October 10 date for the continuation for those people who cannot attend on the 3rd.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Commissioner Hegberg moved to go into Executive (Closed) Session to discuss negotiation strategy for 1996-1997 agreement with employees represented by AFSCME. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent. The Board went into Executive Session at 9:45 a.m. Present for the Executive Session were Commissioners Abrahamson, Peterson, Engstrom and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Richard Arney, Frank Madden, Judy Honmyhr, Shari Bowers, and Patricia Raddatz.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Engstrom moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Hegberg and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hauser absent. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:30 a.m.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-176 as follows:

Resolution Enacting Amendment to Washington County Zoning Ordinance Section 508.01

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners has authority under Minnesota Statutes Chapter 394 to carry on county planning and zoning activities; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 394.24 authorizes the County Board to adopt official controls for purposes of carrying out its zoning activities; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopted their official zoning controls by ordinance on November 9, 1979; and

WHEREAS, these official controls became effective upon publication on December 4, 1979; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission heard and discussed the County Board's requested amendment to Section 508.01 at their meeting of August 22, 1995; and

WHEREAS, the recommendation of the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission was provided to the Washington County Board of Commissioners on September 5, 1995; and

WHEREAS, the County Board provided public notice of its intent to amend Section 508.01 of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance as recommended to them by the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission; and

WHEREAS, the County Board held a public hearing on the proposed ordinance amendment on Tuesday, September 26, 1995;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners, having heard and considered the recommendation of the Planning Advisory Commission and the public, does hereby adopt Ordinance #117 as attached hereto and authorizes its publication according to law.

ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

Washington County Ordinance No. 117

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE WASHINGTON COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE REGULATING LAND USE IN WASHINGTON COUNTY.

The Board of Commissioners of Washington County ordains:

Section 1:

Amend the Washington County Ordinance by deleting Section 508.01 in its entirety and replacing it with the following language:

An amendment to this ordinance may be initiated by the County Board, the Planning Commission or by petition of affected property owners, as defined herein. A petition by affected property owners shall be presented to the County Board of Commissioners. amendment to an official zoning district map shall be referred to the Planning Advisory Commission. The County Board, at its option, may refer any other proposed amendment to the Planning Advisory Commission for study and report. In the event the County Board refers an amendment to the Planning Commission, the Board shall not act on the proposed amendment until it has received the recommendation of the Planning Commission or until sixty (60) days have elapsed from the date of reference of the amendment without a report by the Planning Commission.

Section 2:

The Zoning Administrator is hereby directed to change the Washington County Zoning Ordinance in accordance with the foregoing amendment.

Section 3:

Effective Date. This ordinance shall be and is hereby declared to be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.

Passed by the Board of Commissioners of Washington County, Minnesota this 26th day of September, 1995.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Set Public Hearing Date to Amend the Washington County Zoning Ordinance, Section 602.02(5)

Commissioner Hauser moved to set October 10, 1995, 9:00 a.m. as the date of public hearing to consider amending Section 602.02(5) of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

WASHINGTON COUNTY STAR TRAIL ASSOCIATION

Nora Gallmeyer, Washington County Star Trail Association, requested that Washington County enter into an agreement with the Star Trail Association for use of the railroad bed that runs between Hugo and Forest Lake. Commissioner Peterson asked that letters of approval from the Cities of Forest Lake and Hugo, and Forest Lake Township be provided to the County before any agreement is entered. Commissioner Peterson indicated that this item could be brought back on the Consent Calendar.

MINNESOTA DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES Boating Rules on the St. Croix

Commissioner Engstrom moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-177 as follows:

Resolution Concerning Boating on the St. Croix

WHEREAS, on June 6, 1995, the Washington County Board of Commissioners, in response to problems concerning boat wakes, adopted Resolution No. 95-087, supporting the proposed rule amendments extending the current slow, no-wake zone in the Hudson Narrows on the St. Croix River; and

WHEREAS, this resolution was forwarded to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources as required by Minnesota Statutes § 86B.205; and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources proposed to:

- 1) make the Hudson area a slow-no wake zone to make it consistent with the existing zone, eliminate confusion and comply with the adopted Wisconsin rule; and
- 2) study the area from approximately mile 31.0 to approximately 24.5 during 1995, to further clarify the cause of erosion and to further evaluate recreational boating activity; and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources conducted a public hearing on June 19, 1995 at 7:00 p.m. in Stillwater regarding the Hudson area slow-no wake zone and received a favorable finding from the Office of Administrative Hearings.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the amendment made to Minnesota Rule § 6105.0330 which imposes a slow-no wake speed on the Lower St. Croix River from approximately mile 16.5 to approximately mile 16.1 and from shore to shore in the area known as South Hudson Bay, and is in effect continuously.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Homestead Agricultural Credit Aid

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-178 as follows:

Washington County Resolution on Homestead Agricultural Credit Aid

WHEREAS, there is consideration being given by various legislative committees and community organizations to fund the current state shortfall through the reduction or elimination of Homestead Agricultural Credit Aid received by counties; and

WHEREAS, Washington County and all counties depend on Homestead Agricultural Credit Aid to help fund state-mandated program costs and as a means of offsetting property tax increases; and,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that changes in local government aid should only be considered in the larger context of the state's fiscal relationship with all units of local government and its commitment to the provision of quality services provided by counties for the state; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County continues to support the Association of Minnesota Counties' position that the Homestead Agricultural Credit Aid (HACA) provides vital property tax relief that helps compensate counties for the reduction in tax base due to state policies that provide homestead tax relief and helps offset the cost of providing the various state programs that counties administer. Reductions in HACA could force cuts in these programs and could cause property tax increases; and that

Washington County opposes reduction in county HACA or transfers of county HACA to other county programs (other than direct state takeovers of county costs), unless the transfer of money:

 a) preserves adequate county board flexibility in the use of state money provides the same or a higher level of total state funding for programs controlled by county boards, while assuring that individual counties are held harmless;

- requires no additional county levies or additional spending for new programs; and
- d) maintains property tax relief as the primary purpose of the state funding.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County is willing to work with the Minnesota Legislature to explore options for addressing the issue of the state's fiscal relationship with all units of local government.

Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

PUBLIC HEARING - HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT Amendment to the Washington County Zoning Ordinance Section 602.02(5)

The Board Chairman presented an overview of today's public hearing to consider an amendment to the Washington County Zoning Ordinance, Section 602.02(5). This amendment would allow on a natural environment lake where a 200 foot structure setback is required, the buildable area calculation would be measured from a 150 foot setback rather than the required 200 foot setback.

The Secretary to the Board read into the record the notice of intent to amend said ordinance. The Board Chairman opened the public hearing at 9:05 a.m.

Walt Anderson, Waland Companies, stated his company was in favor of this amendment to the Zoning Ordinance. He feels that the space between the 150 foot setback to the lake and the 200 foot setback should be included in the one acre buildable area because that area is allowed for septic system. The septic system setback is 150 feet and the structure is 200 feet from the lake. He indicated the ordinance is ambiguous as it is written now. He presented a preliminary plat for the Long Lake Shores Addition.

Mir Verner, 12685 107th, stated he was opposed to amending the zoning ordinance and that this amendment would only benefit this specific developer. He stated this change would allow one extra home for every four built with a possibility for twenty-five percent more pollution in a small pond. He stated there will be more crowding on County Road 4. He asked why is it when a developer sees a nice view they say "lets put up a condominium" thus destroying a beautiful view.

John Bower, 12405 Otchipwe Avenue, May Township, stated that the regulations that were established in the Zoning Ordinance were put in for a good reason, and he wonders whether those reasons have changed. He feels it would be wise to keep the restrictions and regulations that are in place now, and if anything, make them more restrictive. Once you impact these areas you can never go back again and they will never be the same.

Tom Anderson, Director of Warner Nature Center, stated that for the past 30 years the Warner Nature Center has been involved in environmental education for thousands of residents in Washington County and the Metropolitan area. He indicated that kids have been acquiring data on water quality in this area for nearly 30 years and have learned that water quality does not come easily. He stated they can leave the kids with two messages: how good planning works; or, how poor planning works. He feels that this is a good opportunity to not lessen the standards that have been set up. To lessen the standards would be reducing what Washington County, particularly May Township, has been very proud of-preserving values and a good quality of life. To lessen those standards would be a step back.

Keith Myrmel, Wilder Foundation, reemphasized what Tom Anderson stated. This development will have an impact on their environment. He asked that the Board really take a look at what reducing the restrictions would mean, and asked that the restrictions in place remain in place. Wilder has served between 30,000 and 40,000 individuals from the County and the Metropolitan area. Every new development is an additional encroachment to these nature centers.

Carolyn Griffith, Norell Avenue, representing the Long Lake Association, stated that the Association feels that the present ordinance should remain in affect. It was put in effect by a previous Board for a good reason. She asked what is one or two more houses in that development? The developer is not being denied permission to go ahead and develop the property. A question the Association has, is one or two more houses that important for this particular development, or any development, when you consider what impact it will have on nature and when you consider that May Township has definitely taken a stand for their open space environment? She wants to go on record that the Long Lake Association recommends that the Board deny changing the ordinance.

Walt Anderson spoke again and indicated that this amendment is just a clarification of the ordinance already in place. He stated that they were not going to be putting septic systems any closer than already allowable under the law; they are not going to be building buildings closer than is already allowable. It is just changing how the one acre buildable requirement is calculated. The Minnesota DNR requirement is 150 setback for both septic systems and buildings, they are not asking to change that. They are asking to include that space as part of the justification for the one acre buildable. They are not asking for anything different than just a clarification.

The Board Chairman asked for further comments; none were heard. The public hearing was closed at 9:20 a.m. The Board Secretary indicated that all evidence had been received.

The Board discussed the amendment to the Washington County Zoning Ordinance. The Health, Environment and Land Management Director presented a history of this proposed zoning ordinance amendment.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to amend the Washington County Zoning Ordinance, Section 602.02(5) which would provide that on natural environment lakes where a 200 foot structure setback is required, the buildable area calculation would be measured from a 150 foot setback rather than the required 200 foot setback for the reason that this amendment would be in compliance with the regulations established by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources and that it would not allow further building intrusion in the setback than what is currently allowed. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

WASHINGTON COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 118

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE WASHINGTON COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE REGULATING LAND USE IN WASHINGTON COUNTY.

The Board of Commissioners of Washington County ordains:

SECTION I. Amend Section 602.02(5) of the Washington County Zoning Ordinance to read as follows:

All new lots created which are not served by public sanitary sewer must have at least 1 acre of accessible buildable land. Buildable land is defined as land with a slope less than 25 percent, and outside of any required setbacks except that on a natural environment lake where a 200 foot structure setback is required, the buildable area calculation would be measured from a 150 foot setback rather than the required 200 foot setback; above any floodway, drainageway, or drainage easement. All new lots created which are served by public sewer must contain at least 3,200 square feet of buildable area as defined above. Property situated within shorelands or the St. Croix River District are also subject to requirements set forth in those respective ordinances.

