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OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA JANUARY 2, 1996

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 4:30 p.m. in the Washington County Government Center County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Engstrom, Peterson, Abrahamson, Hauser and Hegberg. Absent none. Chair Abrahamson presided. Also present were James Schug, County Administrator; Virginia Erdahl, Deputy Administrator; Richard Arney, County Attorney; Don Wisniewski, Public Works Director; Jim Frank, County Sheriff; Mary McGlothlin, Director of Health, Environment and Land Management; Russ Reetz, Court Services Director; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Rick Backman, Community Services Division Manager; Jane Harper, Physical Development Planner; Judy Honmyhr, Human Resources Director; and Mickey Scheid, Public Information Specialist.

Chair Abrahamson called for unfinished business for 1995. There was none. Commissioner Hauser moved to adjourn sine die. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to appoint County Administrator Jim Schug to act as temporary Chair for the purposes of electing the 1996 Washington County Board Chair. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Temporary Chair Schug declared nominations open for Chair of the Washington County Board of Commissioners for 1996. Commissioner Abrahamson nominated Commissioner Engstrom. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion. No further nominations were heard and Commissioner Engstrom was unanimously elected Washington County Board Chair for 1996.

Chair Engstrom declared nominations open for Vice-Chair. Commissioner Hauser nominated Commissioner Peterson. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion. There were no further nominations and Commissioner Peterson was unanimously elected Vice-Chair of the Washington County Board of Commissioners for 1996.

PUBLIC HEARING - CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The Physical Development Planner gave a brief overview of the 1996-2000 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan.

The Board Chair opened the public hearing to accept comments on the 1996-2000 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan. The Board Chair asked for comments; none were heard.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; the public hearing was closed at 4:40 p.m.

Commissioner Hauser moved to adopt Resolution No. 96-003 as follows:

Adoption and Submittal of the 1996-2000 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners had considered the 1996-2000 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan covering a five-year period and setting forth the estimated year, together with the estimated cost, the need for the improvement, and sources of revenue to pay for the improvement; and

WHEREAS, in preparing the Capital Improvement Plan, the County Board of Commissioners has considered for each project and for the overall plan:

- 1) the condition of the County's existing infrastructure, including the projected need for repair or replacement;
- 2) the likely demand for the improvement;
- 3) the estimated cost of the improvement;
- 4) the available public resources;
- 5) the level of overlapping debt in the County;
- 6) the relative benefits and costs of alternative uses of the funds;
- 7) operating costs of the proposed improvements; and
- 8) alternatives for providing services more efficiently through shared facilities with other counties or local government units; and,

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners, after public notice, conducted a public hearing on January 2, 1996, for the purpose of receiving comments on the proposed 1996-2000 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopt the 1996-2000 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorize submittal of the plan to the Community Development Division of the Minnesota Department of Trade and Economic Development for their approval.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

CONSENT CALENDAR

Commissioner Abrahamson moved, seconded by Commissioner Hauser to adopt the following Consent Calendar:

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that all parcels of tax-forfeited land listed on 1996 Tax-Forfeited Sale, be classified as non-conservation land; that the basic sale price of each parcel appearing on the list filed with the County Auditor-Treasurer, be approved and authorization for public sale be granted, pursuant to M.S. 282.01; that the sale will be held at 9:00 a.m., Monday, March 11, 1996 by the County Auditor-Treasurer in the County Board Room, Washington County Government Center for not less than the basic sale price.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the terms of sale shall be for cash only.

1996 Fees for Professional Consultation, Licenses and Permits

WHEREAS, the Washington County Department of Health, Environment and Land Management provides services to the community in the form of licensing and permits, professional consultation and direct services; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes and adopted Washington County Ordinances allow for the collection of fees for services delivered; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Health, Environment and Land Management has prepared fee schedules for the year 1996 that are consistent with Board Policy;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby adopts the 1996 fee schedule and Attachment A bond limits and certificates of insurance of solid waste management.

- Approval of unpaid leave of absence to hold elected office for Douglas Swenson in the County Attorney's Office beginning January 8, 1996 and continuing to the end of the 1996 session expected to end on or about May 1, 1996.
- 8. Adoption of **Resolution No. 96-006** as follows:

Support for the Livable Communities Act

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Livable Communities Act (1995 Minnesota Laws Chapter 255) establishes a Metropolitan Livable Communities Fund which is intended to address housing and other development issues facing the metropolitan area defined by Minnesota Statutes section 473.121; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Livable Communities Fund, comprising the Tax Base Revitalization Account, the Livable Communities Demonstration Account and the Local Housing Incentives Account, is intended to provide certain funding and other assistance to metropolitan area municipalities; and

WHEREAS, a metropolitan area municipality is not eligible to receive grants or loans under the Metropolitan Livable Communities Fund or eligible to receive certain polluted sites cleanup funding from the Minnesota Department of Trade and Economics Development unless the municipality is participating in the Local Housing Incentives Account Program under Minnesota Statutes section 473.254; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Council has adopted an incentive funding policy for the ISTEA solicitation package that requires any county application for a project in a city or multiple cities that the county must: adopt a resolution supporting the Livable Communities Act; pledge to encourage communities in its jurisdiction to participate in the Local

Housing Incentives Program; and indicate how the county, or another county entity, will assist municipalities that choose to participate in the Local Housing Incentives Program to meet their negotiated affordable and life-cycle housing goals;

HARLE TO SEE

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Washington County Board of Commissioners supports the Livable Communities Act; pledges to encourage communities within Washington County to participate in the Local Housing Incentives Program; and hereby designates Washington County HRA to assist municipalities that choose to participate in the Local Housing Incentives Program, to meet their negotiated affordable and lifecycle housing goals.

- Approval of amendment to the grant agreement between the Metropolitan Council and Washington County relating to the acquisition of recreation and open space lands in Grey Cloud Island and Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Parks.
- 10. Approval of the Plat of Hallmark, West Lakeland Township.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Commissioner Hauser moved to approve a contract with Ramsey County for rental of jail space (20 beds) at the Law Enforcement Center from January 15, 1996 through December 31, 1997. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Position of ISD 834 on District Boundary Issues

Melva Radtke and Joan Friant, members of the Independent School District 834 School Board, presented information on the School District's position regarding discussions that have taken place concerning the School District boundary between Districts 834, 833, and 622 in the Woodbury area. They indicated that School District 834 will not continue with discussions with the Ad Hoc Boundary Committee (ABC), but requested that they be provided with those agendas, minutes and meeting materials. A letter was read into the record from Ms. Radtke and Ms. Friant which gave background information and a proposal for future action.

The Board Chair read into the record a letter from Cheryl Hurst, Woodbury, supporting the Ad Hoc Boundary Committee meetings and proposing that they be continued between School District 833 and 622 and the City of Woodbury.

Commissioner Peterson stated that at the time of platting of new housing projects within a community, school boundaries should be discussed to see which districts they go to. Ms. Radtke agreed with Commissioner Peterson, and indicated that with all the growth and development going on the school districts were never asked what the impacts would be on the districts.

Auditor-Treasurer Stafford addressed some of the issues raised in the letter from Ms. Radtke and Ms. Friant. He indicated that because of three applications for annexation or detachment of property in the Woodbury area, and as part of the 1995 legislative package, it was agreed that the Auditor-Treasurer would work with the school districts to help alleviate the problems of boundary issues. He also stated that in the last legislative workshop the Board did support the Ad Hoc Boundary Committee process to continue studying this issue to find a remedy. He stated that the problems of school boundaries are there and need to be addressed.

Extension of Two Tax Increment Financing Districts in Oakdale

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 96-007, and to approve a cooperative agreement between the County and the City of Oakdale specifying the revenue transfer as a result of the extension of two Tax Increment Financing districts in the City of Oakdale; and further, that the County Administrator and Board Chair be authorized to sign said contract pending final review by the County Attorney. Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Resolution No. 96-007

Approving Special Law Relating to Tax Increment Financing

WHEREAS, under Laws of Minnesota, 1995, Chapter 264, Article 5, Section 41 (the "Act"), certain authority was granted to the City of Oakdale (the "City") relating to the extension of the durational limits placed on Tax Increment Financing District Nos. 1-2 and 9 (collectively, the "Tax Increment Financing Districts"), and

WHEREAS, subdivision 2 of the Act provides that the Act is effective the day after compliance with Minnesota Statutes, Section 645.021, Subdivision 3 (the "Local Consent Law") and Section 469.1782, subdivision 2, and

WHEREAS, (i) Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.1782, subdivision 2, provides that in the case of a special law such as the Act the "affected local government units" for purposes of the Local Consent Law include the "city or town, the school district, and the county in which the (affected) tax increment districts are located", (ii) the Tax Increment Financing Districts are located within the City, the County of Washington (the "County"), and Independent School District 622 (the "School District") and not any other school district, and accordingly the City, County, and School District are the "affected local government units" under the Local Consent Law, and

January 9, 1996

WHEREAS, the Local Consent Law and Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.1782, subdivision 3, provides, in relevant part, that as soon as the local government units have approved a special law such as the Act, the City Clerk shall file with the Secretary of State a certificate stating the essential facts necessary for valid approval and a copy of each of the resolutions of approval of the governing bodies of the affected governmental units.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Washington that Laws of Minnesota, 1995, Chapter 264, Article 5, Section 41, is hereby approved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Administrator is authorized and directed to forward a certified copy of this resolution to the Clerk of the City for filing as required by the Local Consent Law and Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.1782, subdivision 3.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATION

The Board met in workshop session with the Office of Administration to discuss and review 1996 legislative issues. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Abrahamson, Peterson, Engstrom, Hauser and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Virginia Erdahl, Robert Lockyear, Susan Ladwig, Russ Reetz, Richard Arney, Don Wisniewski, Dan Papin, and Jim Broede, St. Paul Pioneer Press.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATION

The Board met in workshop session with the Office of Administration to discuss the draft Linear Park Master Plan. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Abrahamson, Peterson, Engstrom, Hauser and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Virginia Erdahl, Robert Lockyear, Jane Harper, Don Wisniewski, Jim Luger, Jack Perkovich, Bob Turrentine, Mary McGlothlin, Dennis O'Donnell, Jim Frank, and Jim Broede, St. Paul Pioneer Press. The following is a brief recap of the discussion that took place:

Issue: Cost of Development and Maintenance, Liability

Jane Harper, Planner - Reviewed two prepared briefing papers. The first one included suggested realignments. The second one included more cost information.

Commissioner Hauser - The County's current policy is to pave shoulders when roads are reconstructed. Any segments that are developed as paved shoulders along roadways that are planned to be reconstructed will incur no additional cost.

Commissioner Abrahamson - The Plan should include a trail connecting Grey Cloud Island Regional Park. This should also be recommended for inclusion in the regional trail system. Would like cost estimates.

Commissioner Peterson - Believes there should be a trail segment from the Cottage Ravine Regional Park to Grey Cloud Island Regional Park and to also include a trailway that would go to the Wakota Bridge.

