Fiscal Services to Newly Formed Metropolitan Emergency Services Board

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-114 as follows:

Washington County to Provide Fiscal Services for the Metropolitan Emergency Services Board

WHEREAS, Washington County has been an active member of the Metropolitan 911 Board and the Metropolitan Radio Board, organizations that recently have merged to form the Metropolitan Emergency Services Board (MESB); and

WHEREAS, the county will continue to be a member of this newly merged MESB board; and whereas, MESB agreement calls for member counties to periodically provided support services for this organization; and

WHEREAS, the following services are being provided to MESB by members: Anoka County, provides payroll services; Dakota County provides Human Resource Services; Hennepin County provides Legal Services and Metropolitan Council provides Fiscal Services.

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Services provided by the Metropolitan Council shall end on August 31st, 2005; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has been requested to take over the fiscal services function starting on September 1st, 2005.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Washington County shall assume the duty of providing Fiscal Services for MESB effective September 1st, 2005.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the services to be provided shall be limited to processing, recording and reporting all MESB financial transactions authorized and funded by the MESB.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County will not assume financial obligation for any MESB financial activities that encumber or cause liabilities above MESB appropriations or assets; and that Washington County funds will not be allocated or appropriated to subsidize or assume financial responsibilities of the MESB.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County Financial Services is hereby designated as the department responsible for fulfilling the obligation of providing the financial services for MESB.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Cost Recovery for Public Health Nuisance Abatement in Hugo

WHEREAS, on January 20, 2005, the Department of Public Health and Environment (Department) conducted an inspection at 13891 Forest Boulevard North in the City of Hugo, PID #29.031.21.22.0001, (the Site) and observed and documented an accumulation of uncontained putrescribe garbage and debris improperly stored in various locations on the grounds and within the unoccupied and unsecured structures; and

WHEREAS, on January 26, 2005, the Department issued a Notice and Abatement Order to parties responsible for the Site pursuant to Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165, section 6.6, stating that a Public Health Nuisance exists at the Site as a result of the conditions found on January 20, 2005, and requiring the abatement of the Public Health Nuisance; and

WHEREAS, the January 26, 2005 Notice stated if the responsible parties failed to abate the Public Health Nuisance in accordance with the Abatement Order, that the Department would take action to abate the Public Health Nuisance pursuant to Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165, section 6.10, and that the Department would pursue reimbursement of the costs incurred for the enforcement action pursuant to Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165, section 8.1; and

WHEREAS, on February 1, 2005, the Department conducted a follow-up inspection at the Site and found further violations of Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165; and

WHEREAS, on February 22, 2005, the Department issued a Notice and Amended Abatement Order to parties responsible for the Site, pursuant to Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165, section 6.6, stating that a Public Health Nuisance exists at the Site as a result of the conditions found on January 20, 2005 and February 1, 2005, and requiring the abatement of the Public Health Nuisance; and

WHEREAS, the February 22, 2005 Notice stated if the responsible parties failed to abate the Public Health Nuisance in accordance with the Abatement Order, that the Department would take action to abate the Public Health Nuisance pursuant to Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165, section 6.10, and that the Department would pursue reimbursement of the costs incurred for the enforcement action pursuant to Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165, section 8.1; and

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2005, the Department conducted an inspection at the Site and observed and documented that the Public Health Nuisance had not been abated by the deadline of March 10, 2005 as stated in the Amended Order; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2005, a Washington County Department of Corrections Sentence to Serve Crew conducted abatement activities at the site pursuant to Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165, section 6.10, thereby abating the Public Health Nuisance; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has incurred expenses of \$1,831.27 for abatement supplies, waste disposal, and staff time; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Public Health Nuisance Ordinance #165, section 8.1, provides for the County Board to recover the costs of an enforcement action by assessing the costs against the real property on which the Public Health Nuisance was located.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the County Auditor and the Department of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections to recover the county's expenses to abate the Public Health Nuisance, by placing an assessment of \$1,831.27 on the tax roll of the real property at 13891 Forest Boulevard North in the City of Hugo, PID #29.031.21.22.0001, legal description as follows:

All that part of the North ½ of the Northwest ¼ of Section 29, Township 31, Range 21, described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the South line of said tract and the East line of State Highway 61, as now widened to 111 feet; thence North 11 degrees 51 minutes East, along said Highway line a distance of 501.4 feet to the actual point of beginning of the tract to be 267

described; thence Easterly and parallel with the South line of said North ½ of NW ¼ a distance of 400 feet; thence Northerly at right angles to last course a distance of 357.26 feet; thence Westerly and parallel with the South line of said North ½ of NW ¼ a distance of 325.23 feet to its intersection with East line of State Highway No. 61, as now widened to 111 feet; thence South 11 degrees 51 minutes West along said Highway line a distance of 365.0 feet to the actual point of beginning, containing 2.97 acres, more or less, according to the United States Government survey thereof.

WASHINGTON COUNTY LIBRARY

Library Board Duties and Responsibilities

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-120 as follows:

Washington County Board Duties and Responsibilities

WHEREAS, the governance of the Washington County Library has been given to the Washington County Board of Commissioners pursuant to Minnesota Session Laws 2005, Chapter 13, and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners has accepted the Governance of the Washington County Library by Resolution 2005-043 passed on March 22, 2005, and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners is required to appoint a Library Board as advisory to the County Board and to delegate to said board such duties and responsibilities relating to the Library as it deems advisable.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners, under the authority provided in Minnesota Session Laws 2005, Chapter 13, hereby delegates to the Washington County Library Board the following duties and responsibilities:

- The Library Board shall annually review the proposed operating and capital budgets of the Library Department and shall submit comments thereon to the Washington County Board of Commissioners in sufficient time to permit consideration prior to the adoption of budgets by the County Board.
- 2. The Library Board shall annually review long-range plans for the Washington County Library and provide a report to the Washington County Board of Commissioners in sufficient time to permit consideration prior to the adoption of the Capital Improvement Plan and budgets by the County Board.
- The Library Board shall develop policies and procedures for the operation and administration of the Washington County Library to be submitted to the County Board for its approval.
- 4. The Washington County Library Board is authorized to accept gifts to the Washington County Library on behalf of Washington County.
- The Library Board shall have sole authority and discretion in maintaining and developing collection of the Library within budget approved by the County Board.
- 6. The Library Board shall be responsible for the use and scheduling of Library meeting rooms.

Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford absent.

Library Board By-Laws

Pat Conley, Library Board Director, indicated that the Library Board reviewed and adopted the By-Laws last evening, but raised a question about the open meeting laws. She indicated that it is the opinion of the County Attorney that that language be reinserted in Article IV relating to meetings to indicate that the Library Board will follow the open meeting law.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt the Library Board By-Laws with the addition of the Open Meeting Law statement. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford absent.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

Dan Papin, Community Services Director, presented an overview of a proposed contract with Blue Plus whereby Washington County will provide care coordination services to enrollees of the Blue Plus Minnesota Senior Health Options Program. Blue Plus will reimburse the county at the current rate of \$90 an hour, the

same amount that the Department of Human Services has been paying. They will also reimburse the county for the long-term care consultations. 180 Blue Plus enrollees are expected to begin this program. Mr. Papin indicated there is a cancellation clause of 130 days in case this proposal does not work. Staff will also evaluate this project on a regular basis to determine whether or not it is working.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve a contract with Blue Plus, a Minnesota Health Maintenance Organization, for Washington County to provide care coordination services for enrollees of the Blue Plus Minnesota Senior Health Options Program. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Lake Elmo Library Lease Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, updated the Board on the proposed Lake Elmo Library lease. The county has been working with the property owners, Mr. and Mrs. Lee, and also with the City of Lake Elmo, to try and explore options for covering the cost of the necessary building improvements. Originally, the county had approximately \$30,000 allocated in the library fund for these improvements. Later, it was determined that the costs would be closer to \$60,000. Staff started to have informal conversations with the City of Lake Elmo who indicated an interest in contributing something to the cost of that remodeling. As plans were developed, more things needed to be done in terms of bringing the building up to code and fire protection. They received the final architectural drawings last week and a contractor estimated that improvements would cost \$117,000. Yesterday they met with the Lees, Lake Elmo Mayor and City Administrator and they feel that by having the building owners do the improvements that they could get it done based on an estimate that they have for approximately \$90,000. If the county were to cover that whole \$90,000 as part of the lease agreement over a five-year period that would result in a per square foot cost of about \$20.50 and that would not include utilities or maintenance. The City has indicated that if the County Board is willing to move forward or develop the lease with the Lees that they would take to their city council a proposal to make a financial contribution that would help buy down costs.

Dean Johnston, Mayor, City of Lake Elmo, addressed the Board as an individual and not on behalf of the council. He believes, and is fully prepared to advocate to the City Council, that Lake Elmo would pick up \$30,000 of the \$90,000 cost for the library repairs. A special meeting of the City Council has been set for Thursday afternoon in order to address this issue. They are concerned about losing the current site that is under consideration. He feels that a library in Lake Elmo is very important to their community. He encouraged the Board to move forward on this issue and the city will move forward as quickly as this week if it will help the process along.

Commissioner Peterson indicated there had been discussion of a new Lake Elmo City Hall and the library going into the existing city hall. She asked what the time frame was on that proposal. Mayor Johnston indicated there is no schedule. A new city hall was bonded for and the funds have been sitting in the bank for almost a year. The problem they had was finding an appropriate site and that maybe anywhere from immediate to three years depending on how they proceed with the development of the Old Village.

Mr. Schug stated that was an option discussed with the City on a number of occasions. One thing that may come forward, if the county moves in the direction of a lease, would be that in order to recover the investment there would need to be a longer term lease than the 3-year lease under discussion. A long-term lease with the Lees for that facility would mean that the county wouldn't be in a position to take advantage of the space that might become available in the current city hall building.

Mr. Johnston indicated that the City of Lake Elmo places a high priority on getting a library. He knows if the county felt it was necessary to sign a longer lease that the City would find a way to make sure that the old city hall was available upon termination of the lease.

Financial Policies

Jane Harper, Principal Planner, presented revisions to the County Financial Policies.

Commissioner Hegberg suggested a change to Fund Balance, Policy No. 2701 to remove the word "sufficient" from Guidelines A.

Commissioner Peterson suggested a change to Fund Definitions Policy No. 2703, Capital Repair Fund 411, by adding "This fund does not provide revenue for other capital projects such as the Historic Courthouse, transportation facilities and parks."

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve the revised Financial Policies as amended. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Stafford absent.

Oak Park Heights and City of Stillwater Campus Detachment Agreement

Mr. Schug advised the Board that the detachment agreement of the land south of the Government Center and also around the campus from the City of Oak Park Heights to the City of Stillwater for future campus development was approved by the City of Oak Park Heights two weeks ago and last Tuesday, the City of Stillwater approved the agreement. Staff is working on clarifying and proofing the legal descriptions of the parcels and they expect to bring it to the County Board for approval in the near future.

A Resolution Creating Redevelopment Project No. 2 and Adopting a Redevelopment Plan Relating Thereto, and Creating Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-1 and Adopting A Tax Increment Financing Plan Relating Thereto

BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Commissioners (the "Board") of the County of Washington, Minnesota (the "County"), as follows:

Section 1. Recitals.

- 1.01. It has been proposed and approved by the Housing and Redevelopment Authority in and for the County of Washington (the "Authority") that the Board approve the creation of Redevelopment Project No. 2 (the "Project Area") and adopt a Redevelopment Plan relating thereto, pursuant to and in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Sections 469.001 to 469.047 and Laws of Minnesota 1974 chapter 475, inclusive, as amended and supplemented from time to time.
- 1.02. It has been further proposed and approved by the Authority that the Board approve the creation of Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-1 (the "TIF District") within the Project Area and approve and adopt a Tax Increment Financing Plan (the "TIF Plan") relating thereto pursuant to and in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Sections 469.174 to 469.179, 469.001 to 469.047 and Laws of Minnesota 1974 chapter 475, inclusive, as amended and supplemented from time to time.
- 1.03. The Authority has caused to be prepared, and this Board has investigated the facts with respect thereto, a Redevelopment Plan for the Project Area and a TIF Plan for the TIF District defining more precisely the property to be included, the public costs to be incurred and other matters relating thereto.
- 1.04. The Authority and the Board have performed all actions required by law to be performed prior to the approval and adoption of the Redevelopment Plan and TIF Plan.
- 1.05. The Board hereby determines that it is necessary and in the best interests of the County and the Authority at this time at this time, to create the Project Area and approve and adopt the Redevelopment Plan relating thereto and to create the TIF District and to approve and adopt the TIF Plan relating thereto.

Section 2. Findings.

- 2.01. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the assistance to be provided through the adoption and implementation of the Redevelopment Plan and TIF Plan (collectively the "Plans") are necessary to assure the development and redevelopment of the Project Area.
- 2.02. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Plans conform to the general plan for the development and redevelopment of the County as a whole in that they are consistent with the County 's comprehensive plan.
- 2.03. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Plans afford maximum opportunity consistent with the sound needs of the County as a whole for the development and redevelopment of the Project Area by private enterprise and it is contemplated that the development and redevelopment thereof will be carried out pursuant to redevelopment contracts with private developers.
- 2.04. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the approval and adoption of the Plans is intended and, in the judgment of this Board, its effect will be to promote the purposes and objectives specified in this Section 2 and otherwise promote certain public purposes and accomplish certain objectives as specified in the Plans.

- 2.05. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the TIF District constitutes a "tax increment financing district" as defined in Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subd. 9, and further constitutes a "redevelopment district" as defined in Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subd. 10.
- 2.06. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the proposed development or redevelopment in the TIF District, in the opinion of this Board, would not reasonably be expected to occur solely through private investment within the reasonably foreseeable future and, therefore, the use of tax increment financing is deemed necessary.
- 2.07. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Housing and Redevelopment Authority in and for the City of Oakdale, Minnesota has determined that there is a need for the Authority to proceed with the redevelopment of the Whispering Oaks Mobile Home Park and has forwarded its recommendation to the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Oakdale (the "City").
- 2.08. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Council of the City has conducted a public hearing on the need for redevelopment of the Whispering Oaks Mobile Home Park and the Council has authorized the Authority to proceed with the redevelopment of the Whispering Oaks Mobile Home Park.
- 2.09. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the County made the above findings stated in this Section 2 and has set forth the reasons and supporting facts for each determination in the Plans and Exhibit A to this Resolution.
- Section 3. Approvals and Adoptions.
- 3.01. The creation of the Project Area and the adoption of the Redevelopment Plan relating thereto are hereby approved by the Board of the County.
- 3.02. The creation of the TIF District within the Project Area and the adoption of the TIF Plan relating thereto are hereby approved by the Board of the County.
- Section 4. Filing of Plans.
- 4.01. Upon approval and adoption of the Plans, the Board shall request the Authority to cause said Plans to be filed with the Minnesota Department of Revenue and the Office of the State Auditor.
- 4.02. The County Auditor is requested to certify the original net tax capacity and the original local tax rate of the TIF District, as described in the TIF Plan, and to certify in each year thereafter the amount by which the original net tax capacity of the TIF District has increased or decreased. The Authority is authorized and directed to forthwith transmit this request to the County Auditor in such form and content as the County Auditor may specify, together with a list of all properties within the TIF District for which building permits have been issued during the 18 months immediately preceding the adoption of this resolution

EXHIBIT A TO RESOLUTION NO. 2005-121

he reasons and facts supporting the findings for the TIF Plan for the TIF District pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.175, Subdivision 3, are as follows:

1. Finding that the Proposed TIF District is a "redevelopment district" as defined in Minnesota Statutes.

The TIF District consists of a single parcel of land. It has been determined that 70% of this site is occupied by buildings, streets, utilities, paved or gravel parking lots or similar structures as required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subdivision 10. Additionally, the parcel contains a single structure which has been determined to be structurally substandard as also defined in Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subdivision 10, and further satisfies the requirement that over 50% of buildings, not including outbuildings, must be found "structurally substandard". These findings and the conclusion that the TIF District qualifies under the statutory criteria and formulas for a redevelopment tax increment financing district are further described in a report prepared by LHB Engineers & Architects dated June 10, 2005.

2. Finding that the proposed development or redevelopment, in the opinion of the Board, would not reasonably be expected to occur solely through private investment within the reasonably foreseeable future and, therefore, the use of tax increment financing is deemed necessary.

County staff has reviewed the estimated redevelopment costs which include acquisition, demolition, relocation, infrastructure improvements, site preparation and environmental remediation and the available methods of financing, and has determined that tax increment assistance is necessary to make the redevelopment project economically feasible.

3. Finding that the increased market value of the site that could reasonably be expected to occur without the use of tax increment financing would be less than the increase in market value estimated to result from the proposed development after subtracting the present value of the projected tax increments for the maximum duration of the Proposed TIF District permitted by the Proposed TIF Plan.

County staff has determined that without tax increment assistance the project would remain tax exempt and continue to operate as a manufactured home park. This continued operation would, however, require a substantial capital investment in infrastructure resulting in an estimated market value for the existing manufactured home park of \$1,750,000. After deducting the original market value of \$1,275,500 from this estimated market value, County staff has further determined that the increased market value that could reasonably be expected to occur from a project receiving no tax increment assistance would be approximately \$474,500.

County staff has further determined that with tax increment assistance it is possible to construct approximately 151 units of housing with an estimated market value of \$28,250,000. After deducting the original market value of \$1,275,500 from the estimated market value of \$28,250,000, County staff has further determined that the increased market value that could reasonably be expected to occur from a project receiving tax increment assistance would be approximately \$26,974.500.

County staff has further determined that the total amount of tax increment generated from the project using tax increment assistance over the 25 year term of the TIF District approximates \$8,857,815. Assuming the same term and a present value rate of 6.0%, which is assumed to be the bond rate for financial analysis, the present value of \$8,857,815 approximates \$3,374,050. After deducting the present value of the tax increment (\$3,374,050) from the increase in estimated market value occurring as a result of utilizing tax increment assistance (\$26,974,500), the net increase in estimated market values approximates \$23,600,450.

County staff has further determined that the increase in the market value of the site that could reasonably be expected to occur without the use of tax increment financing (\$474,500) is less than the increase in the market value estimated to result from the proposed development after subtracting the present value of the projected tax increments for the maximum duration of the district permitted by the TIF Plan (\$23,600,450). Further information supporting this Finding is attached as Schedule 1.

4. Finding that the TIF Plan conforms to the general plan for the development or redevelopment of the county as a whole.

The Housing and Redevelopment Authority and the County Board have reviewed the TIF Plan and determined that it conforms to the comprehensive plan of the County.

5. Finding that the TIF Plan will afford maximum opportunity, consistent with the sound needs of the County as a whole, for the development or redevelopment of the Project Area by private enterprise.

The redevelopment activities for this TIF District include site acquisition, demolition and removal of structures, site preparation, installation of public improvements, resolution of environmental issues and construction of approximately 151 units of housing in 2007 and 2008. Upon completion of the project, it is anticipated that the County's tax base will increase by approximately \$26,974,500.

6. Finding that the expenditure of tax increment serves a primarily public purpose.

The expenditure of tax increment is not intended as a private benefit, and any such benefit is incidental. The principal intent for the tax increment expenditures includes the removal of impediments to the redevelopment described in the Plans. These activities include demolition and removal of existing structures, relocation of existing tenants and replacement of substandard or insufficient infrastructure. Among the public benefits are (i) the development of housing units for the County (ii) the utilization of existing infrastructure including sanitary sewer, water and roads; (iii) the utilization of existing capital improvements including school, parks, community center and an approximate 22 times increase in the County's current market value for this site.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

Patrick Singel, Community Services Deputy Director, advised the Board that Governor Pawlenty declared Wednesday, July 27, 2005 as County Financial Worker and Case Aide Day in Minnesota. Mr. Singel provided a brief overview and recognition of the work of financial workers in Washington County.