SECTION II. The Zoning Administrator is hereby directed to change the Washington County Zoning Ordinance in accordance with the foregoing amendment.

SECTION III. Effective date. This ordinance shall be and is hereby declared to be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.

HUMAN RESOURCES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Engstrom moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-184 as follows:

October 12 Declared "Turn Off the Violence Day"

WHEREAS, the citizens of Washington County recognize violence as an epidemic that affects our daily habits, our children, and our overall quality of life in our neighborhoods, business, and schools; and

WHEREAS, we believe we have the power to help reverse the growing threat of violence by educating ourselves and our children about healthy ways of resolving conflicts and responding to anger;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Washington County Board of Commissioners do hereby proclaim the date of October 12, 1995 to be

Turn Off The Violence Day

in our community. "Turn off the Violence Day" is a day for citizens to begin using their individual power to choose to turn off violent television programs, not to listen to violence music, and not to go to violent movies.

Furthermore, on that day, citizens are encouraged to examine the way they resolve anger and conflicts and to begin to resolve them without violent words or actions. We dedicate our celebration of this day to all the victims of violence.

Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Valley Branch Watershed District Appointments

Commissioner Engstrom moved to appoint Jeff Peterson, West Lakeland Township, to the Valley Branch Watershed District Board of Managers to a three-year term expiring November 13, 1998. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson and Hegberg; No, Commissioner Hauser.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to appoint Stephen Foley, Baytown Township, to the Valley Branch Watershed District Board of Managers, to fill an unexpired term beginning December 1, 1995 through November 13, 1996. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion.

Commissioner Hauser asked that the appointment to fill the unexpired term of Peter Zetterberg, from December 1, 1995 to November 13, 1996, be postponed until more applicants can be solicited from a wider range of cities. The County Attorney suggested that the Board should first accept the resignation of Mr. Zetterberg from the Valley Branch Watershed District.

Commissioners Engstrom and Abrahamson withdrew their motion and second.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to accept the resignation of Peter Zetterberg from the Valley Branch Watershed District Board of managers effective December 1, 1995, and that the Chairman send a letter to Mr. Zetterberg thanking him for his services. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson moved that vacancy on the Valley Branch Watershed District, which will take effect on December 1, 1995, be filled on November 14, 1995. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Engstrom asked that a letter be sent to the remaining applicants to the Valley Branch Watershed District stating that their applications will be considered on November 14.

Location of International Airport in Dakota County

The County Administrator informed the Board that a copy of Dakota County's resolution opposing the relocation of a new international airport to Dakota County has been distributed to the Board members. Commissioner Peterson indicated that she would like to discuss this issue at the Board meeting next week, particularly the land banking issue.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Engstrom asked that a press release be sent out clarifying the amendment to the Zoning Ordinance, Section 602.02(5), and that it does not allow buildings closer to the water than 200 feet. Judging by the comments and letters received, he feels that individuals are under the impression that this amendment allows buildings and septic systems closer to the water. The only thing that changed was the calculation.

Commissioner Peterson indicated she will be attending the Transportation Alliance Convention this week and will not be able to attend the Community Social Service Advisory Committee meeting.

Commissioner Hegberg suggested that a workshop be scheduled to review the groundwater management plan.

Commissioner Peterson indicated that she attended a Rural by Design public meeting last week and there was a video shown which she thought the Planning Commission might be interested in seeing.

EXECUTIVE (CLOSED) SESSION

Commissioner Engstrom moved to go into Executive (Closed) Session for attorney-client discussion on the Junker Sanitation Landfill litigation. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously. Set Public Hearing - Amendments to the Hazardous Waste Management Ordinance

Commissioner Peterson moved to authorize publication of a public notice setting a public hearing date of Tuesday, November 7, 1995 at 4:30 p.m. to receive comments to proposed amendments to the Hazardous Waste Management Ordinance. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Need for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet for the Proposed Plat of Maywood South in May Township

The Board Chairman presented an outline of the procedure to be followed in hearing a petition for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) for the proposed subdivision of land known as Maywood South in May Township.

Dave Dupay, Folz, Freeman, Dupay & Associates, Inc., stated he was hired by Mr. Andrews to take a look at developing a piece of property in May Township referred to as the Maywood South Plat. This plat consists of 11 proposed lots, ranging in size from 2.5 to 10 acres. One of the proposed lots has frontage on Square Lake. A new 1/2 mile road is proposed entering in a northerly direction off of Square Lake Trail and terminating in a temporary cul de sac where it meets Oakland Road. Grading is proposed for only the road work with some fill coming off of portions of two lots in the proposed subdivision. A storm water management plan was submitted that incorporates clean water diversions, three stormwater/sediment basins, and erosion control practices. All road runoff is proposed to be directed into one of the three stormwater basins. The post treatment water of two of the three basins will enter a wetland. The purpose of the stormwater basins are to provide settling areas for construction site runoff and keep peak post-development runoff rates to the same level as pre-developed conditions. He indicated that all of the lots have suitable septic systems which have been tested and sent to the County and have been approved. All the septic systems have the same type of sandy soil and are anywhere from 10 feet to 30 feet above what would be the water table. The final construction plans are not available because they haven't gotten that far into the process.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Land Use Specialist and member of the Washington County Plat Commission, presented an overview of the Plat Commission's review regarding a petition for an EAW. Items contained in this overview were: Background information on proposed plan; Standard of review, what is required by Minnesota Rules and the Environmental Quality Board; the Plat Commission Review; responses from the Plat Commission to Petition Review regarding 1) Square Lake and surface water contamination and groundwater contamination; 2) Wetlands; and conclusion by the Plat Commission that there would be no significant impact to Square Lake or the adjacent wetland as a result of this project and that an EAW is not needed for this project.

Mark Doneux, Water Resource Specialist, Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District, indicated that his office has a sitting membership on the Plat Commission and that their role is to review all plats for grading, drainage, erosion control, water quality, and wetland issues. They also review the plans for compliance consistency with numerous watershed districts and water management organization plans. Mr. Doneux discussed the following five areas: 1) Mandatory Requirements for EAW; 2) Grading and Drainage Plans; 3) Erosion Control Plan; 4) Plan Compliance Review of Marine on St. Croix Management Organization Plan; and 5) General Square Lake Water Quality.

Robert Dickie, Attorney representing the homeowners in the Square Lake area, and a resident of Afton, appeared on behalf of the petitioners for an EAW. He indicated he has enjoyed Square Lake since he moved here in 1975. He stated he was appalled by the lack of understanding of the resources that we have in Square Lake. He stated this was just not any development going in there, this development will increase the houses on that lake by one-third. He asked what will be the impact of this development on Square Lake? He feels that County staff is not qualified to address the environmental impact of this development on the lake--there is not a hydrologist, geologist, nor staff naturalist who have reviewed this project.

Mr. Dickie indicated that the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has not been invited to participate in this process. He indicated that the DNR has some valid and real concerns about this area, as Washington County should have as well. He stated that the DNR has made a huge commitment to Square Lake to help maintain its water quality and it supports a natural trout habitat. He was informed by the DNR that a particular wetland in this development area may not be a wetland at all, but may actually be a part of the lakeshore of Square Lake. He stated that this would change the requirements that both Washington County and May Township have. He found it appalling that this questions has not been addressed by County staff and by the developer.

Mr. Dickie stated that County staff have indicated that there has been no material evidence to support the petition. He advised the Board that they were not given the opportunity to participate in discussions at the Plat Commission. If they had been, they would have asked staff to review the submissions that had been made in the petition. Those submissions include not only the plat, which unlike the developer had indicated with the location of the septic systems as you can see in very close proximity to the wetlands, if you review the elevation data some of the surface area where the septic systems will be installed are 10 feet above the groundwater. It's his understanding that those septic systems are going to be below ground only a few feet above the water table. According to the hydrological maps that were provided with the petition, it shows the localized groundwater migration moving to Square Lake and then ultimately moving southeast towards the St. Croix River.

Mr. Dickie referred to an attachment on their petition which provides data that discusses the water table system in Washington County. Square Lake is in an area that has a high to very high probability of soil contamination due to the porous soils. He indicated that according to the geological survey, the ability of the soils to deal with contaminants entering this soil indicates that in an area where you have sand gravel deposits as you do here, there is a high to very high susceptibility to groundwater contamination, and that you actually have an increased likelihood of groundwater contamination when there is no bedrock. Which means, according to the geological survey conducted for this area, that contaminants entering the soil in the area of the proposed development will enter the groundwater within a matter of hours to days, which will flow into Square Lake and ultimately into the St. Croix System. They feel that is an extremely important issue. He indicated that staff was unable to provide that kind of analysis, they didn't even look at the maps when they sat in with the Plat Commission to discuss this.

Mr. Dickie then referred to the surficial geology map attached to the petition, which describes the types of soils that are located in the area. He also referred to depth to bedrock map, which indicates what's happening at Square Lake. He stated that when you have 135 foot wells currently being installed in the Square Lake area, and the bedrock is 200 to 250 feet below the surface, you have private wells in the gravel outwash which means they are getting the water not from the aquifer but from the surface aquifer. The surface aquifer, as already indicated by the prior geological map, is subjected to contamination that will transport itself in a matter of hours to days into the that aquifer or into Square Lake. This too was not dealt with by the staff recommendation. The bedrock geology map was also attached to the EAW petition.

Mr. Dickie listed other items contained in the EAW petition, but were not addressed by County staff, including the endangered species list. He then outlined questions which an EAW would ask, including value of the wildlife, fish in an ecologically sensitive resource, physical impact on water resources, and physical or hydrological alteration of any surface water. He stated that when these questions were asked at the Plat Commission, the best answer that was given was "we'll try to maintain the hydrological conditions". The EAW asks to go into more detail—how will you try, how will that affect hydrological conditions of those wetlands, will they raise, will they lower? Questions of rates of discharge in and out of the water body, the frequency and extent of water level fluctuations interaction with the groundwater, these are all questions that the EAW requires that the developer deal with which have not been dealt with.

Mr. Dickie raised questions on groundwater contamination--is there a better way to put these wells in, should we put in 11 separate wells, should we have one deeper well going into an aquifer? He suggested asking those questions before the developer gets plat approval to go ahead. He asked that the Department of Health respond to those questions. Another question on the EAW, what water related land use management districts apply to this particular development? There's multi-level layering of governmental entities that are responsible for managing Square Lake and have an interest in Square Lake--DNR, Washington County, May Township, federal government with regard to the Corps of Engineers. An EAW would require some coordination and transfer of data back and forth between the entities to make sure all the standards and requirements are dealt with.