Commissioner Abrahamson - There are three good size wetlands along CSAH 19 that will add significantly to the cost of a trail. There are less wetlands along CSAH 15. Inquired about the amount of right-of-way that exists along CR 19.

County Sheriff Jim Frank - Commented on patrolling of park facilities. The County does limited patrolling now. A meeting is scheduled with the Parks staff to discuss what type of program the County should have. The Sheriff anticipates a need for two full-time deputies to patrol the entire park system. Part-time officers would be hired as needed and volunteers would be worked in as appropriate. The Sheriff's department has a volunteer program that could be expanded into the parks area.

WENT CONTRACT

Commissioner Hauser - Congratulated the Sheriff on beginning to look at how to take care of the public park facilities in this way. Using volunteer groups can add to a sense of community and ownership. Other counties have programs in place that we could begin.

Commissioner Peterson - Wants a thorough analysis of what it will cost to run the trail system including any liability of using volunteer patrols. Is concerned about where the funding will come from when we already find it difficult to find the funds for all the necessary road improvements.

Commissioner Abrahamson - Agrees with Commissioner Peterson. The County has a lot of plans that need to be paid for out into the future. Some of these things are needed now but we can't pay for them.

Commissioner Hauser - The Plan is a vision and a guideline. Each segment will be scrutinized further before anything is developed.

Commissioner Peterson - Finds it ironic that there is so much trail mileage in the north where there is so little population. She is not supportive of asking people in cities that are developing trails to pay for these trails in other parts of the county. The priority should be to develop trails where the growth currently is. She would like to see pathways developed along county roads near schools so that children are safe walking to school.

Jim Schug, Administrator - It would be helpful to staff if the Commissioners could establish some criteria in the plan that would assist staff in making budget decisions.

Commissioner Abrahamson - Would like staff to address the right-of-way and liability issues of the trail segment along CSAH 15 north of Hwy 36.

Commissioner Hegberg - He would like staff to consider the following alignment changes: Delete the stretch of Hwy 97 east of CSAH 3 and use CR 52 instead. Delete CR 50 in Forest Lake Township. Remove the utility corridor. He would like an explanation of how the segment along CSAH 15 will be funded.

Commissioner Engstrom - The cost of this system is a cost worth paying. The Plan is a conceptual plan. Development of the system won't proceed any faster than the County can afford to pay. Much

of the system would qualify for regional funding. The regional funding will be used somewhere. If Washington County doesn't take advantage of it Scott, Carver and Dakota counties will.

Direction: Consensus was reached on the staff suggested alignment changes. Another workshop will be held to discuss the additional information that staff was asked to prepare.

ST. CROIX VALLEY SPORTS FACILITY COMMISSION

Rich Cummings, Dick Olsen, and Otto Bonestrad, members of the St. Croix Valley Sports Facility Commission, presented an overview and update on activities in developing a recreational facility in Stillwater. Mr. Olsen indicated that approximately \$4,180,000 has been pledged in financial support from various private and public entities. Commissioner Hauser suggested working with the Housing and Redevelopment Authority, which is a separate entity from the County. She does not feel it is a function of the County to fund these facilities.

Commissioner Hegberg mentioned that instead of using all the funds being discussed for the linear park, that maybe some of those funds could be used for these types of sports facilities to give youths a place to go.

Commissioner Peterson stated that there may be a broader policy issue on where the County should put its dollars in the future, linear parks or recreational activities for youth.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked if this group has met with School District 834 to see if there is a possibility that the 25 acres located behind the Stillwater Area High School could be used for this facility? Mr. Olsen indicated that there have been some discussions with the school administration, but several questions remain to be answered before further discussion takes place. As far as the sports complex fitting in that acreage, he feels there would be adequate space.

Commissioner Peterson moved to refer this matter to the Parks and Open Space Commission for further discussion on what the County policy should be on development of a sports facilities complex and whether any County park land should be used for sports fields or facilities. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Chair Engstrom urged the Sports Facility Commission to also discuss their proposal with the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority for alternative financing of this facility.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the Judicial Ditch 1 public hearing held on January 22. He suggested that a workshop be held to discuss a topic that was brought up regarding the possibility of Judicial Ditch 1 becoming a watershed district or water management organization.

Commissioner Peterson presented an update on the AMC Board meeting she attended last week. The AMC Board met with the League of Minnesota Cities as well as the township organization. The three groups found items that they all could support as a group to bring to the legislature. These three organizations also stated they would like the reinstitution of the Independent Advisory Council on Intergovernmental Relationships.

Commissioner Peterson also reported on a meeting she attended of the growth management committee. She stated this group will be studying six communities with Cottage Grove and Denmark Township being two of the six.

The Board Chair indicated that the Housing and Redevelopment Authority meeting has been rescheduled for February 7 at 3:00 p.m. in the County Board Room. The Chair informed the Board that he and the County Administrator have been invited to attend a meeting with the Minnesota Wisconsin Boundary Area Commission on January 30. They will be meeting with the St. Croix County Chair and County

Administrator to discuss the plan for the Lower St. Croix National Scenic Riverway and deciding whether it needs to be updated.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH THE OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATION

The Board met in workshop session with the Office of Administration to discuss the draft Linear Park Master Plan. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Abrahamson, Peterson, Engstrom, Hauser and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Virginia Erdahl, Jane Harper, Jim Luger, Jack Perkovich, Don Wisniewski, Bob Turrentine, Dennis O'Donnell, and Robert Lockyear. The following is a brief recap of the discussion that took place:

Issue: Cost of development and maintenance, liability, enforcement

Jane Harper, Planner - Reviewed the goals and objectives of the Plan, presented Plan changes to address Commissioners' concerns, and provided revised cost estimates.

Jim Luger, Planner - Presented information requested at previous workshop.

Sheriff Jim Frank, Mike Polehna - Discussed plans for building capacity in the County to patrol parks and trails using sworn deputies and community volunteers. They like the Ramsey County Program. One officer is in charge of water and trail patrol. The officer recruits volunteers to assist with park patrol. Over 100 volunteers are active. Washington County currently provides very little patrolling of the park system. The cost to begin patrolling the current park system would be about \$64,000 for an officer, squad car, and supplies. Over \$11,000 would be needed to equip volunteers.

Commissioner Abrahamson - Questioned what is done when there is a store or some other use close to the right-of-way? The trail would go away from the roadway, go closer to the roadway or go on the roadway shoulder to avoid the obstacle.

The cost of enforcement is low. When the County is finished acquiring all the parkland that is in the approved plans the cost of maintenance and policing will be higher than what is being reported today. It will probably take more than one deputy to patrol just the trails. Enforcement will cost the County - mentioned Square Lake and St. Croix River as examples of enforcement problems.

Commissioner Peterson - Suggested that staff explore running the Grey Cloud Island trail segment along 4th street to provide a safe pathway to the nearby school. Would like to see some connections made to the trail system in Oakdale to serve that major population center. The first priority in implementing the system should be in mostly urbanized areas.

Commissioner Hauser - Stressed the need to tie into local trails throughout the County.

Commissioner Abrahamson - Questioned what % of trail costs are covered by ISTEA funding. The associated enhancement dollars fund trail development. For the most part these dollars are spent in heavily developed areas.

Commissioner Peterson - Is interested in a comparison between Ramsey and Washington counties - land acres, park acres, # of deputies, park use, etc. - to get a handle on expected costs.

Commissioner Hauser - The costs are important but it is impossible to design a system today to meet a need 20 years from now. She would like to see a "Friends of the Parks" Program developed. Community policing should be explored as the County develops. If we don't provide for these trails today the future opportunities will be greatly limited. This is just a plan. Every aspect of the Plan will be revisited by the Board as it is implemented. She would like to see the County begin creating a volunteer patrolling program. The framework can be created now. It can be enhanced as the system expands.

Commissioner Hegberg - Supports the Plan. It has been streamlined. The Board has an obligation to bring a vision to the County. The County must plan ahead. The right-of-way will be expensive but it is cheaper today than it will be in the future. Development will occur, it is happening faster than we might like. Trails are good for communities. They add to the liveability of a community. If you look regionwide, it is areas that have linear parkways that are high amenity, high value areas. When the St. Croix River was first established as a Scenic Riverway the bankers thought that the land values would plummet. This did not happen. Park use is family-oriented. We need to develop the parks so that they are used. It is when they are not used that problems occur. A strong parks program provides employment opportunities for youth.

Commissioner Peterson - Concerned about the liability of the use easement.

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Commissioner Abrahamson - He is not anti park. He would like to buy Ceridian along the St. Croix

River. He is concerned about the cost, about the amount of commitments the County is making for

future costs.

Board Direction: Consensus to bring the Plan back to the Board on February 6 for approval.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the seven counties that make up the Minneapolis/St. Paul metro area join together to study the risk and feasibility involved in counties or groups of counties developing joint purchasing models with the state for services funded by Medical Assistance, General Assistance Medical Care, Minnesota Care, and that the cost of this study be allocated among the participant counties using a jointly agreed upon allocation method; and

The County Administrator indicated that the Community Services Department is also submitting an application to the National Association of Counties for its truancy project.

Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Linear Park Master Plan

Commissioner Hegberg moved to reopen the public hearing regarding the 2015 Comprehensive Plan and the Linear Park Master Plan. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

The Project Manager presented proposed changes to the Linear Park Master Plan which were made according to direction received from the County Board of Commissioners at workshops held in January, 1996.

Commissioner Peterson asked if grant money is used to purchase right-of-way, is the County obligated to replace the trail if in the future the right-of-way is needed for a wider road? The Project Manager stated that it depended on the funding source. Capital bonding would require a 20 year minimum obligation, other park grants require that the County keep the facility or a like-type replacement in perpetuity.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated he was concerned about what the actual costs to taxpayers are going to be. Acquiring the access needed for these trails will add millions of more dollars to the anticipated \$11 million for construction.

Commissioner Peterson is concerned about the enforcement costs. She feels that the \$65,000 per year for a full time sheriff's deputy, squad car and supplies plus \$11,000 to equip volunteers is too low.

Commissioner Hauser moved to approve the language changes made to the Linear Park Master Plan and to adopt Resolution No. 96-020. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted 3-2 with a roll call vote as follows: Commissioner Abrahamson, No; Commissioner Peterson, No; Chair Engstrom, Yes; Commissioner Hauser, Yes; and, Commissioner Hegberg, Yes.