Commissioner Hegberg declared that Monday, August 8, 2005 would be Financial Worker and Case Aide Day in Washington County. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING - TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

St. Croix Valley Trail Master Plan

The County Board Chair presented a brief overview of the procedures to be followed in today's public hearing to receive comments on the draft St. Croix Valley Trail Master Plan. The Board Secretary indicated that the notice of public hearing was published and a copy was made a part of the record.

Jeff Shoenbauer, Brauer and Associates, Ltd. reviewed the draft of the St. Croix Valley Trail plan.

Gregory Fisher, 4504 Parsons Court South, Afton – Mr. Fisher stated his property backs up to the St. Croix Valley Trail and he is concerned about old oak trees located on his property and that care be taken with them when the trail is constructed. He feels that if the trail is too close to them they will be killed. He does not have a problem with the trail, but fifteen years from now he wants the assurances that are made today to still be in effect.

Dorian Grilley, 214 Park Avenue, Mahtomedi – Mr. Grilley is the Executive Director of the Parks and Trails Council and his comments today are his own and not that of the group. He supports the St. Croix Valley Trail Master Plan. Biking is an opportunity for youth and everyone to be more physically active. He believes the county staff and the consultant have done a good job in balancing the needs of the population and the local land owners. The concept of linking Afton State Park, St. Croix Bluffs Regional Park, the Carpenter Nature Center and Point Douglas Park is a wonderful idea. It also makes sense to continue to develop CR 21 with six foot shoulders.

Paul Mohrbacher, 15220 66th Street South, Denmark Township – Mr. Mohrbacher is also concerned about his oak trees. He does not want the trail to extend 30 to 40 feet on to his property with an 8 to 10 foot trail that may do damage to his oak trees. He believes this trail will have a negative effect on his property and property value. He does not believe it is a good idea to connect the parks. He uses all those parks but does not need them connected by a trail. He questioned the steep grades on CR 21 and doesn't see children and young families using that. He uses bike trails along riverbeds, but does not advocate that people's lands are seized to make a trail. He hopes that the people who bought land out here are respected.

Tony Sieben, 15057 87th Street, Denmark Township – Mr. Sieben stated sometime ago that trails used by almost anyone are not maintained. He has walked the trails west of Hastings in the morning and there is no patrolling on that trail. That's an urban trail. Denmark Township is rural, has been rural and would like to stay rural. Now it is getting urbanized by the Metropolitan Council. He has one acre in Denmark Township on 87th Street and trucks travel on that road from 7:00 in the morning until 6:00 in the evening. 87th Street should not be considered in this plan.

Jim Fitzpatrick, 12805 St. Croix Trail South, Denmark Township – Mr. Fitzpatrick is currently the Chair of the Denmark Township Board of Supervisors. They met last night and reaffirmed the resolution of support for the trail and that it include a comment that it does not support any condemnation efforts. The Township would like it maintained that it is a willing seller. He is also here for the Carpenter Nature Center and has been involved with the process from the first day. The Nature Center does stand in favor of the trail. Their Board of Directors has to pass a resolution. They have a draft and have given it to county staff.

Vik Wilson, 906 North 4th Street, Stillwater – Mr. Wilson supports the St. Croix Valley Trail Master Plan and other bicycle and recreational opportunities in the county. He understands there are individuals who are worried about their property and trees. He hopes that county staff will remain sensitive to those things and find solutions that take care of those concerns but still carry this trail forward in the future.

John Pontius, 13085 St. Croix Trail South, Hastings – Mr. Pontius stated that he lives on CR 21. He has concerns that have been identified this morning. He is concerned about condemnation. He is also concerned about the word "willing sellers". He does not want the weight of 20,000 bikers on his shoulders because he

is not willing to be a willing seller. That weighs heavily on his mind. He asked why there isn't an alternative plan for CR 21. There are numerous accidents on that road. As landowners, he believes they should be considered. He is not against a bike trail, but if his property is condemned and if the county insists on going on the river then he is opposed to it.

Floyd Keller, 467 South Fifth, Bayport – Mr. Keller stated that he and his wife are bikers. He supports the trail. They are increasingly biking on trails for safety reasons. They like trails that go somewhere.

John Baird, 5732 Norwich Circle, Oak Park Heights – Mr. Baird stated that he and his wife donated a mile of trail easement through their property for the Gateway Trail. He believes there is no time like the present to establish the trail system and in the best of all worlds all the trails would connect together. He feels that trails and parks system is an essential part of establishing a sense of community. Mr. Baird's written comments were placed on the record.

Ralph Larson, 474 South 5th Street, Bayport – Mr. Larson stated he cannot add more to what the proponents for the trail have stated except he is disappointed that it will take so long. He asked that it be accelerated.

Paul Mosby, W 12821 720th Avenue, River Falls, WI – Mr. Mosby is an owner of about six acres of heavily wooded property with 450 feet water front. The north part of his property is due east directly across the St. Croix from the Conference Center at St. Croix Bluffs Regional Park. He, as others who have spoken, is here because they care about this area. He has unique concerns. The problem he has with putting a recreational trail on the rail bed is its proximity to the water. He is involved with a public process with the review and amendment of land use and water surface regulations on the Lower St. Croix. He feels that placing this proposed trail close to the water is in direct violation of the Lower St. Croix Cooperative Management Plan for Land Use on the Lower St. Croix. He believes it is also in violation of state and local government regulations. Increasingly over the years in winter months there are a number of snowmobilers and ATV users who come off of the St. Croix, or the proposed trail, and come on to private property. He is concerned about that.

Leonard David, Point Douglas Marina, 2300 Bantus Point Road, Wayzata – Mr. David is one of the owners of the Point Douglas Marina. He has concerns about the proximity of the water and the difficult terrain through their area. He is not opposed to trails or recreation, people staying fit or the community gathering together. It's been stated that Denmark Township and others would not support condemnation. It hasn't been said that condemnation would not be allowed. It's been said at different meetings that they want a 50 foot easement through their property. That would greatly diminish the value of their property. At the Township and informational meetings public input was asked for, but nothing was changed in the master plan. The owners of Point Douglas Marina and others weren't happy with a lot of the trespass they assume will happen if this trail does go through there. He does not believe their property is the best place for the trail. There are people using the rail bed, which is private property, now. They just trespass their property

and are making footpaths and bike paths up and down the steep slopes. He cannot imagine how bad that would get if another 2,000 people a week are introduced through that area.

Peter Seed, 5009 Lake Avenue, White Bear Lake – Mr. Seed stated that for 30 years he had lived in Grant. He believes that there is a tremendous obligation not only to serve our present desires, but the needs and desires of future generations to come. This is an appeal on behalf of the next generations to move forward with the Master Plan. For thirty years they lived adjacent to the Soo Line Railroad and they did have a hand in persuading the State to acquire the Gateway Trail. Many of the concerns that adjacent property owners here have expressed were expressed at the time that great undertaking began. He wants to appeal to those adjacent property owners to reserve judgment and not over react. The experience they had was that they never had any trespassers. When it came time to sell their property they found out that the value of their property had increased significantly because of the Gateway Trail.

John Augustine, 6837 Thames Road, Woodbury – Mr. Augustine works at the family business, Afton Alps. He echoed the comments that someone made earlier that it is disappointing that despite all the testimony given at other meetings that the Master Plan does not appear to have changed. He stated that as the Master Plan is proposed it is not workable through their property. The consultant also stated today that it would not work because it is right through the heart of their commercial enterprise. It's possible if somebody would have approached them there might be some property that could be used. Now the consultant says that maybe 15 years down the road the situation might change, the business might not be viable and would be turned into housing so they would like to hang on to this dream. He is disturbed that planners seem to want to hang on to this dream that this business would disappear at some point so that this trail could be realized. They are not going to disappear, so the dream that this plan go along Trout Brook will not happen. He believes the trail should stay along CR 21 and then there are areas in the south where that might not work.

Leslie Thomas, 33579 St. Croix Trail South, Afton – Ms. Thomas has two concerns. The first concern is property value. There have been studies that if there is a bike trail across the street or a block away the statistics say the value will increase. However, there's been studies and statistics to the opposite that if there is a bike trail that is right on your property or right adjacent to it property values go down because of traffic and vandalism. Her other concern is that she and her neighbors' homes are very close to the road. The easement allowed for the bike trail is well within the city's right to take that easement, but she does not believe it is right. In some instances her neighbors would walk right out the front door on to the bike trail. She believes adjustments need to be made and suggests not using the full easement; or, reduce the size of the normally required easement for the bike trail in front of the homes that are downtown and close to the road. She also suggested sharing the burden of the bike trail with the neighbors across St. Croix Trail, to adjust the road so that half of the easement would be taken from us and half from the other side of the road.

Jyneen Thatcher, 12999 Keller Avenue, May Township – Ms. Thatcher stated when her and her husband moved into the county 12 years ago, the main reason was because of the county's support of recreational

facilities, especially the opportunities to bike and ski in the county. Her bike club has worked with the county parks in some of the winter programming over the past several years. She has provided written comments and encourages the Board to adopt the Master Plan.

The Board Chair indicated that she has received three comment cards from individuals who did not wish to speak: Mary Hauser, Birchwood – Supports the plan but feels it is too far in the future; Need to acquire right-of-way on CR 21 where it is less than 100 feet as soon as possible. Helen Myers, Stillwater – Supports the trails for non-motorized uses. Tom Dwight, Mahtomedi – Supports bike trails and indicated they have not been a problem to adjoining property owners.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously. The public hearing was closed at 10:40 a.m.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he supports the trails. Placing trails in the beginning is difficult, but over time it has generally worked out. This is a different public hearing than the hearing for the Gateway Trail and the Forest Lake Trail because in those instances people said that the bikers and walkers were going to break into the houses, take the TV's and go back to the trail and haul them back to the cities. They found over the years that that has not taken place. The values have actually gone up, as Mr. Seed indicated. He will support the plan and recognizes that it will take a number of years to implement it. Hopefully it will be willing sellers but in thirty years there might be one or two spots that would have to be dealt with in a different manner.

Commissioner Stafford indicated he will also support the plan. He supports a linear park system and the ability to bike from one park system to another. He does not agree with staff that time is in the county's favor. He wants to remind folks that in fifteen years there will not be 210,000 people in Washington County there will be 300,000 with vested interest in whatever piece of land they own and it's better to get these things done early on. The problems with the oak trees are real, but there are remedies if the people and staff work together on how those trails are made out. In Woodbury there is a massive, comprehensive and highly successful trail system within the city. It evolved because it was part of a planning process. They have solved some of the vandalism problems, and there wasn't a lot. He agrees with the comment on what it does to the value of homes. He indicated that Woodbury has a volunteer patrol system for their trails. That might be a possibility. He has had complaints from individuals in the same area represented here about the traffic and safety problems they have with bikers now because they are using the roads. He sees the trails as an improvement to the esthetics as well as the safety. To use eminent domain, the county would have to show the courts that it is in the best public interest.

Commissioner Kriesel stated he will support the Master Trail plan as long as it framed in the context of a willing seller approach. He would like to see an alternative defined down by the Carpenter Nature Center so there is no misunderstanding in the future that there is an alternative. Trails and parks are such a highly

valued component of the reason why we live in Washington County. It's a quality of life issue and there will be greater and greater demand for those recreational areas. There are a lot of details that need to be worked out regarding safety and protection of forestry, but he is confident that the county can adequately build this trail to protect those environmental concerns.

Commissioner Peterson indicated she would also be supporting this trail. The county has looked at this trail, as well as its entire trail systems, as a plan for a spine and that the ribs and connectivity to local parks and neighborhoods will be developed by the communities that adjoin that spine. They will occur as properties develop and as the needs arise. She looks at this as a plan for the future, and some have indicated that they would like that future sooner rather than later, and in some instances that will be done. As roads need to be improved the county will be looking at how a segment of that trail can be built sooner than later. This is a good plan and the process has been very thoughtful. Contrary to what some people have said, she has seen changes in the plan, they may not be monumental but they certainly have been considered and there have been changes made because of the comments.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-123 as follows:

St. Croix Valley Trail Master Plan

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Council Parks and Open Space Commission urged Washington County to evaluate the feasibility of a trail from the City of Afton to Point Douglas Park and propose an alignment near the St. Croix River that links parks and natural areas, and

WHEREAS, Washington County's Linear Parks master plan proposes a trail within a search area from the City of Afton to Point Douglas Park, but does not indicate a specific alignment, and

WHEREAS, there are several public parks and natural areas containing portions of a former railroad right-of-way which provide views and access to the Federally and State designated Wild and Scenic St. Croix river, and

WHEREAS, a trail linking these public parks and natural areas along the St. Croix River would benefit the residents and visitors to Washington County and the State of Minnesota, and would be of regional and state-wide significance.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves the St. Croix Valley Trail Master Plan and forwards the plan to the Metropolitan Council for review and approval to become part of the Metropolitan Regional Trail System.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

The Board took a recess at 10:50 a.m.

The Board reconvened at 11:00 a.m.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Roundabouts as a Design Alternative

Commissioner Stafford moved to approve the use of roundabouts as a design alternative for intersections on county roads and approved Amendment No. 2 to the HR Green contract for additional design services in the amount of \$109,492 for the Radio Drive Safety and Mobility Project. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Stillwater, Oak Park Heights and County Agreement

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve an agreement between the City of Stillwater, the City of Oak Park Heights and the County of Washington for development of the campus of the Washington County Government Center. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Lease Agreement for Library Facility in Lake Elmo

Reduction in Tipping Fee

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-126 as follows:

Reduce the Tipping Fee for Haulers with All Waste Delivery Agreements to \$34.00 Per Ton

WHEREAS, Section II.F. of the All Waste Delivery Agreement establishes a \$38 per ton tipping fee for haulers delivering waste to the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Facility; and

WHEREAS, because of changed circumstances in the solid waste market place, the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project Board recommended to the respective County Boards a reduction in the tipping fee for All Waste haulers to \$34 per ton; and

WHEREAS, such reduction in the tipping fee must be accomplished through an amendment to the All Waste Agreement; and

WHEREAS, further adjustment of the tipping fee maybe necessary to address the changing dynamics of the solid waste market place.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, The Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby approves a tipping fee for haulers that have entered into All Waste Delivery Agreements at \$34.00 per ton, effective August 15, 2005, through the term of the agreements, subject to the right of the County, in its sole discretion, to further lower the tipping fee or to raise the tipping fee up to the amounts established in Section II-F of the All Waste Delivery Agreements prior to this amendment, through action of the County Board but without the necessity of amending the All Waste Delivery Agreements; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Director of the Washington County Public Health and Environment Department to execute amendments to All Waste Delivery Agreements containing these provisions in a form approved by the County Attorney.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent.

Resource Recovery Project's 2006 and 2007 Operating Budget

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-127 as follows:

Ramsey/Washington Resource Recovery Project Budget for 2006 and 2007

WHEREAS, the Joint Powers Agreement for Resource Recovery provides that authority for approval of Resource Recovery Project budgets remains with the respective County Boards; and

WHEREAS, the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project Board has prepared and recommended a proposed Project budget for 2006 and 2007; and

WHEREAS, Ramsey and Washington Counties, in order to accomplish environmental and public health goals, have each contracted with waste haulers to assure the delivery of waste to the Facility through July, 2007, at a reduced tipping fee; and

WHEREAS, the County Board has authorized amending the All Waste Delivery Agreements to reduce the tipping fee to \$34.00 per ton.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent.

ASSESSMENT, TAXPAYER SERVICES AND ELECTIONS

Kevin Corbid, Director of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections, presented a brief history of today's request to consider repurchase applications from Robert Beale for tax forfeited property located in Oakdale and Lake Elmo. The previous owner, Cheryl Hilyar, has assigned her repurchase rights to Mr. Beale through an agreement signed on July 21, 2005. The agreement consists of the following items: 1) Ms. Hilyar agrees to assign her rights to repurchase to Mr. Beale; 2) Mr. Beale submits the repurchase applications to the County and includes the payment of past due taxes, penalties, interest, and fees as well as administrative costs incurred by the County; 3) Ms. Hilyar provides to Mr. Beale the roughly \$12,000 she paid to the County (and since refunded back to Ms. Hilyar) at the time the first repurchase application was submitted; 4) Ms. Hilyar agrees to take action to satisfy the federal and state tax liens on the properties; and, 5) Mr. Beale, upon resale of the property, agrees to pay Ms. Hilyar \$100,000 for each property, minus any costs incurred by the County for cleanup of the property and paid by Mr. Beale at the repurchase.

Mr. Corbid indicated that the current conditions of the properties are as follows: Lake Elmo – Currently a vacant lot, the abandoned well has been sealed and septic tanks crushed and filled; Oakdale – Not in as bad of shape as the Lake Elmo property, but there has been a history of city code violations at the property. The County Board has several options to consider including the following: Statute allows the previous owner the right to submit a repurchase application, however, the County Board has discretion on whether or not to approve repurchase; The County Board should consider whether the repurchase application will correct a hardship or injustice that has occurred because of the forfeiture and whether the repurchase will promote and best serve the public interest. The repurchase applications were reviewed by the County's Finance Committee last week and they recommended that the County Board deny the repurchase applications. If that is position the County Board takes today, the department will move forward in preparing the properties for sale or reconveyance to another party. The biggest obstacle to that would be tax liens that currently exist on the two properties of nearly \$500,000.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to deny the repurchase applications by Robert Beale for the following tax forfeited properties: 827 Greenway Avenue North, Oakdale and 8961 37th Street, Lake Elmo. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion. The Board discussed this motion.

Robert Beale, applicant, asked the County Board why they are denying the repurchase application and he would like to know what the Board's position is on the takings clause of the Minnesota Constitution, and also the Federal Constitution which states in the Fifth Amendment that no private property will be taken for public use without just compensation. He asked what the county intends to do with the proceeds of the sale of the property, assuming that the liens are taken care of. He believes the properties were assessed at somewhere near \$500,000. He requested if the properties are going to be taken and used for public use, just compensation be provided to the owner.

Mr. Corbid stated that the process for the tax forfeiture, as it's laid out in Minnesota Statute, is that if a property owner fails to pay their property taxes over a period of years the property goes into a forfeiture status and the title and ownership of the property reverts to the State of Minnesota. The property is currently owned by the State of Minnesota and managed by Washington County. If a property goes to sale and there are proceeds from the sale, Minnesota State Statute outlines how the proceeds are distributed amongst the taxing jurisdictions. If this property goes to sale and repurchase application is not approved, there are no funds to reimburse the local units of government for the back taxes, penalties and fees that it has lost so the sale proceeds are distributed in a manner that compensates those governments for its loss of tax revenue over that period of time. As to the question of denial of the property, Mr. Beale and the attorney for Ms. Hilyar asked the same question when he made them aware of the Finance Committee's recommendation for denial, and the discussion can best be characterized that the Finance Committee looked at the history of both properties, the history they've had with the property since it's been forfeited, and came to the conclusion that the two conditions that needed to be met for a repurchase application to be approved could not be met.