Mr. Dickie stated that another question contained in an EAW regards water quality, surface water runoff issues, the amount and composition of stormwater runoff and plans to minimize adverse quality and quantity impacts. He stated that no mention has been made of what is going to happen with the road salt that goes into the holding ponds, what impact is that salt going to have on the wetlands when it does discharge into the wetlands? What's going to happen to the groundwater that's only a few feet below the holding ponds when it absorbs the salt, and where is it going to go and what effect will it have on Square Lake? These are questions that the EAW is designed to answer, and we don't have a clue from the County response to the petition that they understand the answers to those questions.

Mr. Dickie showed a map outlining a different type of development. The lots would be approximately 1½ acres in size, some would be larger, they fit the minimum requirements for cluster development. Surrounding all the wetlands there would be undisturbed area that would be owned in common by all the lot owners, they would have equal access and the right to use that area. That area could be developed into hiking and skiing trails around those wetlands, the ponds could be used as a skating rink in the winter time. Any potential impact of the type of suburban development that had been earlier proposed could be mitigated or eliminated all together. He suggested that the developer consider a 20 foot gravel road which are very common in the area around Square Lake and absorb more of the water runoff and don't shed them into different areas. He suggested that common septic systems could be proposed as in other areas such as Afton. He indicated that these are the kinds of developments that in 20 years will be extremely valuable after all the open spaces have been developed. He stated that answering the questions contained in an EAW, and once the developer enters into a dialogue with the different governing bodies that will be addressing these issues, will result in a better development both for themselves and for the environment in Washington County.

Judy Markham, resident of Square Lake and representing the petitioners for the EAW, indicated they are asking that this EAW be conducted so that some tough questions can be answered for reassurance that the environment in and around Square Lake not be harmed by this development. She stated that 44 petitioners, mostly Square Lake residents, signed the petition for an EAW. A few of the supporters have built new homes on existing homesites on Square Lake, several have upgraded substandard septic and road systems using County and Township guidelines. She stated they are not against development. They are against going ahead without having all the environmental questions answered. The questions on the EAW are worth asking. If the answers are positive, we will all have our assurance. If the answers are negative then they can be dealt with and we will feel glad that we asked in the future.

Lynette Anderson, Warner Nature Center, read into the record a letter from Tom Anderson, Director, Warner Nature Center, encouraging the Board to require an EAW for the proposed development site. Ms. Anderson also spoke on her own behalf. She wanted the Board to remember that natural communities is a word, and that there are actual life forms out there--the frogs, the birds and the insects--who are depending on our responsible decisions to ensure that they have a quality of life. She would ask that when the Board considers how the development is made, it remembers to be responsible and respectful of the other lives out there.

Jack Fortin, Director of Wilder Forest, read into the record a letter supporting the need for an EAW of the proposed Maywood South development.

Michael Alwin, Stillwater, stated that he is a member of Trout Unlimited, the Audubon Society, and the Nature Conservancy. He indicated that he was not here as a spokesman for these groups, he's simply a taxpayer and a concerned citizen. His interest in Square Lake is in maintaining the resource.

Mr. Alwin advised that Square Lake has the depth, the water clarity, the groundwater influence, and the temperature regime to survive as a two-stage fishery. Over the years the land around Square Lake has provided enough of a buffer so that this unique two-stage fishery can survive. In order to continue to do its job the integrity of the buffer cannot be compromised. Therefore, it is prudent to know the effect of development before the construction begins. That is why the County should initiate the process with an EAW, because when you compromise on the environment, the environment always loses.

Mark Larson, Stillwater, stated he heard some things this morning that has him concerned as a citizen of Washington County and a user of Square Lake. He described Perch Lake which has about one-third the surface acre of Square Lake and also has a two-stage fishery. He has heard comments that Perch Lake is not as clear as Square Lake. He asked a question regarding a creek that emerges from the woods just west of Square Lake and it goes underground and comes out again somewhere--where does the creek go and what aquifer, what groundwater table is it near and how will the water continue its flow into Square Lake? He supports the request for an EAW.

Renee Pritzker, homeowner on Square Lake, stated that what this dialogue has shown this morning is that there are greater environmental questions that need to be answered before this development goes through. She stated she is also a member of the Square Lake Association and that their position is not that there can never be development in this area, but that the development be thoughtful and protect a resource that's available for all the people in the County as well as in the State. She asked that the Board take the responsibility as stewards of Square Lake seriously, and that the Board do a thorough environmental review to ensure that this resource be protected.

Dean Tharp, resident of Square Lake, stated he had a couple of concerns. He cautioned the Board to not be totally dependent or rely on the advice of the Plat Commission. He indicated that he was told that the Plat Commission was not a public meeting and that the public was not invited. He reviewed law books and found that Commission meetings are public and the public is invited. When he got to meeting he found out that the public was not invited to participate and he was concerned about that because of the nature of the discussion and the immediate effect it would have on him as an adjacent property owner. He was concerned that no evidence was allowed to be presented on behalf of the petitioners. He also heard at this meeting from Mr. Doneux about an erosion and drainage control plan that was designed. He wanted to know who designed it, was it the Soil and Water Conservation District or the developer? He cautioned the Board to really consider what Mr. Doneux's involvement is in developing these soil and water erosion control and drainage plans. Another issue that occurred at the Plat Commission that was not addressed is what would happen to the road salt when the ponds were frozen? The question wasn't answered. Another concern regards a permanent structure which is being directed over the wetland and doesn't require a variance. He asked the Department of Health and Environment and Land Management why a structure going over a wetland doesn't require a variance? His previous experience before the Board of Review was that he couldn't build a permanent structure

within 75 feet of a wetland. He has serious questions about that. Commissioner Abrahamson indicated that that had nothing to do with the plat, that it was a separate issue with the DNR.

Mr. Tharp stated that as a resident of Square Lake he is enormously sympathetic to the problems developers have and people who are trying to get building permits. They are for orderly development here. Part of the orderly development that he hopes the Commissioners would support would be to hold the conservation effort dear to their hearts.

Floyd Johnson, resident of Square Lake for 35 years, stated he spends a lot of time protecting that lake and the protection is against those people that have moved in, not this development. This development will probably have the best septic systems and engineering planning in the whole watershed of Square Lake. He asked why do we spend our time complaining about this development when there are septic systems on the lake that are very poor? He indicated that the property next to his has 500 gallons of affluent within 60 feet of Square Lake. This system is 40 feet above the lake and if it leaks it will leak directly into Square Lake not through a wetland. The same property has caused erosion which is also a pollution to Square Lake. It has caused a ditch that is 12 feet deep. There is a new sandbar in Square Lake. Now these people are saying that this development should not go through because they feel it is improper. This development is the best of all of the septic systems in that Square Lake watershed area. He thinks more time should be spent on those properties including his. He guesses it is not nearly as good as these systems are going to be. He suggested spending time and effort on where the problems are and not trying to create problems where there are not any.

Tracy Mazanec, May Township Board Chairman, stated there is an important responsibility when the County administers zoning requirements within a township. He has reviewed the EAW request and finds it not only sound but extremely prudent for this project. He asked that the Commissioners take their responsibility and require this EAW for this project.

Commissioner Peterson asked if the Township would pay for the EAW? Mr. Mazanec stated he could not speak for the Township. Mr. Dickie stated that the Board as the RGU has the authority to assign who would pay that, and it's either going to be yourselves or what normally happens is the developer would pay for the EAW. The governing body is not going to pay for it, although your staff is going to assist in preparing the EAW.

Mr. Dickie also stated that they do believe that this does require a mandatory EAW because of the construction of the dock. It indicated in the EQB guidelines, that generally any project that removes material from the bed, places material on the bed, or places structures on the bed of a protected water or protected wetland requires an EAW.

Randy Samuelson, resident of May Township and also a member of the Planning Commission, stated that he was appalled by the attorney for the Square Lake Homeowners Association, for making the

statements that the Washington County Plat Commission and staff is unqualified to review plans. He indicated that he has worked with them for the past five years and found them to be very qualified in doing that. This group does not represent all the residents of May Township and apologized to the Commissioners and the staff of the Plat Commission.

David Magnuson, Attorney, spoke on behalf of the developer. He stated that the petitioners have given their concerns for Square Lake but there was not any evidence presented that there is the potential for significant environmental harm. Mr. Magnuson referred to a map showing the development area and the peoples names in bold are the people that signed the petition. He went on to say that these people were given variances for several different reasons including substandard lots, houses too close to the lake, variance from the bluffland setback as well as the public road requirement, variance on a cement boathouse right on the shore. He asked are these people concerned? He said yes, they are concerned as long as they don't have to abide by the same regulations that other people have to abide by. He asked how can they say they are concerned about Square Lake when they come to this Board and ask for variances from all the various regulations that they want imposed on everybody else. He stated that last year several of these same people decided that they would improve Oakland Road. They did this without a permit to go in and begin work. He showed a picture of the results. They did not have a grading plan or an erosion control plan. Furthermore, the roadway goes right through a designated wetland as designated by the Army Corps of Engineers. These are the petitioners that want to drag this process through an extra six months of waiting and another \$25,000 worth of expense. He stated that the Board has to listen to their staff. There's no evidence of potential and significant environmental harm to the turtles and birds. He asked the Board to deny the petition for an EAW.

Dennis O'Donnell commented on the comments made by the petitioners. He expected there would be more evidence presented. He expected that there would a geologist, hydrologist to prove that these things will occur. The DNR has been aware of this plat, and also this is just the concept phase of this plat. The Plat Commission has not gone into great depth and has not given even preliminary approval to this plat and will definitely have the DNR involved in any approval process. In response to the petitioner's cluster development for some common septic areas. One of the things they forgot to look at were the state rules which prohibit a common drain field for new developments. A concern was putting so much sewage in one area where you could create a groundwater or surface water contamination problem.

Commissioner Hegberg asked what the setback was for septic systems on Square Lake. Mr. O'Donnell responded that it was 75 feet. Commissioner Hegberg asked what the setback requirement is for a wetland. Mr. O'Donnell responded 75 feet.

Commissioner Engstrom asked Mr. O'Donnell if the DNR was invited for any input, and was this issue of whether the wetland is part of the lake or not and had that been addressed?

Mr. O'Donnell stated that the DNR was aware of this project. He indicated that we were not required to provide them information or make them aware of this EAW petition, but they certainly are aware and they did not send us any response saying an EAW petition would be recommended or that that was part of the lake. He indicated they would further explore that as the plat proceeds through the approval process. It hasn't even gone before the township as far as he knew.