Resolution No. 96-020

Adoption of the Washington County Linear Park Master Plan

WHEREAS Washington County undertook to develop a Linear Park Master Plan during the summer of 1993; and

WHEREAS, Washington County developed a Linear Park Master Plan that lays out a series of open space and recreational corridors that connect communities, parks and other trails, and provides guidance for the continued planning, design and development of the system; and

WHEREAS, Washington County conducted an extensive public involvement program to seek input for the Linear Park Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission held public hearings on the Linear Park Master Plan on April 18 and 20, 1995; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Parks and Open Space Commission approved a draft Linear Park Master Plan to submit to the County Board of Commissioners on June 15, 1995; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners conducted a public hearing on the October 3 and 10, 1995, and held two workshops to discuss the public hearing findings and the details of the proposed Linear Park Master Plan.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopts the Linear Park Master Plan with the proposed revisions.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked if this Board would consider a limit on bonding of \$10 or \$12 million dollars and anything over would be up to the taxpayers in a referendum at the next election? The Board Chair stated that at a workshop last week with the District Court Judges this Board indicated that it was not willing to issue any bonds. Commissioner Hegberg indicated that the Finance Committee has a policy in place that the debt can only be a certain percentage of the total taxable value within the County.

2015 Comprehensive Plan

The Project Manager presented proposed changes to the 2015 Comprehensive Plan which were made according to direction received from the County Board of Commissioners at workshops held in November and December, 1995 and January, 1996.

Commissioner Hegberg asked for a clarification on the Average Housing Density portion of the comprehensive plan. The sentence he wishes clarified is on Page 2 of the proposed language changes, under the section marked pg. 4-34, and reads "State, County and local parks and lakes **not managed through the State Shoreland Management Program** will be included in the average density calculation. After discussion and a short break it was the consensus of the Board to make the following change to that sentence: "State, County and local parks will be included in the average density calculation. Lakes not managed through the State Shoreland Management Program will be included in the average density calculation."

Commissioner Hauser moved to approve the language changes to the 2015 Comprehensive Plan and adopt **Resolution No. 96-021**, and submit the 2015 Comprehensive Plan to the Metropolitan Council. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to amend the motion to approve the proposed language changes to the 2015 Comprehensive Plan, as follows: page 3 of the proposed changes, pg.4-40 under Industrial and Commercial Development to read "The land 1000 feet to the north and south of I-94 in West Lakeland Township will be considered for commercial development when public sewer and water is available." Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion.

Commissioner Peterson commented that the County has committed \$41 million to parks. The County's basic tax resource comes from housing. She believes that the Board should look at the County as a whole and ask how are we going to pay for project costs if we don't look at our resources along the

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I-94 corridor, along Highway 61, and along 35 W north and south. The County needs something other than housing stock to pay for its projected infrastructure.

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Commissioner Abrahamson called for the vote.

The motion to amend the proposed language changes to the 2015 Comprehensive Plan, page 3 of the proposed changes, pg.4-40 under Industrial and Commercial Development to read "The land 1000 feet to the north and south of I-94 in West Lakeland Township will be considered for commercial development when public sewer and water is available.", was defeated 3-2 with a roll call vote as follows: Commissioner Hegberg, Yes; Commissioner Hauser, No; Commissioner Peterson, Yes, Commissioner Abrahamson, No.; Chair Engstrom No.

The motion to approve the language changes to the 2015 Comprehensive Plan and adopt **Resolution No. 96-021**, and submit the 2015 Comprehensive Plan to the Metropolitan Council was adopted 5-0 with a roll call vote as follows: Commissioner Hegberg, Yes; Commissioner Hauser, Yes; Chair Engstrom, Yes; Commissioner Peterson, Yes; and, Commissioner Abrahamson, Yes.

Resolution No. 96-021

Adoption of the Washington County 2015 Comprehensive Plan

WHEREAS Washington County began updating its Comprehensive Plan during the summer of 1993; and

WHEREAS, Washington County developed a sound plan for future growth after considering population and job projections, past and possible future patterns of development, the future infrastructure needs, the condition of the natural and cultural resources, and the recreational needs and opportunities; and

WHEREAS, Washington County conducted an extensive public involvement program to seek input for the Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission held public hearings on April 18 and 20, 1995 and approved a draft comprehensive plan to submit to the County Board of Commissioners on July 13, 1995; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners conducted a public hearing on October 3 and 10, 1995, and held seven workshops to discuss the public hearing findings and the details of the proposed Comprehensive Plan.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves the 2015 Comprehensive Plan with the proposed revisions, and directs staff to submit the Plan to the Metropolitan Council for review.

Commissioner Hauser thanked the Planning Advisory Commission and its Chair Harry Melander for their work on this project over the past several years. She also thanked all the citizens who participated in shaping the document. Finally, she thanked staff, especially Jane Harper, Project Manager, the Planning Department, as well as the department heads who helped in providing the information.

Support for LCMR Grant Proposal

The Board Chair outlined a request for support by the LCMR for a pilot project using voluntary easements, purchase and transfer of development rights and acquisition, which would create a protected corridor of natural resource acres in high growth Washington and Chisago Counties. This group is asking the County for planning and GIS assistance. He indicated other public and private entities involved are: Land Stewardship Project, Trust for Public Land, Minnesota Land Trust, Minnesota Farmers Union, and Chisago County Committee to Preserve Rural Values.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to support the proposal to the LCMR for funding of a project that would preserve farm and natural resource lands in Washington and Chisago Counties. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

The County Attorney asked that his department review this grant proposal. The Board Chair stated that this is just a request for support not the final grant application, and that any legal documents would certainly go through the County Attorney's Office for review before approval by the Board.

Lower St. Croix National Scenic Riverway

The County Administrator gave a brief overview of a meeting he and the Board Chair attended with an inter-agency team of the Lower St. Croix Riverway and the Boundary Area Commission. This interagency team has been established to update the Master Plan for the Lower St. Croix National Scenic Riverway. Washington County has been selected to represent Minnesota counties on the task force and they are asking that a representative be appointed. He also stated this person would need to be available to attend meetings over a two-year period including some intensive workshops this spring and summer that might be multi-day workshops.

The Board discussed options to appoint a representative to serve on the task force. The Board Chair indicated that his preference would be a citizen appointment who would keep the County Board informed of the process. He also indicated that a per diem would be available along with mileage. Commissioner Peterson indicated she was interested in serving on this task force. Commissioner Hauser suggested advertising for this position and that the individual wouldn't necessarily have to live on the river to serve. It was Board consensus that the County would advertise for this position, Board members could recruit individuals, and that this matter will be brought back for Board action at a later date.

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DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience.

Connie Hickey, 6125 10th Street North, Oakdale, presented a petition from parents and students of Tartan High School, petitioning the County Board to install a traffic control light at the intersection of 10th Street and Greenway Avenue, North, in Oakdale, Minnesota.

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Maxine Schultz, 2982 Hallmark Avenue, Oakdale, presented the following information: 1) copy of a letter from Bill Sullivan, Chief of Police, Oakdale, to Craig Waldron, Oakdale City Administrator concerning traffic control inquiry at 10th and Greenway in Oakdale; and 2) Resolution from the City of Oakdale requesting the Washington County Board of Commissioners to accelerate the installation of traffic signals at 10th Street and Greenway Avenue. She also indicated that they have the support of School District 622.

Commissioner Peterson asked if the school district has started charging for parking at the schools?

Ms. Schultz indicated that a policy was taking shape and was set to go into effect at the beginning of the second semester this past week. That has now been delayed and will begin at the start of the next school year.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked that the letter, resolution and petition be accepted and that this information be copied to the Public Works Director for a response.

The Public Works Director indicated that they are aware of this situation and have had correspondence with the City of Oakdale as well as some representatives from the school district. He stated a letter was sent to them at the end of November, 1995 stating the County's position that at this time the accident data from the Minnesota Department of Transportation did not warrant a traffic control. He informed the Board that the Public Works Department will perform additional counts this spring.

The Board Chair informed Ms. Hickey and Ms. Schultz that the information they presented tonight will be copied and forwarded to the Public Works Department for response after additional traffic information is obtained.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

The Board Chair and Commissioner Peterson updated the Board on the AMC meeting they attended last week.

Commissioner Hauser informed the Board that the flow control legislation at the federal level has been defeated for this session. She hopes that cities will negotiate contracts with their haulers to make sure that their garbage is taken to the Newport facility which would save not only money in the long run, but is environmentally safe as well.

The Board Chair has learned that this bill may not only be dead for this session but for the foreseeable future.

Commissioner Abrahamson suggested writing a letter to the Secretary of the Interior, Bruce Babbitt, regarding the environmental issue of flow control.

Use of Board Room for Court Cases During Remodeling

The Board discussed changing the meeting times for County Board meetings from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. during the remodeling of the courts area to allow morning court session to be held in the Board Room. Also, Board workshops would be held in various locations throughout the Government Center and Law Enforcement Center. It was Board consensus to change the Board meeting times and locations as necessary to accommodate the Judiciary during remodeling.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Peterson and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 6:30 p.m.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The County Administrator presented an overview of a meeting held with the District Court Judges, representatives of Court Administration, County Attorney's Office, Sheriff's Department, Administration and Mike Cox and Jill Smith of Wold Architects, who met to discuss details on the courtroom remodeling project and logistics of where the Judges will be working during this remodeling period. He indicated that samples of courtroom layouts and furnishings are located in the Administration Conference Room for the Commissioners to view. Also, there will be a weekly newsletter giving an update on the construction progress.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson requested Board discussion on a letter received in the Board packet to Arne Stefferud, Metropolitan Council, regarding funding for regional parks. She stated there are several issues the Board needs to determine: 1) Is the County going to own and operate a gravel pit? 2) What is the County looking at paying per acre? 3) What happens to the gravel taxes, will it be given to the City of Cottage Grove?

Commissioner Hauser stated that a policy has been set by the County Board and that is a policy of willing seller. The County has two regional parks for which it is acquiring property, Big Marine and Grey Cloud. As she understands, the landowners were all notified and asked whether or not they had intentions of selling in the next fiscal year. Also, she indicated that the policy has been set for the County Board to not get involved in individual negotiations for each piece of property.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that the Board had a workshop on this issue a year ago regarding the purchase of Grey Cloud Island and what the price was going to be, what the costs were going to be. The County purchased 80 acres and paid close to a million dollars for that 80 acres. Now, all of a sudden a 40 year plan for the future becomes now. The County is considering the purchase of 1,300 acres for a gravel pit which is a tax base. He stated he was opposed to purchasing or even considering the purchase of this 1,300 acres and taking it off the tax rolls. He felt the County didn't do such a good

job with the first negotiations. The price went from \$600,000 to close to a million dollars in a matter of three months. He believes that the County should purchase Ceredian, which is available and they are a willing seller, it's already developed, it has a boat launch and everything else. The County can purchase that for between \$6 and \$7 million dollars. The County is looking at 1,300 acres to be purchased based on what it paid for the first 80 acres. Where is the money going to come from? This park was planned for 40 years from now and suddenly it's here. The County Board has a responsibility to the taxpayers.

Chair Engstrom reminded the Board that a decision was made on Grey Cloud Island, even though it was a 3-2 vote, and he anticipates that there will still be opposition to Grey Cloud. However, it was a 3-2 vote that supported it.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that a workshop should be held to discuss this issue since it was not listed on today's agenda. He thinks the Board needs to know where the staff is going on this issue, because of the size of this property with or without the gravel tax and with or without the gravel operation. He thinks it's an important issue that has to be discussed.