Commissioner Stafford stated that if the Minnesota Statutes on the procedure for handling tax forfeited land were unconstitutional they would have been challenged and turned down a long time ago. Mr. Beale used the term taking for a public use, that's not the case. The county is not taking it for a public use, it is taking it and reselling it at a public auction to get it back on the tax roles, it is not taking it for a road or a park or school. Commissioner Stafford indicated he is not sure that selling it back to the former owner is in the best interest of the public, he's not sure that the power of attorney is appropriate, he is not sure that the Federal tax liens could be resolved and that is enough for him to say that they get this over with. The parties interested still have an option to buy at auction. He does not agree with Mr. Beale's figure on the value of the property. The Board is to consider whether the repurchase will promote and best serve the public. He hopes that Mr. Beale is not suggesting to this Board that allowing the prior owner to continue to own property and treat it in a manner that she has in the past ten or twenty years is in the best public interest.

George Kuprian, Assistant County Attorney, stated that Mr. Beale's argument is basically disingenuous. Commissioner Stafford is correct, the County Board is merely following State statutes.

The motion to deny the repurchase applications by Robert Beale for the following tax forfeited properties: 827 Greenway Avenue North, Oakdale and 8961 37th Street, Lake Elmo was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

County Wheelage Tax

Jim Schug, County Administrator, advised the Board that Anoka County has recently passed a resolution initiating a wheelage tax of \$5.00 beginning in 2007. Staff is not looking for action today, but there has

been discussion as to whether or not several counties would be interested in pursuing this as a metropolitan group rather than individual counties. If the County Board is interested, staff could start having discussions with other counties.

It was Board consensus that staff work with other counties in the metropolitan area to determine what they are looking at for a wheelage tax, how it would be implemented and how it would affect each county's budget.

Methamphetamine Testimony

Mr. Schug announced that the National Association of Counties used information pertaining to the impact of the methamphetamine problem and how it affects child protection and child neglect and abuse, provided by Community Services staff, when it testified before the House of Representatives Subcommittee on Criminal Justice, Drug Policy and Human Resources in July.

MCIT 2005 Dividend

Mr. Schug announced that the Minnesota Counties Insurance Trust has issued its 2005 dividend notice. Washington County's portion for Worker's compensation and Property/Casualty was in the amount of \$318,971 which will be placed in the Post Retirement Health Care Fund.

Grant from the Minnesota Department of Transportation

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-131 as follows:

Acceptance of a Minnesota Department of Transportation Local Road Improvement Fund Grant

WHEREAS, Washington County has applied to the Commissioner of Transportation for a grant from the Minnesota State Transportation Fund for construction of Local Road Improvement Project No. SAP 82-612-12-11; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Transportation has given notice that funding for this local road improvement project is available; and

WHEREAS, the amount of the grant has been determined to be \$208,333.00.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby accepts the Minnesota Department of Transportation Local Road Improvement fund grant for the purposes of completing Project No. SAP 82-612-11; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Washington County does hereby agree to the terms and conditions of the grant consistent with Minnesota Statutes, section 174.52, subdivision 5, and will pay any additional amount by which the cost exceeds the estimate, and will return to the Minnesota State Transportation Fund any amount appropriated for the road project, but not required.

Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Update on the Federal Transportation Bill

Wayne Sandberg, Deputy Director of Transportation and Physical Development, reviewed the SAFETEA-LU (Safe, Accountable, Flexible and Efficient Transportation Equity Act – A Legacy for Users) Transportation bill recently passed by Congress. This legislation authorized \$286.5 Billion over six years for federal highways, public transit and road safety projects. Minnesota apportionments are a little over \$3 billion and the distribution to the Metro Area will be based on a formula that is currently being studied. High priority projects for Washington County include the following: \$2.4 million for design and right-of-way for the Broadway Avenue interchange project in Forest Lake; \$4 million for acquisition of right-of-way for TH 36 and the Stillwater Bridge; \$9 million for design, construction and acquisition of right-of-way for the St. Croix River Crossing; \$400,000 for Stillwater Bridge Environmental Assessment of the preferred approach to the St. Croix River Crossing; \$400,000 for design of planned improvement to I-94 frontage road in Woodbury; and \$2 million for corridor studies in the Red Rock, Rush Line and Central Corridors.

Mr. Sandberg recognized and thanked Senators Mark Dayton and Norm Coleman, Sixth District Representative Mark Kennedy, Second District Representative John Kline and Eighth District Representative James Oberstar. He indicated that Congressman Mark Kennedy will be at the Woodbury City Hall at 10:00, the County Government Center at 11:00 and Hugo City Hall at Noon on Friday, August 19, to announce the apportionments of these projects.

Update on the Wakota Bridge Project

Adam Josephson, Minnesota Department of Transportation, presented an update on the Wakota Bridge project. He indicated that they are past the half way point and are in their fourth year of construction. By the end of this year he noted that most of Highway 61 will be completed, except in the 494 interchange where ramp work still needs to be done. Red Rock Road, Glen Road, 7th Avenue, 2nd Street, and St. Paul Park Road have been completed. Along 61, the St. Paul Park interchange on the south end is closed right now, but work is progressing well, and the ramps will open up around Halloween. In the north, the section from 494 up to Carver Avenue there is a lot of work going on there. Northbound 61 has been reduced to one lane and they are half way through that, but they expect to be driving on new pavement in that area and reopen two lanes in each direction. Westbound lanes on 494, closer to Woodbury, have been completed, most of the rest of westbound 494 will be completed by this fall. Once the river bridge is open, all the traffic will be moved over to the westbound side and they will begin tearing down the existing Wakota Bridge as well as rebuilding the eastbound pavement.

Mr. Josephson stated there have been some problems with the bridge. As construction commenced through last fall, hairline cracks began to show up. Cracks in concrete are routine, but the frequency in those cracks raised alarm. Modifications were made to the design last fall while construction continued. It reduced the amount of the problem, but they have to retrofit the segments that were already in place before the corrective actions were taken. That is occurring now. The cracks themselves do not cause a safety problem for the bridge, but they were concerned about the long-term serviceability of the bridge. They expect this bridge to last 75 to 100 years. These hairline cracks are avenues for salt and water to get down into the reinforcing steel and cause problems if left on treated.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the conference he attended in Alaska last week. The conference was for Board of Directors throughout the United States that deal with public employee retirement associations. Concerns discussed were health insurance, Social Security and Medicare.

Commissioner Kriesel reported that he attended the meeting of the St. Croix Alliance which is made up of elected officials from the various communities. Deputy Tim Tuthill and Deb Paige from public health gave a presentation on emergency preparedness and it was very well received. He thanked them for attending.

August 16, 2005

Commissioner Peterson announced that she met with Jay Riggs, Director of the Washington Conservation

District. He is putting forth a new agenda and he is looking forward to having a workshop with the County

Board to explain what he envisions the Conservation District will be doing in Washington County.

Commissioner Peterson reminded the Commissioners that the Association of Minnesota Counties Policy

Committee meetings will be held in New Ulm on August 31 and September 1 and they should get their

reservations in.

County Response to Hurricane Katrina

James Schug, County Administrator, informed the Board that the national associations that the county is involved with, including the National Association of Counties and the National Sheriff's Association are asking all units of government to try and identify resources that might be made available when the time is right, to help out in the Hurricane Katrina disaster. Two specific areas are: 1) Sheriff Pott has had communication about possible resources that might be requested at a later date; and 2) Lowell Johnson, Director of Public Health and Environment has had communication from the Minnesota Department of Health in two areas, provide resources with the resettlement of the evacuees in the Camp Ripley area and for public health nurses. Mr. Schug feels it is too early to provide any direct services because it is not known exactly what is needed and how individuals would be utilized.

Mr. Schug indicated that for individual contributions there are many reputable organizations that are accepting contribution of funds to aid in the disaster relief and every one is encouraged to consider those.

Sheriff Steve Pott advised the Board that they have been asked to provide law enforcement services when requested. The original request was for two person teams in squad cars, which would be self sufficient with food, water, clothing, a tent, and a sleeping bag. What their department can offer when the request comes is not only personnel but the command trailer which is well equipped and is self-sufficient. He believes they can restore some VHF communication for some of the areas. The command trailer is ready to go and can run for weeks on its own and would provide air conditioned shelter for staff and it could be used as a bunk house. He has heard from many of their full time staff that are interested in being deployed and he has also been contacted by some of their volunteers who are willing to go on the county's behalf on their own time.

Sheriff Pott has learned recently that there is an intergovernmental agreement that has to be signed with Minnesota Department of Public Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management. It's a boiler plate contract that he feels will pass through the Attorney's office without any problem. He asked if there would be a way for the Board to authorize the County Administrator to sign the agreement pending

approval of the County Attorney's Office. He feels that would at least make the Sheriff's Office available and it would provide possible reimbursement to the county.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to authorize the County Administrator to sign an intergovernmental agreement with Minnesota Department of Public Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, for county Departments to assist with the Hurricane Katrina disaster, contingent on approval from the Washington County Attorney's Office. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was

adopted unanimously.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg reported he met with Scandia Senior housing. Some residents want to have their heating bills included in their rent because half of the units are that way now. The Washington County

Housing and Redevelopment Authority will be looking at that policy.

Commissioner Peterson reported on the AMC Policy meeting held in New Ulm last week. She is proud to report that the AMC Transportation Committee did stick together, and there still is concern about the billion dollar needs in transportation per year. She also mentioned that the new County Insight Program this month

will be on senior services.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Planner, reviewed the Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) that was prepared for Aggregate Industries proposal to expand its existing limestone quarry on Grey Cloud Island by approximately 116 acres. The proposed expansion is north and northeast of the existing operation and will occur over approximately 20 years. Comments on the EAW were received from the following: Dave Jasper, neighbor; The Washington Conservation District; Metropolitan Council; South Washington Watershed District; and Natural Resources Group, Inc. No commenting agency recommended the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement. Responses to these letters were prepared by Aggregate Industries. Mr. O'Donnell stated that staff believes that this project does not have a potential for significant environmental effects. Staff recommends that the County Board make a negative declaration on the need for an Environmental Impact Statement.

WHEREAS, the Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) dated June, 2005 and revised August, 2005 has been prepared and circulated to the appropriate public agencies and private citizens pursuant to Minnesota Rule 4410.1700; and

WHEREAS, based on the information contained in the EAW, records and files and comments received and responded to in the EAW, the County Board as the RGU concludes the following:

The type, extent and reversibility of environmental effects are similar to effects associated with other mining operations and the project does not have potential for significant environment effects.

No cumulative potential effects of related or anticipated future projects exist that would pose significant environmental effects.

The anticipated environmental effects are subject to by ongoing regulatory authority, including the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, Washington County and Grey Cloud Island Township.

The extent to which environmental effects of the mining operation can be anticipated and controlled as a result of the mining permitting process as required by the Washington County Development Code, Chapter Seven, Mining Regulations, the Grey Cloud Island Town Board and other environmental studies undertaken by public agencies or the project proposer, including other EISes.

WHEREAS, based on the criteria in Minnesota Rule 4410,1770, the project does not have significant environmental effects.

WHEREAS, the Washington County Court Administrator has been responsible for the day to day supervision of the Law Library; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Court Administrator did become an employee of the State of Minnesota on July 1, 2005; and

WHEREAS, the Law Library Board desires to delegate to the Washington County Library Director (Director) the supervision of the library staff and the supervision of the daily operation of the Law Library.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the Director or designee to supervise the law library staff and oversee the operation of the Washington County Law Library, located in the Washington County Government Center in Stillwater, Minnesota.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Director or designee shall be a member of the Law Library Board with full rights, replacing the Washington County Court Administrator.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Law Library Board shall retain the appointment authority for the law librarian.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Law Library Board shall set the annual budget, provide direction on the library collection and control the after hours access authorization.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Director shall supervise the purchase and maintenance of the necessary law library materials, furniture, shelving, equipment, and supplies in a manner consistent with normal Washington County budget and purchasing practices.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Law Library Board shall provide all necessary funding for the operation of the library including library staff salary and benefits, rent, the purchase and maintenance of the law library materials, furniture, shelving, equipment and supplies, the necessary insurance coverage

concerning the furnishings and material contained within said law library and all other expenses now incurred for the operation of the library.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Director shall maintain records of law library expenditures and income and shall provide quarterly reports to the Law Library Board.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the librarian shall make an annual report to the Law Library Board.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Don Theisen, Director of Transportation and Physical Development, presented an overview of the proposed contract fee breakdown with Wold Architects and Engineers for professional services for the 2025+ campus improvements to the Government Center and courts.

Commissioner Stafford moved to approve the contract. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion.

Commissioner Stafford mentioned that the 2025+ campus improvements is misleading in its title and asked for some clarification. Mr. Theisen stated that 2025+ refers to what is believed to be the life of the improvements. He explained that construction will start no earlier than the spring of 2007 and will probably be completed in 2010 – depending on the various options as they come back to the County Board. He added that more information will be brought back to the Board in November.

Commissioner Peterson stated that this is a hard vote for her. She believes strongly that there should be courts in Forest Lake and Cottage Grove. Services are needed in the north and the south because that's where the population growth of the county is.

Commissioner Hegberg agreed with Commissioner Peterson but added that he understands the courts dilemma in dealing with security matters. He feels minor offenses and juvenile offenses can be dealt with in Forest Lake and Cottage Grove and he will continue to work with that objective. He believes courts should be at the district level.

Commissioner Peterson added that with the state takeover, it seems that district lines should be erased and that people should be able to go to court closest to their homes.

Commissioner Kriesel stated that the task force put together a few years ago to work on these issues recommended that the courts reside in the county seat. He feels this makes good business sense; it will enhance both the scheduling process and the ability to provide good security, and all records would be in one central place.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated that he will not be supporting this contract. He fears that once the county starts expending the dollars for this project, it will later just be pouring good money after bad. He feels that the challenge with the courts is more a scheduling problem than a space needs problem and that this could be addressed with better and more creative scheduling. He believes there are space needs, but what is driving this project is the space needs of the court and he doesn't feel these are real and needed at this point.

Commissioner Stafford added that he does feel sometimes that the courts space needs appear to be questionable, but in the long run he's looking at the consistent population projections of the county and the need to develop the campus for the future.

Chairman Peterson asked for all those in favor of approval of the Wold Architects and Engineers contract. Aye: Commissioners Hegberg, Stafford, and Kriesel. Opposed: Commissioners Pulkrabek and Peterson.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Kriesel recognized Rick and Connie Hill who organized a fundraiser this past weekend in Stillwater for victims of Hurricane Katrina. The community garage sale raised \$11,000 which was given to the Salvation Army. He also mentioned that many Stillwater businesses generously participated in the event by donating items.

Commissioner Pulkrabek had the opportunity to talk with Administrator Craig Waldron, City of Oakdale, who reiterated his interest on behalf of the city in going with the county services in the administration of elections.

Commissioner Stafford attended the Comcast volunteer event at Lake Elmo Regional Park on Saturday morning. It was extremely well attended by many volunteers. He mentioned that one volunteer, Master Gardener Vera Wagner, put in 700 hours of volunteer time last year on various projects.

Commissioner Stafford requested a correction to a statement he had made during the September 27 Board meeting. He had indicated that the Energy Task Force had acquired two new members, Stearns and Ramsey Counties, and the minutes reflect this statement. The true statement is that the new members are Sherburne County and Ramsey County and he would like this in the record to be technically correct.

Commissioner Hegberg mentioned that this week is National 4H week and there will be a number of events around the county promoting 4H activities.

Commissioner Peterson announced that last week's League of Local Governments annual event was attended by about 120 people. She thanked former Governor Al Quie for being the keynote speaker and sharing his time and thoughts with the group. She also thanked county employees who assisted with the meeting and legislative liaison, John Kaul, for arranging for the governor to speak.

Commissioner Peterson reminded the commissioners that there is a District 10 meeting at AMC on Monday, October 10 at 3:00 p.m. She feels it would be beneficial to have all the County Board members there.

Commissioner Peterson congratulated Deb Paige, Director of Emergency Services, who recently received the Association of Minnesota Emergency Managers' Metro Regional Director of the Year award.

Commissioner Peterson reminded women in the audience and the women of our organization that October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Commissioner Kriesel motioned to recess the meeting and go into closed session at 10:45 a.m.

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:05 a.m., in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Wayne Sandberg, Deputy Director of Transportation and Physical Development, presented an overview of the County Highway 18 reconstruction project in Lakeland and Lakeland Shores and recognized the time, effort, and commitment of volunteer community members who worked on the Design Review Committee with Washington County staff. These citizens attended numerous meetings, hosted open houses, filmed cable access videos and acted as advocates of the project to their communities.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-165 as follows:

Presentation of Commissioners Award to Members of the County Highway 18 Design Review Committee for Their Commitment Towards Improving Transportation in Washington County

WHEREAS, Project Development works best when the county partners with the local community, and

WHEREAS, the County Highway 18 Design Review Committee was developed to ensure that community considerations were incorporated into the plan and included volunteers from both Lakeland and Lakeland Shores, and

WHEREAS, the Design Review Committee met on a regular basis beginning in March of 2005, to review plan concepts, discuss public comments, develop ideas and address issues, and

WHEREAS, the Design Review Committee developed two cable access programming productions and hosted two open houses to provide residents and concerned citizens with information they needed to make informed comments, and

WHEREAS, the members of the Design Review Committee acted as liaisons and advocates, strengthening the partnership between the County and the Community, and

WHEREAS, the Design Review Committee has been an integral component toward developing and implementing the County Highway 18 Project, which will improve the safety of residents, pedestrians and drivers.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby presents this Commissioners Award to the County Highway 18 Design Review Committee for their commitment to improving Transportation in Washington County. Commissioner Kriesel welcomed those committee members in attendance today and thanked the members for their efforts in partnering with the county's transportation engineers for the successful design and ultimate approval of the County Road 18 project. He also recognized Don Theisen, Wayne Sandberg, and Cory Slagle for their work on this project and gave special recognition to Richard Glasgow, chairperson of the Citizens Design Task Force.

Commissioner Kriesel presented each committee member with a Commissioners Award and a Golden Hard Hat Award.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Sheriff Steve Pott asked the Board for approval to accept a \$2,000 donation from Kris Lundquist in memory of her father, Bill Lundquist. He indicated that the donation would be given for the purchase of uniforms and equipment for the Sheriff's mounted patrol unit. The members of this unit are all volunteers with their primary goal as search and rescue. The unit spends approximately 1,300 hours a year representing the Sheriff's Office at various functions, such as the county fair and National Night Out.

Commissioner Stafford moved to accept the donation of \$2,000 from Kris Lundquist in memory of her father, Bill Lundquist. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hegberg recognized this donation as well as the donations given this morning by Target Corporation and Wal-Mart that were approved on the Consent Calendar.

Commissioner Stafford stated that a lot of people and companies are doing great things for their communities and that the county is appreciative of their efforts.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Water Management Organizations

Amanda Goebel, Senior Environmental Specialist, gave an overview of the county's watershed management organizations' proposed 2006 budgets and priority projects. District members in attendance were: Cliff Aichinger, Ramsey/Washington Watershed District; Matt Moore, South Washington Watershed District; Jack Lavold, South Washington Watershed District; John Jansen, Middle St. Croix Water Management Organization; Rick Vanzwol, Brown's Creek Watershed District; Dave Bucheck, Valley Branch Watershed District; and Craig Leiser, Brown's Creek Watershed District.

