WHEREAS, a policy variance will expedite some amendment approvals but not County Board fiscal control on the project or approval of individual amendments over \$25,000; and

WHEREAS, the variance requested is "For the Campus 2025 Improvements County Board approval is required if the sum of amendments for a prime contractor exceed \$100,000 or 5% of the original contract"; and

WHEREAS, once the sum of any prime contractor amendments reach 5% or \$100,000 County Board approval will be required for further amendments.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that for the Campus 2025 Project only and notwithstanding any provisions in the Washington County Contract Guidelines to the contrary the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby adopts the contracting protocol established in Exhibit B which is attached hereto and incorporated herein and delegates to those individuals identified in Exhibit B the authority to perform the acts set forth in Exhibit B.

Rice Creek Watershed District Appointment

I-94 High Speed Busway

Wayne Sandberg, Deputy Director of Transportation and Physical Development, presented an update on the meeting that was held last week in Woodbury to discuss a proposed I-94 high speed busway. Commissioners Orth and Kriesel attended, as well as representatives from Ramsey County, the City of Woodbury, the City of Lake Elmo, City of Lakeland and Senator Kathy Saltzman and Representative Julie Bunn. Although the point of the meeting was to talk about a high speed bus, they ended up talking about the lack of vision and options that the Metropolitan Council has for transit and for transportation opportunities for the East Metro area. They agreed that staff from Ramsey and Washington County will work together to draft legislative proposals and Senator Saltzman will carry a bill to the legislature which identifies funding to help kick-start a transportation corridor study of the I-94 corridor. They also identified the Highway 36 and Highway 5 corridor and will develop language for that. They will bring back to the County Board next week documents for Board discussion.

Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief update on legislative activities. A transportation bill was introduced including: an increase to the gas tax; authorization for counties to implement a wheelage tax up to \$20; a new formula for distribution of funds; and authorization for county boards to act in a joint powers arrangement to consider a ½ cent sales tax in the metro area to be used for transportation and transit.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – REQUESTS

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the Metro Alliance for Healthy Families meeting he attended last week. They discussed developing a joint powers agreement including the seven metro counties. Dakota County would be the lead and carry the financial accounting. The service to be provided would be for new born children who are at high risk of child abuse or neglect. They would be marked for future social service home visits. In Washington County they anticipate approximately 50 children will need this service.

Commissioner Orth reported that he met with a number of Judges yesterday, and will meet with them again this afternoon.

Commissioner Peterson reported on the Association of Minnesota Counties Legislative Committee. She brought back legislative recommendations that she will distribute.

Commissioner Peterson announced that Transportation Day at the Capitol will be held on February 8. On Friday, January 26 from 11:45 a.m. to 1:15 at the University Club Lockridge, Grindal and Nauen will be hosting a leadership lunch. Senator Pogemiller and Representative Anderson Kelliher will speak to the group.

Commissioner Peterson reported that they will be interviewing for a new executive director of the Metropolitan Emergency Services Board this Wednesday.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson abstained.

ASSOCIATION OF GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTS

Ron Cox, Section Vice President of the Association of Government Accounts, presented the County Board with a Certificate of Achievement in Service Efforts and Accomplishments Reporting for the 2005 Washington County Annual Performance Report.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Mike Rogers, Transportation Planner, reviewed action taken regarding a proposed I-94 corridor study. In meeting with staff from Ramsey County it was determined to model the I-94 corridor coalition after the Red Rock and Rush Line corridors to include elected representatives and staff from each agency or municipality who would meet and make decisions for the corridor. They have not decided whether there will be a joint powers agreement for this corridor. A cost estimate of \$1 million to perform a transportation study for the Lake St. Croix Corridor has been discussed: \$350,000 for the I-94 Interregional Corridor Study, and \$650,000 for the I-94 Transit Feasibility Study. Mr. Rogers stated that they will be working on draft language requesting the \$1 million for the study through the Minnesota Legislature. Senator Saltzman's staff will be working on this language with the counties. They will also be working on information about the corridor including what are the transportation numbers, what kind of growth is happening in the corridor, and developing a corridor map. They will continue to work on the 36 corridor improvement options.

Commissioner Peterson suggested that the businesses along I-94 be included in this process. Mr. Rogers stated that the business community has been discussed including the local Chambers of Commerce along the corridor.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Transfer of Responsibilities for the Boomsite Wayside to the DNR

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-006 as follows:

Support Senate File No. 18 Transfer Responsibility for Re-Opening and Operating the Boomsite Historical Wayside to the Department of Natural Resources

BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby supports Senate File 18 of the 2007 Minnesota Legislative Session which, if enacted into law, will transfer the responsibility for re-opening and operating the Boomsite Historical Wayside located 1.2 miles north of the junction of Trunk Highways 95 and 96 in Washington County to the commissioner of natural resources for use as a historic wayside.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners also supports an appropriation to the commissioner of natural resources for the operation and maintenance of the Boomsite Historical Wayside.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Legislative Reception

Jim Schug reminded the Board that there will be a reception with the county legislative delegation this evening at the Oak Marsh Golf Club in Oakdale at 4:45 p.m.

Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District Appointment

Commissioner Hegberg moved to appoint Wayne Moe, Scandia, to the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District Board of Managers to fill an unexpired term to September 22, 2009. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported that Lake County Commissioner Clair Nelson was killed this past weekend while working on his car. Services will be held on Wednesday, January 17. He was an active county commissioner and will be missed.

Commissioner Peterson reported they met with the two finalist for the executive director position of the Metropolitan Emergency Services Board (MESB). They hope to have someone on Board by the first of March. They also met with six lobbying firms and have reduced them to three. The MESB will be meeting with each of the three and then make a decision.

Commissioner Peterson announced that the Minnesota Inter-County Association will hold its annual meeting on Wednesday in Faribault. She will be attending the Metropolitan Transportation Advisory Board (TAB) so she may be late for the meeting. The TAB will be discussing the extension of the Metropolitan Transit taxing authority to include the entire seven county metropolitan area.

Commissioner Peterson reported that there are funds in jeopardy at the federal level regarding transportation. She suggested that the Board lobby the federal delegation to retain those funds. She also reported that the primary seatbelt law is moving through the committees. Finally, the \$800 million in bonding for road and bridge projects that was approved last year, when the new state fiscal year begins on July 1 that number will drop to \$450 million because of inflation. Prices for construction are going up.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated that the Finance Committee will meet following the Board meeting. One item for discussion includes the Whispering Oaks redevelopment. He is in support of the project, but will be asking two questions: 1) How affordable will the affordable houses be; and 2) Will Washington County residents have priority to this housing.

Commissioner Orth reported that the Metro Energy Task Force will be meeting more frequently, and will meet on January 26 in Mankato. This week he will be attending the County Government 101 sessions at the Association of Minnesota Counties.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that the Rush Line Corridor is requesting more funds at the federal level for bus lanes on Highway 61. He also attended the Minnesota Counties Insurance Trust meeting.

Commissioner Kriesel reported on the Metro Energy Task Force meeting he attended last week. A meeting is scheduled for January 26 in Mankato between members of the Metro Energy Task Force and the Rural Energy Board of Counties to discuss governance of a possible wind energy project. They were also updated on the Governor's energy initiatives which call for 25% more renewable energies by 2025, energy conservation, and less carbon emissions in the state. They also heard about the CAP-X 2020 a transmission project.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

The Board recessed into Executive Session to discuss litigation strategy regarding Hilyar vs. State of Minnesota and Washington County whereby Ms. Hilyar is challenging the tax forfeiture of her two properties located in Washington County. Her basic challenge is predicated on the constitutionality of the forfeiture statutes. The parties met in court ordered mediation and a tentative settlement was negotiated. The settlement will be presented to the County Board in order to discuss the pros and cons of the settlement and how these impact the lawsuit. The Board recessed into Executive Session at 9:52 a.m. Present for the Executive Session were Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg. Also present were Jim Schug, Molly O'Rourke, Doug Johnson, George Kuprian, Kevin Corbid, Tom Carlson, Carlson & Soldo, John Stein, MCIT, and Patricia Raddatz, Board Secretary. The Executive Session concluded at 10:21 a.m.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Hegberg moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Pulkrabek and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:21 a.m.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, a public hearing is required to be held prior to the issuance of the Bonds by the County;

- The Board of Commissioners of the County hereby gives preliminary approval for the issuance of the Bonds, and authorizes Kennedy & Graven, Chartered, as bond counsel, and Springsted, as financial advisor, to prepare the necessary documentation for the authorization, sale, and issuance of the Bonds.

Commissioner Orth moved to reappoint Steve Dornfeld to the Parks and Open Space Commission to a first full term expiring December 31, 2009. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief overview of the Governor's proposed budget and its effect on counties including: \$45 million for improvements and changes in the mental health delivery system; property tax relief including a potential cap on property taxes for jurisdictions who receive over a third of their general fund from state aid, typically Washington County receives a smaller proportion in state aid; improvement in funding for short term offenders increasing the daily reimbursement from \$10 to \$30; improved veterans and military benefits; proposal for bonding and one time funding for road projects of \$1.7 billion; \$16 million infusion into the CrimNet program; build out of the statewide 800 MHz radio system; increase in local government aid; improvement to the market value based homestead credit; a number of

changes to the Minnesota Family Investment Plan that would bring the state into better compliance with the federal requirements; additional work with preparing the pandemic influenza possibility; and a possibility of \$115,000 to Washington County for Community Corrections act funding.

Commissioner Peterson stated that the Governor would like to transition from a gas tax to some form of mileage tax based on the miles that are traveled.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported that the first meeting of the Hastings bridge reconstruction, which is scheduled for 2012, was held. She noted that Representative Ann Lenczewski sent a letter to the citizens in the southwest quarter encouraging the development of the I-494 busway or transitway. Commissioner Peterson indicated she has talked to Senator Sieben indicating they should be part of that group. She feels that Washington County has a lot of residents who use the I-494 corridor and believes the county should be involved with those discussions.

Commissioner Orth reported that he attended the Association of Minnesota Counties conference for newly elected commissioners last week. Many topics were covered and he learned a lot.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the HRA meeting he attended last week which discussed the Whispering Oaks redevelopment and improvements to the kitchens at Parkside Apartments. He attended the Metro Transit Board on Wednesday. He feels that the east side of the metro needs to be more diligent in trying to get funding, especially in the transitway area. They are seeing a lot of projects coming up that are going to the west side of the metro. He met with the City of Hugo and discussed the I-35 corridor and those issues, and with the new harness track going into Anoka County that will cause bottlenecks in Washington County. They also discussed Metropolitan Council's decision to close down the sewer septic station in the area in June and now the pumpers will have to drive to the cities with their loads. The waste from Forest Lake, Scandia and that area will have to go to downtown St. Paul and that plant will close in 2008 so they will have to go farter south to the Pigs Eye plant.

Commissioner Pulkrabek left the meeting at 9:20 a.m.

Commissioner Kriesel reported that he attended the Lower St. Croix Valley Alliance which includes the elected officials of the five river communities. Sheriff Hutton and Chief Deputy Mike Johnson attended. Following that meeting there was a presentation by Cory Slagle, Transportation Department, on the CR 18 project and the roundabouts that will be installed in that area.

Social Security Resolution for Entities with Elected Officials Currently Holding Positions Covered by the Defined Contribution Plan and Excluded from the Coordinated Plan

WHEREAS, legislative changes made in 2006 to Minnesota Statutes Section 355 establish procedures that allow a governmental subdivision to extend Social Security coverage to certain local elected officials who are members of, or are eligible for membership in, the Defined Contribution Plan administered by the Public Employees Retirement Association; and

WHEREAS, Washington County desires to offer Social Security coverage to its eligible elected officials.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners does hereby adopt the following resolution:

Section 1. It is hereby declared to be the policy of this governing body to extend the provisions of Minnesota Statutes Section 355, as amended by Chapter 271 or 2006, providing Social Security coverage to eligible elected officials of Washington County.

Section 2. In pursuance of said policy the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby requests and authorizes the execution of a divided vote referendum under Section 218(d)(6) of the Social Security Act for the purpose of allowing current eligible elected officials the option of paying the Social Security tax. The coverage of current local elected officials shall be effective as of May 9, 2007 for those eligible officials who vote "Yes" in the divided vote Social Security referendum. The referendum will be conducted pursuant to applicable state and federal laws and regulations by a designee of this entity under the supervision of a representative of the Public Employees Retirement Association acting as the designated State Social Security Administrator.

Section 3. The Public Employees Retirement Association is hereby directed to execute a modification to the section 218 Agreement between the State of Minnesota and the Secretary of Health and Human Services to secure Social Security coverage of the eligible elected officials who vote "Yes" in the referendum and all local newly-elected officials of this governmental subdivision.

Section 4. Withholdings from the salaries of elected officials for the purposes provided in this resolution are hereby authorized to be made in the amounts and at such times as may be required by applicable federal and state laws and regulations.

Section 5. Employer contributions shall be paid from amounts appropriated for such purposes and payment of employee and employer contributions shall be paid to the Internal Revenue Service in such amounts and at such times as are designated in Internal Revenue Code.

Section 6. Washington County shall maintain such records and submit such reports as may be required by the Public Employees Retirement Association or the Social Security Administration.

Section 7. This resolution shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage.

I-94 Feasibility Analysis

Commissioner Orth moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-015 as follows:

Support for Funding for the I-94 Corridor Transportation Feasibility Analysis

WHEREAS, the Interstate 94 (I-94) corridor is the principal east/west route for traffic thru Ramsey Washington, and St. Croix Counties connecting St. Paul to the eastern metropolitan area; and

WHEREAS, the I-94 Corridor is experiencing robust employment and population growth; and

WHEREAS, the I-94 Corridor is experiencing increasing levels of congestion, reducing mobility in the corridor; and

WHEREAS, there are no planned highway improvements to the I-94 Corridor in the Metropolitan Council's 2030 Transportation Policy Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Department of Transportation has identified I-94 as a high priority Interregional Corridor and is supportive of planning for mobility improvements in the Corridor; and

WHEREAS, Washington County recognizes the need to plan for mobility improvements in the I-94 Corridor; and

WHEREAS, this planning should take a multi-modal, highways and transit, approach to maintaining Corridor mobility; and

WHEREAS maintaining mobility is necessary for the continued prosperity and economic vitality of residents, businesses, and commuters throughout the Eastern Metropolitan area; and

WHEREAS, the first step in planning for a multi-modal I-94 Corridor is to complete a Transportation Feasibility Analysis which includes analyzing highway and transit improvements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Washington County supports the multi-modal evaluation of the I-94 Corridor and a request of \$1 million in State funds for the completion of the I-94 Transportation Feasibility Analysis.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Drainage Study, CSAH 18 in Afton

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve a contract with Short Elliott Hendrickson, Inc. to perform a drainage study for the reconstruction of Washington County State Aid Highway 18 (CSAH 18) in Afton, for a cost not to exceed \$36,010. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hegberg left the meeting at 9:37 a.m.

Design Services, CSAH 18 in Lakeland and Lakeland Shores

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve a contract with Short Elliott Hendrickson, Inc. for design services for the reconstruction of Washington County State Aid Highway 18 (CSAH 18) in Lakeland and Lakeland Shores, for a cost not to exceed \$228,418. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent.

Commissioner Hegberg returned at 9:40 a.m.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Lowell Johnson, Director of Public Health and Environment, reviewed the Metro Alliance for Healthy Families project. He stated this is a regional initiative dedicated to prevent child maltreatment, abuse and neglect on a large metro-wide scale. They also want to address issues of family mobility and outreach in a regional health care system. The outcomes of this initiative will be avoidance of out of home placement, and improved child health and readiness for school. A joint powers agreement has been created that includes the counties of Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott, Washington, and the City of Bloomington.

Commissioner Orth moved that the County Board Chair and County Administrator are authorized to enter into a Joint Powers Agreement for the Metro Alliance for Healthy Families. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson moved to appoint Commissioner Dennis Hegberg to the Metro Alliance for Healthy Families Governing Board and Commissioner Orth as alternate. Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a legislative update on a bill that was introduced regarding short term offenders that would increase the reimbursement to counties—since 2003 through 2006 it has cost the county \$640,000. Minnesota Inter County Association (MICA) supports a bill that was introduced that would require the state to reimburse counties for the last four years of services they provided under this law. It would be a one time payment out of the projected surplus and that they would also pay \$55 a day for any future prisoners that are transferred from the state prison to the county jails.

Commissioner Peterson asked that Mr. Schug's memorandum and report be sent to the Association of Minnesota Counties and MICA.

Mr. Schug noted that a smoking ban bill has been introduced that would expand the smoking ban in public places statewide which is what the county has supported.

Mr. Schug noted that MICA and the Metropolitan Cities group is hosting two transportation forums. The first one is February 8 from 7:30 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. at Southview Country Club in West St. Paul, which will represent the southern part of the county. On February 22, from 7:30 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. forum will be held in New Brighton to address the northern part of the county.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported on the AMC Legislative Committee she attended last week. The smoking ban has divided the group up and is a hotly discussed item. They were concerned that the bill would take away local control.

Commissioner Peterson moved to appoint Commissioner Dennis Hegberg as a delegate, and Commissioner Kriesel as an alternate, to the Association of Minnesota Counties Board of Directors. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to appoint Commissioner Greg Orth as the Association of Minnesota Counties District X representative. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Pulkrabek noted that he will be meeting with representatives from the City of Lake Elmo on February 7. He also addressed the murders in Waseca and that the suspect in those murders in the last five years had been convicted of five different crimes. He finds that disturbing and wonders why he was out in public and not incarcerated.

Commissioner Kriesel reported on a meeting he attended of the Metropolitan Energy Task Force last week that is looking at a governance study partnering with the rural energy board to help facilitate a wind energy project. He recommended that the County Board hold a workshop to discuss this further and to receive direction.

Commissioner Kriesel advised the Board that the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp will be discussing policy changes regarding veterans' rights to use the facility and have equal rights for all veterans and not the long-term rentals that have taken place in the past.

INTRODUCTION OF MARK RITCHIE, MINNESOTA SECRETARY OF STATE

Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services, introduced Mark Ritchie, the newly elected Secretary of State. Secretary Ritchie presented his vision for his office and what he hoped to accomplish during his term.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve the Workforce Investment Act, Title 1B Master Grant Agreement (covering adult, youth, dislocated worker, and older Americans programs) with the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development. Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson, Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg; No, Commissioner Pulkrabek.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to deny execution of an agreement with the University of Minnesota to provide Extension programs locally and employ county Extension staff. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion. The motion failed 2-3 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson and Pulkrabek; No, Commissioners Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to authorize the County Board Chair and the County Administrator to enter into an agreement with the University of Minnesota to provide Extension programs locally and employ county Extension staff. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted 3-2 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg; No, Commissioners Peterson and Pulkrabek.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Don Theisen, Director of Transportation and Physical Development, presented updates on the North and South Service Centers. He indicated that they expect to take occupancy of the South Service Center in Cottage Grove the first week in March. On Friday, April 13 they hope to move staff into the building and they will unpack over the weekend. They will then have a soft opening on Monday, April 16. Sometime between May and June they are looking at having the grand opening with a ribbon cutting by the County Board. They want to make sure the road to the service center is complete, and the landscaping is finished.

Mr. Theisen reported that for the North Service Center in Forest Lake they are still looking at a late summer completion and a fall grand opening. There will also be a ground breaking ceremony for the Transit Center and bike trail head in that area.

Mr. Theisen reported that the overall budget is still on target. The two change orders he is requesting today deal with electrical equipment in the Forest Lake Service Center and the mechanical system in the Cottage Grove Service Center. Change Order #4 in the Cottage Grove Service Center is the result of a design error. They will be requesting a similar change order at the Forest Lake Service Center because of the same design error. Final county costs for these change orders will be reduced by a payment from the design firm.

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve Change Order #3 with Gephart Electric, Inc. for \$43,169 at the Forest Lake Service Center/Library; and Change Order #4 with Kumar Mechanical, Inc. for \$126,327 at the Cottage Grove Service Center. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, reported that Don Theisen was elected President of the Minnesota County Engineers Association at their annual meeting in January.

Mr. Schug presented a legislative update on the following items: Payment of public defenders on a standby basis for which counties would be responsible for this payment, MICA is actively testifying against that; a hearing on funding for State short-term offenders housed in county jails has been scheduled for Thursday, February 16 at 12:30 p.m. in Room 10 of the State Office Building; a proposal for \$10 million in bonding for the State's share of the high speed rail between St. Paul and Chicago has been introduced; and, there is a hearing coming up on the maintenance of effort requirement in the chemical dependency treatment fund.

Mr. Schug noted that there is a County Legislative Committee meeting later this morning to discuss a proposal to seek funding to assist the Disabled Veteran's Rest Camp in doing their capital improvements.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Orth reported that he attended the Metro Emergency Services Board 911 Hero Award. An award was given to a child who saved his father by dialing 911. A discussion followed about how to improve a child's response to emergencies. He was formerly with School District 833 and designed training programs and videos for children. If any Commissioner would like copies of this information he can provide that to them.

Commissioner Kriesel reported he attended the Stillwater Township meeting with legislators and citizen advocates to determine how to get the Boomsite rest area open. He provided the legislators with the resolution of support from the County Board. The issue is who will be the lead agency and he mentioned that it wasn't part of the county's mission.

Commissioner Hegberg feels that the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources would be the appropriate agency, since the Boomsite is on the scenic St. Croix River.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked for some valuations of businesses in the Old Village in Lake Elmo. He has heard there have been significant jumps. He asked for a comparison from last year to this year.

February 13, 2007

Commissioner Peterson reported that she and Commissioner Kriesel attended an early morning meeting with MICA and the cities group to hear a report on transportation issues. She also noted that Commissioner Kriesel received a letter from Dakota County Commissioner Mike Turner about the 1/2 cent sales tax meeting of February 28 at 1:00 p.m. to hear an overview of the House and Senate Bill, and receive perspectives from MICA, Metro Transitway Development Board and AMC.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Peterson and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 9:55

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA FEBRUARY 20, 2007

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:00 a.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg. Absent none. Board Chair Kriesel presided. Also present were James Schug, County Administrator; Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; George Kuprian, Assistant County Attorney; Doug Johnson, County Attorney; Don Theisen, Director of Transportation and Physical Development; Wayne Sandberg, Deputy Director of Transportation and Physical Development; Ted Schoenecker, Transportation Engineer; Keith Potter, Facilities Manager; Harley Will, Financial Services Director; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Richard Backman, Community Services Division Manager; Mjyke Nelson, Information Technology Director; Melinda Kirk, Budget/Financial Analyst; Sheriff Bill Hutton; Tom Adkins, Community Corrections Director; Lowell Johnson, Director of Public Health and Environment; Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Rebecca Ault, Property Records and Taxpayer Services; and Steve Nelson, Public Information Coordinator II.

The Board recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

The Board Chair asked for comments from the public; none were heard.

PUBLIC HEARING - FINANCIAL SERVICES

Consider the Issuance of G.O. Capital Improvement Bonds up to the Amount of \$82 Million

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of the procedures for today's public hearing to consider a proposal to issue up to \$82,000,000 in general obligation bonds in order to finance projects under Washington County's 2007 to 2011 Capital Improvement Plan which was adopted on December 19, 2006. The Board Secretary indicated that notice of the public hearing was published and the affidavit of publication is on the record.

Don Theisen, Director of Transportation and Physical Development, reviewed the projects to be included in the issuance of general obligation bonds as follows: Big Marine Park Reserve Phase 1 Development and Park Land Acquisition (\$6,300,000); CSAH 13 Improvement (\$4,500,000), CSAH 2 Reconstruction (\$12,000,000); and the Campus 2025 Expansion (\$56,400,000).