Commissioner Peterson recalls that this Board decided it did not want to be in the gravel business. She believes the Board should have been involved in this discussion prior to this letter being sent to the Metropolitan Council because there are unanswered questions and this is a policy discussion that should have occurred first. She requested that the Board hold a workshop next week to discuss this matter.

Commissioner Hauser stated that the issue of whether Grey Cloud Island should be a part of the regional system would not be brought up again. It has already been discussed and approved as a part of the regional system.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that everyone has a right to change their mind, especially when you are talking about millions of dollars of taxpayer's money. He brought up a request that he made at last week's meeting to set a cap on how much the County Board can spend on parks at any given time.

Chair Engstrom reminded Commissioner Abrahamson that the funds that are available are coming from Metropolitan Council funds, so are the funds for the bridge to Wisconsin. If the Board is going to revisit Grey Cloud he suggested that maybe the bridge to Wisconsin should be revisited.

Commissioner Peterson stated again that her request is that the Board discuss this issue. It's not a discussion on what parcels the County will or will not buy, it's a discussion on policy procedure of this Board, when the Board wants to be involved in that discussion.

Commissioner Peterson discussed the P-MAP bill from the social services health committee which she understands has passed. She suggested sending a letter to the legislative delegation thanking them for supporting the County's position. The Community Services Director indicated that he has heard it passed out of the policy committee and is in the financial committee at the present time and will be heard sometime next week.

Commissioner Hauser discussed the Metropolitan Light Rail Transit Joint Powers Board Annual Report, and gave an overview of the motions that were passed relative to legislative positions of the Board. She also announced that the Board of Government Innovation and Cooperation has looked favorably on the proposal which would define the role of urban counties and it will be submitted to them in the form of an application. The County Administrator indicated that the Metro County Administrators talked about that at their meeting last week and if this plan moves forward and gets funding that the AMC District X would be the coordinating entity for actually conducting the study.

Commissioner Hauser discussed recommendations by the AMC District X regarding the organization and scheduling of joint powers organizations and joint activities in the seven county metro area. She will make copies available to the other Board members.

Commissioner Peterson discussed the following legislative items: 1) Annexation of ACIR along with the County, cities and township associations; 2) Wetland proposal not applying to new roads or roads expanding width for additional traffic lanes; 3) Senate File 1998 and House File 2512, annexation joint planning legislation; 4) House File 2414 removal of County Commissioners from the municipal board; 5) House File 2005 splitting penalty on delinquent taxes and interest on delinquent property taxes with the State; 6) House File 2234, homestead values to fiscal disparity.

Commissioner Abrahamson informed the Board that the 911 Board is meeting tomorrow to discuss changing the executive committee of the 911 Board to include all counties in the seven county metro area. Up to this time, the two smaller counties have always been left out.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA FEBRUARY 27, 1996

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:40 a.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Abrahamson, Peterson, Engstrom, Hauser and Hegberg. Absent none. Board Chair Engstrom presided. Also present were James Schug, County Administrator; Richard Arney, County Attorney; Richard Stafford, Auditor-Treasurer; Leo Steiner, Assistant Auditor-Treasurer; John Devine, Controller; Russ Reetz, Court Services Director; Cindy Koosmann, County Recorder; Carol Seefeldt, Community Services Department; and Mickey Scheid, Public Information Specialist.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Commissioner Peterson moved, seconded by Commissioner Abrahamson to adopt the following Consent Calendar:

- Adoption of Resolution No. 96-027 as follows:

Support for a 5¢ Per Gallon Increase on the Motor Fuel Tax, Indexing of the Motor Fuel Tax, and Providing a Stable and Dedicated Funding Source for Transit

WHEREAS, the State Advisory Council on Major Transportation Projects examined the level of transportation need facing the state. This need is often difficult to quantify because it can vary considerably with the level of service goals which are to be met. While there is not widespread agreement of the precise dollar amount of need, there is general agreement that transportation funding must be increased if we are going to maintain and improve the existing system.

WHEREAS, there are a number of factors and trends which are contributing to Minnesota's growing transportation needs and the gap between these needs and transportation spending. Over the past decade, travel on Minnesota's highways has increased at a rate much faster than population or job growth. From 1980 to 1990, population rose seven percent, the number of households grew by 14 percent, Minnesota added over 400,000 new jobs, and total travel on our roadways increased by over 36 percent. This rapidly growing travel demand is reliant on an aging transportation system that receives comparatively fewer dollars than it did in 1972.

WHEREAS, Minnesota's last gas tax increase occurred in 1988, at which time the tax went from 16 cents per gallon to the present 20 cents per gallon. However, because the gas tax is not indexed for inflation, Minnesota's buying power in the area of transportation has dropped substantially. An Information Brief prepared by House Research indicates that since 1972, highway expenditures as a percent of total state and local government spending have dropped from 11.6 percent of total spending in 1972 to 7.5 percent of government expenditures in 1992.

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Advisory Council on Major Transportation Projects recommends that the Legislature should increase the present motor fuel tax by five cents per gallon and provide for annual indexing of the tax at the rate of inflation in subsequent years.

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Transportation Alliance supports a motor fuel tax increase of at least five cents per gallon and that legislature provide for the annual indexing of the motor fuels user fee rates to reflect the rate of inflation.

WHEREAS, the motor fuel tax is a user fee related to the amount of travel and therefore reflects the cost to the state and local government of providing and maintaining highways and streets.

WHEREAS, transit services are a critical element of a well functioning transportation system; and

WHEREAS, funding of these transit services should be dedicated and stable, an example would be capturing the revenue growth in the motor vehicle excise tax; and

WHEREAS, Washington County supports amending existing legislation to include motor fuels tax increase of five cents per gallon, and providing future increases through indexing conditioned on inclusion of the following changes to the County State Aid Highway system:

- Modify the make up of the County State Aid Screening Board to add more representation from the seven county metropolitan area including urban counties;
- Change the mileage factor to use lane miles for allocation of 30 percent of CSAH funds in place of centerline miles;
- Remove the 30,000 mile CSAH system limit and direct the Screening Board to develop a process to add qualified miles to the CSAH system.

WHEREAS, Washington County residents would benefit by the timely construction of state highways to allow for the movement of people and goods in Washington County; by an increase in state funding to the county for the construction and maintenance of county state aid highways; and by an increase in funding to municipalities over 5000 population in Washington County for the construction and maintenance of municipal state aid roads. Washington County's current construction needs for the county exceed \$96,000,000.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Washington County supports the motor fuel tax increase to twenty-five cents per gallon and provide for the annual indexing of the tax at the rate of inflation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County supports a stable and dedicated source of funding for transit.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County urges its legislative delegation to support increasing and indexing the motor fuels tax during the 1996 legislative session.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Chair Engstrom asked that the Planning Advisory Commission be asked to look at the Mining Ordinance and its requirement that barbedwire fences be used around mining operations. He indicated that the Denmark Town Board Chair asked if that portion of the ordinance and the berming portion could be reviewed, leaving options as to what kinds of fencing may be used up to the town boards.

Chair Engstrom thanked the Workforce Center staff for the good job they did at the On the Air Job Fair. Several staff members volunteered their time answering telephones and doing behind the scene work. It appeared that the venture was a great success and it may become a semi-annual event.

Commissioner Hegberg updated the Board on a public hearing held on Monday for Judicial Ditch 1. He indicated that the petition for repair was turned down. The number one reason the petition was turned down was that the number government agencies that are involved in cleaning the ditch make it almost impossible to do it in a cost effective manner. Additional funds were allocated and loaned to the ditch authority. He indicated that this is only a loan and when the process is completed the loan will be assessed against the benefited property owners. The County's share is \$16,000. He indicated that one bill, \$4,600, was for water quality and under ditch law water quality is not an issue and shouldn't be assessed against the property owners. Washington County's share of that amount is approximately \$1,840. He suggested looking at legislation on ditch law as to attorney fees, and bring this matter up to the AMC.

Commissioner Hauser asked that when appointments are made to the Planning Advisory Commission and Board of Adjustment and Appeals that those candidates be required to attend workshops giving basic information on planning issues. It was Board consensus that a consent calendar item be prepared for next week's agenda stating that appointees to the Planning Advisory Commission and Board of Adjustment and Appeals be required to attend workshop sessions on basic land use issues.

Commissioner Peterson informed the Board that cluster zoning is going on in Cottage Grove, and it will be interesting to see how that project is working out. She suggested reviewing their ordinance in conjunction with the county ordinance on cluster zoning.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Washington County Attorney's Office is authorized to execute all documents with the City of Woodbury and the Woodbury City Attorney to jointly commence the necessary proceedings to acquire title and possession and to prosecute said action to a successful conclusion or until it is abandoned, dismissed or terminated by the County or an Order of the Court.

HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

The Board Chair presented an overview of the procedure to be followed regarding a positive or negative declaration on the need for an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for a housing project in West Lakeland Township proposed by Lyman Development Company.

Steve Ryan, representing Lyman Development Company, gave a brief description of the proposed housing project in West Lakeland Township. He indicated that there are two plats, Emerald Highlands and Summerfield with a total of 53 single family residential lots ranging in size from 2.5 acres to 6 acres.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Land Use Specialist and representing the Washington County Plat Commission, indicated that an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) was prepared on this housing project. The EAW was reviewed by the Plat Commission and forwarded to the Environmental Quality Board and distributed according to law. He indicated that comments were received from the

following agencies: Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, Metropolitan Council, Minnesota Historical Society, and the Minnesota Department of Health. Mr. O'Donnell also presented the Plat Commission's conclusions after review of the EAW and agency comments. Comments from the agencies and conclusions of the Plat Commission, as contained in a memo to the Washington County Board of Commissioners from the Plat Commission dated March 11, 1996, are hereby made a part of this record.

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Mr. O'Donnell stated that the Plat Commission made the following conclusion and recommendation: The proposed project is in conformance with both Township and County Comprehensive Plans and conforms with all standards of the Township and County Zoning Ordinances. After review of the project itself, and review of comments from other governmental agencies, the Plat Commission found there should not be any significant environmental effects as a result of this project. Further, any impacts that may result, can be mitigated through the on-going regulatory process. The Plat Commission recommended that the County Board make a negative declaration on the need for an EIS.