Update on Washington County Water Consortium Activities

Ms. Goebel presented an update on the Washington County Consortium activities. She indicated that this is the 5th active year of the consortium. It works on surface water and groundwater issues that cross local governmental boundaries. Recent accomplishments include developing groundwater protection rules for incorporation into watershed rules; hosting an educational display at the county fair; groundwater and surface water studies; and continuing to apply for joint grant projects. Monthly consortium meetings focus on collaboration opportunities, information sharing, working meetings, policy issues and worldwide water issues. In 2006 the water consortium will discuss sharing a water resource educator; municipal separate storm sewer systems collaboration; education and interaction with local government units; and continuing to work together on groundwater and surface water issues.

Ray Wuolo, Barr Engineering, presented a brief summary of feature projects including intercommunity groundwater protection, sustaining growth and natural resources (Woodbury/Afton area), and integrating groundwater and surface water management for southern Washington County.

Washington Conservation District's 2006 Budget

Jay Riggs, District Manager, presented the Washington Conservation District 2006 proposed budget and program services. Washington Conservation Board members in attendance were: Gary Baumann, Tom Armstrong, Rosemary Wallace and Tom Meyer.

Unpaid County Environmental Charges

Judy Hunter, Senior Program Manager, presented a brief overview of today's action requesting that the County Board certify to the County Auditor unpaid outstanding County Environmental Charges (CEC) to be extended as assessment with interest upon the tax rolls of the county. County Ordinance #167 established the environmental charge to require haulers to collect and remit the charge. The county was notified through the hauler that there were some 2003 and 2004 unpaid environmental charges, particularly with the residents of Oak Park Heights. The hauler had billed these individuals in July 2004, December 2004 and July 2005. On September 19, 2005 the Department of Public Health and Environment mailed 357certified letters to Oak Park Heights residents who had unpaid 2003 and/or 2004 CEC payments. Today, there is an updated list of 110 parcels to which the Department has not received a response or payment.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-166 as follows:

Certification of Unpaid Environmental Charges

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopted the Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance #163 on

November 19, 2002, and the Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance #167 on November 18, 2003; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Solid Waste Management Ordinance #163 and #167 establish the County Environmental Charge; and

WHEREAS, a solid waste hauler has provided records to the Washington County Department of Public Health and Environment (Department) of generators who have unpaid 2003, 2004 or 2003 and 2004 County Environmental Charges; and

WHEREAS, the solid waste hauler sent bills to generators in July 2004 and December 2004 for a 2003 County Environmental Charge and July 2005 for a 2004 County Environment Charge; and

WHEREAS, the Department sent certified letters requesting prompt payment to 357 generators with 2003, 2004 or 2003 and 2004 unpaid County Environmental Charges on September 5, 2005; and

WHEREAS, Section 14, subpart 14.81 of the Ordinance #167 provides that on or before October 15 in each year, the County Board may certify to the County Auditor all unpaid outstanding charges as reported by the Department, by Haulers and Disposal Facilities and a statement of the description of the lands which were serviced and against the Charges arose; and

WHEREAS, the Section 14, subpart 14.81 also provides that it shall be the duty of the County Auditor, upon order of the County Board, to extend the assessments with interest provided for in Section 279.03 subd. 1 upon the tax rolls of the County of the taxes of the year in which the assessment is filed; and

WHEREAS, the properties that have failed to pay the CEC are identified in Exhibit A which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the County Auditor and the Department of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections to extend the unpaid County Environmental Charges on the properties set forth in Exhibit A to this resolution as assessments with interest in accordance with County Ordinance #167.

Minnesota Sustainable Building Guidelines in County Building Projects

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-167 as follows:

Adoption of Minnesota Sustainable Building Guidelines

WHEREAS, sustainable building design is a mainstream approach that reduces energy expenditures, enhances the health, well-being and productivity of a building's occupants, and improves the quality of the natural environment; and

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota has developed the Sustainable Building Guidelines to be used in all new state building projects funded by state bonds, and issued version 1.1 of the Guidelines on July 1, 2004; and

WHEREAS, on August 25, 2004, the regional Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board strongly recommended that member counties adopt the Minnesota Sustainable Building Guidelines; and

WHEREAS, on November 23, 2004, the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopted the Washington County Solid Waste Management Master Plan and the Solid Waste Management Coordinating Board's Regional Solid Waste Management Master Plan respectively; and

WHEREAS, these plans call for Washington County to: (a) incorporate sustainable building guidelines into its building procedures for future building and remodeling projects and will encourage other public entities to do the same, and (b) incorporate sustainable building principles into planning, designing, and construction contracts for government sponsored buildings, including assessing the potential for reduction, reuse and recycling and/or processing of materials in county deconstruction and remodeling projects and will encourage other public entities to do the same; and

WHEREAS, many aspects of the Guidelines can be implemented at no extra cost through integration in the County's planning process for buildings, and all cost related decisions can be evaluated on a project by project basis with no predetermined obligation.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby adopts the Minnesota Sustainable Building Guidelines for voluntary use in all current and future County building and renovation projects, where practical and fiscally feasible; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners directs the Department of Transportation and Physical Development to utilize the Minnesota Sustainable Design Guidelines in the design and development of the North and South Service Centers within established budgets; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners directs the Departments of Transportation and Physical Development and Public Health and Environment to evaluate options for innovative energy generation at the North and South Service Centers, and to develop strategies for utilizing the Centers to communicate with and educate the public and other local government units about sustainable building design.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Department of Assessment, Taxpayer Services & Elections to subdivide tax-forfeited parcel 17.030.21.33.0005, into two pieces with the legal descriptions as in Attachments A & B.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2005-173** as follows:

Designation of the National Incident Management System as the Basis for All Incident Management in Washington County

WHEREAS, the President of the United States of America issued Homeland Security Presidential Directive 5 to enhance the ability of the United States to manage domestic incidents by establishing a single, comprehensive national incident management system; and

WHEREAS, the secretary of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security developed and administered the National Incident Management System (NIMS) to provide for interoperability and compatibility among federal, state, and local capabilities; and

WHEREAS, the NIMS will include a core set of concepts, principles, terminology, and technologies covering the incident command system; multi-agency coordination systems; unified command; training; identification and management of resources; qualifications and certification; and the collection, tracking, and reporting of incident information and incident resources; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Governor Tim Pawlenty issued Executive Order 05-02; Designation of the National Incident Management System (NIMS) as the basis for all incident management in the State of Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and desirable that all Washington County agencies and personnel coordinate their efforts to effectively and efficiently provide the highest levels of incident management; and

WHEREAS, the NIMS standardized procedures for managing personnel, communications, facilities, and resources will improve the ability of Washington County to utilize federal funding to enhance local and state

agency readiness, maintain first responder safety, and streamline incident management processes; and

WHEREAS, the Incident Command System components of the NIMS are already an integral part of various incident management activities throughout Washington County, including current emergency management training programs; and

WHEREAS, the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks (9-11 Commission) recommended adoption of a standardized Incident Command System; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Washington County adopt the National Incident Management System (NIMS) as the standard for incident management on this 18th day of October, 2005.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Board Chair Peterson reported that Deb Paige, Emergency Services Director, was recently named the 2005 Region Director of the Year by the Association of Minnesota Emergency Managers. Commissioner Peterson congratulated Ms. Paige on her honor and noted the contributions she has made to the county, including coordinating disaster drills and improving communications among responders, other governmental entities, and the citizens they serve.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

SRF Consulting Group, Inc.

In response to a question by Commissioner Stafford, Don Theisen, Director of Transportation and Physical Development, summarized the work to be performed under the contract.

Commissioner Stafford move to approve a contract with SRF Consulting Group, Inc. for consulting engineering services for the south parking lot expansion final design and the Government Center Storm Water Management Plan. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Pat Anderson, State Auditor

Pat Anderson, Minnesota State Auditor, reviewed two bills passed in the last legislative session to help address unfunded mandates and waivers from rules and procedural laws.

<u>Mandate Reform Imitative</u> – This legislation will give local units of government the opportunity to propose reforms of state mandates by filing a written resolution with the state auditor objecting to a state mandate or making recommendations for reforming a state mandate. The state auditor must list on the state auditor's

Web site a list of all state mandates cited in a resolution under this section, and the name of the unit of local government citing the mandate.

Waivers from Rules and Procedural Laws – Local units of government can fill out an application to identify the administrative rule or procedural law that is hindering cooperation and explaining why waiving that rule or law would result in an improved cooperative effort. After the application is received by the state auditor's office, that office will have the authority to grant a waiver to the rule or law, allowing the local government to cooperate more effectively.

October 25 Board Meeting

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to cancel the October 25 County Board meeting. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Stafford reported he will be attending the Solid Waste Coordinating Board Executive Committee meeting on Wednesday. He also will be meeting with the Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, and Nancy Pollock, Metropolitan Emergency Services Board, to discus the procedures needed to comply with the bonding required for the 800 MHz radio system.

Commissioner Stafford asked about a claim regarding Oakdale property and that a motion was scheduled for October 14. He would like to know the outcome on that. Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator, stated the person bringing the action secured an attorney. The day before the hearing the attorney came in and asked for a 30 day extension. The Judge granted that, so another hearing date will be set.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on meetings he attended last week with PERA and the Insurance Trust. Both committees will likely go to the legislature to look at technical items that the courts have ruled on differently than the committees had interpreted the procedures. Since Washington County is the largest county in the Insurance Trust he was asked to speak with John Kaul the county's legislative liaison to discuss strategies for dealing with those technical issues.

Commissioner Kriesel indicated he will be attending Judge Meyer's retirement tomorrow.

Commissioner Peterson reported on the Transportation Advisory Board of Directors meeting and they are working on the legislative package for next year.

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

They all felt if was an invasion of privacy and a safety issue. Preliminary Solid Waste Processing Facilities Capital Assistance Application

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota has a Solid Waste Facilities Capital Assistance Program which includes Household Hazardous Waste facilities which is administered by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency; and

WHEREAS, Washington County will need a replacement Household Hazardous Waste Facility by December 1, 2008, is actively planning for its replacement, and has a preliminary facility project estimate of \$4.2 million; and

WHEREAS, Washington County is eligible to apply for funding under this Program and the level of funding is fifty percent (50%) of eligible costs or \$2 million, whichever is less; and

WHEREAS, funding under this Program is subject to appropriations by the Minnesota Legislature; and

WHEREAS, Washington County plans to make application for a Solid Waste Processing Facilities Capital Assistance grant to construct a Household Hazardous Waste Facility (Special Stream Facility).

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners states that, if Capital Assistance funding is granted for purposes of building a household hazardous waste facility, Washington County will implement the project, provide necessary local financing, and accept and exercise the governmental powers necessary to develop and operate the project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes the Director of the Department of Public Health and Environment to sign the Preliminary Capital Assistance Program grant application on behalf of Washington County.

6. Adoption of **Resolution No. 2005-175**, as follows:

Identification of Market Price for Purposes of the Solid Waste Management Tax

WHEREAS, the 1997 Minnesota Legislature enacted a bill eliminating both the SCORE sales tax and the Solid Waste Generator Assessment, replacing them with the Solid Waste Management Tax; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statutes §297H requires political subdivisions that subsidize tipping fees at solid waste management facilities to identify the "market price" for solid waste management services, which is identified as "the lowest price available in the area, assuming transactions between separate parties that are willing buyers and willing sellers in a market"; and

WHEREAS, this law requires political subdivisions to identify the market price and submit their findings to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency each year; and WHEREAS, the Ramsey and Washington Counties Boards of Commissioners in 2004 by resolution each identified \$27.09 per ton as the "market price" for purposes of the Solid Waste Management tax, effective January 1, 2005; and

WHEREAS, Ramsey County, Washington County, and the Ramsey/ Washington Resource Recovery Project staff have worked cooperatively to identify the market price for Ramsey and Washington Counties, beginning January 1, 2006, and have determined a different market price which requires approval by County Board Resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes identification of \$27.70 per ton as the "market price" for purposes of the Solid Waste Management Tax, which reflects a waste disposal tipping fee of \$20.70 per ton at the Pine Bend landfill plus an estimated transportation cost of \$7 per ton, and authorizes submittal by the Department of Public Health & Environment of this "market price" and supporting documentation to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency.

- Approval of Public Health and Environment Director Lowell Johnson as the Washington County
 Community Health Board's representative to the State Community Health Services Advisory
 Committee and Deputy Director Sue Hedlund as Alternative representative.

Comcast Corporation Project

Peter Mott, Parks Coordinator, provided information about a joint effort of 600 Comcast Corporation employee volunteers and the Great River Greening organization which was held on October 1, 2005. The 600 volunteers participated in conservation activities that improved the natural environment in Lake Elmo Park Reserve. Projects included: 200 pounds of native prairie seed collected; 20 Wood Duck houses constructed; 20 Bluebird houses constructed; Wildlife viewing blind constructed; and an area the size of a football field cleared of buckthorn.

Kelly Weber, Comcast Corporation representative, expressed her thanks to Park staff that helped with this project. She stated that Comcast is proud to serve in Washington County and looks forward to future projects.

Need for EIS Miller Farms and Audubon Open Space Design Developments

Ann Pung-Terwedo, Sr. Planner, advised the Board that an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) was prepared on the proposed Miller Farms and Audubon Open Space Design Developments in Baytown Township. The proposed development consists of 121 single family residential lots with 50% of the land preserved in open space. The EAW was distributed to various agencies and no commenting agency recommended the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement. The impact on the Wildlife Management Area south of the development, water quality and surface water run-off were issues of most concern. She believes all of these issues have been adequately addressed in the EAW and subsequent comments and responses.

Todd Erickson, Folz, Freeman, Erickson, Inc., presented a brief overview of the Environmental Assessment Worksheet.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2005-177** as follows:

Resolution for Negative Declaration of Need for an Environmental Impact Statement for Joint Projects Including Audubon and Miller Farms in Baytown Township

General Legal Description:

Part of Section 15, Township 29 North, Range 20 West.

WHEREAS, Washington County Board of Commissioners is the responsible governmental unit (RGU); and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Rules 4410.4300 Subpart 19 and the Washington County Development Code, Chapter One, Administration, Section 12 requires that an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) be prepared

for a residential development consisting of 50 or more unattached units in an unsewered unincorporated area; and

WHEREAS, the Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) dated July 11, 2005 has been prepared and circulated to the appropriate public agencies and private citizens pursuant to Minnesota Rule 4410.1700; and

WHEREAS, based on the information contained in the EAW, records and files and comments received and responded to in the EAW, the County Board as the RGU concluded the following:

The type, extent and reversibility of environmental effects are similar to effects associated with other residential developments and the project does not have potential for significant environmental effects.

No cumulative potential effects of related or anticipated future projects exist that would pose significant environmental effects.

The anticipated environmental effects are subject to ongoing regulatory authority, including the Minnesota Department of Health, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, Washington County, and Baytown Township.

The extent of the environmental effect of the new residential development can be anticipated and controlled as a result of the development process as required by the Washington County Development Code, Baytown Town Board, and other environmental studies undertaken by public agencies or the proposer, including other EISes.

The proposal is consistent with recent Baytown Township and Washington County Comprehensive Plan amendments but is not consistent with the Metropolitan Council's Regional residential densities for rural areas and water supply system policies.

WHEREAS, based on the criteria in Minnesota Rule 4410.1770, the project does not have significant environmental effects.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the EAW for the Audubon/Miller Farms joint project is adequate and a negative declaration is made on the need for an EIS.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COUNTY LIBRARY

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2005-178** as follows:

Naming the Washington County Library Branch in Lake Elmo The Rosalie E. Wahl Branch

WHEREAS, Washington County is re-opening the library branch located in Lake Elmo; and

WHEREAS, Rosalie E. Wahl has advocated for library services in Washington County throughout her 50 years as a resident of Lake Elmo and the County; and

WHEREAS, Rosalie E. Wahl served with distinction on the first Washington County Library Council before beginning her distinguished legal career which culminated in her appointment as the first woman to serve on the Minnesota Supreme Court; and

WHEREAS, under her leadership the Washington County Library Council advocated at the Washington County Board for the establishment of a County Library; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board did establish a County Library in 1967 with the first branch located in Lake Elmo; and,

WHEREAS, the current Washington County Board of Commissioners recognizes the importance of library service to the community as well as the importance of advocacy by citizen leaders, such as Rosalie E. Wahl.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby names the library branch located in Lake Elmo the "Rosalie E. Wahl Branch" of the Washington County Library.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Patricia Conley, Library Director, invited the Board members to attend the ribbon cutting ceremony at the Rosalie E. Wahl Branch Library in Lake Elmo on January 7, 2006 at 10:00 a.m.

ASSESSMENT, TAXPAYER SERVICES AND ELECTIONS

Kevin Corbid, Director of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections, addressed the issue of property photos on the county Website. Two options previously presented were: 1) Remove the parcel photos in their entirety; or 2) Allow the opt-out by property owners to have their photos removed. A third option has been identified and that is to make changes to what is available to individual property owners who log on to the web. They would still have the ability to search for property by PIN number and property address. The change would be not to allow access to the property record card that has more detailed information. All photos would be removed from the site as well as the property sketches. The comparable search module would still be available to the general public, but there would not be a photo attached.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to remove public access to the property record card and all property photos from the county's Website. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Draft 2006-2010 Capital Improvement Plan

Sue Kuss, Budget/Financial Analyst, presented the Draft 2006-2010 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Changes made to the plan since it was last reviewed by the Board include: (CSAH 2) reduced bonds funds from \$16.5 to \$11 million due to anticipated receipt of federal funding; (CSAH 13) increase bond funds to \$5.5 million to advance construction from Bailey Road to Glen Road; \$3.2 million to be earmarked for the implementing recommendations of a facility study that was done on the north and south highway maintenance shops for new wash bays, salt shed, and work on new wastewater treatment system; Spread the \$12 million budgeted for 2009 for the 800 MHz Radio system over four years from 2006 to 2009 to make funds available to match anticipated state grant dollars; New projects include the expansion of the Oakdale Branch Library estimated cost of \$1,060,000 and expansion of the Wildwood Branch Library estimated cost of \$880,000 in 2010; and Construction of the Red Rock Corridor estimated cost of \$14.7 million for the county's share. Ms. Kuss stated that over the next five years the county will be adding over 300,000 square feet of new office and library space. Using the county's standard rental rates \$4.4 million will be added into the operating budget to heat, air condition, clean and maintain those new spaces.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to release the draft 2006-2010 Capital Improvement Plan to Washington County communities for their review and comment. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Stillwater Library

Commissioner Kriesel moved that the \$21,000 service fee that Washington County charges the Stillwater Library be removed and that those funds come out of the county fund balance for 2006. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion.

Commissioner Hegberg stated if the county foregoes the service fee, he feels that would have to come out of fund balance because he is not sure the Library could withstand a \$21,000 adjustment in its proposed budget for next year.

Commissioner Stafford thought that the Board was waiting for a review of statistics from the Library Board?

Commissioner Kriesel stated they were, but it is getting close to December and Stillwater and Bayport are concerned about setting their budgets for the Libraries.

Commissioner Stafford stated he is amenable to some sort of compromise, but he would like it based on fairness and facts. For the County Board to send this issue back to the Library Board and then the County Board votes on it before the Library Board give its report—he asked what he is missing.

Jim Schug, County Administrator, stated that the Library Board at its October meeting did take it up and had recommended that the fee be continued as it is proposed in the 2006 budget of approximately \$21,000. It was based on their analysis that if you look at the support that the Washington County Library system is already providing to the Stillwater Library it is actually considerably more than \$21,000 and that \$21,000 represents only partial reimbursement of the support that is being provided.