Kathy Aho, President of Springsted, Inc., reviewed the financial aspects of this proposal including: statutory authority; county's overall debt authority; county's CIP debt limit; proposed bond issue; financing plan which incorporates the new issue within legal restraints, limits annual increase in taxes for debt service to a manageable lever, provides for a Phase 3 financing in 2009 (Phase 1 was sold in 2003), and applies

\$1,200,000 of existing debt service funds to reduce the need for capitalized interest until levy is in place for 2008. If the resolution is adopted today providing for the sale of the bonds, then final recommendations regarding the structure and authorization for the actual sale would be made in April, competitive offers for the bonds would be received in May, and funds for the projects would be received in June.

John Freed, Forest Engineering, 1520 Southwest 9th Avenue, Forest Lake – Mr. Freed directed his questions to the reconstruction of CSAH 2, Broadway Avenue in Forest Lake. He asked if there would be any costs to that project that are not included in the total cost? Mr. Theisen stated the chart shows all the known sources of revenue, there could be other costs, but this is the known amount of revenue to build the project.

Mr. Freed asked about the two different projects for CSAH 2, the Broadway Avenue Interchange and the other, would that be about \$6,000,000 for each project? Commissioner Hegberg stated that is correct, approximately.

Mr. Freed asked are those dollar amounts locked into those two portions of the project? Commissioner Hegberg stated he does not believe they are locked in because there isn't a final design and the final costs have not been determined. However, the Federal funds are divided into what the county can spend within the two sections.

Mr. Freed asked were there restrictions on the use of that \$12,000,000 in relation to the Broadway project? Commissioner Hegberg stated if the project came in at \$9,000,000 the other \$3,000,000 could be used for another road project someplace else. Or, if this road project was not done, the county could spend it on other road projects in the county.

Mr. Freed stated that the \$12,000,000 included in this bond issue is not necessarily earmarked for Forest Lake? Commissioner Hegberg stated that is what it is for at this time, but it could be amended at a later date.

Mr. Freed stated his concern up there is about the different portions of the project and the design—the roundabouts versus other alternatives. They would appreciate inclusion in this. There is a major traffic problem along Broadway and inclusion of a significant amount of money would go a long way in helping to alleviate that problem. Their concern is how that would best be used to solve the problem up there. But whatever they can get would certainly be a big help.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the audience; none were heard. The Board Secretary reported that she has received all documentary evidence.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously. The public hearing was closed at 9:35 a.m.

Commissioner Peterson stated she will support the bond issue, but she still maintains that court services are needed where the people live. She feels that the majority of the population growth is in the south and the north. It troubles her when the Board decides to deliver services where the people do not live.

Commissioner Kriesel stated this issue has been discussed for many years, even before he became a commissioner. The citizens advisory committee provided input into the need for the courts expansion, the consolidation of services, record keeping, and the citizens can come to the Government Center and have their needs taken care of. He believes this is a significant capital improvement project, and he is very pleased that it will not spike taxes. He commended the previous County Boards who set the 5% debt growth. They have been fiscally responsible.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-016 as follows:

Resolution Preliminarily Providing for the Sale and Issuance of General Obligation Capital Improvement Bonds, Series 2007A, in an Estimated Original Principal Amount of \$82,000,000

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Commissioners of Washington County Minnesota, (the "County") as follows:

- It is hereby found and determined that:
 - (a) The County has duly adopted its Capital Improvements Plan for the years 2007-2011, as amended (the "CIP Plan"), in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Section 373.40, as amended.
 - (b) The CIP Plan identifies various capital projects (the "Projects") that are proposed to be financed with the proceeds of general obligation indebtedness of the County issued under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Section 373.40, as amended, and Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 475, as amended (collectively, the "Act"). The Projects provide for the acquisition or betterment of public lands, buildings or other improvements within the County for the purpose of one or more of the following: improvements to the County courthouse campus, park land acquisition, betterment of parklands, and improvements to certain roads in the County.
 - (c) The Board of Commissioners of the County held a public hearing on this date (February 20, 2007) with respect to the issuance of the Bonds (as defined below) by the County. The public was given an opportunity to be heard at the public hearing with respect to the issuance of the Bonds.
- 2. To provide financing for certain Projects, the County will therefore issue and sell its General Obligation Capital Improvement Bonds, Series 2007A (the "Bonds"), in the original aggregate principal amount estimated not to exceed \$82,000,000, said amount to include, as needed, additional interest required to market the Bonds at the time of sale, to provide for capitalized interest until such place as property tax collections or other funds are sufficient to pay interest when due on the Bonds, and to pay costs of issuance related to the sale of the Bonds coming due on the additional Bonds. The Bonds will be sold, issued and delivered in accordance with terms and conditions to be established by the Board of Commissioners at a subsequent date.

- 3. The previous action taken by County employees is hereby ratified in establishing the date and time of the public hearing before the Board of Commissioners as required by provisions of the Act as a condition to the issuance of the Bonds and publishing a notice of such public hearing in the official newspaper of the County or in a newspaper of general circulation in the County once at least fourteen (14) days but not more than twenty-eight (28) days prior to the date of the public hearing.
- Springsted, as financial advisor to the County, is authorized and directed to assist the County in determining appropriate terms and conditions of sale and negotiating the sale of the Bonds through the solicitation of competitive offers.
- 5. The law firm of Kennedy & Graven, Chartered, as bond counsel for the County, is authorized to act as bond counsel and to assist in the preparation and review of necessary documents, certificates and instruments relating to the Bonds. The Chair of the Board of Commissioners, the Acting County Administrator and other officers, employees and agents of the County are hereby authorized to assist Kennedy & Graven, Chartered in the preparation of such documents, certificates, and instruments.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

Cheryl Anderson, Washington County Citizen Review Panel co-chair, presented their 2006 Annual Report.

Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the 2006 Citizen Review Panel Annual Report. Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Ted Schoenecker, Transportation Engineer, presented a progress report on CSAH 19 (Keats Avenue and Woodbury Drive) projects including: CSAH 19 and I-94 north ramp intersection improvement, CSAH 19 trail improvements, and CSAH 19 mill and overlay. Final approval of plans should occur in March, with award of contract and beginning of construction to occur in late May or early June, 2007.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Commissioner Peterson moved to support Senate File 821 appropriating funds for capital improvements for the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp. Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson hopes that if there are inadequacies in well and septic she believes those should be addressed as a priority item. She also suggested if there is a possibility of a joint venture between the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp and the Big Marine Park concerning well and septic systems that it could be looked at.

Jim Schug provided an update on other legislative activity as follows: The House Tax Committee heard a bill yesterday that would exempt local governments from sales tax including improvements to courthouses, which could save Washington County approximately \$1,000,000 on materials for that project alone; discussion held on the light rail central corridor; and a bill was heard on the chemical dependency maintenance of effort issue in the Senate Health and Human Services Budget Committee that would gradually decrease the high maintenance of effort responsibility that counties such as Washington, Hennepin, and a few others have, over time and would equalize all the counties across the state.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the AMC Board of Directors meeting and transportation was a major subject. They are also considering a new committee for corrections. He also reported on the meeting several Commissioners attended to discuss transit issues and the Union Depot in St. Paul. He feels the Central Corridor should run to the Depot so a seamless transit system can be provided.

Commissioner Peterson suggested having an update on Ramsey County's efforts to use the Union Depot to accommodate all modes of transportation.

Commissioner Orth reported he attended the groundwater contamination and public information session in Woodbury. It was well attended by those who were concerned about contamination. Although there is not much serious groundwater contamination there are still a lot of PFBA's to be continually monitored in the southeast area in both public and private wells. The chemicals come from sites in Lake Elmo, Oakdale, Woodbury and Cottage Grove. The Minnesota Department of Health will continue to monitor that to make sure the water is safe to drink.

Commissioner Kriesel stated he has had a request from West Lakeland to be included in the I-94 corridor meetings.

February 20, 2007

Commissioner Peterson testified at the Capitol last week advocating for high speed rail. On March 28 and

29 there will be a 2007 legislative conference. The Association of Minnesota Counties, the League of

Minnesota Cities and the Minnesota School Board Association will all meet together to discuss legislative

issues. She encouraged the entire Board to attend.

Commissioner Peterson asked staff to prepare a board action that would reaffirm the county's position in

support of transit, essentially Senator Murphy's bill supporting transportation funding.

Commissioner Pulkrabek mentioned that last year Governor Pawlenty appointed him to chair the nominating

committee for appointments to the Metropolitan Council. This committee will make recommendations to

the Governor's Office as to who should sit on the Met Council. This committee will be convening the

second or third week in March because there are two openings on the council.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn,

seconded by Commissioner Pulkrabek and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at

Resolution for Continuing Participation in the HOME Consortium with Anoka County, Dakota County, Ramsey County and the City of Coon Rapids

WHEREAS, Title I of the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act (the Act) affirms the national goal that every American family be able to afford a decent home in a suitable environment; and

WHEREAS, Title II of the Act provides for formula allocation of funds among eligible state and local governments; and

WHEREAS, Section 216 (2) of the Act provides for formation of consortia of units of general local government for the purposes of the Act; and

WHEREAS, Anoka County, Dakota County, Ramsey County, Washington County, and the City of Coon Rapids are jointly contiguous units of general local government and each have sufficient authority and administrative capability to carry out the purposes of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned counties agreed in the Spring of 2004 to a HOME Consortium agreement that renews every three years,

WHEREAS, continued participation in the HOME Consortium will enable Washington County to receive Home Investment Partnership Program funding to meet the affordable housing needs of low-income residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves Washington County Community Services continued participation in the HOME consortia with Anoka County, Dakota County, Ramsey County, and the City of Coon Rapids for the 2008, 2009, and 2010 program years.

- 5. Adoption of **Resolution No. 2007-022** as follows:

Resolution Required by Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code Giving Approval to a Project on Behalf of Senior Care Communities, Inc. and Approving the Issuance of Certain Obligations by the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Therefor

WHEREAS, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 462C, as amended (the "Act"), the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority, a public body corporate and politic and political subdivision of the State of Minnesota created and existing under Minnesota Laws 1974, Chapter 475, and Minnesota Statutes, Sections 469.001 through 469.047, as amended (the "Authority") is authorized to carry out the public purposes described in the Act by providing for the issuance of revenue bonds or notes and loaning the proceeds thereof to provide funds to finance or refinance certain multifamily housing developments located within Washington County, Minnesota (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, Senior Care Communities, Inc. (the "Corporation"), a Minnesota nonprofit corporation and an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), has requested that the Authority issue revenue bonds, notes or other obligations (the "Obligations") pursuant to the Act and loan the proceeds derived from the sale of the Obligations to the Corporation or one or more wholly-owned subsidiaries of the Corporation (the Corporation and any and all such subsidiaries, collectively, the "Borrower") to finance the acquisition, rehabilitation, and improvement of real property commonly known as Woodbury Senior Living Campus, including a 64-unit assisted living facility,

a 75-unit independent/assisted living facility and a 212-bed nursing home facility, located at 7012 Lake Road in Woodbury, Minnesota, and real property commonly known as Birchwood Senior Living Campus, including a 46-unit assisted living facility and a 150-bed nursing home facility, located at 740 Northeast First Street in Forest Lake, Minnesota (collectively, the "Project"), to be owned and operated by the Borrower, and managed by Covenire Care, LLC, a Minnesota limited liability company, as a multifamily housing development for rental primarily to elderly or disabled persons, and a health care facility; and

WHEREAS, the Obligations are proposed to be issued in one or more series in an original aggregate principal amount estimated not to exceed \$45,000,000 and loaned to the Borrower pursuant to one or more loan or revenue agreements to finance the acquisition, rehabilitation and improvement of the Project, fund a debt service reserve or other reserves and pay the costs of issuance with respect to the Obligations; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Commissioners of the County (the "County Board") has been advised that the Authority conducted a public hearing with respect to the proposed issuance of the Obligations and the financing of the Project preceded by notice of the time and place of the hearing, the general nature of the Project and an estimate of the principal amount of Obligations published in accordance with the requirements of the Act and Section 147(f) of the Code and at such public hearing all parties were given an opportunity to express their views with respect to the proposed Project and the issuance of the Obligations; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has requested that the governing body of the County approve the Project and the financing of the Project by the issuance of the Obligations by the Authority, for purposes of Section 147(f) of the Code; and

WHEREAS, the full faith and credit of the County will not be pledged to or responsible for the Project or the payment of the principal of, premium, if any, or interest on the Obligations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Washington County Board of Commissioners as follows:

- The Project and the issuance by the Authority of the Obligations pursuant to the Act in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$45,000,000 to finance the costs thereof, all as described above, is hereby approved by the County Board for purposes of Section 147(f) of the Code.
- 2. In no event shall the Obligations ever be payable from or charged upon any funds of the County and no holder of the Obligations shall ever have the right to compel the exercise of the taxing power of the County to pay the Obligations or the interest thereon, nor to enforce the payment thereof against any property of the County. The Obligations shall not constitute a charge, lien or encumbrance, legal or equitable, upon any property of the County, nor shall the Obligations constitute an indebtedness of the County within the meaning of any constitutional, statutory or charter limitation.

- 3. The Chair of the County Board and the County Administrator shall execute and deliver such certificates and other documents as may be necessary on the date of delivery of the Obligations as may be reasonably necessary or appropriate for the undertaking of the Project and the issuance of the Obligations.
- 6. Approval of two Special Project Community Health Specialists (1.5 FTE) positions in the Department of Public Health and Environment for twelve months.
- Approval of a new 1.00 FTE position of Management Analyst I in the Department of Transportation and Physical Development.
- 8. Approval of Joint Powers Agreement with Scott County to combine efforts to successfully convert data from the current ACS Tax System to the newly purchased Manatron Tax System.
- Approval to accept \$150 donation from Laura and Pat Bailey in honor of their mother, Joanne Bailey, for the summer reading program at Newport Branch Library.
- 10. Orville Linquist, YMCA's Youth in Government Program Executive, presented Washington County Election's Division a plaque in recognition of their help in the 2007 Minnesota YMCA's Youth in Government program by writing programs for the 17 different elections, preparing the ballots, providing access to the county's printing vendor, providing voting machines, training volunteers on how to use the machines, and providing assistance the entire day of the election.

Acceptance of Electronic Recordings

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-023 as follows:

Resolution Authorizing Washington County Recorder/Registrar to Accept Electronic Recordings Pursuant to Minnesota Statute

WHEREAS, Washington County intends to implement electronic filing of those real estate documents as permitted in pilot projects authorized by the task force created by Laws 2000, Chapter 391; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Laws 2005, Chapter 156, Article 2, Sections 40 and 42, a resolution which constitutes a written certification of compliance with paragraph (b), clause (2) of each of those sections and also signed by the County Recorder is required as a condition of accepting electronic filings. The certification, once accepted by the Task Force, constitutes authority to implement and accept electronic filings.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of Washington County, and the County Recorder of Washington County, as evidenced by the authorized signatures below hereby declare:

- That Washington County intends to implement electronic filing of those real estate documents permitted in pilot projects authorized by the task force created by Laws 2000, chapter 391; and
- 2. That Washington County will comply with the standards adopted by that Task Force for the electronic filing of real estate documents; and
- 3. That Washington County will use software validated by the Task Force for the electronic filing of real estate documents.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Roundabout Presentation

Ted Schoenecker, Transportation Engineer, presented an informational DVD on roundabouts which was created with the help of Washington County.

Change Order #4 - North Service Center/Library

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve Change Order #4 with Master Mechanical, Inc. for \$104,010 at the North Service Center/Library. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Jim Luger, Parks Director, stated this Change Order is due to a design error. Final county costs for this change order will be reduced by a payment from the design firm.

Amendment #3 - South Service Center

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve amendment #3 to Peoples Electric, Inc. contract for revisions and additions of material and labor at the South Service Center. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Support for Transportation and Transit Funding

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-024 as follows:

Support for Transportation and Transit Funding

WHEREAS, Transportation and Transit Funding in Minnesota has not kept pace with the need to keep our transportation infrastructure maintained, and to build for the future of Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, a robust transportation and transit network is and will continue to be critical to the economic vitality of the state; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has a history of supporting funding for transportation and transit improvements; and

WHEREAS, a comprehensive and statewide solution will be needed to solve this crisis; and

WHEREAS, Washington County supports legislative efforts to develop this statewide solution.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby supports statewide legislative initiatives to increase funding for transportation and transit initiatives in Minnesota.

Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson was saddened to see the action that the Metropolitan Council took on the Central Corridor. It failed to have the Central Corridor go to the concourse level of the Depot in St. Paul. She stated there has been a vision advocated for the \$50 million appropriated for the Union Depot and they are designing a system that is not going to be seamless. She is saddened to see the shortsightedness of the Metropolitan Council by not addressing the regional vision. She will be writing a letter to the editor and encouraged other Board members to take a strong posture about seamless transportation at the Union Depot.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update on the following items: Meeting to be held tomorrow at 1:00 p.m. at the Association of Minnesota Counties building to talk about a proposal for a metro-wide sales tax for transportation and transit; there are a number of bills being heard that would

reimburse counties for the cost of housing short-term offenders from state prisons; movement in having bills heard that would exempt local units of government from sales tax; the nickel a drink excise tax bill has been heard and staff has testified; and continued discussion of the maintenance of effort for the consolidated chemical dependency treatment fund.

Mr. Schug noted that Commissioner Kriesel, Don Theisen, and others testified in support of the \$1 million appropriation to the Disabled Veteran's Rest Camp to make capital improvements. Several local businesses and trades unions have discussed donating time and materials to do voluntary work to help with the capital improvements. The committee adopted the recommendation that there would be a \$1 million appropriation to the Veteran's Rest Camp and have held it for possible inclusion in an omnibus bill coming out of that committee.

Commissioner Kriesel thanked Senator Saltzman for being the author of the Disabled Veteran's Rest Camp bill. He believed it was well received by the committee.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Orth reported that Commissioner Kriesel was elected Chair of the Resource Recovery Project Board and he was elected to the Budget Committee. Commissioner Orth stated he would be attending the Eastern Transit Alliance meeting this evening. He also reported that he will be attending the National Association of Counties Conference in Washington D.C. and will not be attending next week's meeting.

Commissioner Pulkrabek announced that he would also be attending the National Association of Counties Conference in Washington D.C. and will not be attending next week's meeting.

Commissioner Kriesel reported that he has been attending many meetings with the Veteran's Rest Camp Board to discuss a new policy that places some of the camp sites into rotation. They have adopted policies that will over time place those sites into rotation and make them available for all veterans. They are currently working on whether those sites should be rented out on a weekly, monthly, or annual basis.

Commissioner Kriesel mentioned that a workshop will be held in March for an update on the wind energy initiative.

Commissioner Peterson asked that the Board consider appointing Jennifer Levitt to the Groundwater Advisory Committee representing municipalities.

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Pulkrabek and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:05 a.m.

Division to administer the grant and provide reemployment services to laid-off Andersen Windows employees. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Pulkrabek and Orth absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief update on transportation/transit issues discussed at the legislature last week: an appropriation for studying transportation/transit improvements along Highway 36; appropriation of \$1.5 million for the design and construction of park and ride facilities along the Red Rock Corridor; Senate File 658 which would provide \$1 million in bonding for transportation and transit improvements along the I-94 corridor; the Eastern Transportation Alliance (ETA) is gearing up; and Commissioner Peterson, Don Theisen, and he attended a meeting at the Association of Minnesota Counties and discussed the possibility of a metropolitan wide sales tax of a half cent for transportation and transit and there was agreement to continue to support the AMC transportation bill.

Commissioner Peterson commended county staff for preparing a "coaster" which explains the average daily trips on the road in the east metro compared to the west metro. She feels these are great tools to demonstrate the transportation/transit needs on the east side of the metro.

Mr. Schug discussed a proposed letter to the Washington County Legislative delegation supporting the portion of the Governor's recommend budget which includes an increase in the Community Corrections Acts subsidy.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to authorize a letter supporting the portion of the Governor's recommended budget which includes an increase in the Community Corrections Acts subsidy. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Pulkrabek and Orth absent.

Commissioner Peterson requested a news release about this being one of the county's mandates and the impact it has on the budget. In the same article she would like to see the increase of the dollars the county is putting into the jail because of the short-term offenders from the state. These are mandates the county has no control of and the property taxpayers are picking up the tab.

Mr. Schug also reported that the Senate Health and Human Services Budget division heard the county initiated bill that would provide supplemental funding to the child support program to replace the potential loss of \$8 million in Federal aid that came out of the Deficit Reduction Act. There was also a bill introduced that would require an assessment in discharge planning for jail inmates that have a mental illness. They will have to watch this so it doesn't become an unfunded mandate on the property tax.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported that the Mosquito Control District now has in place a web site that shows

where treatments would be applied, what the treatment is, and the topography. She believes this will be

helpful to those who are concerned about the different chemicals.

Commissioner Peterson reported that there will be another meeting of the Eastern Transportation Alliance

on March 12 in St. Paul at 6:00 p.m.

Commissioner Hegberg indicated that he will not be at next week's Board meeting because he will be

attending an insurance trust conference.

Commissioner Hegberg requested numbers on what the county spent on paint. He learned at last week's

Regional Solid Waste Coordinating Board meeting that latex paint is not a hazardous waste, it is an issue of

putting it in the garbage and having it leach into the ground. They've never been successful at recycling it.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Support Legislation Sought by Rock-Tenn

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2007-027** as follows:

Support Legislation Sought by Rock Tenn Company to Establish a Metropolitan Emissions Reduction Project Renewable Energy Transition Charge

WHEREAS, Washington County has an adopted and approved the Solid Waste Master Plan for 2005 – 2024 (Resolution No. 2004-135); and

WHEREAS, the Master Plan contains a number of policies on waste processing, which includes the production and use of refuse derived fuel (RDF), including a policy that states "Consistent with the state hierarchy, Washington County continues to affirm processing of waste into energy or by composting as the preferred mixed municipal solid waste (MSW) management strategies (over landfilling) for waste that is not reduced or recycled." This policy applies both to MSW generated throughout the county and specifically to waste generated by public entities; and

WHEREAS, Rock-Tenn Company owns and operates a paper recycling mill in the City of Saint Paul on a 40 acre site, employing about 500 people in livable wage jobs, and which handles about 1,000 tons per day of paper recovered for recycling; and

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota has approved a Metropolitan Emissions Reduction Plan (MERP) put forward by Xcel Energy, which would reduce air emissions in several ways, including replacing the coal fired High Bridge Power Plant in Saint Paul with a natural-gas fired power plant; and

WHEREAS, Rock-Tenn is a large energy consumer, and currently uses steam generated by the coal-fired High Bridge power plant, but will lose that energy source when the coal fired plant is replaced in 2007 to comply with the MERP legislation; and

WHEREAS, Washington County through its participation in the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project has supported work on the development of a new energy supply for Rock Tenn; and

WHEREAS, Rock-Tenn Company, Market Street Energy (an affiliate of District Energy St. Paul) and the Saint Paul Port Authority are working together on the development of a new energy facility that uses renewable energy to meet Rock-Tenn's energy needs;

WHEREAS, the Ramsey/Washington County Resource Recovery Project Board has recommended, at its February 22, 2007 meeting, that the County Boards support legislation sought by Rock-Tenn Company, Market Street Energy and the Saint Paul Port Authority to provide funds to Rock-Tenn for use in developing a new renewable energy facility to serve Rock-Tenn.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby indicates its support for legislation sought by Rock Tenn Company, Market Street Energy and the Saint Paul Port Authority to establish a Metropolitan Emissions Reduction Project Renewable Energy Transition Charge to provide funds to Rock-Tenn for its use in developing a new renewable energy facility to serve Rock-Tenn.

Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent.

Expansion of Special Well Construction Area Designation in the Lake Elmo-Oakdale Area

John Freitag, Sr. Environmental Specialist, reported that based on extensive testing of drinking water wells and monitoring wells in the Special Well Construction Area (site of the Washington County Landfill) the Minnesota Department of Health will be expanding the boundaries of this area and renaming it the Lake Elmo-Oakdale Special Well Construction Area. The new designation will go into effect on March 15 and applies to construction, repair, modification, and sealing of wells and borings. In addition, a seller of real property is required to follow the special disclosure language established in statute.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update as follows: Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources will meet on March 28 to enlarge the Carnelian-Marine Watershed District Board of Managers to include the Marine Water Management Organization increasing the managers from five to seven, and rename the district to the Carnelian-Marine-St. Croix Watershed District; hearing in the Senate on the exemption of the county courts facility from sales tax for construction materials; a hearing is scheduled for this evening regarding the appropriation of \$1 million for the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp; hearing held last week on transportation funding issues including money to study the I-94 corridor; hearing held on the Red Rock Corridor; and action on a number of transportation funding proposals.

Mr. Schug discussed a bill introduced regarding the Child Safety Act which would appropriate \$55 million to partially replace loss of state funding since 2003 and loss of federal funding anticipated by the Deficit Reduction Act. The approximate loss of those two funding sources is approximately \$73 million for the state and this would propose to replace about \$55 million.

Commissioner Peterson moved to authorize the Board Chair to send a letter of support for a bill authored by Senator Sieben and Representative Slawik to the entire legislative delegation in support of the Child Protection and Safety Act HF 1290/SF1508. Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent.

Commissioner Peterson suggested sending the letter and information to the Community Advisory Committee because they may want to send letters encouraging the passage of this bill.

Mr. Schug noted that Senator Coleman and Representative Ellison are authoring legislation that would restore some of the federal funding cuts for the child support program. After staff receives more detailed information on the legislation, they will offer a letter to the federal delegation in support of that.

<u>COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS</u>

Commissioner Peterson announced that tonight is the annual meetings of the townships. She will be attending those in her district.

Commissioner Peterson reported that this Friday afternoon at Metro State University Congresswoman Betty McCollum will hold a meeting of policy makers to discuss various east metro issues. All Commissioners are invited to attend.

Commissioner Peterson will not be at next week's Board meeting. She asked if someone could fill in for her next week at the Metropolitan Transportation Advisory Board meeting. They meet at noon in St. Paul.

Commissioner Peterson stated she is concerned about the Wakota Bridge. She asked that someone from the Minnesota Department of Transportation present an update to the County Board on what is happening with that project at a future meeting.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported on the National Association of Counties Conference that he and Commissioner Orth attended last week. A luncheon was held with Senators John McCain and Joe Biden as guest speakers. He thought it was insightful. They talked about the Iraq war, but also discussed county issues. He believed the best session he went to was on budgeting. It talked about how to take in more revenue and different ideas that other counties had to reduce their budgets. He'll discuss those ideas a little more at a future meeting.

Commissioner Orth also reported on the National Association of Counties Conference in Washington D.C. He attended many sessions on justice, public safety steering committee, homeland security, and emergency management. He obtained a lot of information and tool kits and provided that to the Emergency Manager. He also attended transportation steering committee meetings, community economic development steering committee meetings, and a meeting with federal state congress members.

Commissioners Orth and Peterson asked that the Board consider adopting a resolution supporting transportation funding as proposed by the Eastern Transportation Alliance at their next meeting.

Commissioner Kriesel reported that he was at the Capitol last week testifying for various bills. Tonight he will be testifying at the Capitol for the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp capital improvement bill. He too will try to attend all of the annual township meetings in his district.

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

There being no further items to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Pulkrabek and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg absent. The Board meeting adjourned at 9:54 a.m.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Excellence in 4H After School Programming Award

Anne Stevenson, U of M Extension, presented the County Board with the University of Minnesota Extension 4H Site Based Program Award from the National Association of Extension 4H Agents which was awarded on February 7 at the annual state conference.

Comments on the Baytown Groundwater Contamination Superfund Site Plan

Cindy Weckwerth, Program Manager, presented a review of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) plan to remediate the trichloroethylene (TCE) contamination in the Baytown Special Well Area. TCE was first discovered in this area in 1987 by the Minnesota Department of Health. It has impacted several drinking water aquifers, hundreds of private wells, and the municipal well number 2 in the City of Bayport. In August of 2004 the main source of TCE was discovered under Hagberg's Country Market in Lake Elmo. This property was formerly occupied by a metal working facility from 1940 to 1968. The MPCA plan has three objectives: minimize the time that private wells are on Granulated Activated Carbon whole house filters; protect the Bayport municipal wells; and prevent future migration of TCE and restore the aquifer within a reasonable timeframe. To achieve this the MCPA plans to contain the TCE on the Hagberg site and to treat the contaminates at the source. The Plan is generally consistent with the county's 2003-2013 Groundwater Plan and 2007 Work Plan. They also suggested the following: potential uses for the treated water such as reinjecting it into the groundwater or looking for potential uses as potable water; provide ongoing education to residents on the effectiveness of the plan and treatment; continue to update the plume map; provide fencing around the area; and make sure they are working with all local agencies such as the Valley Branch Watershed District to obtain the permits they need.

Commissioner Orth moved to approve comments to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency regarding the Baytown Groundwater Contamination Superfund Site Proposed Plan 2007 and approve the letter drafted on behalf of the Commissioners to be signed by the Board Chair. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, provided a legislative update on the following items: Senate property tax division released a report that included \$60 million of additional county program aide; increase to some homestead and agricultural credits; the Senate public safety division has proposed to fund \$2 million on projects designated by CrimNet; additional \$2.5 million for the short-term offenders; and the transportation funding bill was passed through the Transportation Finance Division of the Senate which includes all of the items that the County Board has looked at and supported.

Al Mitchell, Disabled Veteran's Rest Camp Vice President, thanked the County Board and staff for their help and cooperation in obtaining funding for capital improvements at the Rest Camp. He also apologized, on behalf of the Veteran's Rest Camp, for any past misunderstandings or accusations that may have occurred. He thanked Commissioner Gary Kriesel for his insight and direction as a member of the Board to help all veterans. With his help and that of Senator Saltzman they are seeing a dream come true.

Support Appointment of Harry Melander to the Metropolitan Council

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-032 as follows:

Resolution of Support for the Appointment of Harry Melander to the Metropolitan Council

WHEREAS, Harry Melander, a resident of Mahtomedi, Washington County has applied to serve on the Metropolitan Council representing District 12, which includes most of Washington County, and

WHEREAS, Harry Melander has an impressive and long-standing record of public service to Washington County, including service on the county's Planning Advisory Committee, the Board of Adjustment and Appeals, and the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority Board of Commissioners, and has served in leadership roles on these boards and commissions, and

WHEREAS, Mr. Melander's experience with the county and his professional responsibilities with the building trades has given him excellent experience and perspective on many of the issues that fall within the responsibility of the Metropolitan Council, such as: comprehensive planning, housing, transportation, and other services for the residents of the region.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby supports the application for appointment of Harry Melander to the Metropolitan Council representing District 12.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

<u>COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS</u>

Commissioner Pulkrabek addressed an earlier agenda item related to the 4H After School Program award. He stated that even though he has questioned the funding apparatus of this program, he does support it and thinks it is a good program for kids and young adults. He does not question the merit or value of the program, he questions who should pay for it.

Commissioner Pulkrabek read that the Pioneer Press is reporting property taxes will be going up 9% state wide and 5-1/2% in the metro next year. He finds it strange that they would report that when budgets haven't been approved for next year and local governments still have a say in those budgets.

Commissioner Orth reported on the Metropolitan Emergency Services Board meeting he attended last week. A resolution was submitted and approved to add radios for the jail and court security under the 800 MHz program.

Commissioner Hegberg wanted to thank Senator Vandeveer and Congresswoman Bachman for their help initially in the Disabled Veteran's Rest Camp. He also reported on the insurance conference he attended last week in San Diego. Items discussed included: communications, e-mails and electronic devices and how those items could be subpoenaed in lawsuits and the costs of bringing that information forward; discussion of aging law enforcement officers related to worker's comp and those costs; and discussion on the county's insurance pool and how to deal with board members. Yesterday, he and Commissioner Kriesel toured various locations for hazardous waste facilities.

Commissioner Kriesel reported he attended the event celebrating the upcoming reopening of the Boom Site with Senator Vandeveer, Representative Dean, and DNR Commissioner Mark Holsten. In regards to hazardous waste facilities, he feels it is important to start looking at what will happen with electronic waste in conjunction with hazardous waste.

Commissioner Kriesel reported that he testified last week for the Vet's Camp bill along with Al Mitchell. He thanked Senator Saltzman for her help in guiding this bill and also Senator Vandeveer for his past efforts.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Transportation Funding Options

Commissioner Peterson asked that the resolution supporting transportation funding options during the 2007 State legislative session that was in today's Board packet be delayed. After attending the metropolitan county sales tax meeting yesterday, she feels it would be better at this time to stay with the position in the Washington County Legislative Agenda regarding transportation funding, until a final bill is brought forth.

It was Board consensus to delay action on the transportation funding resolution.

Commissioner Peterson distributed copies of a book she received at the Minnesota Transportation Alliance meeting yesterday. There were several references in the book about transportation revenues in 1990 compared to 2000. There is also a graph that shows unmet needs to 2030 and she was surprised to see Highway 95 was on that list. She also reviewed a report by county and city engineers regarding the trucking industry. She feels it is time to take another look at the 10 ton road system. She will try to get a copy of that information to the Board.

Commissioner Peterson also reported on the House and Senate Transportation funding bills. She indicated they are similar, but there is one issue she is concerned about in the Senate bill. That bill was very prescriptive as to how the seven metro counties will operate. She feels a joint powers board should be able to determine its own fate, the make up of the committee, and how it works. The Senate bill also suggested weighted voting for disbursements. She feels that is poor public policy.

Jim Schug, County Administrator, stated strategy was discussed at yesterday's metropolitan county sales tax meeting because the House and Senate bills were different for transportation funding. The Governor has indicated that some of what is in both of those bills is not acceptable. There is a feeling that a conference committee will meet after the Easter recess and there needs to be a discussion with the Governor's Office about what elements of the transportation funding bills would not be vetoed or could be supported by the Governor.

Legislative Update

Mr. Schug presented a brief update on the following legislative items: The House Capital Investment Finance Committee unveiled the bonding bill and it does include a number of projects discussed at the county including the local bridge program, the Central Corridor transit way, \$3 million for the St. Paul Union Depot, \$2 million for high-speed rail between St. Paul and Chicago, \$500,000 for the I-94 transitway study, \$500,000 for the Red Rock Corridor and \$500,000 for the Rush Line Corridor; a bill that would increase reimbursement for short-term offenders being housed in county jails is moving; the chemical dependency maintenance of effort item is moving through the Senate; and, corporate foster care licensing fees have moved forward.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported on her trip to Cincinnati and indicated that many of the federal highways and some of the state highways are in as bad a shape as Minnesota's roads.

Commissioner Peterson indicated that she would be attending the Association of Minnesota Counties Legislative Conference tomorrow and Thursday. This will be the first time that the counties, cities and school districts will be meeting as a delegation to discuss local issues.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on a meeting he had with the City of Forest Lake to discuss solutions to the Broadway Avenue problem. The citizens are in favor of an 11th Avenue exit onto the freeway. The other part of the meeting discussed the Housing and Redevelopment Authority and a senior housing project with the Walker group near the new service center. He feels that the concept plan was received fairly well.

Commissioner Hegberg indicated that Anoka County has been lobbying extensively against a proposed wetland bill, SF 1135. They feel this bill would increase the cost of building highways if passed.

Commissioner Hegberg and Orth both indicated they would be attending the Association of Minnesota Counties Legislative Conference the next two days.

Commissioner Orth reported on the PFC plume contamination meeting in Woodbury which was conducted by the Minnesota Department of Health. There isn't much change in the plume boundaries, but they are finding higher levels of PFBA's in Woodbury and Cottage Grove by the 3M disposal area. They are in the process of sampling over 400 private wells and their goal is to define the edges of south Washington County and develop new steps. The only city having changes in municipal wells was St. Paul Park.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported he met with Senator Coleman yesterday and discussed public policy issues and politics. He also indicated that the Pioneer Press had a good article about the Washington County Sheriff Reserves in Sunday's paper.

Commissioner Kriesel indicated that following the Board meeting and three workshops, the Washington County and Ramsey County Boards of Commissioners will meet in a joint session at the Oak Marsh Golf Club in Oakdale at noon to discuss issues of mutual interest.

Public Health Week

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-038 as follows:

Proclaim April 2 – 8, 2007 as Public Health Week in Washington County

WHEREAS, the people of Washington County benefit every day from the efforts of the public health and environment workforce when eating at restaurants, drinking tap water, learning about prevention of deadly diseases or receiving vaccinations; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota has a long history of public health success in preventing epidemics and the spread of disease, protecting against environmental hazards, and promoting and encouraging healthy behaviors; and

WHEREAS, the efforts of public health and environment workers to protect the public are of even greater significance in light of the threat of natural or man-made disaster; and

WHEREAS, our experience managing natural disease outbreaks combined with effective planning and partnership between federal, state, and local authorities will assist us in a future crisis; and

WHEREAS, public health efforts alone cannot accomplish the goal of a healthier Washington County without cooperation and partnership with local, state and federal communities and individuals; and

WHEREAS, each of us needs to take the first step to prepare and secure a safe and healthy home and work environment in the event of an emergency; and

WHEREAS, the citizens of Washington County recognize the essential role public health and environment plays in their every day lives.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners do hereby proclaim April 2-8, 2007 as Public Health Week in Washington County, and commend this observance to all our citizens.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Annual Groundwater Plan 2007 Work Plan

Craig Leiser, Groundwater Advisory Committee Chairman, discussed the need for continued study of groundwater issues including water balance, contamination sources and treatment, and research into aquifer geology. He also stated that communication and integration of programs with all units of government is essential. The county-supported water consortium has been an effective example in communication between government units. New challenges include terroristic threats and protection of water reservoirs, previously unknown chemical or biological threats, and loss of resource before criticality can be determined. Mr. Leiser thanked the Board for its past commitment to this issue and to continue to be proactive in the future.

John Freitag, Sr. Environmental Specialist, presented highlights of the 2006 Groundwater Plan including: the City of Woodbury utilized the LCMR groundwater model to develop areas for future well drilling; updating watershed management plans; Brown's Creek and Carnelian-Marine Watershed Districts developed a Statement of Need and Reasonableness and completed a technical review for adoption of volume control and groundwater dependant natural resource protection standards; shared water resource educator and creation of the East Metro Water Resources Education Program; 28 abandoned wells were sealed; Afton oil spill clean-up; and discovery of solvents and cleaners in septic tank and their removal. Mr. Freitag presented the 2007 work plan which includes: help to local units of government to update their comprehensive plans by 2008; watershed district and water management organization projects including evaluating lake system modeling to estimate increased runoff volume due to land uses over time, assessing

infiltration in cold climate conditions, and implementing a best management practice program that assists in pretreatment of water before infiltration; coordination with other state and regional agencies regarding PFC issues in southern Washington County and Lake Elmo/Oakdale Special Well Construction Area, PCE issues in the Baytown Special Well Construction Area, and coordination with Metropolitan Council and the Minnesota Department of Health for a contaminate flume map project; a draft Regional Water Supply Master Plan prepared by Metropolitan Council and the Metropolitan Area Water Supply Advisory Committee; and various educational groundwater activities.

Commissioner Peterson suggested sending a letter to the cities encouraging them to use the county's Groundwater Work Plan as they look at their 2008 comp plans, particularly those cities in the southern portion of Washington County.

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve a contract with Conservation Solutions, Inc. for a conservation treatment of the Washington County Monument to Soldiers and Sailors located at the Historic Courthouse in the amount of \$36,320.88. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson suggested sending an invitation to individuals who are currently serving in Iraq and Afghanistan so they may be recognized at the July 4 rededication of this monument.

WHEREAS, on August 3, 1999 the Washington County Board of Commissioners certified original enrollment in the Correctional Officer Pension Plan for Washington County Correctional Officers and Correctional Officer Sergeants based on established PERA criteria; and

WHEREAS, on July 11, 2000 the Washington County Board of Commissioners certified additional enrollment in the Plan for the Jail Administrator, Assistant Jail Administrator and any Jail Program Coordinators who were promoted from the Washington County Correctional Officer classification, based on legislative changes to enrollment criteria; and

WHEREAS, on November 22, 2006 Washington County Human Resources received a request from PERA to provide names, classification titles and pension plan enrollment; and

WHEREAS, on November 28, 2006 Washington County Human Resources provided names, classification titles and pension plan enrollment to PERA; and

WHEREAS, on December 6, 2006 Washington County Human Resources received a letter from PERA stating that Jail Program Coordinators Cynthia Doty, Tom Hollister and John Warneke were to be removed from Correctional Officer pension retroactively to July 11, 2000 because PERA deemed them ineligible; and

WHEREAS, on December 21, 2006 Washington County Human Resources Director sent a letter regarding enrollment in Correctional Officer plan as requested to Cheryl Keating, PERA Manager per Keating's request during a conference call on December 19, 2006; and

WHEREAS, on January 17, 2007 John Warneke sent an appeal letter to Mary Vanek, Executive Director PERA; and

WHEREAS, on February 4, 2007 James J. Frank, former Washington County Sheriff, sent a letter "To Whom it May Concern" explaining the intent of the original enrollment of the Jail Program Coordinators in Correctional Officer plan; and

WHEREAS, on February 26, 2007 John Warneke sent a letter to the PERA Board of Trustees with attached survey done by John Warneke stating his intent to appeal PERA's decision to remove him from the Correctional Officers Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board certified on July 11, 2000 that Jail Program Coordinators who held Corrections Officer positions at Washington County were eligible for the Correctional Officers Pension Plan; Tom Hollister, Cynthia Doty and John Warneke are eligible for the Correctional Officers Pension Plan and Lori Hanson and William Hoffman ineligible for the Correctional Officers Pension Plan, but eligible for the Coordinated Plan; and

WHEREAS, It is the intention of the current Washington County Sheriff to update the job descriptions to reflect the classification of Jail Program Coordinators to more generalist than specialist, put in place a schedule of rotating assignments to increase the knowledge and productivity, and provide training to respond to incidents in the jail; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That after reviewing the applicable State Statute and the rationale for the original enrollment of these three Jail Programmers in the Correctional Officers Pension Plan, the Washington County Board of Commissioners affirms its decision of July 11, 2000 to continue to include in the Correctional Officer Pension Plan the following employees: Cynthia Doty, Tom Hollister and John Warneke; and include William Hoffman and Lori Hanson in the Correctional Officers Pension Plan prospectively when the position descriptions, training requirements and job assignments have been updated to reflect the more general duties of the position.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Kriesel, and Orth; No, Commissioner Hegberg.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update including: various property tax relief proposals being discussed; bill that would create automatic voter registration for driver's license and permit applicants; proposal in the House and Senate for increased funding for community corrections; additional funding for short-term offenders; proposal in both the House and Senate that would provide one-time money to back fill some of the Federal cuts under the Deficit Reduction Act; \$8 million for the State's child support system; under the chemical dependency treatment there is a proposal that would over a period of time equalize the financial participation of all counties; Senate proposal to move mental health case management to the health plans which would be phased in over two years; and, also additional county costs for treatment for persons who are in regional treatment centers.

Commissioner Peterson asked if the county has a program similar to Hennepin County, where Seniors have the ability to work off a portion of or their entire property tax? Mr. Schug indicated that is something the county has looked at in the past. His recollection is they found that the administrative cost of running that type of a program was somewhat significant. A decision was made not to pursue that. Staff could revisit that issue again and report back.

Commissioner Peterson indicated there was money in the House, Senate, and Governor's proposal for developmentally disabled individuals. Will the county have any access to that money or will it just go to schools? Mr. Schug indicated he was not sure, but will look into it and report on it next week.

<u>COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS</u>

Commissioner Peterson reported they taped County Insight last week and Judge Schurrer discussed traffic court. In the fall they will be having a program on Circle, restorative justice. She reported on the meeting with Ramsey County last week and was surprised that Ramsey County did not have the additional 911 charge on their legislative package. She also reported on the first joint legislative meeting of counties, cities and school districts. This Thursday she and Commissioner Hegberg will be attending Drug Court in Ramsey County at 1:00 p.m.

Commissioner Pulkrabek indicated he may go to the Drug Court session on Thursday also. He commented on the State's proposed property tax relief. He feels that the State is implying that local governments are out of control on their spending and therefore, the State has to step in and fill the gap and give people back some of their money because local government is not being responsible. He pointed out that the amount of money spent by the State of Minnesota for the last 10 years has far outpaced the aggregate spending of local government entities. For the State to turn around and point fingers at local government is ludicrous. Sometimes part of the driving force of why local governments raise their property taxes is because of unfunded mandates such as housing state prisoners in county jails. The State gives the counties a fraction of what it really costs to house them and mandates that the county pay the rest and that money comes from property taxes. He feels if the State wants to have a real impact on the property taxes, they should look at changing the classification rates and not just cutting a check to local government every once in a while when they get a budget surplus.

Commissioner Orth reported he also attended the legislative conference last week. He attended the transportation session and indicated that both the House and Senate passed transportation proposals which the Governor stated he would not accept either one of those. There was discussion at the legislative conference if they could change the bill a little bit they felt it was possible to get three more legislators to support it and then regardless of what the Governor does it would be implemented. He also indicated that the I-94 corridor study initially asked for \$1 million, then it was reduced to \$500,000 and now it may get down to \$250,000. Also, he had gotten a number of complaints from residents in Woodbury about Radio Drive and how many trees were being removed and moving the power lines closer to their houses. The individuals also called their State Representative Marsha Swails and Xcel Energy. He discussed this matter with the Administrator and Transportation and was informed that this would not create any problems other than the view. Representative Swails called him back and indicated she would be in favor of the county's recommendations. He drove by there and things are moving ahead.

Commissioner Hegberg reported he too attended the joint legislative conference and felt it was good to have all three entities involved. He also attended the Metro Transitway Board meeting where he stated that they shouldn't follow county lines, they should follow corridor lines because the Rush Line not only affects Anoka County, but also Washington and Isanti Counties.

The Executive Session convened at 10:35 a.m. Present for the Executive Session were Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg. Also present were Jim Schug, County Administrator, Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; Richard Hodsdon, Assistant County Attorney; Don Theisen, Director of Transportation and Physical Development, Sharon Price, Right of Way/Property Manager, Lowell Johnson,

Services, Todd Hanson, Vice President Industrial Brokerage, and Patricia Raddatz, Board Secretary.

Youth Volunteer Award – Briana Gruenwald volunteers as a Sunday School Assistant Teacher with her church, is a Leader in Training for the City of Woodbury's Summer Childcare program, a respite childcare provider for a family in crisis, and coordinates volunteer promotions for the Volunteer Center program at Community Volunteer Service. She is also active in her School's Key Club and National Honor Society.

Outstanding Volunteer Award – Mary Bridges has volunteered with Lakeview Hospital, Courage St. Croix, and the Family Violence Center.