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

The Board Secretary indicated that she has received all the documentary evidence.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that the proposed housing project in West Lakeland Township known as Emerald Highlands and Summerfield will not have a negative effect upon the environment and therefore moved that a negative declaration on the need for an Environmental Impact Statement be made. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

Amendment to the Metropolitan 911 Telephone Board Joint Powers Agreement

WHEREAS, comments were received from the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, Metropolitan Council, Minnesota Historical Society and the Minnesota Department of Health; and

WHEREAS, on March 6, 1996, after the thirty (30) day review period ended, the Washington County Plat Commission held a meeting to review the EAW comments and response to comments for the purposes of making a recommendation to the County Board as to whether this project has the potential for significant environmental effects; and

WHEREAS, the Plat Commission recommended a negative declaration of need for an Environmental Impact Statement; and

WHEREAS, on March 19, 1996 the Washington County Board of Commissioners held a public meeting to decide whether the project has the potential for significant environmental effects; and

Commissioner Peterson made the following comments/reports: There will be a meeting on April 24 to discuss regional land use housing development patterns, which will be presented by the Sensible Land Use Coalition; Senate File 2879, Section 48 regarding road construction in regional parks, staff to investigate this further; Minnesota Water and Wastewater Needs Questionnaire, referred to the Health, Environment and Land Management Department; Distributed copies to Board Members of the Minnesota Intermodal Terminal Study, possible location of terminal in Cottage Grove or Rosemount, suggested further discussion on this matter; Congressional hearings will begin on March 28 regarding the ISTEA funding, she suggested a workshop to discuss this issue.

Commissioner Abrahamson reported that the legislature has cut \$15 million out of the 800 megahertz system. The Metropolitan Radio System Planning Committee suggested that each County contact Senator Gary Laidig and request his help in restoring the full \$15 million in state bond funds for the radio project.

Chair Engstrom announced there would be a joint Board workshop with the Parks and Open Space Commission on April 9 regarding policies on cluster developments.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Kathy Montgomery and Casey Johnson of the Children's Home Crisis Nurseries presented an overview of the services they provide. They indicated that this program is available to all families residing in the county with children under the age of 13 years who feel they are unable to provide safe and nurturing care because of high levels of stress or crisis situations. The program provides care to children by two methods: 1) 72 hours of overnight care in licensed shelter homes; 2) up to 10 days of child day care through community based child care centers or licensed day care providers. Last year this program helped 70 families in Washington County.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The Deputy Administrator passed along an invitation from the Community Services Director for any Commissioner interested to attend a panel discussion on Managed Care, April 10 in the Department of Health, Environment and Land Management Training Rooms at 1:30 p.m. Representatives from the Minnesota Department of Human Services and the Minnesota Arc will be on the panel.

The Deputy Administrator distributed copies of a document which indicates the growth in market value projected for 1996 is at 9.49 percent over 1995. Of that amount, 5.16 percent is for inflation which leaves new construction at 4.33 percent. If the legislature freezes property taxes, the County would only be able to use the new construction rate of 4.33 percent.

The Deputy Administrator presented a legislative update on the following items: Tax bill; Airport bill; Bonding bill; Funding for the 800 megahertz project; and, the Transportation bill.

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DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

Mike Robinson stated that he has appeared at two prior meetings to discuss his concerns regarding an abstract for a piece of property located in the Carli and Schulenberg Addition to Stillwater. The County Attorney indicated to Mr. Robinson that this matter is currently under litigation and that further comments would not be appropriate. He cautioned the Board that it has no authority or responsibility in this matter since it is in litigation, and it would be inappropriate to respond to Mr. Robinson.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board Correspondence was received and placed on file.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Chair Engstrom indicated that the Guardian ad litem program will be holding a panel discussion on April 24 at the Historic Courthouse on child abuse. They are looking for a Commissioner to sit on the panel. He stated that Commissioners Hegberg and Hauser and himself will be involved in other meetings, and if either Commissioner Abrahamson and Peterson could attend it would be appreciated.

Chair Engstrom noted that Chief Justice Peter Popovich passed away this past weekend and will be greatly missed.

The Board Chair asked the County Attorney to address the recent findings in the class action suit regarding waste flow and interstate commerce. The County Attorney indicated that his office has been aware and concerned about the issues presented for the last 10 years, and that this Board and previous Boards have attempted to fulfill its mandated responsibilities in waste disposal while maintaining good stewardship of the County's tax dollars. He believes that is the position Washington County is in and where it is at with regard to these reported suits.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn seconded by Commissioner Abrahamson and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 5:20 p.m.

- Washington County supports efforts to provide traditional funding sources for the Highway 61 and Interstate 494 Wakota Bridge improvement project.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

The Legislative Representative presented an update on the legislative session just concluded. Topics discussed were: Transportation funding issues; Solid Waste Management issues; Airport Site designation; Wetlands; and Property taxes.

Resource Recovery Facility

The Director of Health, Environment and Land Management presented a brief history on the Minnesota Waste Management Act which required counties to find alternatives to landfills. Information was also provided on how waste is disposed of from Washington and Ramsey Counties. These charts show that

there has been a steady decrease during the past three years in the amounts of garbage being delivered to the Resource Recovery Facility and that this garbage is being taken to landfills in other states.

The Board discussed the issue of garbage being taken to landfills in other states and by-passing the Resource Recovery Facility which has proved to be an environmentally safer way of disposing of garbage. They discussed the future liability that the cities and counties will be involved in when these landfills in other states fail and start to pollute the groundwater. The Board indicated that although they cannot direct the waste haulers where to deliver their garbage, it should encourage them to dispose of their garbage in an environmentally correct method to assure the citizens that it is going to the safest place possible. At the same time, the County has an obligation on behalf of its citizens to provide a facility and encourage the private haulers, as well as the cities and townships within the County's jurisdiction, to help the County maintain this environmentally sound way of disposing of its trash.

It was Board consensus that staff prepare a letter to the cities and townships in Washington County encouraging them to contract with haulers who deliver to the Resource Recovery Facility and that the charts presented at this meeting be included with that packet.

Commissioner Peterson indicated that April 22 is Earth Day and suggested that staff prepare news releases about this issue. It was also suggested that the next Commissioner Newsletter address this issue as well. The Board also discussed the possibility of negotiating with other surrounding counties, including counties in Wisconsin, to use the Resource Recovery Facility for the disposal of their garbage.

Court Room Remodeling Project

The County Administrator indicated that bids were received and opened for the courts remodeling project. He stated that the bids came in under the projected estimates and that there was a tie. The two companies involved have agreed to a coin toss to determine the winning bid. The award of bid will be made at the next Board meeting.

Board Workshop with Parks and Open Space Commission

The County Administrator informed the public that the Board will be meeting in workshop session with the Parks and Open Space Commission at 3:30 this afternoon to discuss the County's movement towards cluster development.

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

good that it may be funded.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Water Problems in Kismet Basin

Craig Leiser, representing certain Grant Township residents, presented an overview of water problems they have been experiencing in the Kismet Basin. Mr. Leiser distributed copies of a study conducted by Barr Engineering in 1986 and a citizens petition from 1986. He requested that Grant Township, Browns Creek Water Management Organization, and Washington County implement a managed gravity water flow project enabling the excess surface water to pass over certain property to intersect the existing natural drainage of Browns Creek. He further recommended that this project follow the 1986 Barr Engineering Study of managing the water flow to a controlled elevation of 542.5 feet; which returns DNR designated wetlands 333W and 334W to a traditional and reasonable level.

SISSAIN PROPERTY.

The Board requested that staff study this report and present a recommendation back to the County Board at a later date.

Legislative Reception

The County Administrator notified the Board that a legislative wrap up session has been scheduled for May 7, 1996 at 3:00 p.m. prior to the 4:30 County Board meeting.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

Bill House, Forest Lake, distributed copies of a letter regarding the history of the Forest Lake Dam and outflow problems. He stated that if the Board had any questions regarding this letter to contact him directly.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Chair Engstrom and Commissioner Abrahamson discussed water problems occurring on Long Lake near County Road 15 north of Highway 36 which is receiving a lot of runoff from the new development that's occurring in that area. They indicated there will probably be additional runoff problems due to construction of a new school and 150 new houses. They asked staff to take a look at this problem and see if there is anything the County can do. The Soil and Water Conservation District was also asked for their assistance in this matter.

Commissioner Hegberg asked that the Parks and Open Space Commission consider a request by a disabled veteran to establish a transferable park permit that would allow him to use that permit when he is given a ride to the park so that person wouldn't have to purchase another permit. He suggested that the Commission also consider waiving the park permit for disabled Washington County residents.

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

MINNESOTA EXTENSION SERVICE

Commissioner Hauser moved to authorize the Minnesota Extension Office to enter into a five year lease agreement, for 3798 square feet at a rate of \$15.45 per square foot at 1825 Curve Crest Boulevard conditioned upon approval as to form by the Washington County Attorney's Office. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

WASHINGTON COUNTY LIBRARY

Commissioner Hauser moved to accept the donation of a 3.78 acre parcel of land from the City of Oakdale and the use of up to \$1,550,000 from bond funds, as previously included in the CIP, for construction of a library building in Oakdale. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

H.E.L.M. DEPARTMENT, PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT, SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT AND BOARD OF WATER AND SOIL RESOURCES

Brown's Creek Water Management Organization

Barbara Ohman, Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR), presented a report which was prepared stemming from a request from the Brown's Creek Watershed Management Organization (WMO) asking for assistance in resolving a dispute which has developed over the Kismet Basin area in Grant Township. This report was presented at a meeting held with the involved parties on May 6, 1996, and a brief review was given to the Board. The Brown's Creek WMO asked BWSR to answer the following questions:

- 1. What political entity, agency, group or individual(s) is responsible for the removal of excessive flood waters from the Kismet Basin?
- 2. What political entity, agency, group or individual(s) is responsible for the payment of costs for the removal of excessive flood waters from the Kismet Basin?
- 3. What are the reasonable assurances and protection that downstream landowners and water resources should be provided to achieve item #1 above?

Based on the findings and conclusions prepared by BWSR, Ms. Ohman offered the following conclusions in response to these questions:

- According to the Brown's Creek WMO Plan, Kismet Basin is a "water of local importance", and Grant Township is the responsible governmental unit.
- 2. As indicated in the report, there are a number of options for funding the project; special assessments Grant Township could use a MS 420 proceeding to construct a project thereby assigning benefits and damages to the Kismet Basin landowners. They could alternatively set up a subwatershed taxing district under 103B.245 and levy a tax across the subwatershed and/or specially assess the benefitted landowners.

3. The matter of potential liability for damages to downstream properties could be mitigated through establishment of flowage easements necessary to allow the passage of the overflow from the Kismet Basin. Adequate compensation for these easements must be determined and provided as part of the cost of the project.

Ms. Ohman made the following recommendations: 1) BWSR would like Grant Township to take action since they are the responsible governmental unit; 2) If Grant Township is unwilling to purse the project, they may seek a short-term joint powers or other legal agreement with Brown's Creek WMO to do a project; 3) If within 45 days of last night's meeting (June 21, 1996) the Brown's Creek WMO does not come up with a means to implement a project, BWSR staff will recommend to the BWSR Board to declare that the Brown's Creek WMO is not implementing its plan and request that a) Washington County take appropriate action to implement the plan to remedy the problems on Kismet Basin and b) take other appropriate action to effect a long term solution to the governance of water management issues of the Browns Creek watershed.

Ms. Ohman indicated that her impression of last night's meeting was that Grant Township would be willing to strengthen the joint powers agreement with Brown's Creek WMO to give them the authority to take over the project on the Township's behalf.