Commissioner Engstrom asked if Mr. Doneux was a hydrologist? Mr Doneux indicated that he was not. Commissioner Engstrom asked for his background. Mr. Doneux stated he has a bachelor of science degree in environmental science, the degree is specifically called reclamation. He spent the last ten years as an environmental scientist, environmental project manager, for R. A. Smith and Associates in Milwaukee with principle duties to conduct lake and wetland and environmental watershed management projects for the firm. He stated he joined the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District in June.

Mr. Doneux stated he had two comments. First, all of the staff did review the geological maps prior to the Plat Commission special meeting. His other comment was relative to the Soil and Water Conservation District working with developers. They often encourage the developers to work with them. They see what works and what doesn't work. They give the developers ideas on how to minimize any impacts on grading and erosion on construction sites and that they will continue to do that.

The Board Chairman asked for further comments, none were heard. The Board secretary indicated that she had all the documentary evidence and that it was made a part of the record.

Commissioner Engstrom asked the County Attorney to address the comments that the public was not allowed to participate at the Plat Commission. Bob Turrentine, Assistant County Attorney, indicated that under the Environmental Quality Board rules, because this is not a County function, when the petition is reviewed and a recommendation is made to the County Board it is made at a staff level. The decision was made to review the petition at the Plat Commission which is a public meeting, no one is denied the opportunity to attend the meeting, but it's not a public hearing. The public hearing portion was intended to be today before the County Board. The petitioners were present and were allowed to ask questions and answer questions.

Commissioner Engstrom asked what the repercussions for not voting for an EAW, what is the recourse? Mr. Turrentine stated that the procedure is the County Board will make its decision, it will provide that decision to the Environmental Quality Board, the Environmental Quality Board will publish their decision. Within 30 days of publishing the decision either the developer or the petitioners if they don't like the decision can sue in district court to have the decision turned over regardless of what the decision is.

Commissioner Engstrom asked the County Attorney if he knew the cost of an EAW, he indicated that he contacted the University of Minnesota and they indicated the cost of an EAW was about \$15,000? Mr. Turrentine indicated that he could not answer that. Mr. O'Donnell indicated that the price could vary depending on how thorough the EAW is.

Commissioner Engstrom asked when staff expected to hear from the DNR on whether that is a lake or a wetland? Mr. O'Donnell stated he couldn't give an exact time on that, but he assumed they could get back to them in a short period of time. Commissioner Engstrom asked if that issue was raised before? Mr. O'Donnell indicated that it was not brought up at the Plat Commission. They found out about it a few days ago.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he was also concerned about Square Lake. He stated he did some research through the University of Minnesota to determine if there was some concerns of the septic systems and he could find none. He called the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency to determine if there were areas that have septic problems and have been documented as contaminated wells. He stated there were individual cases, but even in much smaller lots there were no indications of pollution from the septic systems. He talked to the Minnesota Extension Office concerning the clustering of septic systems. They indicated to him that that would be a bigger concern being a cluster system rather than individual systems because people could dump their waste in that and you wouldn't know where it came from unless you were able to track the waste through the system. With those considerations also he finds that there is no evidence that this will cause a problem to Square Lake.

Commissioner Engstrom stated he will vote for an EAW. He stated that there should have been DNR input, there was an issue raised as to whether the Square Lake wetland is a wetland or a lake.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that if that wetland would be considered part of the lake the setback is identical--75 feet. So he stated that would be immaterial. Mr. O'Donnell agreed with Commissioner Hegberg. He indicated that the developer may need to rearrange a lot line here or there, but there wouldn't be a material change in that plat map.

Commissioner Hauser moved to deny the petition for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) for the proposed plat of Maywood South in May Township based on the following findings:

The proposed development plan shows all road runoff being directed to stormwater management facilities, therefore further reducing the potential for surface water contamination. Therefore, based upon the evidence submitted in the petition, it does not appear that there would be any significant environmental impact to Square Lake from lawn chemicals, septic systems or road salt from this project.

Based upon the grading plan submitted, 0.4 acres of slopes greater than 25% would be altered for road or driveway construction. Therefore, the limited use and grading of steep slopes should not have a significant environmental impact to Square Lake. The steep slopes would only be used for road or driveway construction. All slopes will have erosion

control provisions, including erosion matting for steep slopes. Finally, all road drainage will be directed to stormwater detention facilities for treatment.

There is no anticipated decrease in water clarity or increase in water temperature to Square Lake due to this project. This assessment is made based upon the low density development, the three stormwater detention facilities and because of the four wetlands located between the project and the lake.

Further, based upon the evidence submitted in the petition, the use of lawn chemicals does not appear to pose a significant environmental impact to the groundwater. Due to the low density of the proposed development and the wooded lots, lawn areas are anticipated to be substantially smaller than the lot size and even smaller than the minimum buildable area of each lot which is one acre. Smaller lawns translates into less overall chemical use and provides a greater buffer and absorption area.

Where as previously discussed, all lots have been approved for on-site private sewage treatment systems. Groundwater contamination as a result of these systems installations should not occur.

The Minnesota Department of Health reviews and approves private well permits which is out of the RGU's which is the County's area of authority.

Based upon the evidence submitted in the petition, the use of household hazardous waste does not appear to pose a significant environmental impact to Square Lake or groundwater.

Potentially shallow wells on Square Lake should not be impacted from groundwater contamination for the reasons discussed previously.

Five wetlands exist on the proposed development, however, contrary to the petition, no wetland filing is proposed for this project.

There is no direct untreated, concentrated stormwater runoff discharged to any wetlands on this project. All road runoff is directed to one of three stormwater detention facilities prior to its discharge to wetlands. No direct, concentrated, post treatment runoff is being discharged into the wetlands that abut Square Lake. Erosion control practices are proposed to minimize sedimentation reaching the stormwater detention ponds. The ponds are designed to current Minnesota Pollution Control Agency standards for "Protecting Water Quality in Urban Areas." Additionally, erosion control practices are proposed in areas where any other grading may occur. Therefore, due to the stormwater management and erosion control plan proposed for the Maywood South development, no significant environmental impact is expected to occur to on-site wetlands.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion, and it was adopted with a 4-1 vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser and Hegberg; No, Commissioner Engstrom.

The Board took a five minute recess.

COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE

Commissioner Engstrom moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-195 as follows:

Landfill Cleanup Agreement and Waiver of Claims

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Washington County Board of Commissioners and the Washington County Administrator are authorized to sign those documents necessary to enter into a Landfill Cleanup Agreement with the Commissioner of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, including the Landfill Cleanup Agreement, easement to the former Richert property, Declaration of Restrictions and Covenants to the former Richert property, off-site easements and agreements, Waiver of Claims, Quit Claim Deed to former Richert property and Settlement Agreement with the City of Lake Elmo, all as negotiated by the Washington County Attorney's Office.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Training Assessment Plan

The County Administrator gave a brief explanation of the County's application for Association of Minnesota Counties Achievement Award for the Training Assessment Plan which was approved on the Consent Calendar this morning. This plan was awarded a National Association of Counties Achievement Award this past summer. It was felt that this plan should be brought to the attention of other counties, as it may be a benefit to them in developing their own plan.

County Library Employees

The County Administrator informed the Board that the plan for incorporating the County Library employees into the general County personnel system is now completed.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chairman asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg stated there will be a public hearing on the Joint Ditch No. 1 on October 25.

Commissioner Peterson suggested a workshop concerning the Metro Area Agency on Aging to see how that is working out.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA NOVEMBER 7, 1995

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 4:30 p.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser and Hegberg. Absent none. Chairman Abrahamson presided. PUBLIC HEARING-HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT Amendment to the Washington County Hazardous Waste Management Ordinance

The Waste Manager presented an overview of the proposed amendments to the Washington County Hazardous Waste Management Ordinance.

The Board Chair opened the public hearing and asked for comments from the audience; none were heard. The Public Hearing was closed at 4:35 p.m.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-203 as follows:

Washington County Hazardous
Waste Management Ordinance Amendments
Ordinance No. 119

WHEREAS, the Waste Management Act, which imposes various mandates upon counties, was created out of concern for the protection of water, air and land resources, as well as protection of public health; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes Section 473.811 Subdivision 5b, specifies that each Metro County shall, by ordinance, establish and revise rules, regulations, and standards relating to Hazardous Waste. Provisions of this Statute require revision of the County Ordinance that embodies and is consistent with the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency Rules, Minnesota Rules Chapter 7045.0020 et. seq.; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners of the County of Washington acknowledges the need for protection of the environment and public health and the need for regulation of hazardous waste.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners in and for the County of Washington, Minnesota, that Washington County Hazardous Waste Management Ordinance No. 78 is hereby amended in accordance with the attachments hereto, which are made a part hereof, and the same to become effective upon the publication of the minutes of these proceedings in the official newspaper of the County.

WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA ORDINANCE #119

Amendment to Hazardous Waste Management Ordinance #78

An ordinance establishing standards to protect the health, safety and general welfare of the people of Washington County relating to hazardous waste management: Amends Washington County Hazardous Waste Management Ordinance #78 adopted on September 27, 1989.

The Washington County Hazardous Waste Management Ordinance is being revised in accordance with Minnesota Statute 473.811, subd. 5b, which specifies that each metropolitan county shall by ordinance establish and revise rules, regulations, and standards relating to (1) the identification of hazardous waste, (2) the labeling and classification of hazardous waste, (3) the collection, storage transportation, processing, and disposal of hazardous waste, and (4) other matters necessary for the public health, welfare and safety. The county shall require permits or licenses for the generation, collection, processing, and disposal of hazardous waste and shall require registration with a county office. County hazardous waste ordinances may not be inconsistent with, and must be at least as stringent as the agency hazardous waste rules.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication according to law. (The full text of the ordinance is on file at the offices of the Auditor-Treasurer, Administrator of Washington County and the Washington County Department of Health, Environment and Land Management.)

Passed by the Board of County Commissioners of Washington County, Minnesota, this 7th day of November, 1995.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Acquisition of Property for Inclusion into Grey Cloud Island Regional Park and Grant Agreement from Metropolitan Council for Land Acquisition

The Public Works Director presented an overview of a proposal to acquire property for inclusion into the Grey Cloud Island Regional Park. Funds for the purchase of this property would come from the following sources: \$183,000 would come from the park permit fees for access to the parks; \$100,000 would come from the stewardship account which is money that is rental money from property that's under the Metropolitan Parks System; and \$607,000 would be a grant from the Metropolitan Council for a total purchase price of \$890,000.

Commissioner Peterson asked Sam Cave, the developer and seller of this property, for discussion purposes only, if these lots with houses would sell for \$300,000? Mr. Cave indicated that would be a modest figure. Commissioner Peterson stated that if this development was divided into 16 lots and homes were built, that they would generate \$96,000 a year in taxes that would be divided between the city, county and school district, and that over a 20 year period they would generate \$1,920,000.