Outstanding Group Volunteer Award – The Cottage Grove Peacekepping Circle uses a restorative practice called Sentencing Circles. The Group works in partnership with the Criminal Justice system, the Cottage Grove prosecutor, and Tubman Family Alliance to heal the harm to victims of Domestic Assault and to offer offenders support to change their behavior.

<u>Lifetime Volunteer Award</u> – Sherrill Reid works with the Washington County Guardian Ad Litem program. She has also volunteered for 26 years as an Emergency Medical Technician with the Marine Ambulance, and 22 years as an animal control officer with the May, Scandia, and Marine communities.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-046 as follows:

Community Volunteer Service and Senior Centers National Volunteer Week April 15 - 21, 2007

WHEREAS, the volunteers of Washington County "Inspire by Example," working together to help others and support community projects; and

WHEREAS, Community Volunteer Service and Senior Center's 956 volunteers provided an estimated \$3 million in service to community organizations in the St. Croix Valley during 2006; and

TRANSPORTATION AND PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve Change Order #6 with Gephart Electric in the amount of \$105,428 at the Service Center/Library in Forest Lake; and Change Order #6 with Master Mechanical, Inc.

for \$27, 212 at the Service Center/Library in Forest Lake. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, announced that staff moved into the Service Center in Cottage Grove this past weekend. Yesterday morning they opened for business and customers have been there already receiving services. The grand opening will take place in June.

Mr. Schug presented a brief legislative update on the following items: Ability for counties to charge corporate foster care providers during the licensing process is moving forward; the House and Senate have both passed comprehensive transportation funding bills; and the Association of Minnesota Counties metro group met yesterday to discuss the transportation funding bill and strategize on what steps to take next; it was felt that it is important to maintain a general support of the bill until the conference committee meets.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported on the Locate Meeting she attended yesterday to discuss the Union Depot. A Minnesota Department of Transportation representative talked about passenger rail service; they were given a report that the Union Depot is in the second draft of the purchase agreement and they expect that Ramsey County will be owning that fairly soon; and she will be meeting with a representative from AMTRAK and representatives from the Canadian-Pacific to discuss the high speed rail line from St. Paul to Chicago. The AMC metro sales tax meeting was interesting, and she learned that Carver and Scott Counties are now interested in being a part of the seven metro counties ½ cent sales tax.

Commissioner Peterson discussed the transportation rally that took place last Thursday. She felt it was an exiting event and well attended. There were signs from all avenues of transportation including commuter rail, high speed rail, and biking encouraging more funding for transportation.

Commissioner Peterson stated she feels it is unwise to be bonding for the future and to be looking at the younger people and their children to pay for our transportation needs today. The transportation proposals in front of the legislature are pay-as-you-go programs. The program is a tool bag that allows us to take care of the transportation needs of today and for tomorrow.

Commissioner Orth reported he attended the transportation rally also. The information he has been getting is that after the fund rally there has been a little more support in the Senate and House and it seems like the Governor's veto could be overridden. This afternoon, he and Commissioner Peterson will tape the County Insight to discuss emergency services, libraries and roundabouts.

Commissioner Peterson mentioned a newspaper article in the Star Tribune giving a history of the gas tax.

She thought it was well done and encouraged everyone to read it.

Commissioner Kriesel reported on the Afton City Hall open house for the 800 MHz tower he attended last

evening. He commended Captain Steve Pott for his great presentation. The citizens asked good questions.

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:00 a.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg. Absent none. Board Chair Kriesel presided. Also present were James Schug, County Administrator; Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; George Kuprian, Assistant County Attorney; Doug Johnson, County Attorney; Lowell Johnson, Director of Public Health and Environment; Mjyke Nelson, Information Technology Director; Sheriff Bill Hutton, Chief Deputy Sheriff Mike Johnson; Julie Sorrem, Risk Manager; Jim Luger, Parks Director; Corey Slagle, Transportation Manager; Keith Potter, Facilities Manager; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Jennifer Wagenius, Division Manager; Harley Will, Financial Services Director; Dennis O'Donnell, Sr. Planner; Ann Pung-Terwedo, Sr. Planner; Tom Adkins, Community Corrections Director; and Steve Nelson, Public Information Coordinator II.

COMMENTS FROM THE AUDIENCE

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Commissioner Hegberg moved, seconded by Commissioner Peterson to adopt the following Consent Calendar:

- 4. Approval of contract with Total Software Solutions, Inc. for support, analysis, and modifications of the county's Tract Index application.
- Approval of, and authorization for the County Board Chair and the County Administrator to enter into an agreement with contracted wellness program staff for onsite Employee Wellness Activities in Cottage Grove and Woodbury.

6. Approval of encroachment agreement for construction activities within existing May Township right-of-way in the Big Marine Regional Park Reserve.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Commissioner Hegberg moved to authorize the Board Chair and County Administrator to execute licenses for use of real property for the collection of household hazardous waste for the following locations and dates: Cottage Grove, May 5; Forest Lake, May 5; Lake St. Croix Beach, April 21; and Stillwater, May 19. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

CONSERVATION LEADERSHIP AWARD

Paul Austin, Conservation Minnesota, presented the Washington County Board of Commissioners with a conservation leadership award for its work on the November 7, 2006 ballot measure for the preservation of water quality, woodlands, and other natural resources.

LAND AND WATER LEGACY APPOINTMENTS

Commissioner Peterson moved to appoint Mary Hauser, Birchwood, and Randy Ferrin, Scandia, to the Parks and Open Space Commission representing the Land and Water Legacy Program to first terms expiring December 31, 2009 and December 31, 2010, respectively. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING - OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATION

Repealing the Purchase of Development Rights Ordinance #144 and Adopting the Washington County Acquisition of Development Rights Ordinance

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of the procedure for today's public hearing to consider the repeal of Ordinance #144, Purchase of Development Rights, and the adoption of the Washington County Acquisition of Development Rights Ordinance. The Board Secretary confirmed that the notice of public hearing was published in the legal newspaper.

Jane Harper, Principal Planner, reviewed the proposed Acquisition of Development Rights Ordinance as follows:

- 1. Incorporates the direction received from the County Board on March 20, 2007:
 - a. Removes the provision that requires lands to be within or adjacent to the Green Corridor Opportunity Area in order for the county to acquire a conservation easement over the parcel. This change was broadly supported and was encouraged over the years by local units of government and more recently by the Washington County Citizens for Land and Water.
 - Adds the public purposes stated in the Open Space Funding Referendum to guide the type of projects that the county will acquire, including a clarification that parks includes trail corridors. (Section1.3(3)
 - c. Specifies that the Washington County's Parks and Open Space Commission is the advisory committee to the Land and Water Legacy Program. (Section 4.1)
- 2. Updates the ordinance to incorporate lessons learned since 2000:
 - Adds a provision allowing staff from other agencies to provide technical assistance. This is addressed in the current policies and procedures document and has been the practice since 2000. (Section 4.2)
 - b. Adds a provision specifying when an appraisal is not required. (Section 6.1(3))
- 3. Provides the authority for acquiring conservation easements through Open Space Design Developments:
 - a. Changes the word 'purchase' to 'acquire', where appropriate, to be inclusive of both programs.
 - Adds/changes definitions to be consistent with the Open Space Design Development Code.
 (Section 2)
 - Adds language to distinguish the differences between how a conservation easement is handled through the Open Space Design Development Process and through the Land and Water Legacy Program. (Section 6)

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard. The Board Secretary indicated that she had received all documentary evidence.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously. The public hearing was closed at 9:33 a.m.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-047 as follows:

Resolution Repealing Ordinance #144 and Adopting the Washington County Acquisition of Development Rights Ordinance #175

WHEREAS, on April 24, 2007, the Washington County Board of Commissioners held a public hearing to consider repealing Washington County Purchase of Development Rights Ordinance #144 and replacing it by

adopting the Washington County Acquisition of Development Rights Ordinance #175.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby repeals Washington County Purchase of Development Rights Ordinance #144 and adopts Washington County Acquisition of Development Rights Ordinance #175.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County Acquisition of Development Rights Ordinance #175 take effect upon passage of this resolution and its publication according to law.

WASHINGTON COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 175 ACQUISITIONS OF DEVELOPMENT RIGHTS ORDINANCE

SECTION 1. TITLE AND PURPOSE

- 1.1 Pursuant to Minnesota Statute 84C, Minnesota Statute 373.40 and Minnesota Statue 394.25. Washington County establishes its authority to acquire and improve land and interests in land for the purpose of preserving open space, including natural and scenic areas and agricultural land. The policies, rules and official controls governing the acquisitions are adopted in this ordinance, hereafter known as the Acquisition of Development Rights Ordinance. Practices for carrying out the authorities in this ordinance will be contained in the attendant policy and procedure documents and the Washington County Development Code.
- 1.2 Existing zoning restrictions, while effective at controlling housing densities, cannot keep lands in their present undeveloped state. Acquiring the development rights is one of several means for achieving public benefits through private land conservation actions.

1.3 Purpose

This ordinance is adopted for the following purposes.

- (1) To protect and preserve the rural landscape and high-quality natural areas that make Washington County a special place to live.
- (2) To implement the goals of the Washington County Comprehensive Plan.
- (3) To serve additional public purposes through open space protection, including but not limited to improving water quality of rivers, lakes and streams; protecting drinking water sources; purchasing parklands including trail corridors, preserving wetlands and woodlands; and protecting land along water bodies from development.

SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS

- 2.1 For the purpose of this ordinance, certain words and phrases are defined as follows:
- (1) <u>Agricultural Land</u>: Land whose use is devoted to the production of horticulture and nursery stock, fruit of all kinds, vegetables, forage, grains, bees and apiary products.
- (2) <u>Conservation Easement</u>: A nonpossessory interest in real property whereby the holder may impose certain limitations or affirmative obligations the purpose of which include retaining or protecting natural, scenic, or open-space values of real property, assuring its availability for agricultural, forest, recreational, or open-

- space use, protecting natural resources, maintaining or enhancing air or water quality, or preserving the historical, architectural, archaeological, or cultural aspects of real property. (Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 84C.)
- (3) <u>Corridor</u>: Protected areas of open space linked together throughout the community.
- (4) <u>County Board</u>: The Washington County Board of Commissioners.
- (5) County: Means Washington County.
- (6) <u>Development</u>: An activity which materially alters or affects the existing conditions or use of any land.
- (7) <u>Development Code</u>: The official controls adopted by Washington County regulating the physical development of land in the unincorporated areas of the county, including the Subdivision Regulations.
- (8) <u>Development Rights</u>: The right to use and subdivide land for any and all residential, commercial and industrial purposes and activities not related to agriculture and open space.
- (9) <u>Eligible Land</u>: Properties for which the acquisition of development rights is authorized pursuant to this ordinance.
- (10) <u>Land and Water Legacy Program</u>: A program of Washington County for the purpose of preserving open space through the acquisition of land and interests in land from landowners outside the development process.
- (11) Open Space: Land used for natural habitat, water quality purposes, agriculture, pedestrian corridors and/or recreation, that is undivided and permanently protected from future development.
- (12) Open Space Development: A grouping of residential structures on smaller lots than allowed in the specific zoning district, leaving some land dedicated as open space.
- (13) Resource Values: The physical values of the land supplied by nature including, but not limited to, animal life, plant life, soil, rock, minerals and water. Values may also include protecting natural habitat, productive agricultural land, scenic views and connections to or extensions of existing parks or protected open space.

SECTION 3. AUTHORIZATION

- 3.1 The county may acquire conservation easements over any eligible land within the county by purchase, gift, grant, bequest, devise, covenant or contract and may use any legally available revenue source for the acquisition.
- 3.2 The county may enter into cash purchase and/or investment purchase contracts consistent with applicable law for the purpose stated in this ordinance.
- 3.3 The county may participate jointly in acquiring interests in eligible lands with other qualified organizations empowered to hold interests in real property in accordance with Minnesota Statues, Sections 84C.01-05.
- 3.4 The county may contract with a recognized and legally established nonprofit conservancy, land trust, or other individual or organization qualified under Minnesota Statutes Section 84C.01 and 170(H) of the United States Internal Revenue Code, in order to share in the process of negotiating conservation easements and

establishing the baseline studies management plans and the procedures for monitoring of any conservation easements acquired under this ordinance.

3.5 Acquisitions of interests in land in the form of a conservation easement made through the Land and Water Legacy Program shall be only upon consent of the owner and in a strictly voluntary manner.

SECTION 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF ADVISORY COMMITTEE

- 4.1 For the purpose of the Land and Water Legacy Program, the Washington County Parks and Open Space Commission shall advise the county on the acquisition of lands and interests in lands and other program activities.
- 4.2 The county may request technical assistance from other agencies involved in land and water protection activities to provide advice on activities and practices related to the acquisition of land and interests in land acquired under this ordinance.

SECTION 5. ELIGIBILITY AND PRIORITIES

5.1 For the purpose of the Land and Water Legacy Program, the county shall establish criteria to be used in prioritizing applications and determining which projects to consider.

SECTION 6. CONSERVATION EASEMENT VALUATION

- 6.1 Purchase of Development Rights
- (1) Development Rights Calculation Generally, the value of conservation easements shall be based on the number of development rights remaining on a parcel of land, as determined by the number of

dwelling units that would be permitted given the maximum lot size and lot widths for conventional subdivisions and other requirements of applicable development codes.

- (2) Valuation
 - The value of conservation easements shall be determined using appraisals or an equivalent method such as assessed valuation or appraisal sampling. The value of the conservation easement only establishes the price ceiling. The county is under no obligation to make an offer to the applicant for the full value of the conservation easement.
- (3) Appraisals
 An appraisal may not be required when the county contributes less than fifty (50) percent of the assessed market value of the parcel, as determined by the county tax records. All appraisals will be completed by qualified, independent appraisers.
- 6.2 Open Space Design Developments
- (1) Development Rights Calculation The number of development rights permitted in an Open Space Design Development shall be the same number permitted given the minimum lot size and lot widths for conventional subdivisions and other requirements of the Development Code. The developer may be permitted additional development rights pursuant to the standard established in the Development Code.
- (2) Valuation
 Conservation easements over the open land in Open Space Design Developments are acquired at no cost to the county as part of the development process.

SECTION 7. NATURE OF CONSERVATION EASEMENT RESTRICTIONS

- 7.1 Nature of Restrictions
- (1) Conservation easements shall be permanent.
- (2) The specific terms of the conservation easement shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis.
- (3) The terms of the conservation easement will be designed to protect the property's resource values, as defined through the application and approval process.
- 7.2 Holding of Conservation Easements At the directions of the County Board, conservation easements shall be held by a qualified unit of government, conservation organization, land trust or similar organization authorized to hold interest in real property pursuant to Minnesota Statues, Section 84C.0405.

SECTION 8. CONSERVATION EASEMENT MONITORING AND ENFORCEMENT

8.1 Documentation

The values that a conservation easement is intended to protect are defined and recorded in the baseline documentation. At the time the conservation easement is recorded, documentation of the property shall be conducted, using aerial photographs, maps, photos and/or other media, as a baseline for future monitoring. Such documentation shall be updated periodically by the conservation easement holder(s). Such studies and monitoring shall be conducted according to commonly accepted best practices.

8.2 Frequency of Monitoring

Conservation easements shall be monitored on a regular basis to ensure compliance. Monitoring may include a site visit.

8.3 Enforcement

If the terms of the conservation easement are violated, the conservation easement holder(s) may pursue all legal remedies available, including, but not limited to, specific performance.

FINANCIAL SERVICES

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-048 as follows:

Resolution Providing for the Issuance and Sale of Washington County's General Obligation Capital Improvement Plan Bonds, Series 2007A

BE IT RESOLVED By the Board of Commissioners of Washington County, Minnesota (the "County") as follows:

- 1. It is hereby determined by the County Board of the County that:
- (a) The County, on December 19, 2006, duly adopted a Capital Improvements Plan for the years 2007-2011 (the "CIP Plan"), in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Section 373.40, as amended (the "Act"). The CIP Plan has not been amended by the County. The CIP Plan identifies various capital improvement projects (the "Projects") to be financed with the proceeds of general obligation indebtedness of the County issued under the provisions of the Act. The Projects include, but are not limited to, those presented by County staff at the public hearing held with respect to the issuance and sale of the Bonds (as defined below) on February 20, 2007.
- (b) It is necessary and expedient to the sound financial management of the affairs of the County to issue its General Obligation Capital Improvement Plan Bonds, Series 2007A (the "Bonds"), in the original aggregate principal amount \$80,445,000 (subject to the right of the County to increase or decrease the principal amount of the Bonds to be issued in \$5,000 increments as described in the Terms of Proposal), pursuant to the Act to provide financing for (i) the Projects, (ii) capitalized interest for the Bonds, and (iii) costs of issuance for the Bonds.
- (c) Pursuant to Subdivision 2(b) of the Act, before issuance of any bonds pursuant to the Act (such as the Bonds), the County is required to hold a public hearing to obtain public comment on the proposed issuance of the Bonds. A notice of the public hearing must be published in the official newspaper of the County or in a newspaper of general circulation in the County, at least fourteen (14) days but not more than twenty-eight (28) days prior to the date of the public hearing. The County held a public hearing for the Bonds on Tuesday, February 20, 2007 after proper notice was given for such hearing.

- (d) Pursuant to Subdivision 2(c) of the Act, the County must hold a special election prior to the issuance of the Bonds and seek the approval of the voters of the County if a petition requesting a vote on the issuance is signed by voters equal to five percent (5%) of the votes cast in the last general election and such petition is filed with the County Auditor/Treasurer within thirty (30) days from the date of the public hearing on February 20, 2007. The County Auditor/Treasurer did not receive any such petition within thirty (30) days of the public hearing on February 20, 2007 and, therefore, the County is not required to hold a special election is required to be held on the issuance and sale of the Bonds.
- 2. The County will issue and sell the Bonds in the original aggregate principal amount of \$80,445,000 (subject to the right of the County to increase or decrease the principal amount of the Bonds to be issued in \$5,000 increments as described in the Terms of Proposal) for the purposes set forth in Section 1(b) above. The Bonds are hereby authorized to be issued, sold and delivered in accordance with the Terms of Proposal prepared by Springsted Incorporated as the financial advisor for the County and attached to this resolution as Exhibit A.
- 3. Springsted Incorporated is authorized and directed to negotiate the Bonds in accordance with the Terms of Proposal. The Board of Commissioners will meet at 9:00 A.M. on Tuesday, May 22, 2007, to consider proposals on the Bonds and take any other appropriate action with respect to the Bonds.
- 4. The law firm of Kennedy & Graven, Chartered, as bond counsel for the County, is authorized to act as bond counsel and to assist in the preparation and review of necessary documents, certificates and instruments relating to the Bonds. The officers, employees and agents of the County are hereby authorized to assist Kennedy & Graven, Chartered in the preparation of such documents, certificates, and instruments.
- 5. This resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

(b) <u>Electronic Bidding</u>. Notice is hereby given that electronic proposals will be received via PARITY[®]. For purposes of the electronic bidding process, the time as maintained by PARITY[®] shall constitute the official time with respect to all Bids submitted to PARITY[®]. Each bidder shall be solely responsible for making necessary arrangements to access PARITY[®] for purposes of submitting its electronic Bid in a timely manner and in compliance with the requirements of the Terms of Proposal. DETAILS OF THE BONDS

The Bonds will be dated June 1, 2007, as the date of original issue, and will bear interest payable on February 1 and August 1 of each year, commencing February 1, 2008. Interest will be computed on the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months.

The Bonds will mature on February 1 in the years and amounts as follows:

The County reserves the right, after proposals are opened and prior to award, to increase or reduce the principal amount of the Bonds offered for sale. Any such increase or reduction will be made in multiples of \$5,000. In the event the principal amount of the Bonds is increased or reduced, any premium offered or any discount taken by the successful bidder will be increased or reduced by a percentage equal to the percentage by which the principal amount of the Bonds is increased or reduced.

Proposals for the Bonds may contain a maturity schedule providing for a combination of serial bonds and term bonds. All term bonds shall be subject to mandatory sinking fund redemption at a price of par plus accrued interest to the date of redemption and must conform to the maturity schedule set forth above. In order to designate term bonds, the proposal must specify "Years of Term Maturities" in the spaces provided on the Proposal Form.

BOOK ENTRY SYSTEM

The Bonds will be issued by means of a book entry system with no physical distribution of Bonds made to the public. The Bonds will be issued in fully registered form and one Bond, representing the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds maturing in each year, will be registered in the name of Cede & Co. as nominee of The Depository Trust Company ("DTC"), New York, New York, which will act as securities depository of the Bonds. Individual purchases of the Bonds may be made in the principal amount of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof of a single maturity through book entries made on the books and records of DTC and its participants. Principal and interest are payable by the registrar to DTC or its nominee as registered owner of the Bonds. Transfer of principal and interest payments to participants of DTC will be the responsibility of DTC; transfer of principal and interest payments to beneficial owners by participants will be the responsibility of such participants and other nominees of beneficial owners. The purchaser, as a condition of delivery of the Bonds, will be required to deposit the Bonds with DTC.

REGISTRAR

The County will name the registrar, which shall be subject to applicable SEC regulations. The County will pay for the services of the registrar.

OPTIONAL REDEMPTION

The County may elect on August 1, 2017, and on any day thereafter, to prepay Bonds due on or after February 1, 2018. Redemption may be in whole or in part and if in part at the option of the County and in such manner as the County shall determine. If less than all Bonds of a maturity are called for redemption, the County will notify DTC of the particular amount of such maturity to be prepaid. DTC will determine by lot the amount of each participant's interest in such maturity to be redeemed and each participant will then select by lot the beneficial ownership interests in such maturity to be redeemed. All prepayments shall be at a price of par plus accrued interest.

SECURITY AND PURPOSE

The Bonds will be general obligations of the County for which the County will pledge its full faith and credit and power to levy direct general ad valorem taxes. The proceeds will be used to finance various improvement projects listed in the County's Capital Improvement Plan 2007-2011.

TYPE OF PROPOSALS

Proposals shall be for not less than \$80,445,000 (par) and accrued interest on the total principal amount of the Bonds. Proposals shall be accompanied by a Good Faith Deposit ("Deposit") in the form of a certified or cashier's check or a Financial Surety Bond in the amount of \$804,450, payable to the order of the County. If a check is used, it must accompany the proposal. If a Financial Surety Bond is used, it must be from an insurance company licensed to issue such a bond in the State of Minnesota, and preapproved by the County. Such bond must be submitted to Springsted Incorporated prior to the opening of the proposals. The Financial Surety Bond must identify each underwriter whose Deposit is guaranteed by such Financial Surety Bond. If the Bonds are awarded to an underwriter using a Financial Surety Bond, then that purchaser is required to submit its Deposit to Springsted Incorporated in the form of a certified or cashier's check or wire transfer as instructed by Springsted Incorporated not later than 3:30 P.M., Central Time, on the next business day

following the award. If such Deposit is not received by that time, the Financial Surety Bond may be drawn by the County to satisfy the Deposit requirement. The Deposit received from the purchaser, the amount of which will be deducted at settlement, will be deposited by the County and no interest will accrue to the purchaser. In the event the purchaser fails to comply with the accepted proposal, said amount will be retained by the County. No proposal can be withdrawn or amended after the time set for receiving proposals unless the meeting of the County scheduled for award of the Bonds is adjourned, recessed, or continued to another date without award of the Bonds having been made. Rates shall be in integral multiples of 5/100 or 1/8 of 1%. There is no limit on the interest rate spread if quoted in ascending order; however, no rate for any maturity shall be more than 1.50% lower than any prior rate. Bonds of the same maturity shall bear a single rate from the date of the Bonds to the date of maturity. No conditional proposals will be accepted.

