Washington County 2001 Legislative Agenda

James Schug, County Administrator, reviewed the County 2001 Legislative Agenda including the following priority items: Drop List Legislation; Regional Parks Bonding, 2001-2002; Metropolitan Regional Park System-Candidate Sites; Tax Forfeited Land Designated as Conservation-Recovery of Costs; Statewide Integrated Criminal Justice Information System; Child Welfare Concurrent Planning; Rededicate Undedicated Transportation Funds; and Motor Vehicle Fee Increase.

Mr. Schug advised the Board that three new legislative items will be added to the agenda and they are: Continue funding for planning the Red Rock Corridor; Ensure Waste-to-Energy and Landfill Gas Recovery are defined as a Renewable Energy Resource; and, SCORE Tax and Solid Waste Management Tax.

Commissioner Peterson asked that funding for the Rush Line Corridor also be included in the Legislative Agenda.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to approve the Washington County 2001 Legislative Agenda with the additions as discussed. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Mr. Schug reminded the Board that there will be a meeting with the legislative delegation on January 9, 2001 at the Oak Marsh Golf Course beginning at 5:00 p.m.

Forest Lake Tax Issues

Mr. Schug updated the Board on the Forest Lake Township delinquent tax situation. Taxes were due on the airport, golf course and a water tower. Staff has met with Forest Lake Township a number of times, and with the City of Forest Lake who is now managing the affairs of the Township. The City of Forest Lake has agreed to pay all of the back taxes and the County agreed it would abate certain penalties and interest.

Federal Housing and Urban Development Home Program

Mr. Schug stated that as part of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), the County had to include in the agreements with the local units of government reference to what is called the federal HOME Program. That program is designed to acquire property or help in the construction of affordable housing. It has been determined that the CDBG and HOME Programs work best when they are planned and administered by the same entity.

Mr. Schug advised the Board that the Housing and Redevelopment Authority at its last meeting voted to recommend that Washington County take over the responsibility of administering the HOME Program in addition to the CDBG Program. Administration of the program will require either the temporary hiring or contracting of staff to administer the program. Funds are available through the administrative portion of

each program.

Commissioner Stafford moved to authorize the County Board Chair and County Administrator to execute any documents required to administer the federal Housing and Urban Development HOME program in the County. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg informed the Board that he attended the New Year's Eve Party in St. Paul and stated it was a family oriented event with several bands in different areas. He complimented the City of St. Paul for that event and asked that a letter be sent to Mayor Norm Coleman congratulating him on its success.

Commissioner Peterson noted that there will be an open house for the Wakota Bridge/61 project at Newport, 5:00 to 8:00 on January 9 and in St. Paul Park from 5:00 to 8:00 on January 11. On February 7, the Minnesota Drive In for Transportation Alliance at the Kelly Inn in St. Paul. The Metro East Development Partnership will hold their annual meeting on February 8 at the Town and Country Club from 5:00 to 7:00.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously. The public hearing was closed at 9:10 a.m.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-003 as follows:

Adoption and Submittal of the 2001-2005 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners has considered the 2001-2005 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan covering a five-year period and setting forth the estimated year, together with the estimated cost, the need for the improvement, and sources of revenue to pay for the improvement; and

WHEREAS, in preparing the Capital Improvement Plan, the County Board of Commissioners has considered for each project and for the overall plan:

- the condition of the County's existing infrastructure, including the projected need for repair or replacement;
- 2) the likely demand for the improvement;
- 3) the estimated cost of the improvement;
- 4) the available public resources;
- 5) the level of overlapping debt in the County;
- 6) the relative benefits and costs of alternative uses of the funds;
- 7) operating costs of the proposed improvements; and
- 8) alternatives for providing services more efficiently through shared facilities with other counties or local government units; and,

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners, after public notice, conducted a public hearing on January 9, 2001, for the purpose of receiving comments on the proposed 2001-2005 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopt the 2001-2005 Washington County Capital Improvement Plan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorize submittal of the plan to the Community Development Division of the Minnesota Department of Trade and Economic Development for their approval.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Update on the Woodbury Library Project

Richard Gauger, Project Manager, presented an update on the Woodbury Library Project. Mr. Gauger indicated that the architects have completed drawings and the advertisement for bids is in place and will be distributed to the contractors this week. He also updated the Board on the following items: The development agreement approved last fall is completed and will be given to Administration today; The plat work is completed and is expected to be in place prior to the award of the construction contracts; The schedule calls for receipt of bids on February 15 with an award recommendation to be presented to the County Board on February 27; Groundbreaking is scheduled for April 2; Tax-exempt status for this project is being sought for a portion of this project; Review of construction documents continues and items suggested by Library staff will be incorporated in the drawings including the book drop issue; The Library and Central Park will be connected to the senior housing and the YMCA; The architect's estimate on the cost of the project continues to be the same; and work continues on the operation and maintenance agreement with the City of Woodbury.

Lake Links Trail Network Master Plan

Jeff Schoenbauer, Brauer & Associates, LTD, presented an update on the Lake Links Trail Network Master Plan. The Lake Links Trail Network includes a trail loop around White Bear Lake and Silver Lake, extension of the Bruce Vento Trail from Maplewood to the Hugo trail system, and trail links to the Gateway Trail and Stillwater trail system.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to approve the Lake Links Trail Network Master Plan and authorization to submit this master plan to the Metropolitan Council for review and approval of regionally significant trail corridors. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2001-004** as follows:

Metropolitan Counties Energy Task Force Recommendations and Work Plan

WHEREAS, the electric utility industry is making major structural changes in anticipation of retail competition, including mergers and acquisitions by major investor-owned utilities, mergers between gas and electric utilities, the creation of regional independent transmission system operators, and electric power trading exchanges; and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Commerce has released its report "Keeping the Lights On, Securing Minnesota's Energy Future," which presents a legislative proposal for changes in Minnesota's energy policy; and

WHEREAS, Washington County is committed to protecting its residents and its businesses from potential adverse effects of changes in energy policy, including deregulating or restructuring the electric utility industry and decisions affecting the reliability of natural gas and electric energy; has a significant interest in ensuring reasonable prices for natural gas and electricity, continued reliability of natural gas and electric supply and high quality of service; and has significant economic interests that may be impacted in terms of its own energy usage as a large institutional consumer of electricity; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has significant interests which may be impacted as this public policy debate unfolds, many of which are common to the interest of other counties within the region that will also be impacted by energy policy changes; and there is precedent for counties approaching major public policy initiatives jointly; and

WHEREAS, Washington County and the other Metropolitan Counties have created a Metropolitan Counties Energy Task Force, which provides a forum to address energy restructuring/deregulation, which has developed draft policy positions for consideration by the counties; has monitored energy restructuring/deregulation activities in a variety of forums; has coordinated intergovernmental activities related to this issue, and has explored the best type of organization for the Metropolitan Counties to use in the next few years to deal with energy issues.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby accepts the report from the Metropolitan Counties Energy Task Force.

January 9, 2001

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County Board states its continued participation in the Metropolitan Counties Energy Task Force, which shall have a term of two (2) years and the term of which shall be reviewed in the fall of 2002, and the budgets for which shall be approved by the member counties.

BEIT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County Board instructs the Administrator/County Manager to work with other counties in the region through the Metropolitan Counties Energy Task Force for purposes of carrying out the recommendations of the Task Force, including working with other public and private entities to increase the supply of natural gas to the metropolitan area, and exploring working together on distributed generation as a source of energy, considering the best available current technologies and their costs, monitoring energy policy development activities at the Minnesota Legislature and the Minnesota State Public Utilities Commission, as well as activities in other states and at the federal level, and generally within the electric utility industry.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County Board hereby adopts the legislative policy positions recommended by the Metropolitan Counties Energy Task Force, and directs that those positions be included in its legislative package for the 2001 session.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County Board directs Metropolitan Counties Energy Task Force to report on its progress in July and December of each year.

BEIT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County Board approves the payment of \$9,841.82 for the 2001 Washington County Board's share of the Metropolitan Counties Energy Task Force.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Distinguished Budget Presentation Award

Virginia Erdahl, Deputy Administrator, presented the Board Chair with the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the Government Finance Officers Association for the 2000 budget document. Ms. Erdahl stated this is the third award received by the County.

WHEREAS, Washington County has a state approved comprehensive local water plan, which has been locally adopted pursuant to Minnesota Statutes §103B.311 or §103B.255, or has State approved comprehensive local water plans, covering 50% of land area in the county, which have been locally adopted pursuant to Minnesota Statutes §103B.231, §103D.401, or §103D.405; and

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota, acting by and through its Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR), has authority to award Natural Resources Block Grants for purposes of implementing comprehensive

local water plans, the Wetland Conservation Act, the DNR Shoreland Program, and the MPCA Individual Sewage Treatment Systems (ISTS) Program, to local government pursuant to Laws of Minnesota 1993, Chapter 172, sec. 6, and Laws of Minnesota 1994, Chapter 632, sec. 3; and

WHEREAS, Washington County may assess a levy under its general levy authority to match such grants by BWSR pursuant to Minnesota Statute §103B.355; and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Revenue has determined the minimum amount necessary to be raised by Washington County for the base grant portion of the grant under the formula in repealed Minnesota Statute §275.50, subd. 5; and

WHEREAS, BWSR has determined that Washington County is eligible for a Natural Resources Block Grant of up to \$58,738 upon BWSR acceptance of the LGU's application and the execution and delivery of a Grant Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves of Washington County entering into a Grant Agreement with the State of Minnesota to receive state funds for the implementation of its comprehensive local water plans, and the administration of the Wetland Conservation Act, DNR Shoreland Program, and MPCA ISTS Program, under the terms of the Grant Agreement and all statutory requirements; and

County Road 33a is entirely within New Scandia.

Ann Pung-Terwedo, Senior Land Use Specialist, stated that an issue was raised by two residents of Denmark Township regarding the subdivision of property and the retention of existing accessory structures on the farmsteads. A variance to allow more buildings and square footage was denied by the Washington County Board of Adjustment and Appeals last fall and the township contacted the County requesting that it study the issue. The Washington County Planning Advisory Commission reviewed this situation and have recommended amendments to the Washington County Code.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to accept the Washington County Planning Advisory Commissions' recommendation for amendments to the Washington County Code and that this matter be set for public hearing on March 20, 2001. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

James R. Schug, County Administrator, reported that the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources has ordered the enlargement of the Brown's Creek Watershed District and the enlargement and name change of the Valley Branch Watershed District. Mr. Schug stated that the number of members for each watershed district would remain at five.

Legislative Update

Mr. Schug advised the Board that John Kaul, the County's Legislative Liaison, has been working with the revisor's office to draft a County bill that would extend the special drop list legislation, which allows people to keep their names off of lists that are provided to marketing firms. This bill would make the drop list legislation permanent. Draft legislation is also being worked on regarding tax-forfeited land that cannot be sold. They are discussing a bill, that would provide reimbursement of costs that the County incurs in managing those tax-forfeited lands that cannot be sold.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Stafford reported that he has a PERA meeting on Thursday, February 8 to discuss the shortfall issue.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported on a meeting he attended last Thursday with the House caucus to discuss the Governor's budget proposal and what it means to local government.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked that a letter be sent to the residents of the senior housing in Scandia who have questioned the rent increases by the Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA). He asked that they be informed as to how the HRA is operated and why the County stays out of the HRA's business.

Commissioner Abrahamson addressed a newspaper article on the Highway 36 Study. He reported that he has received several phone calls from residents in Oak Park Heights who are concerned about the frontage roads and do not understand how they will be able to get on the highway.

Commissioner Abrahamson addressed an article he read regarding lower appropriations for highway funding. He feels there are a lot of unmet needs on the state's roads and no money to address them.

Commissioner Peterson reported on the Library Board meeting she attended last evening. She stated that the two new appointees to that Committee rolled up their sleeves and got right to work. A group from south Washington County spoke about the access to pornography on the Internet through the public library system.

WHEREAS, the one bid received was in excess of the available budgeted funds and no other bids were received; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the bid received from Videotronics, Inc., made on February 5, 2001, be rejected due to being in excess of budgeted monies available.

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Department of Transportation & Physical Development be authorized to advertise for bids on this project in the future.

16. Approval to execute lease for overflow parking space at Salem Lutheran Church.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Dan Papin, Community Services Director, presented an overview of the chemical dependency program.

Cindy Rupp Community Services, gave an overview of the host county contracts the County has with chemical dependency treatment contractors over the last year. She stated that the County is getting

performance results and data reports from these contractors and that area facilities are performing better than the statewide average. She stated that they are also conducting site visits to talk to staff, look at their space and discuss future expectations.

Mark Kuppe, Human Services, Inc., talked about the need for these facilities. He said that out of 2,400 chemical dependency evaluations made last year, 634 required treatment placements. The host contracts from the County represent 40% of the placements used, 60% of the placements go to other facilities. Mr. Kuppe indicated that the County uses so many different facilities because of: different needs, volume of clients, specialty areas, and geographic area. He stated there will be a Board workshop in April to discuss the County's chemical dependency program.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked why the County is using two facilities in Wisconsin citing concern about taxpayer money going to Wisconsin. Mr. Kuppe stated that individuals could go there depending on the type of program they need and also for geographical considerations.

Commissioner Stafford stated that he would abstain from voting because he has a relative on the staff of one of these facilities. He asked for further clarification on the facility that Ms. Rupp mentioned was below standard on its performance last year and why the County was again giving them a contract?

Ms. Rupp explained that the person in charge has now left that employment, and Community Services staff has confidence in the person who is now in charge.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to approve host County contracts with the following chemical dependency treatment providers: Avalon, Inc.; Haven Chemical, Inc.; Kinnic Falls, Inc.; Cedar Ridge, Inc.; Christensen Health Services, Inc. (dba Burkwood Residence); Human Services, Inc. (jail treatment program); On-Belay, Inc. (dba Anthony Lewis Center); We Care Counseling Center, Inc; and, Fairview Healthcare Services, Inc. (dba Fairview Recovery Services). Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford abstained.

Commissioner Pulkrabek complimented the staff on the fine job they had done over the year with the chemical dependency facilities and stated that he will be very interested in further data that comes back.

Mr. Schug commented that there is a workshop set for April 10 to discuss performance measurements.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

John Kaul and Bob McFarlin, Legislative Liaisons, gave an update on the following items: County's drop list legislation has been drafted and introduced; Regional parks bonding; Tax forfeited land issues;

Statewide criminal justice information system; Child welfare concurrent planning; Unfunded mandates; and, Transportation issues including discussion of a constitutional transfer of motor vehicle excise taxes to the trunk highway fund and discussion of funding for the City of Newport as it relates to the Wakota Bridge.

DESTRUCTION DESTRUCTION

Mr. Schug advised the Board that the Association of Minnesota Counties and the Metropolitan Inter-County Association has sent a draft resolution for an increase in the Community Corrections Act Subsidy. This item will be discussed at the next Board meeting.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Stuart Glaser, EMS Manager, presented an update on the status of Project Impact activities. He indicated that the partners in the project continue to grow, and that they are contributing more money and giving more hours of their time. The project has been working on the following items: Developing a brochure; Flood mapping; Public education appearances; Video; and Working with a television station in airing a segment on the project. Mr. Glaser stated that following the Board meeting, they would visit an actual home that contains a "safe room" which is a room built inside a home to withstand up to 250 mph winds.

Commissioner Peterson asked that the Board be kept up to date on any potential flooding problems that might occur this spring.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Abrahamson asked that the Board discuss the Stillwater Bridge crossing at next week's Board meeting and confirm that it still supports the project.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported that he has asked for information on liquor license fees and the discrepancies in the amounts charged by the County and different cities.

Commissioner Peterson reported that the Metropolitan Transportation Advisory Board is considering a new process to determine funding for highway projects that would award points according to the County's ability to promote affordable housing. Part of the criteria includes the use of tax increment financing for affordable housing.

Commissioner Stafford and Hegberg requested that as a result of a recent meeting with Ramsey County and state legislative representatives, that the Board hold a workshop to discuss Resource Recovery Facility issues and SCORE funding.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Pulkrabek and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:25 a.m.

WHEREAS, Deputy Administrator Virginia Erdahl is retiring from Washington County Government effective February 28, 2001; and

WHEREAS, Virginia Erdahl joined Washington County in 1973 and embarked on an exemplary 28-year career that began in the County Attorney's Office and then moved to the Office of Administration in 1976; and

WHEREAS, Virginia Erdahl's responsibilities in the Office of Administration grew in concert with the growth of Washington County Government and the rapidly increasing number of County residents; and

WHEREAS, Virginia Erdahl became Deputy Administrator in 1985 and has provided leadership in the development of the County's annual budget, served as Auditor-Treasurer since 1998, guided the County in the

continued implementation of new systems and technology to keep Washington County at the forefront of modern public service and has ably served in the absence of the County Administrator; and

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WHEREAS, Virginia Erdahl has continuously demonstrated her enthusiasm for special County projects and has made countless contributions for the betterment of the County and her profession; and

WHEREAS, Virginia Erdahl has served as President of the Minnesota Association of County Administrators, the Minnesota City/County Management Association and Chair of the MetroGIS Policy Team and has achieved professional recognition for the County through awards, such as the Government Finance Officers Association Budget Award in 1998, 1999 and 2000; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Washington County Board of Commissioners joins together with the employees of Washington County to heartily commend Deputy Administrator Virginia Erdahl for her dedication and 28 years of service to the citizens of the County, and proclaims Friday, March 2, 2001, as "Virginia Erdahl Day in Washington County."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Board of Commissioners hereby recognizes the administrative leadership that Virginia Erdahl has provided to the County and extends its best wishes to Virginia Erdahl and her family for a happy and healthy future.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Community Corrections Act Subsidy Increase

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-022 as follows:

Community Corrections Act Subsidy Increase

WHEREAS, Minnesota was one of the first states to adopt a Comprehensive Community Corrections Act Statute in 1973; and

WHEREAS, 31 Minnesota counties, organized into 16 administrative jurisdictions, have chosen to provide correctional services through the Community Corrections Act; and

WHEREAS, the Community Corrections Act (CCA) was developed to address state concerns over the rising cost of institutions, limited local correctional services, and overlapping correctional jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, CCA counties will supervise nearly 75% of the 126,000 offenders under supervision in Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, downward departures in CCA counties save over \$68 million per year in prison costs; and

WHEREAS, county spending on corrections and public safety continue to rise, with an average county spending 19% of the entire budget on public safety costs (up from 8% only 20 years ago); and

WHEREAS, the Community Corrections Act subsidy has not been increased since the 1997 session; and

WHEREAS, probation caseloads in CCA counties will have risen 30% since the last subsidy increase; and

WHEREAS, without a significant increase in the CCA subsidy during the 2001 session, a number of CCA jurisdictions may choose to discontinue under the Act; and

WHEREAS, the funding of probation services in the three delivery systems should be equitable.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners supports legislation authored by Representative Dave Bishop and Senator Deanna Wiener to provide a significant increase to the Community Corrections Act subsidy in 2001.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Report on Woodbury Library Bids

Richard Gauger, Woodbury Library Project Manger, presented results of the joint library/Woodbury Central Park project bid opening held on February 15, 2001. He stated that bids were very favorable and under budget for both the City and the County. The bid for the County's share of the construction portion was \$6,419,500. The final bid, including the book drop and alternate for the 6,659 square foot expansion space, was \$6,940,000, which is approximately \$200,000 less than budgeted.