Commissioner Peterson stated that there is an opportunity for the County to receive money from a housing development on this parcel of property and that there is still enough land for a park in that area. She feels this property is good residential property and would generate \$96,000 a year in taxes. She

finds it difficult to spend this kind of money on the purchase of property for a major regional park when there are still over 1,300 acres left. She wonders with the cutbacks coming from the federal government for medical assistance, juvenile justice out-of-home placement and other social programs how the County can justify spending this kind of money for a park. Where will the money come from to purchase more property and to take on greater liability for future parks?

Commissioner Hauser stated that the funds used to purchase this property can only be used for parks.

This money cannot be spent on any of the other issues Commissioner Peterson indicated.

Commissioner Peterson also stated she was concerned about placing additional transportation problems in the Cottage Grove area with this park, they are already being penalized for transportation problems on Highway 61.

Commissioner Peterson moved to deny the request for acquisition of the Michaud property for inclusion into the Grey Cloud Island Regional Park. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it failed with a 3-2 vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson and Abrahamson; No, Commissioners Engstrom, Hauser and Hegberg.

Commissioner Hauser moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-204 as follows:

Agreement Between State of Minnesota and Washington County for a Metropolitan Grant SG-95-36

WHEREAS, Washington County desires to acquire 80 acres of land for park expansion in Grey Cloud Island Regional Park;

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Legislature, by 1995 Minnesota Laws Chapter 220, Section 20, item(b) has appropriated \$607,000.00 to the Commissioner of Natural Resources for this land acquisition;

WHEREAS, Washington County agrees to be in compliance with legal restrictions and requirements, including Minnesota Statutes Section 473.301 et seq. and all other relevant state and federal laws and regulations governing this grant in fulfillment of this project;

THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED, that this agreement be approved and executed by the Washington County Board of Commissioners and the County Administrator.

Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted with a 3-2 vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom, Hauser and Hegberg; No, Commissioners Peterson and Abrahamson.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-205 as follows:

Resolution to Purchase Michaud Property Grey Cloud Island Regional Park

WHEREAS, Washington County is interested in acquiring the property described in addendum no. 1 in Grey Cloud Township, for inclusion into the Grey Cloud Island Regional Park and whereas the owners agree to sell the property.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes its Chairman and Administrator to execute on behalf of the County a purchase agreement and any other document necessary for the County to purchase the property legally described in Addendum No. 1 ("the Property") for the sum of \$890,000; in total.

Conveyance should be by warranty deed pursuant to the terms and conditions of a standard Miller-Davis Purchase Agreement free and clear of all liens, charges and encumbrances. This purchase agreement shall be subject to the following conditions:

- Seller to pay all levied or pending special assessments (if any);
- b. Seller to pay abstract expenses;
- c. Real Estate taxes shall be pro rated as of the date of closing;
- d. Seller to pay state deed tax and conservation fee, if any;
- e. Seller to pay all the Green Acre payback tax on the property described in addendum no. 1.
- f. Closing is to be on or before December 1, 1995. The closing shall be handled through the Washington County Attorney's Office.
- g. The acquisition is subject to a satisfactory environmental assessment by the County.
- h. This sale is being made in lieu of condemnation.
- Sale is contingent upon the seller obtaining the necessary approvals by the required governmental bodies to split parcels 85025-2000 and 27030-3750.
- Seller shall successfully complete its purchase of the Property from the Estate of Martha Michaud and Betty Kartarik.
- k. The property is being purchased by Buyer in its present physical condition. Buyer has, or will have prior to Closing, conducted such tests, reviews, appraisals, and inspections of the Property as it deems necessary or appropriate in connection with the acquisition thereof and shall rely solely upon such due diligence with regard to the condition of the Property including all environmental matters, the location, size, character, value, subsurface or soil condition, and state of repair thereof. Upon closing, buyer shall be deemed to have purchased the property "as is" without any representation or warranty whatsoever, express or implied.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Natural Resources Block Grant

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve expenditures of \$16,000 of State Natural Resources Block Grant-Wetland Funds for Brown's Creek Water Management Organization hydrologic study and stormwater management plan. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Impact of the Livable Communities Act on Transportation Funding

The Commissioners discussed the Livable Communities Act and the impact it would have on transportation funding. Commissioners Hauser and Engstrom attended a Metropolitan County Transportation Advisory Board (TAB) meeting on October 31 and gave an overview of the discussion that took place. A proposal was made to the TAB Policy Committee recommending that legislation be changed to include a place for counties to register their adoption or not of the Livable Communities Act in order to gain their own points for their own proposals for ISTEA money. The proposal is that county sponsored projects will be awarded 50 points if the following conditions are met: 1) Project in more than one city will be awarded 50 points if at least 20% of the project is located in a city that has adopted a resolution to participate in the Local Housing Incentives program by February 9, 1996; and/or 2) the county adopts a resolution supporting the Livable Communities Act, pledges to encourage communities in its jurisdiction to participate in the Local Housing Incentives program, and indicates how the county or another county entity (i.e. HRA) will assist municipalities that choose to participate in the Local Housing Incentives program, to meet their negotiated affordable and life-cycle housing goals.

Commissioner Peterson indicated that Metropolitan Council has created a Livable Communities Committee which is made up primarily of city representatives. She requested the Board's support in her appointment to this committee as a representative of the Transportation Advisory Board. She feels that it would be a good idea to bring a county perspective to this committee.

AND A

The County Administrator suggested that if the Board is in support of the proposal as discussed that it send that message to the next TAB Policy Committee meeting scheduled for November 13. Then, after the guidelines are developed and the requirements as to what the county would have to do if this policy is adopted, a resolution could be prepared for Board action at that time.

Commissioner Engstrom moved general support for the proposal outlined in the Metropolitan Council letter of November 6, 1995 regarding ISTEA Incentive Funding Policy as follows: County sponsored projects will be awarded 50 points if the following conditions are met: 1) Project in more than one city will be awarded 50 points if at least 20% of the project is located in a city that has adopted a resolution to participate in the Local Housing Incentives program by February 9, 1996; and/or 2) the county adopts a resolution supporting the Livable Communities Act, pledges to encourage communities in its jurisdiction to participate in the Local Housing Incentives program, and indicates how the county or another county entity (i.e. HRA) will assist municipalities that choose to participate in the Local Housing Incentives program, to meet their negotiated affordable and life-cycle housing goals. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Engstrom moved that a letter supporting the appointment of Commissioner Peterson to the Livable Communities Committee as a Transportation Advisory Board representative. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Meeting with the Greater St. Paul Tomorrow Group

The County Administrator informed the Board that there is a group called Greater St. Paul Tomorrow, which is a policy/planning organization with 28 members made up of elected officials and business community representatives throughout the east metro area. He stated that Commissioner Hauser sits on that committee. He indicated that they are in the process of putting together a Social Outcomes Report outlining the social and economic health of the east metro area and have expressed an interest in meeting with the local officials. He suggested holding a forum such as the one held a few months ago with Metropolitan Council, inviting all the elected officials. It was Board consensus to hold this forum and a date would be determined at a later date.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORT - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Engstrom discussed the possibility of scheduling regular meetings between the County Board members and the County legislative delegation during the legislative session at the Capitol. The County Attorney advised the Board that these meetings will need to be noticed as to time, place, and items to be discussed. It was Board consensus that these meetings be scheduled.

Commissioner Peterson acknowledged Harvey Stiefel, Grey Cloud Island Township, who has faithfully served the County for many years. She and the other Board members thanked Mr. Stiefel for his services on the Planning Advisory Committee.

Commissioner Peterson also thanked the Board members and County staff for their support during the last week.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Engstrom moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Hegberg and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 5:45 p.m.

The following is a recap of items discussed at the workshop:

<u>Purpose:</u> Identify concerns that the Commissioners would like to spend more time discussing before approving the plans.

Concerns:

<u>I-94 Land Use</u> - Consensus was reached on removing the statement referring to commercial development when sewer and water is available. The land use would remain R-1. The County can consider amending the plan in the future if the circumstances change.

Alternative Waste Treatment Systems - Consensus was reached on adding an implementation action relating to staff researching alternatives to individual on-site septic systems and the county reviewing its current septic ordinance, and adding language to the plan providing the county with the option to use alternative systems in the future. This ties into the sections on cluster development, rural centers, the commercial/industrial policy, and the natural resource policies.

<u>MUSA Expansion</u> - There was some concern that the Plan included too much emphasis on expansion of the MUSA. A suggestion was made to delete comments that are supportive of MUSA expansion. However, another comment was made that the Plan should look beyond 2015 a bit and indicate areas where the MUSA should be expanded and areas where it should not be expanded. This relates to the sections on the general philosophy of the plan, transition areas and supporting cities in their efforts to plan for orderly growth.

Rural Centers - Be sure that the rural center boundaries and applicable policies are well defined.

<u>Cluster Housing</u> - A suggestion was made to refer to cluster housing as Planned Unit Development Housing. Open space permanence: What can the County require? How far can the plan go? A suggestion was made to include a list of criteria that must be met in order to convert open space to another use? Need to specify a maximum lot size.

Minimum Lot Size - Staff will evaluate the impact of eliminating the minimum lot size and develop pros and cons of doing this. The lot size should be dictated by performance standards such as septic requirements, well requirements, lot width, etc.

<u>Density</u> - Concept: A suggestion was made to stick with the current plan and give townships more authority. Another suggestion was made to adopt one overall density for each township instead having different density districts.

Calculation: A suggestion was made to only include what's buildable. Staff will work up an example to show the impact of excluding lakes, parks, and wetlands.

<u>Right-to-Farm Issue</u> - What can the County do to ensure that the farmers operation is not considered a "nuisance" as more rural residential development occurs? What is the feasibility of passing legislation for open space protection similar to the Metropolitan Agricultural Preserves Act?

Affordable Housing - Does the plan do all it can to address the affordable housing issue. The plan should describe the concept of "community".

<u>Water</u> - Be sure that the plan has policies regarding proper planning and storm water run-off to avoid some of the water problems that have been occurring.

Natural Features - Incorporate more language regarding protecting the counties natural features.

<u>Linear Parks</u> - Issues - cost, maintenance, liability.

The following is a brief recap of the discussion that took place:

Issue: I-94 Land Use in West Lakeland Township

Discussion:

<u>Commissioner Peterson</u> - 50 years from now this area will be an economic resource. We should preserve it. It is ludicrous to put rural residential next to a freeway. Agricultural zoning makes most sense - preserves long-term options and allows PUD's. (Both sides of freeway.) The County will need an economic base to pay for open space.

<u>Commissioner Engstrom</u> - Wants agricultural zoning on south side of freeway. Parks and Open Space Commission is researching the viability of a golf course.

<u>Commissioner Peterson</u> - Her vision is corridor of corporate headquarters. We should encourage development of a golf course. Noise is hazardous.