AWARD

The Bonds will be awarded on the basis of the lowest interest rate to be determined on a true interest cost (TIC) basis. The County's computation of the interest rate of each proposal, in accordance with customary practice, will be controlling.

The County will reserve the right to: (i) waive non-substantive informalities of any proposal or of matters relating to the receipt of proposals and award of the Bonds, (ii) reject all proposals without cause, and (iii) reject any proposal that the County determines to have failed to comply with the terms herein.

BOND INSURANCE AT PURCHASER'S OPTION

If the Bonds qualify for issuance of any policy of municipal bond insurance or commitment therefor at the option of the underwriter, the purchase of any such insurance policy or the issuance of any such commitment shall be at the sole option and expense of the purchaser of the Bonds. Any increased costs of issuance of the Bonds resulting from such purchase of insurance shall be paid by the purchaser, except that, if the County has requested and received a rating on the Bonds from a rating agency, the County will pay that rating fee. Any other rating agency fees shall be the responsibility of the purchaser.

Failure of the municipal bond insurer to issue the policy after Bonds have been awarded to the purchaser shall not constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser to accept delivery on the Bonds.

CUSIP NUMBERS

If the Bonds qualify for assignment of CUSIP numbers such numbers will be printed on the Bonds, but neither the failure to print such numbers on any Bond nor any error with respect thereto will constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser to accept delivery of the Bonds. The CUSIP Service Bureau charge for the assignment of CUSIP identification numbers shall be paid by the purchaser.

SETTLEMENT

Within 40 days following the date of their award, the Bonds will be delivered without cost to the purchaser through DTC in New York, New York. Delivery will be subject to receipt by the purchaser of an approving legal opinion of Kennedy & Graven, Chartered of Minneapolis and Saint Paul, Minnesota, and of customary closing papers, including a nolitigation certificate. On the date of settlement, payment for the Bonds shall be made in federal, or equivalent, funds that shall be received at the offices of the County or its designee not later than 12:00 Noon, Central Time. Unless compliance with the terms of payment for the Bonds has been made impossible by action of the County, or its agents, the purchaser shall be liable to the County for any loss suffered by the County by reason of the purchaser's non-compliance with said terms for payment.

CONTINUING DISCLOSURE

In accordance with SEC Rule 15c2-12(b)(5), the County will undertake, pursuant to the resolution awarding sale of the Bonds, to provide annual reports and notices of certain events. A description of this undertaking is set forth in the Official Statement. The purchaser's obligation to purchase the Bonds will be conditioned upon receiving evidence of this undertaking at or prior to delivery of the Bonds.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT

The County has authorized the preparation of an Official Statement containing pertinent information relative to the Bonds, and said Official Statement will serve as a nearly final Official Statement within the meaning of Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission. For copies of the Official Statement or for any additional information prior to sale, any prospective purchaser is referred to the Financial Advisor to the County, Springsted Incorporated, 380 Jackson Street, Suite 300, Saint Paul, Minnesota 55101, telephone (651) 223-3000.

The Official Statement, when further supplemented by an addendum or addenda specifying the maturity dates, principal amounts and interest rates of the Bonds, together with any other information required by law, shall constitute a "Final Official Statement" of the County with respect to the Bonds, as that term is defined in Rule 15c2-12. By awarding the Bonds to any underwriter or underwriting syndicate submitting a proposal therefor, the County agrees that, no more than seven business days after the date of such award, it shall provide without cost to the senior managing underwriter of the syndicate to which the Bonds are awarded 250 copies of the Official Statement and the addendum or addenda described above. The County designates the senior managing underwriter of the syndicate to which the Bonds are awarded as its agent for purposes of distributing copies of the Final Official Statement to each Participating Underwriter. Any underwriter delivering a proposal with respect to the Bonds agrees thereby that if its proposal is accepted by the County (i) it shall accept such designation and (ii) it shall enter into a contractual relationship with all Participating Underwriters of the Bonds for purposes of assuring the receipt by each such Participating Underwriter of the Final Official Statement.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

National County Government Week

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-049 as follows:

Washington County Employees National County Government Week April 22 - 28, 2007

WHEREAS, county governments and employees are instrumental and central to providing services and projects for citizens across the nation; and

WHEREAS, there are 3,066 counties in the United States of America that serve over 300 million citizens as an essential component of local government; and

WHEREAS, Washington County provides services and programs for over 224,000 citizens; and

WHEREAS, Washington County places the highest value on its employees who plan, administer, and deliver county services and projects that address the essential needs of the children, families, and adults who reside in Washington County; and

WHEREAS, the National County Government Week theme for 2007 is "Protecting the Environment" to recognize county employees, services, and projects that help safeguard the county's valuable and vulnerable environmental resources in many ways for present and future generations.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners recognize and congratulate all county employees for the exceptional customer services being performed every day in a costeffective manner;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby proclaims the week of April 22 - 28, 2007, as "National County Government Week in Washington County."

Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update on the following items: the conference committees are now meeting and there are a number of positive items for counties, but they are dependent on some of the more controversial tax bills; and the Senate conference committee on transportation does include Senator Katie Sieben.

Mr. Schug announced that on Friday, April 27, the Board will meet with the legislative delegation at 7:30 a.m. at the Central Park Place in Woodbury to touch base with them as they move into the final voting period of the legislative session.

Mr. Schug reported that the county has supported a statewide ban on smoking in restaurants and liquor establishments. The Senate has passed a bill that is consistent with what the county has supported. The House passed a Freedom to Breathe bill that includes two major exemptions, one would require local government to grant these exemptions if more than 50% of a business revenue comes from alcohol sales or if a bar or restaurant has physically separated and ventilated a smoking room. The counties have opposed that language, because it creates a difference across the state. The Association of Minnesota Counties has requested that counties contact their House members and support the Senate version of the smoking ban.

Commissioner Peterson moved to authorize the Chair to send a letter to the Washington County State Representatives asking that they support a statewide smoking ban similar to the bill passed by the State Senate, and oppose language that allows restaurants and bars to petition local units of government to opt out of the law. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-0 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Peterson, Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg; Commissioner Pulkrabek abstained.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he abstained from this motion because if he votes for it, he feels it would be in support of the statewide smoking ban and if he votes against it, then he would be supporting the decision-making be held at the local level. He does not support a statewide ban or a local ban. He feels if these groups are concerned about people's health they should come out for the prohibition of tobacco and tobacco products.

Commissioner Kriesel stated he somewhat agrees with Commissioner Pulkrabek's comments; however, he feels the Board has to send a clear message to the State that this should not come down to a local control issue. The law needs to be made at the Capitol that would be the same for all local units of government.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he will support the motion, but he does agree with Commissioner Pulkrabek about banning tobacco products.

Mr. Schug indicated that the Board received a letter from Dennis Berg, Chair of the Anoka County Board of Commissioners, asking for Washington County's support to oppose a provision that has been added to Senate bill SF 1312 that eliminates the local approval process on acquisition procedures for the establishment of DNR wildlife management areas. This affects a small portion of Washington County, the Lamprey Pass Wildlife Management area on the west side of Clear Lake near Forest Lake.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to oppose a provision that has been added to Senate bill SF 1312 that eliminates the local approval process on acquisition procedures for the establishment of wildlife management areas. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson expressed her concern that the de minimis wetland exemption is still in there. She does have a list of the legislators who have voted to keep it, so the Board may want to have a conversation with the legislators on Friday morning. It would create more of a hardship for counties when they are building roads. It doesn't take into account any of the new wetlands that are created within the watersheds or new buildings with rain garden sites.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to support Anoka County's efforts in opposition to the de minimis wetlands exemption in the Environment and Natural Resources Budget Bill. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

<u>COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS</u>

Commissioner Peterson reported that Washington County will host the Minnesota Book Awards at the Stafford Library in Woodbury on April 30 at 7:00 p.m.

Commissioner Peterson reported that she received an e-mail from AMC stating it needs the county's help on supporting the e-waste bill. The House has taken it up today at 10:00 and the Senate will take it up at the end of the week. Last week she attended a meeting with the metro representatives and city representatives, and they reached a consensus on the governance of the ½ cent sales tax for transportation. The cities agreed that the counties would be the governing body, but the cities would like input on the determination as to how the dollars would be spent. Also, the communities within Carver and Scott Counties agreed to the ½ cent sales tax.

Commissioner Peterson reported that in this month's issue of Historic Whisperings there is an article about the trolley system in Stillwater Township and Stillwater and how at one time it went from Stillwater to Excelsior to White Bear Lake and what a travesty it was to pull those tracks.

Commissioner Pulkrabek addressed Mike Ciresi's run for Senate and Ramsey County's program that allows seniors to work off a portion of the property taxes if they are having trouble paying them.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that the Library Board will be involved in the Comp Plan process next year. He will be in Washington D.C. this week seeking Federal transportation funding. He met with the City of Forest Lake to discuss affordable housing and what percentage of income should be used. It was the Housing and Redevelopment's position that 50% of income would be more economical than the 30% some groups were asking for.

Commissioner Hegberg spoke about the sixteen year old who was shot on the metro bus last week after midnight. He stated that a curfew was passed about seven to nine years ago that people at a certain age level couldn't be out that late at night. So many of the crimes happen in the metro area and they have a more restrictive curfew than Washington County does. He believes if the curfew laws were enforced more they could reduce some of these issues in the inter-city. He feels that a sixteen year old should not be out after midnight.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Hegberg moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Peterson and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:58 a.m.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY BOARD WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA MAY 1, 2007

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:00 a.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg. Absent none. Board Chair Kriesel presided. Also present were James Schug, County Administrator; Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; George Kuprian, Assistant County Attorney; Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Steve Gransee, Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Jennifer Wagenius, Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Jody Moran, Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Don Theisen, Director of Transportation and Physical Development; Corey Slagle, Transportation Manager; Barbara Dacy, Executive Director, Housing and Redevelopment Authority; Rich Malloy, Deputy Executive Director, Housing and Redevelopment Authority; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Robert Crawford, Workforce Center Division Manager; Mjyke Nelson, Information Technology Director; Harley Will, Financial Services Director; Sheriff Bill Hutton; Mike Johnson, Chief Deputy Sheriff; Lowell Johnson, Director of Public Health and Environment; Kay McAloney, Human Resources Director; and Steve Nelson, Public Information Coordinator.

The Board recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Jim Lenart, 511 9th Street Southwest, Forest Lake, indicated he had concerns about awarding the bid to the low bidder on the Big Marine Phase I project. Mr. Lenart stated he was contacted by an employee of this company claiming he did not receive the prevailing wage on a Hastings job and other projects he worked on last summer. He requested a certified copy of this person's payroll check and should receive it in a few days. He has a stack of OSHA violations, citations and fines and last fall there was a crushing death of an employee on the job site. The company was cited for exposing the employees to worksite hazards. The City of Winona rejected Pember's bid even though they were low due to prior work, complaints and problems, they called the company non-responsive. The City of Baldwin also rejected their low bid calling them non-responsive and did not wish to award them another project. He asked the Board to review a report he gave them and hopes the Board will award the bid to a responsible bidder.

Harry Melander, 716 Park Avenue, Mahtomedi, stated he works with the St. Paul Building Trades Council representing men and women from the construction industry. He addressed the same concerns as Mr. Lenart and asked the county to look at the concerns raised about the contractor who may provide service to the county.

Mr. Schug stated that the contract being addressed is not on today's agenda and is tentatively scheduled for next week. Staff will review the contractor and the bid proposal.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Commissioner Peterson moved, seconded by Commissioner Orth to adopt the following Consent Calendar:

- Approval of the seventh amendment to contract with East Suburban Resources to provide training, employment placement, and case management services to Dislocated Worker program participants from January 1, 2007 through December 31, 2007.
- 2. Approval to award contract for installation of fiber optic cabling to Access Communications in the amount of \$143,224.66.
- 3. Approval to execute a contract for the installation of a fiber optic cable plant to MP Nexlevel, LLC.
- 4. Adoption of **Resolution No. 2007-050** as follows:

Limited Use Permit with the Minnesota Department of Transportation for a Pedestrian/Bicycle Trail within State Right-of-Way Along Interstate 94 at County Highway 19 in the Cities of Woodbury and Lake Elmo

WHEREAS, Washington County supports the new construction of a pedestrian/bicycle trail along County Highway 19 from Hudson Boulevard in Lake Elmo to Hudson Road in Woodbury to promote multi-modal facilities that move people and goods safely and efficiently; and

WHEREAS, said trial would be located within the State right-of-way for Interstate 94; and

WHEREAS, the State requires a Limited Use Permit for the construction and utilization of said trail.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the Director of Transportation and Physical Development to execute and enter into a Limited Use Permit with the Minnesota Department of Transportation for a trail within Interstate 94 right-of-way along County Highway 19 from Hudson Boulevard in Lake Elmo to Hudson Road in Woodbury.

5. Adoption of **Resolution No. 2007-051** as follows:

Declaring the Official Intent of Washington County to Reimburse Certain Expenditures from the Proceeds of Tax-Exempt Bonds to be Issued by the County - Campus 2025 Improvements Project

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has issued Treas. Reg. § 1.150-2 (the "Reimbursement Regulations") providing that proceeds of tax-exempt bonds used to reimburse prior expenditures will not be deemed spent unless certain requirements are met; and

WHEREAS, Washington County, a county and political subdivision of the State of Minnesota (the "County"), expects to incur certain expenditures that may be financed temporarily from sources other than tax-exempt bonds and other obligations, and reimbursed from the proceeds of a tax-exempt bonds or other obligations; and

WHEREAS, the County has determined to make this declaration of official intent (the "Declaration") to reimburse certain costs from proceeds of tax-exempt bonds or other obligations in accordance with the Reimbursement Regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Washington County, Minnesota as follows:

- The County has duly adopted a Capital Improvement Plan (the "CIP Plan") for the County in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Section 373.40, as amended (the "Act"). The CIP Plan identifies various capital improvements projects (the "Project"), including, 2025 Campus Improvements Project, in the County that are proposed to be financed with the proceeds of general obligation indebtedness of the county issued under the provisions of the Act.
- 2. The County reasonably expects to reimburse, in a principal amount currently estimated not to exceed \$56,400,000, the expenditures made for certain costs of the Project from the proceeds of general obligation bonds of the county to be issued in 2007. All reimbursed expenditures will be capital expenditures, costs of issuance of the tax-exempt bonds or other obligations, or other expenditures eligible for reimbursement under Section 1.150-2(d)(3) of the Reimbursement Regulations.
- 3. Issuance of Mortgage Revenue Bonds for First Time Homebuyers of Single Family Homes

WHEREAS, in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Chapters 462C, 474A and Section 471.59 (the "Act"), the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (the "Authority") proposes to issue, either on its own or together with certain other public entities (together with the Authority, the "Issuers"), one or more series of single family mortgage revenue bonds or refunding bonds ("Mortgage Revenue Bonds") to finance the acquisition by low and moderate income first-time homebuyers of single family homes within the jurisdictions of the Issuers; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has found and determined that the preservation of the quality of life within the Authority's jurisdiction is dependent upon the maintenance and provision of adequate, decent, safe and sanitary housing stock and that a need exists for mortgage credit to be made available for both existing and new single family housing and for rehabilitation of existing single family housing and for home improvements; and

WHEREAS, the principal amount of Mortgage Revenue Bonds to be issued by the Authority, or to be allocable to the Authority as part of a bond issue undertaken jointly by the Issuers, is expected to be equal to \$3,009,851; and

WHEREAS, to the extent the Authority issues bonds jointly with the other Issuers, the total principal amount of the Mortgage Revenue Bonds will be the sum of amounts allocable to the Authority as described above and amounts similarly allocable to the other Issuers;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), the issuance of the Mortgage Revenue Bonds must be approved by the "applicable elected representatives" of the Issuers, and the Washington County Board of Commissioners is the "applicable elected representative" for the issuance of tax-exempt bonds by the Authority;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Washington County Board of Commissioners, that the issuance of Mortgage Revenue Bonds in amount described above as allocable to the Authority, by the Authority or the Issuers pursuant to the Act is hereby approved.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update and noted that there are several conference committees meeting. He reported on the meeting with the county's legislative delegation that was held last Friday and felt it was productive.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson distributed copies of the 2006 Metropolitan Transit Development Board Annual Report. She reported that the Eastern Transportation Alliance met yesterday. They discussed some successes of the east metro in the bonding bills and they are working together well. They would like the

supporters who are members of chambers of commerce to write the Governor and tell him how important these bonding and transportation bills are to the east side of Minnesota. After that meeting she met with Ramsey County Commissioners to discuss a proposal they are putting forth about passenger rail service. Yesterday she attended the first meeting of the Principal Arterial Study Committee for the metro area, and feels that will be a very interesting process. On Saturday she attended Cottage Grove's Arbor Day celebration. She asked that a Commissioner's award be prepared for Brian Voelker, citizen and employee of Cottage Grove for his efforts in that event.

Commissioner Pulkrabek noted a great article in the Star-Tribune Sunday paper that talked about repeat DWI offenders and the sentencing they receive from judges in Minnesota.

Commissioner Orth reported that Washington County will host a future meeting of the Eastern Transportation Alliance; a date has not been selected yet. All of the cities and legislators of Washington County will be invited.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on his trip to Washington D.C. last week seeking funds for transportation. He attended the Foster Care dinner last Thursday and indicated that one foster family had over 800 children go through their house in thirty years. Another family had two children that were mentally handicapped from babyhood through the age of 37 and they are still maintaining them in their home.

Commissioner Peterson announced that two new Viking Cheerleaders were chosen from Cottage Grove, one is Sara McLaughlin, a second grade teacher, and the other, Heather Hopkins Cracauer, is receiving her doctorate in pharmacy.

WASHINGTON COUNTY HOUSING AND REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2007-059** as follows:

Declaration of Official Intent to Provide a Loan to the Housing and Redevelopment Authority in and for the County of Washington

WHEREAS, Whispering Oaks Mobile Home Park (the "Park") is a manufactured home park located south of 50th Street North, east of Hadley Avenue and west of I-694 in Oakdale, Minnesota (the "City"); and

WHEREAS, the Housing and Redevelopment Authority in and for the County of Washington (the "Authority") has been the owner of the Park since 1993; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has determined that it would not be financially viable to continue to operate the Park as a manufactured home park and that the most prudent use of resources would be to replace the existing use with new, affordable housing options for a variety of families in different life stages; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has estimated that the cost to relocate current residents of the Park, replace infrastructure and otherwise prepare the site for redevelopment will be approximately \$8.1 million, including \$2.3 million of indebtedness incurred by the Authority to purchase the Park which is due in 2009 (the "Acquisition Debt"); and

WHEREAS, creation of the Redevelopment Plan by the Authority under Minnesota Statute, Section 469.10 and the costs related to the redevelopment are set forth in Minnesota Statute, Section 469.012 subd. 1h; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has entered into a Purchase Agreement with Red Oak Preserve LLC (the "Redeveloper") which provides for the construction of new infrastructure and a variety of affordable and market-rate, rental and for-sale housing units on the site; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Minnesota Statute Section 469.175 subd. 3(e) the Board of Commissioners (the "Board") of the County of Washington (the "County), by its Resolution No. 2005-121, approved Redevelopment Project No. 2, and Redevelopment Plan, the creation of Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-1 and attendant Tax Increment Financing Plan relating to redevelopment of the Park; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has requested the County to either issue general obligation bonds or provide a loan to the Authority in 2009, the proceeds of which bonds or loan would be used to repay the Authority's Acquisition Debt; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statute Section 469.041 (9), authorizes the County to furnish funds through a loan or otherwise available to it from any source including the proceeds of bonds, to the Authority to pay all or any part of the cost to the Authority of the activities authorized by Minnesota Statute Section 469.012, subd. 1h.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners (the "Board") of the County of Washington, Minnesota (the "County"), as follows:

The Board hereby declares its intent to provide a loan to the Authority in 2009, the proceeds of which loan would be used to repay the Authority's Acquisition Debt, provided that the Authority pledges tax increment from Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-1 to the repayment of the loan and, if necessary, agrees to levy to provide for repayment of the loan; and also provided that the making of such loan does not violate any law or regulation applicable to the County.

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update on the following items: Capital budget bill was vetoed, which contained a number of items of interest to the county; the House and Senate passed a state government bill and the economic development bill, however the Governor has indicated he will veto those, and the state government bill included the \$1 million appropriation for the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp; the legislature passed the public safety bill and the environmental bill, and the governor has indicated he will sign those; the public safety bill includes funding for the short-term offenders being housed in county jails and funding for Community Corrections, and felony case load reduction; in the Senate health and human services bill the chemical dependency consolidated fund maintenance of effort amount was removed; a small appropriation was made for existing drug courts, possibly one additional; the transportation budget bill is still up in the air, but they have agreed to apply the new CSAH formula to any new gas tax, license tab fees, and it will be used for the phase-in of the MVST percentage that was approved last year through the constitutional amendment. Mr. Schug indicated there is some money in the health and human services omnibus bill for backfilling some of the lost federal funds for targeted case management and child support, but unfortunately that is in the bill that is going to be vetoed.

Commissioner Hegberg asked how the courthouse sales tax fared. Mr. Schug indicated that did not survive, it will not be included in the tax bill.

Mr. Schug indicated that under the transportation bill, there is agreement about the wheelage tax being removed from motor bikes and it has been taken off of large trucks over 26,000 pounds.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported that she met with Mike Rogers from Transportation and Physical Development and Senator Katie Sieben last week to talk about transportation legislation and the continued funding of the county's corridors particularly the I-94 corridor. Senator Sieben stated she was interested in transportation and she will also be sitting on the high-speed rail initiative.

Commissioner Peterson complimented John Elholm, Sr. Planner, on his presentation of the Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park and how he answered questions from the audience.

Commissioner Orth reported that he received a disaster and terrorism tool kit from the National Association of Counties containing a documentation video and software resources for elected officials. He will give this to the county's emergency services manager for her review.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on a meeting he attended with the Housing and Redevelopment Authority for a proposed senior housing project in Forest Lake with 80 units. Twenty units would be at 30% of the income level; 40 units at 50%; and 20 units at 80%. He was surprised that one apartment unit costs \$186,000. They are applying for grants and hopefully the land will be donated or partially donated by the city to drive down the costs per unit.

Commissioner Kriesel reported on the Metro Energy Task Force which is still working to form a governance structure for the wind initiative partnership with rural counties. Yesterday he met with Stillwater bridge advocates from Minnesota and Wisconsin to discuss the new bridge and how to keep interest in that going. Stillwater Mayor Harycki intends to call a meeting with the Minnesota and Wisconsin Departments of Transportation to figure out the significance of the 2024 date for construction.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Peterson moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Hegberg and it was adopted unanimously. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:04 a.m.

Mary Farmer-Kubler, Supervisor, presented a brief overview of the 2007 Community Development Block Grant/HOME Annual Action Plan that includes funding recommendations of the CDBG Citizen Advisory Committee amounting to \$1,106,672. Projects for 2007 include: 1) Twin Cities Habitat for Humanity, Red Oak Preserve, \$302,007; 2) Two Rivers Community Land Trust, Red Oak Preserve, \$75,000; 3) Two Rivers Community Land Trust, acquisition and rehabilitation program, \$140,990; 4) CDBG and HOME Administration, \$192,796; 5) Washington County owner-occupied rehabilitation program, \$161,194; 6) First HOME down payment assistance program, \$110,486; 7) Housing Specialist, \$48,019; and 8) Wraparound services, \$76,180.