Mr. Gauger indicated that he plans to bring the construction contract back to the Board within the next 30 days and break ground in April with dedication taking place in early fall of 2002.

Commissioner Stafford moved to include the 6,659 square foot expansion space as part of the proposed construction contract. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Update on Solid Waste Management Issues

Judy Hunter, Public Health and Environment Senior Program Manager, updated the Board on the status of the Ramsey/Washington Resource Recovery Facility. She informed the Board that in 2000 various waste haulers delivered 391,622 tons of waste to the Resource Recovery Facility. Because of market and business decisions and in order to compete, some waste haulers have decided to take their waste to

landfills in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa and it is estimated that 249,153 tons will be delivered to the Resource Recovery Facility in 2001. Ms. Hunter indicated that the two counties have guaranteed to deliver 280,800 tons a year to the facility. Staff has been working on options to present to the Ramsey and Washington County Boards at a March 22 workshop. Options being considered include terminating the service agreement and closing the facility; If the tip fee isn't working at \$38 a ton, will it work if the tip fee is reduced to zero; Look at requiring the cities to have organized collection of all residential waste, if they don't, the counties would do that; Look at getting the business waste in at a different price whether it's a zero tip fee or not; and, County collection of garbage.

PROPERTY.

Ms. Hunter stated that pros and cons of these options will be discussed at the March 22 workshop. Staff has also been talking with legislative representatives of the two counties. They have requested and will meet with the head of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency and the Director of OEA next week. They are talking with a couple of large businesses in the two counties to find out if they care where their waste goes and what steps do they take in managing their waste.

Commissioner Stafford asked that the workshop include information on the latest technology for landfills.

Vince Anderson, West Lakeland Township, believes that knowledgeable taxpayers do care where their garbage goes. He suggested meeting with the cities and town boards and have them give the citizens a choice on where their garbage goes. He feels citizens would be willing to pay more.

Stillwater/Oak Park Heights-Houlton St. Croix River Crossing

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to send a letter to the Minnesota Department of Transportation stating that Washington County is concerned about their decision to suspend the design work on the Stillwater/Oak Park Heights – Houlton St. Croix River crossing, and that Washington County supports continuation of the process to construct a new river crossing in Stillwater as part of the comprehensive improvement program for Highway 36. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson asked that a copy of the letter be sent to the Washington County Legislative delegation.

Legislative Update

James Schug, County Administrator, advised the Board that Molly O'Rourke, Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections Director, is testifying in support of legislation that extends the County's property

drop list. Consideration is also being given in the bill that this be made a statewide option. Any county interested in instituting the drop list would be permitted to do so.

Mr. Schug stated that AMC and MICA have had discussions about PERA deficits in funding. They have asked that the County send a letter to its legislative delegation indicating this is a serious issue and encourage the state's participation in resolving this problem Staff will prepare a letter expressing the County's concern to the legislative delegation.

Mr. Schug indicated that legislation is being introduced that would place the 911 Communication Center employees and Community Corrections Act County Probation Officers in the Law Enforcement retirement program. This would be a higher participation rate and earlier retirement. The County opposed this when the Correctional Officers were put into that program a few years ago, but were not successful in defeating it. It ended up costing the County in \$100,000 annual costs to the County. The estimated cost of this proposed legislation could result in another \$90,000 in additional cost for the County as its share of the PERA taxes that would be increased. Mr. Schug will inform John Kaul, the County Legislative Liaison, that the County has serious concerns about the price tag unless there is state funding to go along with it.

Commissioner Stafford left the Board Meeting at 10:40 a.m.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg stated that Transportation and Physical Development has advised him of accidents on Highway 61 and Highway 8. They need to take a look at that to see if there are any solutions. He also met with residents of Oakhill in Scandia concerning the Housing and Redevelopment Authority.

Commissioner Abrahamson reported that there are many pot holes throughout the highway system in the metropolitan area and hopes the state can find the money to fix them.

Commissioner Peterson asked that she be placed on the Library Board agenda and minute list. She also reported that there will be a reception at the Historic Courthouse on Friday, March 2, for Deputy Administrator Virginal Erdahl, and that most of the Commissioners will be in attendance.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

The recommended allocation of \$293,500 in funds include the following: \$160,125 for new construction of affordable housing (20 + units); \$60,000 for homebuyer downpayment assistance program (12 + households); \$44,025 for Community Housing Development Organization (15%, HUD requirement); and \$29,350 for program administration.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve the preliminary allocation of Washington County 2001 HOME Program funds, as presented, for the Consortium public hearing to be held on March 21, 2001. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

Introduction of Scout Troop 477

The Board Chair welcomed Scout Troop 477 from Beaver Lake Lutheran in Ramsey County. The Scout Troop is working on their Citizenship Merit Badge. They have met with the Judges and will be touring the jail after this meeting.

Legislative Update

James Schug, County Administrator updated the Board on the following legislative actions: The tax forfeit property bill has been drafted; A hearing has been held on the County's property tax drop list bill; A letter has been sent to the County's legislative delegation asking for an increase in the Community Correction's Act funding; A bill has been introduced from the Secretary of State's Office that would require photo ID's at elections-that could have some impact on the County's operations-this will be discussed at the County's Legislative Committee meeting next week; and a bill being introduced that would move the 911 Dispatchers and Probation Officers into the Law Enforcement Retirement Fund.

Commissioner Peterson asked that the Board discuss at a future workshop Senator Marko's bill and the bill for the TIF exclusion for St. Paul Park.

WASHINGTON COUNTY HOUSING AND REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-025 as follows:

Issuance of Bonds in Washington County for the 2001 Single Family Mortgage Revenue Bond Program

WHEREAS, in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 462C, as amended (the "Act"), the Dakota County Community Development Agency (the "CDA") proposes to issue its single family mortgage revenue bonds and/or single family mortgage revenue refunding bonds in an aggregate principal amount of approximately \$71,100,000, (the "Bonds") and to use approximately \$5,000,000 of the proceeds thereof to finance the acquisition by low and moderate income first-time homebuyers of single family homes within Washington County, pursuant to an agreement

between the CDA, the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (the "HRA") and the Minneapolis/Saint Paul Housing Finance Board; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), the issuance of the Bonds must be approved by the "applicable elected representative" of the HRA; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f)(ii)(E) of the Code, the Washington County Board of Commissioners is the "applicable elected representative" for the issuance of tax-exempt bonds by or on behalf of the HRA;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Washington County Board of Commissioners, that the issuance of Bonds by the CDA pursuant to the Act is hereby approved.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

TRANSPORTAION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Bid Award for the Washington County Woodbury Library and Indoor Central Park Project

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-026 as follows:

Bid Award Concurrence for the Woodbury Library-Indoor Central Park Project to Donlar Construction

WHEREAS, the City of Woodbury and Washington County desire to construct a new County library-City indoor Central Park as a joint construction project; and

WHEREAS, the City of Woodbury and Washington County have entered into a cooperative construction agreement for this project; and

WHEREAS, the City of Woodbury has let bids for this project construction and has determined that Donlar Construction is the low bidder.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Washington County concurs in the bid award to Donlar Construction, through the authorization of the Washington County Board of Commissioners.

Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

Contract with Wold Architects - Remodeling of the Old Woodbury Library

Don Wisniewski, Director of Transportation and Physical Development, presented a proposed contract with Wold Architects and Engineers for engineering work involved with remodeling the old Woodbury Library including an expansion of existing parking. Excise excavated material from the foundation for the new library could potentially be used to expand the old library parking lot. A credit of \$100,000 would be given if that material could be used.

AND MARKET THE WAY

Commissioner Hegberg stated that the County is not sure who is going to go into the old library and what it will be used for. He understands the parking lot issues, but wonders why they should be hired at this point in time to do the remodeling? What procedures will they go through inside of the building to say this space will be appropriate for whomever? Mr. Wisniewski stated that this contract provides for developing the actual groups that would be moving into this building after it's remodeled. They would be working with the departments to determine what is the best strategic move in terms of moving personnel from this building down to that facility. They are talking about moving the existing license center at Woodbury City Hall to the old library. After it is determined what people would move, that would give them the parking load that would be required and would tell them what size of expansion they would have to incorporate into the design as it relates to parking.

James Schug, County Administrator, added that staff is doing the in house planning for space, but they also need to be working with an architect to start developing a plan to bring to the Board and get direction on who will be occupying that Woodbury Service Center.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked what the appraisal was for the current Woodbury Library? Mr. Schug stated that the last appraisal was approximately \$1.3 million. He does not have it with him, but could quickly retrieve that information.

Commissioner Abrahamson is still questioning whether or not the County should be putting a million dollars into this building. He would like to see the appraisal. He will not vote for this contract today.

Commissioner Hegberg feels it would be a good idea to wait because he knows Commissioner Peterson has concerns about remodeling this building also and she is not here today. He also feels that 2002 is out a ways in the future. He agrees that it makes some sense to take the extra excavation from the new construction site and use it for the parking lot in the old library, whether the County keeps that building or not. He is not convinced that the remodeling needs to be done at this time.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to table the request to approve a contract with Wold Architects and Engineers for engineering work involved with remodeling the Old Woodbury Library for one month. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

Mr. Schug stated they will pull together more information on leases and update the appraisal and come back to the Board in a month.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

Mr. Schug updated the Board on the latest activities of the 2001 legislative session. Items discussed included the following: A hearing is being held this morning on the County's drop list legislation; AMC has requested the County's help in testifying on a bill that is encouraging the State to fund more mandates in the area of out-of-home placement for children and also in family preservation aide; and the Senate has passed a bill authorizing appropriations in the amount of \$7.3 million to cover the City of Newport's share of the Wakota Bridge/Highway 61 project, this will face a tougher time in the House. The County has met with the City of Newport and is trying to find additional ways to get them funding for their share of the project.

The County Legislative Committee will meet this afternoon at 1:15 p.m. to discuss legislative issues that have come up that the County does not have official positions on including the changes in voting procedures put out by the Secretary of State and also a proposal to expand the Law Enforcement pension fund that would include 911 dispatchers and County Probation Officers which would have significant costs for the County.

Conservation Easement on the Baird Property - May Township

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the co-holding of the conservation easement with the Minnesota Land Trust contingent on the County Board's approval on an interagency agreement that addresses monitoring, enforcement and dispute resolution issues.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

March 27, 2001 County Board Meeting

Commissioner Hegberg also reported on the energy task force meeting. He will have a conflict with this meeting in the future because of his appointment to the PERA Board. He will continue to be an advocate that RDF is a renewable resource.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Northern Traffic Supply, Inc. be paid in full for the said contract work in the amount due indicated on the final payment voucher which is attached herewith and is hereby a part of this resolution.

11. Authorization for the County Board Chair and County Administrator to execute a partnership agreement with Minnesota Department of Transportation to assign Gregory Felt to work full time at Washington County as Operations Manager.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford absent.

PUBLIC HEARING - TRANSPIRATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Amendments to the Washington County Development Code - Accessory Structure Regulations

The Board Chair presented an overview of today's public hearing to consider an amendment to the Washington County Development Code, Chapter One, Section 2, and to amend Chapter Two, Zoning Regulations, Part 3, Performance Standard, Section 1.2, Accessory Structures (3D).

The Secretary to the Board read into the record the notice of public hearing. The Board Chair declared the public hearing open at 9:05 a.m.

Ann Pung-Terwedo, Senior Land Use Specialist, presented an overview of the proposed amendments to the Washington County Development Code. She stated that there is currently an accessory structure ordinance in the Development Code. This allows accessory structures based on the number of acres someone owns and the number of parcels they have. Last fall the Planning Advisory Commission heard a variance request regarding a parcel of property proposed to be subdivided. Those individuals wanted to keep all their buildings on their property. That proposal was submitted to the Board of Adjustment and Appeals and it denied the variance because the applicant could not prove a hardship in that case. The Denmark Township Board brought this issue forward to the County and staff has worked with the Township on amendments to the ordinance and those amendments were brought forward to the Planning Advisory Commission.

Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated the proposed amendment would allow land to be subdivided with a minor subdivision into parcels of no less than 10 acres and retain the existing number of square footage of accessory structures on the site if they are part of the farmstead as existed on January 1, 2001 subject to certain conditions: A) No additional accessory buildings shall be constructed on the property; B) If any existing accessory buildings become hazardous buildings, they shall be repaired or removed by the owner; and C) The buildings shall not be leased to any other person or entity unless the buildings are used for the storage of agricultural products grown on the property or on nearby farmland or equipment used on the property or on nearby farmland.

Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated that the record includes a letter from Gary Thyren, Denmark Township Board, asking that an additional section be added to allow a property owner to build an additional garage. Also a resolution was distributed to the County Board this morning from West Lakeland Township requesting that the County reduce the ten-acre minimum to five acres.

Kevin Shoeberg, Attorney for Denmark Township, stated they had two issues of concern when they looked at this. One is the fact that in Minnesota because of the climate most people find it necessary to have a garage and that's why they raised the issue about allowing a garage to be constructed. They suggest that Section 2, A) be amended and that "except for a garage" be added. The second issue that was raised is in Section 2, C). They feel that the ordinance in the township already deals with any other uses of property. They would like the Board to consider deleting Section 2, C) or amending it to say other uses would be dealt with on a conditional use basis. They feel this is not limited to just one person. They believe there are several properties in Denmark Township that may be affected.

Bill Voedisch, Chairman of May Town Board, 14318 Ostrum Trail North – Stated he is here to speak favorably on the ordinance; however, he is not speaking for the Town Board who took no official action on these amendments. He did speak against the five acre notion presented by another Township. He believes you have to be careful about what the number of buildings and size of square footage would do to a five acre parcel. It would be very imposing on that parcel and what you could end up with is something that might not fit visually. He is not in favor of adding language that would allow an additional building such as a garage.

Andy Hansen, Baytown Township Board, stated they concur with West Lakeland's idea of going with the five acres. They have discussed and feel that tearing down a perfectly good building just to meet an ordinance doesn't make sense. Commissioner Peterson asked if that was passed by Resolution and was it submitted to the County? Mr. Hansen said they did pass it and he will make sure the County gets a copy of that resolution.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the audience; none were heard. The public hearing was closed at 9:30 a.m. It was noted that all documentary evidence was made a part of this record.

SAME TO SERVICE STATE

Commissioner Hegberg stated he would support the five acres and removing Section 2, C) from the proposed ordinance.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked how this ordinance would affect prior conditions that were put on by the Planning Commission? Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated this ordinance pertains to minor subdivisions, it doesn't pertain to the platting of property.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Land Use Specialist, stated this ordinance only deals with minor subdivisions, someone who would be creating maybe one or two lots in addition to the homestead but not platting the property into any more than three lots. If someone were still going through major subdivision process, platting their property into a number of lots, they would still need to bring the number and size into conformance with the ordinance.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he will support the Planning Advisory Commission's recommendation as is. He is not in favor of going with the two amendments as presented by Commissioner Hegberg.

Commissioner Hegberg asked Mr. Voedisch if he recognized this as a minor subdivision, a difference between a minor and a major subdivision? Mr. Voedisch stated he did, but he sees a way to work around it. If he owned 80 acres he would come forward first and divide six lots off of the 80 on a 10-acre average density, keeping 20.01 acres. At the end of that process he would come back and say he wants to do a minor of the 20.01 with a 10.01 and another 10 with all the buildings on it. That's how he would get around it. It seems if the Board wants to get rid of those types of shenanigans it would basically strike the word minor and say it should apply to either major or minor.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to send this matter back to the Planning Advisory Commission to discuss this issue further as it pertains to the minor and major subdivisions. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion.

Meredeth Magers, Assistant County Attorney, stated according to statute, once this matter has been submitted to the County Board a decision has to be made within 60 days. She also advised the Board that when there is a major subdivision and it does come through the County's Plat Commission, there is a condition of the plat, a density agreement, that eliminates the so called shenanigans so that someone cannot keep subdividing and then be able to get density units at a later time.

Commissioners Hegberg and Abrahamson removed their motion and second to send this matter back to the Planning Advisory Commission to discuss this issue further as it pertains to the minor and major subdivisions.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to amend the proposed ordinance, Section 2, to read: "Land may be subdivided with a minor subdivision into parcels of no less than <u>5 acres</u>"; and to remove item C from Section 2. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted 3-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Hegberg, Abrahamson and Peterson; No, Commissioner Pulkrabek; Commissioner Stafford absent.

The ordinance was adopted as follows:

RESOLUTION NO. 2001-031

Approving Text Amendment to the Washington County
Development Code – Ordinance No. 156 Chapter One
Section 2 and Chapter Two, Part 3, Section 1.2(D) Zoning Regulations

WHEREAS, Washington County is authorized to carry on County planning and zoning activities in the unincorporated areas of the County pursuant to MINN. STAT. CHAPT. 394; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County 2015 Comprehensive Plan was adopted by the Washington County Board of Commissioners on April 22, 1997 and became effective October 1, 1997 as Washington County Ordinance No. 124; and

WHEREAS, MINN. STAT. § 473.865 requires counties to adopt the official controls described in their Comprehensive Plan so as to implement the Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Development Code was adopted by the Washington County Board of Commissioners and became effective on October 20, 1997 as Washington County Ordinance No. 127; and

WHEREAS, an application has been submitted to amend Chapter One, Section 2 by adding definitions for "farmstead" and "hazardous building/hazardous property" and to amend Chapter Two, Part 3, Section 1.2(D) of the Washington County Development Code to allow a minor subdivision of no less than 10 acres and retain the existing number and square footage of accessory buildings on the site if they were part of the farmstead as it existed on January 1, 2001, subject to three conditions; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission held a public hearing on the proposed amendments on January 23, 2001 and recommended approval of the application to the Washington County Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, on March 20, 2001, the Washington County Board of Commissioners conducted a public hearing to consider the amendments to Chapter One, Section 2, Definitions and Chapter Two, Part 3, Section 1.2(D); and

WHEREAS, the records of the public hearing consist of the minutes of the Planning Advisory Commission meeting, staff reports, correspondence, presentation by staff of the Washington County Department of Transportation and Physical Development-Land

Management, Land Survey, representative of Denmark Township and members of the public; and

AND THE STREET

WHEREAS, Washington County 2015 Comprehensive Plan promotes preserving and protecting the rural areas and rural characteristics of the County which includes existing historic farm sites.

- 1. The amendment would apply to existing structures only.
- 2. That 5 to 20 acre parcels are small for productive farming operations of crops and livestock, yet are of reasonable size for hobby type farms.
- 3. That no commercial or business operations are allowed under the amendment.
- 4. That the amendment meets the intent of the Washington County 2015 Comprehensive Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, based upon the hearing record, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby amends Chapter One, Section 2. Definitions by adding:

Farmstead: A group of buildings and adjacent service areas which support the functions of a farm. Structures may include, but are not limited to, homes, barns, machinery sheds, granaries, pump houses, chicken coops and garages.