Commissioner Stafford stated he had asked some specific questions of the Library Board to reapproach this question as to what would the county's real costs be if it took over the Stillwater Library. He's never got an answer to that and is reluctant to vote on this today when he has asked a question and does not have the details. He asked Commissioner Kriesel if he could wait one more week until he gets an answer to those questions?

Commissioner Kriesel stated he could probably agree with that, but he feels it is time to fish or cut bait. In a perfect world the Library Board or staff would come back and be able to articulate what role the associate libraries play in accommodating the library system. The concern he has when you look at the fee, the associate libraries are interested in doubling their collections and it's punitive in that it will increase their fees when 40% are non-residents using that library. He wants to make sure that the county in all fairness truly reflects their role in what it costs.

Commissioner Stafford asked if this issue is delayed a week that the Bayport Library be included in the motion because you cannot do one without the other.

Commissioner Hegberg stated they do have information from the County Library Board meeting and the analysis that they used. As to the question if the county took over the Stillwater and Bayport Libraries, each library uses different analysis and operational expenses are different than how the county would run the library system.

Commissioner Kriesel stated if the county were to return all these libraries to the local communities in which they reside and let those local communities keep their tax base, would that sufficiently address those communities that don't have libraries in their communities. He feels the Board needs some analysis as to what roles and expectations the county has of these associate libraries in terms of keeping up with the growth and accommodating that growth in the surrounding communities. If somebody can convince him and others that this boils down to an adjustment between service fee for cataloging, he feels it goes well beyond that service fee that in fact their tax base is no longer sufficient to keep up with the role they play for the greater community.

Commissioner Kriesel removed his motion that the \$21,000 service fee that Washington County charges the Stillwater Library be removed and that those funds come out of the county fund balance for 2006 and Commissioner Pulkrabek removed his second.

Mr. Schug stated that he has discussed with Pat Conley, Library Director, the fee and is it the right amount of subsidy or too little or too much. They can show the Board how they computed the amount of support that is being provided by the county library operations to the Stillwater Library. Where you get into the question of what would it cost the county to run the Stillwater and Bayport Libraries if they were in our system, as Commissioner Hegberg said, that would depend on a lot of assumptions on the level of service, whether or not the county would acquire the buildings which wouldn't be the county's choice, the citizens of Stillwater by referendum would have to vote to turn that over to the county and would the county operate it the way it is being operated today or the way the county operates the rest of the library system.

Commissioner Stafford stated that he remembers those figures and based on population it was \$60,000. If the county took out their contribution of people who use their system then it became \$40,000 and we are only charging them \$21,000. The question was different, what would happen if it was decreed tomorrow that the county took over those libraries, what's the dollar amount.

Commissioner Kriesel stated he wants to see what the county's intention of handling that growth, whose budgeting for it and whose responsibility it is.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported that AMC's 2nd Vice President Bob Fenwick's son was severely injured in a car accident. She asked that a card be sent from the County Board to the family.

Commissioner Peterson announced that yesterday was the 30th anniversary of Barry Sittlow as St. Paul Park's City Administrator. She believes he is one of the best City Administrator's she's ever seen. He has served the city and county well. She will be presenting him with a Commissioners' award.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Hegberg moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Stafford and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:40 a.m.

WHEREAS, a right-of-way plat has been prepared for the property by the Washington County Department of Transportation and Physical Development, Survey and Land Management Division, according to MINN. STAT. § 505.1792.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, Washington County Right-of-Way Plat No. 148, Point Douglas Trail is approved by the Washington County Board of Commissioners.

The foregoing Consent Calendar has been adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING - TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Appeal Planning Advisory Commission's Approval of a Mining Conditional Use to Rumpca Excavating, Inc.

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of the procedures that will be followed for today's public hearing to consider an appeal of the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission's approval of a mining Conditional Use to Rumpca Excavating, Inc. The Board Secretary confirmed that the notice of public hearing was published in the legal newspaper.

Ann Pung-Terwedo, Sr. Planner, reviewed her memo to the County Board of Commissioners dated November 8, 2005 and marked as Exhibit B. Briefly, she indicated that Rumpca Excavating, Inc. made an application for a mining/conditional use permit in 2001 to mine an 80 acre parcel of property in Denmark Township. The county processed that EAW and there was a determination made for a negative declaration on the need for an Environmental Impact Statement. The application was not complete in 2001 because approval had not been received from Denmark Township. After a long administrative and legal process, Denmark Township submitted a permit on September 5, 2005. Ms. Pung-Terwedo reviewed the application, displayed the location of the proposed mining, the product to be removed from the site and the proposed reclamation of land. There is currently litigation between Rumpca and neighbors regarding the issue of the access going south of the mining operation down 90th Street. That process is a separate process from today's public hearing.

Ms. Pung-Terwedo indicated that the appeal was submitted by George LeTendre representing the Kramer and Grotes property which is directly south of the site. Four issues were submitted regarding that appeal: 1) Health, safety, and welfare of surrounding residents; 2) Effect on property values and scenic views; 3) Product to be removed from the site; and 4) Reclamation of land.

George LeTendre, representing the appellants in this matter, requested that the application be denied or continued. Throughout this process for the conditional use permit, his clients were assured by the Denmark Town Board and the Denmark attorney that the access to the gravel pit would not be going to the south. The Township Board voted 5-0 that the road would not go on Oakgreen Avenue to the south. Also, James Fitzpatrick, Town Board Supervisor, informed Mary Grote and Dennis Holz that they were not permitted to attend the arbitration hearing. After the arbitration his clients realized that the road was going to the south right by their homesteads. They have raised the following issues:

<u>Health Safety and Welfare of Surrounding Residents/Traffic along Oakgreen and 90th Street</u> - Joe Lux's report states that a left turn lane may be appropriate where heavy vehicles turning averaged 15 per hour, eight hours per day. He went on to state that he estimates 27 trucks per hour will be entering Oakgreen Avenue. He would like more clarification. He is also concerned about the intersection of 90th and 95. What

traffic counts are there and what accidents have been recorded at that location. He believes more information is needed.

Reclamation of Land: - Based on the application they will be digging a 60 foot hole. They would like more clarification on how they plan to make any use of this 60 foot deep hole. He referred the Board to Exhibit N, a letter from Peter Young, Washington Conservation District, dated September 9, 2005. The letter indicates that "intermittent streams and waterways do exist adjacent to and on the site. These drainage ways lead to an unnamed tributary to the St. Croix River Extra precautions must be taken to protect these drainage ways from negative sedimentation impacts A sealed holding pond should be required." He is not sure there is anything in this application that specifically states there will be a sealed pond. "A recycled material area and a sealed holding pond should be denoted on the plans The recycled material area must not be directed to the other proposed runoff basin." "there is nothing in the permit submittal that indicates how the sizing of the pond or outlet structure was arrived at it does not show the locations of the stormwater management structures. Of greater concern is the lack of an adequate route for the water to travel from the pond to the drainage swale on the east side of the site. Plans and calculations should be submitted showing that the pond and outlet structures are properly sized and that the water will have a safe and clean route off the site when water does discharge from the pond." The letter recommends that an additional \$40,000 be added to the cost estimate for seeding of the Nature Preserve Area. He asked the Board to review that and see if they believe all of those issues have been dealt with in the application. Mr. LeTendre stated that Ms. Terwedo indicated there is suppose to be an 8 foot berm around the east and south side of the pit. Based on the appellate and arbitration decisions the roadway now will have access at the southeast corner of this property, therefore there will be a breach in the berm. He believes that is an issue both from the scenic and safety issues and they would like a little more clarification on how they would deal with that.

Mr. LeTendre, stated because of their pending litigation with Denmark Township, even if the Board granted a permit today, it would not allow them to start an operation. He suggested that there is no harm to the petitioner if there were a continuation and that the Board look at the issues he has raised and other issues that his clients will be bringing to the Board.

Jack Clinton, 7616 Currell Blvd., Woodbury, representing the Magone/Rumpca Conditional Use permit, stated he came prepared to address the issues raised in the notice of appeal. There are a number of issues that have gone beyond that this morning. He will address those at the end of his presentation. He does not believe they are part of the appeal and there is information that has been provided to the Board which is not accurate in terms of historical background. Mr. Clinton reviewed his letter to the County Board dated October 14, 2005. That letter included a copy of the Court of Appeals decision involving Rumpca and Denmark Township. In his letter he raised certain objections to the perfection of this appeal and he will not restate them. He feels that everything submitted by Magone family and Rumpca have met all of the ordinance criteria. There is noting in the appeal, factually or legally, stating that there is any non-

compliance with the ordinance criteria. He does not believe there is an appeal of anything substantive before this Board which can be acted upon to overturn the Planning Commission decision to issue the permit. He will not address the last two issues because they were only asking for information about the tonnage of the material to be removed and how the reclamation was going to be done. There has been a reclamation plan submitted as part of the original application to the Township, that also accompanied the application that was made to the county.

Mr. Clinton addressed the issues of environment and traffic issues, all of which were addressed by the Court of Appeals. The Township adopted findings denying the permit for four reasons. The Court of Appeals went through all of those reasons including environmental issues, property values and traffic. Each of the issues the Court of Appeals went through the record and found that none of those reasons the Township gave for denial were of substance and could be upheld. The Court overturned the denial of the permit. The Court of Appeals stated in their decision "...the record shows that the township's planner recommended conditions for the permit that would adequately address concerns regarding noise and dust". "The Tiller permit, which the board approved, is subject to identical conditions." Mr. Clinton stated that the Court of Appeals decision stated that there were identical conditions attached to the permit approved by Tiller. In March of 2001 the Township Board denied the Rumpca permit request. In April of 2001 the Township approved a renewal of the Tiller permit which is immediately adjacent to this property, had identical issues that would have been reasons for denial of their permit, and the Township approved it. The Court of Appeals decision went on to find "The board also found that the proposed mine is 'in close proximity to rural residential developments and will seriously depreciate the property values." One of the issues that has been raised on this appeal. "The evidence in the record shows otherwise. Although one resident submitted anecodotal evidence of differences in property values depending on proximity to an existing gravel mine, there is ample evidence that the proposed mine would not seriously decrease property values and might even result in increased values." "As discussed earlier, the record does not support the board's finding that the proposed mine will seriously depreciate the value of land adjacent to the Magones' property." There has been nothing submitted to the County Planning Commission nor the record submitted to the County Board that would contradict that or would provide additional information that there's a concern regarding property values. On traffic issues the Court of Appeals stated "The board found that there were insufficient 'site distances ... for some of the accesses for both vehicular and pedestrian traffic' and that all of the suggested accesses would 'lead to increased traffic congestion and are not in harmony with the surrounding community.' But the Township engineer stated unequivocally that the proposed mine did not pose any problems with increased traffic volume and that any problems with the suggested routes could be solved.The evidence shows that the proposed mine will not add to traffic congestion." That was supported by letters from the county highway department and Mn/DOT who both reviewed alternative accesses for this gravel pit. The Court of Appeals then concluded that "the township's denial of a conditional use permit allowing appellants to operate a gravel mine was unreasonable, arbitrary, and capricious because the reasons given for the township's decision are legally insufficient or lack a factual basis in the record." Mr. Clinton stated they are not in any

different position today. There is no new information that would indicate that anything determined by the Court of Appeals or through the arbitration process are in error.

Mr. Clinton stated that after the Court of Appeals decision two issues remained. One was the access route and a challenge they made to fees being charged by Township consultants for their review. Approximately \$30,000 in consultant fees were charged by the Township to Rumpca for the review. The same review for the Tiller permit was \$1,500. Both the District Court and the arbitrator reduced the amount of fees that the Township could charge to Rumpca significantly, but it was still about 20 times what Tiller paid for the same review. The only request that they made to the Township was treat us like Tiller. The Court of Appeals stated in their findings that the conditions recommended were like those of Tiller.

Mr. Clinton addressed additional issues raised that he feels are outside of the scope of the appeal. Regarding the arbitrator's hearing, there was a full day of testimony and it was held in June at the Town Hall at 9:00 in the morning. The Town Hall was opened. He does not know what was represented to any landowners, he does know that there was never any discussion about that hearing being closed to the public. In fact there were members of the public there. Anybody who wanted to come to the hearing just had to walk in the doors, they weren't closed let alone locked. In terms of promising routes, there were four routes looked at. He will only address the two that were focused upon. What is called Route C is the south route from Oakgreen to 90th Street and Route B would be to go north to 80th Street and out to Highway 95. The reason they went to arbitration was because the Township didn't want either of those routes used. The arbitrator had surveys and deeds on the property before him in terms of making a decision. The testimony from the Township engineer indicated they did not know whether 80th Street would sustain the traffic loads and weight and therefore couldn't recommend it. The arbitrator went with Oakgreen to 90th Street. Two different engineers on behalf of the Township reviewed this option. There were no issues on this. The county and Mn/DOT looked at 95 and 90th Street, there were no issues. The Township was asking Rumpca to construct turn lanes on Highway 95 for alleged safety concerns over sight distances. The evidence was that Tiller had been using the same intersections for years and no one had ever raised an issue about Tiller needing to build turn lanes for those same intersections. They had accident records at all four of those intersections going back for 20 years. The records indicate that for 90th and 80th there had been seven accidents in 20 years. At 110th, the primary route used by Tiller, there were 21, three times the number of accidents. At 70th Street the accident records were substantially higher than that even thought it was a fourway stop, there were a total of 41 accidents. None of the accidents at all four intersections involved a gravel truck. He feels the concerns about traffic are unsubstantiated. In terms of traffic counts, their application was for 75 round trips or 150 one way trips. Tiller has twice that because of the size of their operation. Rumpca does not anticipate approaching that, but because the Court of Appeal's decision said to the Township it has to issue the permit with conditions similar to those of Tiller, the number of truck trips maximum under the Conditional Use Permit are the same for Rumpca and Tiller, but they don't anticipate going to that maximum.

Mr. Clinton addressed a point that was made that even if the County Board issued this permit they cannot start this operation. That is not true. There is no restraining order in place preventing them from operating consistent with the permit. In terms of the road issue that has been raised in the other litigation, he and the Township attorney offered in July to take the whole issue back to the arbitrator, but the litigation is still pending and they are not any further than they were in July.

Mr. Clinton addressed the four issues raised in the appeal: All of the ordinance criteria have been met; None of the four issues raised during the hearing based on the evidence before the Planning Commission and the record indicates that any of the ordinance criteria have not been met. The parties to this appeal are simply trying to relitigate issues that have already been thoroughly reviewed by the District Court, the Court of Appeals, the Supreme Court and an arbitrator. Nothing new has been raised. There was a reference made to water crossing the property. The Court of Appeals addressed that and it was one of the reasons that the Township cited for denial saying that is within an area that cannot be used for a gravel mine. That wasn't supported by the record. That is just another red herring thrown out today to try and sidetrack this whole thing. He believes that everyone has had the opportunity for public input and comment concerning ordinances being adopted, ordinance criteria for various land uses and that was the time to address it. His clients have been respectful of this process, they came in and submitted the applications, submitted all of the documentation that has been asked for, have met all of the ordinance criteria, it's been reviewed by the courts and a decision has been made. He is requesting the County Board deny the appeal and approve the issuance of the permit as it was approved by the Planning Advisory Commission.

Mr. LeTendre addressed the issue of a denial versus a continuation. This body has the legal right to put reasonable restrictions on any Conditional Use Permit. The Appellate Court, though they addressed some of these issues, he does not believe they addressed all of them. He feels it is incumbent on this Board to review it to make sure the safety concerns are addressed. What Mr. Clinton referred to as a red herring, the report by Pete Young, Land Use Conservationist, he cannot support that argument. This was prepared in September of 2005 and may have taken into consideration things that the Appellate Court did not and Denmark Township did not. He said he would not call Mr. Young's report a red herring.

Ken Tibesar, 8780 Oakgreen Avenue, Hastings, MN – Mr. Tibesar stated his property is to the south of Steve Kramer one of the appellants. A letter was provided highlighting their issues and concerns. 1) Health, Safety and Welfare—they feel that the Joe Lux report from the Transportation and Physical Development was good for traffic of that day, but the traffic on 90th Street is a designated route to the St. Croix Bluffs Park and there are different traffic patterns throughout the year which have not been examined. Mr. LeTendre also mentioned the access to Highway 95. The Township engineer and Wayne Lemanika, Department of Transportation stated that the 80th Street access to Highway 95 was safer. Mr. Lemanika also stated that the best truck route was north on Oakgreen to 70th Street. There has also been a concern expressed by the Town Board about the playground located on the Denmark Town Hall property that has not been addressed. Monitoring wells are required at the Tiller excavating site which is within two miles and is not adjacent as

Mr. Clinton mentioned. The Washington County Geological Atlas says that for their area there are a number of issues regarding bedrock fracturing and sandstone caves. He asked why monitoring wells are not required for the Rumpca site when they are required for Tiller's site. 2) Property Values-They feel that the increased traffic and loss of trees on this property would have a significant impact on property values. 3) Rushed Decision by the County Planning Commission—The night got very late, the Planning Commission did not start the public hearing on this matter until 11:30 p.m. and the decisions by the Planning Commission were not discussed until 12:30 a.m. They do not feel this was a proper setting, wasn't addressed properly, and maybe all the issues were not reviewed by the Planning Commission because of the late hour. 4) Incomplete Rumpca Mining Application—In the mining regulations, Section 5.2 item 10, "road or streets shall name right of way width and traveled portion width." This information is not available for Oakgreen Avenue South. There is no information, no studies done on the road for Oakgreen Avenue South and information is not in their findings. The binding arbitration findings and decisions noted a number of issues as stated in the arbitrator's findings with some of the other routes noted. There was a comment from one of the engineers saying there was a significant impact. They feel there are a number of things that are still unaccounted for. Mr. Clinton mentioned the binding arbitration. They were told by members of the Town Board that those hearings were closed and they were not invited to attend those hearings. Even if they did attend those hearings would their information and concerns be heard by that arbitration? The arbitrator did note a number of problems with the issues that were stated with the different routes. They are questioning the accuracy and completeness of the information because there were a number of times where the name Steve Biscoe has been mentioned in taking an active role in collecting the data and providing the information to the Township engineer. His name is also mentioned in the binding arbitration findings. As a brother-in-law and a husband to the gravel pit site owners and as a landowner himself of property on the corner of 80th Street and Highway 95, they feel that Steve has been put in a very difficult position and may have had a hard time maintaining an open and unbiased view. They are not saying the information that Steve collected is incorrect or incomplete, but they feel that due to this conflict of interest an independent party should be appointed by the County Board to review all of this information and analysis for this permit. They feel that the work for the CUP is not complete since there are a number of issues still outstanding. They feel the mining regulations have not been fully addressed prior to the use of this permit. They request that the Board ask for this information and deny the Conditional Use Permit.

Charlie Grote, 8719 Oakgreen Avenue South, Hastings – Mr. Grote asked the following questions: If the CUP is approved, who controls the CUP requirement? George Kuprian, Assistant County Attorney, stated that the county would control based on its permit. The county would be regulating its own permit. Whatever conditions are in the permit would be subject to the county's control.

Mr. Grote asked who in the county would control that? Mr. Kuprian stated that Land Use and Planning would.

Mr. Grote asked if the county would monitor and protect the rights of the Township residents versus the gravel pit owners? Mr. Kuprian stated the county would be enforcing the permit requirements.