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve the 2007 Community Development Block Grant and HOME Investment Partnership Annual Action Plan which includes the funding recommendation of the Community Development Block Grant Citizen Advisory Committee in the amount of \$1,106,672. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Commissioner Orth moved to approve a contract between Washington County, administered through the Department Public Health and Environment, and the Minnesota Department of Health to provide private well water testing services to residents in the county for perfluorochemicals (PFCs). Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update on the following items: The Governor has indicated he will veto the tax bill and it does not appear that any additional revenue is being put into county program aide; the House approved a transportation bill that includes a number of the provisions that the county supported, but it is not clear if there are enough votes to override the Governor's promised veto; and the health and human services bill was also vetoed and that bill contained items that the county was interested in. Mr. Schug reported that the environmental bill, the agriculture and veteran's service bill, and the public safety bill were approved.

Mr. Schug announced that retired Judge Ken Maas, of the 10th Judicial District, passed away this morning at his home in Birchwood. He extended the county's thoughts and prayers to the family.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported that she was in attendance at the Capitol yesterday lobbying for passage of the transportation bill. There were between 100 and 150 metropolitan commissioners, city officials, county engineers, and other local officials from throughout Minnesota supporting the transportation bill.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if the county had ever discussed, through MICA or AMC to force the hand of the state or federal government, by stopping the provision of some services that they mandate the county to provide if the funding isn't there to pay for it. Mr. Schug indicated that there has been a lot of informal talk about not providing the services or cut back to the level of the funding that is provided. Usually that stops somewhat short, because those services are being provided to vulnerable people, or public safety is involved. A lot of the requirements are that the county is required by law or rule to provide something, they are often silent on the funding part. Some states have passed legislation that says a law cannot be passed without providing the funding for its implementation. Some counties have cut back on the level of service and have tried to make ends meet, but that means there might not be full compliance with the state rules. George Kuprian, Assistant County Attorney, stated that the courts see counties as an arm of the state. If the state mandates the county to do something, then the county is required to do it. The state is immune from suit by local units of government. If the county does not do the mandate, sometimes the party will have standing to sue the county, other times it can bring action for malfeasance or misfeasance for failing to act.

Commissioner Hegberg reported he met with Commissioner Ben Montzka of Chisago County to discuss a piece of property that is tax forfeited that Washington County cannot sell because it has a creek running through it. Chisago County would like to have that property to see if they can do some projects on it. He is expecting that they will send a letter requesting this action.

Commissioner Hegberg also met with an individual who would like to contribute a substantial amount of money to the new library in Forest Lake, but he would also like the naming rights of the library. He feels that may be appropriate and would like the Board to consider it.

Commissioner Kriesel announced that the Sheriff's Office will host a Law Enforcement Memorial ceremony today at noon at the Law Enforcement Center. The ceremony will honor those officers who have given their life in the line of duty.

Resolution Awarding the Sale of General Obligation Capital Improvement Plan Bonds, Series 2007A; Fixing the Form and Specifications of the Series 2007A Bonds; Directing the Execution and Delivery of the Series 2007A Bonds; and Providing for the Payment of the Series 2007A Bonds

BE IT RESOLVED By the Board of Commissioners (the "County Board") of Washington County, Minnesota (the "County"), as follows:

Section 1. <u>Terms of the Bonds</u>.

Section 1.01 Sale of the Bonds.

- (a) The County is authorized by Minnesota Statutes, Section 373,40, as amended, and Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 475, as amended (collectively, the "Act"), to issue and sell its Capital Improvement Plan Bonds, Series 2007A (the "Bonds"), in the original aggregate principal amount of \$79,385,000 finance certain capital improvements in the County.
- (b) The County has duly adopted a Capital Improvement Plan for the years 2007-2011, as amended (the "CIP Plan"), in accordance with Section 373.40 of the Act. The CIP Plan identifies various capital improvement projects (the "Projects"), including, but not limited to, those Projects listed in (b) below, that are proposed to be financed with the proceeds of general obligation indebtedness of the County issued under the provisions of the Act.
- (b) The following Projects have been duly ordered by the County pursuant to the provisions of Section 373.40 of the Act;

- (c) It is necessary and expedient to the sound financial management of the affairs of the County to issue the Bonds in the original aggregate principal amount of \$79,385,000, pursuant to the Act to provide financing for the Projects.
- (d) Pursuant to Subdivision 2(b) of the Act, before issuance of any bonds (such as the Bonds) pursuant to the Act, the County is required to hold a public hearing to obtain public comment on the proposed issuance of bonds. Pursuant to the Act, a notice of the public hearing must be published in the official newspaper of the County or in a newspaper of general circulation in the County, at least fourteen (14) days but not more than twenty-eight (28) days prior to the date of the public hearing. The County held a public hearing for the Bonds on February 20, 2007 after proper notice was given for such hearing. The public of the County was given an opportunity to speak at the public hearing for the Bonds and several members of the general public did give comments to the County Board with respect to certain Projects. No members of the general public expressed opposition at the public hearing on February 20, 2007 to the issuance of the Bonds.
- (e) Whereas, pursuant to Subdivision 2(c) of the Act, the County must hold a special election prior to the issuance of the Bonds and seek the approval of the voters of the County if a petition requesting a vote on the issuance is signed by voters equal to five percent (5%) of the votes cast in the last general election and such petition is filed with the County Auditor/Treasurer within thirty (30) days from the date of the public hearing on February 20, 2007. The County Auditor/Treasurer did not receive any such petition within thirty (30) days of the public hearing on February 20, 2007 and, therefore, the County is not required to hold a special election for the issuance and sale of the Bonds.
- 1.02 Award of the Bonds and Interest Rates. (a) Pursuant to the terms of a resolution of the County Board, adopted on April 24, 2007 (the "Sale Resolution"), Springsted Incorporated was authorized to negotiate the sale of the Bonds, in accordance with the Terms of Proposal set forth in the Sale Resolution. The sale of the Bonds is being awarded on the true interest cost. The proposal of Merrill Lynch & Co., New York, New York (the "

Purchaser") to purchase the Bonds is hereby found and determined to be a reasonable offer and is hereby accepted, the proposal being to purchase the Bonds at a price of \$80,792,183.70 plus accrued interest from June 1, 2007 to June 27, 2007, for Bonds bearing interest as follows:

1.03 Purchaser Contract and Good Faith Check. The County Auditor/Treasurer is directed to deposit the good faith check of the Purchaser, pending completion of the sale of the Bonds, and to return the good faith checks of the unsuccessful proposers forthwith. (The proposals of all proposers for the Bonds, including the successful Purchaser, are set forth in EXHIBIT A to this Resolution.) The Chair and County Administrator are directed to execute a contract with the Purchaser on behalf of the County.

1.04. Terms and Principal Amounts of the Bonds. 1.05. Optional Redemption. The County may elect on August 1, 2017, and on any day thereafter, to prepay Bonds due on or after February 1, 2018, at a price of par plus accrued interest. Redemption of the Bonds may be in whole or in part and, if in part, at the option of the County and in such manner as the County shall determine. If less than all Bonds of a maturity are called for redemption, the County shall notify The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC") of the particular amount of such maturity to be prepaid. DTC will determine by lot the amount of each participant's interest in such maturity to be

redeemed and each participant will then select by lot the beneficial ownership interests in such maturity to be redeemed.

Section 2. Registration and Payment.

- 2.01. <u>Registered Form</u>. The Bonds will be issued only in fully registered form. The interest thereon and, upon surrender of each Bond, the principal amount thereof is payable by check or draft issued by the Registrar described herein.
- 2.02. <u>Dates</u>; <u>Interest Payment Dates</u>. Each Bond shall be dated as of the last interest payment date preceding the date of authentication to which interest on the Bonds has been paid or made available for payment, unless: (i) the date of authentication is an interest payment date to which interest has been paid or made available for payment, in which case the Bonds will be dated as of the date of authentication; or (ii) the date of authentication is prior to the first interest payment date, in which case the Bonds will be dated as of the date of original issue. As set forth in Section 1.02 above, interest on the Bonds is payable on February 1 and August 1 of each year, commencing February 1, 2008. Interest on the Bonds is payable to the registered owners of record thereof as of the close of business on the fifteenth (15th) day of the immediately preceding month, whether or not such day is a business day.
- 2.03. <u>Registration</u>. The County will appoint a bond registrar, transfer agent, authenticating agent and paying agent (the "Registrar" and the "Paying Agent") for the Bonds. U.S. Bank National Association, Saint Paul, Minnesota, is hereby appointed as initial Registrar and Paying Agent for the Bonds. The effect of registration and the rights and duties of the County and the Registrar with respect thereto are as follows:
- (a) <u>Register</u>. The Registrar shall keep at its principal corporate trust office in Saint Paul, Minnesota a bond register in which the Registrar provides for the registration of ownership of the Bonds and the registration of transfers and exchanges of the Bonds entitled to be registered, transferred or exchanged.
- (b) <u>Transfer of Bonds</u>. Upon surrender for transfer of a Bond duly endorsed by the registered owner thereof or accompanied by a written instrument of transfer, in form satisfactory to the Registrar, duly executed by the registered owner thereof or by an attorney duly authorized by the registered owner in writing, the Registrar shall authenticate and deliver, in the name of the designated transferee or transferees, one or more new Bond of a like aggregate principal amount and maturity, as requested by the transferor. The Registrar may, however, close the books for registration of any transfer after the fifteenth day of the month preceding each interest payment date and until that interest payment date.
- (c) <u>Exchange of Bonds</u>. When Bonds are surrendered by the registered owner for exchange, the Registrar shall authenticate and deliver one or more new Bonds of a like aggregate principal amount and maturity as requested by the registered owner or the owner's attorney in writing.
- (d) <u>Cancellation</u>. Bonds surrendered upon transfer or exchange shall be promptly cancelled by the Registrar and thereafter disposed of as directed by the County.
- (e) <u>Improper or Unauthorized Transfer</u>. When a Bond is presented to the Registrar for transfer, the Registrar may refuse to transfer the Bond until the Registrar is satisfied that the endorsement on the Bond or separate instrument of transfer is valid and genuine and that the requested transfer is legally authorized. The Registrar shall incur no liability for the refusal, in good faith, to make transfers which it, in its judgment, deems improper or unauthorized.
- (f) <u>Persons Deemed Owners</u>. The County and the Registrar may treat the person in whose name a Bond is registered in the bond register as the absolute owner of the Bond, whether the Bond is overdue or not, for the purpose of receiving payment of, or on account

- of, the principal of and interest on the Bond and for all other purposes, and payments so made to a registered owner or upon the owner's order shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon the Bond to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.
- (g) <u>Taxes</u>, <u>Fees and Charges</u>. The Registrar may impose a charge upon the owner thereof for a transfer or exchange of Bonds sufficient to reimburse the Registrar for any tax, fee or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to the transfer or exchange.
- (h) Mutilated, Lost, Stolen or Destroyed Bond. If a Bond becomes mutilated or is destroyed, stolen or lost, the Registrar shall deliver a new Bond of like amount, number, maturity date and tenor in exchange and substitution for and upon cancellation of the mutilated Bond or in lieu of and in substitution for any Bond destroyed, stolen or lost, upon the payment of the reasonable expenses and charges of the Registrar in connection therewith; and, in the case of a Bond destroyed, stolen or lost, upon filing with the Registrar of evidence satisfactory to it that the Bond was destroyed, stolen or lost, and of the ownership thereof, and upon furnishing to the Registrar an appropriate bond or indemnity in form, substance and amount satisfactory to it and as provided by law, in which both the County and the Registrar must be named as obligees. Bonds so surrendered to the Registrar shall be cancelled by the Registrar and evidence of such cancellation shall be given to the County. If the mutilated, destroyed, stolen or lost Bond has already matured or been called for redemption in accordance with its terms it is not necessary to issue a new Bond prior to payment.
- (i) Redemption. In the event any of the Bonds are called for redemption, notice thereof identifying the Bonds to be redeemed shall be given by the Registrar by mailing a copy of the redemption notice by first class mail (postage prepaid) to the registered owner of each Bonds to be redeemed at the address shown on the registration books kept by the Registrar and by publishing the notice if required by law. Failure to give notice by publication or by mail to any registered owner, or any defect therein, shall not affect the validity of the proceedings for the redemption of Bonds. Bonds so called for redemption shall cease to bear interest after the specified redemption date, provided that the funds for the redemption are on deposit with the place of payment at that time.
- 2.04. Appointment of Initial Registrar. Pursuant to Section 2.03 hereof, the County has appointed U.S. Bank National Association, Saint Paul, Minnesota, as the initial Registrar and Paying Agent. The Chair and the County Administrator are authorized to execute and deliver, on behalf of the County, a contract with the Registrar. Upon merger or consolidation of the Registrar with another corporation, if the resulting corporation is a bank or trust company authorized by law to conduct such business, the resulting corporation is authorized to act as successor Registrar. The County agrees to pay the reasonable and customary charges of the Registrar for the services performed. The County reserves the right to remove the Registrar upon thirty (30) days notice and upon the appointment of a successor Registrar, in which event the predecessor Registrar shall deliver all cash and Bonds in its possession to the successor Registrar and shall deliver the bond register to the successor Registrar. On or before each principal or interest due date with respect to the Bonds, without further order of this County Board, the County Administrator shall transmit to the Registrar money sufficient for the payment of all principal and interest then due.
- 2.05. Execution, Authentication and Delivery. The Bonds shall be prepared under the direction of the County Administrator and executed on behalf of the County by the signatures of the Chair and the County Administrator, provided that all signatures may be printed, engraved, or lithographed facsimiles of the originals. If an officer whose signature or a facsimile of whose signature appears on the Bonds ceases to be such officer before the delivery of any Bond, that signature or facsimile shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if the officer had remained in office until delivery. Notwithstanding such execution, a Bond shall not be valid or obligatory for any purpose or entitled to any security or benefit under this Resolution unless and until a certificate of authentication on the Bond has been duly executed by the manual signature of an authorized

representative of the Registrar. Certificates of authentication on different Bonds need not be signed by the same representative. The executed certificate of authentication on a Bond is conclusive evidence that it has been authenticated and delivered under this Resolution. When the Bonds have been so prepared, executed, and authenticated, the County Administrator shall deliver the same to the Purchaser upon payment of the purchase price in accordance with the contract of sale heretofore made and executed, and the Purchaser is not obligated to see to the application of the purchase price.

2.06. <u>Temporary Bonds</u>. The County may elect to deliver, in lieu of printed definitive Bonds, one or more typewritten temporary Bonds in substantially the form set forth in Section 3 with such changes as may be necessary to reflect more than one maturity in a single temporary bond. Upon the execution and delivery of definitive Bonds, the temporary Bonds shall be exchanged therefor and cancelled.

Section 3. Form of the Bonds.

- 3.01. Printing of Bonds. All of the provisions of the Bonds, when executed as authorized herein, shall be deemed to be a part of this resolution as fully and to the same extent as if incorporated verbatim herein and shall be in full force and effect from the date of execution and delivery thereof. The Bonds shall be substantially in the form attached to this resolution as Exhibit C, which form is hereby approved, with such necessary and appropriate variations, omissions and insertions (including changes to the aggregate principal amount of each Bond, the stated maturities of the Bonds, the interest rates on the Bonds, the terms of redemption of the Bonds, and variation from County policies regarding methods of offering general obligation bonds) as the Chair and the County Administrator, in their discretion, shall determine. The execution of the Bonds with the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chair and the County Administrator and the delivery of the Bonds by the County shall be conclusive evidence of such determination.
- 3.02. <u>Approving Legal Opinion</u>. The County Administrator is authorized and directed to obtain a copy of the proposed approving legal opinion of Kennedy & Graven, Chartered, Minneapolis, Minnesota, which shall be complete except as to dating thereof and cause the opinion to accompany each Bond.

Section 4. Payment; Security; Pledges and Covenants.

4.01. Funds Established for the Bonds.

a) Debt Service Fund. The Bonds shall be payable from the General Obligation Capital Improvement Bonds, Series 2007A, Debt Service Fund (the "Series 2007A Debt Service Fund"), hereby created, and the proceeds of the ad valorem taxes hereinafter levied are hereby pledged to the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund. If a payment of principal or interest on the Bonds becomes due when there is not sufficient money in the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund to pay the same, the County Administrator will pay such principal or interest from the general fund of the County, and the general fund will be reimbursed for those advances out of the proceeds of the taxes levied by this resolution, when collected. There is hereby appropriated to the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund, from proceeds of the Bonds, \$262,948.47 representing accrued interest on the Bonds.

In addition to the amount appropriated in (i) above, the County shall also deposit, prior to February 1, 2008, to the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund an amount equal to \$1,200,000 to pay a portion of the interest due on the Bonds on February 1, 2008.

b) <u>Series 2007A Project Fund</u>. The proceeds of the Bonds, less the appropriations made in paragraph 4.01(a) above, together with any other funds appropriated for the Projects during the acquisition, construction, and installation of the Projects, will be deposited in a separate Series 2007A Project Fund (the "Series 2007A Project Fund") to be used solely to defray expenses of the Projects and payment of the costs of issuance of the Bonds. When the

Projects are completed and the cost thereof paid, the Series 2007A Project Fund is to be closed and any remaining balance therein transferred to the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund. There is hereby appropriated to the Series 2007A Project Fund the following amounts from proceeds of the Bonds.

- (i) \$78,308,012.65 representing funds from the sale of the Bonds (not including original issue premium);
- (ii) \$964,268.20 representing capitalized interest on the Bonds through February 1, 2008; and
- (iii) \$1,519,902.85 representing original issue premium paid by the Purchaser of the Bonds.

Prior to February 1, 2008, the County shall transfer the amount set forth in 4.01(b)(ii) above from the Series 2007A Project Fund to the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund. Amounts derived from the investment of funds in the Series 2007A Project Fund may, at the option of the County, remain in the Series 2007A Project Fund or may be transferred to the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund.

- 4.02. <u>Filing of Resolution</u>. The County Administrator is authorized and directed to file a certified copy of this Resolution with the County Auditor/Treasurer (or the official of the County performing the functions of the County Auditor) and to obtain the certificate required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.63, as amended.
- 4.03. Pledge of Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Bonds, there is levied a direct annual irrepealable ad valorem tax (the "Tax") upon all of the taxable property in the County, to be spread upon the tax rolls and collected with and as part of other general taxes of the County. The Tax will be credited to the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund above provided and shall be established by officials of the County after the award of the Bonds and determination of the interest rates on the Bonds. The Tax shall be levied and collected in the years and in the amounts as follows (year stated being year of levy for collection the following year):

<u>Levy Year</u> <u>Collection Year</u> <u>Amount</u>

(See attached Exhibit B)

4.04. Overlevy Requirement. It is determined that the estimated collection of the foregoing Tax will produce at least five percent (5%) in excess of the amount needed to meet when due, the principal and interest payments on the Bonds. The Tax so levied herein will be irrepealable until all of the Bonds are paid, provided that at the time the County makes its annual tax levies the County Administrator may certify to the County Auditor/Treasurer (or the official of the County performing the functions of the County Auditor) the amount available in the Series 2007A Debt Service Fund to pay principal and interest due during the ensuing year, and the County Auditor/Treasurer of the County will thereupon reduce the levy collectible during such year by the amount so certified.

Section 5. Authentication of Transcript.

5.01. Furnishing of Documents. The officers of the County are authorized and directed to prepare and furnish to the Purchaser and to Kennedy & Graven, Chartered, bond counsel for the County, certified copies of proceedings and records of the County relating to the Bonds and to the financial condition and affairs of the County, and such other certificates, affidavits and transcripts as may be required to show the facts within their knowledge or as shown by the books and records in their custody and under their control, relating to the validity and marketability of the Bonds, and such instruments, including any heretofore furnished, will be deemed representations of the County as to the facts stated therein.

5.02. Official Statement. The Chair and County Administrator are authorized and directed to examine the Official Statement to be prepared and circulated in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds and to certify, if appropriate, that to the best of their knowledge and belief the Official Statement is a complete and accurate representation of the facts and representations made therein as of the date of the Official Statement.

Section 6. Tax Covenants.

- 6.01. Tax-Exempt Bonds. The County covenants and agrees with the holders from time to time of the Bonds that it will not take or permit to be taken by any of its officers, employees, or agents any action which would cause the interest on the Bonds to become includable in gross income for federal income tax purposes under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and the Treasury Regulations promulgated thereunder, in effect at the time of such actions, and that it will take or cause its officers, employees or agents to take, all affirmative action within its power that may be necessary to ensure that such interest will not become includable in gross income for federal income tax purposes under the Code and applicable Treasury Regulations, as presently existing or as hereafter amended and made applicable to the Bonds.
- 6.02. <u>Compliance with Code</u>. The County will comply with requirements necessary under the Code to establish and maintain the exclusion from gross income of the interest on the Bonds under Section 103 of the Code, including, without limitation, requirements relating to temporary periods for investments and limitations on gross proceeds invested at a yield greater than the yield on the Bonds.
- 6.03. Not Private Activity Bonds. The County further covenants not to use the proceeds of the Bonds or to cause or permit them or any of them to be used, in such a manner as to cause the Bonds to be deemed to be "private activity bonds" within the meaning of Sections 103 and 141 through 150 of the Code.
- 6.04. <u>Procedural Requirements</u>. The County will use its best efforts to comply with any federal procedural requirements which may apply in order to effectuate the designations made by this Section 6.

Section 7. Book-Entry System; Limited Obligation of County.

- 7.01. <u>DTC</u>. The Bonds will be initially issued in the form of a separate single typewritten or printed fully registered Bond for each of the maturities set forth on Exhibit B attached hereto. Upon initial issuance, the ownership of each Bond will be registered in the registration books kept by the Registrar in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee for DTC, and its successors and assigns. Except as provided in this section, all of the outstanding Bonds will be registered in the registration books kept by the Registrar in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC.
- 7.02. Participants. With respect to Bonds registered in the registration books kept by the Registrar in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC, the County, the Registrar and the Paying Agent will have no responsibility or obligation to any broker dealers, banks and other financial institutions from time to time for which DTC holds Bonds as securities depository ("Participants") or to any other person on behalf of which a Participant holds an interest in the Bonds, including but not limited to any responsibility or obligation with respect to (i) the accuracy of the records of Cede & Co., DTC or any Participant with respect to any ownership interest in the Bonds, (ii) the delivery to any Participant or any other person (other than a registered owner of Bonds, as shown by the registration books kept by the Registrar), of any notice with respect to the Bonds, including any notice of redemption, or (iii) the payment to any Participant or any other person, other than a registered owner of Bonds, of any amount with respect to principal of, premium, if any, or interest on the Bonds. The County, the Registrar and the Paying Agent may treat and consider the person in whose name each Bond is registered in the registration books kept by the Registrar as the holder

and absolute owner of such Bond for the purpose of payment of principal, premium and interest with respect to such Bond, for the purpose of registering transfers with respect to such Bonds, and for all other purposes. The Paying Agent shall pay all principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds only to or on the order of the respective registered owners, as shown in the registration books kept by the Registrar, and all such payments will be valid and effectual to fully satisfy and discharge the County's obligations with respect to payment of principal of, premium, if any, or interest on the Bonds to the extent of the sum or sums so paid. No person other than a registered owner of a Bond, as shown in the registration books kept by the Registrar, will receive a certificated Bond evidencing the obligation of this Resolution. Upon delivery by DTC to the County Administrator of a written notice to the effect that DTC has determined to substitute a new nominee in place of Cede & Co., the words "Cede & Co." shall refer to such new nominee of DTC; and upon receipt of such a notice, the County Administrator shall promptly deliver a copy of the same to the Registrar and Paying Agent.