The Board Chair asked if any studies have been conducted which would solve this problem? Ms. Ohman stated that Barr Engineering performed a study in 1986 on behalf of the homeowners in that area. Craig F. Leiser spoke to the Board on the 1986 proposed solution. The proposal at that time was an underground pipe requiring an easement control through Bill Johnson's property emitting its water into a lower ponding ditch on the McKenzie property. He indicated that Mr. Johnson since that time would prefer a surface water pipe rather than another underground easement.

The Board Chair stated that if this matter comes back to the County Board for action, that there be a plan in place to implement immediately so this problem is not dragged out through another construction season. He also stated that the County Board would like to see this resolved, whatever it takes.

Ms. Ohman stated that the Washington County Soil and Water Conservation District monitors the WMO's affairs and will keep all interested parties updated on the progress of this project within the next few weeks.

Mary McGlothlin, H.E.L.M. Director, indicated to the Board that Brown's Creek WMO has already asked for technical assistance, particularly in the engineering studies, from the Soil and Water Conservation District, who have indicated they would be more than happy to assist. Also, the WMO indicated at last night's meeting they may come to the County Board for some advance dollars to implement the project.

Joint Judicial District Ditch #1

Don Theisen, Deputy Public Works Director, presented concerns related to surface water management in the area governed by Judicial Ditch #1. He indicated that several options have been discussed to resolve this issue: 1) Do nothing; 2) Form a watershed management organization with a joint powers agreement; or 3) Form a watershed district. He indicated that staff has recommended that a watershed district be formed. He stated that current ditch law does not adequately manage the situation in this area. One concern about establishing a watershed district is what area would the petition cover. There is a successful watershed management organization in Forest Lake but it does not cover the joint ditch. Another question is whether Chisago County would join in the petition for a watershed district. Also, the question has to be answered on the membership of the watershed district, how many would be from Chisago County and how many from Washington County.

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Mr. Theisen outlined three options regarding the formation of a watershed district: 1) Prepare a petition for a watershed district using the Comfort Lake outlet as a control point; 2) Petition for watershed district using the St. Croix River as a control point; and 3) Send a resolution to the Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) stating the County intends to file a petition in nine months. During the next five months the County can request BWSR to help resolve the issues that may come up and help define the district boundaries. It was staff recommendation that a resolution be sent to BWSR indicating the County's intent to file a petition in nine months.

Mr. Theisen indicated that Chisago County has requested that Washington County delay a decision on whether or not to petition for a watershed district until the two counties have discussed this further. He also stated that the Chisago County Board has requested a joint meeting with the Washington County Board.

Commissioner Peterson moved that the Washington County Administrator work with the Chisago County Administrator to set up a joint meeting of the County Boards to discuss the water/drainage problems in the Joint Ditch #1. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Update on East Mississippi WMO

Mark Doneux, Soil and Water Conservation District, presented an update on the East Mississippi WMO. He stated that the East Mississippi WMO is currently governed by a joint powers agreement. The Board of Water and Soil Resources is prompting that entity to take action because of a lack of a surface water management plan. Four options have been discussed: 1) Amend the current joint powers agreement; 2) Join an adjacent watershed district; 3) Petition to become a stand-alone watershed district; and 4) Continue to do noting, in which case Washington County would be designated as the responsible

planning unit, which would lead us back to options two or three. The consensus at the latest meeting of the member communities was to petition for a stand-alone watershed district. Since that meeting the BWSR and the County SWCD staff have discussed this matter further and it was the concurrence of these bodies that they would prefer supporting the consolidation effort with the adjacent watershed district. South Washington Watershed District would be the most likely or possibly Ramsey-Washington Metro Watershed. He indicated there is a meeting scheduled for May with the member communities who will consider a formal petition to BWSR. Until that time, there is no direct action required by the County. BWSR will probably be directing that process once a petition is filed and seek comments on joining or creating a stand-alone district.

Long Lake High Water Situation

Mark Doneux, Soil and Water Conservation District, discussed the high water on Long Lake. He stated there hasn't been any flooding to date, but the lake has gotten higher and closer to homes threatening to flood if it continues to rise. The City of Stillwater has initiated a \$40,000 study by their consultants to evaluate the 20 year old outlet on Long Lake. This will be a two phase project.

The County Administrator suggested that at the next League of Local Government meeting in July the Board of Water and Soil Resources could be asked to discuss surface water management.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The County Administrator stated that the 1996 legislature created new state funding called Local Performance Aide. He feels the County can meet the requirements and draw additional HACA funding.

The joint meeting with the Ramsey County Board of Commissioners is confirmed for May 28, 1996 at 12:30 p.m. at the Historic Courthouse.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

Bill Francois, July Avenue, indicated that he too has a water problem and can not get help from Hugo, Grant Township or May Township. There are only two houses, his and his neighbor, out in this area. He couldn't use his water or septic system. The road to his house was closed all last year. The water is getting closer to his house all the time. His neighbor has water is his house. The Board Chair asked Mr. Francois to leave his documentation and full address with the County Administrator and staff will look at his situation and get back to him.

The Board Chair stated he received a call from a person in Woodbury regarding a program that Hennepin County offers to seniors where they are allowed to work off a portion of their property taxes by doing service in the County. The Board Chair asked staff to look into this possibility and see what Hennepin and Ramsey County are doing in this area. The other Board members stated they would not

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be in favor of starting a new program, but indicated that staff could investigate further.

Commissioner Hauser and Judy Arends, H.E.L.M. Department, updated the County Board on action taken at the Ramsey County Board meeting related to the Resource Recovery Project and lowering of

the tipping fee.

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Abrahamson and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby proclaims Wednesday, May 22 as Seat Belt Awareness Day in Washington County;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners heartily supports and encourages the use of seat belts by all employees and residents to increase their safety and quality of life.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Deputy Public Works Director presented concerns raised by the Metropolitan Parks and Open Space Commission's advisory paper of June 4, 1996, regarding the siting of a waste treatment plant in the Grey Cloud Island Regional Park.

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Commissioner Hauser moved to approve the resolution stating the County's concern regarding the siting of the proposed Southeast Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant within the Grey Cloud Island Regional Park. Commissioner Engstrom seconded the motion.

The Board discussed this matter. Commissioner Peterson stated that in reviewing the City of Cottage Grove's comprehensive plan with business leaders, they wanted land set aside for industrial development. In placing facilities, the County should not encourage a city to give up land for the facility. She was also concerned that if the County does not want a waste treatment plant in a regional park, how do you make it acceptable in other sites. She encourages the placement of a treatment plant anywhere that is best. She also had concerns about security.

Commissioner Hauser stated that the executive summary prepared by the Metropolitan Parks and Open Space Commission indicates two sites in the Grey Cloud Island Regional Park would not be preferred, and the County resolution requests the Metropolitan Council fully address these concerns about the two sites.

Commissioner Abrahamson has heard from Mayor Jack Denzer of Cottage Grove that recreational areas which back up against treatment facilities work out well. He feels that a treatment plant would not be detrimental to this area.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that the Metropolitan Parks and Open Space Commission was negative to a treatment plant located in the park. He feels there are positive aspects as well including improved roads and use of the park in winter.

Commissioner Hauser moved to table the matter of a resolution concerning the siting of a proposed Southeast Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant within the Grey Cloud Island Regional Park. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Lower St. Croix Planning Task Force

Laura Reynolds, Washington County's representative on the Lower St. Croix Planning Task Force, presented a status report of the Task Force's process. She indicated that the first session was held in

April and was organized by the National Park Service. The purpose of this meeting was to develop purpose statements. Ms. Reynolds will make future presentations as issues occur.

Comments on the Metropolitan Council's Growth Options Report

The Physical Development Planner presented proposed comments on the Metropolitan Council's Growth Options Report.

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve the comments on the Metropolitan Council's Growth Options Report with the following changes: Page 1, 7th paragraph, 2nd sentence to read "The County supports limited expansion of the Metropolitan Urban Service Area to accommodate staged residential, commercial and industrial growth."; and, Page 2, 2nd to last paragraph, 1st sentence to read: "The County is developing an Open Space Development Design ordinance (i.e. clustered housing) and is exploring the use of other tools such as density transfer programs to further these goals and objectives." Commissioner Hauser seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously. Comments, as amended, will be forwarded to the Metropolitan Council.

Status of the Browns Creek Water Management Organization and Kismet Basin Flooding Problems

Konrad Koosmann, Soil and Water Conservation District, presented an update on the flooding problems in the Kismet Basin area. He distributed a schedule of events concerning this area. The Board discussed how the process could be sped up. A possible solution was to request that various townships move faster in setting their meetings.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION OF

WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA JUNE 17, 1996

The 1996 Washington County Board of Equalization was scheduled to convene on June 17, 1996 to review the overall assessment for the County. The Board delayed the opening of the meeting for lack of a quorum when earlier meetings ran longer than anticipated.

Commissioner Engstrom called the 1996 Washington County Board of Equalization to order at 2:15 p.m. on June 18, 1996 with the following members present: D.D. "Dave" Engstrom, Chairman, Wallace L. Abrahamson, Mary M. Hauser, Dennis C. Hegberg, and Molly O'Rourke, Assistant Auditor-Treasurer.

Also present were Scott Hovet, Washington County Assessor, Julie Roisen, Staff Appraiser, and Sharoan Harp acting as recording secretary.

Scott Hovet administered the oath to the Board members and Commissioner Engstrom presented opening comments.

CASE #2 -- Ralph and June Brown -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #3 -- Helen E. Mahoney -- submitted a letter stating that she would not be able to appear before the Board.

CASE #4 -- David Newhall and Carol Ludington came before the Board to appeal the market value of parcel 31-030-21-14-0060 in the City of Mahtomedi. Newhall/Ludington purchased the property 9/30/93 for a negotiated price of \$335,200. The owners have not made any improvements to the property since the purchase date. They did enter into an assessment agreement which they feel has never been honored. They sent a letter to the Mahtomedi Board of Review to reserve their appeal rights on the 1996 market value of \$380,600; the local board increased the value to \$430,600. Newhall/Ludington feel this increase was due to a personal agenda of the City of Mahtomedi regarding a law suit against the City. Mr. Newhall and Ms. Ludington presented handout material for the Board to review in support of their position that the 1996 market value of \$430,600 is too high. They are requesting a decrease in the 1996 market value to \$374,500. No action was taken at this time.