Mr. Grote asked how that would be done? Mr. Kuprian stated he would defer to Land Use and Planning since they would be doing the enforcement.

Mr. Grote asked if there were any violations noted by the residents would they report it to the county Land Use and Planning? Mr. Kuprian indicated that is correct.

Pam Monno, 13199 80th Street South, Hastings, spoke for Michell Ray, 13310 80th Street Court South, Hastings – Ms. Monno read a letter from Ms. Ray to the Denmark Town Board dated February 24, 2001. The letter refers to a Denmark Township property value impact analysis that she prepared regarding the proposed Rumpca gravel pit. It also listed her qualifications related to this issue. Ms. Ray determined from her research of public records that the proposed Rumpca gravel pit, if approved, would seriously depreciate the surrounding property values. Her analysis included the Hidden Valley and Sandy Hills developments in Cottage Grove.

The Board Chair asked if this information was given to the arbitrator? Ms. Monno stated she could not answer that for sure. The Board Chair believes that it was and asked that copies of this report be made for the record.

Mr. Clinton clarified two items. He thought they were here on an appeal for two property owners and didn't know they were going to retry the case that has already been tried through the district court. There was a report by Ms. Ray that was submitted in part of the record and it comprised pages 202 through 293. The Hidden Valley Project was a development done by the Rigg Family, it was a gravel pit off 70th Street. They had been there for 35 years. They submitted information from Mr. Rigg that is also part of the record that went to the trial court, Court of Appeals and Supreme Court concerning this and they had been able to successfully develop upscale housing adjacent to the gravel pit. They had not had any marketing problems or issues with people concerned over the gravel pit. As he referenced earlier, the Court of Appeals stated "The Board also fund that the proposed mine is 'in close proximity to rural residential development and will seriously depreciate the surrounding property values.' The evidence in the record shows otherwise. Although one resident submitted anecdotal evidence of differences in property values depending on proximity to an existing gravel mine, there is ample evidence that the proposed mine would not seriously decrease property values and might even result in increased values." Mr. Clinton objected to the submission of the Ray Report. It has been rejected by the Courts. There was a comment made by Mr. LeTendre that the Town Hall playground had not been addressed. That is not correct. The Township had raised issues they didn't want the gravel pit driving trucks past the playground. The playground has gravel trucks going by it now because Tiller drives by the playground with their trucks. It's fenced and there have never been any safety problems, no child has ever been injured from the gravel trucks. The area where the trucks would

drive on Oakgreen the condition of the arbitrator's award was that Rumpca has to install a fence, the same type of fence that has protected the kids on 90th Street. The other issue was raised concerning Pete Young's report. After he wrote the report he met with Mr. Rumpca on site because he had not been there before. They went over the site, the sealed pond that Mr. Young wants is agreed to and that will be done. There is nothing in Mr. Young's report which is an issue. Nothing that the County Board has to review, determine or gather more information on or put any more conditions on. The sealed pond that he wants for sedimentation is going to be done. He feels they have addressed everything that has been asked. He asked that the County Board affirm the issuance of the permit as approved by the Planning Commission.

Dennis Holz, Oakgreen Avenue – Mr. Holz stated that Mr. Clinton has made a number of comparisons to Tiller. He believes there are a number of things that are different. Tiller has a driveway. All the mailings they've gotten it lists the Rumpca address as 80th and Oakgreen, not 90th and Oakgreen. The traffic will increase with Rumpca's use. In the arbitrator's ruling another route was turned down because of traffic repetitions. It cannot be based solely on what Tiller does because traffic will increase. He believes that Tiller has a monitoring well. Part of the issue from the beginning has been the exit. The whole issue has been danced around from one exit to another. He questioned how they are going to get in if they don't have a route in, how will they begin their operation. They live across from the park and it is fenced along 90th Street where Tiller goes with their trucks, but along Oakgreen where there will be 300 trucks a day that will not be completely fenced because the Township a number of years ago moved their entrance to Oakgreen, so it will not be completely fenced.

Rich Robinson, 8833 Oakgreen Avenue South – Mr. Robinson stated this gravel pit is in the center of the town. The reclamation calls for this gravel pit to be zoned ag. The pit will be going 20 to 30 years when there will be 60 foot hole in the ground in the middle of the Township. The area around there will be very residential. He does not understand a reclamation plan that isn't forward looking. He does not see anyone farming that area. He does not believe this area will be zoned ag. He thinks a reclamation plan needs to be more forward thinking. At the commission meeting a staff member did raise the issue of reclamation and unfortunately the question was asked during public comment and because it was during public comment there never was staff discussion about reclamation.

Pam Monno, 13199 80th Street South – Ms. Monno stated this proposed gravel pit is in the center of the Township. Most cities do not have industries such as this in the center of their Township. She has in front of her two letters written by the attorney they had hired and she has retained that information. She stated there are purposes for zoning ordinances. Denmark Township is their local government and that's important because that is how the common people are heard. The purpose of a zoning ordinance as a review is helpful to recall the general specific purposes of the Denmark Township zoning ordinance. Ms. Monno went on to identify the general purposes of zoning ordinances.

The Board Chair stated that the entire Board understands Planning Commission responsibility at the local level. That was heard when this case was tried. There are three former council people on this County Board. The Board has people who have served on the Planning Commission of various communities, so the Board fully understands Planning Commission responsibilities.

Ms. Monno, stated the Board has so much information it has to process that she wanted to refresh some memories here. She apologized. She read the following statement: We all need help in refreshing our memories. To help us refresh our memories the following definition of democracy was taken from the Second Collegiate Edition, the American Heritage Dictionary, Copyright 1982, 1985 and 1991. She then proceeded to read the definition. She is concerned about the erosion of the democratic process regarding the CUP. The democratic process was not eroded as demonstrated by the decisions to deny the CUP originally made by the Denmark Township Planning Commissioners or the Town Board Supervisors. Their decisions were based on the factual and legitimate information compiled and presented by the citizens or common people. One of the facts presented to the Town Board was the devaluation of private property. This was the key to denying the CUP. The local government heard the majority of the local people. The District Court ruled in their favor and was then overturned by the Appellate Court. The Appellate Court not only overturned the Township's decision but also threw out the restrictions that were placed on the CUP by the Town Board. The common people proposed those restrictions and the Town Board thought they were valid enough that they included them in the decision making process. The Township board listened to them. The Appellate Court chose not to listen to the common people, they instead listened to maybe information that may have been distorted or miscommunicated. By not listening they eroded the democratic process and showed a blatant disregard and disrespect for the common people. This is a mockery of our justice system. The proposed gravel pit has been a well kept secret. Only a select few knew. The select few will benefit economically from the gravel pit. She asked how will they benefit economically as the common people. Land was sold to the common people in the immediate area before the CUP proposed gravel pit was submitted. A ten acre lot located on 80th Street and Neal was the last land to be sold in this area. Shortly thereafter the CUP was submitted. Had they known a gravel pit was planned for this area would they have purchased these properties, absolutely not. She feels the people living near or adjacent to the proposed gravel pit will be greatly impacted financially, physically, and mentally.

Mr. LeTendre stated that Mr. Clinton indicated that Mr. Rumpca met with Pete Young out at the site and did in fact agree to that sealed pond. He wanted to verify if that is going to be part of the CUP and would the other suggestions and recommendations that Mr. Young presented be implemented into the permit. Ms. Pung-Terwedo, indicated she did have a conversation with Peter Young and he did meet on the site with Rumpcas. Based on the comments in his memo, that will be made part of the permit and staff will follow up with them to make sure all those recommendations are made.

The Board Chair asked if the 40 feet that will be left above the water table, will the county be monitoring that? Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated that based on the Geologic Atlas they found the groundwater at about 100 feet. Every year mining operators submit a survey showing the lowest elevation of the pit. Staff makes sure every year that the operator is mining at the lowest depth they are permitted for.

Commissioner Stafford stated in the letter that Mr. Clinton provided he makes a comment that the District Court issued an order directing the Township to issue a Conditional Use Permit. The Board Chair stated that the Township issues one first, there are two permits.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that the Planning Commission met on September 27, 2005 and they took all the new information into consideration and also the route that would be accessed to the property, was that determined? Ms Pung-Terwedo stated that is correct and that was part of the permit that was issued from the Township for that route of Oakgreen going south.

Commissioner Hegberg stated there were conditions about the draining issue, that was on there. Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated that is correct.

Commissioner Hegberg stated the restoration plan was reviewed and requirements there were 28 requirements on the permit holder. Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated there were actually 29 conditions. No. 28 was access and 29 was revocation.

Commissioner Hegberg asked if the permit is reviewed every five years and at that time does the county ask for additional information and determine if wells will be required? Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated every five years the county requires a permit application consistent with the regulations on a mining operation. Every five years they have to resubmit all the data for the next five-year round. If concerns are raised about a monitoring well, they will be reviewed.

Commissioner Stafford stated there was a question about the reclamation of that property. The proposed long term use is for 20 to 30 years. Is this just going to be a five year project? Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated it is a full mining plan with an ultimate use being what the proposal is in crop land and natural prairie. However, there is the underlying zoning and comp plan that may change over time. As things move forward things change, there is the underlying zoning.

Commissioner Stafford stated he was still unclear, is this going to be mined for five years and then reclaimed or are these a series of five year permits? Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated they are a series of five-year permits.

Commissioner Stafford asked about the gentleman who testified about the long-range plan for reclamation that is planned to be ag but in real life it may not be that in the future, can that reclamation plan be changed as the permits renew? Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated it could in the long term, but you can't predict too far out, thirty/forty years.

Commissioner Peterson asked if the underlying zoning of this property were to change to cluster zoning or one dwelling per one-half acre, then the reclamation plan would have to be changed to the appropriate zoning, isn't that correct? Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated that is correct. Commissioner Peterson commented that when the comp plan is reviewed staff will look at the reclamation plans of all gravel pits to make sure that that plan is representative of the new zoning. Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated that is correct. Right now it is zoned ag, residential uses are allowed there under a density of two dwelling units per 40 acres.

Commissioner Hegberg asked if Denmark Township would become a city, then the zoning and the permits required would go to the city, is that correct? Mr. Kuprian stated that is correct.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the audience; none were heard.

The Board Secretary indicated that she has received all documentary evidence.

The Board Chair closed the Public Hearing and opened the matter for discussion and comments by the Board. The Public Hearing closed at 10:55 a.m.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he was on the Board when the county started the mining permit process in the late 1980's or early 1990's. There were conflicts in the area and one that comes to mind is the Bracht pit on CR 97 and former Governor Carlson bought a house a quarter mile from the pit. He can assure everyone that the property did appreciate quite a bit. The pit still exists and is operating and the values did not change significantly. These issues are always contentious as the county develops, but the need for gravel still exists. He understands how the people feel. He believes the Washington County Planning Commission did hear it and had made a number of restrictions on it to the best of their ability. He does find that they addressed the water issue. Transportation is always an issue and that as he understands it, may be determined later on.

Commissioner Stafford stated with the help of staff he has done a little bit of research on values. The concern about property values was stated two different ways. One was the value of property deteriorating around a gravel pit and the other saying no, I'm more concerned about what the traffic created by the gravel pit will do to my value. He has three areas in the county where homes abut the gravel pit and rather heavily traveled roads are involved. Tenth Street North, Interstate 94, Highway 95 in West Lakeland around the Barton Pit. There are expensive homes in Grey Cloud surrounded by County Road 75, 105th Street South, both very heavily used roads. A pit in New Scandia with 95 on the east County Road 15 on the west surrounded by fairly pricy homes and the value for some of these homes from 1998 until 2006 have

increased from \$150,000 to \$338,000, with an average growth increase on the studies they did from 8 to 24% in value. He is having a difficult time finding valid reasons to overturn the Planning Commission's recommendation.

Commissioner Kriesel stated he has not heard or seen anything brought forward today that hasn't already been before the courts or arbitrator. He was interested in hearing any new evidence and that hasn't been brought forward.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to affirm the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission's approval of a Mining Conditional Use Permit to Rumpca Excavating, Inc. and to deny the appeal. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

The Board Chair directed the County Attorney's office to prepare findings relative to comments made by the County Board today regarding its decision and it will be brought back at a later meeting.

The Board recessed at 11:05 a.m.

The Board reconvened at 11:15 a.m.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve comments to the Marine on St. Croix Watershed Management Organization regarding their Draft Watershed Management Plan and authorize the Board Chair to sign a letter drafted on behalf of the Commissioners. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to approve a contract with Medica Health Plans, A Minnesota Health Maintenance Organization, for Washington County to provide care coordination services for enrollees of the Medica's Dual Solution through the Minnesota Senior Health Options Program (MSHO). Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COUNTY LIBRARY

Commissioner Peterson moved to deny waiving the library fee charged to Stillwater and Bayport Public Libraries for 2006. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion.

Commissioner Kriesel referred the Board to an e-mail he sent to the Board yesterday regarding cost comparisons. In comparing similar libraries, it costs county taxpayers \$707,760 to operate the Park-Cottage Grove Library and it costs taxpayers \$316,209 for the Stillwater Public Library (this figure is minus the \$21,000 fee from Washington County). So, it costs Washington County taxpayers \$391,551 more to operate the Park-Cottage Grove Library than the Stillwater Public Library and both are considered regional county library facilities. He then reviewed items borrowed by place of residents in Stillwater Township: Loaned at Stillwater 19,309 (75%); Loaned at Bayport 1,967 (8%); and Loaned at Washington County Libraries, 4,329 (17%). Therefore, Stillwater Township places a heavy burden on the Stillwater Library System. He stated there are four other examples that he will not quote. He just wanted to say that the associate libraries serviced 81% of the neighboring communities borrowing items. Stillwater residents borrowed a total of 175,000 items, 139,972 were borrowed at the Stillwater Public Library and 18,465 were borrowed at Washington County Libraries which is an 80% and 20% spread. He also asked the Board to consider that the Stillwater taxpayers are funding \$5,000,000 of a \$9,000,000 expansion project. He believes if the county truly considers Stillwater Public Library and asset to the county library system, given the fact that Stillwater cost to the county taxpayer is \$316,209 and a similar size library of Park-Cottage Grove is \$707,000 there is a pretty significant disparity there and he asked that the Board vote against this motion and consider waiving the \$21,000 service fee.

Commissioner Stafford stated that Commissioner Kriesel has made a good pitch for his district. He thinks somebody preceding him made a good pitch because the county has acknowledged its value in the form of recognizing \$65,000 worth of fees and the county has waived \$44,000 of those fees in consideration of those circumstances. Commissioner Kriesel's goal is to get rid of the \$21,000. One problem he has comes from his own district. Woodbury is 28% of the county population and they pay about 35% of the total tax. He gets this all the time from Woodbury that they are paying more and getting less. He tries to tell them they have to think about the county as entire unit. If you start getting into this picking and choosing there will always be trouble and somebody will always get angry with the Board. He thinks the Board has recognized Commissioner Kriesel's argument to the tune of \$44,000 and he just does not want to go any further.

Commissioner Kriesel stated his argument is not for his district. If the roles were reversed and this was Park-Cottage Grove or the library in Woodbury, if somebody were showing me that the library in Woodbury was only being funded with \$319,000 he would be in your court on this. It is not about a district, it is about doing what's right. Recently there were 600 employees who came into the park and provided a benefit to the park. It's like turning around and asking them to pay a \$15 admittance fee. There is no problem placing a value on the service that the county provides associate libraries, but the problem lies in the county does not recognize fairly the benefit that they provide the county. \$330,000 is insufficient to supply the library services that Stillwater and Bayport provide to this regional area. He finds it difficult that anyone could look at the usage patterns and say they are not filling a significant county portion. His argument is not about trying to bring something back to his district, it is trying to have a long-range long-term global view of where the libraries should be in the future.

Commissioner Peterson stated she cannot sit here and embrace what Commissioner Kriesel is saying. Washington County provides a certain level of service and that is spread throughout all of the county library system. The county has a ratio of staff, a continuity of building style and building presence. There is a community that has made a decision that that they want to increase staffing levels, they want to have a grander building and that is there choice, we applaud them. But when it comes to circulation and when it comes to product, the product is not only what your purchase in Stillwater it's what is purchased throughout the region. It is shared throughout the region. The county already gives Stillwater a credit and this \$21,000 is like the straw that breaks the camel's back.

The motion to deny waiving the library fee charged to Stillwater and Bayport Public Libraries for 2006 was defeated 2-3 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson and Stafford; No, Commissioners Pulkrabek, Kriesel and Hegberg.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to waive the library fee charged to Stillwater Public Library in the amount of \$21,000 and the Bayport Public Library in the amount of \$7,500 for 2006 and that those funds come out of the county contingency for 2006. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted 3-2 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Pulkrabek, Kriesel, and Hegberg; No, Commissioners Peterson and Stafford.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, announced that he received a letter from the Minnesota Counties Insurance Trust with a check for \$318,971 which is Washington County's dividend for worker's compensation coverage and property casualty coverage. That amount has been deposited in the county's post retirement health care account.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported that there has been preliminary talk about a potential community center on the Tartan High School site. The school district has indicated that it will provide the land. There are different groups involved. The City of Oakdale is split on it, but it may come up in the next month about the county's interest as far as space needs for social services or other programs.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the Minnesota Extension committee meeting he attended last week. They received a report on the extension based 4-H programs in Landfall, Parkside and Cimarron. That program is doing well for those communities. He pointed out, however, that the City of Lake Elmo does not fund the program in Cimarron, that it is funded strictly through the county.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that the AMC annual conference will begin on Sunday, December 4 through Wednesday, December 7.

Jim Schug, announced that the December 6 Board meeting has been canceled and that the next meeting will be held on December 13.

Commissioner Peterson reported that the Hiawatha Line has a 40% larger ridership than they anticipated.

Commissioner Peterson wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving this week.

Commissioner Peterson reported that the county Truth-in-Taxation hearing will be held on Thursday, December 1, at 7:00 p.m. She asked Kevin Corbid, Director of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections, to give his response to citizen's comments on the 10% property tax.

Mr. Corbid stated that the concern some residents have when they see their property tax statement is that if they have a property tax increase greater than 10% they are confusing the state limited market value law. The value can only go up a certain percentage each year. There is no restriction in State law about how much the taxes can go up each year. Staff has explained to taxpayers that if they look at their value statements their estimated market value can rise to whatever the market says it should be for value, but their taxable has been held back each year by a certain percentage as allowed in State law. That percentage is now 15%. It is a value limitation and not a tax limitation.

Commissioner Peterson asked that each Commissioner share with her a business card to give to a child through the Make A Wish Foundation for the largest collection of business cards in the Guinness Book of Records.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Kriesel moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Pulkrabek and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 12:05 p.m.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA TRUTH IN TAXATION PUBLIC HEARING DECEMBER 1, 2005

The Washington County Board of Commissioners convened at 7:00 p.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room, to conduct a Truth-in-Taxation public hearing for the purposes of review of the proposed 2006 county budget. Present were Commissioners Pulkrabek, Kriesel, Peterson, Stafford, and Hegberg. Absent none. Board Chair Peterson presided. Also present were Jim Schug, County Administrator; Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; Sue Kuss, Budget/Financial Analyst; Don Theisen, Director of Transportation and Physical Development; Lowell Johnson, Director of Public Health and Environment; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Patricia Conley, Library Director; Doug Johnson, County Attorney; Edison Vizuete, Financial Services Director; Kevin Corbid, Director of Assessment, Taxpayer Services and Elections; Joanne Helm, Assessment/Taxation Program Manager; Kay McAloney, Human Resources Director; Tom Adkins, Community Corrections Director; Steve Pott, County Sheriff; Cindy Koosmann, Recorder; and Steve Nelson, Public Information Coordinator II.

Board Chair Peterson opened the hearing with a welcome to those in attendance.

James Schug, County Administrator, gave a brief overview of the budget process to date. He stated that final action on the budget and levy will be taken on December 13 at the County Board meeting. He noted that various Department Heads are here this evening and are available to provide information or answer questions. He also mentioned that staff from the Assessment Department is available in Room 20 to help those who have questions about their property valuations.

Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator, presented an overview of the proposed 2006 budget.

The Board Chair opened the meeting for comments from the audience.

George Weiss, 18834 Layton Avenue North, Marine on St. Croix – Mr. Weiss stated that over the last three years his taxes have gone up, some as high as 67%. He has three small lots. One is 150 X 50, one is a swamp and the DNR says it cannot be filled, the county said if it was filled it couldn't be built on. The other lot is the same. The taxes on his home he understands have to go up. But the other two pieces of property that cannot be built on the tax assessor says it enhances the value of the rest of his property. The only thing he can do with the one piece of property is watch the mosquitoes breeding. So when the county says the budget is going up by 5.6%, why are his taxes going up 40, 50 and 60%? His only complaint is if he can't build on it or improve it, how could that enhance the value of his property.

The Board Chair informed Mr. Weiss that property value has increased substantially. She suggested that he talk to the Assessment staff to see why his property valuation has gone up.

Commissioner Stafford suggested he go to the local board of review and have them look at that again. He asked if the property were on three different tax statements. Mr. Weiss indicated it was. Commissioner Stafford stated that they should stand on their own. He believes Mr. Weiss may have some valid questions and suggested seeing the Assessment staff tonight and go to the local board of review next spring.

David Punch, 8773 Springwood Drive, Woodbury – Mr. Punch questioned the assessed value in his neighborhood. He believes the assessed values are arbitrary. Two of his neighbors have made fairly substantial improvements to their homes, \$30,000 and \$40,000 respectively and their property values have increased 10% and in the other neighbor's case 1.4%. He has made no improvements over the last two years and has seen the maximum 15% increase in their property taxes both years. He asked whom he could speak with to address that?

The Board Chair indicated that the staff from Assessment can address his questions.

Wendy Lou, 1970 Northwestern Avenue, Stillwater – Ms. Lou asked about her commercial property. First, her property tax increased 53% from this year to next year and she would like to know why. The building is the same, no improvements. Secondly, as a commercial property when the rates are increased, are other areas such as Oakdale, Woodbury or other cities looked at to see if those are competitive? If the rates are high those are passed on to the tenants and they cannot attract business to this area.

The Board Chair stated that is not a budget policy question. It's really a question that the Assessment staff needs to answer. They can look up your property and help you with that. She stated in her area the commercial appraisals had not been done and had fallen behind so there were two years where they did receive significant increases because there had been significant change.

Craig LeVay, 2353 Grenadier Avenue, Oakdale – Mr. LeVay stated he lives in a small townhouse with no real improvements at the property since they were built in 1992. For many years his property was valued approximately about what he paid for it back in 1992 and 1993. The last three years he has noticed there have been big double digit increases not only at the county level but at the local level. He knows valuations increase because of the value of the property goes up. The county says there is only about a 5% increase in property taxes. More of the median type property in the \$270,000 or \$300,000 properties seem to be going up between 4 and 5%. But the lower valued properties the \$80,000, \$90,000 to \$110,000 or \$120,000 have been seeing an almost 15% increase on the average.

The Board Chair indicated legislative action took place and it has caused a significant increase on the lower price houses. That has not been a reduction that all of us have embraced, but the county is not in control of that. She believes this happened during Governor Ventura's term, when the tax rate on the

highest priced houses were reduced and the lower priced houses were increased. Affordable housing has

taken a significant jump. Again, this is an issue that needs to be addressed with the Assessment staff.

Someone from the audience asked where do intergovernmental revenues come from? Ms. O'Rourke

stated they come from a variety of sources. It could be federal monies, state reimbursements, or cost

share reimbursements from municipalities.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the audience; none were heard.

The Board Chair thanked everyone for coming out this evening. She did encourage individuals to attend

their local boards of review next spring and also the county Board of Equalization in June.

Mr. Schug indicated that staff will be around after the meeting to answer individual questions,

particularly on valuation. The County Board will consider the proposed 2006 budget and levy at the

December 13 meeting.

Commissioner Stafford asked is there still relief to individuals whose taxes went up more than 12%.

Mr. Corbid stated there are two state programs related to property tax refunds. One is an income

sensitive program that asks for federally adjusted gross income amounts from the federal tax form plus

property tax information. The second one is not income sensitive and it triggers if a person's taxes goes

up more than 12% from one year to the next.

The Board Chair stated there are programs for senior citizens and asked Mr. Corbid to explain that. Mr.

Corbid stated it is called the Senior Citizen Deferral Program and it's the ability of senior citizens to

defer the taxes on their property. The piece that makes it less attractive is that the amounts they are not

paying get paid by the state and become a lien on their property. So if they ever sell, that is an amount

that comes out of the sale proceeds of the house to first payback the state for the deferral of taxes.

The Board Chair closed the hearing at 7:50 p.m. She informed the audience that the County Board will

stick around if anyone wishes to speak to the County Board members. The meeting adjourned at 7:50

p.m.

- Approval of the 2006-2008 agreement with Comfort Keepers to provide home and community-based services for Alternative Care, Elderly Waiver, Community Alternative for Disabled Individuals and Traumatic Brain Injury clients.
- 11. Approval of the 2006 agreement with Dakota County Receiving Center to provide detoxification and in-patient chemical dependency services to adults.
- 12. Approval of the 2006-2008 agreement with South Metro Human Services, Inc. for adult foster care.
- Approval of adult mental health grant application (CY 2006 and 2007) for \$916,378 of State dollars to support community mental health programs.
- Approval for the Community Services Department to accept a donation of \$2,500 for child protection services from the Minnesota Jamboree Council of the United Federation of Doll Clubs – Region 5.
- 15. Approval for the Community Services Department to accept \$8,000 from the Medica Foundation Grant via Ramsey County, to assist children and adults experiencing a mental health crisis through a contract with Human Services, Inc.
- 16. Approval of Findings, Conclusion and **Resolution No. 2005-186** as follows:

Findings of Fact, Conclusion and Resolution Affirming the Washington County Planning and Advisory Commission's Issuance of a Mining Permit to Rumpca Excavating, Inc.

This matter came on for public hearing on November 22, 2005 before the Washington County Board of Commissioners on appeal of a decision by the Washington County Planning and Advisory Commission to grant Rumpca Excavating, Inc. a Conditional Use

Permit to conduct mining operations in Denmark Township. This appeal is brought by Charles Grote, Mary Grote, Steven Kramer and Cynthia Kramer. The Appellants were represented at this hearing by George LeTendre, Attorney at Law; Rumpca Excavating, Inc. was represented by Jack W. Clinton, Attorney at Law; and the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission was represented by Linda C. Krafthefer, Attorney at Law. Having reviewed the record of the Washington County Planning and Advisory Commission and the evidence submitted by interested parties at this public hearing and having heard the arguments of the parties and others and being otherwise advised in the premises, the Washington County Board of Commissioners makes the following:

FINDINGS OF FACT:

- 1. The Washington County Board of Commissioners has jurisdiction to hear this appeal under Chapter 1, section 9.11 of the Washington County Development Code.
- 2. On September 6, 2005, Rumpca Excavating, Inc. (hereinafter "Rumpca") submitted a mining permit application to Washington County, which would allow it to mine gravel and limestone on an 80 acre parcel of land in Denmark Township. The land is more specifically described as the Northeast Quarter (NE¼) of Section 17, Township 27 North, Range 20 West in the Town of Denmark, County of Washington.
- 3. Rumpca previously submitted a mining permit application to Denmark Township pursuant to the Township's Ordinance.
- 4. Under the Washington County Comprehensive Plan 2015, the land use type of the subject property is agricultural. It is zoned A-2, Agricultural, and mining is a permitted use under the Washington County Development Code.
- 5. The County and Township have concurrent permitting authority for mining operations in the Township, and Rumpca must obtain permits from both the Town and the County in order for mining operations to take place.
- 6. In March, 2001, the Denmark Township Board of Supervisors denied Rumpca's permit application.
- 7. Rumpca appealed the Town Board's decision to the District Court, and the District Court found for Denmark Township, upholding its decision to deny the mining permit.
- 8. Rumpca appealed the District Court's decision; and, on July 3, 2003, the Minnesota Court of Appeals reversed the District Court's decision and remanded the case to the District Court, directing the District Court to order the Township to issue a Conditional Use Permit to Rumpca for mining operations.
- 9. The Court of Appeals held that the Township's denial of a Conditional Use Permit allowing Rumpca to operate a gravel mine was unreasonable, arbitrary and capricious because the reasons given by the Township for its decision to deny the permit were legally insufficient or lacked a factual basis in the record.
- 10. Following remand to the District Court, the District Court issued its Order requiring the Township to issue a Conditional Use Permit to Rumpca but left two issues undecided. One concerned the access route to the gravel mine and the other was the engineering fees charged by the Township to Rumpca. The District Court ordered these issues to be decided through binding arbitration.
- 11. An arbitration hearing was held on the issues; and, in his decision, the arbitrator specified that the access route to the mine was to be Oakgreen Avenue via 90th Street.

- 12. On September 6, 2005, Denmark Township issued to Rumpca a Conditional Use Permit for the operation of an aggregate pit and quarry. The permit specified that access to the pit would be from Oakgreen Avenue to 90th Street.
- On September 27, 2005, a public hearing was held by the Washington County Planning and Advisory Commission to consider Rumpca's application for a County mining permit.
- 14. After consideration of the evidence presented at the hearing, the Planning and Advisory Commission found the proposed mining operation as set forth in its application comported to the requirements of the Washington County Development Code and, therefore, issued a Conditional Use Permit to Rumpca for the extraction and processing of sand, gravel and rock and for the recycling of used concrete and asphalt, subject to certain enumerated conditions.
- 15. Following the issuance of the permit, property owners Charles and Mary Grote and Steven and Cynthia Kramer appealed this decision to the Washington County Board of Commissioners.
- 16. The Appellants predicate their appeal on the adverse effect the mining operation will have on the health, safety and welfare of the residents in the area surrounding the mine; the negative impact the operation will have on property values in the area; the product removed from the site; and the reclamation of the land.
- 17. The Minnesota Court of Appeals and the Arbitrator actually and necessarily decided the issues related to health, safety, welfare and land values in favor of issuance of the permit. The Appellants contend that road access is a new issue related to health, safety and welfare and that land values along the road access were not considered but only those land values around the pit itself.
- 18. Land values around the mine and along the access road will not seriously depreciate because of the mining operation.
- 19. The Rumpca mining permit application is complete.
- 20. The reclamation plan submitted by Rumpca as part of the permitting process is adequate and conforms to the mining ordinance.
- 21. The Arbitrator in his decision found that access to the site would be Oakgreen Avenue off of 90th Street and required Rumpca to improve the road to a 9 ton road with 24 foot wide paved lanes and 4 foot gravel shoulders. The improvements would be to Township standards and would need to be approved by the Township. Rumpca would be entirely responsible for the maintenance of Oakgreen Avenue during the term of the permit and life of the gravel pit. These requirements were made conditions in the Township's Conditional Use Permit.
- 22. The Oakgreen Avenue and 90th Street intersection as currently configured is adequate for the proposed use, and no change to lane configuration or traffic control will be necessary.
- 23. Property owners in the area have brought a Declaratory Judgment action in District Court against Denmark Township, challenging the existence of Oakgreen Avenue.
- 24. The County's Conditional Use Permit issued to Rumpca makes access to the site from Oakgreen Avenue, a condition subsequent of the permit. The permit requires any changes in access to the site to be approved by Denmark Township and would require an amendment to the County's mining permit.

- 25. If access to the mine cannot be had from Oakgreen Avenue, the County mining permit issued to Rumpca would be invalid, unless and until amended.
- 26. The scenic views of Appellants will not be seriously affected because of the distance the mine is from the houses and the berming required by the Conditional Use Permit.
- 27. The product to be removed from the site is adequately controlled through the permitting and regulating process.

CONCLUSION:

- 1. The proposed mining operation conforms to the Washington County Mining Ordinance and is otherwise consistent with the Washington County Development Code.
- 2. The Washington County Planning and Advisory Commission decision to grant a Conditional Use Permit to Rumpca Excavating, Inc. to conduct a mining operation in Denmark Township has a basis in fact, and the conditions imposed in the permit conform to the requirements set forth in the Washington County Development Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the decision of the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission to grant the Conditional Use Permit at issue to Rumpca Excavating, Inc. to conduct mining operations in the Northeast Quarter (NE ¼) of Section 17, Township 27 North, Range 20 West in Denmark Township, County of Washington is hereby affirmed in all respects.

WHEREAS, the House of Representatives passed the 2006 budget reconciliation bill (H.R. 4241) on November 18, 2005; and

WHEREAS, HR 4241 contains major cuts to Medicaid, Child Support, and Foster Care; and

WHEREAS, these cuts would significantly reduce the ability of the county to assure the health, safety, and well-being of abused children, persons with a mental illness or developmental disability, and fragile seniors in their homes and community; and

WHEREAS, the legislation would result in a greater utilization of institutions such as nursing homes, group homes, and foster homes at a greater cost to federal, state, and local jurisdictions.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby opposes the legislation and informs federal legislators of its opposition.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

METROPOLITAN MOSQUITO CONTROL

Morrie Anderson, Acting Director of the Metropolitan Mosquito Control Board, and Jim Stark, Public Affairs Coordinator, presented an update of the 2005 programs and an overview of the 2006 budget.

PUBLIC HEARING - TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Appeal by Cary Bartz and David Adkins

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of the procedures that will be followed for today's public hearing to consider an appeal by Cary Bartz owner and David Atkins, Insignia Development, applicant of the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission's denial of an Open Space Design Development/Conditional Use Permit. The Board Secretary confirmed that the notice of public hearing was published in the legal newspaper.

Ann Pung-Terwedo, Senior Planner, reviewed her memo of December 8, 2005 responding to the appeal. She noted that the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission denied the open space design development on October 25, 2005. The denial was a 4-4 vote for approval. The proposal is a conditional use permit for an open space design development consisting of 11 residential lots approximately 2 acres in size on a parcel of property of about 81.9 acres. There will be 51.7 acres of open space, one outlot is 10.8 acres which will be owned by the homeowners association, and another 40.9 acres has an existing large horse stable/training facility. One additional residential structure will be constructed on this parcel.

Ms. Terwedo, indicated that the stables on the 80 acres has been operating on the site for over 15 years. The business trains, shows, buys and sells horses and also provides riding lessons. They have stables, an arena, and two storage buildings. An on-site manager's quarters is located within the stables and will not change as a result of this proposal. Ms. Terwedo displayed where this location is on a map. The denial was based on the issue of ownership of the 40.9 acre parcel which will have the stable/horse training facility with one additional density unit as part of the plan. Many of the Planning Advisory Commission members felt that the 40.9 acre should have access for the new owners of the property and there was also discussion on just having the homeowners own the stable itself. The full minutes of the Planning Advisory Commission were made a part of the record. Ms. Terwedo stated that staff feels this horse stable is an asset to the county, the township and general area and it does fit into the rural character of the area.

David Atkins, Insignia Development, stated they have attended no less than eight board and commission meetings at the county and at the township going through this process over the past ten months. The township has been very thorough, looked at all avenues of this project and are very comfortable with the project. The township staff and consultants are supportive of Ms. Bartz continuing to own this property. At no time did any one person from the public, staff or commission bring up that her retaining ownership of the 40.9 acres would be a question. He asked for the County Board's approve of their request.

Cary Bartz stated she is part owner of the property along with her ex-husband. That is the reason for this process. This is part of a divorce and dissolution. She has been committed to the horse business all her life. She has lived in Stillwater for over 21 years. They purchased that property and built that training facility 17 years ago. She has been running it on her own for the past five years. She has every intent of staying there until she is old. The issue of her continuing with the horse business there and running an equestrian facility has never been an issue. That has been the one piece of integrity that the neighbors and the community have wanted to make sure stays in place.

Commissioner Hegberg asked if the township voted unanimously for this? Mr. Atkins stated yes, that is correct.

Commissioner Hegberg stated there was a letter from an individual in the packet who was concerned about the view, and trees were going to be planted in that area. He asked that they show him that location on the map. Mr. Atkins stated they are continuing to work with the neighbors to plant trees in strategic areas and elevations to screen as many of the homes as possible. He pointed out the main area of concern on the aerial map. They have gone through five or six revisions of the landscaping plan and they continue to work on it to satisfy all the neighbors concerns.

Commissioner Hegberg asked that the lots being developed, which are all two plus acres, will they be allowed to have horses? Ms. Bartz indicated it was her understanding that is not a permitted use.

Commissioner Stafford asked if this was all one parcel and if they had plat approval to subdivide. Mr. Atkins stated they are at preliminary plat approval with the township board. The next step was a conditional use permit for the open space development. Going forward they would be going to the county for preliminary plat approval, then back to the township board for final plat approval and then back to the county.

Commissioner Stafford stated he is having difficulty extracting the intent from the Planning Commission minutes. If this is subdivided and there is a platted area and a separate parcel for the stable, what was the concern of the commission about that being set up that way? A remark was made that if a decision was made to get out of the horse stabling then the land could be reverted to the homeowners association. He does not make the connection where they feel they would have a claim on her property? Ms. Bartz, stated they didn't either and that is what is in question here.

Commissioner Stafford does not understand why the Planning Commission thinks that Ms. Bartz's operation ought to be part of their open space. If this subdivision is completed Ms. Bartz will have a separate parcel, a separate tax statement this will be a separate platted area and it will have its own issues. He asked if anybody could tell him why the Planning Commission felt they had some sort of dibs on this?

Mr. Atkins stated it is the first application under the new ordinance. He felt they might be looking for some direction.

Commissioner Kriesel asked if the horse farm went out of business what will be the status of the property long term? Ms. Terwedo stated if the horse farm no longer exists, there will be a conservation easement over that full 40.9 acres with a management plan stating what can be done with the open space on that parcel. Through the management of that open space it may be turned into prairie, it may be forested, it may be some type of other use that is in keeping with the general area and those adjacent land uses.

Donald Cullen, 11760 Quail Avenue North – Mr. Cullen stated his property directly abuts the development. Initially he was opposed to this development because he was under the impression that because he is on 10 acres everybody else had to be. He now understands that they are following all the rules that are set up. His concern now, and he is the one that wrote the letter, is about the view. He was reluctant to see more houses up there, but as Mr. Atkins stated, they have worked with them and the neighbors. He's toured the site and they have agreed to site trees strategically to block the view of the houses built in the future. That is his concern that they continue along that process and if so, then he is fine with the situation.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the audience; none were heard.

The Board Secretary indicated that she has received all documentary evidence.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent. The Public hearing was closed at 9:50 a.m.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to reverse the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission's denial and approve the Conditional Use Permit with the 13 conditions as presented at the Planning Advisory Commission meeting held on October 25, 2005; and, that the County Attorney's Office be directed to prepare a resolution consistent with the County Board's decision. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

Commissioner Stafford asked that the developer save the township and the county a lot of grief in the future by making sure the buyers of those lots know exactly what is around there. Some sort of acknowledgement that they are moving next door to a facility such as the horse stable.

ASSESSMENT, TAXPAYER SERVICES AND ELECTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-191 as follows:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Bill of Sale for the houses at 17111 Manning Trail and 16460 May Avenue between the county and Otting House Movers and the demolition agreement between the county and Ray Anderson and Sons for the houses at 12020 165th Street, 17725 Lisbon Avenue, and 17745 Lisbon Avenue be executed through the signatures of the Chair of the Washington County Board of Commissioners and the Washington County Administrator without further action of the County Board conditioned upon compliance with all bid specification requirements and approval as to form by the Washington County Attorney's office.

16. Adoption of **Resolution No. 2005-204** as follows:

Findings of Fact and Resolution Reversing the Decision of the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission to Deny a Conditional Use Permit for the Open Space Development of Victory Pass and Granting a Conditional Use Permit to Develop Victory Pass

This matter came on for public hearing on December 13, 2005 before the Washington County Board of Commissioners on appeal from the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission denying to the development Victory Pass a Conditional Use Permit for an Open Space/Cluster residential subdivision and was held under the auspices of Chapter 1, Section 9.11 of the Washington County Development Code. The

appellants are Cary Bartz the landowner and David Adkins the developer. Having reviewed the record of the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission; heard the testimony of the parties and other interested individuals and being otherwise advised in the premises, the Washington County Board of Commissioners makes the following:

FINDINGS OF FACT:

- 1. The appellants planned to develop real property more fully described as the Northeast Quarter of the Northeast Quarter of Section 3, Township 30, Range 20, Washington County and Government Lot 2, Section 3, Township 30, Range 20 and that part of the Southeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 36, Township 31, Range 20, lying southerly of the railroad right-of-way, comprising 81.9 acres of land, as an open space/cluster residential subdivision called Victory Pass. An open space design development is a permitted use under the Washington County Development Code and, therefore, requires a Conditional Use Permit for its implementation.
- 2. The above described real property is owned jointly by the appellant Cary Bartz and her husband and is zoned A-4 Agricultural under the Washington County Development Code.
- As part of a dissolution action between Ms. Bartz and her husband, the aforementioned real property was ordered to be partitioned and sold.
- 4. Ms. Bartz has operated a horse stable on the site for the past 15 years and wishes to continue to own and operate the business.
- 5. In order to be able to retain ownership of the business, Ms. Bartz proposed an open space design development in which 11 residential lots, each approximately 1.6 to 1.8 acres in size would be developed on approximately 30.2 acres of land with the remaining 51.7 acres of the development dedicated to open space. The 51.7 acres dedicated to open space constitutes better than 60 percent of the development.
- 6. Under the development plan submitted by appellants, of the 51.7 acres dedicated to open space, 10.8 acres would be deeded over to the homeowners association as outlots and 40.9 acres would be retained by Ms. Bartz, where she would continue to operate her horse stable business. The retained parcel is denominated as Lot 7 in the Plan.
- 7. The development plan requires all 51.7 acres dedicated to open space to be subject to a conservation easement which would be held by an acceptable land trustee or other similar organization as approved by the County and recorded at the time of final plat as mandated by the Development Code.
- 8. The intended use of the open space by Ms. Bartz and the attendant structures on the parcel comprising Lot 7 is archetypical of the open space concept envisioned in the Development Code.
- 9. In furtherance of the planned subdivision of Victory Pass, appellants applied to Washington County for a Conditional Use Permit for an open space development.

- On October 25, 2005, a public hearing was held by the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission on the application for the Conditional Use Permit.
- 11. On a four (4) to four (4) vote, the Planning Advisory Commission rejected the application for the Conditional Use Permit, citing the continued ownership by Ms. Bartz of the 40.9 acres of open space as the sole reason for the denial.
- 12. Chapter 2, part 3, section 4.6(1)(D) of the Washington County Development Code does allow for designated open space and common facilities to be owned and managed by an individual who will use the land for open space purposes and subjects the land to a conservation easement.
- 13. Ms. Bartz would give a conservation easement to the County on Lot 7 as part of the Conditional Use Permit.
- 14. Because the open space development idea evolved from Ms. Bartz's attempt to retain her horse stable business in the face of an ordered partition and sale of the whole, it would work an undue hardship on Ms. Bartz to require her to deed over Lot 7 to the homeowners association and would result in a loss to the community of a viable business
- 15. Stillwater Township has approved appellants' development plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners reverses the decision of the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission denying a Conditional Use Permit to Cary Bartz and David Adkins for the open space development of Victory Pass.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Conditional Use Permit attached hereto as Attachment 1 be granted to Cary Bartz and David Adkins for the development of Victory Pass.

Victory Pass Conditional Use Permit

- 1. This permit allows for an open space/cluster residential subdivision consisting of 11 residential lots approximately 1.6 to 1.8 acres in size on a parcel of property of approximately 81.9 acres. There will be 51.7 acres of open space (over 60%). One outlot is 10.8 acres and another 40.9 acres has an existing, large horse stable/training facility. One additional residential structure will be constructed on this parcel. Development shall take place in accordance with the plans submitted and dated 09/19/2005.
- 2. A management plan for the open space shall be submitted. This plan shall include long term management of the both Outlot A and Outlot B and Lot 7, Block 2.
- 3. The owner shall transfer fee simple title of Outlot A and B to the Homeowner's Association. Said lots shall be owned and maintained in common by the Homeowner's Association.
- 4. The homeowners association's documents must be submitted to the Washington County Plat Commission for review and approval prior to

the final plat being approved. These documents must be recorded with the plat.

- 5. The plat itself must be reviewed and approved by the Washington County Plat Commission and Stillwater Township and meet the standards of the Washington County Development Code. The final plat must be recorded within one year from the date of this permit or this permit becomes null and void.
- 6. A permanent conservation easement covering Outlot A and B and Lot 7, Block 2 shall be dedicated to an acceptable land trustee or other similar organization as approved by the county and recorded at the time of final plat.
- 7. The boundary of the conservation easement shall be delineated on site with appropriate markings as approved by the Zoning Administrator.
- 8. A copy of the Carnelian/Marine Watershed District Permit shall be submitted.
- All comments from the Department of Transportation and Physical Development shall be made part of this permit and an access permit shall be obtained.
- 10. All Outlots shall not be further subdivided.
- 11. All soil testing shall be submitted to the Washington County Department of Health and Environment. The septic area shall be clearly delineated on the site. The septic drainfield area shall be roped-off with a snow fence in order to preserve the area for the drainfield. Soils on these sites shall not be disturbed. No vehicle of any type shall drive over the area.
- 12. All conditions of the existing Certificate of Compliance dated 10/08/01.

17. Adoption of **Resolution No. 2005-205** as follows:

Amendment to Trunk Highway 120 Turnback Agreement From Interstate 494 to Woodbine Avenue

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Transportation and Washington County did enter into a Cooperative Construction Agreement No. 82976 dated July 23, 2002 providing for payment by the State to the County of the State's share of the cost of intersection improvement construction to be performed by the county at Trunk Highway 120 and Lower Afton Road and bridge rehabilitation construction to be performed at the interchange of Trunk Highway 120 (Valley Creek Road) and Trunk Highway 494; and

WHEREAS, after the Cooperative Construction Agreement No. 82976 was fully executed, the County and the State mutually agreed that the bridge rehabilitation construction scheduled to be performed by the County at the interchange of Trunk Highway 120 (Valley Creek Road) and Trunk Highway 494 will be performed by the State; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Cooperative Construction Agreement No. 82976, the State advanced to the County a lump sum payment of \$2,500,000 and is scheduled to advance \$3,000,000 in Fiscal Year 2007 for the bridge rehabilitation construction; and

WHEREAS, the State and the County desire that Cooperative Construction agreement No. 82976 be amended to reflect a \$2,500,000 County return payment to the State and cancellation of the scheduled Fiscal Year 2007 State payment of \$3,000,000 for the bridge rehabilitation construction that will no longer be performed by the County; and

WHEREAS, the bridge rehabilitation construction that was to be performed by the County under State Projects No. 6227-58 and 8220-9883 will now be performed by the State under State Projects No. 8285-82016 and 8285-88. A separate Cooperative Construction Agreement between the State and the County will be written to cover the County cost participation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Article II of Cooperative Construction Agreement No. 82976 dated July 23, 2002 is hereby amended and modified so as the County will no longer administer the bridge rehabilitation construction; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the County will make a lump sum payment to the State in the amount of \$2,500,000 as a refund of funds previously advanced by the State for work that will no longer be performed by the County; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the scheduled payment of \$3,000,000 to the State in Fiscal Year 2007 shall be cancelled.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING - TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Washington County Development Code Amendment

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of the procedures that will be followed for today's public hearing to consider an amendment to the Washington County Development Code relating to fairgrounds. The Board Secretary confirmed that the notice of public hearing was published in the legal newspaper.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Planner, reviewed his memo of December 12, 2005. The proposed amendment would allow for buildings used for Fair purposes to also be used for seasonal storage under prescribed conditions. The Planning Advisory Commission heard a request from the Agricultural Society to build a new exhibit building on the Washington County Fairground's property in Baytown Township. They also want to use this new building for seasonal storage of boats and recreational vehicles. The current ordinance would prohibit seasonal storage in that building. The Planning Advisory Commission approved an amendment to the ordinance and staff concurs with the Commission's decision. Mr. O'Donnell reviewed the amendment to the Washington County Development Code.

Commissioner Kriesel asked what would happen if the person storing their items in the building do not remove it by April, what is the procedure? Mr. O'Donnell stated the fairgrounds leases the building out to a separate entity and according to those leases everything has to be out by a certain date.

Commissioner Stafford asked about security and insurance. Mr. O'Donnell indicated that the Ag Society leases the building out for the winter months to, say, a marina. The marina would then have the individual contracts with the boat owners or RV owners. It's not the Ag Society that is signing for each piece of equipment.

Byron Anderson, President of the Agricultural Society, is asking that the Board authorize the use of a new exhibit building for seasonal storage. He stated that insurance is carried by the two entities that rent out for storage. There is a security system in each building, so they are well covered as far as insurance and security.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the audience; none were heard. The public hearing was closed at 9:30 a.m.

The Board Secretary indicated that she has received all documentary evidence.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2005-206 as follows:

Resolution Amending the Washington County Development Code Chapter Two, Part 1, Section 2.2(3) Land Uses in an Agricultural District; and Chapter Two, Part 3, Section 2 Standards for Uses

ORDINANCE NO. 172

WHEREAS, Washington County is authorized to carry on county planning and zoning activities in the unincorporated areas of the County pursuant to MINN. STAT. CHAPT. 394; and

WHEREAS, the Washington 2015 Comprehensive Plan was adopted by the Washington County Board of Commissioners on April 22, 1997 and became effective October 1, 1997 as Washington County Ordinance No. 124 and was amended on March 6, 2002 to Washington County 2020 Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, MINN. STAT. § 473.865 requires counties to adopt the official controls described in their Comprehensive Plan so as to implement the Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Development Code was adopted by the Washington County Board of Commissioners and became effective on October 20, 1997 as Washington County Ordinance No. 127; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Planning and Advisory Commission held a public hearing on October 25, 2005 to consider the proposal of county staff that the Washington County Development Code be amended to create

the land use of "Fairgrounds" as a conditionally permitted use in an Agricultural District; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission recommended approval of the amendment; and

WHEREAS, on December 20, 2005, the Washington County Board of Commissioners, pursuant to a Notice of Intent to Amend the Washington County Development Code, conducted a public hearing on the request; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment to Chapter Two, Part 1, Section 2.2(3) adds the land use of "Fairgrounds" as a conditionally permitted use in an Agricultural District; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment to Chapter Two, Part 3 adds Section 2.41 to define "Fairgrounds" as property owned by an Agricultural Society or Association as defined in Minnesota Statute section 38.01 and primarily used for outdoor fairs or exhibitions; and

WHEREAS, the Performance Standards set forth in the proposed amendment to Section 2.41 allows for limited seasonal storage of boats, autos and other recreational vehicles; and

WHEREAS, the proposed land use would be in conformance with the Washington County Comprehensive Plan, a Policy Guide to 2020 and the Washington County Development Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that based upon the hearing record, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby adopts the proposed amendments to the Washington County Development Code as fully set forth in Exhibit A, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Zoning Administrator is directed to make the changes set forth in the Washington County Development Code and cause the same to be published and codified according to law and from and after the effective date of Ordinance 172.

Exhibit A

Amendments to the Washington County Development Code

Amend Chapter Two, Part 1, Section 2.2(3), Land Uses in Agricultural Districts with a Conditional Use Permit to add the following use:

(T) Fairgrounds.

Amend Chapter Two, Part 3, Section 2, Standards for Uses by adding Section 2.41 as follows:

2.41 Fairgrounds

(1) Definition - Fairgrounds is defined as property owned by an Agricultural Society or Association as described in MINN. STAT. § 38.01 and primarily used for outdoor fairs or exhibitions.

- (2) Required Permit The use of the property for the County fair is a permitted use. A conditional use permit is required for other uses of the property as allowed in paragraph (4) below.
- (3) Other requirements Fairgrounds must comply with all rules and regulations of federal, state, County and local agencies.
- (4) Performance Standards Fairgrounds must comply with all of the following standards:
 - (A) A conditional use permit shall be obtained for any use of Fairgrounds property other than the County Fair. (B) The Fairgrounds may be used for recreational activities and other uses previously permitted by terms of any conditional use permit granted prior to adoption of this ordinance.
 - (C) Any building used for Fair purposes may be used for the seasonal storage of boats, autos, and other recreational vehicles if the following conditions are met.
 - 1) All boats, autos and recreational vehicles shall be brought to the Fairgrounds in the month of October and removed during the month of April.
 - 2) No signage is allowed as part of the seasonal storage activities.
 - 3) Buildings used for seasonal storage must be primarily for

Fair purposes and cannot be erected for the main purpose of storage.

- 4) Outside commercial storage is prohibited.
- 5) A conditional use permit is granted.

Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Pulkrabek left the meeting at 9:30 a.m.

WASHINGTON COUNTY LIBRARY

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2005-207** as follows:

Resolution Authorizing Washington County to Apply for \$750,000 of State Library Construction Grant Funds

WHEREAS public library services in the County of Washington will improve with the construction of a library building in Forest Lake, Minnesota; and,

WHEREAS, the County of Washington has title to the site and building where the Forest Lake Public Library will be located; and,

WHEREAS the County of Washington has determined that such construction will cost approximately \$5.2 million; and,

WHEREAS the County of Washington has determined that it will need a matching grant from the Department of Education to pay for such construction and;

WHEREAS the County of Washington shall provide matching funds for expenditures relating to the public library construction project in an amount equal to the amount of the grant from non-state sources and that such match shall be dollar-for-dollar and not matched by in-kind contributions and;

WHEREAS the matching funds are any combination of (i) cash monies, (ii) legally binding commitments for money, or (iii) equivalent funds or contributions, including equity, and;

WHEREAS the source of the matching funds will be the 2003 County General Revenue bond proceeds; and,

WHEREAS the County of Washington understands and agrees to adhere to the list of assurances as stated in the grant application;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the County of Washington authorizes the Washington County Administrator to submit a grant application totaling \$750,000; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Administrator or Deputy County Administrator are authorized independently to sign and submit all applicable contracts, documents and agreements associated with the application or grant agreement on behalf of the County of Washington.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

COURT ADMINISTRATION

Commissioner Stafford moved to approve an agreement for the operation and management of the Washington County Court Self Service Center and transfer the assets and position from the Washington County Law Library Board to the State of Minnesota, Tenth Judicial District Court, Washington County, with a declining allocation over five years. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

2006 Legislative Agenda

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented the 2006 Legislative Agenda and asked for clarification on two items: 1) Assessment Levy would allow cities to opt in or out of the countywide assessment and allow the county to levy on a sub-taxing district to include those communities who are in the countywide assessment; and 2) County support of High Speed Passenger Rail.

Commissioner Stafford asked that a brief definition and description of light rail, commuter rail and high speed rail be included in the package.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to include the support for the high speed passenger rail section. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

Commissioner Stafford asked that the legislative delegation receive the 2006 Legislative Agenda far in advance of the legislative meeting.

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt the 2006 Legislative Agenda as presented. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

Commissioner Pulkrabek returned at 9:45 a.m.

Commissioners Hegberg and Pulkrabek reported on their trip last week to Washington D.C. to lobby against cuts to Medicare and Medicaid and how that would affect the county.

Dan Papin, Community Services Director, updated the Board on what the House passed this past Sunday. Most of the language passed is identical to the language they were concerned about originally. They have not seen any changes, and the amended language they had hoped for did not appear. Three or four areas of major concern are: 1) It will be more difficult to claim Federal IV-E dollars for children in foster care; 2) Temporary Assistance for Needy Families has significant reductions that will make it more difficult for states to draw down Federal dollars because the work requirements for participants have been raised again; 3) Child Support – There was success in beating off an attempt by Congress to reduce the federal financial participation for that program, but they have eliminated the incentive earnings which for Washington County is more significant than what the county would have lost if they had reduced the FFP from 66% to 50%; and 4) Targeted case management – The analysis from HSA is that no change was made in that language. The county could be looking at a \$2.5 million loss affecting 37 staff. The Senate will be taking up the bill today and they will be monitoring that situation.

Mr. Schug indicated that the Metropolitan Inter-County Association 2006 legislative package will be brought back to the County Board for approval after the MICA Board of Directors adopts it in January.

December 27 County Board Meeting

Commissioner Kriesel moved to cancel the County Board meeting for December 27, 2005. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

<u>COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS</u>

Commissioner Hegberg reported on meetings he attended in Hugo. One meeting addressed Judicial Ditch 2. He asked that the Board send a letter to the Governor concerning Rice Lake and asking that it be a managed lake level. The Highway 8 project bids were discussed. He would also like a letter to go to the Metropolitan Council asking them to make their sewer connections as part of the Highway 8 project instead of waiting five or six years when it would be more expensive and they would have to tear up the medians.

Commissioner Hegberg asked that the applicant for the Housing and Redevelopment Authority vacancy in District 1 be interviewed as quickly as possible. He also asked that a copy of that application be faxed to the City of Hugo.

Commissioner Peterson suggested meeting with the Metropolitan Council fairly early next year, possibly January, to discuss transportation issues and potential legislative action.

Commissioner Stafford displayed pictures of snowmobile damage to an area recently planted in exotic grasses, sapling and evergreen trees by the Ramsey-Washington Watershed District and the City of Woodbury to help prevent erosion to the ditch. He stated the City of Woodbury is looking at placing signs there and patrolling the area. He is asking the citizens to be more mindful of where they travel with snowmobiles.

Commissioner Kriesel wished staff and everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Commissioner Peterson also wished staff a very Merry Christmas.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

RECESS FOR AN EXECUTIVE SESSION

Commissioner Hegberg moved to go into Executive Session with the Department of Transportation and Physical Development to discuss purchase agreements with the City of Forest Lake for northern service center/library and transit center/trailhead properties. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; the time being 10:26 a.m. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Pulkrabek, Kriesel, Peterson, Stafford, and Hegberg. Also present were Jim Schug, Molly O'Rourke, Doug Johnson, Richard Hodsdon, Don Theisen, Mike Rogers, Sharon Price, and Patricia Raddatz.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Kriesel moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Hegberg and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at