- 7.03. Representation Letter. The form of Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations proposed to be submitted to DTC, which is on file with the County Administrator (the "Representation Letter"), is hereby approved, and the County Administrator is authorized to execute and deliver the Representation Letter in substantially the form on file, with such changes therein not inconsistent with law as the County Administrator and the County Attorney may approve, which approval shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution thereof. Any Paying Agent or Registrar subsequently appointed by the County with respect to the Bonds shall agree to take all action necessary for all representations of the County in the Representation letter with respect to the Registrar and Paying Agent, respectively, to be complied with at all times.
- 7.04. Transfers Outside Book-Entry System. In the event the County, by resolution of the County Board, determines that it is in the best interests of the persons having beneficial interests in the Bonds that they be able to obtain Bond certificates, the County will notify DTC, whereupon DTC will notify the Participants, of the availability through DTC of Bond certificates. In such event the County will issue, transfer and exchange Bond certificates as requested by DTC and any other registered owners in accordance with the provisions of this Resolution. DTC may determine to discontinue providing its services with respect to the Bonds at any time by giving notice to the County and discharging its responsibilities with respect thereto under applicable law. In such event, if no successor securities depository is appointed, the County shall issue and the Registrar shall authenticate Bond certificates in accordance with this resolution and the provisions hereof shall apply to the transfer, exchange and method of payment thereof.
- 7.05. Payments to DTC. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Resolution to the contrary, so long as a Bond is registered in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC, payments with respect to principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bond and all notices with respect to the Bond shall be made and given, respectively, in the manner provided in DTC's Operational Arrangements, as set forth in the Representation Letter.
- Section 8. <u>Continuing Disclosure</u>. The County hereby covenants and agrees that it shall comply with and carry out all of the provisions of the Continuing Disclosure Certificate. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Resolution, failure of the County to comply with the Continuing Disclosure Certificate is not to be considered an event of default with respect to the Bonds, however, any Bondholder may take such actions as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking mandate or specific performance by court order, to cause the County to comply with its obligations under this section. "Continuing Disclosure Certificate" means that certain Continuing Disclosure Certificate executed by the Chair and County Administrator and dated the date of issuance and delivery of the Bonds, as originally executed and as it may be amended from time to time in accordance with the terms thereof.
- Section 9. <u>Defeasance</u>. When all Bonds and all interest thereon have been discharged as provided in this section, all pledges, covenants and other rights granted by this resolution to the

holders of the Bonds will cease, except that the pledge of the full faith and credit of the County for the prompt and full payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds will remain in full force and effect. The County may discharge all Bonds which are due on any date by depositing with the Registrar on or before that date a sum sufficient for the payment, including interest earned thereon, in full of the Bonds. If any Bond should not be paid when due, it may nevertheless be discharged by depositing with the Registrar a sum sufficient for the payment thereof in full with interest accrued to the date of such deposit.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Legislative Update

John Kaul, Washington County Lobbyist, reviewed the 2007 State Legislative Session and its impact on Washington County.

Performance Measurement Report

Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator, presented an overview of the Washington County 2006 Annual Performance Report. The county is continuing to effectively report performance measurement. They have continued the effort to communicate this information to the citizenry to make sure that the county is measuring outcomes that are relevant to the public. A county-wide indicator section has been expanded to give a sense of what is happening to the overall quality of life in Washington County. Training opportunities have been provided to improve data analysis and enhance use of measures. Patricia Conley, Library Director, summarized key learnings as a result of the performance measurement in her department

including: above average number of cardholders; average annual rate of loans and number of visits; use of digital content growing; interlibrary loan is fastest growing service; and, patrons prefer a greater degree of self-sufficiency.

Ms. O'Rourke presented the County Board with a trailblazer's award from the National Center for Civic Innovation for involving the public in the county's performance measurement and reporting endeavors.

Emergency Operation Exercise

Ms. O'Rourke advised the Board that county staff will be conducting a pandemic flu emergency training and exercise event this Thursday. Then, on the 11th and 12th of June there will be preparation and implementation of a mock influenza vaccine distribution site at the Mahtomedi High School.

Carnelian-Marine St. Croix Watershed District Appointments

Commissioner Hegberg moved that a resolution be prepared for next week's Board meeting appointing the following individuals to the Carnelian-Marine St. Croix Watershed District: John Bower, May Township, James Shaver, Marine on St. Croix, Rick Markwardt, May Township, and Douglas Pratt, Scandia. Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Peterson and Pulkrabek absent.

<u>COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS</u>

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the Metro Alliance for Healthy Families meeting he attended. This committee deals with at risk families and children. The group has received \$1 million from both the United Way and the Bush Foundation.

Commissioner Hegberg also met with the Marine Library group. They are concerned about the library and whether it will stay in its current location or be moved to the school or another spot. There is not a significant amount of capital money for a new library. The library has indicated that the improvements are handicapped accessibility and technology.

Commissioner Hegberg requested that the Board hold a workshop to discuss the naming of the new Forest Lake Library.

Commissioner Orth reported that he attended the AMC District X meeting yesterday. They will be requesting that every county provide information on what it is doing in transportation and the costs. They will use this information to push for transportation bonding if a special session is held this year, or next

year's legislative session. He also informed the Chair that a new committee will be formed called Public

Safety and Corrections. A member of the County Board and an alternate will need to be chosen.

Commissioner Kriesel reported he attended a ribbon cutting ceremony at Andersen Windows for a new

consumed or used right there and less than 1% is placed in landfills.

Also present were Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; George Kuprian, Assistant County Attorney; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Don Theisen, Director of Public Works; Wayne Sandberg, Deputy Public Works Director; Cory Slagle, Transportation Manager; Jeneen Johnson, Human Resources Coordinator; Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Jody Moran, Property Records and Taxpayer Services Supervisor; Mjyke Nelson, Information Technology Director; Sheriff Bill Hutton; Chief Deputy Mike Johnson; Harley Will, Financial Services Director; Mjyke Nelson, Information Technology Director; and Steve Nelson, Public Information Coordinator II.

The Board recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

The Board Chair asked for comments from the public; none were heard.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

Dan Papin, Community Services Director, announced that Washington County is one of three counties selected by the Federal government to be reviewed under the Minnesota Child and Family review process. Carlton and Hennepin are the other two counties in Minnesota. The review will take place during the week of September 24-28. In February, 2005 the State reviewed the county for seven child safety, permanency, and well-being outcomes along with twenty-three performance items. The results of that review were mixed. The county discovered through that process that there were several areas for improvement. He believes it is the county's positive response to that review that drew the State of Minnesota's attention to the county. Staff for the child service area has spent quite a bit of time developing a performance improvement plan to address the areas where they came up short. They also looked at areas that although they passed, they felt could be strengthened. The review team will be made up of Federal, State, community people from other counties, and provider agencies. This team will intensively review fifteen of the county's child welfare cases. The team will talk to judges, foster parents, community providers, and perhaps members of the County Board, to find out what these individuals feel about the system, how it's working or things that could be improved.

Commissioners Peterson and Orth indicated that this might be a good time to address Federal and State funding cuts and the impact it has on the county.

PUBLIC WORKS

Commissioner Orth moved to approve Amendment #5 to the HR Green contract for additional inspection and design services in the amount of \$59,116 for the Radio Drive Safety and Mobility Project. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator, announced that the I-94 Coalition meeting will take place on June 13 at 4:00 p.m. and not June 14 as listed on the agenda.

Ms. O'Rourke informed the Board that next week the Board of Equalization will start at 9:00 a.m. to be followed by the County Board meeting.

PROPERTY RECORDS AND TAXPAYER SERVICES

Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services, announced that at a recent conference, the Minnesota Counties Computer Cooperative (MCCC) recognized the work of a number of Washington

County employees. Individuals recognized for their outstanding technical service included: Tom Norve, Laurie Evans, Pat VanLue, and Joanne Helm. Joanne Helm was also recognized for her outstanding dedication and services to MCCC and her extensive participation in MCCC activities

COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported on the Operation Lifesaver train that he and Commissioner Kriesel took this past Sunday. It was a train ride from St. Paul to Roberts, Wisconsin. A short program was presented on the need for train safety. He felt it was worth attending and the program was informative.

Commissioner Orth reported on the Metro Energy Task Force meeting he attended last week. He indicated that Xcel Energy will be providing \$1.9 million for new conservation efforts. More information will be coming out on that.

Commissioner Kriesel reported that the Sierra Club filed a lawsuit to prevent or delay the Stillwater Bridge from being constructed. He was disappointed with their decision. The Sierra Club talked about the sprawl they feel will occur in Wisconsin, and Commissioner Kriesel believes that sprawl has already occurred. He believes there is more environmental damage happening to historic downtown Stillwater and the neighborhoods from not building the bridge.

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF APPEAL AND EQUALIZATION OF WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA JUNE 12, 2007

Commissioner Gary Kriesel called the 2007 Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization to order at 1:00 p.m. with the following members present: Commissioner/Chair Gary Kriesel, and Commissioners Dennis Hegberg; Greg Orth, Myra Peterson, Bill Pulkrabek, and Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer.

Chairperson Kriesel welcomed all attendees, and explained the power of the Board. They are not empowered to adjust taxes or unrelated issues - they will only deal with valuation and classification issues for the 2007 assessment year.

Property owners wishing to appeal were asked to make an appointment to appear by contacting the Assessor's Office prior to the appointment deadline. Ten minute timeframes have been scheduled in which any relevant information pertaining to their appeal can be presented. The first appointment is scheduled for 1:10 and the last appointment is scheduled for 3:00. Any property owner(s) in attendance who are not on today's agenda will be heard at the end of the scheduled appointments.

The County Board of Appeal and Equalization will consider any information submitted by a property owner along with the information provided by the Assessor's Office.

There will be a second meeting of the Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization to be held on June 19th, 2007 at 9:00 a.m. At this meeting, the Board will review the recommendations from the County Assessor and make a decision on each appeal. If the property owner is not satisfied with final decisions of the Board, they may appeal to the Minnesota Tax Court.

Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke administered the oath to the Washington County Board of Appeal Members, and the required certification forms were signed.

County Assessor, Bruce Munneke, introduced the assessment staff in attendance: Sylvia Schreifels (Assessment Technical Support Supervisor and Recording Secretary for today's meeting), Rollie Huber (Deputy County Assessor); Al LaBine (Residential Supervisor); Don Lovstad (Residential Supervisor); Ann Miller (Commercial Appraiser); Curt Piepenburg (Commercial Appraiser), and Residential Appraisers Barry Staberg, Jeff Satzinger, and Sam Scott.

Kevin Corbid, Director of the Property Records and Taxpayer Services Department was also in attendance.

County Assessor Bruce Munneke welcomed everyone to the 2007 Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization. He stated these proceedings bring to an end the 2007 Assessment. During this appeals period he stated his staff received 980 calls regarding value and classification. There were 19 Local Boards and four Open Book Meetings, starting on April 9th and ending on May 8th. 149 properties were appealed at Board Meetings, and 11 persons have appointments to appear today.

CASE #1 - City of St. Paul Park - (Parcel 07.027.21.31.0089 Estimated Market Value \$212,700 for 2007) Appearance by the son-in-law of Celestine and Lorrai Mischke. The son-in-law is a real estate agent, and he had a market analysis done comparing the property to others that had updates and sold. He feels \$185,000 would be a fair value, and he passed a copy of the appraisal on to the Commissioners stating he did provide this to the assessor as well. At this time the Assessor's Preliminary Recommendation is to reduce the value from \$212,700 to \$196,000. Commissioner Peterson asked if he looked over the comps.? Commissioner Pulkrabek commented that those parcels that sold for a higher value also had larger square footage. County Assessor Bruce Munneke stated that they consider upgrades and square footage. Mischke's son-in-law commented that their house did not have as much basement finish square footage, but the Assessor stated they did not consider basement square footage. Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke questioned some of the other comps. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked why they did not appeal last year, and their son-in-law responded that the Mischkes did not understand that their property was appreciating faster than the market. Commissioner Hegberg asked if there was asbestos siding - no, cedar shakes. Commissioner Peterson stated that the market in South Washington County is flat and many properties stay on the market six months before they sell. Commissioner Kriesel thanked the Mischke's son-in-law, and said they would look over the information he provided. Commissioner Pulkrabek offered thanks as well, and commented on the quality of the information provided. Commissioner Kriesel said the information is important and will help with the decision for next week. Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke stated that the information would be reviewed during the week and a decision would be made on recommendations at next week's meeting. The assessor will also have an opportunity to go over information. Next week's meeting will be at 9:00.

CASE #2 - City of Birchwood - (Parcel 30.030.21.42.0030 Estimated Market Value \$358,900 for 2007) Appearance by Mary Wingfield on behalf of her Mother, Diane G. Wingfield who resides at 720 Birchwood Ave., Birchwood. Diane went to a realtor in February of 2007 prior to the Assessment Notices being mailed out. Mark Ashby did the appraisal on her house, and Mary commented that if the assessor did not have a copy, she would get one to them. She said her Mother's house is 40 years old, and is the original house with no updates, i.e. kitchen, bath, floors. She brought up the fact it had outdated characteristics. Mary said that when they talked to appraiser Barry Staberg about the comps., Barry stated that Ashby did not include comps. that were similar houses but higher values, and they did not use all the same comps. Reference was made to a comp. that was on the market for over 300 days and after numerous reductions it sold for \$270,000. This house also had numerous improvements. Commissioner Pulkrabek questioned why the Wingfield property building decreased, but the lot doubled

in value. Mary stated that there were two lots (parcel 30.030.21.42.0029 increased from \$56,500 in 2006 to \$165,000 in 2007). The assessor explained that all land values in Birchwood increased due to their land schedule. Mary stated that she thought land with improvements should be valued less. Bruce Munneke, the County Assessor, responded that all land is valued as vacant. Commissioner Kriesel asked if there was more dialog, and they would look over her information for next week. County Assessor Bruce Munneke asked for a copy of her appraisal. The assessor's preliminary recommendation is that the assessed value of \$338,200 is the fair market value of this parcel.

CASE #3 - City of Newport - 36.028.22.24.0008, 36.028.22.24.0011, 36.028.22.24.0007, 36.028.22.21.0066 (Parcels are four 3-bedroom apartments, each with an Estimated Market Value of \$444,600 for Assessment Year 2007) Appearance by Jeff Johnson. Mr. Johnson provided handouts to the Commissioners and stated that the assessor had his income information. He also stated that the construction in the neighborhood along Hwy 61 and 494 has adversely affected his business regarding occupancy and rental rates. It has also created access issues. Mr. Johnson also stated that that these apartments are on a private street, and the yards are private so how each renter maintains their area can affect value. Regarding comparable apartments by the same builder in Dakota County – those apartments are in a more desirable location, the occupants are closer to their employment, and there are no road construction issues. Commissioner Peterson asked if they privately maintain their own sewer and water. Commissioner Kriesel commented that value should be 95 to 105% of market. Commissioner Hegberg asked what current taxes were and if utilities were separate or included in rent. (The assessor's preliminary recommendation is to reduce each building from \$444,600 to \$407,600.)

CASE #4 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 08.032.21.32.0061 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$851,800/8-unit apartment) (Parcel 08.032.21.32.0074 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$1,045,200/10-unit apartment) (Parcel 16.032.21.24.0002 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$866,000/8-unit apartment) Appearance by Mr. Kaeding of Kaeding Properties, LLC. Mr. Kaeding talked about his comparables and prior sales. He passed handouts to the Commissioners. County Assessor Bruce Munneke commented that the assessor was not provided with an appraisal prior to this meeting. Regarding the handouts today, Commissioner Kriesel commented that this information should be of interest to the assessor. Commissioner Hegberg asked what the rent was and was utilities included. Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke commented that the value has not gone up since last year, and why didn't he appeal last year. Mr. Kaeding stated he was too busy. (The assessor's preliminary recommendation is no change.)

CASE #5 - City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 24.032.21.22.0002 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$651,500) – Appearance by Beatrice Meyer at 1:50. Ms. Meyer stated she asked the assessor how he came up with her land value, and she said she was given comparables and addresses. She said the comps. were higher quality, mansion quality, adding that she had worked in mortgage banking. Ms. Meyer brought up an example of a parcel with a sandy beach that the assessor lowered to \$651,500, but

her property has poor quality frontage and is mucky and weedy. Commissioner Kriesel commented on the value of one of the comparables, and Ms. Meyer stated they were offered less than market due to sales trends. Commissioner Peterson had questions regarding lot sizes, and Commissioner Kriesel asked for addresses of the comparables that Ms. Meyer was referring to. The preliminary recommendation of the assessor is for no change to value.

CASE #6 - City of Bayport - (Parcel 10.029.20.11.0061 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$205,100) - Mr. Wayne Ristow was scheduled to appear before the Board at 2:00. Mr. Ristow did not appear and the case is dismissed.

CASE #7 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 16.032.21.21.0051 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$259,200) - Appearance by Luerna Sawyer. Ms. Sawyer stated that she compared her property with others on her block, and said for the past two years her value has increased around \$30,000 each year, yet she does not have a screen porch, pool, large garage, no recent improvements - the last improvement was to her roof ten years ago. She also commented on the value of an outlot she has a deeded interest in, and said that a realtor told her that value is also wrong. Ms. Sawyer said nearby parcels also have an interest in that out lot and it is used for lake access. She asked the assessor for the definition of an out lot. Commissioner Pulkrabek questioned a discrepancy in the values, but thought it may be attributed to EVM vs. limited market value. County Assessor Bruce Munneke asked Ms. Sawyer if she feels she benefits from the out lot, and she answered no, because she does not have a boat. Commissioner Hegberg is familiar with the area and he comments on the number of boats that can go in and out. Ms. Sawyer also asked about a neighbor whose property description does not state they have an interest in the out lot, and she wonders if they are contributing towards the taxes. Commissioner Peterson asked what rights do the owners have, i.e. campfires, etc. Ms. Sawyer commented on prior issues with late parties, drinking, bad language, but that has stopped since complaints have been filed. Commissioner Kriesel stated that her information will be looked over this week and a recommendation made. Commissioner Hegberg is familiar with the area, and commented regarding the number of boats that can dock, and no one has taken responsibility for jurisdiction. The assessor's preliminary recommendation is for no change.

CASE #8 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 10.032.21.42.0009 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$476,400) (Parcel 10.032.21.42.0010 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$20,000) - Mr. Kevin T. Kealy was scheduled to appear before the Board at 2:20. Mr. Kealy did not appear and the case is dismissed.

Because the Board was ahead of schedule and Case #9 was not yet present - County Assessor Bruce Munneke passed out copies of the letter sent in by Norman Dupre who was scheduled as Case #10 at 2:40. In his letter, Mr. Dupre rescinded his request to be heard by the County Board. The appeal of Mr. Russell Mansmith is being heard next as Mr. John Donovan/Case #9 is not present at this time.

(Scheduled to be Case #12 City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 06.032.21.23.0014 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$228,300) (Parcel 06.032.21.23.0011 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$85,600) (Parcel 06.032.21.23.0016 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$2300) Appearance by Russell Mansmith. County Assessor Bruce Munneke stepped up to the podium to give background information on the Mansmith appeal. Assessment Year 2006 for taxes payable in 2007, the classification of Mr. Mansmith's parcels were changed from agricultural to residential, and he was removed from the Green Acres Program. A slide projection was displayed by County Assessor Bruce Munneke to aid in explaining that Mr. Mansmith did not have 10 acres being used in agricultural production, or an intense agricultural use. The Forest Lake Local Board of Review in April of 2007 voted to return Mr. Mansmith's property to an agricultural classification. A copy of an opinion from the Washington County Attorney was obtained in which the attorney supported the assessor that the agricultural classification is not appropriate for the parcels being appealed. Mr. Mansmith provided pictures of his tree farm, and stated that he has to reserve an area to park cars and sell trees. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if the 10 acres in production rule is new. Mr. Mansmith said there has been a huge increase in his taxes - previously they had been very low. Commissioner Hegberg was out to the Mansmith property and suggested to him that he bring in pictures. Mr. Mansmith complimented the Assessor's Office saying they had been very courteous to him and especially the appraiser he has been dealing with - Jeff Satzinger. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked why Mr. Mansmith just didn't put two more acres into production and he would then comply with guidelines. Mr. Mansmith responded that the soil conditions would not allow for producing a desirable tree. Commissioner Peterson commented, why not plant trees of any kind. Mr. Mansmith stated he is a member of the Minnesota Christmas Tree Growers Association. He also said the reason he did not appeal the classification change last year was due to a family situation. He stated he planted his first tree in 1966. He has a choose and cut tree farm, that includes a recreational area, parking, nature trails, wetlands, etc. and these are all part of the experience of a choose and cut tree farm. People would not like to drive further. Commissioner Kriesel said they appreciate the value of what Mr. Mansmith is doing, but the decision is in the statutes. Commissioner Hegberg said that Mr. Mansmith has trees in back of his house and has transplanted trees from the yard where his house is. Commissioner Kriesel said they are not trying to diminish the value of what he does, but they need to be clear and operate within statute. Commissioner Peterson suggested that Mr. Mansmith find two more acres to qualify. Commissioner Pulkrabek said his concern would be if someone had ten acres and used one acre saying it was intensely used.

CASE #9 – City of Stillwater – (Parcel 21.030.20.43.0003 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$497,100) Appearance by Mr. John Donovan at 2:35 p.m. Mr. Donovan passed out information to the Commissioners. He stated he owns an old house on the North Hill in the City of Stillwater. He feels the value that the assessor has on his property is not acceptable. \$50,000 had to be spent on replacing a retaining wall. He presented a spreadsheet with three comparable sales in the neighborhood, and he referred to his/their values in relation to the assessor's EMV. Commissioner Peterson commented that the assessor's value is 95 to 100% of EMV. Commissioner Pulkrabek commented that Mr. Donovan

paid \$517, 000 for the parcel in 2003, and questioned why he is now saying it is not worth the current value of \$497,000. Mr. Donovan responded that he bought in a peak market, he overpaid - the market is different now. Commissioner Kriesel asked if Mr. Donovan feels his house is comparable to one across the street. Mr. Donovan said it has not sold, and he referred to another that sold for \$440,000. Commissioner Peterson stated what he paid for the property in 2003 and the fact it has been reduced - is it factored in when someone overpays? The assessor commented that at the time the CRV was reviewed the terms of the sale checked out. Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke commented that one sale does not establish the sales ratio. Commissioner Kriesel said he would like to see more comparables. Mr. Donovan asked to have the decision on his appeal put on hold until the sale of a comparable house is finalized. Commissioner Peterson said that could not be done. Commissioner Kriesel commented that a decision on Mr. Donovan's appeal will be made at the June 19th Meeting, and Commissioner Pulkrabek commented that has been the process past years. The assessor's preliminary recommendation is for no change or increase the value to the 2003 sale price.

CASE #11- City of Oakdale - (Parcel 30.029.21.44.0052 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$194,300) Appearance by Manley Ellertson at 2:55 p.m. Mr. Ellertson proceeded to talk about the Tanners Lake area, that there are basically three styles of homes in the area and they all look alike. He stated he received a 4.7 % increase in his taxes but his neighbors went down. He referred to his 2006 payable EMV of \$192,400, and his 2005 payable 2006 value of \$174,000 (that was his limited market value - EMV was \$183,400). He said he had a partially finished basement, so his value should be lower or his neighbor's value should be higher. Commissioner Pulkrabek commented that his value has only gone up a few thousand, and asked if he checked comparables? Mr. Ellertson said some were higher, and some lower. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if he had submitted information to the assessment staff. Mr. Ellertson said he got his information off the County web site, and he will give it to the assessor. County Assessor Bruce Munneke said this is a fairly homogenous neighborhood, and they have access to building permits. Commissioner Peterson commented that what Mr. Ellertson wants is equity. County Assessor Bruce Munneke commented that it appears taxable value is being compared to market value. Commissioner Kriesel commented that there are hardly any houses in Washington County valued under \$200,000. Mr. Ellertson stated that he knew of two that sold for \$180,000. The assessor's preliminary recommendation is that the value of \$194,300 is at fair market value.