CASE #1 -- Allen Messerli appeared before the Board to appeal the market value of \$239,300 for parcel 08-029-20-14-0003 in Baytown Township. Mr. Messerli said the property had increase in value by 10% in 1995 and by 6% in 1996; he feels the value is too high for the size of his home and that the increase in value is unreasonable. Mr. Messerli has not requested either a fee appraisal or a market analysis for this parcel. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #8 -- Lee Miller appeared before the Board to appeal the 1996 market value of \$147,900 for parcel 31-030-20-13-0040 in the City of Stillwater. Mr. Miller presented the Board with various handouts relating to the watershed area. The Board indicated their awareness of water problems in this area. This property abuts Long Lake and may be subject to potential flooding. There has been no damage due to flooding at this time, but the flooding potential must be disclosed upon sale of the property. Therefore, Mr. Miller feels this disclosure would affect the value of the property. Mr. Miller presented a fee appraisal for the Board's consideration; this appraisal did outline a probable cost to repair the possible flooding problem. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #52 -- Paul Presbrey came before the Board to appeal the 1996 market value of \$202,500 for parcel 10-030-21-44-0003 located in Grant Township. Mr. Presbrey discussed his frustration with the Board about the property tax system. He had an appraisal for refinancing purposes that indicated a lesser value and asked the Board to take this into consideration. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #51 -- Frank Belinsky submitted a letter requesting a reduction in value for parcel 07-030-21-21-0002 in the City of White Bear Lake. Scott Hovet, County Assessor, indicated to the Board that he would be recommending a reduction for this property. The Board will hear this recommendation when considering all cases.

At this time there was a break in the presentations. The Board held a discussion about the water problems within the county and how property value may be affected.

CASE #15 -- David G. Fabio appeared before the Board to discuss the market value of parcel 31-030-20-13-0042 in the City of Stillwater. Mr. Fabio is a neighbor to Mr. Miller -- both have a water problem with potential flooding. The Board advised Mr. Fabio that they were aware of the problem and that any potential relief would be temporary until the water issue was resolved. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #20 -- Terry Henry appeared before the Board to appeal the value of parcel 13-030-21-21-0003 in Grant Township. Mr. Henry said that he did not understand why his value increased and that it was hard to compare to other properties because the land value was not consistent between properties. Mr. Henry left a list of properties with the Board; the Board instructed the County Assessor to review these properties and report back to them.

CASE #10 -- Neil Scott came before the Board to appeal the market value of \$394,500 for parcel 22-028-21-24-0024 in the City of Woodbury. Mr. Scott felt the value should be reduced to the purchase price of \$376,850. The property was listed for sale for one and one-half years. The Board asked Mr. Scott if he had an appraisal for this property, he did not. At this time there has not been an interior

inspection of the property due to cancellation of the appointment by the owner. Mr. Scott will call to set a new appointment for interior inspection. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #12 -- Joseph Nicoletti appeared before the Board to question the increase in value for parcels 29-030-21-12-0064 and 29-030-21-12-0063 in the City of Mahtomedi. The value of these parcels had been reduced at the 1995 County Board of Equalization. Mr. Nicoletti could not understand why the value increased in 1996 when the water problems were worse this year than they were last year. Mr. Nicoletti stated that the city road land locked his property and was a major source of his water problems. The Board advised Mr. Nicoletti that any issues he had with the road must be addressed to the City of Mahtomedi. The Board took no action at this time.

Myra Peterson joined the Board at this time and was sworn in by Scott Hovet.

CASE #13 -- Jennifer & Lauren Fariss -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #25 -- Jack Johnson came before the Board to request a reduction in value for parcel 11-030-21-43-0004 in Grant Township due to water problems. Mr. Johnson presented handouts and photos to the Board. He stated that the water has steadily been rising since 1993 and that he has lost approximately 80% of the dry land. The septic system is barely functional and downstairs facilities unusable. Any significant rain would put water in the lower level of the house. There is no more dry land available for a new septic system without buying an easement from the neighbor. The Board advised Mr. Johnson that they were aware of the water problems in this area and would let him know of their decision at a later date.

CASE #28 -- Hammon Becken and his attorney appeared before the Board to appeal the market value of \$440,700 for parcels 24-029-21-44-0010 and 24-029-21-44-0011 in the City of Lake Elmo. Mr. Becken feels the value is overstated based on sales and the way the lot is situated. This property is located on a "natural habitat lake." Mr. Becken's estimate of value was in the \$350,000 range. He has hired a fee appraiser and will fax a copy of the appraisal to the Board as soon as he receives it.

CASE #17 -- Norman Bierschenk appeared before the Board to question the value of \$81,300 for parcel 35-029-20-33-0061 in the City of Lakeland. Mr. Bierschenk felt that his modular home is overvalued when compared to homes of frame construction. There has been no fee appraisal on this property. The Board will notify Mr. Bierschenk of their decision.

CASE #29 -- Donald Holzmer came before the Board to ask for a reduction in the market value of \$258,300 for parcel 21-028-20-12-0005 in the City of Afton. Mr. Holzmer offered a market analysis of average listing/sale prices prepared by MinVada Corp to support his request. The Board discussed how location of property affects value and how specific areas of Washington County reflect this increase in value. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #58 -- Steve Biscoe sent a letter to the Board regarding the market value of agricultural parcels 27012-2900, 27013-2650, 27013-2550, 27012-2905, 27012-2950 and 27012-3365 in the City of Cottage Grove. Mr. Biscoe has similar agricultural land in Denmark Township that carries a different value than in Cottage Grove. Since the land is adjacent, Mr. Biscoe felt the value should also be similar. This land is classified as "Green Acres." Mr. Biscoe asked only for an adjustment on the estimated market value and not on the taxable market value of this land. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #40 -- Charles Briscoe appeared before the Board to appeal the market value of \$179,500 on a partially completed structure for parcel 34-030-21-11-0005 in Grant Township. Mr. Briscoe has two parcels of land totaling 5.4 acres in size. He feels the land value is too high and is concerned about the water covering a portion of his property. The Board had many questions for Mr. Briscoe concerning the construction process and permits considering the area in which his property lies. The Board took no action at this time.

Molly O'Rourke excused herself from the meeting at this time.

CASE #53 -- George Larson -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #23 -- Tom Sikora was scheduled to appear before the Board but was unable to attend due to a family emergency.

CASE #24 -- Margaret Meyer sent a letter to the Board regarding the high taxes on parcel 01-029-21-33-0003 in the City of Lake Elmo. The Board acknowledges the letter but is unable to act upon a previous year's assessment.

CASE #26 -- Clyde and Leone Fulks -- Did not appear before the Board.

CASE #19 -- Ronald Carlson came before the Board to appeal the estimated market value of \$150,000 for parcel 21-028-20-11-0001 in the City of Afton. Mr. Carlson had planned on developing this land but was required to sign a developer's agreement with the City of Afton stipulating conditions under which the property could be developed. He felt this agreement decreased the value of his property. Commissioner Engstrom asked Mr. Carlson if he had gone to the Afton City Council to request a variance for this property -- he had not. There was also discussion concerning the legality of the developer's agreement. The Board entered into further discussion but took no action at this time.

The meeting recessed at 6:15 p.m. The Board will reconvene at 1:00 p.m. on June 19, 1996 in the HELM Training Room on the fourth floor of the Washington County Government Center.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION OF

WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA June 19, 1996

The Washington County Board of Equalization reconvened at 1:05 p.m. on June 19, 1996. The meeting was called to order by D. D. "Dave" Engstrom, Chairman, with the following members present: Wallace L. Abrahamson, Dennis C. Hegberg, Mary M. Hauser, and Molly O'Rourke. Member absent: Myra Peterson.

CASE #31 -- Patrick Dean met with the Board to discuss the affect of an easement on parcel 04-029-21-33-0025 in the City of Lake Elmo. Mr. Dean presented the Board with handouts and maps detailing the problem. Mr. Dean bought this property based upon a survey that did not fully detail the easement over his property. A lawsuit occurred and judgment was entered in 1994 fully detailing the easement, who could use the easement and what activities could occur on that easement. Mr. Dean indicated that the land value was adjusted two years ago by six percent, but he feels that the improvements are also effected and should be adjusted. The Board questioned the county assessor about easements and about the value of property that has access to a lake but is not on the lake. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #33 -- Rosemary Sierakowski came to the Board to discuss the influence of Bellaire Sanitation on parcel 28-030-21-12-0003 in Grant Township. This parcel is closest to Bellaire Sanitation. Since the business sold in 1995 the commercial activity has increased to 24 hours a day, six days a week. Commissioner Hauser stated that the Board is aware of the Bellaire Sanitation operation. The Board agreed that some relief should be allowed for this property, but will decide the amount of reduction at a later time.

CASE #38 -- Cancelled

CASE #39 -- Mrs. Stephen Smith -- Mrs. Smith met with the appraiser for the City of Afton regarding parcel 27-028-20-23-0001. Mrs. Smith felt the recommendation to be presented to the Board for adjustment was fair and will accept this adjustment upon Board approval.

CASE #41 -- Robert Lutz did not appear in person to the Board. He felt there was inequity in comparing his property with other similar properties for parcel 07-028-21-42-0014 in the City of Woodbury. The county assessor recommended an adjustment for the 1996 assessment. Sue Kondratowicz, Woodbury City Assessor, said the property would be reassessed for the 1997 assessment along with other commercial properties. There was discussion concerning the commercial land value throughout the County. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #48 -- Donald Dunlap came before the Board to appeal the market value of 08-029-20-11-0008 in Baytown Township. Mr. Dunlap felt the increases in value over the past two years were excessive.

He questioned how the value could raise so quickly over a short period of time. Scott Hovet, Washington County Assessor, explained how property increases in value. Mr. Dunlap indicated that he had an estimate of value from a realtor; the Board asked for a written estimate of the realtor's opinion. No action was taken at this time.

CASE #55 -- Bob Flaherty appeared before the Board on behalf of the American Legion Post #225 in Forest Lake City -- parcel 08-032-21-12-0100. Mr. Flaherty expressed his concern that the parking lot parcels were overvalued due to the location and the parking requirements imposed by the City. There was considerable discussion regarding the price per square foot of commercial land in the City of Forest Lake. The Board took no action at this time.

CASE #57 -- Dale Swanson sent a letter to the Board regarding the value of parcels 08-032-21-21-0104 and 08-032-21-21-0105 in the City of Forest Lake. The Board took no action at this time.

There were no further presentations for the 1996 County Board of Equalization. The Board discussed and considered all appeals before them at this time. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the County Transportation Engineer to establish a "No Parking" zone adjacent to the new St. Paul Park City Hall and to erect and maintain appropriate signing.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

RECOGNITION OF REPRESENTATIVE WALTER PERLT

The County Board Chair presented Walter Perlt a Resolution of Appreciation for his many years of public service to the citizens of Washington County.

<u>PUBLIC HEARING - DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT</u>

Comprehensive Plan Amendment and Rezoning Request by J.L. Shiely Company

The Board Chair presented an overview of today's public hearing to consider an application to amend the Washington County Comprehensive Plan and rezone 49 acres of property in West Lakeland Township from R-1 Residential to A-2 Agricultural.

The Secretary to the Board read into the record the notice of public hearing. The Board Chairman declared the public hearing open at 1:15 p.m.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Land Use Specialist, presented background information on the plan amendment and rezoning request. He presented seven issues the Board should consider before making a decision. He also indicated that the Planning Advisory Commission held a public hearing on April 27, 1996 and May 28, 1996. The Planning Advisory Commission recommended County Board approval of the plan amendment and rezoning. He also placed on the record correspondence received from area residents.

Robert Bieraugel, Environmental Affairs Manager, Shiely Company, presented a brief overview of their application. He focused on two issues addressed by the Senior Land Use Specialist: 1) Is Property compatible with adjacent land uses; and 2) Is it in the public interest. He reviewed a remediation schedule which was compiled with the assistance of a neighborhood advisory committee. Items on this schedule included: microwave back up alarms and cameras - no other pit does this; voluntarily removed primary crusher from the production line in order to decrease noise; greater setbacks than required; preservation of forested bluff along west side of Highway 95; separation from stationary equipment and nearest neighbors; he also discussed Shiely's part in area traffic; and noted that this area has accessibility to I-94, lessening traffic into neighborhoods.

Mr. Bieraugel addressed the issue of compatibility with the comprehensive plan. They believe that the future use of this 49 acres, 19 of which is going to be mined, will be residential. They propose to mine this area for three years, reclaim that site in the fourth year, and in the fifth year it should be available for residential development. The long-term end use of that property will be compatible with the comprehensive plan which is for residential use. He indicated that mining on this property is only an interim use.

Mr. Bieraugel indicated that there is a strong public interest. This site is among the two top aggregate deposits in the entire metropolitan area. The quality of this deposit is extraordinary. This is an important resource that needs to be extracted. He indicated that there is a demand for sand gravel. There is a public interest in the material itself and in the products it produces such as roads, bridges, schools and houses.

Commissioner Hegberg asked what is the level of mining above the water level? Mr. Bieraugel stated that there is 160 feet of natural material, they will be mining to 60 feet, so they will be 100 feet above the water level.

John Walker, West Lakeland, is disturbed by the proposed extension of the mining operation. He asked what they are going to do to make the 60 foot hole compatible with a residential area? Mr. Bieraugel indicated that the reclamation plan calls for 4-1 slopes coming down from the original grade to the floor of that property. The original grade will be undisturbed on the east and to the north. There is a plan that residential lots could be located around the north and east side of that property and there could be lots on the floor as well.

Mr. Walker stated this was suppose to be a prime residential area. He does not think this is enticing for the area to build houses at the bottom of a 60 foot hole. He's concerned about what will happen to the larger area that Shiely owns.

Lynn Most, 1787 North Rivercrest Road, West Lakeland, submitted and read into the record a letter to the County Board asking that the Board deny the request to rezone and change the Washington County Comprehensive Plan. He agreed that Shiely has tried to correct some of the problems, but there is still a lot of noise, dust and traffic, and a gravel pit is still a gravel pit no matter what you do you cannot change that.

Muriel Schiltgen, 1635 North Rivercrest, Lakeland, stated that the request is to rezone 49 acres in West Lakeland, but as pointed out that gravel crusher was moved 2,000 feet south and it has moved closer to where she lives in Lakeland. Mr. Bieraugel talked about how far it is from the nearest neighbor in the north, but nothing about how far it is from the nearest neighbor to the east. There are several homes along Rivercrest Road and they are the ones that have taken the brunt of the noise in the past. She stated that at the Planning Commission meeting Shiely talked about the amount of taxes they paid, \$150,000. She indicated that for the tax year of 1994-1995 the people in Lakeland paid \$4,191.30 in taxes. She feels that this request is not in the best interest of Washington County, Lakeland and West Lakeland.

Bob Rupp, 1747 North Rivercrest Road, Lakeland, feels the Board is working at cross purposes. If it rezones from 2.5 acres to 5 acres you're reducing the number of home sites by half that can be put on these acres that will be mined. So in five years from now you will need to be in the process again of rezoning back the other way to get down to the density that the long-term plan was scheduled for originally. He stated that looks like preferential treatment to one of the land owners in the area.

The Board Chair asked the Senior Land Use Specialist to address Mr. Rupp's concern. Mr. O'Donnell stated if the Board approved the request it would be going from a 2.5 acre zone to 5 acre zone. Once the mining is done, Shiely could develop it at a 5 acre residential development without putting it back to this Board. If Shiely decided that 2.5 acres would be better suited for their purposes, the Board would probably see them in for a rezoning trying to get it back down to 2.5 acres. He indicates that it is probably a reasonable assumption that once the mining is done the rezoning would come back before the Board requesting to go back down to 2.5 acres.

Jan Most, 1787 North Rivercrest Road, West Lakeland, asked about the buffer zone which is the pasture on highway 95. She said that is such a beautiful site as you come down through Bayport up the hill and then back down there are all those horses. That would be buffered, the horses would be gone and it will be just dust, noise and gravel. She feels their request is not in conformance with the comprehensive plan and is not compatible to the neighbors.

The Board Chair asked Mr. Bieraugel to address Ms. Most's concerns about the buffer. Mr. Bieraugel indicated that the horse pasture would not be mined, that stays as a buffer. They have plans to construct berms and tree plantings that would match the existing terrain and that came about as a result of the citizens advisory meetings that were held.

Sandy Brandt, 1287 Rivercrest Road, Lakeland, stated she is in awe of the idea of expanding commercialism in a residential area. They are not opposed to Shiely existing, they have Shiely that's not the issue. She is against the expansion of the commercial aspect in this area. She is concerned about preserving the St. Croix Scenic River Valley, one of the most beautiful places in the country. She asked that the Board consider this request very seriously and hopes that big bucks do not win out and hopes that will not be an issue.

Bob Rupp, 1747 North Rivercrest Road, Lakeland, does not feel that berms are any great solution to problems. All that does instead of being able to see out towards a horizon you just see a hill right next to you.

The Board Chair asked for further comments; none were heard. He asked the Board Secretary if she had all documentary evidence. The Board Secretary indicated that she had. The Public Hearing was closed at 2:10 p.m.

Commissioner Peterson asked if this is a temporary rezoning or is this permanent rezoning? Mr. O'Donnell stated that if this rezoning is approved the zoning would change to agricultural. This would not preclude any property owner from coming back at some later date and try to rezone it.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to amend the Washington County Comprehensive Plan and rezone 49 acres of property in West Lakeland Township from R-1 Residential to A-2 Agricultural based on the following findings:

- 1. There is only one vehicle working the mine once it is in operation.
- The applicant has reduced noise by: A) Moving the crusher south away from the northern residents; and B) By removing the back up alarm on the loader and replacing it with camera and monitor.
- The line of sight will be mitigated by the installation of an earthen berm along the northern property line.
- 4. The applicant has an on-going reclamation program in place.
- The end use of rural residential is in conformance with the comprehensive plan and is within the time frame of the proposed comprehensive plan.
- 6. There is no proposed additional impact on truck traffic.

7. This approval in no way implies that a conditional use permit will be issued for the property.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

The County Attorney's office was directed to prepare a resolution formalizing this action.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Needs Analysis - Ceridian Recreational Area

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to authorize County Park staff to prepare a needs analysis for adding the Ceridian Recreational Area to the Regional Recreation Open Space System; authorize staff to prepare a master plan as required by the Metropolitan Council to qualify for grant funds; establish an advisory committee made up of the following individuals: Two members from the Washington County Parks and Open Space Commission; one member from Denmark Township; one member from the Department of Natural Resources; and one member from the Minnesota-Wisconsin Boundary Area Commission; and set public meeting for August 7, 1996 at 7:00 p.m. County Board Room, Washington County Government Center. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Comprehensive Feasibility Study - Square Lake Park

Commissioner Hauser moved to authorize County Park staff to prepare a comprehensive feasibility study for Square Lake Park as a Special Regional Recreational Feature designation by the Metropolitan Council; authorize staff to establish a nine member advisory committee to work with staff in preparing a feasibility study for Square Lake Park made up of the following individuals: Two members from the Square Lake Home Owners Association; two members of the Washington County Parks and Open Space Commission; one member from the May Town Board; one member from the May Town Planning Commission; one member from the Washington County Board of Commissioners; and two citizens at large (one citizen at large could be a representative from the watershed management organization and one member from Golden Acres Resort); and approval to set the public meeting for August 7, 1996 at 8:00 p.m. in the County Board Room, Washington County Government Center. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hegberg volunteered to be the County Board representative on this advisory committee.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

The County Administrator indicated that at the last Board meeting Commissioners discussed a request by the Municipal Board for two Commissioners to serve on a petition hearing board to consider the incorporation of Grant Township. Due to scheduling conflicts with some Commissioners it was decided that Commissioners Hauser and Peterson would serve.

The County Administrator indicated that Imation, 3M's spin off, will be holding an event on July 1 at 3:30 p.m. in Oakdale. Commissioners Peterson, Hauser, Engstrom and Hegberg indicated they would be attending.

DISCUSSION FROM THE AUDIENCE

Dave Jones, 13241 30th Street North, West Lakeland, asked the County Board to give consideration to two items he has not heard any discussion on: 1) Use of chemicals that are being used in Washington County in the agricultural industry that may not be allowed in the State of Minnesota; and, 2) Mining rates that generate revenue to the County have not been changed since 1970, and those rates are not based on market value of the materials that are coming out of the mine but based on volume, tonnage yards of material so the tax that is being charged to the mining operation has not been changed since the 1970's.

Commissioner Hauser suggested that the Minnesota Extension Office could investigate Mr. Jones' first concern regarding agricultural chemicals.

The County Administrator indicated that previous discussion has taken place on the gravel rates. The Auditor-Treasurer was asked to pull together some information on gravel taxes, and the Public Works Department showed where some of that is directed. He indicated that information will be gathered and that the County Attorney's Office and the County lobbyist will be asked to do research on this issue.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

The Board Chair asked the Public Works Director to investigate a complaint he has had about bikers on County Road 21 where there are no shoulders, and that signage be placed there which restricts bikers to single file in that area. The Public Works Director indicated that State law allows for bikers to ride two abreast and that any signage placed there would not be enforceable.

The Board Chair asked the County Attorney to clarify what the legal rights of bicyclists on a regular County Road are and is there an ability for the County to restrict them.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked when County Road 14 would be reconstructed. The Public Works Director stated that they are completing design work, the right-of-way agent has been talking to landowners, and the bid letting is scheduled for August.

The Board discussed an article in this morning's paper regarding property taxes. The Board Chair stated that as this issue develops the Board should consider what its position is as far as property tax reform is concerned to effectively present that to the legislature.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board Correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Peterson and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

The Board meeting was preceded by a workshop session with the County Administrator to discuss his annual performance and goals for the coming year. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Abrahamson, Peterson, Engstrom, Hauser and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug and Richard Arney.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

The Board meeting was followed by a workshop session with the Public Works Department to discuss flooding problems on School Section Lake and Goggins Lake and effects on CR 57. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Abrahamson, Peterson, Engstrom, Hauser and Hegberg. Also present were James Schug, Virginia Erdahl, Don Wisniewski, Jack Perkovich, and Mary McGlothlin.

BOARD WORKSHOP WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, ENVIRONMENT AND LAND MANAGEMENT