<u>Commissioner Engstrom</u> - Not in favor of commercial along the corridor, in most areas. Probably won't be commercial within next 20 years.

<u>Commissioner Hauser</u> - North and south do not need to be treated in the same way. Need to look at permitted uses to be sure we can live with what is allowed in an agricultural zone.

<u>Commissioner Abrahamson</u> - Keep R-1 on north side of freeway. Citizens want no sewer and water. Already have houses in the area. Others have plans to develop houses.

<u>Commissioner Peterson</u> - Tanner's Lake, City of Landfall - examples of developments that should not have been allowed. They are now causing problems for developing economic uses. We should not make the same mistake.

Bob Turrentine, Assistant County Attorney - When down zoning you need to leave some uses to allow the owners to have reasonable use of the property. This can be done through implementation. You need to be in furtherance of a legitimate governmental purpose (land banking for future residential or commercial). He would be more comfortable with 1/10 than 1/40.

<u>Commissioner Hegberg</u> - Concerned about noise - residential isn't appropriate in this location. Agriculture will preserve the land for long-term uses. DuPage County is an example of good development along a freeway. It is what the I-94 corridor should look like. Need to allow interim uses. What you see along the freeway is quads - where poor people live. It isn't fair to the poor people.

<u>Commissioner Abrahamson</u> - People aren't concerned about the noise. Leave the area as is - that's what the people want. Let the township plan it for long-term commercial if that is their wish.

Commissioner Hauser - 1/10 residential will get us into some legal tangles. It's not inconceivable that the south side of the freeway could be annexed to Afton and the city could then rezone it.

The Board met in workshop session with the Office of Administration to continue discussion on the 2015 Comprehensive Plan. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser, and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Virginia Erdahl, Bob Turrentine, Jane Harper, Dennis O'Donnell, Robert Lockyear, Ron Amland, Stillwater Gazette, and Jim Broede, Pioneer Press. The following is a brief recap of the discussion that took place:

Issue: MUSA Expansion

Discussion:

Commissioner Abrahamson - Announced that the Township Association will seek changes to annexation laws to require a referendum. How would this affect the Plan?

Commissioner Peterson - The Sustainable Development Committee has asked all cities, towns and counties to take the next two years to study what position should be supported regarding annexation legislation.

Commissioner Hauser - The emphasis in the Plan should be on supporting the agreement between cities and towns, not on prescribing where annexation boundaries should be.

Commissioner Engstrom - We need to encourage cooperation.

Commissioner Peterson - The MUSA needs to be more flexible. The County needs to work with the cities to expand the MUSA and provide them room to grow. It is foolhardy for the county to not support orderly annexation in areas adjacent to the cities, especially when there is demand for urban-type housing. Orderly annexation is good land use policy. Sewered development will protect the ground water. That is better than a county full of 2 1/2 acre lots with individual on-site sewage treatment systems that might someday pollute the ground water.

Commissioner Hauser - Questioned how we influence the use of the land if we defer to the cities and their desires to expand. She fears that the County will have creeping sewers and a development pattern that might make a Woodbury or an Oakdale of the entire county. If we support the transition areas, they will fill up and ultimately put more pressure on the adjoining townships for smaller lots.

Commissioner Hegberg - People need a place to live. So many people will move here and we must provide for them. Some development will occur whether or not we do anything. We need the transition areas to allow for future high density development.

Commissioner Abrahamson - The only reason Stillwater wants to annex is to provide the sewer line to the schools. The services in the transition areas will cost more than the revenues generated.

Commissioner Engstrom - Transition areas will encourage more growth and a greater rate of growth.

Commissioner Hauser - Embraces the theory but the applications show the folly of the theory. We need to build in the regulations and policies to cause the theory to work. The current ways don't work. The Met Council has been unable to do something on a regional basis. We still can't find enough density to support mass transit.

Commissioner Engstrom - We need to tie our transportation investments to our desired land use.

Commissioner Hauser - We need to assess our fees and recover full costs from the towns we serve.

Commissioner Peterson - The market for large lots with large houses will deteriorate as the baby boomers age. They will want smaller structures, townhouses or condominiums. We need a place for these units. The large houses will decline in value as the demand for them decreases. We need to make up for the loss in tax capacity with more density.

Commissioner Hauser - Current zoning makes growth unmanageable. We shouldn't segregate communities by zone. We should consciously create community. Now we do it through social services after we've butchered the land. We should start with rural centers and build out. People want to live in areas where the services are.

Direction:

Change the Plan's language on page 4-30 <u>General Philosophy</u> to read: "Locations within the Metropolitan Urban Service Area (MUSA) should continue to accommodate staged serviced residential, commercial and industrial growth to the limits of **the MUSA**. The County will **support** orderly annexation agreements **developed cooperatively** between cities and townships in identified transition areas...."

The other references to MUSA will be revisited after the discussions on density.

November 21, 1995

Issue: Cluster Housing - Permanence of Dedicated Open Space

Discussion:

Commissioner Engstrom - Would like to require the townships to offer clustering as a development option. (Attorney Bob Turrentine confirmed that this would be legal.) Commissioner Peterson agreed.

Commissioner Peterson - Endorses the clustered housing concept. The ordinance needs to include a maximum lot size to make cluster housing work. She is concerned about ground water impacts from clustered housing. The ordinance must include performance standards to protect the environment.

Commissioner Hegberg - The bonus needs to be liberal enough to pay for the additional planning and design work developers will need to do. This is the key to the whole program.

Direction:

Delete the sentence referring to developing the open land if the land is rezoned.

Delete the words "for the development" and "No other uses, of the common land are permitted." These statements may exclude some legitimate open space uses.

Require that townships offer cluster as an option - the townships would be required to adopt the County's cluster ordinance.

The ordinance should contain a minimum and maximum lot size.

The following is a brief recap of the discussion that took place:

Issue: Maximum Housing Density Concept

Discussion:

Commissioner Engstrom - To have individuals buy into the concept of cluster development, the zoning ordinance should have input from specific groups such as the Builders Association to help develop that ordinance.

Commissioner Hegberg - The Board needs to have more discussion on the density districts, and the bonus given for cluster development has to be significant enough to pay for infrastructure of clustering our planned unit developments.

Commissioner Hauser - Feels that a consensus has been reached that clustering is important enough that we are interested in finding an appropriate incentive level.

Commissioner Peterson - It may mean that the County will have to hire a specialist in this type of zoning because there may be legal and planning questions that we don't have experience with.

Dennis O'Donnell, Sr. Land Use Specialist - In order for clustering development to work, you need to convince the townships that clustering is a good idea and their ordinance would have to closely resemble the County's.

November 28, 1995

Commissioner Hauser - Believes that the Comprehensive Plan should indicate what the township density should be and then allow the townships to divide it up according to how they could achieve that density without setting any kind of minimum or maximum lot size. This would mean that the town plan has to be in

sync with the County's Comprehensive Plan. But we should allow maximum flexibility not only for the townships but for the property owners within those townships.

Direction

Consensus: The concept of maximum housing density accepted by the Board.

Issue: Average Housing Density Calculation

Discussion:

Commissioner Engstrom - Would like to see the public waters, public parks and wetlands excluded from the calculation.

Commissioner Peterson - Believes you cannot totally exclude wetlands from the calculation.

Commissioner Hauser - Undevelopable areas, whether they are water or just wetland, should not be included in the calculations.

Commissioner Hegberg - Would prefer to keep wetlands in the calculation of density because it allows the township to decide and look at that area. He questions whether you could define wetlands to such an extent that you could exclude it without getting into a whole regulatory program and lawsuits because of the size.

Bob Turrentine, Assistant County Attorney - If the County moves towards the density concept, there is nothing in the state or federal law that would prohibit the County from including or excluding the wetlands as part of the density because what protects wetlands is the setbacks from building on them and the inability to drain them. However, if you use minimum lot size then there are a few more constraints.

Direction

Discussion on the average housing density calculation will be continued at the December 12, 1995, Board meeting along with discussion on density districts.

WETLAND CONSERVATION ACT

Commissioner Engstrom moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-220 as follows:

Wetland Conservation Act

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners believes that wetlands are important resources that need to be protected in order to provide: storage area for excess water during times of flooding; filtering of sediments and nutrients before they enter lakes, rivers, and streams; fish and wildlife habitat; public recreation; commercial uses; and

WHEREAS, the County Board recognizes that the present Minnesota Wetland Conservation Act should be amended to provide more flexibility to local units of government in order to help them better deal with their local wetland issues; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners believes that the amendments to the Minnesota Wetland Conservation Act being proposed by the Board of Water and Soil Resources strike an appropriate balance between the protection of wetlands and the need for local control.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners supports the legislative amendments to the Minnesota Wetland Conservation Act being proposed by the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Association of Minnesota Counties and to the legislative delegation representing Washington County.

Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted with a 3-2 vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom, Abrahamson and Hauser; No, Commissioners Peterson and Hegberg.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Community Services Director introduced Andrea Skolkin, Executive Director, and Robert Provost, Chairman, Board of Directors, Metropolitan Area Agency on Aging. Ms. Skolkin and Mr. Provost presented an update on the Metropolitan Area Agency on Aging.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Capital Improvement Plan

The Physical Development Planner presented an update on the 1996-2000 Capital Improvement Plan and requested that this plan be set for public hearing. Commissioner Peterson moved to set the public hearing date for the 1996-2000 Capital Improvement Plan for January 2, 1996, at 4:45 p.m. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

A STATE OF THE STA

The County Administrator announced that the State Aid Director has indicated to Public Works that the County can use population estimates by Metropolitan Council for determination of an urban county, a population of 175,000. This would mean the County would be eligible for additional state aid.

The County Administrator also informed the Board that the LCMR has tentatively approved an increase in reimbursement for the purchase of the Michaud property in Grey Cloud Island in the amount of \$93,619.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hauser reported that the meeting between the Resource Recovery Project Board and NSP scheduled for this morning was cancelled because the Ramsey County Board Chair could not make the meeting. This meeting has been rescheduled for next Monday.

Commissioner Peterson announced a legislative forum on transportation will be held on January 24 from 4:30 to 7:30 at the Radisson Hotel in St. Paul. She also indicated that she has been elected Chair of the Suburban Transportation Alliance Chapter, and was appointed to the State Executive Committee. She reported that the I-35 Solution Alliance has asked the Transportation Alliance to support their call for a major summit in the State to address the transportation needs and concerns, and that MN/DOT and Metropolitan Council will be co-sponsoring this event.

Commissioner Abrahamson reported that Nancy Pollack has been selected as new Executive Director of the 911 Board.

Commissioner Abrahamson invited everyone to attend the Truth-in-Taxation Hearing this evening in the County Board Room at 7:00 p.m. He also indicated that it would be cablecast.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Hauser and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 9:35 a.m.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH THE OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATION

The Board met in workshop session with the Office of Administration to continue discussion on the 2015 Comprehensive Plan. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser, and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Bob Turrentine, Jane Harper, Mary McGlothlin, Dennis O'Donnell, Robert Lockyear. The following is a brief recap of the discussion that took place:

Issue: Stormwater Runoff

Discussion:

Commissioner Hauser - Objects to the second policy addition. She doesn't understand it ("natural surface outlets"). If used, the terms 'feasible' and 'practicable' must be defined. Commissioners agreed to drop this policy.

Commissioner Peterson - One of the most critical things to runoff management is the final grading of a site. This will be especially important in cluster developments where lots will be smaller and structures will be closer together. Emphasis should be on doing site inspections when the development is complete to ensure that the grading plan has been followed.

Commissioner Engstrom - The Plan should reference the FEMA (flood elevation) maps. These maps need to be updated. If resources is an issue, the County should look for grant money. HELM should develop a cost estimate.

Commissioner Hauser - It is most appropriate for the water management organizations to do this.

Commissioner Peterson - Thinks that the County also has a role and a need for updated maps.

Dennis O'Donnell - FEMA is digitizing the maps but is not doing any updating. It will be up to the County, or other local organizations to provide them with updated information.

Jane Harper - It might be possible to get better flood elevation information as part of the Brown's Creek hydrologic study.

December 12, 1995

Commissioner Engstrom - Policy #1, must indicate that the 1% is rate not volume.

Issue: Natural Features

Discussion:

Commissioner Engstrom - Likes the proposed language. Suggested including it all in the Plan.

Jane Harper - Highlighted the fifth policy regarding doing a comprehensive survey. The policy will be changed to read "The County will encourage the DNR to conduct a comprehensive survey..."

ALERTON DESCRIPTION

Issue: Right-to-farm

Discussion:

Commissioner Abrahamson - We need to do what we can to protect the farmers. We shouldn't limit the protection to farmers and farmland in Cottage Grove and Denmark Township or to prime agricultural land. There are viable operations on non prime land. Don't limit the definition of farms to soil type or parcel size. In the statement on General Development Philosophy, change "especially" to "such as is located".

Commissioner Peterson - Need to define 'prime agricultural land'.

Commissioner Hegberg - Wants the Plan to communicate that the County is supportive of farmers and maintaining their farms.

Commissioner Hauser - The two points we need to cover in the Plan are:

- 1. Provide for preservation of the agricultural land.
- 2. Offer landowners more options in how they develop their land when they decide to do so.

Commissioner Peterson - Outstate the issue is with feedlots and their smell. Night time noise and light from farm operations, particularly in the spring and fall are concerns.

Bob Turrentine - There are legislative nuisances and judicial nuisances. You can do nothing about judicial nuisances - the ones that courts have ruled on. The best thing the County can do is to avoid land use conflicts by not locating conflicting uses near each other. This can be handled through the rezoning process. In the case of conflicts between residential and commercial/industry uses, the commercial/industry use is usually required to relocate. In the case of an agricultural operation, it can't be moved. The courts would be probably be more sympathetic.

Commissioner Engstrom - Zoning option #2 regarding open space development design: Change "Require" to "Encourage". We must provide carrots. Would like staff to come back with suggestions on what those carrots might be. There seems to be consensus developing on requiring the townships

to offer cluster housing as a development option but not to make cluster housing the only option. We will come back to this discussion. Would like a briefing on the specifics of the Marine on St. Croix District Court case challenging the City's mandatory cluster ordinance.

Dave Washburn - Concerned that the Plan doesn't address this issue. He sees three parts to the issue:

1. right-to-farm, the nuisance issue, 2. options-to-farm, and 3. opportunities to farm. He would like the following concerns addressed:

- 1. Ordinance concern Allow more parking for employees.
- Legislative concern The 40-acre minimum in the Ag. Preserves Act must be changed to apply to specialty farms in Washington County.
- 3. Legislative concern An arbitration format must be approved for settling nuisance disputes. The burden of proof must be on the person bringing the complaint. The farmer can't afford lengthy court battles. Could the County provide an ombudsman to help these farmers?
- Financial concern- Best farmland is under pressure of being suburbanized. Must make the economics work.

Ross Screaton - The movement of equipment on roads and the storage of equipment, at least temporarily is becoming a bigger issue. This will be more important as smaller and smaller discontinuous parcels are farmed by the same farmer.

Judy Screaton - Wants assurance that density can be transferred from one parcel to a non-contiguous parcel in the same ownership.

Commissioner Hauser - This could be done under a transfer of development rights program.

Issue: Affordable Housing

Description:

Commissioner Engstrom - Objective 1 regarding locating near support amenities should read "encourage" rather than "assure".

Comfortable with the language changes as proposed.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH THE COUNTY ELECTED OFFICIALS

The Board met in workshop session with the County Elected Officials to discuss 1996 salaries for elected department heads. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser, and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Richard Arney, Richard Stafford, Jim Frank, Cindy Koosmann, and Judy Honmyhr.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA TRUTH-IN-TAXATION PUBLIC HEARING DECEMBER 12, 1995

The Washington County Board of Commissioners convened at 7:00 p.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room, to conduct a Truth-in-Taxation public hearing for the purposes of review of the proposed 1996 County budget. Present were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser and Hegberg. Also present were Jim Schug, County Administrator; Richard Arney, County Attorney; Dick Stafford, Auditor-Treasurer; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Don Wisniewski, Public Works Director; Mary McGlothlin, H.E.L.M. Director; Robert Lockyear, Director of Planning and Administrative Services; Jim Frank, Sheriff; Denny Montague, Assistant County Assessor; Sue Ladwig, Legislative Representative; and Ron Amland, Stillwater Gazette.

Chairman Abrahamson opened the hearing with a welcome to those in attendance and indicated that comment cards were available for audience members who wished to speak.

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented an overview of the proposed 1996 budget.

Richard Stafford, Auditor/Treasurer, reviewed the property tax notice sent in the mail to all taxpayers.

Chairman Abrahamson indicated that the public hearing was open for comments. Commenting from the audience was the following individual:

Fred Heck, Baytown Township, complimented staff on the material presented in the budget overview. He felt it was very helpful and easy to understand. He stated he belonged to a small church in Afton and that they had a parsonage they had been renting until they felt it was no longer safe. This past summer they sold it for \$1,000. He stated that what probably should have happened was that the person who took position of that property would pay his share of the taxes. The church just received the property tax notice for payable 1996 and it came to \$2,500. He contacted the Assessor's Office and asked them to explain why that property was taxed so high. He was told that whatever the property was valued at on January 2, 1995 that was the amount they would figure tax on. He asked if this was correct.

Denny Montague, Assistant County Assessor, stated that it is true that whatever is on a property on January 2, 1995 is what the taxes are going to be based on for 1996. He did indicate that the church could make an application to make that property exempt from taxes in 1997, but the church has to do that the County Assessor's Office cannot do that for them.

Mr. Heck also asked about the Valley Branch Watershed District. He indicated that about three years ago the soil conservation people came to his place to determine how much of his property was in the Valley Branch Watershed District. He was told that he was not going to be in the district. Then a couple of years later he sees it listed on his tax statement that he is in a watershed district. He stated he never received any notice. He asked if this was a proper way to run things? The Board indicated that this was a watershed district decision and someone from the watershed district would get back to him to answer his concerns.

The Board Chair asked for further comments; none were heard.

Chairman Abrahamson indicated that department heads and staff would be staying after the hearing to answer any further questions and concerns the audience might have.

The Truth-in-Taxation Hearing ajdourned at 7:45 p.m.

Hill, Inc., representing Brown Developers, presented a preliminary plat of a subdivision named The Arbors, which he indicated has been presented and approved by the West Lakeland Planning Commission, West Lakeland Town Board, and the Washington County Plat Commission. He indicated that this project consists of 54 single family lots which all meet the minimum requirement of two and a half acres, one acre buildable, and that all the roads are constructed within the West Lakeland Township requirements. He also indicated that this development will be completed in different phases.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Land Use Specialist, and member of the Washington County Plat Commission, gave an overview of the Plat Commissions findings. He indicated that all lots in the development meet minimum development standards of the County ordinance, each lot has suitable area for installation of on-site septic system, and that road improvements have all been reviewed to be acceptable and meet County standards. Mr. O'Donnell presented the County Board with copies of a review conducted by Charles Wetzler, TKDA, West Lakeland Township engineer, and their

recommendation that a road connection to Olene Avenue not be approved without requiring the necessary improvements to conform to present day standards. He stated that since all standards of the County Development Code have been met the Plat Commission recommended approval of this subdivision.

Gretchen Hessler, 19th Street, West Lakeland, stated she has safety concerns on 19th street which she feels have not been addressed. She indicated that 19th Street has many curves and hills and two blind approaches. This road is heavily used by residents walking, bicycles, people waking their strollers and dogs. She is asking that the township be required to address the residents' safety issues before final approval is given.

Jim Depuydt, 19th Street, West Lakeland, stated he too was concerned with public safety on 19th Street. He also indicated there are blind areas on this road and this fact was not brought out at the Town Board meeting. There have been no safety studies done up to this point. He also wanted to mention that 18th Street was disqualified early on based on misinformation. There were claims of that area being below the 100 year flood plain and claims of encroachment on wetlands. Subsequent studies which they carried out show that neither are the case. There are no hills on 18th Street, and in his opinion it is very clear that 18th Street is a much more prudent choice in connecting out to this eastern outlet on this new development.

Esther Depuydt, 14800 N 19th Street, West Lakeland, stated that this other property up for development will connect straight down to 10th Street which would give a direct south access to 10th street which is where most of the traffic will flow.

Dennis McCain, owner of property at 14750 N. 18th Street, stated that his family settled on this property in 1854 and it has been farmed for the last 141 years. He informed the Board that his developer has proceeded with all the criteria set forth by the County and Township Boards. He feels it is their right to have the property developed in a timely manner, and asks the County Board to resolve this matter quickly.

Jim Depuydt stated he also wants this matter settled quickly, and early on in the process they were raising these safety issues and they were simply ignored at the Town Board meeting.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the audience; none were heard. The Board Chair closed the meeting at 9:30 a.m. The Board secretary indicated that all documentary evidence had been made a part of the record.

Commissioner Hegberg found that township roads are not County roads, and the County must deal with safety problems on County Roads, and it's the township's responsibility to deal with their roads. He also found that the rest of the development does meet all the requirements. Therefore, Commissioner

Hegberg moved to approve the subdivision known as The Arbors, located in West Lakeland Township. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COURT SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve the 1996 Annual Comprehensive Plan and submit the Annual Comprehensive Plan to the Department of Corrections. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

HUMAN RESOURCES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Hauser moved to ratify the 1994-95 agreement with Washington County Supervisors Association (Library Supervisors) as follows:

- 1. Duration: January 3, 1994 through January 6, 1996.
- Wages: Effective for 1994, a 1.0% general wage increase, and effective for 1995, a 2.0% general wage increase.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Natural Preservation Route

Commissioner Hauser moved to adopt Resolution No. 95-228 as follows:

Requesting the Commissioner of Transportation to Designate a Portion of CSAH 3 as a Type III Natural Resources Route

WHEREAS, County State Aid Highway 3 in Washington County, Minnesota is a road under Washington County jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, this road is scheduled for reconstruction in 1997 to improve the poor pavement condition; and

WHEREAS, County State Aid Highway 3 from County State Aid Highway 4 to the north Washington County line traverses through a region of Washington County richly abundant in historical and environmental resources; and

WHEREAS, the preservation, protection, and enhancement of these resources is a goal of the Washington County Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, the improvement of County State Aid Highway 3 must be sensitive to these County resources;

WHEREAS, the Department of Transportation State Aid for Local Transportation Division has adopted State Aid Operations Rules which include designation of Natural Preservation Routes; and

WHEREAS, the designation of County State Aid Highway 3 as a Type III Natural Preservation Route will allow the County to provide and balance the needed improvements and preservation of historical, cultural, and environmental resources.

NOW THEREFORE, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby requests the Commissioner of Transportation to designate County State Aid Highway 3 from County State Aid Highway 4 to the north Washington County line as a Type III Natural Preservation Route.

Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Carnelian-Marine Watershed District

Ron Gavelek, President of the Carnelian-Marine Watershed District, appeared before the County Board and presented a proposed solution to the flooding problems on Lake Louise. Mr. Gavelek stated that Stillwater and May Township would also be involved in this project. The County's costs would be one third or \$6,700, which would later be assessed to the improved properties. He indicated that the initial cost would be for the hydrologic study and engineering design.

Commissioner Engstrom felt that if the County gets into this project there may be many other projects throughout the County which would be looking for assistance where there are flooding problems. He indicated there were three areas in his district where the County may get a petition for County assistance. He asked the County Attorney if the County could help on this project? The County Attorney stated he would analyze this matter and report back to the Board.

Rebecca Johnson, Supervisor, May Township Board, requested that the County Board support this project so they can proceed as quickly as possible.

Commissioner Engstrom moved to table to December 26, 1995, the matter to consider joining in a petition to the Carnelian Marine Watershed District for an improvement project to solve flooding problems on Lake Louise in Stillwater Township, pending review by the County Attorney as to the impact on the County property and financing as to whether the County can financially participate in this project. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported on a legislative committee meeting she attended regarding transportation and land use planning. She also indicated that she has been appointed to the Livable Communities Advisory Committee and they will hold their first meeting on Thursday, December 21, 1995.

Commissioner Engstrom updated the Board on a joint meeting he and Commissioner Peterson attended with the County legislative delegation. Another meeting has been scheduled for January 29 at 4:00 p.m. at the State Capitol.

Commissioner Hauser informed the Board that there will be a local government officials forum on January 9 hosted by the Board of Government Innovation and Cooperation. She also suggested discussion with School District 834 about their plans to locate an elementary school on an intersection that includes two County Roads. The County Administrator indicated that School District 834 will be appearing before the County Board at the January 9 meeting to discuss school boundaries and he will ask them to be prepared to discuss the school siting issue also.

The Board Chair wished all the County employees and citizens a happy holiday season.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Engstrom and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 11:10 a.m.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH THE OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATION

The Board met in workshop session with the Office of Administration to continue discussion on the 2015 Comprehensive Plan. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser, and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Bob Turrentine, Jane Harper, Mary McGlothlin, Dennis O'Donnell, and Lowell Johnson. The following is a brief recap of the discussion that took place:

Issue: Average Housing Density Calculation

Discussion: (Continuation of November 28, 1995 Discussion)

Commissioner Hegberg - Should exclude lakes but only those that are managed under the State Shoreland Management Program (lakes greater than 25 acres in unincorporated areas). The density is already accounted for in recognizing the shoreland districts as separate density districts.

Commissioner Hauser - All public parks and public lakes should be excluded because they can't be built upon.

Commissioner Engstrom - Agrees with Hauser.

Commissioner Hegberg - Parks should be included because they are open space that the public says they want. As a park, the land is preserved as open space.

Commissioner Peterson - Include public parks. Park land dedication is a tool that a community can use to get developers to set aside open space.

Consensus: State, county, local, and private parks and lakes not managed through the State Shoreland Management Program will be included in the average housing density calculation.

Issue: Density districts.

Discussion:

Jane Harper - Passed out a table that shows the average housing density given current township zoning. The table indicates that the only two areas where there is a difference between the current zoning and the County's proposed land use is in New Scandia and northern Stillwater townships. Two policies that could be adopted to address these situations are:

- 1. Allow greater density in exchange for mandating cluster housing.
- Allow greater density if a township can prove that under its current zoning ordinance the actual development would not exceed the County's specified density.

Commissioner Hauser - We should focus on providing townships and landowners with options to do development in a sensible manner and not focus so much on the distinction between 1/5 and 1/10 average densities.

Commissioner Hegberg - Need to provide carrots such as 100% bonus for clustering. This would give the townships a way to meet the County's average density guideline and still allow smaller lot sizes.

Commissioner Hauser - Favors specifying one average density per township.

Jane Harper - That approach would work in most places. However, in townships where there is a big difference in development patterns, multiple districts are needed to reflect the current development patterns. Suggested the following changes in Forest Lake: the 2/40 district be combined with the 1/10 to allow the Township more flexibility in providing for development while avoiding the areas with severe resource constraints; the 16/40 district be combined with the transition area because it is fully developed at a high density and should be blended in with the development that will occur in the transition area.

Commissioner Hegberg - Agreed with the changes for Forest Lake Township.

Consensus: Maintain stated densities as illustrated on the current Land Use Plan Map except for the staff suggested changes in Forest Lake Township.

<u>Issue:</u> Consider eliminating the minimum lot size requirements.

Discussion:

Commissioner Hegberg - Would like to have a 1.5 acre minimum lot size. Some research has shown that that is how much land is needed for nitrate absorption.

Commissioner Abrahamson - The township can make the lot size more restrictive.

Commissioner Peterson - Would favor leaving the lot size alone until the zoning rewrite committee has time to study it.

Commissioner Hauser - Originally proposed this issue. She has been persuaded that, because of the enforcement difficulties, it probably is not a good idea. Would support leaving the minimum lot size at 2 acres.

Consensus: Leave the minimum lot size at 2 acres.

Carnelian-Marine Watershed District Manager Ron Gavelek appeared to ask for a decision from the Board on the Watershed District's request that the County join with Stillwater and May Townships in the petition and share in the cost for a project study to solve flooding problems on Lake Louise in Stillwater Township.

Commissioner Engstrom motioned to have Washington County join the petition with the two townships and loan the Carnelian-Marine Watershed District \$6,700 (1/3 share of the estimated study and design cost), with the following conditions: 1) The total cost of the project does not exceed the assessed value of the benefited property involved; 2) The Watershed must be eligible to receive these funds, according to State Statute and the advice of the County Attorney; and 3) The Watershed continues to work with the area TIF district to obtain funds for the project. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion.

Commissioner Hauser requested that the portion of the motion be withdrawn which stated that Washington County would be a petitioner. Commissioner Engstrom agreed to amend his motion to

remove any language concerning petitioner. The motion passed by a 3-2 vote with Commissioners Hegberg and Abrahamson in opposition.

Commissioner Abrahamson discussed the hope that a Watershed District representative would be able to attend Plat Committee meetings since it is so important to get their input.

Commissioner Hegberg questioned whether the Watershed District had looked at additional fees to building permits to help with water management.

Ron Gavelek stated that he will share the request for attendance at Plat Committee meetings with his Board. He also stated that the Watershed District does attend town board meetings to give their input on future development. He also indicated that they have tried to stay away from additional charges on building permits to keep costs down, and that they are willing to listen, learn, and improve the way they work.

Commissioner Engstrom stated that perhaps, when reviewing ordinances, the Board can review who makes up the Plat Committee and consider changes in the membership.

Commissioner Hegberg and the County Administrator noted that the County's Finance Committee would review the Watershed District's need for a County loan to complete the study on this issue and that a recommendation would come from the Committee on the amount and terms of the loan which will be in accordance with State law.

The County Administrator stated that the loan agreement will come back to the Board as a consent calendar item.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

1996 Commissioners' Salaries and Expenses

Commissioner Hauser moved to adopt Resolution No 95-237 as follows:

Resolution Establishing County Commissioners' Salaries and Expenses for 1996

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statute 375.055, Subdivision 1, requires the County Board of Commissioners to set salaries/per diem/expenses for its members prior to January 1 of the effective year; and

WHEREAS, the current 1995 salary rate for Washington County Commissioners has previously been established at \$33,368/year for Commissioners and \$35,568/year for the Board Chair; and

WHEREAS, the current 1995 expense reimbursement for County Commissioners has previously been established at actual expenses plus mileage in accordance with County policy with no per diem payments.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the salary rate for Washington County Commissioners be \$34,035/year for Commissioners and \$36,279 for the Chair, effective January 1, 1996.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the expense reimbursement for County Commissioners be for actual expenses plus mileage in accordance with County policy with no per diem payments.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that each of the County Commissioners receive the same County paid medical insurance premium and flexible medical expense account as received by the appointed and elected department heads.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Engstrom, Hauser, Hegberg and Peterson; No, Commissioner Abrahamson.

Commissioner Abrahamson indicated that he will not take the raise and asked the County Administrator to prepare a paper stating this intention.

1996 County Administrator Salary

Commissioner Engstrom moved to increase the County Administrator's salary by 2%. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

The Commissioners all thanked the County Administrator for the fine job he has done during the past year.

The County Administrator thanked the Board for their support.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hauser requested a report on the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority be brought to the Board early in January. After discussion on dates it was agreed to hold a workshop on January 23 to bring the Board up-to-date on developments at the HRA.

Commissioner Hauser thanked Commissioner Abrahamson for a great year as Board Chair.

Commissioner Engstrom thanked Commissioner Abrahamson for his leadership during the year.

Commissioner Abrahamson thanked the Board for the team effort given during his year as Board Chair.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Engstrom and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:05 a.m.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH COURT SERVICES AND HUMAN RESOURCES DEPARTMENTS

The Board met in workshop session with the Court Services and Human Resources Departments to discuss performance criteria and a merit based pay plan with Teamsters Local 320. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Abrahamson, Engstrom, Hegberg, Peterson, and Hauser.