Hazardous Building or Hazardous Property: "Hazardous buildings or hazardous property" means any building or property which because of inadequate maintenance, dilapidation, physical damage, unsanitary condition or abandonment, constitutes a fire hazard or a hazard to public safety or health.

and amends Chapter Two, Zoning Regulations, Part 3, Performance Standards, Section 1. Development Standards, 1.2 Accessory Structures (3) (D) to read:

Land may be subdivided with a minor subdivision into parcels of no less than 5 acres and retain the existing number and square footage of accessory structures on the site if they were part of the farmstead as existed on January 1, 2001, subject to the following conditions:

- A) There shall be no additional accessory buildings constructed on the property.
- B) If any existing accessory buildings become "Hazardous Buildings," they shall be repaired or removed by the owner.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Zoning Administrator is directed to make the changes set forth in the Washington County Development Code and cause the same to be published and codified according to law and from and after the effective date of Amended Ordinance No. 156 in Chapter One, Section 2 and Chapter Two, Part 3, Section 1.2(D) thereto is repealed.

WASHINGTON COUNTY DEVELOPMENT CODE AMENDMENT

WASHINGTON COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 156

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE WASHINGTON COUNTY DEVELOPMENT CODE REGULATING LAND USE IN WASHINGTON COUNTY.

The Board of Commissioners of Washington County ordains:

SECTION 1: Amend Chapter One, Administration, Section 2. Definitions by adding:

Farmstead: A group of buildings and adjacent service areas which support the functions of a farm. Structures may include but are not limited to homes, barns, machinery sheds, granaries, pump houses, chicken coops, and garages.

Hazardous Building or Hazardous Property: "Hazardous buildings or Hazardous property", means any building or property which because of inadequate maintenance, dilapidation, physical damage, unsanitary condition, or abandonment, constitutes a fire hazard or a hazard to public safety or health.

SECTION 2: Amend Chapter Two, Zoning Regulations, Part 3, Performance Standards, Section 1. Development Standards, 1.2 Accessory Structures (3) (D) to read:

Land may be subdivided with a minor subdivision into parcels of no less than 5 acres and retain the existing number and square footage of accessory structures on the site if they are part of the farmstead as existed on January 1, 2001 subject to the following conditions:

- There shall be no additional accessory buildings constructed on the property.
- B) If any existing accessory buildings become "Hazardous Buildings", they shall be repaired or removed by the owner.
- SECTION 3: The Zoning Administrator is hereby directed to change the Washington County Development Code in accordance with the foregoing amendment.
- SECTION 4 Effective Date. This ordinance shall be and is hereby declared to be in full force and effect after its passage and publication according to law.

Passed by the Board of County Commissioners of Washington County, Minnesota, this 20th day of March, 2001.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to send this issue back to the Planning Advisory Commission to discuss the major subdivisions. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford absent.

HUMAN RESOURCES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to modify the attraction/retention salary range for the classification of County Assessor/Appraisal Manager in the Department of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Child Protection Assessment Unit

Debbie Kenney, Intake-Assessment Unit Supervisor, presented a brief overview of the County's Child Protection Assessment Unit's ten-year collection of statistics. These statistics reflect a national decline in the number of referrals for child physical and sexual abuse and neglect. However, there is a tremendous increase in the number of child welfare cases accepted for the presenting issue of truancy. These figures can be explained by an increased education and public relations work that the truancy workers have done with schools and within the community. The Washington County schools are also doing a good job in identifying students who are in danger of being unsuccessful in school because of their attendance issues.

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Local Youth Plan

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to approve the Workforce Investment Act Local Youth Plan Update for the program year beginning April 1, 2001 to March 31, 2002. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

Commissioner Hegberg moved to send a letter to Representative Eric Lipman opposing House File No. 1587 which would require county, city and school elections to be conducted in November of off numbered years. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted 3-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Hegberg, Abrahamson and Pulkrabek; No, Commissioner Peterson; Commissioner Stafford absent.

Mr. Schug reported that this afternoon there would be a hearing on Washington County's bill requesting that a number of tax forfeited parcels that are on water bodies be approved for sale. Staff members will be testifying at that hearing.

Mr. Schug noted that the County has received a resolution adopted by Baytown Township that states that the township, in concert with the other townships in the County, would take over the responsibility for zoning and planning within townships. Staff has been researching this matter and has tentatively planned a workshop for April to bring the Board up-to-date on what that research indicates. He also asked that if the County Board was going to consider reducing or eliminating its role in zoning and planning in townships, would it be upon the request of all of the townships and not just one or two at a time?

Commissioner Abrahamson stated he would like to hear from all the townships and hold a workshop with the townships on this issue.

Mr. Schug stated that the workshop would focus on what the law is and what would have to be done to make a change. The second question is does the County even want to have a workshop until we hear from all or most of the townships about what their interests are?

Commissioner Hegberg stated the Board should have a workshop and then hear from the townships. He believes that all of the townships would have to agree before the County would take action to change its role.

Mr. Schug informed the Board that the City/County Utility Coalition has been working with Xcel Energy and have drafted legislation that would remove the real estate property taxes on the electric generating equipment in the utilities and replace it with payments to cities and towns and local units of government, to keep them whole. This would dramatically change how the taxes are computed on utilities and would have an effect on future siting of generation facilities. When he receives more information on the proposed legislation he will pass it on.

Mr. Schug reminded the Board that there would not be a Board meeting next Tuesday, March 27. The next meeting will be on April 3 at 4:30 p.m.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that Commissioner Stafford was having surgery this afternoon and wished him well.

Commissioner Abrahamson hoped there would be a good turnout at the Resource Recovery meeting on Thursday at the Oak Marsh Golf Course.

Commissioner Pulkrabek wished the Tartan boy's basketball team good luck today in the State Tournament. They are the defending champions in 4A. Also, Eric Crawford, one of Tartan's marquee players, is the son of Robert Crawford, the Workforce Center Division Manager.

Commissioner Peterson stated she would be testifying tomorrow on rail corridor approval by communities.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Hegberg and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford absent. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:40 a.m.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the contract between the County and Miller Excavating, Inc. Aggregate Industries, Inc. T.A. Schifsky & Sons, Commercial Asphalt Co., Tower Asphalt, Inc. and Bituminous Materials be executed through the signature of the Chairman of the Washington County Board of Commissioners and the Washington County Administrator without further action of the County Board conditioned upon contract execution by the vendors and approval as to form by the Washington County Attorney's Office.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

COMMUNITY VOLUNTEER SERVICE

2001 National Volunteer Recognition Week

Commissioner Stafford moved to approve the following proclamation:

Washington County Proclamation National Volunteer Week

WHEREAS, 2001 is the International Year of Volunteers in recognition of the global opportunity to make a difference by proclaiming the valuable contributions that volunteers make in every nation; and

WHEREAS, volunteers are vital to our future as a caring and productive nation; and

WHEREAS, volunteers can connect with local community service opportunities through hundreds of community service organizations such as Community Volunteer Service; and

WHEREAS, nationally more than 109 million adults representing 56% of the population and 13.3 million youths, ages 12-17, representing 59% of the youth population are contributing as volunteers to utilize their time and talent to make a positive impact in the lives of other children, adults and the elderly; and

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WHEREAS, Minnesota continues to exceed the national volunteer percentages, with 66% or over two million of its citizens volunteering to help build healthy, safe and clean communities; and

WHEREAS, Washington County Government received vital volunteer contributions from over 970 citizens, who participate in its many programs and services, saving the taxpayers thousands of dollars; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, the Washington County Board of Commissioners proclaims April 22-28, 2001 as National Volunteer Week in Washington County and urges all citizens to Change the World - Volunteer.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners recognizes and expresses its gratitude to the many volunteers who contribute their time and talents to enhance the quality of life in many ways throughout Washington County.

Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and was adopted unanimously.

Community Involvement Awards

Louise Jones, President of the Board of Directors of Community Volunteer Services, thanked the Commissioners for their dedication in honoring volunteers in Washington County. She stated that CVS is in its 34th year of volunteerism and has referred over 4,000 volunteers. Three awards will be given today to recognize outstanding volunteers, nominated for citizen involvement and service to their communities.

<u>Individual Award:</u> Barbara Bylander, Stillwater, is volunteer for many organizations, including the Neighborhood Service Exchange and the Stillwater Senior Community Center.

Youth Award: PLACE II - Ten Washington County youth on probation, have become regular visitors to "Circle of Friends," an adult day program.

<u>Lifetime Award</u>: Elaine Mitchell, South Washington County, is a lifelong volunteer in her community, including "Basic Needs Inc.," "Crop Walk," the Stone Soup Thrift Shop, Girl Scouts, her church, and many more organizations.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT / MINNESOTA EXTENSION

Association of Minnesota Counties 4-H community Leadership Awards

Chuck Leifeld, Minnesota Extension Educator, stated that Washington County had twenty-four 4-H Clubs participating in community services projects last year. He added that each year the Association of Minnesota Counties honors youth involved in community leadership projects and that two 4-H groups from Washington County were nominated.

Commissioner Pulkrabek presented an Honorable Mention award to the Woodbury 4-H Club for its "Bridging Generations" project that planned and conducted eight activities with the residents of an elderly care facility.

Also recognized for being nominated is the City Cousins 4-H Club of Cottage Grove. This group conducted two projects where they planned, prepared and served nutritious meals.

Commissioner Peterson thanked all the volunteers being recognized today for the important jobs they do in their communities.

FINANCIAL SERVICES

Refunding 1992A Series Bonds

Edison Vizuete, Financial Services Director, stated that the Finance Committee and the County's financial advisor, Springsted, Inc., have recommended that the County take advantage of current low interest rates and refinance the 1992A Series Bonds.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-036 as follows:

Resolution Authorizing a Process for the Refunding of the General Obligation Refunding Bonds Series 1992A

WHEREAS, the Washington County Finance Committee and the County's financial advisor recommend the refunding of the Series 1992 bonds as a means to reduce the County's future debt and to take advantage of current low interest rates.

WHEREAS, Springsted Inc., the County's financial advisor has advised the County that under current Federal law the 1992A Series Bonds refunded in 1999 can only be refunded after November 2001.

WHEREAS, alternative financing options such as a forward purchase contract with a fixed rate will provide savings of \$100,000 annually to the County.

WHEREAS, the County will benefit by entering a forward purchase contract, locking in the current interest rate for a forward sale on November 3, 2001.

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WHEREAS, the refunding of these bonds will provide a total estimated savings of \$829,229 future value or \$689,437 present value.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that to reduce annual debt service costs to the County, the Board authorizes the Finance Committee and the County Administrator to proceed with the following:

- (a) Authorize and request the County Attorney to recommend and contract for bond counsel.
- (b) Authorize Springsted and staff to develop a competitive process for the selection of underwriters.
- (c) Authorize the Finance Committee and the County Administrator to draft the criteria for a forward sale contract.
- (d) To have all legal and financial documentation prepared in order to attain new ratings for this refunding.
- (e) To have all documents for the refunding including official Board resolution, official statement, financial disclosure, etc. prepared.
- (f) To monitor the market and authorize Springsted to advise the County as to the best timing for the sale.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Finance Committee will inform the Board as to the progress of this refunding.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

ASSESSMENT, TAXPAYER SERVICES AND ELECIONS

Molly O'Rourke, Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections Director, presented the department's 2000 Annual Report. She indicated that some of the department's accomplishments for last year were: the processing of 100,000 citizen calls, reorganization of the department, addressing tax forfeiture items, securing Internet access to the tax system, 2000 primary and general elections which ran smoothly using a new system, the relocation and expansion of the Stillwater License Center, and the electronic licensing system.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

Seniors' Agenda for Independent Living Project (SAIL)

Richard Backman, Community Services Division Manager, introduced the two County staff employees who work on the SAIL project, Connie Waldera and Marcia Welinski.

Marcia Wielinski, Community Services Supervisor, gave a background of the SAIL project, which develops and coordinates cost-effective services in the community as an alternative to nursing home placement. Washington, Ramsey and Dakota Counties entered into this joint powers agreement in 1992 and the lead agency, which is responsible for fiscal management, rotates among the counties. Ms. Wielinski asked the Board to consider Ramsey County to be lead agency for the SAIL project beginning July 1, 2001.

Connie Waldera, Public Health and Environment Program Manager, discussed current projects they are involved in. These projects include the caregiver project, which focused on working with employers to raise awareness of issues faced by working caregivers. Another project they are focusing on is senior transportation to adult care. A report entitled "Building Toward the Senior Boom" was published and reports on the housing needs of the seniors through 2030. They are also looking at working with builders to get people to think and plan ahead and try to build homes or retrofit homes so they can stay in their home as they are aging. A preadmission screening project was initiated to simplify the process for people entering a nursing home. The last project Ms. Waldera mentioned was service coordination. This reduces the duplication of information, which in turn increases efficiency.

Commissioner Stafford asked to see more data showing that the program is working. Mr. Backman indicated that staff would submit more statistics to the Commissioners concerning SAIL.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to authorize Ramsey County to be the lead agency for the East Metro Seniors' Agenda for Independent Living (SAIL) Project. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Department of Human Services Waivered Services

Mr. Backman stated that the Department of Human Services has sent notification that it has approved placing everyone who is on the waiting list for waivered services on the waiver. This is a temporary policy change until the end of the state's current fiscal year, June 30, 2001. Community Services will be requesting a temporary part-time social worker to help contact people. Mr. Backman also stated that this would be a benefit to the County, since some of the people who will get on the waiver are people currently using County funds; this will free up some money for other County programs.

Commissioner Abrahamson indicated he supports the State's policy change to this program.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that since this is temporary, it is important to get all the people placed on the waiver who want it before the time limit lapses.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Brown's Creek Watershed Appointment

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to appoint Jerry Turnquist, Oak Park Heights, to the Brown's Creek Watershed District Board of Managers to fill an unexpired term to October 21, 2002. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Executive (Closed Session)

Jim Schug, County Administrator, indicated that the Executive Session, scheduled for today to discuss pending litigation against BFI, has been cancelled. BFI has sent notification that it intends to honor its 2001 contract.

Legislative Update

Mr. Schug gave an update to a recent workshop with the District Court held to discuss the State takeover of court costs which will bring all courts under State funding. The takeover for Washington County is scheduled for July of 2005.

Commissioner Stafford reported that the Metropolitan Radio Board is seeking legislation through the 911 fees to raise money for local governments to help them with the 800 MHz. He stated he would be contacting Representative Mares on behalf of the Counties belonging to the Metropolitan Radio Board.

Commissioner Peterson stated there is legislative authority to go to a certain amount and this is just a matter of increasing that amount. She does not believe that it is for any additional resources.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that he is concerned about legislation to legalize wine sales in supermarkets and how this will affect the many businesses that employ young people. He doesn't want the sale of alcohol in stores and is concerned if this bill passes.

Commissioner Peterson indicated that this bill has been withdrawn but will be brought back next year.

Mary McGlothlin, Public Health and Environment Director, stated that there are problems present with this legislation and that her department and law enforcement have expressed concerns. She added that responsibility for the enforcement of alcohol compliance checks is with the Sheriff's Department.

Mr. Schug added that the Minnesota Department of Public Safety has been looking at the issue also.

Commissioner Stafford reported on an issue that arose last year regarding a request from public safety people for Counties to support EMS on the tax base and Washington County said it didn't see that as a County problem. That group has gone statewide through the Minnesota Ambulance Association, which is seeking, and apparently is going to succeed in getting, legislation whereby the State would permit counties to levy for that. Commissioner Stafford stated he was concerned that this would switch the responsibility from the state to the county.

Mr. Schug announced that Dan Papin, Community Services Director, has been elected president of the Minnesota Social Services Association (MSSA).

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he would attend the Minnesota Extension meeting on Thursday, April 5 and the Farm Family of the Year Banquet. He also attended a Library Board meeting and one of the subjects discussed was whether federal laws on pornography pertain to counties. Library staff is looking at implementing new procedures to curtail this type of activity in our libraries.

Commissioner Peterson announced that this is National Library Week.

Commissioner Hegberg reported he has been at the State legislature for discussions on RDF as a renewable resource and that this issue should be brought to the federal level.

Commissioner Peterson stated that the Joint Powers Board would have a regional rail and transit strategy session Monday, April 9 in State Capitol Room 316.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Peterson and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 7:00 p.m.

COMMUNITY SERVICES – WORKFORCE CENTER DIVISION

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to approve the Workforce Investment Act Adult and Dislocated Worker Programs and Senior Community Services Employment Program Plan update for program year July 1, 2001 through June 30, 2002. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he voted for this item, but he does not support the Senior Community Services Employment Program for nine low-income seniors. He does support the other portion of this program, but they have now combined the two programs into one, so he cannot vote against one program without voting against the other program.

COURT SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to approve the 2001 contract between Dakota County and Washington County for provision of secure juvenile detention bed services. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

HUMAN RESORUCES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Stafford moved to approve a County Cellular Phone Policy to authorize the use and assignment of County leased/purchased cellular phones or a cellular phone allowance to eligible employees for service delivery to County citizens. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

ASSESSMENT, TAXPAYER SERVICES AND ELECTIONS

Commissioner Stafford moved to set a public hearing for April 24, 2001, 9:00 a.m. for the detachment and annexation of parcel #03.028.21.33.0073 per MN Statute 123A.45. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Purchase of Development Rights Acquisition

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2001-039** as follows:

Resolution Authorizing Expenditure of Funds to Acquire a Conservation Easement on the Doerr Property

WHEREAS, Washington County is authorized to purchase development rights in the form of conservation easements under MINN. STAT. CHAPT. 84C in areas where preservation is considered to be desirable; and

WHEREAS, Washington County is authorized to acquire the development rights in the form of conservation easements through capital improvement funds pursuant to MINN. STAT. 373.40; and

WHEREAS, the 1999 Minnesota Legislature through, the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources, has provided Washington County with a \$150,000 cost-sharing grant to acquire property interests in fee or less than fee to protect lands within the Washington County Green Corridor Opportunity Area where preservation is considered to be desirable; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has adopted a match of \$150,000 of capital improvement funds to acquire property interests in fee or less than fee to protect lands within the Washington County Green Corridor Opportunity Area where preservation is considered to be desirable; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has solicited, evaluated and ranked land protection proposals according to an adopted Purchase of Development Rights Ordinance and an approved Policies and Procedures Document; and

WHEREAS, the Purchase of Development Rights Advisory Committee recommended that the Doerr parcel in the City of Woodbury, Property Identification Number R12.028.21.42.0001, be protected through the PDR PROGRAM.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the expenditure of \$110,000 to acquire a conservation easement on the Doerr property; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Board Chair and the County Administrator be authorized to execute all necessary documents related to this expenditure.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, updated the Board on the following legislative items: The County's drop list legislation continues to move forward despite regular concerns and opposition by lobbying groups; and last Friday he attended a meeting with other County Administrators and the Metropolitan Inter-County Association and they discussed a number of things that are going on in the tax committee that would shift certain costs to the State, but the tradeoff is the State is looking for a reduction in home and agricultural credit aid. The MICA counties are taking a look at what the impact would be to counties.

Commissioner Peterson discussed transportation legislation and the transfer of Minnesota Vehicle Excise Tax (MVET) funds. She hopes that if there is ballot question that the Board would be supportive of a 100% transfer of MVET funds rather than 50%. This will be discussed further at next week's Board meeting.

Commissioner Peterson stated that yesterday was "Rail Day" at the Capitol. She was surprised at the turnout. Approximately 250 people attended. Commuter rail people lobbied for funding, Red Rock Corridor asked for \$4 million, the Rush Line Corridor is asking for \$5 million and the North Star Corridor needs a minimum of \$10 million. There was great support from citizens, businesses and government.

Updates

Mr. Schug distributed to the Board a letter from the Minnesota Secretary of State with a timeline for redistricting, information on where to access more information on redistricting and an Attorney General's opinion about the need for special elections following redistricting. He stated that a team within the County would be formed to manage this process.

Mr. Schug informed the Board that a workshop has been scheduled for April 17 to discuss the County's role in planning and zoning and the townships. All of the townships will be invited to attend that workshop.

Mr. Schug stated that following today's Board meeting, there would be a meeting with the Commissioner of Human Services, Michael O'Keefe.

Commissioner Peterson presented County Administrator Jim Schug with a Certificate of Recognition for his 15 years of service with Washington County. The Board congratulated Mr. Schug for his many years of service.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Stafford stated he would be speaking at the Association of Metropolitan County Officers tomorrow to discuss how it has been for him to go from an Auditor-Treasurer type environment into a County Commissioner environment. He will also be meeting with Representative Mares this afternoon regarding the 800 MHz and will miss the workshop on County space usage.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported that he attended the Minnesota Extension Committee last week along with Commissioner Hegberg. A lot of discussion took place on the performance measurement outcome process. He also attended the Farm Family of the Year Banquet that was held at Tartan Park. The Biscoe family and Bergmann family were the recipients of those two awards.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that the Insurance Trust bylaws committee discussed health plans and they are looking at HRA's and Economic Development areas that are changing throughout the State of Minnesota. The Internal Audit Committee also met last week.

Commissioner Abrahamson reported that the Board received a letter from Richard Stehr regarding the Highway 36 and the St. Croix River Crossing. He also reported that the St. Croix River is rising, but everything is under control so far.

Commissioner Peterson informed the Board that Jeff Travis is putting together a good program for cutting waste in the County. She challenges the Commissioners to come up with ways to cut waste as part of the County.

A citizen has asked Commissioner Peterson when the County will have another day for the collection of old computers, TV's, VCR's and other items that cannot be brought to the Resource Recovery Facility. Mr. Schug stated the past event was a special project with a couple of manufacturers. No other mass turn-in days have been scheduled.

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:00 a.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Hegberg, Abrahamson, Peterson, Pulkrabek and Stafford. Absent none. Board Chair Peterson presided. Also present were James Schug, County Administrator; Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; George Kuprian, Senior Assistant County Attorney; Doug Johnson, County Attorney; Russ Reetz, Court Services Director; Mary McGlothlin, Director of Public Health and Environment; Lowell Johnson, Senior Program Manager; Judy Honmyhr, Human Resources Director; Doug Fischer, Deputy Director of Transportation and Physical Development; and Bev Hagen, Public Information Coordinator.

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

The Board Chair asked for comments from the public; none were heard.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved, seconded by Commissioner Abrahamson to adopt the following Consent Calendar:

Convey Everton Avenue North Right of Way to the City of Forest Lake

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-042 as follows:

Resolution to Convey Everton Avenue North Right of Way to the City of Forest Lake and Create Access Opening on CSAH 2

WHEREAS, the north leg of the Everton Avenue North intersection with CSAH 2 was constructed in 1998 as part of the reconstruction of CSAH 2 (SAP 82-602-11) in the City of Forest Lake; and

WHEREAS, the right of way for said north leg of Everton Avenue North was acquired in fee title; and

WHEREAS, access control was acquired on the adjacent property northwest of the Everton/CSAH 2 intersection; and

Assessment outside a

WHEREAS, development has been proposed to the City of Forest Lake which would close the existing north leg of the Everton Avenue/CSAH 2 intersection and relocate it approximately 300 feet to the northwest of its present location; and

WHEREAS, the existing right of way for said north leg of Everton Avenue North will no longer be needed by the County and the City of Forest Lake has requested that the County convey that land to the City; and

WHEREAS, construction of the proposed Everton Avenue North requires an access opening in access controlled frontage.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the County Administrator and the County Board Chairperson to convey to the City of Forest Lake the property described as follows:

That part of the NE¼ of the NW¼ of Section 7, Township 32 North, Range 21 West, Washington County, Minnesota, described as follows:

All that part of Parcel 1 of Washington County Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105 that lies northerly and easterly of the following described line: Beginning at boundary marker B1, as shown on said Plat No. 105; thence South 39 degrees 37 minutes 22 seconds East to the easterly line of said Parcel 1, and said line there terminating.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the above described conveyance to the City of Forest Lake is contingent upon the City's vacating to Washington County by Quit Claim Deed the access opening for the existing north intersection of Everton Avenue described as follows:

Beginning at Boundary Marker B1 as shown on Washington County Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105; thence South 39 degrees 37 minutes 22 seconds East to the easterly line of said Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105 and said access opening there ending. Said access opening is located within the NE¼ of the NW¼ of Section 7, Township 32 North, Range 21 West, Washington County, Minnesota.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an access opening in the access controlled right of way of CSAH 2 be created as follows:

Commencing at Boundary Marker B1, as shown on Washington County Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105; thence North 39 degrees 37 minutes 22 seconds West along the northerly right of way of CSAH 2, a distance of 87.19 feet to the point of beginning of the access opening; thence continuing North 39 degrees 37 minutes 22 seconds West along said northerly right of way line, a distance of 143.11 feet to the termination point of the access opening.

NOW, THEREFOR BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Director of the Washington County Department of Transportation and Physical Development is hereby authorized to issue a temporary access permit for ingress and egress to the site of the proposed Forest Lake Shopping Center.

Said temporary access will terminate on September 30, 2001 if construction has not begun. In no case will temporary access be allowed after June 30, 2002.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that existing snow fence and sign easement on northerly line of this property shall be extinguished by the recording of this resolution. The relinquishing of any easement rights shall be contingent upon the plat of Forest Lake Shopping Center containing a 10-foot wide drainage and utility easement along said northerly line of the property, between said Point B1 and point B106 of said Right of Way Plat 105. If the plat of Forest Lake Shopping Center does not contain said drainage and utility easement, all existing easement rights shall be retained by the County. The legal description of the snow fence and sign easement is as follows:

That part of the South 330.00 feet of the Southeast 4 of Section 6, Township 32 North, Range 21 West, Washington County, Minnesota, lying easterly of the center line of County State Aid Highway No. 2 (also known as Ethan Road North).

And

That part of the Northeast 1/4 of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 7, Township 32 North, Range 21 West, Washington County, Minnesota, described as follows:

Beginning at the North Quarter corner of Section 7; thence West, along the North line of said Section 7, a distance of 808.2 feet, more or less, to the center line of County State Aid Highway No. 2, thence Southeasterly, along said center line, a distance of 1,278 feet, more or less, to the North-South Quarter line of Section 7; thence Northerly along said Quarter line, a distance of 1,011 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning;

EXCEPTING therefrom that part of Parcel 1, Washington County Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105, Washington County, Minnesota. Lying Southwesterly of a line passing through "Point B106" and "Point B1" as shown on said right of way plat, and extending Southeasterly to the East line of said Parcel No. 1 and there terminating.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all access rights hereby granted by the foregoing will be extinguished if the Planned Unit Development and all associated Development Agreements are not in place by September 30, 2001.

Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Transfer of Special Reserve Fund of the Gravel Tax to the Road and Bridge Account

Doug Fischer, Deputy Transportation and Physical Development Director, informed the Board that the County does collect a gravel tax. Sixty percent goes to Washington County for its Road and Bridge account for improvements to the highway system. Thirty percent goes to towns and cities for their infrastructure improvements and ten percent goes into a special reserve fund. This special reserve fund was established in the event that there are any public or tax forfeited properties that had former pits that need to be reclaimed.

This money would go towards the restoration of those abandoned pits on tax-forfeited property or on public property. Mr. Fischer indicated there are no tax forfeited abandoned pits on public lands or tax forfeited properties in Washington County. State statute provides that in that event the County is allowed to transfer money from that account into the regular Road and Bridge Account for highway infrastructure. Staff is asking that \$250,000 of the \$285,000 special reserve fund be transferred to the County Road and Bridge Account for the following County Highway pavement preservation projects: CSAH 12–Ideal to TH 244 (Mill and resurface); CSAH 28-CSAH 21 to CSAH 14 (Reconstruct pavement, curbs, drainage); and CSAH 16-Correct slope failure near Jewel Drive.

Mr. Fischer stated that the State Legislature has proposed new legislation amending the current gravel tax statute. The ability to transfer the special reserve may not be possible in the future and these funds would be extended to include privately owned pits, quarries or deposits as well.

Commissioner Hegberg believes the Board should discuss this matter further regarding the proposed legislation. He does support certain parts of this legislation. He also asked how the audit was progressing on the gravel pits.

James Schug, County Administrator, stated they have been planning for an audit. Now that there is a Deputy Administrator in place that will be one of the things she will be working on.

Commissioner Pulkrabek is concerned that the Board is basing its action on what may happen during the legislative session. If this bill does pass it wouldn't take effect until August. He is also concerned that money is being taken that is set aside for a specific purpose and what happens if one of these pits is abandoned there is no money left in this fund to take care of that situation?

Mr. Fischer stated this money had been used for restoration in May Township along Highway 55. The fund was used for finishing touches and was not very expensive at all. Money has been transferred out of this fund twice before.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he would feel more comfortable if half of the money was left in the fund.

Commissioner Stafford believed that the original use of the gravel tax was for repair of roads that gravel trucks used and damaged. Can this money be used for other things rather than fixing those damaged roads? Mr. Fischer stated that the 60% does go into the Road and Bridge Account. The point of discussion here is that 10% of the gravel tax goes towards pit restoration.

Commissioner Stafford stated that the portion of the proposed legislation that would allow restoration funds to be used for privately owned pits bothers him. If a private operator taps out the pit and walks away from it, it might take three to five years to get that forfeited at which time it would be legitimate for the

government to restore it. Up until that time he wonders if the County shouldn't pursue restoration and put a lien against that property.

Commissioner Hegberg stated the County is adequately covered through its regulations of gravel pits. He is more concerned about the rights of the gravel pit operators to continue to function because every time they want to expand their pit there is resistance by the residents who live around those pits. He wonders if this law wouldn't have something in there that allows that, otherwise the pit owners would be lobbying very extensively against this legislation. He feels there's something in the bill that the County does not know about.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to authorize the Director of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections to transfer \$250,000 from the special reserve fund of the gravel tax to the Road and Bridge Account for County Road maintenance and pavement preservation projects. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes: Commissioners Hegberg, Abrahamson, Peterson and Stafford; No: Commissioner Pulkrabek.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to purse legislative action regarding the private mines.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he does not want to do something until he understands what this bill entails, who is the author in the Senate and where they are coming from on their including private owners. He feels with his limited knowledge of the bill he would not support including the privately owned.

Commissioner Abrahamson withdrew his motion. He would like more information on this bill.

Commissioner Stafford asked that the County Administrator and the County's legislative liaison report on this bill at next week's Board meeting.

Commissioner Hegberg asked that staff also report on what types of bonds the County requires of pit operators for restoration.

Commissioner Peterson would also like to know the cities' position on this bill.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Introduction of New Deputy Administrator

Mr. Schug introduced Molly O'Rourke as the new County Deputy Administrator. Ms. O'Rourke has been with the County since 1995, first as Assistant Auditor-Treasurer under Mr. Stafford and later she became the director of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections.

Ms. O'Rourke stated she is very excited to have this opportunity and realizes there are lots of challenges ahead and will do her best to live up to the Board's expectation and that of the County's.

Appointment of County Auditor-Treasurer

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-043 as follows:

Resolution to Appoint Washington County Deputy Administrator Molly F. O'Rourke as the County Auditor-Treasurer

WHEREAS, the 1997 Minnesota Legislature enacted 1997 Minnesota Laws Chapter 153 which is special legislation investing the Washington County Board of Commissioners with the authority to discharge the statutory duties of the offices of County Recorder and County Auditor-Treasurer through department heads appointed by the Board for these purposes; and

WHEREAS, 1997 Minnesota Laws Chapter 153, requires the County Board to appoint a County Auditor-Treasurer as a department head to act for it in the discharge of the duties of the County Auditor-Treasurer; and,

WHEREAS, the Office of Auditor-Treasurer has become vacant with the retirement of Auditor-Treasurer Virginia Erdahl; and,

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners, at its meeting of May 19, 1998, adopted a new organizational structure under which the County's Deputy Administrator has the overall responsibility for the statutory duties of the Office of Auditor-Treasurer; and,

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners in their Resolution 97-131 set forth the manner in which the department head shall be appointed; and

WHEREAS, Molly F. O'Rourke has been appointed as the Deputy County Administrator effective April 16, 2001.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Administrator hereby appoints the Deputy Administrator, Molly F. O'Rourke, as the County Auditor-Treasurer and the County Board of Commissioners hereby consents to this appointment.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the appointed Auditor-Treasurer shall discharge the statutory duties of these offices effective April 17, 2001.

Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Comments on Forest Lake Tax Increment Financing District

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve the County's comments on Forest Lake Tax Increment Financing budgeted modifications for Districts No. 2-1 and 1-2. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Pulkrabek left the meeting at 10:00 a.m.

State of Emergency in Washington County

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-044 as follows:

Washington County Declares a State of Emergency

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statute Chapter 12.29 establishes authority for local governments to declare a local emergency in order to invoke necessary portions of the response and recovery aspects of local or interjurisdictional disaster plans; and

WHEREAS, flooding conditions on the St. Croix River and Mississippi River have caused local units of government to implement protective measures for public health and safety of their citizens; and

WHEREAS, flood crests are expected to occur on or about April 20 or 21, 2001, which may endanger lives and property of Washington County citizens.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners does hereby declare a state of emergency to exist in Washington County, and that the Washington County Emergency Operations Plan be activated and that emergency personnel and related resources be used to respond to the flooding conditions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Emergency Management Program of the Department of Public Health and Environment, in coordination with the Minnesota Division of Emergency Management shall proceed with preparation of a request for a Presidential Disaster Declaration for future Board Action to assist communities impacted by river flooding to recover from these losses.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

Legislative Update

Mr. Schug distributed a draft letter to the federal legislative delegation regarding the designation of refusederived fuel (RDF) as a renewable resource that then makes it eligible for certain special considerations in the state and federal system.

Commissioner Hegberg moved that a letter be sent to the federal legislative delegation asking that they consider designating refuse-derived fuel as a renewable resource and that all the Commissioners would sign this letter. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

Commissioner Peterson asked that the County's State legislative delegation be copied on this letter along with the Association of Minnesota Counties, Ramsey County and the press.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-045 as follows:

Support Legislative Action to Increase State Transportation Funding

WHEREAS, the transportation system remains a key engine of the State's economy, getting people and goods where they need to be; and

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota is facing increasing congestion and increasing concern on the part of the public regarding the adequacy of the transportation system; and

WHEREAS, the transportation industry is a valuable Minnesota industry employing thousands of people and generating millions of dollars in revenue; and

WHEREAS, businesses rely on roadways and transit services to get employees to work; and

WHEREAS, current funding is not keeping pace with the need. The State's 20 cent gas tax is now worth 13.2 cents when adjusted for inflation and license tab fees have been reduced; and

WHEREAS, studies indicate that a minimum investment of \$1 billion per year over the next ten years is necessary to address increasing demands on both the highway and transit systems.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners urges the State to increase funding levels for state highways, local roads and public transit services around the State for FY2002 and FY 2003; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we urge the legislature to propose a ballot initiative constitutionally dedicating 100% of the revenue from the sales tax on motor vehicles to transportation to ensure a reliable transportation system into the future.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

Commissioner Peterson asked that this resolution also be sent to the press.

Commissioner Peterson asked that the City of Stillwater give the County Board an update on what they are doing regarding the Stillwater Bridge. She has received a number of phone calls from citizens of Stillwater regarding the bridge.

Commissioner Abrahamson suggested that if the City of Stillwater is invited to talk about the bridge, they should also invite the Cities of Bayport and Oak Park Heights.

Commissioner Peterson suggested copying the Wisconsin Department of Transportation regarding the County's support for the St. Croix River Bridge crossing.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Andrew Goiffon, 8124 147th Street North, Hugo – Mr. Goiffon reported that he attended the last Rice Creek Watershed District meeting. COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Stafford asked for clarification on the contract with the Housing and Redevelopment Authority for services of the Housing Coordinator position to see what services the County receives for \$45,000.

Dan Papin, Community Services Director, reported that last year 518 residents received services. This service includes helping them access what is out there and many are able to access resources with very little assistance. There were 315 residents that required more interaction in terms of packets and actually guiding them to resources that they might need. Then there is a group of residents who need more intensive services, including individuals with disabilities, etc.

Commissioner Stafford moved to approve a contract between the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority and the Washington County Community Services for the services of the Housing Coordinator position. Commissioners Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted 3-1 with the vote as follows: Yes: Commissioner Abrahamson, Peterson and Stafford; No. Commissioner Pulkrabek; Commissioner Hegberg abstained.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated the problem he has with this position is that it doesn't provide any money toward affordable housing. He is more inclined to support programming and positions that actually put dollars where they are going to help people directly. This is merely steering people to different agencies, talking to them on the phone and directing them to other government agencies.

PUBLIC HEARING - ASSESSMENT, TAXPAYER SERVICES AND ELECTIONS

School District Detachment and Annexation

The Board Chair presented an overview of today's public hearing to consider a petition by Steven and MariDee Wittl requesting a detachment of their property from Independent School District 622 and annexation to Independent School District 834.

The Board Secretary read the notice of public hearing into the record.

Molly O'Rourke, Auditor-Treasurer, informed the Board that the Wittl property at 1011 Interlachen Parkway spans two school district boundaries. At the time the property was platted there was no home built on it and the majority of the value resided in School District 622 and that is where the County put the property for taxation purposes. The house was later built so that the majority of the value switched to School District 834. When the Wittls bought the property they understood that the property was in school district 834. Their home fronts into school district 834, they are on a cul-de-sac and all their neighbor's children also go to School District 834. Both School Districts 834 and 622 concur with this detachment and annexation and letters from both School Districts were provided for the record. It is the recommendation of the Auditor-Treasurer's Office that the County Board approve this petition.

The Board Chair asked if the Petitioners wished to make any comments. They did not.

The Board Chair asked if any representatives from the affected School Districts wished to make any comments. None were heard.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the public. None were heard.

The Board Secretary indicated that all documentary evidence was placed on file and the Board Chair closed the public hearing and opened the matter for discussion and comment from the County Board.

Commissioner Stafford moved to approve the following Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law and Order of Detachment and Annexation:

This matter came on for public hearing before the Washington County Board of Commissioner on this 24th day of April, 2001 on the Petition of Steven and MariDee Wittl requesting a detachment of their property from Independent School District (ISD) 622 and annexation to Independent School District (ISD) 834. Having heard from the Petitioners and the affected School Districts and being otherwise advised in the premises, the Washington County Board of Commissioners

FINDS:

- 1. Petitioners Steven and MariDee Wittl are the owners of real property located at 1011 Interlachen Parkway, Woodbury, Minnesota.
- 2. The tax identification of said parcel is R03.028.21.33.0073.
- 3. The legal description of said parcel is Lake Iverness, Block-006, Estates Lot-010, Woodbury.
- 4. Said parcel is within the boundary of Independent School District 622 and adjacent to the boundary of Independent School District 834.
- 5. The Wittl's wish to detach their parcel from School District 622 and annex it to School District 834.
- 6. Said parcel is bisected by the school district boundary line between Independent School Districts 622 and 834.
- 7. The Wittl's property lies in a cul-de-sac where the other homes are all part of School District 834.
- 8. Because the Wittl's home is the only one in the cul-de-sac that is assigned to School District 622, the Wittl family experiences problems with school transportation, voting and participation in athletic associations. Moreover, the other children in the neighborhood attend school in District 834.
- 9. By resolution passed on February 27, 2001, the School Board of Independent School District 622 approved the detachment of the property of Steven and MariDee Wittl located at 1011 Interlachen Parkway, Woodbury, Minnesota from the School District.
- 10. On March 8, 2001, Board of Education of the Stillwater Area Public Schools, District 834 acted to accept the property of Steven and MariDee Wittl located at 1011 Interlachen Parkway, Woodbury, Minnesota into District 834.
- 11. The property described in the Petition is not included in any plat for consolidation or combination which has been approved by the Commissioner of Children, Families and Learning.

CONCLUDES:

- 1. The Washington County Board of Commissioners has jurisdiction under Minn. Stat. §123A.45 to order the subject property to be detached from ISD 622 and annexed to ISD 834.
- 2. Proper notice of this public hearing was given as required by Minn. Stat. §123A.45 Subd. 3.

ORDER

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Washington County Board of Commissioners that the property located at 1011 Interlachen Parkway, Woodbury, Minnesota be detached from Independent School District 622 and annexed to Independent School District 834, effective immediately.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

James Luger, Parks Director, introduced Carolyn Phelps as the new Historic Courthouse Coordinator. Ms. Phelps thanked the Board for the opportunity to work at the Historic Courthouse. She stated the staff is dedicated and the volunteers love the building and grounds. She invited the Board members to attend a new exhibit opening May 20 entitled "Begonias, Berries and Beans – "Horticulture in Washington County". There will also be a groundbreaking ceremony for the new gardens.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

John Kaul, Legislative Liaison, presented an update on the following County initiatives: Drop list is in the Senate Omnibus data practices bill and in good shape, he believes it is in the House bill as well; Regional Bonding for park candidate sites probably will not happen this year; Tax-forfeited land language is in good shape in Omnibus bills in both the House and the Senate; He believes there will be substantial funding for

Crimnet; Transportation bills are just starting to take shape right now—The Senate has 50% dedication of the MVET, 32% to offset the tab reductions and 18% for transit. A one time spending of \$300 million on everything from trunk highways to video cameras for patrol cars is being proposed; There is a three cent gas tax that is indexed to inflation and a provision in the bill for a ½ cent sales tax referendum in the metropolitan area for transportation; The House transportation bill is tough on commuter rail; Substantial progress has been made in solid waste in the Senate, there is a \$10 per ton provision for the County in the Senate Omnibus bill, \$5 of that would go toward reducing the tipping fee and the other \$5 would be used at the discretion of the County and could be used to lower the tipping fee further or to reduce debt on the facility or operating costs; The House version is not finished yet, he hopes to know more this afternoon; There is \$12 million in general funds for parks; The LCMR recommendations are pretty much the way the County wants them, there is a total of \$5.6 million available; There is an impasse on the PERA issue; The bill that would put local elections off to the even numbered year is pretty close to being dead.

Commissioner Stafford asked that the issue of school boundaries be looked at during next year's legislative session.

Commissioner Abrahamson hoped that if money is made available it be put towards the Kelly Farm and the Big Marine Park.

Commissioner Peterson stated that the purchase of the Kelly Farm and preservation of that parcel of land is a key issue for PDR. It is also the headwaters to a lot of the County's watersheds. It is a piece of property that the County needs to look at preserving.

Jim Schug, County Administrator, advised the Board that he distributed a memo from Doug Fischer, Deputy Director of Transportation and Physical Development, regarding the gravel tax legislation that was discussed at last week's meeting.

St. Croix River Crossing Update

Ted Thompson, representing the City of Stillwater, updated the Board on the status of the St. Croix River Crossing. He stated that the bridge is on hold with a final date of June 1 being a drop dead date if movement is not made on outstanding issues regarding the new bridge. There are three primary issues: 1) City of Oak Park Heights needs to come to an agreement with MN/DOT on the Highway 36 improvements; 2) The current lift bridge and its status is a major issue. The Federal Department of the Interior has offered three alternatives for the building of a new bridge, remove the lift bridge, turn the lift bridge into a pier and put \$10 million into a conservation fund, or allow the lift bridge to remain in place, but in order to leave it in place a \$15 million conservation fund needs to be established; and 3) The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has stated that if the two states proceed with building a new bridge under the plan that the lift bridge is saved, they will not approve permits for the building of the new bridge unless the old bridge is moved or turned into a pier.

Tom Melena, City of Oak Park Heights Administrator, distributed a letter that the City sent to the Minnesota Commissioner of Transportation detailing the city's position on the bridge. The City sees a project that is being stalled and downsized at the price of Oak Park Heights. Sixty-eight properties have already been acquired by the Department of Transportation and they also have tried to work with the Minnesota Department of Transportation on the design of the project. They are in support of the bridge, they are in support of the system, but they do not want to make a bad situation even worse by dumping all of this traffic into an already inadequate traffic system.

COUNTY GOVERNMENT WEEK

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adopt the following proclamation:

Gerald Beedle, Lake St. Croix Beach, commented from the audience that the St. Croix River is expecting the second crest soon. They need people to walk the dikes and more sandbags. He stated there is misinformation out there that they do not need any help—they do.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Abrahamson and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:45 a.m.

AND WHEREAS, a resolution superceding Resolution No. 2001-042 is necessary in order to insure the resolution is properly recorded.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the County Administrator and the County Board Chairperson to convey to the City of Forest Lake the property described as follows:

That part of the NE¼ of the NW¼ of Section 7, Township 32 North, Range 21 West, Washington County, Minnesota, described as follows:

All that part of Parcel 1 of Washington County Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105 that lies northerly and easterly of the following described line: Beginning at boundary marker B1, as shown on said Plat No. 105; thence South 39 degrees 37 minutes 22 seconds East to the easterly line of said Parcel 1, and said line there terminating.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the above described conveyance to the City of Forest Lake is contingent upon the City's vacating to Washington County by Quit Claim Deed the access opening for the existing north intersection of Everton Avenue North described as follows:

Beginning at Boundary Marker B1 as shown on Washington County Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105; thence South 39 degrees 37 minutes 22 seconds East to the easterly line of said Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105 and said access opening there ending. Said access opening is located within the NE¼ of the NW¼ of Section 7, Township 32 North, Range 21 West, Washington County, Minnesota.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an access opening in the access controlled right of way of CSAH 2 be created as follows:

Commencing at Boundary Marker B1, as shown on Washington County Highway Right of Way Plat No. 105; thence North 39 degrees 37 minutes 22 seconds West along the northerly right of way of CSAH 2, a distance of 87.19 feet to the point of beginning of the access opening; thence continuing North 39 degrees 37 minutes 22 seconds West along said northerly right of way line, a distance of 143.11 feet to the termination point of the access opening.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Director of the Washington County Department of Transportation and Physical Development is hereby authorized to issue a temporary access permit for ingress and egress to the site of the proposed Forest Lake Shopping Center. Said temporary access will terminate on September 30, 2001 if construction has not begun. In no case will temporary access be allowed after June 30, 2002.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that existing snow fence easements and sign restrictions on the following described property shall be extinguished by the recording of this resolution. The relinquishing of any easement rights shall be contingent upon the plat of Forest Lake Shopping Center containing a 10-foot wide drainage and utility easement along said southwesterly line of the property described below, between said Point B1 and Point B106 of said Right of Way Plat 105. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all access rights hereby granted by the foregoing will be extinguished if the Planned Unit Development and all associated Development Agreements are not in place by September 30, 2001.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution rescinds and supercedes Resolution No. 2001-042, dated April 17, 2001.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The St. Mary's Catholic Church 2001 Confirmation Class presented the County Board with suitcases to be used for foster children and teens in Washington County. This community project collected 30 suitcases including hygiene essentials and other personal items.

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PUBLIC HEARING - OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATION

Revised Washington County Consolidated Plan for the HUD CDBG and HOME Programs, Annual Action Plan for 2001 and Proposed CDBG/HOME Projects for 2001

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of today's public hearing to consider the revised Washington County Consolidated Plan for the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Programs, Annual Action Plan for 2001 and the proposed CDBG/HOME projects for 2001.

Martina Johntz, Grants Coordinator/Assistant Planner, presented a brief explanation of the proposal and contents of the Washington County Consolidated Plan (Exhibit 6). The Consolidated Plan was developed with input from various sources including organizations and agencies that work with low and moderate income residents, cities and townships that participate in the CDBG and HOME Programs, and Washington County citizens. Also, two recently completed countywide studies have been incorporated into the Consolidated Plan—A housing needs market study and a continuum of care plan, a homeless needs assessment. These resources were used to identify the housing priorities and community development priorities that will guide the use of CDBG and HOME funds over the next four years.

Ms. Johntz stated that proposed projects for 2001 are included in the annual action plan. CDBG funding will be provided to eight sub-recipients for projects that include: Infrastructure for affordable housing; land acquisition for affordable senior housing; land and building acquisition for a day care facility that will serve low-income families; park improvements in parks serving low-income neighborhoods; handicap accessibility for a city hall; kitchen rehabilitation for a senior housing facility; and planning and capacity building. She noted that Washington County will retain CDBG funds for housing services and housing services staff and for program planning administration and monitoring. Also included in the action plan are proposed projects for home funding, including construction of new affordable housing; home ownership assistance; community housing development organization projects; and planning, administration and monitoring.

Ms. Johntz informed the Board that the Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan have been available for viewing at the County Libraries or on the Washington County website. Comments will be accepted through Wednesday, May 9 at 5:00 p.m. After the Board takes final action at next week's Board meeting, the Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan will be submitted to HUD on May 17, 2001.

Deborah Lyzenga, Lake Elmo, Cimarron Community Coalition, Treasurer. Ms. Lyzenga stated that the Consolidated Plan accurately identifies the various factors contributing to the extreme shortage of what is commonly referred to as affordable housing. She does not feel there is a vigorous enough remedy to the cultural and economic biases that have created this problem. She believes that it is not dollars that are needed to reverse the housing crisis, but rather a shift in public policies and agendas with respect to appropriate land use. One of her great fears is that one day Cimarron will be sold for a more lucrative development, thereby dislocating approximately 500 families. There are no present policies in place that would prevent this loss of very affordable housing. She suggests that consideration be given to the perpetual preservation of housing communities such as Cimarron as well as incentives to develop new manufactured housing communities. (Ms. Lyzenga's full written comments were marked as Exhibit No. 7 and placed on the record).

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the audience; none were heard.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that Ms. Lyzenga did a wonderful job of expressing her thoughts and indicated he would like a copy of her statement. He hopes that she sends a letter to Metropolitan Council, the Governor and others who are trying to cut back on transportation.

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Commissioner Pulkrabek proposed that the Housing Services Social Worker for \$50,000, the Housing Services Support Staff for \$25,000 and the Wrap-Around Services for \$81,150 be removed from the plan. He would like to take that money and put it into direct assistance to some of the projects that were not funded fully or weren't funded at all. The projects he would like to see funded with this money would be increased funding for the Raymie Johnson kitchen improvements; increased funding for the Tot Lot Rehab at Landfall; and funding for the Housing Rehab program in Stillwater that was approved but is receiving no funds. He would rather see the money that's proposed to be utilized for the two positions and the Wrap-Around Service be spent directly at the local level.

Commissioner Stafford asked if the money could be reallocated now or would the Board have to hold another public hearing? Ms. Johntz indicated that those funds could be carried over to next year and be reallocated through a competitive process as was suggested. They could not be used next year for public service type activities, but the physical building activities they could be used for. Or, that change could be made by next week and used this year.

Commissioner Stafford stated he is leaning towards what Commissioner Pulkrabek is saying but would like more information from Community Services before the next Board meeting.

James Schug, County Administrator, stated that when the guidelines were established for the program, the Board talked about how to allocate the funds. A planned decision was made by the Board to allocate 65% to local communities to use for eligible programs and those are reflected in the plan. Another 15% was allocated for services and that is the part of the program that the Community Services department applied for funds and it is up to the Board to decide whether or not that should be included in the final plan. Up to 10% would be reserved for administration, planning and program monitoring to make sure that the funds are spent the way they are suppose to be spent. Finally, 10% to be made available in a competitive grant for any jurisdiction that's participating in the program or for the County to submit a proposal that could be considered.

Commissioner Peterson stated that with the start of the housing position the County has been able to access State money for housing. Without that position, the County was not able to access it and in fact lost funding in 1999.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated he can support a couple of things that Commissioner Pulkrabek is talking about, but one thing he cannot support and will not support is elimination of the housing service social worker. He feels that is something that should be in place and is important.

Dan Papin, Community Services Director, thanked Ms. Lyzenga for her comments. He stated that she is not a customer of theirs. She is independent and gets things done. Their clients and customers are people who have troubles including any range of disability, mental illness, chemical dependency or bad behavior that's gotten them in trouble. Because Washington County did not have a continuum of care plan approved in 1999, approximately \$200,000 of homelessness prevention monies was lost. This money helps in the prevention of homelessness and providing services. Those services are not provided by the County but by community based agencies. The Housing Coordinator has provided the leadership to bring the community players together to get a plan approved so those prevention dollars are available.

Mr. Papin addressed Commissioner Pulkrabek's concerns regarding the increased costs that have resulted in the last couple of years. They had hoped to see a reduced cost in the amount of dollars that the County pays for situations that arise where somebody is being evicted or has been evicted or shows up in their waiting room. They thought they could have an impact on that, but their caseloads have increased by about 20 to 30% depending on the program. There is a growth in the cases coming through their door and therefore they were not able to deliver on what they hoped to be a promise of lower costs.

Mr. Papin stated that the recommendation for the three services is not so much a department recommendation as it is the Board's citizen advisory committee recommendation. The department suggested some things, but the advisory committee is what's bringing this before the Board today. It is an option to address the growing and expanding homeless issue that the County faces without an impact on the property tax.

Mr. Papin stated that for the population they serve a case management model does seem to be an effective tool. It looks at all the family issues, not just housing, but what other issues caused this crisis. The dollars are used for education, budgeting assistance, giving them the tools they need to stay put and correcting some bad behaviors. They feel the case management model is the strongest tool in their arsenal right now.

Commissioner Peterson asked if the dollars stay in the Community Service for this project area, these folks are being hired as temporary or permanent employee? Mr. Papin stated that would be at the discretion of the Board, but probably special project because of the nature of the work.

Commissioner Peterson asked if a review process could be established within the next year? Mr. Papin stated that would be something they expect to do.

Commissioner Stafford stated that some of the functions described, would they be in the wrap-around services? Mr. Papin stated that is correct.

Commissioner Stafford asked if there would be three people involved in that project – the Housing Coordinator who is funded indirectly by HRA, the Housing Services Social Worker and a staff support person? Mr. Papin stated that is correct.

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Commissioner Peterson stated that the number of folks who are going to be requiring these services is growing. She feels the Board will make a huge mistake by not funding these wrap-around services. They need to get a program in place that addresses a continuum of care that really brings together all of the players in housing in Washington County. That's the very essence of continuum of care. They then will become the advocates for affordable housing in our communities and they will be developing strategies to bring that to bear.

Commissioner Stafford stated he is concerned that this program does not address the real need which is building units. If there were units then these costs would not be needed. He is frustrated because the Board is only plugging the dike. With all the organizations that are bragging about what they do for affordable housing, he doesn't see any popping out of the ground. He is concerned that the County is spending a lot of money merely to keep the ship afloat and nothing is being done to move it across the ocean.

Comprehensive Plan the utilization of single-family dwelling units that could be duplexed. They have also followed that through in zoning. She believes that the Housing Coordinator has met with a number of groups in her area and they are putting forth housing programs at the local level. She believes there are things, because of this position and because of the County's involvement in the continuum of care, she is seeing monthly meetings, monthly activities going on where in fact private enterprise is engaged in developing some of those housing needs. There is an awareness that is coming to the table. The Housing Coordinator is working with church groups and non-profits. A lot of things are going on.

Commissioner Peterson asked the Board to give staff direction so this matter can be presented on the Consent Calendar for next week's Board meeting.

Mr. Schug asked for direction and stated that staff would make any amendment to the proposed Consolidated Plan before the final adoption. He has heard the issue of whether or not the Community Service request for services be included in the proposed plan or be converted to some other type of service or to be carried over.

Commissioner Stafford stated he would like to discuss this item further with the Community Services Director.

It was Board consensus to discuss this matter further at next Tuesday's Board meeting.

CITIZEN SURVEY

Bill Morris, Decision Resources, Inc. presented a summary of the results from a recently completed countywide citizen survey. This survey was conducted between January 26 and February 12, 2001, and included 500 randomly selected residents of Washington County.

Commissioner Peterson left the meeting at 11:16 a.m.

ASSESSMENT, TAXPAYER SERVICES AND ELECTIONS

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to approve an agreement with the City of Woodbury which provides that the County will assume responsibility for the assessment of property in Woodbury. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

HUMAN RESOURCES

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to authorize the re-establishment of the position of Deputy Assessor/Appraisal Manager in the Department of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Chisago/Washington Purchase of Development Rights Pilot Program

Mr. Schug stated that Chisago County has had a number of administrative difficulties in bringing their purchase of development rights pilot program together. They have recently decided to request that the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources transfer the funding that was set aside for Chisago County to Washington County. Staff has been working with the South Washington Watershed District to purchase the development rights on the fourth property that was identified for PDR and will bring that to the Board for its consideration in the near future.

Legislative Update

Mr. Schug presented a legislative update and indicated that there is a lot of activity with the tax bill, PERA funding, Community Corrections Act funding and transportation funding.

Mr. Schug stated there is a proposal in the House tax bill that would reinstate levy limits for Counties for two years and at the end of two years there would be a provision for a reverse referenda if taxes were increased by even one dollar. Any increase in taxes would be subject to a potential reverse referendum. The County organizations are very concerned that this usurps the power of local elected officials who have been elected to make those decisions at the County level.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the Energy Task Force meeting he attended last week. A speaker from the City of Chaska indicated that the city owns its own electrical generating plant. Chaska, because they're a governmental unit, could build the plant with tax exempt bonds, no real estate taxes and other benefits. This decreased their capital costs from about \$92 per kilowatt to \$52. He questioned if the Counties are going to get into this business, then who is going to pay the taxes, because a considerable amount of taxes is provided by the generating process. Another issue that was discussed was the State of Washington burns asbestos shingles which removes the asbestos out of them. This process is not allowed in Minnesota, the shingles are landfilled. The shingles do produce a considerable amount of BTU value and the ash from this process is used for road beds in the State of Washington.

Commissioner Hegberg asked that the Board hold a workshop to discuss allowing campers in County Parks to bring their dogs for overnight camping.

Commissioner Abrahamson announced that the Law Enforcement Center will hold a memorial next Tuesday at noon.

Commissioner Stafford reported that a township in his district does not want to meet individually with Transportation staff. He is concerned about comments that have been made that he is trying to torpedo this project. He has made private and public statements that he would support cutting the townships loose if all the townships would get together to do that. The problem he is some townships do not want the private meetings to occur with individual townships, but there might be townships that do want a private meeting. He feels that townships that do not want a private meeting will not show up anyhow, but those that do want a private meeting ought to be given one. At the end of that process the Board will hold a general meeting with all the townships.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated that on Wednesday, May 9 there will be a groundbreaking ceremony for the new Woodbury Library at 4:00 p.m.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Hegberg and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent. The Board meeting adjourned at 11:45 a.m.

The Board workshop with the Community Services Department was postponed until next week, May 15.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Judy Hunter, Senior Program Manager, presented a review of the 2000 projects and accomplishments of the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board. The following items were discussed: Earth action challenge—encourage employees to cut waste; Environmentally preferable purchasing guide/procurement guide; Transport packaging demonstration project; Reduction of office paper demonstration project; Model ordinance for backyard food waste composting; Support for State waste reduction media campaign; Latex paint task force discussion on the management and recycling of latex paint; CRT task force, collection of electronic equipment; Regional household hazardous waste brochure; Processing and landfilling; Regional hauler licensing program; Various studies on technical analysis of processing capacity; Legislative and intergovernmental programs; Various research projects; and the annual solid waste system progress reports and annual county progress reports.

FINANCIAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Kathleen Aho, Springsted, Inc., informed the Board that the County extended a request for proposals for underwriting services to refund General Obligation Refunding Bonds Series 1992A. Five responses were received: 1) Dain Rauscher Incorporated; 2) Dougherty & Company, LLC; 3) Miller Johnson Steichen Kinard; 4) US Bancorp Piper Jaffray; and 5) Wells Fargo Brokerage Services, LLC. Ms. Aho indicated that the County Finance Committee met prior to the Board meeting and it was the Committee's recommendation that Dain Rauscher Incorporated be chosen as the underwriter for the refunding of these bonds.

Ms. Aho also informed the Board that the Finance Committee discussed this morning whether to wait and do the transaction in November or do the transaction at his point. As an outcome of that discussion, the Committee decided that if the County Board would choose to wait, its recommendation would be different.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that the Feds are discussing the rates this week and he feels the County Board should wait.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated if this is done now, the County would save approximately \$100,000 per year. There is a recommendation from the Finance Committee and Springsted, the County's Financial Advisor.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to approve Dain Rauscher Incorporated as the underwriter for the refunding of the \$19,325,000 General Obligation Refunding Bonds Series 1992A. The motion died for lack of a second.

Commissioner Stafford liked where Commissioner Pulkrabek was headed. He asked if the Board could wait until the Fed rate comes out and then ask Springsted, Inc. to come back with a scenario that takes the new rate into consideration? Is it physically possible to do that by next Tuesday or the following Tuesday?

Ms. Aho stated that the tax exempt market is not always direct or immediate. She suggested waiting a week after the Feds next action to see the impact.

Commissioner Hegberg stated it is his opinion that the rate isn't going to go up, so waiting a week or two wouldn't make that much difference.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to delay action on appointing an underwriter for the refunding of the \$19,325,000 General Obligation Refunding Bonds Series 1992A until June 5, 2001. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Hegberg, Abrahamson, Peterson and Stafford; No, Commissioner Pulkrabek.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Tammy Kincaid, Community Services Supervisor, presented the annual report on the status of out-of-home placement of children in Washington County.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Community Development Block Grant and Home Plans

The County Board continued discussion began last week on the 2001 Community Development Block Grant and discussed various options presented in the Board's packet.

Commissioner Peterson believes strongly that the wrap around services should be fully funded. She feels it gives staff resources to solve problems. She continues to support option 1.

Commissioner Stafford suggested the following compromise: Place the social service worker on hold, consider putting the support staff person up to full time and pay for that by taking a little bit out of the wrap around money, take the savings and put it back into the communities. He says there would still be money left in the wrap around program and gives the Housing Coordinator a staff person to do the paperwork and puts the social service worker on hold for this cycle.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated the calls he has received feel the money should be put towards projects. He would go along with option 2. He could go along with option 2 and use the remaining money for the wrap around program.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he is leaning towards Commissioner Stafford's suggestion. He believes the Housing Coordinator's position was never in question, but it is important that she has help. It also would allocate more money towards projects and the wrap around program.

Commissioner Peterson believes that the need for housing and the need to find housing will continue to grow. She believes that the wrap around service becomes a funding source that can help people when there is an emergency.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to take the \$50,000 that was earmarked for the Housing Services Social Worker and fully fund the Raymie Johnson kitchen improvements and the Landfall Tot Lot Rehab and that the remaining \$2,955 be carried over to next year; Make the Housing Services Support staff a full time position at \$40,000 with the difference to be paid for out of the wrap around services leaving \$66,150 in the wrap around services. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion.

James Schug, County Administrator, informed the Board that after those adjustments are made it leaves a relatively small amount of money to be carried over. The Board might want to consider moving those funds into the wrap around services leaving a clean budget for 2001 with the understanding that the money will not be spent if it is not needed.

Commissioner Pulkrabek and Commissioner Abrahamson were agreeable to that suggestion and the new motion reads as follows:

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to take the \$50,000 that was earmarked for the Housing Services Social Worker position and fully fund the Raymie Johnson kitchen improvements and the Landfall Tot Lot Rehab and that the remaining \$2,955 be allocated to the Wrap Around services; Make the Housing Services Support staff a full time position at \$40,000 with the difference to be paid out of the wrap around services leaving \$69,105 for that service. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-056 as follows:

Resolution Approving Washington County's Consolidated Plan and 2001 Annual Action Plan for the Community Development Block Grant and HOME Investment Partnership Programs, and Authorizing Submission of a Grant Request to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

WHEREAS, Washington County is an Entitlement County for funds through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program; and

WHEREAS, Washington County is entitled to HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME) funds through its participation, with Anoka, Dakota and suburban Ramsey Counties, in the Dakota County Consortium; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Office of Administration administers the CDBG and HOME Programs in Washington County; and

WHEREAS, cities and townships participating in the Washington County CDBG and HOME programs have proposed projects for funding in their jurisdictions, according to the priorities identified in the Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has proposed projects for funding, according to the priorities identified in the Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Community Development Block Grant Citizen Advisory Committee has recommended projects for funding, according to the priorities identified in the Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, as part of the application process for CDBG and HOME funds, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development requires the submission of a Consolidated Plan and a One-Year Action Plan; and

WHEREAS, an agreement between HUD and Washington County for CDBG funds is required; and

WHEREAS, an Joint Powers Consortium Agreement between the Dakota County and Washington County for HOME funds is required; and

WHEREAS, HUD requires the designation of a certifying officer for environmental reviews associated with the CDBG and HOME Programs; and

WHEREAS, on May 8, 2001 at 9:25 a.m., the Board of Commissioners conducted a public hearing to consider approval of the Washington County Consolidated Plan and 2001 Action Plan for the CDBG and HOME programs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves the Washington County Consolidated Plan and 2001 Action Plan for submission to HUD.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board Chair and/or County Administrator are authorized to execute and sign the Application for Assistance, Certifications, FY 2001 CDBG agreement with HUD for the acceptance of CDBG funds, and Joint Powers Consortium Agreement with the Dakota County Consortium for the acceptance of HOME funds.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners designates the County Administrator as the certifying officer for environmental reviews associated with the CDBG and HOME programs.

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Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Stafford reminded the Board of the Law Enforcement Memorial Service at noon today.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported on an article he read in this morning's Pioneer Press regarding a fouryear sentence a drunk driver got for killing a 20-year old woman by going the wrong way on the Mendota Bridge. The driver had two previous misdemeanor convictions for assault and disorderly conduct in connection with incidents that involved heavy drinking. Commissioner Pulkrabek has heard some lobbying organizations for counties talk about not wanting three DWI convictions go to a felony status. He would be in favor of having the three DWI convictions become a felony. He feels something needs to be changed.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that the health pool that had existed in the Minnesota Counties Insurance Trust has been discontinued. The group that was remaining in that pool has decided to accept that now is not the time to fight with the larger health care units and their premiums.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that when President Bush comes to the Twin Cities he hopes he discusses and embraces debate on nuclear power. He believes this country is missing the boat on that issue.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he went to the Capitol last week to keep alive the monies for the Resource Recovery Plant to help reduce the tipping fee and pay down the debt.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated that the Historic Courthouse will hold an event this Sunday at 1:30 p.m. breaking ground for the new garden.

Commissioner Peterson reported she meet with the League of Women Voters last night to discuss waste issues. She believes the County needs to do more programs like this because the public is surprised when they hear what goes on at Resource Recovery and the impact it has on all of us. She thanked Judy Hunter for doing an outstanding job at that event.

Mr. Schug reminded the viewing audience that today is May 15 and the first half of property taxes are

due.

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners entered into a Joint Powers Agreement with Ramsey and Dakota counties to operate and finance an Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Radio Communications system in the east metropolitan area; and

WHEREAS, Article V of the EMS Radio Communications Board Joint Powers Agreement allows for withdrawal in Section 1 as follows: "Any county may withdraw on December 31 of any year by giving notice to the Chair of the EMS Radio Communications Board of a certified copy of a resolution of its Board of Commissioners indicating its intent to withdraw from this Agreement. Such notice must be given to the Chair of the EMS Radio Communications Board by June 1st of the year of withdrawal to be effective."; and

WHEREAS, the Dakota County Board of Commissioners has taken action to notify the EMS Radio Communications Board Chair and has resolved to withdraw from the Joint Powers Agreement effective, January 1, 2002; and

WHEREAS, Article VI of the EMS Radio Communications Board Joint Powers Agreement provides conditions for termination of the Agreement in Section 1 as follows: "This Agreement shall remain in effect and terminate only upon the occurrence of any one of the following events:

- A. When, in the judgment of the Board, it becomes impractical or uneconomical to continue the EMS radio communications system.
- B. When necessitated by operation of law or as a result of a decision by a court of competent jurisdiction.
- C. When a majority of the counties hereto agree, by resolution, to terminate the Agreement."; and

WHEREAS, the effects of the Dakota County withdrawal, the need for equipment replacement and/or upgrades, and changes in the use patterns of the EMS Radio Board's Medical Resource Control Center at Regions Hospital in St. Paul, MN makes continued participation in the EMS Radio Communications Board uneconomical and impractical; and

WHEREAS, staff have prepared recommendations (hereby attached to this resolution) for an orderly transition for Washington County's withdrawal from the Joint Powers Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby gives notice to the Chair of the EMS Radio Communications Board, and to its fellow member counties of Ramsey and Dakota, of its intent to withdraw from the Joint Powers Agreement for operating and financing the EMS Radio Communications system effective December 31, 2002.

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby directs staff to implement the recommendations as presented from the Department of Public Health and Environment and to work with Public Health Staff from the other member counties and Emergency Medical Services providers to achieve an effective and orderly transition out of this service.

Recommendations for Washington County's Withdrawal from the EMS Radio Communications Board May 22, 2001

- That the Washington County Board of Commissioners indicate its intent to withdraw from the Radio Communications Board effective December 31, 2002.
- That the Ramsey and Washington County Boards of Commissioners give formal notice to Regions Hospital that the existing contract for Medical Resource Control Center operations will not be renewed at its termination date of December 31, 2002.
- That Ramsey and Washington Counties indicate their willingness to assign the use of the UHF channels related to the operation of the EMS Radio Communication System to an appropriately formed governance entity.
- 4. That Ramsey and Washington Counties indicate their willingness to negotiate a reasonable price for transfer of ownership of the equipment related to the operation of the EMS Radio Communications System to an appropriately formed governance entity.
- That County staff provide technical assistance and consultation to Regions Hospital and/or to local cities who may desire to develop a governance agreement for operation and maintenance of the EMS Radio Communications system and the Medical Resource Control Center effective January 1, 2003.
- 6. That Ramsey and Washington Counties indicate their willingness to contribute an amount not to exceed 25% of the total cost for operation of the Medical Resource Control Center on an annual basis to assure the availability and use of the system for mass casualty incident and/or disaster coordination. Such annual cost shall not grow by more than 3% annually. The term of this condition would be for five (5) years January 1, 2003 through December 31, 2007. (Ramsey and Washington Counties' respective shares of this cost would be determined between the Counties)
- That Washington and Ramsey Counties work cooperatively with providers and Regions Hospital to secure a permanent alternative funding stream.
- 8. That Ramsey and Washington Counties request that Regions Hospital and/or local cities indicate their interest in pursuing ownership, operation and maintenance of the EMS Radio Communications System and the MRCC by January 1, 2002. If Regions Hospital and/or local cities are not interested in ownership, operation and maintenance of the EMS Radio Communications System, the system shall cease to operate on January 1, 2003.

- Concur in the approval of an agreement between the City of Woodbury and the YMCA of

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Linda Bixby, Community Services Supervisor, presented an overview of current legislative proposals in the State House and Senate on the shared responsibility child support guidelines. These proposals would take both parents' income into account in determining the amount of the child support order. Ms. Bixby stated it is anticipated that neither bill will be passed this session, but instead statewide hearings will be conducted during the summer months on the merits of each bill.

J. Alan Midgett, Community Services Supervisor, presented an overview of the Financial Institution Data Match (FIDM) that creates quarterly matching of delinquent non-custodial parents with financial institution account records. The process allows the child support office to levy against the non-custodial parent's financial account and will increase the collection of delinquent child support.

WASHINGTON COUNTY HOUSING AND REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-058 as follows:

Resolution Approving the Qualified Allocation Plan for Housing Tax Credits

WHEREAS, Congress has permanently extended the Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program by enactment of the Revenue Reconciliation Act of 1993;

WHEREAS, Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations") require allocators of low income housing credits, including the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (the "Authority") which allocates such credits on behalf of Washington County (the "County"), to provide procedures to allocate low income housing tax credits and monitor compliance of projects to which it has allocated low income housing tax credits pursuant to Section 42 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended;

WHEREAS, the Authority has determined it is necessary and appropriate to modify the Authority's previously adopted Housing Tax Credit Qualified Allocation Plan (the "Plan"); and

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WHEREAS, the Authority has adopted the Plan, as amended, in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit A following a public hearing regarding the revision of the Plan for which not less than 14 days notice was published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners of Washington County that the amended Housing Tax Credit Qualified Allocation Plan previously adopted by the Authority and attached hereto as Exhibit A is hereby approved.

Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

WHEREAS, Chuck Leifeld has been highly respected by his fellow University of Minnesota Extension colleagues, by Washington County employees and by the residents of the Washington County community he has served and worked with over the years; and

WHEREAS, Chuck Leifeld has continuously demonstrated his enthusiasm and commitment in working with youth and has made significant contributions by helping our youth become all they can be – today and in the future.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that, the Washington County Board of Commissioners acknowledges with grateful appreciation Charles (Chuck) Leifeld's service to the citizens of Washington County; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT, The Washington County Board of Commissioners heartily commends Charles (Chuck) Leifeld for his active leadership in the University of Minnesota Extension Service—Washington County and extends its best wishes to Chuck and his family for a happy and healthy future.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson moved to declare June 1, 2001 as "Chuck Leifeld Day in Washington County." Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Appreciation for Flood Related Activities

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-059 as follows:

Resolution of Appreciation for Flood Related Activities

WHEREAS, during the period April 10, 2001 and May 6, 2001, Washington County experienced flooding conditions caused by snowmelt and precipitation on the Mississippi and St. Croix Rivers; and

WHEREAS, the communities of Afton, Bayport, Cottage Grove, Denmark Township, Lakeland, Lake St. Croix Beach, Marine on St. Croix, May Township, Newport, St. Mary's Point, and Stillwater, have all been impacted by flood waters which reached the second highest levels on record; and

WHEREAS, hundreds of volunteers and local government personnel have devoted countless hours of hard work and effort to sand bag, pump, provide security, provide food and refreshments and many other activities related to protecting the health and safety of Washington County residents; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners recognizes and appreciates all the fine work done by individual volunteers, community agencies and our local, state and federal government agencies and staff.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners does hereby officially thank all those who participated in the flood fight of 2001 and publicly acknowledges their contribution to our community.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Lowell Johnson, Senior Program Manager, informed the Board that there were 64 homes with major damage, 22 with minor damage and 59 that were affected. Twenty-seven families were evacuated from their homes and 17 families were sheltered by the Red Cross or assisted by others. Mr. Johnson stated that total estimated damages countywide are \$1,540,357 to date. This figure not only includes private residences, it includes damages and expenses related to the flood fight such as sand bagging, levies, pumping, public safety services, equipment and repairs.

Mr. Johnson demonstrated how Project Impact grant funds were used to conduct flood hazard analysis and damage assessment using the County's geographic information system and the use of two-foot contour mapping.

WHEREAS, Washington County has solicited, evaluated and ranked land protection proposals according to an adopted Purchase of Development Rights Ordinance and an approved Policies and Procedures Document; and

WHEREAS, the Purchase of Development Rights Advisory Committee recommended that Purchase of Development Rights Program funds be used to protect parcels of land in the South Washington Watershed District's Central Corridor Project area;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the expenditure of up to \$186,000, to acquire a conservation easement on the Ratzloff parcel in the City of Woodbury, Property Identification Number 34.028.21.42.0002; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Board Chair and the County Administrator be authorized to execute all necessary documents related to this expenditure; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes this expenditure contingent on the South Washington Watershed District providing the required \$150,000 cash match.

Commissioner Abrahamson reported on a ceremony held last Sunday at the Historic Courthouse for a groundbreaking on the new garden and a wall dedication.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked that copies of a brochure from the Metropolitan 911 Board and EMS on how to place a 911 call be made available to the public and published in the Staying in Touch Newsletter. Commissioner Peterson asked that staff have these brochures available at the County, the County fair and other County sponsored events.

Commissioner Stafford asked that staff provide him with more information regarding the County's water governance program and the current appeal.

Commissioner Stafford stated that he and Commissioner Hegberg met with Representative Vandeveer regarding the reduction in transit funding that the Metropolitan Council member Marc Hugunin brought to the County's attention. He stated that Representative Vandeveer had an entirely different view on that situation. Commissioner Stafford believes there needs to be a dialog between Metropolitan Council and the County legislative delegation to get a clearer picture on this issue.

Commissioner Peterson acknowledged the "Take It Back" brochure that was sent to County residents. She believes this is a wonderful tool and hopes that this brochure will also be available at the County fair, libraries and any booth the County may have at any local events. Commissioner Peterson would

All Way Stop Installation at the CSAH 19 and Lake Road Intersection Located in the City of Woodbury

WHEREAS, the intersection of CSAH 19 (Woodbury Drive) & Lake Road currently operates as a two-way stop controlled intersection, with the Lake Road approaches required to stop; and

WHEREAS, this intersection has experienced increased traffic volumes due to additional construction and development in the area; and

WHEREAS, there have been nine (9) accidents at this intersection in the latest twelve (12) month period that would be susceptible to correction by the installation of an all way stop; and

WHEREAS, a traffic analysis shows that this intersection does meet the criteria set forth in the Minnesota Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices for an all way stop.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Director of Transportation and Physical Development to install and maintain the appropriate signs to establish an all way stop condition at the intersection of CSAH 19 (Woodbury Drive) & Lake Road located in the City of Woodbury.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Dan Papin, Community Services Director, presented information on the Minnesota Children's Justice Initiative which is a joint venture between the Minnesota Department of Human Services and the Minnesota Supreme Court. The purpose of the project is to improve the processing and outcomes of child protection cases through collaboration of the juvenile courts, social service agencies and others invested in keeping children safe.

Judge Susan Miles informed the Board that a local workgroup has been developed which includes representatives from the Courts, Court Administration, Community Services, County Attorney, Public Defender, Guardian Ad Litem, Foster Parents and the Citizen Review Panel. They hope to have a report n their findings by late summer or early fall.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, informed the Board that the County's drop list legislation and authority to sell some tax-forfeited lands did make it through the legislative session. He heard yesterday from John Kaul, the County's legislative liaison, that the Environment and Natural Resource Conference Committee agreed to some funding for processing solid waste at about \$5 per ton to help offset some of the costs at the County's Resource Recovery Facility.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to cancel the July 3, 2001 County Board meeting. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent.

The Board could meet on that date if an emergency arises.

State Waivered Services Program Update

Doug Karsky, Community Services Supervisor, provided the Board with a brief update on their efforts to move individuals and families with persons who have developmental disabilities on to the State waiver program by the June 30, 2001 deadline.

Tax Forfeited Lands Auction

Jim Schug, County Administrator, announced that the County will hold a public sale of tax forfeited land this Friday, June 8 at 9:30 a.m. in the County Board room.

Commissioner Abrahamson informed the Board that there will be a joint powers hearing on Monday, June 11, 7:00 p.m. at the Bayport City Hall to hear Andersen Corporation's request for reduced zoning on a parcel of land they own near County Road 21.

Commissioner Peterson informed the Board that she will be attending the Great Grove Get-Together on Saturday and will have a booth there to talk specifically about the Wakota Bridge and the Red Rock Rail, but she will have other County Brochures there as well.

The Board discussed the resolution.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to amend the resolution by removing section (b) and changing section (c) to read as follows: "If a forward sale is selected, the Finance Committee is authorized to issue RFP's for underwriter services." Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adopt amended Resolution No. 2001-068 as follows:

Resolution to Select an Underwriter(s) and Authorize the Transaction for the Refunding of the General Obligation Refunding Bonds Series 1992A

WHEREAS, the Washington County Finance Committee and the County's financial advisor have recommended the forward refunding of the Series 1992A bonds to take effect not later than August 1, 2001; and

WHEREAS, depending upon interest rate trends, the County may desire to enter into a forward purchase contract and enter into a forward sale on November 3, 2001; or to complete a competitive sale to refund the Series 1992A bonds after the November 2001 limitation.

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NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the County Board delegates to the Finance Committee the authority to proceed as follows:

- (a) The Finance Committee is authorized to select either a forward sale or a competitive sale for the refunding of the Series 1992A Bonds.
- (b) That if a forward sale is selected, the Finance Committee shall select underwriter services through a request for proposal (RFP) process.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Introduction of New Director of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to approve an agreement between the Minnesota Department of Trade and Economic Development and Washington County Community Services' Workforce Division to operate Dislocated Worker Program between July 1, 2001 and June 30, 2003. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Hegberg, Abrahamson, Peterson and Stafford; No. Commissioner Pulkrabek.

PUBLIC HEARING - TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Rezoning Request and Comprehensive Plan Amendment by James Schneider

The Board Chair presented an overview of a request by James and Peggy Schneider to amend the Washington County Comprehensive Plan and Washington County Zoning Ordinance to rezone approximately 2.5 acres of land in New Scandia Township from Commercial/Industrial Rural to Single Family Estate-Residential.

The Board Secretary read the notice of public hearing into the record.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Planner, presented an overview of the Schneider's' property and their request to rezone the property from commercial to residential. Mr. O'Donnell asked the Board to consider six issues he outlined in his memo to the Board dated June 6, 2001 (received and placed on record).

AND STREET,

Mr. O'Donnell advised the County Board that the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission reviewed this request on May 22, 2001 and recommended approval of the rezoning and comprehensive plan amendment (minutes received and placed on record). He also indicated that the New Scandia Town Board recently approved this request.

Mr. O'Donnell stated after review of the conditions in the area, staff concurs with New Scandia Township and the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission's decision and feel residential use would be the best and most environmentally sound use of this particular piece of property.

Commissioner Peterson asked when this land is developed, can the house be buffered from future development across the way? Mr. O'Donnell stated that would be possible. They are quite a distance from both the north property line and the west property line. It is also heavily wooded so it should provide a pretty good buffer.

Commissioner Hegberg asked about the property to the west of this request, is that the metal fabricating, or what is that? Mr. O'Donnell indicated that the two white buildings shown on the aerial photographs are self-storage units.

Commissioner Stafford asked Mr. Schneider if there is anything in his development plan to alert people who buy those lots of what their surroundings are? Mr. Schneider indicated that this will only be one home site.

The Board Chair opened the public hearing for comments; none were heard. The public hearing was closed at 9:23 a.m.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2001-070** as follows:

Resolution Approving Comprehensive Plan Amendment and Rezoning Request by James and Peggy Schneider

WHEREAS, James and Peggy Schneider have submitted an application to amend the Washington County Comprehensive Plan and the Washington County Development Code to rezone 2.5 acres of property legally described as Lot 9, Block 1, Hawkinson Business Park, New Scandia Township from Commercial/Industrial Rural to Single Family Estate-Residential; and

WHEREAS, these requests were heard by the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission at their meeting of May 22, 2001; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission recommended approval; and

WHEREAS, on June 19, 2001, the Washington County Board of Commissioners conducted a public hearing on the requests; and

WHEREAS, the record of the public hearing consists of the minutes of the Planning Advisory Commission meetings, including the written comments thereto, a staff memorandum to the County Board dated June 6, 2001, including minutes from New Scandia Township Planning Commission dated April 3, 2001 supporting the zoning request and presentations by the Washington County Department of Transportation and Physical Development, representatives of James and Peggy Schneider and members of the public.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, based upon the hearing record, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby amends the Washington County Comprehensive Plan by changing the land use designation from Commercial/Industrial Rural to Single Family Estate-Residential and the Washington County Development Code by rezoning the above described property in New Scandia Township from Commercial/Industrial Rural to Single Family Estate-Residential, for the following reasons:

- 1. A Single Family Estate zone permits residential use.
- 2. The lot is compatible with adjacent land use to the south zoned rural residential.
- 3. The lot is heavily vegetative, with a wetland which provides a good buffer to adjacent property zoned light industrial.
- 4. The rezoning request to Single Family Estate is an environmentally sound use of this property and there is no negative off-site impact as a result of the rezoning.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Zoning Administrator is directed to make the appropriate changes in the Comprehensive Plan and Development Code and to cause the same to be published and codified according to law.

WASHINGTON COUNTY DEVELOPMENT CODE AMENDMENT

WASHINGTON COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 157

An Ordinance Amending the Washington County Comprehensive Plan and Washington County Development Code Regulating Land Use in Washington County.

The Board of Commissioners of Washington County ordains:

SECTION 1: The Washington County Comprehensive Plan and the Washington County Development Code be amended to rezone 2.5 acres of property legally described as Lot 9,

Block 1, Hawkinson Business Park, New Scandia Township from Commercial/Industrial Rural to Single Family Estate – Residential.

SECTION 2: The Washington County Zoning Administrator is hereby directed to amend the Washington County Comprehensive Plan and Washington County Development Code, including zoning maps, in accordance with the foregoing amendment.

CONTRACT STATES

SECTION 3: Effective date. This Ordinance shall be and is hereby declared to be in full force and effect after its passage and publication according to law.

Passed by the Board of County Commissioners of Washington County, Minnesota, this 19th day of June, 2001.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Resource Recovery Waste Education Agreement

Judy Hunter, Senior Program Manager, stated that last year, the Resource Recovery Project Board entered into a Waste Education Agreement with Washington County to hire an Environmental Specialist to provide outreach and education services. During the past year, this person has arranged for 78 tours of the facility, presentations to a variety of groups and has ensured that the Resource Recovery display has been set up in many locations throughout the two counties. The work plan for the coming year is being revised to include targeted work with multi-family homes such as condominiums and town home associations and educating them as to where their waste goes. Staff is requesting a one-year extension of the Special Project Environmental Specialist position for outreach services.

Commissioner Peterson stated there is a real public interest in wanting to know about Resource Recovery and wanting to see the display. She feels this person is doing an excellent job.

Commissioner Stafford noted that additional tasks were added for outreach and should increase information to the public. He also reminded the Board that there is a citizen's jury meeting this week to review waste management.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he will not support this position. His vote does not reflect the job performance, from everything he has heard she is doing a fantastic job. He does applaud the efforts to focus more on town home associations. However, he feels this position has an insurmountable task and the bottom line for him is that they hired this position as a temporary position at a price tag of \$57,000 and it cannot be shown that it is working, or will work. The amount of garbage going to the Newport

facility has gone way down. If there has been a great education campaign then there would be pressure on the haulers to bring the garbage to the Newport facility, and that simply hasn't happened. The County's own survey shows that less people know where their garbage goes and less people care where their garbage goes than the survey done two years previously. The City of Oakdale survey that came out a few months ago, compared to a survey taken six years ago, says the same thing; less people know where their garbage goes, less people care where their garbage goes and price is still the biggest factor in determining which hauler they select.

Commissioner Peterson feels the County Board should assume some of the responsibility to go out and promote the kinds of environmental stewardship that it should. She would challenge the Commissioners to do something with this position and promote environmental stewardship of our garbage.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated he agrees with Commissioner Peterson. He has met with quite a few people and he is surprised by the lack of understanding of the average taxpayer in not knowing where there waste is going. He feels it is getting better, at least in the communities he represents, they want to know how to force the haulers to do certain things. He feels education is a key.

Commissioner Hegberg agrees with Commissioner Pulkrabek to a great extent on the financial part. However, he will support the position. Education is an extremely difficult task, but he feels the public needs to be educated on why the County does certain things. Including the town house associations and apartments in educating them on where their garbage is going is a good idea.

Commissioner Stafford moved to authorize the County Board Chair and County Administrator to execute the Waste Education Agreement between Washington County and the Ramsey/Washington Resource Recovery Board to provide a one-year extension of the Special Project Environmental Specialist position for outreach services. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Hegberg, Abrahamson, Peterson and Stafford; No. Commissioner Pulkrabek.

Amendment No. 10 to the Resource Recovery Service Agreement

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-071 as follows:

Amendment Number 10 to the Ramsey/Washington Resource Recovery Service Agreement with NRG Energy, Inc.

WHEREAS, Ramsey and Washington Counties have entered into a Service Agreement with NRG Energy, Inc. for resource recovery services; and

WHEREAS, the Counties and NRG have previously amended the Service Agreement nine times, in 1989, 1990, 1992, twice in 1993, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1999; and

WHEREAS, the Counties and NRG have negotiated an amendment to the Service Agreement that would help to address issues related to waste deliveries; and

WHEREAS, the Joint Powers Agreement for the Resource Recovery Project provides that the County Boards must approve any Service Agreement Amendments; and

WHEREAS, the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project Board has recommended that the County Boards approve Amendment Number 10 to the Service Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the Amendment Number 10 to the Service Agreement, and authorizes the Chair and County Administrator to execute the agreement.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Explore Public Collection System for Solid Waste

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-072 as follows:

Authorization to Direct the County to Fully Explore and Consider Development and Implementation of a Public Collection System for Solid Waste

WHEREAS, Washington County (the "County") desires to continue to benefit, protect and ensure the public health, safety, welfare and environment of the County's residents and businesses through sound management of solid waste generated in the County; and

WHEREAS, public collection of solid waste could provide such services in a more cost effective manner and better allocate the costs of solid waste management among generators of waste based upon the volume of waste generated; and

WHEREAS, public collection could reduce the impact of solid waste collection vehicles on roads, alleys and bridges, and reduce noise and traffic impacts in the County; and

WHEREAS, the County seeks to manage the potential long-term financial liability on its taxpayers, including the environmental liability associated with disposal of solid waste; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes, including Minnesota Statutes Chapters 115A, 145A, 400 and 473, grant the County the authority to establish and conduct solid waste management programs to protect the water, air and land resources of the County thereby promoting the public safety, health and welfare of its residents and businesses; and

WHEREAS, the County has adopted the Regional/Washington County Solid Waste Master Plan ("Plan"), Resolution No. 99-019, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Chapter 473 that seeks to implement solid waste management in a manner fully consistent with the waste management

hierarchy prescribed by the State of Minnesota, including reducing the amount of solid waste generated, maximizing recycling and converting waste to energy; and

WHEREAS, the Plan specifically contemplates exploration and potential implementation of public collection of solid waste; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes Chapters, 115A, 145A, 400, and 473 grant the County the specific authority to provide for and regulate the collection, management and disposal of solid waste and other refuse; and

WHEREAS, the process to develop and implement public collection of solid waste should ensure participation of County residents and businesses.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby directs that the County fully explore and consider development and implementation of a public collection system for solid waste in light of the potential benefits described above, and that the County engage participation of residents, municipalities, solid waste haulers, businesses, and citizen groups as it considers development and implementation of a public solid waste collection system; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County Board hereby authorizes and delegates to the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project Board ("Project Board") the responsibility for the study of a public collection system on behalf of each County, including the authorization to enter into contracts and use Project funds to advance the study; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the outcome of this exploration and discussion is not predetermined and final decisions will be made by individual county boards.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Acceptance of the "Award of Excellence"

Murray Harber, Past President of the Minnesota Council of Physical Activity and Sports, presented the County Board Chair with its "Award of Excellence" to the Community Fitness Partners. This award recognizes the partners for completion of a "walkability" assessment of Oak Park Heights and Stillwater and the development of printed maps of walking routes throughout the two cities.

Mr. Harber also presented the Board Chair with a Certificate of Commendation to the Community Fitness Partners from Governor Jesse Ventura.

Jean Streetar, Community Health Specialist, listed the current partners in the coalition: Washington County Department of Public Health and Environment; Washington County Department of Transportation and Physical Development; City of Oak Park Heights; City of Stillwater, Courage St. Croix; Stillwater Area School District and Community Education; Stillwater Senior Center; and Lakeview Hospital.

June 19, 2001

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

James Schug, County Administrator, reported on a possible State shutdown and what impact that would have on local government. Staff is determining what are the County's essential services and how they would be impacted. Services to children, elderly persons, persons with disabilities are some of the services that need to be maintained even if there is a suspension of some of the funding. The County is looking at its labor agreements and policies regarding employees if it should have to reduce the size of the workforce on a temporary basis. They are also looking at the contracts for Community Service providers who provide direct care to the vulnerable populations in the community. The issue of cash flow and reimbursement is also being looked at. If there is an interruption in State funding, will the County be made whole again when the 2002-2003 budget is approved? Various State departments are being contacted to determine their plans so the County can coordinate. How information would be shared with the public if there is a reduction in County and State services is also being looked at. Finally, they are coordinating efforts with other agencies such as the Metropolitan Inter-County Association and the Association of Minnesota Counties.

CHARLES THE SERVICE

Citizen's League Energy Task Force Application

Mr. Schug announced that the Citizen's League is starting a process to examine how Minnesota should prepare for its future energy needs while balancing affordability, reliability and environmental concerns. If any of the Commissioners are interested in participating in that process, they are looking for individuals to serve on that task force. A brief description and application was provided to each Commissioner.

County Auction

Mr. Schug reported on the July 18 County Auction and informed the Board that they took in about \$121,000. Also, there will be a follow up auction on Saturday, July 7 at 9:00 a.m.. This auction will also he held at the Transportation and Physical Development Facility on Myeron Road and will be primarily a semi-trailer full of construction materials and tools and motorcycle parts.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg reported he went on the groundwater tour and learned how to spot springs along the river. He also attended the Hugo meeting last evening and their concern was having an access off Interstate 35 to County Road 4. The HRA Board will meet later on today and the Resource Recovery Board will meet tomorrow to discuss its budget.

Commissioner Abrahamson asked Transportation and Physical Development to check the signage on a pedestrian crosswalk on Osgood, south of Herberger's Department store. He has had several calls from senior citizens who have trouble crossing there because cars are not stopping for them as they should.

Commissioner Stafford asked how long the Board of Equalization will last this year? Mr. Schug stated that the last hearing is scheduled to take place at 3:45 p.m.

Commissioner Pulkrabek announced that Oakdale will celebrate its Summerfest later this week with the parade on Thursday night. He will be participating in the parade and also in the tennis tournament. He also thanked staff for their quick response to a couple of constituent's calls last Friday.

Commissioner Peterson announced that on Wednesday, June 20, the Green Corridor Project will meet for its final public discussion and project wrap up. The Central Corridor will hold an open house to discuss their scoping document on June 26 at the Sheraton Midway from 8:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. and on June 25 at Life Track Resources Job Service Center from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. On June 27 the Sensible Land Use Coalition will meet at the Radisson Metrodome to discuss affordable housing. She also brought in a copy of the April issue of the *Urban Land Institute* that has an article on the Metropolitan Council she thought the Board might be interested in.

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:00 a.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Hegberg, Abrahamson, Peterson and Stafford. Commissioner Pulkrabek absent. Board Chair Peterson presided. Also present were James Schug, County Administrator; Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; George Kuprian, Senior Assistant County Attorney; Doug Johnson, County Attorney; Jay Brunner, First Assistant County Attorney; Steve Pott, Chief Deputy Sheriff; Deputy Tom Stafford; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Pat Singel, Deputy Community Services Director; Don Wisniewski, Director of Transportation and Physical Development; Doug Fischer, Deputy Director of Transportation and Physical Development; Larry Nybeck, County Surveyor; Ann Pung-Terwedo, Senior Planner; Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Planner; Konrad Koosmann, Soil and Water Conservation District; Jane Harper, Principal Planner; and Bev Hagen, Public Information Coordinator.

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

The Board Chair asked for comments from the public; none were heard.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Commissioner Abrahamson moved, seconded by Commissioner Hegberg to adopt the following Consent Calendar:

Resolution Approving Washington County Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Cooperation Agreement

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has the authority to award Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership Program funds to local governments for the purpose of providing assistance to low and moderate income households, pursuant to the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 24, Chapter 5, §570; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Housing and Urban Development has determined that Washington County is eligible to receive CDBG funds of \$1,041,000 in 2001; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Housing and Urban Development has determined that Washington County is eligible to receive additional

CDBG funds in 2002 upon execution of CDBG Cooperation Agreements with cities and towns of Washington County that did not participate in the CDBG program in 2001.

 Approval of an agreement between the State of Minnesota and Washington County for the provision of Law Enforcement Services and approval to hire a replacement FTE for the term of the contract.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2001-074 as follows:

Resolution of Commendation for **Deputy Tom Stafford** as Minnesota Police Officer of the Year

WHEREAS, Washington County Deputy Tom Stafford has been selected by the Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association as the 2001 Minnesota Police Officer of the Year; and,

WHEREAS, Deputy Tom Stafford was honored at the annual awards dinner on Monday, June 11, 2001, with the highest form of recognition by this statewide association of over 7,000 members for his work in helping to solve two gang-related murders that occurred in 2000 in Minneapolis and St. Paul; and,

WHEREAS, Deputy Tom Stafford has served for three years on the Minnesota Gang Strike Force and his knowledge of gang activities led to his identification of the persons responsible for the two gang-related murders; and,

WHEREAS, Deputy Tom Stafford has been singled out for distinction but he has stated his support of his many County fellow officers and other Minnesota law enforcement officers for their daily performance of their duties to help prevent and solve crimes against the citizens of Minnesota; and,

WHEREAS, Deputy Tom Stafford is currently a deputy sheriff assigned to the patrol division of the Washington County Sheriff's Office; and, NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners heartily commends Deputy Tom Stafford for his service to the citizens of Washington County and for the very special recognition accorded to him by his peers in the Minnesota Police and Peace Officers Association;

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County shares in the pride accorded to Officer Tom Stafford and acknowledges the high level of duty and professionalism constantly being displayed by the officers of the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATION

Jane Harper, Principal Planner, reviewed the proposed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Minnesota Land Trust. The Board authorized the purchase of a conservation easement on the John Baird property and agreed to co-hold the easement with the Minnesota Land Trust contingent on the County Board's approval of an interagency agreement that addressed monitoring and enforcement responsibilities. The proposed MOU would apply only to the Baird conservation easement; however Washington County and the Minnesota Land Trust could amend it to add additional conservation easements that would be co-held in the future.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve the Memorandum of Understanding between Washington County and the Minnesota Land Trust that describes the respective responsibilities for monitoring and enforcing conservation easements that are co-held by these parties as part of the Washington County Purchase of Development Rights Program. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Conservation Easements in Open Space Design Developments

Don Wisniewski, Director of Transportation and Physical Development, requested direction from the County Board as to whether or not it wants staff to pursue holding conservation easements as part of the cluster development; if the County holds, should they just be a holder of last resort; or, should they be a co-holder. At this time, a developer has requested a conservation easement for a cluster development in Stillwater Township. The Township does not want to be the holder and the developer cannot find a private entity such as the Land Trust. Without that, the developer will have to reconsider the cluster development and go back to the traditional development.

Mr. Wisniewski provided the following options: Best alternative is the Land Trust or private organization, but there are none available; Township has good local knowledge and people living in the neighborhoods who are concerned, but not all of the Townships are staffed to handle the responsibility; The Soil and Water Conservation District is strong in technical assistance and they have the ability through some of their other programs to monitor and to hold the easement but they are reliant on the County Attorney's Office in terms of enforcement; A do nothing alternative would mean that the development would need to go back to the traditional development and a cluster development would not be an alternative for them; A co-holder situation requires an agreement between the County, if it would be one of the holders, and another party. It would be a situation where there are more eyes doing the checking and better enforcement, but it may not always be easy to reach agreement between the co-holders; The last option is to have the County take on the responsibility, it has the legal, property management and compliance checking mechanisms in place, it began the open space development ordinance and was the catalyst for the use of conservation easements and there is only one process with the County rather than working with more. Mr. Wisniewski stated that staff is leaning toward the recommendation of the County being the holder.

Mr. Wisniewski addressed questions asked by the Commissioners last week. One question regarded the ability to transfer conservation easements. He stated that the County could transfer them if the Township became a City. If somebody else is a holder, the County cannot force them to transfer their easement to the County.

Another question regarded liability—Discussions were held with the County Attorney and the Minnesota County Insurance Trust (MCIT). MCIT suggested that to minimize the County's exposure it should ask that the landowners carry insurance and it would be a requirement of the owner and or the owner's association if they ultimately were the owners of the land.

Commissioner Stafford stated he is looking for consistency. He would be amenable to Soil and Water and the County being co-holders. He asked if the administrative money would be through fees? Mr. Wisniewski stated that the County could charge a fee to manage and setup the conservation easement or it could be something that is ongoing. The Land Trust is currently charging \$5,000, staff believes the range is anywhere from \$2,000 to \$5,000, a one time payment.

Commissioner Stafford stated that the County Attorney was asked to discuss statutory immunity if the County was the holder and also the question about insurance. The County Attorney's response is "I do not believe we would prevail in a claim of statutory immunity based on the Statute." He believes that makes insurance more important. He indicated that the County Attorney's comment was that is not a legal question, rather a business and policy decision. They would recommend that insurance, if the County was to require it, include a provision that names the County either as an additional insured or certified holder. Commissioner Stafford would lean towards that.

Commissioner Stafford stated he would support Soil and Water either alone or in joint holding with the County and make sure that the people who want us to manage this are covered with insurance.

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Commissioner Peterson questioned if she were purchasing a \$500,000 house on a cluster development, why wouldn't the homeowners want to have some control over that open land, and could the County work with that homeownership group to monitor the land? Mr. Wisniewski stated ultimately that is the way these would play out. The County would be working with some kind of an association. He believes the developer leaves the scene once that development is completed. To the degree that the County can write an agreement with a developer as it relates to the conservation easement that recommends and establishes a strong association, the County would be in a much better situation in terms of the long-term problems. He is not certain how far they can go in pushing for that strong association.

Commissioner Hegberg supports the County being the holder. The County has elected officials to make changes as this thing evolves. There is no way to determine what the pressures will be on that easement in 150 years or what the changes will be. It would be appropriate that an elected Board would help make those choices. He believes the County is the most appropriate place of last resort if the City or the Township doesn't want to accept that responsibility at this point in time. He also believes that a fee is appropriate with an option to assess the landowners for special assessments. The County can collect that and do it against taxes. That could also be transferred to the Cities. He believes that Soil and Water could manage it for the County, because they are the ones that are used to managing easements of various natures for agriculture.

Commissioner Abrahamson stated he would go along with staff's recommendation to go with the County. However, he wants to involve the Soil and Water Conservation District. He still has great concern regarding private trails and the liability.

Commissioner Abrahamson moved to authorize that the County become the principal holder of last resort for conservation easements in open space design developments. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion.

Commissioner Stafford asked if the motion includes the statement by two Commissioners that they somehow want to include the Soil and Water Conservation District in the process? Commissioner Peterson stated the motion is the County. She believes to put this in a resolution is somewhat premature because staff has not worked that out. The County, Soil and Water are all together as partners, so she would prefer that the motion just be that the County would be the holder of last resort for conservation easements in open space design developments.

The motion as stated was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Selection of Architect for the Proposed Courts Expansion Project

Commissioner Hegberg moved to select the firm of Wold Architects and Engineers for the proposed Washington County Courts project. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

Commissioner Stafford asked if it would be possible to have the Jefferson Center, the group that conducted the citizen's jury on waste management, do a press conference before the next Board meeting to give the findings of that jury. Commissioner Peterson stated if that were done, she would hope there would be cablecast also.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the Energy Forum he attended. He asked that staff look at offering Xcel Energy the use of the County's generator during high peak periods. The Department of Commerce spoke at the Energy Forum and their primary concern is the affordability of energy. They think that natural gas will be the generator of electricity during high-energy peaks in the future. They were also talking about wind being a primary source. He disagrees with this. He feels nuclear power would be the most economic. They also discussed garbage being a renewable resource. The Commissioner of Commerce didn't feel that was appropriate at this point in time, but he did leave an opening for future discussions.

Mr. Schug informed the Board that the County does have an interruptible power agreement with Xcel on the Law Enforcement Center, because that generator is large enough to provide alternate energy. In fact, the generator did kick in yesterday.

Commissioner Hegberg also reported on the Scandia Swedish Heritage Days this past weekend.

Commissioner Peterson stated she has been named the Chair of the Association of Minnesota Counties District X for the next year. Four meetings of District X will be held next year, two during the legislative session.

Commissioner Myra Peterson called the 2001 Washington County Board of Equalization to order at 1:45 p.m. with the following members present: Wallace L. Abrahamson, Dennis Hegberg, Chairperson Myra Peterson, Bill Pulkrabek, Richard Stafford, and Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator/Auditor/Treasurer.

Also present were Kevin Corbid, ATSE Director, Bruce Munneke, Washington County Assessor, Rollie Huber, Deputy County Assessor, Sylvia Schreifels, Assessment Administration Coordinator, acting as recording secretary, Allan Labine, staff appraiser, Dan Raboin, staff appraiser, Barry Staberg, staff appraiser and Ken Tolzmann, Forest Lake assessor.

Commissioner Peterson administered the oath to the Board members.

County Assessor Bruce Munneke delivered the opening remarks with a brief overview of the number of sales in the county during the most recent sales period, value added to the county due to new construction, and county wide valuation adjustments to residential, commercial/industrial, and apartment property. Reference was made to the turnout at the 23 Local Boards of Review and the 10 Open Book Meetings.

Mr. Munneke stated that at the County Board level, 15 property owners responded, of which six have chosen to appear today (one being by letter). He then briefly covered the procedure for today's County Board meeting.

CASE #1 – Woodbury – 31.028.21.13.0014 – Appearance by John and Colleen Kraemer. The subject property has a market value of \$397,600. The Kraemers claim they are unequally assessed compared to their neighbors, and additionally they should be receiving a reduction in value due to their proximity to high voltage power lines. Mr. Robinson takes issue with his value due to its proximity to Highway 97, and he questions equalization in the area. He requested the parcel count of the Forest Lake assessor and information regarding how many properties the assessor views yearly. The

Commissioners requested information to substantiate the assessor's recommendation of no change, and continued this case to June 26, 2001.

CASE # 5 – Forest Lake – 07.032.21.13.0024 & 07.032.21.13.0028 – Appearance by Dennis Robinson (commercial property). The improved parcel has a value of \$316,400 and the vacant land parcel has a value of \$129,200. Mr. Robinson feels his property is not valued equitably in comparison to nearby commercial businesses. The Forest Lake assessor, Ken Tolzmann, explained the methodology he uses in applying different square foot rates to different commercial properties. Commissioner Stafford asked that valuation inequity issues in the area be pursued. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked that this case be continued over to June 26, 2001, stating he did not feel he could make an informed decision at this time. Mr. Robinson has not provided the County Assessor's Office with income and expense information per their request.

CASE # 6 – Forest Lake – 15.032.21.22.0002 – Appearance by Richard Tschida (residential property). The subject property has a value of \$627,500. Mr. Tschida feels his property is not valued equitably compared to other homes in the area, and if there was equalization his taxes would go down. Mr. Tschida also referred to some obsolescence that should be taken into consideration in the valuation of his house. Commissioner Stafford requested that the case be continued over to the June 26, 2001 meeting, and that Mr. Tschida return with two market value appraisals.

CASE # 7 – Forest Lake – 08.032.21.43.0021, 08.032.21.43.0010 & 08.032.21.43.0017 – Appearance by Richard Tschida (commercial property). Valuation on the improved parcel/.0021 is \$721,900 and on the unimproved land parcels is .0010/\$46,200, and .0017/\$26,000. Mr. Tschida feels his properties are not valued equitably compared to other commercial properties around him, and that the two unimproved parcels are overvalued. The County Assessor had requested income expense information for three years including the current year (prior to today's meeting). On June 19, 2001, Mr. Tschida provided to staff income and expense information on the subject properties for the years 1997, 1998, 1999 and 2000. This case is to be carried over to June 26, 2001.

CASE #8 – Forest Lake – 02.032.21.34.0007 – Appearance by Kevin Hecht and Joanne Satalino. The subject property has a value of \$399,400. The owners expressed concern with equalization issues in the area. Joanne Satalino stated that they have tried to correct the discrepancies in data collected on their house for several years, even going to the Forest Lake Board, but to no avail. On June 5, 2001 an interior inspection was done on the subject property. Characteristic errors were found, and an \$11,400 adjustment reducing the value has been recommended by the Washington county Assessor's Office. Commissioner Pulkrabek requested this case be continued on June 26, 2001, at which time he wants to have all information provided by the owners and assessor.

CASE #9 - Forest Lake - 07.032.21.11.0010 & 07.032.21.12.0010 - A letter was submitted by Lester Houle. The valuation on parcel 11.0010 is \$6,400 and parcel 12.0010 is \$66,300. The combined property area is 10.3 acres, which seems to be land locked. Commissioner Abrahamson requested to see a copy of Mr. Houle's letter. Commissioner Stafford asked what Mr. Houle is asking for, and Commissioner Abrahamson passed the letter on to him. This case will be carried over to June 26, 2001.

CASE #10 - Forest Lake - 20.032.21.12.0004 - Appearance by Richard Hubers. This is a split classification parcel. The Commercial portion has a value of \$1,615,300 and the residential portion has a value of \$100,700. Mr. Hubers feels his commercial value is too high in comparison to other like buildings. When asked if there was an appraisal made on the property, Mr. Hubers stated that there was, but that he was not willing to share the appraisal for Assessor's Office staff to review. This case is to be carried over to June 26, 2001.

The Valuation Change Authorization Report of settled cases was not submitted to the Commissioners at the June 19, 2001 County Board of Equalization, and will be carried over to June 26, 2001.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION OF

WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA JUNE 26, 2001

Commissioner Myra Peterson called the 2nd meeting of the 2001 Washington County Board of Equalization to order at 12:30 pm. With the following members present: Wallace L. Abrahamson, Dennis Hegberg, Chairperson Myra Peterson, Richard Stafford, and Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator/Auditor/Treasurer.

Also present were Kevin Corbid, ATSE Director, Bruce Munneke, Washington County Assessor, Rollie Huber, Deputy County Assessor, Sylvia Schreifels, Assessment Administration Coordinator, acting as recording secretary, Allan Labine, staff appraiser, Barry Staberg, staff appraiser, and Ken Tolzmann, Forest Lake assessor.

Commissioner Peterson administered the oath to the Board members.

County Assessor Bruce Munneke delivered the opening remarks with a brief overview. Mr. Munneke delivered the opening remarks with a brief overview. Mr. Munneke told the Board that each property owner who attended the June 19th meeting, and indicated they wanted to attend the June 26th meeting, has been contacted and scheduled for 15 minute appointments.

Mr. Munneke indicated that the packets provided to the Board today contain photos of subject properties and comps. Income and expense information has been provided if available. If the Board has any follow up questions for the appraiser who reviewed the property, that appraiser is available to respond. After decisions have been made regarding the appearances today, the Board will have to make a motion to also approve the 31 maintenance changes, and Addenda items A & B.

CASE # 1 – Woodbury – 31.028.21.13.0014 – Appearance by John Kraemer. The subject (residential property) has a value of \$397,600. Information on the valuation of comparable properties and sales information was provided by the Assessor's Office. Mr. Kraemer brought one market value appraisal of his property to the meeting. Molly O'Rourke, acting in her capacity as County Auditor, stated that additional public testimony is not needed at this time because the respective property owners stated their cases last week. Commissioner Stafford recommended no change, Commissioner Abrahamson seconded, and motion carried.

CASE # 2 - Forest Lake - 14.032.21.34.0003 - Appearance by Dennis Robinson. The subject (residential property) has a value of \$229,500. Mr. Robinson feels his property's proximity to Highway 97 is detrimental to its value. The Assessor's Office stated that the property is currently receiving an 18% negative adjustment for its location, but that the qualities and amenities of the subject property along with the appeal of homes with acreage, would place the sale price of this property above the \$229,500 if placed on the market. Commissioner Hegberg recommended a reduction. Commissioner Stafford moved to accept the recommendation of the Assessor's Office of no change, Commissioner Abrahamson seconded, and Commissioner Peterson stated the motion is carried.

CASE # 3 - Forest Lake - 07.032.21.13.0024 & 07.032.21.13.0028 - Appearance by Dennis Robinson. The subjects (commercial properties) have a value of \$316,400 on the improved parcel, and \$129,200 on the vacant land parcel. Mr. Robinson has not provided income and expense information to the Assessor's Office in order for them to review the property from an income basis. Commissioner Stafford questioned the value history of the property, and the valuation rationale. Appraiser Tolzmann stated there had been a prior appeal and adjustment. County Assessor Bruce Munneke addressing the valuation rationale referred to economy of scale, i.e. smaller properties being more per sq. ft. vs. larger less per sq. ft. The fact that the vacant parcel could be sold as a separate commercial building site was also brought up. The various approaches to value, and comparables used were explained by Deputy Assessor Rollie Huber. Commissioner Peterson asked for a motion and Molly O'Rourke, acting in capacity as Auditor, recommended no change based on the fact Mr. Robinson has not supplied income/expense information. She stated he could file with Tax Court. Commissioner Abrahamson seconded, and the motion was carried.

CASE # 4 - Forest Lake - 15.032.21.22.0002 - Appearance by Richard Tschida. The subject (residential property) has a value of \$627,500. Mr. Tschida brought up his concerns of equalization in

Tolzmann addressed the structural problems/depreciation, stating permits had been taken out to correct those problems, and that the Forest Lake building inspector had told Mr. Tolzmann that work was done, and also a 544 square foot addition with full basement was added to the house. Commissioner Peterson had questions concerning the proximity to Mr. Tschida's property of the comps. provided by the Assessor's Office, did the comps. have storm sewer easement, and the total size and lakeshore frontage of the subject parcel? Commissioner Peterson asked if there were any further questions. Commissioner Abrahamson moved to accept the staff recommendation of no change, and Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion. The motion was carried with no further discussion.

CASE # 5 – Forest Lake – 08.032.21.43.0021, 08.032.21.43.0010 & 08.032.21.43.0017 – Appearance by Richard Tschida (commercial property). Valuation on the improved parcel/.021 is \$721,900, and on the unimproved land parcels is .0010/\$46,200, and .0017/\$26,000. On June 19, 2001, Mr. Tschida provided income and expense information to staff on the subject property for the years 1997, 1998, 1999, and 2000. After analysis of the income and expense data furnished by Mr. Tschida, staff determined the market value to be excessive, and recommended a reduction of \$83,900 reducing the 2001 value of the three parcels to a total of \$710,200. Commissioner Hegberg moved to accept the change, Commissioner Abrahamson seconded, and the motion was carried.

CASE # 6 – Forest Lake – 20.032.21.12.0004 – The owner, Richard Hubers, did not appear. This is a split classification parcel. The commercial portion has a value of \$1,615,300 and the residential portion has a value of \$100,700. Commissioner Stafford was told the classification change from residential to commercial is responsible for much of the increase in value. Commissioner Peterson asked that these types of classification changes be noted in future Summaries of Facts. Mr. Hubers has been unwilling to share his appraisal with staff. Based on the review and income analysis of the subject property, and owner's unwillingness to share the appraisal, staff is recommending no change. Commissioner Abrahamson moved for no change, seconded by Commissioner Stafford, and carried.

CASE # 7 – Forest Lake – 02.032.21.34.0007 – Appearance by Joanne Satalino (residential property). Valuation on the parcel is \$399,400. County Assessor, Bruce Munneke, stated that the owners' main concern has been equalization versus valuation. The appraisal staff made adjustments to the house characteristics, and reduced the value by \$11,400 to a total of \$388,000. Commissioner Abrahamson moved to accept the recommendation, Commissioner Hegberg seconded, and motion carried.

CASE #8 – Forest Lake – 07.032.21.11.0010 & 07.032.21.12.0010 – Mr. Houle did not attend the June 19, 2001 County Board of Equalization meeting, but had submitted a letter, and did not attend the June 26, 2001 meeting. His parcels are agricultural classification with a value of \$6,400 on parcel/.11.0010, and \$66,300 on parcel/.12.0010. Deputy County Assessor stated the parcels were vacant and land

locked. Staff recommends that the total estimated market value of the parcels be reduced from \$72,700 to \$26,800. Commissioner Abrahamson moved to accept, Commissioner Stafford seconded, and motion carried.

Commissioner Peterson made the motion to approve the Valuation Change Authorization Report of Settled Cases and Addenda Items A & B, submitted by the County Assessor, seconded and motion carried.