Walk In #1 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 10.032.21.22.0005 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$128,000) Appearance by Richard McNamara. Mr. McNamara stated this is a small lot on Forest Lake, approximately 50 x 60, and it is used for walking to the lake, it is steep, and a boat cannot be docked there. Because it is steep and only used to get to the lake, it is not marketable, and no one will buy it. Both appraisers Catherine Arth and Jeff Satzinger looked at the lot. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked what the lot is used for now. Mr. McNamara said he has only walked it once in years, and didn't know there were steps. He bought it 30 years ago from a Mrs. Johnson. Commissioner Hegberg said it is wooded, there is an 85% incline and he wants it looked at again. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked how it

went from \$4,600 to \$128,000. County Assessor Bruce Munneke said that it would be looked at again based on Mr. McNamara's appearance.

At 3:10 p.m. Commissioner Kriesel asked if there were any more cases to be heard. Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke recommended that the Board recess until next Tuesday, June 19th. Commissioner Peterson made the motion, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. All Board Members were in favor, and the motion carried.

WASHINGTON COUNTY 2007 COUNTY BOARD OF APPEAL AND EQUALIZATION 2ND MEETING JUNE 19, 2007

Commissioner Kriesel called the 2nd meeting of the Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization to order at 9:00 a.m. The following members were present: Commissioner/Chairperson Gary Kriesel; Commissioners Dennis Hegberg, Greg Orth, Myra Peterson, Bill Pulkrabek, and Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer.

The assessment staff present today are: County Assessor Bruce Munneke, Assessment Technical Support Supervisor/Recording Secretary for today's meeting Sylvia Schreifels, Deputy County Assessor Rollie Huber, Residential Supervisors Al LaBine and Don Lovstad, Commercial Appraiser Ann Miller. Also in attendance are County Administrator James Schug, and Property Records/Taxpayer Services Director Kevin Corbid.

If a property owner cancelled their appeal or did not appear for their appointment at last week's County Board of Equalization Meeting, their case is considered closed. Regarding active appeals, all additional information presented to the assessor since the last meeting was reviewed by the assessor before he made his recommendations.

At this time, County Assessor Bruce Munneke asked the Board to act on the Maintenance Changes made by the appraisal staff at the Open Book Meetings. These changes are being presented on the spreadsheets required by the Department of Revenue. Commissioner Bill Pulkrabek made the motion to approve the changes, Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion, and it carried.

County Assessor Bruce Munneke asked the Board to vote on the next group which is the County Board Changes. These are changes in Local Board areas, but the property owners did not receive Amended Notices ten days prior to their meeting. Also some changes are due to a change in a neighborhood that carried over to other properties in the neighborhood. Commissioner Kreisel asked for a motion.

Commissioner Orth made the motion, and Commissioner Hegberg seconded. The motion carried to approve the changes.

Persons appealing their properties were reminded that any changes made today are for assessment year 2007 taxes payable in 2008. If they do not agree with the Board's decision, their next step is Minnesota Tax Court, and they need to apply for Tax Court by April 30th in the year taxes would be due.

CASE #1 - City of St. Paul Park - (Parcel 07.027.21.31.0089 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$209,500) The parcel is a single family residential home owned by Celestine and Lorrai Mischke. The appraisal staff made minor corrections to property data and performed a sales comparison analysis. The assessor's recommendation is that the value of this property be reduced from \$209,500 to \$195,000. Commissioner Gary Kreisel made the motion to approve the assessor's recommendation, it was seconded and carried.

CASE #2 - City of Birchwood - (Parcel 30.030.21.42.0030 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$358,900) The subject property is a single family residential home owned by Diane Wingfield. Consideration was given to the market analysis given to the Board. Adjustments were made for differences between the subject property and comparable sales. The assessor's recommendation is to reduce the value from \$358,900 to \$343,000. Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke stated that the original recommendation was for \$338,200, and she feels it is a problem to raise it from that value, so she is recommending the value stay at \$338,200. A motion was made to keep the value at \$338,200 by Ms. O'Rourke. Commissioner Peterson seconded, and the motion carried.

CASE #3 – City of Newport – (Parcels 36.028.22.24.0008, 36.028.22.24.0011, 36.028.22.24.0007, and 36.028.22.21.0066) The subject parcels are four 4-unit apartments. Deputy County Assessor Rollie Huber stated that staff inspected the parcels and recommended a reduction from \$444,600 to \$407,600. Commissioner Gary Kriesel asked for a motion, the motion was made to approve the staff recommendation, Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

CASE #4 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 08.032.21.32.0061 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$851,800/8-unit apartment) (Parcel 08.032.21.32.0074 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$1,045,200/10-unit apartment) (Parcel 16.032.21.24.0002 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$866,000/8-unit apartment) Mr. Kaeding provided the appraisal staff with two appraisals last week, and a recommendation has been written up now based on their analysis. Discussion followed regarding the value differences between 8-unit versus 10-unit apartments, and Commissioner Hegberg asked staff for information on other apartments in Forest Lake. Commissioner Gary Kriesel stated he had a concern about information being used by just going to the web and pulling sales – an appraisal is more detailed. A motion was made to approve the staff recommendation and the motion prevailed. The values of

parcels 08.032.21.32.0061 and 08.032.21.32.0074 were unchanged. Parcel 16.032.21.24.0002 was reduced from \$866,000 to \$854,600.

CASE #5 City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 24.032.21.22.0002 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$651,500) The subject property is a single family residential parcel owned by Beatrice and James Meyer. Assessor staff reviewed the property again following the June 12th meeting, and further research was done of other active listings. The County Board has been provided with comparable sales that support the value placed on the subject property, and it is felt the property is valued within an acceptable range for comparable properties. No change is recommended. Commissioner Gary Kriesel asked for a motion, the motion was made and seconded – the motion carried for no change to the value.

CASE #6 – City of Bayport – (Parcel 10.029.20.11.0061 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$201,100) The subject property is a single family residential parcel owned by Wayne Ristow. Mr. Ristow was scheduled to appear at the County Board Meeting on June 12th. He did not appear. The assessor's recommendation is for no change. Commissioner Kriesel made the motion for no change. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

CASE #7- City of Forest Lake- (Parcel 16.032.21.21.0051 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$259,200) The subject property is a single family residential parcel owned by Luerna Sawyer. The assessor could find no market evidence to indicate a change. The assessor's recommendation is that the value remain at \$259,200. Commissioner Bill Pulkrabek made the motion to support the assessor's recommendation. Commissioner Greg Orth seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

CASE #8 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 10.032.21.42.0009 and Parcel 10.032.21.42.0010) The subject parcels are a single family residential parcel and an adjacent vacant lot. The combined values of these two parcels were reduced at the Forest Lake Local Board of Review from \$574,100 to \$496,400. The owner, Kevin Kealy was scheduled to appear at the County Board of Equalization on June 12, 2007. He did not appear. The recommendation of the assessor is for no further change. Commissioner Pulkrabek moved for no change, it was seconded and carried.

CASE #9 - City of Stillwater - (Parcel 21.030.20.43.0003 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$497,100) - The subject property is a single family residential parcel owned by John and Alicia Donovan. The assessor reviewed the appraisal provided by Mr. Donovan and felt sales used in the report were reasonable. The assessor's recommendation is that the value be reduced from \$497,100 to \$490,000. Commissioner Gary Kriesel moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, Commissioner Peterson seconded, no further discussion, the motion carried.

CASE #10 - Baytown Township - (Vacant Lots in Bay Lake Reserve) The subject parcels are vacant single family residential lots in Bay Lake Reserve. The owner, Norman Dupre, withdrew his request to appear at the June 12, 2007 County Board of Equalization. No change is recommended.

CASE #11 - City of Oakdale - (Parcel 30.029.21.44.0052 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$194,300) The subject property is a single family residential parcel owned by Manley and Aemilia Ellertson. The property owners' concerns are with what they consider inequities in the valuation of similar properties. The recommendation of the assessor is for no change based on a sales analysis report. Commissioner Peterson asked that this report be shared. Auditor Treasurer/Deputy Administrator Molly O'Rourke commented that there is a difference between the taxable market value and the estimated market value. A motion was made to approve the assessor's recommendation, it was seconded by Molly O'Rourke, and carried.

CASE #12 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 10.032.21.22.0005 Estimated Market Value for 2007 is \$128,000) The subject property is an unbuildable vacant land parcel owned by Richard McNamara. The assessor is recommending that the value be reduced from \$128,000 to \$32,000. Staff concluded that it is land locked, and has a steep incline. It would only be of benefit to an adjacent landowner. A motion was made to accept the assessor's recommendation, seconded, and carried.

CASE #13 - City Forest Lake - (Parcel 06.032.21.23.0011) The owner, Mr. Russell Mansmith, is appealing the classification of his property. He owns three parcels (06.032.21.23.0014, 06.032.21.23.0011, and 06.032.21.23.0016). For assessment years 2006 payable 2007 and 2007 payable 2008 the classification has been changed to residential and the Green Acres has been removed. The Forest Lake Local Board on April 30, 2007 approved a change of classification from residential back to agricultural. The assessor's staff is recommending that the parcel be changed back to residential. Commissioner Hegberg disagreed and passed a letter out to the Board. He stated he felt the parcel was being used for intensive agricultural use and felt under law the agricultural classification was allowed. He also felt the wetlands area should be deemed in agricultural use as well. Commissioner Hegberg made a motion to reclassify as agricultural. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked for a definition of intensive use, and where did it come from? He asked if there are court cases challenging the definition, and he referred to the letter brought in to today's meeting. Commissioner Kriesel said he feels if it is less than ten acres then it must have exclusive and intense use for agricultural. County Assessor Bruce Munneke referred to the opinion provided by our County Attorney which stated it was not intensive use. Auditor Treasurer/Deputy Administrator Molly O'Rourke commented on two statutes, and said Agricultural Preserves has different qualifications, i.e. requiring 40 acres, and it is an eight year commitment. Mr. Mansmith has fewer acres. Commissioner Kriesel commented on the social and recreational areas on the parcel – other farmers do this and it is not held against them. Commissioner Hegberg compared Mr. Mansmith's property to orchards. Commissioner Peterson inquired on the area breakdown – 12.2 acres (6.7 producing & 5.5 wet). She questioned why the balance of the land couldn't be put into some other

agricultural use to qualify. Commissioner Kriesel said he feels "intense and exclusive" are subjective descriptions, but he does not want to undermine the assessor. Commissioner Peterson commented on prior information shared about soil conditions of remaining land. Commissioner Pulkrabek said this is a tough decision, a nebulous area. Commissioner Hegberg asked for a motion. Commissioner Peterson said she had concerns regarding other cases that may come up in the county, and she encouraged Mr. Mansmith to use the balance of his land. Auditor Treasurer/Deputy Administrator Molly O'Rourke stated she is against Commissioner Hegberg's motion to keep an agricultural classification on the property. She stated it does not meet the criteria, and seems more commercial. She said it should stay residential, and Mr. Mansmith should take his case to Tax Court for experts to decide. Commissioner Kriesel asked if there should be a concern for the wetlands. Commissioner Pulkrabek said Tax Court is a last resort. Commissioner Kriesel said we do not want to open a Pandora's Box. County Assessor Bruce Munnek said we could end up classifying large gardens as agricultural. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if this was a tree farm issue, and County Assessor Bruce Munnek said it was an issue of area of land in production. Commissioner Peterson referred to a newspaper article about prairies - restoration and prairie products/plants - she feared someone with ten acres of prairies could request an agricultural classification. It was questioned why the parcel was classified as agricultural for years, and Commissioner Hegberd said that classification held up for years. County Assessor Bruce Munneke stated that it is now a county assessed municipality and there are changes. Commissioner Hegberg made a motion to keep the classification as agricultural, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion failed on a 2-3 vote with Commissioner Greg Orth abstaining. A second motion was made to approve the assessor's recommendation of classifying the property as residential. The motion passed on a 3-2 vote with Commissioner Orth abstaining.

Auditor Treasurer/Deputy Administrator Molly O'Rourke made a motion to close the final meeting of the 2007 County Board of Appeal and Equalization at 9:55 a.m. Commissioner Gary Kriesel seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

REPRESENTATIVE KARLA BIGHAM

Representative Karla Bigham, District 57A, reviewed the 2007 Legislative Session including: Construction bidding, counties will be allowed to look at timeliness of a project and quality in addition to low bid; On October 1 the smoking ban will take effect; 911 fee will be increased to pay for 800 MHz radio infrastructure; increased reimbursement of short-term offenders to \$33 a day; 10 new judges will be placed where there is a need; additional money for battered women shelters, domestic violence programs, and abused children programs; increasing penalty for burglarizing with the intent to commit theft or criminal damage of property to schools, government building, or religious buildings; e-waste bill passed which makes manufacturers responsible for that waste; \$500,000 in funds for upgrades and improvements to the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp; G.I. bill which will give additional money to the soldiers coming back, and additional money was put in for veteran's outreach and county service officers; expanded the war survivors act to help spouses and children to get educational benefits; and they also expanded the veteran's hotline.

Representative Bigham stated there were disappointments that included the veto of the transportation, bonding and tax bills. She stated her commitment to continue to make sure those are priorities for Washington County.

PUBLIC HEARING - PUBLIC WORKS/SURVEY & LAND MANAGEMENT

Comprehensive Plan/Rezoning Request by G.V. Properties, Inc.

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of today's public hearing to receive comments on the comprehensive plan/rezoning request by G.V. Properties, Inc. The Board Secretary indicated that notice of the public hearing was published and the affidavit of publication is on file.

Dennis O'Donnell, Senior Planner, presented a brief description of the property owned by G.V. Properties and the requested rezoning as outlined in his memorandum of June 13, 2007. The applicant is seeking to amend the Comprehensive Plan designation on property which is located in Baytown Township from Rural Residential to Single Family Estate. Mr. O'Donnell displayed an aerial photo of the property and surrounding area. He noted that Baytown Township and Metropolitan Council approved the proposed changes and that documentation has been submitted for the record. On May 22, 2007, the Washington County Planning Advisory Commission held a public hearing on this request and recommended approval of the Comprehensive Plan amendment and rezoning request. Those minutes are also part of the record.

Mr. O'Donnell concluded his remarks by stating that the eastern portion of Baytown Township has been changing over the past several years with areas developing at a density of 1 home per 2½ acres. Property approximately one-quarter mile to the north was recently rezoned to Single Family Estate zoning. Staff feels that this request appears to be consistent and compatible with this area of Baytown Township. Further, they do not recognize any off-site impacts as a result of this rezoning change or of the ultimate development. Staff therefore recommends approval of this request.

Commissioner Peterson asked if this area were in the well advisory zone? Mr. O'Donnell indicated it was.

Commissioner Peterson asked if this property, when it is subdivided, would be able to connect to any community sewer or water system? Mr. O'Donnell stated it would not be able to connect to community sewer. There have been developments further to the north that did connect to the Bayport water supply system, but this is a little further to the south and for just three lots would be cost prohibitive.

Commissioner Peterson stated she is concerned about adding an additional subdivision unless there is a mechanism that does provide for a community well and septic systems. She feels the county is not addressing what she believes is its responsibility to have water systems that are safe. Continuing to punch holes into the water aquifer, she feels, is poor public policy.

Mr. O'Donnell stated he understands the Commissioner's concerns. In regard to the septic the county has been allowing individual on-site septic systems and there should be adequate area in soil on these 2 ½ acre lots to provide good treatment of the sewage. The water is another issue. The Department of Health is allowing new wells to go into place as long as the Township has an ordinance that states they have to be installed properly and have the filters on them.

Commissioner Kriesel asked about the nearby mining operation, and the Planning Commission requested that potential buyers of these three lots understand that there is a mining operation so there are no complaints later. He asked how that would be addressed? Mr. O'Donnell stated that when the subdivision comes before the Plat Commission they can make note of that and have a separate agreement that would be recorded

against the property so that future owners are aware of the mining operation and hopefully will see that at the time of purchase.

Commissioner Kriesel asked if the Board denied this request, he asked Mr. O'Donnell to explain the possibility of annexation into Bayport? Mr. O'Donnell stated a petition would have to be filed with the city and it would ultimately go to the Municipal Board and they would need to find that sewer and water could be provided to the property and that it's adjoining property in Bayport which this particular piece is not. That is a concern that Baytown Township has had.

Commissioner Orth mentioned that there is no conflict with the Department of Natural Resources property to the south. How was that determined and evaluated. Mr. O'Donnell believes he stated he hopes there will be no future conflict. The DNR has mentioned to them that they have seen encroachment onto their property. That is the concern the DNR has and hopefully that will not be an issue in this case.

Commissioner Peterson asked what density would need to exist to make a water system viable. Mr. O'Donnell stated that to bring water from Bayport, he feels you would need to be in close proximity. He cannot answer the question with any great accuracy at this point.

Commissioner Peterson believes that a statement is added about the well advisory on the deed. Mr. O'Donnell stated that the county requires an affidavit to be filed against any newly recorded properties that indicate that the properties are in the well advisory area and any future owners are aware of that when the property changes hands.

Commissioner Peterson asked if there are any other potential developments close by that would make this viable for a water system? Mr. O'Donnell stated not in the near future.

Commissioner Peterson asked if active mining still goes on with blasting? Mr. O'Donnell indicated that was correct.

Dave Dupay, Emmons and Olivier Resources, indicated he is representing Bill Keefer and G.V. Properties. He feels that Mr. O'Donnell has covered everything that he would have to say. He stated he lives about the same distance south as the applicant lives west and he worked out of his house for 2 and ½ years. Once a week at noon the mining operation has a blast and about two-thirds of the time he didn't realize it was going on. He does not believe the blasting would be a problem. He feels this development would be an asset to the community by providing two additional lots drawing tax dollars with no additional infrastructure. The well advisory concerns—he feels that is handled by the Minnesota Department of Health, so whatever guidelines they have they have to follow. As far as filing affidavits against the property so there is notification of blasting or the wells, he does not see any problem with that.

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard. The Board Secretary reported that she has received all documentary evidence.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to close the public hearing on a comprehensive plan/rezoning request by G.V. Properties, Inc. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously. The public hearing closed at 9:45 a.m.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve the recommendations of the Planning Advisory Commission to amend the Comprehensive Plan and rezoning request of G.V. Properties, Inc. located in Baytown Township. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Pulkrabek, Kriesel, Orth, and Hegberg; No, Commissioner Peterson.

Commissioner Peterson stated she did not vote for the motion because of the water issue. She stated she lives in an area where water has become an issue, she has been concerned about the groundwater in Baytown Township, and she feels the county should revisit all comp plans throughout the county to address water. She feels it is foolhardy and poor public policy to continue to have individual well and septic systems in land that is very easily contaminated.

The Board Chair asked the County Attorney's office to prepare a resolution consistent with the Board's motion for the next Board meeting.

PUBLIC HEARING - PUBLIC WORKS/PARKS DIVISION

Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park Master Plan Amendment

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of today's public hearing to receive comments on the draft Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park Master Plan Amendment. The Board Secretary indicated that notice of the public hearing was published and the affidavit of publication is on file.

John Elholm, Senior Planner, presented a brief overview of the planning process to review and amend the Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park Master Plan. He indicated nine public meetings, workshops and open houses have occurred since September 2006. He displayed a map of the park and indicated where changes would occur. The draft plan was presented to the County Parks and Open Space Commission on April 19, where the Commission recommended that the plan be forwarded to the County Board with suggested changes. The amended plan was presented to the Cottage Grove City Council on May 2 and the Washington County Board of Commissioners on May 15. The only change that has been made since that time is an addition of land on the east side of the park. A landowner came forward and indicated they were interested in selling, county staff and city staff discussed this matter and have agreed that it would be a good addition for the boundary of the park.

Commissioner Kriesel asked if a dog park was associated with the plan. Mr. Elholm indicated that the Master Plan does have a discussion on the dog park. The Parks and Open Space Commission was very concerned about a dog park. They didn't feel that would be an appropriate facility for the county to be operating. He stated it falls in line with ball parks, skate parks, those types of facilities. The Park Commission did recognize that there is a group of citizens in Cottage Grove who are interested in this type of facility, so it is mentioned in the plan. The county would agree to work with the city if it is interested in providing that type of facility and is looking for a location. There are some fields that are not in the strict natural resources part of the park that could potentially be used for that.

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard. The Board Secretary reported that she has received all documentary evidence.

The public hearing was closed at 10:00 a.m.

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2007-079 as follows:

Approval of the Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park Master Plan Amendment

WHEREAS, the existing Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park Master Plan was completed over 15 years ago; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners adopted the Parks Division Vision, which calls for review of all existing park master plans; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Park and Open Space Commission reviewed the existing Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park Master Plan and recommended the plan be updated and amended; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners directed Washington County Park staff to retain a consultant and conduct a master plan review; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Park staff has completed a master plan review through a lengthy public process, which meets Metropolitan Council requirements for public input.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves the Cottage Grove Ravine Regional Park Master Plan Amendment and forwards the plan to the Metropolitan Council for review and approval.

Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Jim Schug, County Administrator, announced that with the cancellation of the July 3 Board meeting, this will be Park Director Jim Luger's last meeting before his retirement on July 6. He thanked Jim for his 21 years of service and wished him luck. The County Board also extended their best wishes.

FINANCIAL SERVICES

Kathy Aho, Springsted, Inc. presented the County Board with a plaque recognizing its achievement of a AAA rating, the highest rating given from Standard and Poor's rating agency, and AA1 rating from Moody's. She congratulated the county for its efforts.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Sarah Jaycocks, Master Gardener Coordinator, and Lyn Keller, Volunteer Master Gardner, presented a year-to-date report on work plans, progress, and next steps for the Master Gardener program. They've prepared material which identifies the 11 noxious weeds from money donated by the Valley Branch Watershed District. They have also worked with the Conservation District, Ramsey County Master Gardeners, cities, townships, community education, and schools, educating them on improving water quality and weed control.

Ann Stevenson, Regional Extension Educator with 4-H Youth Development, reviewed the expanded programs at Lincoln Place in Mahtomedi through the Community Power Grant and Nutrition Education Program, and the establishment of a weekly site based program through partnership with the Lake Area Youth Service Bureau in Forest Lake. Community club youth and families assist with program planning and delivery, which gives the youth members experience on education in a structured and safe environment on a consistent basis.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Captain Steve Pott reviewed the proposed changes to the Motorola 800 MHz Radio System contract:

Congressman Oberstar is an advocate for all forms of transportation, but is very interested in high speed rail service as they have in Europe. He is the Chair of the Transportation Committee and she believes he will work with the county in securing Federal funds for all of the transportation projects whether they are road, train, bicycle or airport. Also, Congresswoman McCollum is on the Appropriation Committee and Congressman Obey from western Wisconsin is on the Transportation Committee. She felt it was a successful meeting.

Commissioner Peterson reported on the Eastern Transportation Alliance meeting held in Oakdale last evening and felt there was a good turn out for that meeting.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported on community events he attended over the past couple weeks including Summerfest in Oakdale, and the pancake breakfast for the firefighters.

Commissioner Hegberg reported he also attended the dinner meeting with Congressman Oberstar to make sure that the Rush Line Corridor was included.

Commissioner Kriesel expressed his condolences to the family of Bob Utecht who passed away recently.

EXECUTIVE (CLOSED) SESSION WITH THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE
