#### PUBLIC HEARING - HOUSING AND REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

# Request to Modify Redevelopment Area and Create a Housing TIF District in Forest Lake

The County Board Chair presented a brief overview of today's public hearing to consider a request by the Housing and Redevelopment Authority to modify an existing Redevelopment Plan Project No. 2 and to Create a New Housing Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District No. 2-2, TrailSide Senior Living in Forest Lake. The Board Secretary indicated that notice of the public hearing was published and the affidavit of publication is on the record.

Barbara Dacy, Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA) Executive Director, presented their request to use tax increment to enable the construction of an affordable senior housing development in Forest Lake. They propose to expand the project area to include the two parcels in Forest Lake, the proposed HRA senior rental building and the proposed Walker Methodist market rate building. They will use the tax increment from the Walker Methodist parcel to help pay for the debt service. The HRA proposal consists of 70 units, 35 one bedrooms, 35 two bedrooms, with an aggressive affordability range. They would like 20% of the units as low as \$400 to \$500 per month in rent, but all of the development will be below 60% AMI or about \$38,000 to \$39,000 a year for one or two person senior households. The HRA building is proposed to be architecturally integrated with the Walker building, and 10% will be designed for the disabled. The Walker facility, named the Forest Bay Lodge, will be up to 176 units and will consist of both market rate independent living and assisted living with a memory care unit as well.

Ms. Dacy stated that the project costs for the HRA building are estimated to be about \$15.2 million. They are proposing to finance with bonds about half of the project costs. They would like to use the tax increment to help pay for the B Series Bonds on the project. The bonds to be sold will be about \$8 million and will be split into two series, A Series and B Series. They are looking for the tax increment financing to help with the B Series, and then the A Series will be supported from the cash flow from the project. At the February meeting, they will also be asking the county to pledge its general obligation so they can get the lowest rate possible. They are analyzing who needs to be the issuer on the bonds. State law requires that with TIF, the county would have to be the issuer on the B Bonds, and they are trying to find a solution that they could have just one issuer on both series of bonds. The rest of the project costs will be financed by HRA funds or loans or grants.

Ms. Dacy indicated that if there is no tax increment, the project cannot proceed. They are offering very affordable rents, but they have to pay the bills to run an apartment building, so the TIF helps in the annual cash flows. She asked that the County Board continue the public hearing to February 5, 2008, at which point they would ask the Board to approve the resolution.

The Board Chair asked for comments from the County Board; none were heard.

The Board Chair asked for comments from the audience; none were heard.

Commissioner Peterson moved to continue the public hearing to consider a request by the Housing and Redevelopment Authority to modify an existing Redevelopment Plan Project No. 2 and to Create a New Housing Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-2, TrailSide Senior Living in Forest Lake to February 5, 2008. Commissioner Orth seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson reported that she attended the organizational meeting of a coalition that will be advocating for the Hastings Bridge. She reiterated that a report was written in 1989 identifying bridges that needed to be replaced in the east metro: Bridge No. 3 was the Stillwater Bridge; Bridge No. 4 was the Hastings Bridge; Bridge No. 8 was the Wakota Bridge; and No. 10, was the St. Paul Park Bridge. The Stillwater and Hastings bridges both had lower ratings than the Wakota Bridge. She felt the Wakota Bridge was built because they did have a coalition of multi-jurisdictions. The Hastings Bridge coalition is underway and she encouraged Stillwater to get its coalition up and running.

Commissioner Peterson reminded the Board of two MICA meetings coming up this month on the 16th and the 23<sup>rd</sup>. March 5 is the Transportation Alliance meeting at the legislature and encouraged all the Commissioners to attend that meeting also. She will be attending a meeting in Hastings with the Chamber of Commerce to discuss transportation. She encouraged the Commissioners to attend one of those meetings. One meeting is on January 10 at 7:30 in Hastings, another is in Lakeville on January 16, and one in St. Paul on Wednesday, January 9 at 2:00 p.m.

Commissioner Pulkrabek will be meeting with constituents tomorrow. Also, the Finance Committee will meet today after the Board Workshops.

Commissioner Orth, reported on a flood meeting he attended in Woodbury last Friday. The South Washington Watershed District discussed funding sources. On January 23 at 5:00 p.m. there will be an open house at the Government Center to address the National Flood Insurance Program, FEMA Flood Maps and insurance issues. He also noted that 3M will be holding a PFC meeting in Woodbury on Thursday night. He will not be able to attend because the Public Health Emergency Preparedness Committee will also be meeting. He asked that someone from the Public Health and Environment department attend that meeting in Woodbury. Commissioner Peterson volunteered to attend that meeting for him.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that the bus service from Forest Lake to Minneapolis started yesterday. He is happy to say that they had overflow parking.

Commissioner Kriesel reported he has been working with the Veteran's Rest Camp on their 2008 budget. He met with Mayor Zeller of Lakeland to discuss the County Road 18 project.

### **GENERAL ADMINISTRATION**

### Request by the City of Oakdale

Craig Waldron, City of Oakdale Administrator, presented their request for the county's support in the passage of special legislation to provide for 35 year tax increment financing redevelopment districts (10 year duration extensions) to reverse the trend of blight and decay that exists in the area of the Oakdale Mall and the Tanner's Lake commercial area.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to approve a letter supporting the City of Oakdale's request for special legislation to provide for 35 year tax increment financing redevelopment districts (10 year duration extensions) to reverse the trend of blight and decay that exists in the area of the Oakdale Mall and the Tanner's Lake commercial area. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

### **District 5 County Commissioner Vacancy**

Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services, presented options for the Board to consider to fill the vacancy in Commissioner District 5 caused by the death of Commissioner Greg Orth on January 12, 2008. There are two different methods by which the Board can fill the vacancy, by special election or through an appointment process. If a special election were considered the earliest date to fill the vacancy would be in 52 days and the longest would be in 90 days. The cost to conduct a special election is estimated to be \$50,000. That person would serve out the remainder of the current term, to 2010. In the appointment process, the Board would need to make the appointment at a regular or special meeting of the County Board and it must be by resolution. That individual would serve until a special election was held in November, 2008, and then that person would serve out the remainder of the current term, to 2010. No additional costs would be incurred by the county for filling this vacancy by the appointment option.

Commissioner Peterson stated that the County Board has a number of issues that it will be working on this next year. She believes it would be important that there is active representation from the Woodbury area.

Jim Schug, County Administrator, reported that he did have an opportunity last week to talk to the City Administrator of Woodbury. The City Council and Mayor met in workshop on an informal basis following

Commissioner Orth's death. They couldn't take formal action, but they did express a strong preference for the appointment process. They were concerned about the timing of a special election and want to have the city represented as fully and as soon as possible.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he spoke to Woodbury Mayor Hargis and he also indicated yesterday they had a meeting and they felt the same way. They would like to have somebody represent them that could hit the ground running. The name of former Commissioner Stafford came up because of his background and experience. They felt that would be acceptable to them.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if the Board went with the appointment process, other than soliciting the opinion of the City of Woodbury, what would be the process for other individuals who may want to be considered. Mr. Schug stated the new law is silent on the process. It would be up to the County Board to decide if it wanted to seek persons who might be interested to go through some sort of a screening process.

Commissioner Peterson stated she is leaning toward an appointment process, but she wants to make sure that whoever they appoint would not be a candidate in the fall. She feels it is important to appoint someone who can come in and participate and represent the City of Woodbury. She thinks it's important that the Board does not give someone a leg up in the fall election.

Commissioner Kriesel agreed with those comments. He has had conversations with Mr. Stafford during the last few days and he indicated that he would be interested in the appointment and his intention would be not to run. He is leaning toward the appointment process.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he agrees with Commissioner Kriesel. He is not a fan of a special election because it is expensive, it would be highly partisan and because of the low voter turnout, he does not feel that would be representative of the Woodbury residents. If they appoint, that person would only serve until the end of the year and it would give whoever is interested in possibly running time to gear up on their campaign. He recommended that the Board solicit the opinion formally of the City of Woodbury as far as who they would like to see, but also have some kind of timeframe to allow others who might be interested an opportunity to apply for the appointment.

Mr. Schug stated that former Commissioner Stafford has indicated his intent not to run. The county cannot make that a condition or control it through any type of an agreement.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve the appointment process; that the date for appointment be February 5, 2008; and that individuals who may be interested in appointment submit a letter of intent and their resume to the Office of Administration by the end of the day on Tuesday, January 29, 2008. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Peterson asked that if individuals are interested in applying to be appointed what would they fill out and how would that process work. Will the Board review the applications on the 5<sup>th</sup> or come in on the 29<sup>th</sup> of January and look at the applications. She feels this is fairly nebulous and that it should be tightened up a little bit.

It was the consensus of the County Board that they would hold televised interviews prior to the County Board meeting on February 5, 2008 of applicants who have submitted a statement of interest and resume to the Washington County Office of Administration by January 29, 2008.

Mr. Schug noted that a press release would be prepared and that a notice would be placed on the county web site stating the intent to appoint and that interested persons should submit a statement of interest and resume to the Office of Administration by January 29, 2008.

### **COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS**

Commissioner Peterson asked that Mark Furman be invited to speak on the Central Corridor at a future Regional Railroad Authority meeting. She also attended the Metropolitan Transit Development Board. They are scheduling tours to visit out state Minnesota county projects. She asked that Commissioners try to attend one of these trips. At the AMC Board of Director's meeting she attended last Friday, she asked if other counties sold ads in their newsletters. No one at that meeting did. She asked the Commissioners to keep March 5 open for Transportation Day at the Capital. She distributed a list of State entities that have county representation.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated it has been established that the City of Oakdale runs ads in their newsletter. He received in the mail last week a School District 622 community education newsletter and there were several ads in that. He got his driver's license renewal in the mail from the State of Minnesota and there were three advertisements in that envelops. He reminded the public that caucuses are coming up on February 5 and encouraged everyone to attend.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the HRA meeting he attended last week. Their budget is doing well because vacancies are down. They are putting a lot of emphasis on screening occupants.

The County Board interviewed Gabriel E. Berntson and R.H. "Dick" Stafford for the Commissioner District 5 vacancy caused by the death of Commissioner Greg Orth.

### GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

### Resolution Appointing a Commissioner to Fill the District 5 Vacancy

Commissioner Kriesel moved to adopt Resolution No. 2008-014 as follows:

Resolution Appointing R. H. "Dick" Stafford as Washington County Commissioner for the Fifth District

WHEREAS, on January 12, 2008, a vacancy was created on the Washington County Board of Commissioners by the passing of Commissioner Greg Orth; and

WHEREAS, Commissioner Orth represented Washington County's Fifth Commissioner District; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statute §375.101 provides for the vacancy to be filled either through a special election or through appointment; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissions feels it vital that District 5 have representation on the Board as soon as law allows; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Statute §375.101 subd. 4 authorizes the County Board to fill the vacancy by appointment through resolution at a regular or special meeting of the County Board; and

WHEREAS, the person appointed to the vacancy would only serve in the appointed position until the qualification of the successor elected at a special election held in conjunction with the County's November 4, 2008 general election; and

WHEREAS, because the Board of County Commissioners has determined that filling the vacancy by appointment will serve the best interests of the residents of District 5; and

WHEREAS, filling the vacancy through the Statute's special election option will prove costly and time consuming, delaying the representation of District 5 residents; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners has solicited applicants for the position; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners has studied the applications submitted and interviewed the applicants for the vacancy.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that pursuant to Minnesota Statue Section 375.101 subd. 4, the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby appoints R.H. "Dick" Stafford Washington County Commissioner for District 5 to serve until the qualification of the successor elected at a special election which will be held in conjunction with the County's November 4, 2008 general election.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

### Administer the Oath of Office to the Newly Appointed Commissioner

The Honorable Judge Greg Galler, Judicial Court Judge, administered the Oath of Office to R.H. "Dick" Stafford.

Commissioner Stafford was seated as a member of the Washington County Board of Commissioners.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to approve the assessment year 2007 payable year 2008 assessment classification and valuation change list as presented. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

### HOUSING AND REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY - CONTINUED PUBLIC HEARING FROM JANUARY 8, 2008

### Request to Modify Redevelopment Area and Create a Housing TIF District in Forest Lake

The County Board Chair indicated that today's public hearing was continued from January 8, 2008, and is being held to consider a request by the Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA) to modify an existing Redevelopment Plan Project No. 2 and to Create a New Housing Tax Increment Financing (TIF) District No. 2-2, TrailSide Senior Living in Forest Lake.

Barbara Dacy, Housing and Redevelopment Authority Executive Director, reviewed their request. She explained that if the Board adopted the resolution today, that would 1) expand the geographic area, or add two parcels in the project area in the county and establish a scattered site program for affordable senior housing; and, 2) the Board would be overlaying a housing tax increment district over the two parcels. The Housing Authority would use the tax increment to help with the expenses of the affordable housing development they are proposing to construct. Ms. Dacy stated that the public hearing was continued to this date to allow the Washington County Planning Commission to complete its review. The County Planning Advisory Commission met on January 22, 2008 and passed a resolution that verified that they feel that the expansion of the geographic area into Forest Lake is consistent with the County's Comprehensive Plan. The City of Forest Lake has the adopted the resolutions required by statute to authorize the HRA to undertake this project.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

Commissioner Hegberg informed the Board that because he works for Frandsen Bank and Trust who has a financial interest in the loan underlying this project, he will abstain from any motion.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2008-015** as follows:

A Resolution Modifying the Redevelopment Plan for Redevelopment Project No. 2, the Tax Increment Financing Plan for Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-1, Creating Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-2 and Adopting a Tax Increment Financing Plan Relating Thereto.

BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Commissioners (the "Board") of the County of Washington, Minnesota (the "County"), as follows:

Section 1. Recitals.

1.01. It has been proposed and approved by the Housing and Redevelopment Authority in and for the County of Washington (the "Authority") that the Board approve the modifications to the Redevelopment Plan for Redevelopment Project No. 2 (the "Project

Area") to reflect increased geographic area, increased project costs and increased bonding authority, pursuant to and in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Sections 469.001 to 469.047 and Laws of Minnesota 1974 chapter 475, inclusive, as amended and supplemented from time to time.

- 1.02. It has been proposed and approved by the Authority that the Board approve the modifications to the Tax Increment Financing Plan (the "Existing Plan") for Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-1 (the "Existing District") to reflect increased geographic area, increased project costs and increased bonding authority within the Project Area, pursuant to and in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Sections 469.174 to 469.1799, 469.001 to 469.047 and Laws of Minnesota 1974 chapter 475, inclusive, as amended and supplemented from time to time.
- 1.03. It has been further proposed and approved by the Authority that the Board approve the creation of Tax Increment Financing District No. 2-2 (the "Proposed District") within the Project Area and approve and adopt a Tax Increment Financing Plan (the "Proposed Plan") relating thereto pursuant to and in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Sections 469.174 to 469.1799, 469.001 to 469.047 and Laws of Minnesota 1974 chapter 475, inclusive, as amended and supplemented from time to time.
- 1.04. The Authority has caused to be prepared, and this Board has investigated the facts with respect thereto, a modified Redevelopment Plan for the Project Area, a modified Existing Plan for the Existing District and a Proposed Plan for the Proposed District, defining more precisely the property to be included, the public costs to be incurred and other matters relating thereto.
- 1.05. The Authority and the Board have performed all actions required by law to be performed prior to the approval and adoption of the modified Redevelopment Plan, modified Existing Plan and Proposed Plan.
- 1.06. The Board hereby determines that it is necessary and in the best interests of the County and the Authority at this time to approve and adopt the modified Redevelopment Plan for the Project Area, the modified Existing Plan for the Existing District, to create the Proposed District and to approve and adopt the Proposed Plan relating thereto.

### Section 2. General Findings.

- 2.01. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the assistance to be provided through the adoption and implementation of the modified Redevelopment Plan, modified Existing Plan and Proposed Plan (collectively the "Plans") are necessary to assure the development and redevelopment of the Project Area.
- 2.02. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Plans conform to the general plan for the development and redevelopment of the County as a whole in that they are consistent with the County's comprehensive plan.
- 2.03. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Plans afford maximum opportunity consistent with the sound needs of the County as a whole for the development and redevelopment of the Project Area by private enterprise.
- 2.04. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the modification, approval and adoption of the Plans is intended and, in the judgment of this Board, its effect will be to promote the purposes and objectives specified in this Section 2 and otherwise promote certain public purposes and accomplish certain objectives as specified in the Plans.
- 2.05. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the County made the above findings stated in this Section 2 and has set forth the reasons and supporting facts for each determination in the Plans and Exhibit A to this Resolution.

- Section 3. Specific Findings for the Proposed District.
- 3.01. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Proposed District constitutes a "tax increment financing district" as defined in Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subd. 9. The Proposed District also constitutes a "housing district" as defined in Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subd. 11, and further constitutes a "qualified housing district" as defined in Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subd. 29.
- 3.02. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the proposed development or redevelopment in the Proposed District, in the opinion of this Board, would not reasonably be expected to occur solely through private investment within the reasonably foreseeable future and, therefore, the use of tax increment financing is deemed necessary.
- 3.03. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Forest Lake Economic Development Authority has determined that there is a need for the Authority to proceed with the redevelopment of the TrailSide Senior Living housing project and has forwarded its recommendation to the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Forest Lake (the "City").
- 3.04. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the Council of the City has conducted a public hearing on the need for the redevelopment of the TrailSide Senior Living housing project and the Council has authorized the Authority to proceed with said redevelopment.
- 3.05. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the expenditure of tax increment within the Proposed District primarily serves a public purpose.
- 3.06. The Board hereby finds, determines and declares that the County made the above findings stated in this Section 2 and has set forth the reasons and supporting facts for each determination in the Plans and Exhibit B to this Resolution.
- Section 4. Approvals and Adoptions.
- 4.01. The modifications to the Redevelopment reflecting increased geographic area, increased project costs and increased bonding authority within the Project Area are hereby approved by the Board of the County.
- 4.02. The modifications to the Existing Proposed Plan reflecting increased geographic area, increased project costs and increased bonding authority within the Project Area are hereby approved by the Board of the County.
- 4.03. The creation of the Proposed District within the Project Area and the adoption of the Proposed Plan relating thereto are hereby approved by the Board of the County.
- Section 5. Filing of Plans.
- 5.01. Upon approval and adoption of the Plans, the Board shall request the Authority to cause said Plans to be filed with Washington County, the Minnesota Department of Revenue and the Office of the State Auditor.
- 4.02. The County Auditor is requested to certify the original net tax capacity and the original local tax rate of the Proposed District, as described in the TIF Plan, and to certify in each year thereafter the amount by which the original net tax capacity of the Proposed District has increased or decreased. The Authority is authorized and directed to forthwith transmit this request to the County Auditor in such form and content as the County Auditor may specify, together with a list of all properties within the Proposed District for which building permits have been issued during the 18 months immediately preceding the adoption of this resolution.

#### EXHIBIT A - GENERAL FINDINGS

The reasons and facts supporting the findings for the Plans for the Project Area, Existing District and Proposed District pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.175, Subdivision 3, are as follows:

1. Finding that the assistance to be provided through the adoption and implementation of the Plans is necessary to assure the development and redevelopment of the Project Area.

The tax increment assistance resulting from the implementation of the Plans is necessary for the proposed project to proceed. Please refer to Exhibit III-D of the Proposed Plan.

2. Finding that the Plans conform to the general plan for the development of the City as a whole in that they are consistent with the County's comprehensive plan.

The City of Forest Lake and the Forest Lake Economic Development Authority have both approved the development plans for the housing project and through the adoption of their respective resolutions on November 26, 2007 have found the Plans to be consistent with the City's comprehensive plan. In addition, the County's Planning Advisory Commission adopted a resolution on January 22, 2008 determining that the modifications to the County's Redevelopment Plan, including modification of the Existing District and creation of the Proposed District, are consistent with the County's comprehensive plan. Further, the Board has reviewed the Plans and has also determined that they are consistent with the County's comprehensive plan.

3. Finding that the Plans afford maximum opportunity, consistent with the sound needs of the County as a whole, for the development and redevelopment of the Project Area by private enterprise.

Please refer to the attached Exhibit B for specific information relating to the Proposed District.

4. Finding that the approval and adoption of the Plans is intended and, in the judgment of the Board, its effect will be to promote the public purposes and accomplish the objectives specified in the Plans.

The tax increment that will be generated due to the approval and adoption of the Plans will assist in financing the public improvements and eligible expenses as detailed in the Plans.

### EXHIBIT B - SPECIFIC FINDINGS FOR PROPOSED DISTRICT

1. Finding that the Proposed TIF District is a "housing district" and further is a "qualified housing district" as defined in Minnesota Statutes.

The Proposed District will consist of 246 units of senior housing. As required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subdivision 11, 70 of these units will be available for households with incomes less than 60% of the area median income ("AMI"). Of these 70 units, 14 are prepared to be available to households at 30% AMI, 46 units at 50% AMI and the remaining 10 units at 60% AMI, which initially qualifies the Proposed District as a housing tax increment district.

Further, the Proposed District also meets the criteria for a qualified housing tax increment district. As required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.174, Subdivision 29 the property within the Proposed District receiving tax increment assistance meets the rent restriction requirements and the low-income occupancy test for a qualified low-income housing project under section 42(g) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended through December 31, 2002. Further, the Proposed District meets the following:

- (a) income limitations required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.1761, subdivision 1(1),
- (b) square footage limitations for non residential uses required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.1761, subdivision 1(2),
- (c) income requirements for qualified residential rental projects under section 142(d) of the Internal Revenue Code and required by Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.1761, subdivision 3. This subdivision 3 requires that a housing tax increment district composed of residential rental property must satisfy the income requirements initially and prospectively, that is, for the district's duration.

Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.1761, subdivision 4, failure of the Proposed District to comply with the above requirements is subject Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.1771 (violations).

2. Finding that the proposed development or redevelopment, in the opinion of the Board, would not occur solely through private investment within the reasonably foreseeable future and, therefore, the use of tax increment financing is deemed necessary.

Redevelopment activities within the Proposed District include construction of approximately 70 units of affordable senior rental housing and 176 units of market rate rental housing commencing in 2008 and concluding in 2010.

County staff has reviewed the estimated redevelopment costs and the available methods of financing and has determined that tax increment assistance is necessary to make the redevelopment project economically feasible and to allow the project to proceed at this time.

3. Finding that expenditure of tax increment serves a primarily public purpose.

The expenditure of tax increment is not intended as a private benefit and any such benefit is incidental. Public benefits resulting from the proposed project include (i) an increase in the State, County and City tax bases of over \$22,000,000; the creation of 70 units of affordable senior rental housing; and (iii) the development of property which is not now in its highest or best use.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Pulkrabek, Stafford, and Kriesel; Commissioner Hegberg abstained; and Commissioner Peterson absent.

### EAGLE SCOUT RESOLUTION FOR COLIN GOULETTE OF BAYPORT

Colin Goulette was present to receive the following resolution.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2008-016** as follows:

Resolution Honoring Colin Goulette, Bayport, Minnesota, Upon Achieving the Rank of Eagle Scout

WHEREAS, the Boy Scouts of America was established on February 8, 1910, to provide an educational program for boys and young adults to build character, to train in the responsibilities of citizenship, and to develop personal fitness; and

WHEREAS, the Boy Scouts of America help its members develop into American citizens who have a high degree of self-reliance with personal qualities of initiative, courage, and resourcefulness; gain the desire and skills to help others in need of assistance; understand the principles of American social, economic, and governmental systems; and gain skills for participation and leadership in American society; and

WHEREAS, the rank of Eagle Scout is the highest one achievable by Scouts and is the pinnacle of achievement of established requirements in the areas of leadership, service, and outdoor skills; and

WHEREAS, only four percent of all Boy Scouts earn the Eagle Scout Award that places the Scout in a select group of boys who have excelled in gaining lifelong skills for their future education, business, and service careers; and

WHEREAS, Colin Goulette of Troop 113 in Bayport, Minnesota, has been notified by the Boy Scouts of America that he has earned the Eagle Scout Award for his contributions as an active dedicated Boy Scout; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that, the Washington County Board of Commissioners heartily congratulates Colin Goulette on his accomplishment in obtaining the Boy Scouts' highest honor, the rank of Eagle Scout; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners wishes him further success as he journeys through life.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

### PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Jeff Travis, Environmental Program Manager, provided a brief overview of Minnesota's electronics recycling law and informed the public of opportunities for residents to recycle their electronics. The Department of Public Health and Environment has partnered with a group of manufacturers to collect and recycle electronic items covered under the law, free of charge, at the household hazardous waste facility (HHWC). The hours are Tuesday evenings 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the CRT facility, which is located north of the county HHWC, and Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the HHWC located in Oakdale.

### **PUBLIC WORKS**

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve a letter indicating a decision not to act on a Petition for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) for a proposed 800 MHz radio tower in the City of Afton. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

### GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

### Commissioner District 5 Committee Appointments

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to appoint Commissioner Stafford to the following committees: Metropolitan Emergency Services Board, Metropolitan Energy Policy Coalition, and the Ramsey/Washington Resource Recovery Project Board. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

### **Meeting with Ramsey County**

Mr. Schug advised the County Board of the annual meeting with Ramsey County to discuss east metropolitan issues. They are looking at scheduling this meeting for March 18, 25 or April 1. The meeting will be held at the Oak Marsh Golf Club in Oakdale. Commissioner Hegberg indicated that he would not be available on March 18 or 25.

### **Capital Investment Finance Committee**

Mr. Schug reported that last Wednesday, the House of Representatives Capital Investment Committee toured the east metro area to look at projects that have requested State bonding. That tour included the Big Marine Park in May Township and Scandia, and the Disabled Veterans Rest Camp. Commissioners Hegberg and Kriesel attended the tour, along with State Representatives Matt Dean, Bob Dettmer, and Julie Bunn.

Mr. Schug reminded the Board that there will be a legislative reception at Oak Marsh Golf Club in Oakdale this Thursday at 3:30 p.m.

### <u>COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS</u>

Commissioner Pulkrabek commented on a newspaper article regarding Local Government Aid. He feels the formula needs to be reformed or abolished. Cites like North Oaks, White Bear Lake and Stillwater get money from the State of Minnesota, but Oakdale, Woodbury, and Lake Elmo get zero money. He believes that is wrong.

Commissioner Kriesel reported on a Boom Site meeting he attended to determine who would manage that site. Public commentary indicated that the DNR should continue that management. He attended a Fly Ash public meeting in Oak-Land Junior High. He recognized the Stillwater Courier who recently received the Mills Trophy which is one of the State's top journalism awards.

Commissioner Stafford reported that he is a member of the Board of Directors of the Friends of Washington County which is the parks and open space group. He informed them that if he was appointed to the position of County Commissioner he would be resigning from active participation in that group.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the MICA meeting that was held on January 23. They discussed unfunded mandates. He attended the Minnesota Extension Committee meeting. He reminded the viewing public to attend their caucus tonight.

### **BOARD CORRESPONDENCE**

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

### **ADJOURNMENT**

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Kriesel moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Stafford and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent. The Board meeting adjourned at 10:00 a.m.

### **BOARD WORKSHOP WITH HUMAN RESOURCES**

The Board met in workshop session with the Department of Human Resources to discuss the employee self service software project. No business was transacted and the public was welcome to attend. Present for the workshop session were Commissioners Pulkrabek, Hegberg, Stafford, and Kriesel. WHEREAS, a Mn/DOT report completed by the Michael Baker Corporation identified that the bridges tacks welds are "of very poor quality", water leakage has deteriorated deck joints, bridge bearings are badly corroded or contracted, and there are mission bridge bolts and plates; and

WHEREAS, the current bridge is not scheduled for replacement until 2018 at the earliest; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of state, counties, and cities to see the replacement of the Hastings Bridge prior to 2018.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby request that the Commissioner of Transportation identify funding for the replacement of the Hastings High Bridge so that it can be completed prior to 2018.

ditches. She asked that Jeff Van Wychen, who presented a talk on Minnesota's Shrinking Government to the AMC Legislative Steering Committee, address the County Board.

Commissioner Kriesel reported that he will be going to Texas tomorrow as a Board Member of the Dear American Hero to meet with Burt Brady who meets every plane leaving for and arriving from Iraq.

Commissioner Stafford reported that he has resigned his seat on the Friends of Washington County Committee. He's been contacted by the citizens group in Afton, who he assumes is against the 800 MHz radio tower, and they want to meet with him because of his past involvement with the 800 MHz. He indicated he would meet with them, but not without the participation of Captain Pott and Commissioner Kriesel because it is his district. Next Wednesday he will be meeting with the Mayor and City Administrator of Woodbury to get up to speed on issues they may have. He noted that he has been an active member of the American Legion and they have discovered that the City of Berkley, by an 8 to 1 vote, voted to tell the Marine Corp recruiting office to leave town. This has gotten veterans' organizations all over the United Stated madder than heck. The only news agency covering this item is Fox.

Commissioner Hegberg met with the City of Hugo, Grant and White Bear Township to discuss a small section of road that connects all three municipalities. WHEREAS, the Minnesota DNR desires to have three properties included in the statutory boundary of the park; so they will have the ability to negotiate a land purchase from the owners in the future, and

WHEREAS, the three properties are located adjacent to the park or are an 'inholding' within the park, and

WHEREAS, the three property owners (Balego, Stiles, Bengston) have expressed an interest in adding their land to the statutory boundary of the park, and

WHEREAS, the Marine City Council took action on January 10, 2008 in support of adding these parcels to the statutory boundary of the park, and

WHEREAS, Washington County has received a letter from the Minnesota DNR, asking Washington County to also support of these land additions.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby supports the addition of three parcels (Balego, Stiles, Bengston) to the statutory boundary of William O'Brien State Park.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

## **Planning Advisory Commission Appointments**

Commissioner Peterson moved to appoint Terry Zoller, Stillwater, as a District 3 representative on the Planning Advisory Commission to a first term expiring December 31, 2010, and Kent Grandlienard, Baytown Township as an At Large Township representative to the Planning Advisory Commission to fill an unexpired term to December 31, 2009. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

## Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District Legislation

Randy Anhorn, Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District Administrator, stated they are seeking legislation as a Metropolitan Watershed Management Organization under Minnesota Statute 103B. Last year the Washington County Board of Commissioners supported this legislation but it required that Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District's annual budget and property tax levy be approved by the Washington and Chisago County Boards of Commissioners. Mr. Anhorn is asking that these two requests be separated—one having the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District seek its special legislation as a Metropolitan Watershed Management Organization under Minnesota Statute 103B; and, the second would be Washington County seeking legislation to approve budgets of all watershed districts in Washington County.

Commissioner Stafford stated that what has prompted the County Board to ask for budgeting oversight in the past was that watersheds are unique, they are appointed but have taxation power. The Board feels there should be elected people involved in the budget process.

Commissioner Peterson stated it is this Board's belief that if the watershed districts in Washington County were consolidated, and reduce administrative costs, resources could be put into projects rather than administration. She will continue to articulate that desire for one watershed district in the county. She applauds Carver and Scott counties because they are the watershed district for their counties and have significantly less administrative costs and they are able to do better projects.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he is in favor of keeping the legislation as is because this is the only watershed district in the metro area that goes into a rural county. He does not feel this will set any precedent. He feels that this legislation should not include all the watershed districts because the county has not had open discussions with them. When Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed came to the county asking for its support then the issue was raised. He does not feel it would be appropriate at this time to include all the watersheds without open discussion with them. He believes this could be a pilot project to see how it would work.

Mr. Anhorn stated his concern is that the Board of Water and Soil Resources would be opposed to linking these two actions together and muddying the waters and would potentially kill their bill. They would not be included in Minnesota Statute 103B. That is why they are requesting to separate the two. They would like to have this opportunity to put the shovel in the ground and use funds to do work.

Commissioner Peterson stated she would like them to start projects, and she would support Comfort Lake-Forest Lake becoming a metro watershed, but she would like assurances that he would be at the legislature lobbying for a pilot project where the county would have oversight over all watersheds. Mr. Anhorn stated that puts him in a tough position. As part of this process to have one county to approve and another one not participating in the process would also be problematic. He did speak with Commissioner Ben Montzka, Chisago County, and their Board is not on the same page as the Washington County Board for having their levy and budget approved.

Commissioner Hegberg moved to support the efforts of Comfort Lake – Forest Lake Watershed District in seeking legislation to amend the definition of watershed management organization in Minnesota Statutes Section 103B.205, subdivision 13 to include the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District; and, that the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District's annual budget and property tax levy, and the work plan be approved by the Washington and Chisago County Boards of Commissioners. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted 4-1 with the vote as follows: Yes, Commissioners Pulkrabek, Hegberg, Stafford, and Kriesel; No, Commissioner Peterson.

## Senate File 2666 and House File 2924 - Conveyance of Tax Forfeited Land

Commissioner Peterson moved to support the passage of Senate File 2666 and House File 2924, a request from the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District to convey two parcels of tax-forfeited land, located near the Sunrise River and abandoned Judicial Ditch 1 in the City of Forest Lake, to the watershed district. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

## Support for Legislation to Allow a Private Sale of Tax-Forfeited Land

Commissioner Hegberg moved to support Senate File 2665 and its companion House File that would allow the county to sell, by private sale, tax-forfeited land to adjacent owners for property located on Long Lake in the Cities of Mahtomedi and Dellwood, and that a drainage easement be granted to Washington County or Rice Lake Watershed District. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

## **Legislative Update**

Jim Schug, County Administrator, advised the Board that the transportation bill passed yesterday with a 5 cent increase in the gas tax, up to 3½ cents additional gas tax for debt service, increase in license tab fees for new vehicles, and the ¼ cent sales tax that would be authorized in the metropolitan area and does not require a referendum. What this means to Washington County needs to be analyzed and that information will be brought back to the Board.

Commissioner Peterson asked that a letter be sent to all of the legislators who voted for the bill and the override. She feels they were courageous to make those votes.

## COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson reported on a Transportation Advisory Board meeting which discussed a State Transportation Plan update. She will distribute that information to the Board. Some of the information it contains is: construction costs; problems with inter-regional corridors; and aging bridges and the difficulty in funding those. She asked that high speed rail be put into this plan.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported that he and Commissioner Hegberg will be attending the National Association of Counties annual conference in Washington D.C. and will not be at next week's Board meeting.

Commissioner Kriesel reported that on Wednesday he will be attending a Minnesota Air, Water, Waste conference. He will also attend a Veteran's Rest Camp meeting that same evening. During the afternoon there will be a traffic operations study at the Stillwater City Hall.

Commissioner Stafford reported on the meeting he attended with the Administrator and Mayor of Woodbury. Last Friday he met with the Sheriff's Office, Commissioner Kriesel and the County Administrator to discuss 800 MHz. He drafted a letter in response to inquiries he had on that.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the Metro Family Alliance meeting he attended yesterday. They will be requesting money from the Legislature for first time Mothers and children who are at risk. He reported on the Library Board meeting he attended last evening which discussed library hours and when the high concentration of usage is.

WHEREAS, the Marine Branch Library enriches the community by assisting county residents in their search for information, ideas, education and recreation.

NOW, THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED, that the lease between the County of Washington and the City of Marine on St. Croix be executed through the signatures of the Chairman of the Washington County Board of Commissioners and Washington County Administrator without further action of the County Board conditioned upon compliance with all lease specifications, requirements, and approval as to form by the Washington County Attorney's office.

7. Approval to accept a \$162 donation from the staff at Prosperan/Washington County Bank, Oakdale, to be used towards the Washington County Sheriff's Office K-9 Unit.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Hegberg and Pulkrabek absent.

## **COMMUNITY SERVICES**

Commissioner Stafford moved to accept a County Veteran Service Office Enhancement Grant from the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs in the amount of \$32,375; and, authorization for a two year 0.25 FTE special project position supported by the grant. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Hegberg and Pulkrabek absent.

Commissioner Stafford mentioned there are several groups being established to help veterans. He does not believe there is any coordination between them. He asked if it would be possible to find out who's doing what. Dan Papin, Community Services Director stated he will have the Veterans Service Officer Jon Larson look into that.

Commissioner Kriesel asked that the Board hold a workshop with the Veterans Service Officer, Disabled Veteran's Rest Camp and other veteran's groups to get these questions answered.

## GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

#### **Legislative Update**

<u>Tax-forfeited Land</u> – Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services stated that the bill in which parcels of tax-forfeited land that were requested to be transferred to the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District was heard in the Senate Committee last week and staff presented the Board's letter of support. He also testified on the parcel in Mahtomedi that borders Long Lake that is proposed for a private sale. The Department of Natural Resources supported both bills. Both items were moved forward to the Senate's Omnibus Land Sale bill. The House heard the bill on Monday. There is not a house author to the bill on the Mahtomedi parcel for the private sale, but Mr. Corbid believes that will be taken care of in the conference committee.

<u>Transportation</u> – Don Theisen, Public Works Director, provided a brief overview of the 2008 Transportation Bill. Estimates for Washington County for 2009 – 2018 are: \$122,728,000 with the allocation divided 60% for construction, \$73,636,800 and 40% for operation and maintenance \$49,091,200. The local option tax that was approved allows a 0.25 percent sales tax and motor vehicle excise tax of \$20. Counties need to be part of a joint powers board. Joint powers agreements need to be formed by July 1 to become effective at the start of the next quarter which would be October 1, 2008. A workshop will be scheduled in the near future for further discussion of this bill.

Bonding Bills – Mr. Schug announced that the bonding bills were introduced in both houses. Washington County had positions on four items: I-94 transitway—county asked for \$1 million, Senate included \$750,000, House, \$500,000; Red Rock Park and Ride, both bills included \$500,000; Rush Line Park and Ride, both bills included \$500,000; and the St. Paul to Chicago High Speed Rail—Senate bill had \$2 million and the House bill \$4 million. The county's request for bond funding for the Big Marine Park was not included in either bill. \$6 million was earmarked for the Metropolitan Council which is the county's other source of funding for parks.

<u>State budget shortfall</u> – Mr. Schug noted that this figure is now at \$935 million. There are no details on what impact that could have on the county. The Governor has indicated that he is looking at reducing Health and Human Service funding and spending.

## **Community Services Advisory Committee**

Commissioner Stafford moved to appoint Tom Halfpenny, Woodbury, to the Community Services Advisory Committee to a first term expiring December 31, 2010. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

**COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS** 

Commissioner Kriesel reported that he attended the Governor's conservation award program. The Resource

Recovery Project received an award for participating with St. Paul Schools for the food to waste recycling

program. The schools recycle their food waste and it is sent to hog farmers. He also attended a

transportation traffic study to look at the intersection of County Road 12 and Owens.

Commissioner Stafford is reviewing a report that was written in 2005 by the Center for Finance Research, a

part of the Taxpayers Association. This report showed that there were \$5 billion in dedicated funds in the

State of Minnesota which they called "hidden funds". These funds are attached to a fee which keep

accumulating and earning interest. Some of them get used and are very worthy, but some don't. He feels

that if the State revisited these funds they could cut 20% of them and that would take care of the shortfall for

this year.

Commissioner Peterson will be attending a meeting this evening at the All Saints Lutheran Church to

discuss water issues surrounding 3M. Tomorrow evening there is a meeting in St. Paul Park on water issues.

Tomorrow is Transportation Alliance Day at the Capitol. Woodbury will have their water quality meeting

on March 10.

BOARD CORRESPONDENCE

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

## PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

## Groundwater Plan 2008 Work Plan

Ned Gordon, Groundwater Advisory Committee Chair, stated that the County Board has for the past 16 years taken steps toward protecting the groundwater resources for generations to come. The plan shows that there needs to be a balancing act between growing communities and their need for additional municipal wells and groundwater contamination and aquifer sustainability. Comprehensive planning is needed to answer questions such as how to retain valuable recharge areas, what kind of land uses are appropriate for those areas, and what impact will a growing number of infiltration basins have on groundwater quality. More understanding is needed about the connection between surface water and groundwater. Some surface water bodies in the county are being listed as impaired waters. In many parts of the state the impact of

surface water on groundwater is not considered. Washington County recognizes and studies the essential connection between groundwater and the surface water resources.

John Freitag, Sr. Environmental Specialist, presented highlights of the 2007 work plan: Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District hosted a nitrate clinic in Scandia, over 100 participants had their well water sampled; Lower St. Croix Watershed Management Organization mapped sink holes and other related features; Rice Creek Watershed District gathered information to begin a groundwater management plan; South Washington Watershed District worked closely with member cities to assess the risk of stormwater on infiltration practices and how that affects groundwater resources; and the Valley Branch Watershed District aided in information to state agencies with the investigation of pathways through surface water from the PFC contamination issue. Other highlights include the county's abandoned well sealing cost share program which has helped seal 15 wells over the past year. The East Metro Water Resource Education Program has a growing list of 13 local funding partners that have helped with education in the county.

Mr. Freitag listed activities for the 2008 work plan: Metropolitan Council has utilized the LCMR groundwater model that was developed by Washington County to verify and calibrate a regional groundwater model they have been developing over the past year; the United States Geological Survey is conducting a synoptic groundwater study that is looking at water levels of the three metro aquifers since the 1990's; the Washington County water consortium will be hosting several workshops dedicated to incorporating water resources into the Comprehensive Plan; groundwater protection will be incorporated into the county Comprehensive plan; the Department of Public Health and Environment will work on groundwater education out reach including proper use and disposal of fertilizers and pesticides as well as educational materials directed at elementary age children; the East Metro Resource Education Program will host two metro rain garden workshops and will host a workshop that focus on native plantings for water conservation; and, funding from the Board of Water and Soil Resources challenge grant will be used to seal abandoned oil borings in Denmark Township that were drilled in the 1950's.

Mr. Freitag updated the Board on Trichloroethene contamination in Baytown and Bayport. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency continues to monitor private wells as well as the City of Bayport's municipal wells to track the level and movement of the plume. He also provided an update on Perfluorochemicals. Although the Minnesota Department of Health and the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency are the lead agencies, the role of the Public Health and Environment Department has been and will continue to be to assist with education to the public, help problem solving and facilitate discussion among state and local agencies.

Jim Kelly, Minnesota Department of Health, provided an update on the Perflurochemicals found in southern Washington County.

## GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a legislative update on the following items: Transportation funding meetings have been held with metropolitan county staff and commissioners; the Metro Transitway Development Board will be meeting again on Wednesday, March 12 at 9:30 a.m. at the League of Minnesota Cities building; a conference committee has been appointed to discuss the two bonding bills; a non-controversial tax bill was passed by both the House and Senate which contains some consistency with Federal tax law and it also allows irrevocable or revocable trusts for post-retirement health care and other post-employment benefits; there was a cut in short-term offender aid; in the human services area there was an accounting change that would move a payment from the state for mental health services and move it into the state's next fiscal year and would be delayed until July; there is a transfer of the reserve in the consolidated chemical dependency treatment fund into the general fund which takes away a reserve capacity; there will be a freeze on chemical dependency treatment rates; and, the best news in the Governor's budget is that there is no reduction in county program aid.

## **COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS**

Commissioner Peterson reported that the AMC Board of Director's meeting discussed the cutbacks of the State Court system.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported on the National Association of Counties (NACo) conference he attended last week.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the NACo Conference. A session talked about a Federal law that requires counties to withhold 3% from all contractors if the contract is over \$100 million in expenditures. He feels this is just a shell game and costly to counties. He also met with Congresswoman Michele Bachmann and she has a bill that will restore some of the case management funds to the county. He also attended a session on foster care children who turn 18 and have no where to go. He will be attending an Association of Governmental Risk Pools (AGRIP) insurance conference next week and will not be at the Board meeting.

#### Finance Committee Appointment

Commissioner Peterson moved to appoint Commission Stafford as an alternate to the Finance Committee. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

## **BOARD CORRESPONDENCE**

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

EXECUTIVE SESSION WITH THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Peterson moved to go into Executive Session for an attorney-client discussion on proposed

CSAH 15. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; the time being

11:50 a.m. Present for the Executive Session were Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Hegberg, Stafford,

#### **PUBLIC HEARING - SHERIFF'S OFFICE**

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of today's public hearing to consider setting a \$10.00 fee for a civil process service referred to as till tap by the Sheriff's Office.

Sheriff Bill Hutton stated that the proposed fee is a fee that the Sheriff's Office has paid to the State to allow the county into their system to do research. If money is owed a business or individual they get a writ of execution, come to the Sheriff's Office, and often times they do not have the appropriate paperwork to complete the process and they are sent away. They have to go to the State of Minnesota to get this paperwork, pay the State the \$10 and then return to the Sheriff's Office with the information. What they are proposing is to allow the Sheriff's Office to collect the fee that needs to be paid to the State of Minnesota, which would allow the Sheriff's Office to do the research to find out who the owner of a business is that owes a particular individual. Once that is established, the Sheriff's Office goes to the particular business and is able to take the funds from the till to pay what is owed.

# Counties Transit Improvement Board (CTIB) and Metro Area Sales Tax and Excise Tax

The Board Chair outlined the procedures for today's hearing to receive public comment on whether Washington County should enter into a joint powers agreement with other metro counties to form the

Counties Transit Improvement Board (CTIB) and to impose a one-quarter cent sales and use tax plus a \$20 excise tax on the purchase of a motor vehicle.

Don Theisen, Public Works Director, presented an overview of Minnesota Statutes Section 297A.992 allowing the metro counties to form a joint powers agreement establishing the Counties Transit Improvement Board and authorization to impose a ¼ of 1% sales and use tax as a dedicated source for transitway funding. It also allows for an excise tax of \$20 per motor vehicle sale by an auto dealer. Membership on the CTIB will consist of two county commissioners from each member county, and the metropolitan council chair. Annual sales tax generated for Washington County is estimated at \$5,000,000 with a guaranteed return of an estimated \$1,000,000 for fiscal years 2009, 2010 and 2011. Transitways eligible for funding currently are, Red Rock, Rush Line, 35W BRT and potentially I-94 and TH 36.

Commissioner Pulkrabek indicated that 1 to 2% of all of the money that is collected from the sales tax will be used by the Department of Revenue to administer the collection of the tax. Regardless of whether this passes or not, Washington County will get over the next ten years an additional \$57 million to put into road and bridges through the transportation bill.

The following individuals commented on the proposed CTIB and Metro Area Sales Tax and Excise Tax:

Larry Flaherty, 151 Hickory Street, Mahtomedi – Mr. Flaherty stated that the Met Council is a non-elected, self-serving board. They want to take the citizen's checkbook and write checks unimpeded and it sounds like some of the Board wants to let them do it. He does not feel this is a good or fair tax.

Lynne Markus, 9175 Pine Hurst Road, Woodbury – Ms. Markus asked the Board to vote in favor of this proposal for the following reasons: long-term costs will be greater than the short-term costs; traffic is increasing; more congestion; it takes longer to drive from one place to another; and, an increase in air pollution alerts related to driving.

Joanne Gustafson, 15197 19<sup>th</sup> St. Court North, West Lakeland – Ms. Gustafson stated that her family urges the Board to support this measure. She feels that in order to persuade Fortune 500 companies to stay and encourage new investments in this global economy, it must be economical and easy for goods, services, employees, and citizens to move from place to place. She feels this is a small investment for the future.

Judy Trepka, 1487 Jewel Drive, Woodbury – Ms. Trepka urged the Board to opt in on the transportation bill passed by the legislature. The League of Women Voters urges the Board to support the new ¼ cent sales tax for transit. This would allow better access for housing, jobs and reduces vehicle pollution. She feels that Washington County is part of an entire metro community. Many work outside the county and travel to other parts of the metro area for shopping, sporting and cultural events. As the population ages it is important to have a good public transit system.

Joyce Welander, 10381 83<sup>rd</sup> Street North, Stillwater – Ms. Welander presented a letter from Fran Miron, Washington County Farm Bureau President asking the Board to vote against the tax option. (Letter on file)

Ken Heuer, 4713 Helmo Avenue North, Oakdale – Mr. Heuer stated this transportation bill does not make sense. Washington County citizens will give \$5 million in taxes and receive \$1 million back. He feels the country is in a recession. Taxes are starting to hurt the middle class people. He feels that the Met Council, Ramsey and Hennepin Counties will control this and Washington County will never see mass transit in his lifetime.

John Siekmeier, 1150 Lawn Avenue, Grant – Mr. Siekmeier stated he feels this is a time to be thinking toward the future. He asked the Board to support the investment in the transportation and infrastructure. He feels this gives alternatives and options for people to use different modes of transportation. He believes this is planning for the future and that it is Washington County's responsibility to be part of this larger metropolitan community. He urged the Board to vote in favor of this investment in the future.

Mayor Randy Kopesky, 16601 2<sup>nd</sup> Street S., Lakeland Shores – Mayor Kopesky thanked the Board for the opportunity to speak on this controversial subject. He is proud to announce that Lakeland Shores has the lowest mill rate in the Lower St. Croix Valley and they are committed to acting fiscally responsible. They do not raise taxes for issues they do not budget for. He is all in favor of improving the transit issues in Lakeland Shores and Washington County, however other issues just as important as transit are suffocating their citizens. The economy is down, people are losing their jobs and their homes. This is not the time to raise taxes. He feels there will be an opportunity to become a member of the JPA in the future, and he asked the Board to more closely examine the soon to be created Joint Powers Agreement and by-laws.

David Rooney, 840 Woodduck Drive, Woodbury – Mr. Rooney spoke in favor of Washington County's approval of ¼ of 1% metro sales tax to fund the planning, design, construction and operation of a regional transit network. He lives in Washington County, works in Dakota County and frequently is in Ramsey and Hennepin Counties for work, shopping, events or dining. He feels the metro area is interdependent and a robust transit system in Hennepin and Ramsey Counties will also benefit the rest of the counties. Time is money, reducing the freeway gridlock in the metro area will be well worth the estimated \$20 in additional tax a year. He asked if it is fair for Washington County citizens to pay this tax in other counties when spending money in other counties, but Washington County would not get any benefit. He does not think so. If the county does not participate in the development of this regional transit plan, it will be left out of any benefit, but the citizens will still be contributing a significant share of that \$5 million of taxes through spending in other metro counties. He encouraged the Board to approve the county's participation in the metro transitway and to approve the additional ¼ of 1% sales tax.

Danielle Dennison, 2330 Overlook Court North, West Lakeland Township – Ms. Dennison asked the Board to opt out of the ¼ cent sales tax increase for the following reasons: details are murky and unclear; lack of

confidence that Washington County will receive any benefit; there is doubt as to the role and say the county will have as to how these projects continue; what is the accountability for Washington County's contribution; she feels this would be the opportunity for the county to say "no" to St. Paul; and, is the county sure of what the need and capacity for light rail will be.

Karen Fitzpatrick, 306 Juniper, Mahtomedi – Ms. Fitzpatrick sees the entire metropolitan area as one. She encouraged the Board to vote yes on this tiny increase because of the benefits it will bring over time. Citizens of Washington County need to see themselves as part of the metropolitan area, they are not living out in a rural area and are not a part of greater Minnesota. Transit systems are needed to move people around. She feels that most people in this room spend time in several counties of the metro area. She feels the transportation infrastructure is pathetic and doesn't measure up even to smaller communities such as Omaha. Congestion is getting worse. She encouraged the Board to vote yes because the county needs to be at the table and be part of the planning and not be sitting on the sidelines.

Richard McNamara, 22855 Hayward, Forest Lake – Mr. McNamara stated he does not want any more taxes. He encouraged the Board to vote no. He feels the state numbers are fuzzy and he does not know why this county would want to join a group that's going to take the bulk of the money out of this county. They will become noncompetitive with the high taxes that are in Minnesota, and Wisconsin is going to reap the benefits. He encouraged the Board to vote no.

Andy Stockholm, 5500 Obrien Avenue, Oak Park Heights – Mr. Stockholm stated what he is looking for out of his county government is people that are looking out for county needs. He does not think this is in the best interest of Washington County residents and gave the following reasons: none of the Tier 1 projects are in Washington County; the costs of the Tier 1 and high priority projects are well over \$1 billion and the tax is projected to generate \$100 million of revenue a year—he asked how long will it be before any of those monies come back to Washington County, it is not a priority; he does not feel that the county's 7 votes out of 100 is having a seat at the table; Tier 2 projects include Carver County and they voted 5-0 to not join at this time; once the county opts into this deal it commits to the bonds and they cannot get back out; and none of the long-term bonds will benefit Washington County. He urged the Board to opt out at this time.

Reuben Larson, 8292 Deer Pond Trail, Lake Elmo – Mr. Larson stated he has had experience with the Metropolitan Council and he doesn't trust them. They are an unelected body and asked would they in fact serve the county's best interest. He feels all the money and projects will go to Minneapolis. There are no transit lines that go where he travels. He has made a determination not to buy in Hennepin County because of higher taxes. If the Board votes no, he will continue to buy in Washington County.

Harry Melander, 716 Park Avenue, Mahtomedi – Mr. Melander is here representing the labor community nearing 16,000 in Washington County. He is comfortable with taxes and is comfortable with what the county has done with his taxes so far. He encouraged them to move this issue forward. Life does not stop at

Century Avenue, nor does it stop at the river. Washington County has to be part of the metro transit system. He believes and trusts in the county leaders to carry the message of a metro transit system that works for Washington County.

Onno VanDemmeltraadt, 9406 Jane Road North, Lake Elmo – Mr. VanDemmeltraadt thanked the Board for allowing them to speak on this issue. He has been satisfied with the governance that this Board has done in the past and urged the Board to continue to be prudent with his money. He retired 12 years ago and has not received an increase to his pension. He did receive a 2.4% increase to Social Security, but after deducting Medicare that amounted to \$28 a month increase. With the inflation, high grocery costs, people losing their homes, and medical costs, he believes this is not the right time to add more to the sales tax for a railroad or bus route, which he never uses. He encouraged the Board to say no to this tax.

John McPherson, West Lakeland Town Board – Mr. McPherson stated he has had many calls on this situation. One call was from a person living on \$600 a month Social Security and he said "this little bit is putting him over the top". He feels this is not the time to raise taxes. People are losing their homes, people are losing their jobs. He asked the Board to wait.

The Board recessed at 6:30 p.m.

Tim Sinclair, 1411 Dellwood Road North, Stillwater – Mr. Sinclair stated that food costs are going up, gas prices are going up, including the 2 cents gas tax that went up this morning, fast food prices are going up, and his property taxes have gone up. During the last year his wages didn't go up much, if any. He cannot control all of these increases, but the County Board can control this proposed increase. He urged the Board to vote no and opt out of this joint powers agreement. He thought the constitutional amendment with the 60/40 split for transit/roads was suppose to solve a lot of problems, he hasn't seen a lot and is wondering what is going on there. Hennepin County has the Hiawatha Line, Ramsey County is going to have the University line, Dakota County has many transit stations, bus lines expressways, and Anoka County has the commuter rail. He does not see anything foreseeable for Washington County for the \$5 million it will be donating and getting \$1 million back. He does not think a bus here and there is worth \$5 million. He asked the Board not to saddle the citizens with any more taxes. He stated the Met Council is an unelected body, it's a black hole for money. He urged the Board not to approve the ½ cent increase.

Linda Lehrke, 8186 Hemingway Avenue South, Cottage Grove – Ms. Lehrke stated it appears that this meeting might be a futile exercise because her Commissioner has said that she will vote yes with no intentions to evaluate what the citizens may have to say. She feels that other than New York, light rail does not decrease congestion. She agrees with Commissioner Peterson with the idea that you can agree to disagree. There's only one difference in this whole thing, she doesn't get a vote.

David Morgan, 13780 North Manning, May Township – Mr. Morgan stated it is the job of elected officials to try to keep the growth of government under control. He urged the Board to vote no on this proposal. He feels this money will go to special interests that will have very little affect on the citizens of Washington County.

Bob Swinehart, 16377 May Avenue, Marine on St. Croix – Mr. Swinehart stated there have been a lot of good points made tonight why the Board should opt out of this proposal. No additional taxes are needed. The dollars in this program should be kept in Washington County rather than sending them off to the Met Council and getting 10 cents back on the dollar. The vast majority of the people in this county will depend on personal transportation for the foreseeable future. He feels that public transit such as the light rail system is not about reducing congestion, it's about economic development. He believes that if anything it has increased congestion for the people trying to get across because it's running at grade. Finally, if there are viable public transit opportunities that present themselves that make sense for Washington County, then he thinks they should be self-sustaining, they should not require public subsidy.

Bob Zick, 2231 Penn Place #104, North St. Paul – Mr. Zick stated good comments have been made here about the County Board giving away their strength in negotiating by entering into this agreement now and he hopes the Board listens to them. He hoped that the Board members hadn't made up their mind prior to public testimony. When government takes away the people's money they've taken away their freedom of choice. He believes that for every one person that comes and petition government because they want something, there are 100 people that are going to pay for it that oppose that, and those 100 people don't take the time to come down and petition their government. If you multiply the number of people saying no by 100, the Board members who are up for re-election, ought to think real seriously about what is going on here.

Judy Bull, 908 SE 12<sup>th</sup> Avenue, Forest Lake – Ms. Bull encouraged the Board to support the metro transit sales tax. She serves on the Forest Lake City Council and is speaking as a community leader looking toward the future of Forest Lake and the metro area. Most folks living in Forest Lake drive into Minneapolis/St. Paul daily. The numbers of cars increase daily. With the increase in gas prices and the overall increase in global warming, the need for transit options and improvements is overwhelming. She mentioned the Rush Line Corridor which is an 80 mile corridor that runs from St. Paul to Hinckley. The corridor has received federal and state funds to implement its studies and recommendations. A transit center was funded and built in Forest Lake recently and other studies are planned. The proposed transit sales tax would provide funding for this very busy corridor. In January of 2008 Metro Transit set up a commuter bus service. One hundred and fifty cars a day park in the lot and use the daily bus service. It has been very successful. The service is expensive and metro area support is needed for that. The tax increase is small, 25 cents per \$100. It is a sales tax and does not apply to food or clothing and is not an addition to the property tax. If Washington County joins now, it can help make the rules for funding allocations. She feels that Forest Lake needs transit alternatives. She urged the Board to support it.

Susan Young, 9950 1199<sup>th</sup> Street North, Forest Lake – Ms. Young stated she is a city council member from the City of Forest Lake. Economic development in Forest Lake is important. A few years ago they were building 600 to 800 dwelling units per year. In January, they had one dwelling unit that was permitted. She is not sure how building companies, contracting companies and the folks who support those services are going to be able to stay in business in Forest Lake if there is not more growth. As she talks to people who could buy houses in Forest Lake, there aren't a lot of jobs in Forest Lake paying \$25 to \$30 an hour to be able to purchase a new home. In order to have good jobs, people have to go out of Forest Lake. In order to have good jobs they are going to have to be able to afford to go out of Forest Lake. She pays \$12.50 to commute to her job in Minneapolis. She can afford to do that right now. She does not know of many people who can continue to afford to do that in the future. Finding a way to attract people to Forest Lake, to buy homes to support businesses, restaurants, and building companies in Forest Lake, is very important. Transit is going to be one small piece of that. Three hundred rides a day is one piece of that. This is a tax in discretionary spending and not on food and clothing. There needs to be some sort of commuting, car pooling or transit services to encourage people to live in Forest Lake. It will be more expensive to develop transit opportunities in the future.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked that comments be limited to one minute. There are over 30 individuals who still wish to speak.

Jim Kremer, 5475 Oakgreen Place North, Oak Park Heights – Mr. Kremer stated he has not seen one study anywhere that has shown that mass transit reduces traffic congestion. It costs \$100 million dollars a mile for a train. If mass transit is such s benefit, than those using it ought to pay for it and not the 85 cents they are paying in Forest Lake. The cost should not be shifted to those who don't use it or it does not benefit. He feels this is taxation without representation. Washington County will impose the tax, Washington County citizens will pay the tax, and Hennepin and Ramsey Counties will decide how to spend the tax. The argument that the county needs to be at the table is naive. Finally, if it is believed that the money will be returned to Washington County, people must have had blinders on in the last five years when the Hiawatha Rail was being built. The line down University Avenue will cost \$906 million. Every penny from Washington County will end up going into mass transit, will go into trains for Hennepin and Ramsey Counties. He urged the Board to vote against this.

Marjana Callery, 2510 Queensport Road, Woodbury – Ms. Callery read an article by Peter Peterson that was in Newsweek: It's entitled "You Can't Take it With You". He talks about challenges in America. "These challenges all require sacrifice. That means everyone. We fat cats will have to pay more taxes. The government will have to spend less. Everyone will have to save more. I'm not sure if we remember how to give up something for the long term general good. Nor, do we hear calls for sacrifice from our leaders. Our lawmakers are enablers either joining us in the state of denial or trying to anesthetize us. But if we can learn to face the future realistically, everyone will benefit from a more robust, sustainable economy. The greatest generation that lived through the depression of the 1930's and World War II confronted, overcame and paid

for challenges more sobering than those we face today. We can do it again. I refuse to believe that we have become so selfish and self absorbed that we don't care about our children's future and America's leadership in the world. These challenges have hung over our economy for years. Others have tried to sound the alarm. I know the odds of success are daunting. Yet, given what is at stake and what I owe this remarkable country I and we have no alternative but to try." She encouraged the Board to please vote yes on this motion.

Marc Hugunin, 10775 Kimbro Avenue Court North, Grant – Mr. Hugunin stated there are some misconceptions in some of the objections he has heard that are not entirely accurate. There was an article in the Stillwater Gazette entitled "Sales Tax Increase a Bad Deal for Washington County". The gist of the article is to say it is a bad deal because there is no guarantee as to what exactly Washington County will get in return for the \$5 million per year. He does not debate that as an assertion. Some of the arguments that have been made were about the \$1 million versus the \$4 million. But his comment is that yes, there are no guarantees as to precisely what Washington County will get, but there is one guarantee, if Washington County opts out of this opportunity it can be absolutely guaranteed that our transit services and transit system available to Washington County residents as long as most of us shall live will be lost. There will be no such opportunities if we don't opt in tonight.

Roxanne Emerson, 1107 Timber Way, Stillwater – Ms. Emerson, stated she is probably the only transit provider here this evening. She represents over 2,200 people who ride their service system, and they weren't able to come tonight because there is no transit service in the evening because there isn't transit funding at a level that can sustain or provide even a small service. She asked that the Board give great consideration to opting in on this opportunity for transit funding. Even though the seven votes seem small, a small voice is a great deal better than no voice at all. We've been under-represented, under funded. They need strong leadership like this Board to support transit service.

Jerry Beedle, 1470 Riviera Avenue South, Lakeland – Mr. Beedle stated he has been on the United Way, Workforce Council, and now he sits on the Mental Health Advisory Council. He knows how the mental health system works in St. Paul and Minneapolis, they have transportation. That is this county's biggest hang-up for all three of these categories. People at the bottom of the ladder don't have driver's license in many cases, or vehicles to get places. Right now we are supporting them with our taxes. If there were some kind of transportation system, and this would just the beginning, there would be feeder buses going into the terminals to help them get to where the jobs are. Most of the people who live out here don't work out here. What happens to the elderly, disabled veterans, people who have mental health problems, people who want to work but can't get to the jobs. There needs to be a transportation system here. He urges the Board to vote for this.

Kathy (Mannie) Lohmer, 805 Lilac Place North, Lake Elmo – Ms. (Mannie) Lohmer, stated she is the endorsed candidate for District 56A. She believes she won that endorsement because she promised the

people that she would never vote to raise taxes. She got into this race because of the \$6.6 billion transportation bill that was just passed. She does not believe everyone wearing a "No" button is against transit, but there is no plan. She urged the Board to vote no and wait until there is a plan.

Jeff Huber, 9520 Joliet Avenue North, Grant – Mr. Huber congratulated the citizens of Carver and Scott Counties for voting in commissioners who defeated this tax increase which he feels subsidizes nothing more than the construction of mass transit light rail. He feels that the population densities in Washington County do not support light rail.

Tom Carr, 9550 Joliet Avenue, Grant - Mr. Carr stated he is the Mayor of Grant. He thinks long-term planning is great. Times have changed and this process started a while ago when things were different. The Commissioners need to accept the fact that things are not the same as they use to be. Mass transit is good in some areas, but not in Washington County. He believes that Washington County has a road infrastructure that should be used and is expensive. He would rather have his money funding that than light rail.

Paul Stein, 7969 Quadrant Avenue South, Denmark Township – Mr. Stein urged the Board to make the investment in our future. He doesn't like paying taxes any more than anyone else and the times are such that those taxes hurt. However, there is a basic rule when it comes to infrastructure, if you don't make the investment now, you'll end up spending a lot more money later on. The other basic rule of investment is to diversify. Part of the way that money can be saved on roads is to have alternate means of transportation. The third rule of investment is try to leverage your investment. Mass transit investment is one that the federal government will be kicking monies in on and that's one more way to save. These are monies that if are not spent now they will be spent later on in much larger sums. We need to start thinking larger, to become part of the metro community and to become part of the world community which means thinking about ecological ramifications of the investment we make or fail to make.

Russell Hibbing, 10181 Fox Run Road, Woodbury – Mr. Hibbing stated in this proposal the first \$31 million is going to the Met Council to fund deficits in their existing rail lines. He's heard how ridership on the Hiawatha was above their expectations and they are still losing money. He thinks that sends a clear message about how this works. He believes this is only a start to what the taxes will be. This only buys the county a seat at the table. If, in 22 years after the county has sent in \$110 million to the Met Council they decided to build light rail out here, then the county will have to pay an additional 10%. He fears there will be more taxes and he urges the Board to vote no.

Paul Reinke, 7073 46<sup>th</sup> Street North, Oakdale – Mr. Reinke believes that plenty of their money goes to support regional transit initiatives as it is. As structured the act doesn't give enough say over how the collected monies are going to be spent. He believes that voting no tonight would not preclude the county from being involved in the future. He feels Washington County is an important piece of the regional puzzle

and a no vote tonight to delay and revisit at some point in the future gives plenty of opportunity to do the right things down the road.

Dean Cole, 4438 Helena Way, Oakdale – Mr. Cole stated he spent 3 ½ years in Japan and 90% of the people live in 10% of the land because it is a mountainous region, they have to have a train system. In the Midwest, that kind of system is not needed. He was disappointed when the Governor did not campaign against the transportation amendment. He was behind him when he vetoed this legislation. He is not looking for a 3-2 vote tonight, he is looking for a 5-0 vote because this tax is a regressive tax and will punish the poor and working class. If the Board wants the people that benefit from the Twin Cities and don't live here to pay for it, look to the people living in Wisconsin coming here to work everyday, they pay their property taxes, their sales taxes, and not paying our gas tax either in Wisconsin, put a toll booth on the bridge over the St. Croix.

Don Dame, 6740 Ashwood, Woodbury – Mr. Dame agrees this will probably be a 3-2 vote and nobody knows which way it will go. He would like to know the reason why Commissioner Stafford and Commissioner Hegberg are voting the way they are. If the vote does go 3-2 for the tax increase, there are elections in November. The question he would like answered is, if the Board votes for this liberal tax increase, how soon can they undo that vote?

Commissioner Hegberg stated Boards can opt out in January or anytime into the future.

Don Bahr, 7679 Teal Alcove, Woodbury – Mr. Bahr stated if this thing were to be 100% for Washington County he could see maybe going for it. He sees passionate pleas from people to say let's do this, but they are looking at the idea of Forest Lake. Washington County is a large county. When you get mass transit here, how much effect can it possibly have from the north to the south end of the county. He asked that they wait to see what the definitions are before the county joins this thing. He does not see any mass transit benefit between suburbs. He wonders how many people actually use the Hiawatha line to go back and forth to work, how many use it to get to Twins and Vikings games. He knows a lot of people who park and ride for that purpose only. Part of the problem there is it is strictly on an honor system and a lot of people are not paying for it. He feels buses give massive flexibility and that should be the way to go. He asked the Board to think of the people they know who benefit from mass transit.

Scott Koester, 710 Everett Drive, Stillwater – Mr. Koester stated he paid the most ever for gas in his life, and this is only the beginning. Now, you're talking about raising more taxes, sales taxes. He urged the Board to vote no.

Dave Van Hattum, Minneapolis – Mr. Van Hattum stated he works for an organization called Transit for Livable Communities and they strongly support this investment. The metropolitan area is thought of as a region. He stated that two thirds of the Washington County citizens commute to a job in either Ramsey or Hennepin County. He stated there is plan, it's on the Met Council web site and it includes many corridors in

the east metro. He submits that this is a great time to make the investment and that transit is a great investment. There will be one million additional residents coming into the metropolitan region. The alternative is that the economy doesn't grow. The way to make it grow is to invest in the movement of goods both in roads and in transit. Those alternatives are needed throughout the region. He feels this is a good investment for individuals, it does reduce congestion. He strongly encourages the Board to make this investment.

John Ames, 9799 51<sup>st</sup> Street North, Lake Elmo – Mr. Ames stated that in the eight years he has lived here there has been very little expansion of the road network. He has seen how the Met Council considers the opinions of Washington County residents. As a resident of Lake Elmo, they don't always actively consider their opinions carefully. What he has seen is that when roads are built and expanded, such as the Wakota Bridge, it is half done. That has made a dramatic difference in his commute. There is one operative train line right now and that has increased his carbon footprint because it runs at grade level and increases his time that he sits idling in his SUV admitting pollutants into the atmosphere. He asked the Board to consider these opinions carefully.

Ron Goette, 1620 Olene Court, West Lakeland Township – Mr. Goette stated there have been a lot of good comments in support of and against. He feels two things are clear; first of all those who support it have a dream and a vision; and, there are the haves and have nots. In his opinion it is not acceptable to impose taxes when only half the citizens can afford it. He asked the Board to consider if the citizens of Washington County can afford it, and is it fair to impose that tax.

Duane Ellerson, 1168 Guthrie Avenue North, Oakdale – Mr. Ellerson stated he is against this tax. He remembers street cars and they took them out for one reason, they weren't versatile enough. Then they went to buses. Now, buses are not good, and they have to get back to light rail. He believes this is foolishness. He is totally against this.

Larry Becking, 6300 Keats Avenue North, Grant – Mr. Becking stated that more taxes in a depressed economy is just not the answer. If the Board wants to do what the people are sensitive to put a survey on the ballot in the fall and see what the majority of people want and that's what you should go with. If he wanted mass transit he would have moved to the inner-city. They moved out to Washington County because of the rural character. This tax will deteriorate this wonderful community and does not believe it will add to it. If rapid transit comes, then so comes cluster housing, then crime and the character of Washington County will deteriorate. He asked the Board to vote no for this tax.

Rob Lehrke, 8186 Hemingway, Cottage Grove – Mr. Lehrke stated there is a problem with businesses leaving Minnesota because of the high tax structure now, what will this do for us? The right to tax is the right to destroy, let's be aware of that and think about that and what we are doing to the State of Minnesota.

Eugene Huerstel, 10234 204 Street North, Forest Lake – Mr. Huerstel asked for help. He just got his tax statement today and his evaluation went up \$65,000. Last year the State of Minnesota voted to help out on the transportation bill, he didn't vote for it, and now there is another one. He asked when is this going to be through—guess what, it's not going to be through because we need all these roads. He does not believe that Washington County will lose all the money because it doesn't vote for it. The budget in Forest Lake has doubled in the last six years, or more. They have seven roundabouts proposed. He asked that the Board vote no.

Bob Burrichter, 2654 Gershwin Avenue North, Oakdale – Mr. Burrichter stated he was going to come in here today and be real sarcastic because today is April Fool's day. He got his real estate taxes in the mail, and the state legislature raised the tax on gas by 2 cents a gallon today. He feels it is unbelievable how everybody in this day and age just wants to have more and more tax money to spend. The people who seem to speak in favor of this issue come from a certain category. They are the kind of people who are out there trying to save their jobs. He feels there are people trying to tell them how to live their lives, trying to shove certain things down our throats, who wants this mass transit.

David Waletzko, 2440 Grenadier Avenue, Oakdale – Mr. Waletzko stated he does not like it. Let's vote no and get out of here.

Marc Drummond, 3426 F. Cherry Lane, Woodbury – Mr. Drummond stated he is in favor of this. He drives an hour back and forth each day. His wife works in downtown and she is able to take the bus to and from work each day, or he drops her off at the light rail station. He feels that works well. He wished that he could have the chance to do that. He thinks there are a lot of people that live in Washington County that don't necessarily work in Washington County and whether or not all the transit money were to go to Washington County, it's going to make a difference because we all live in the metro area. Whether or not the Board votes yes or no, there will be transit needs for this community. He thinks it is important to have some ability to be at the table.

Luke Michaud, 1914 Mahtomedi Avenue, Mahtomedi – Mr. Michaud stated that in 2005 he was told the tax increase he was going to see was no more than a cup of Starbuck's Coffee. He thinks it should be his choice to buy that Starbuck's cup of coffee not that of the taxing body to take it away from me. In 2006 the tax that was put in last year, most of the legislature said it's nothing more than the cost of a gumball. He stated this is his choice to buy that gumball. Today there was a 2 cent gas increase and it's going to go to 8 cents. For the first time it cost him \$100 to fill up his pickup truck. He asked if the Board couldn't say to the State, enough is enough.

The Board took a short recess.

The County Board reconvened.

The Board Chair asked for further comments; none were heard.

Commissioner Peterson moved to close the public hearing. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Hegberg thanked everyone for coming. He feels the County Board has had an open process. The citizens have come and the Board has listened. He appreciates all the e-mails and phone calls he has gotten, although he was not able to answer all of them.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he has looked at this issue very closely. He feels this is one of the most significant votes he will take since being on the County Board for ten years. He believes that the citizens in Minnesota are over taxed. A week ago the U.S. Census Bureau came out with new numbers that list Minnesotans paying the fourth highest per capita taxes to their state in the nation. He will be voting against this action. He felt if all the tax money taken in Washington County were to be utilized entirely in Washington County he might even entertain the idea of voting for it, maybe. But when you read the fine print and the details, he feels this is a bad deal for people who live in Washington County. Residents living in Ramsey and Hennepin Counties who believe in a macro-regional approach and are happy with their money being spent by other counties, then they should support this. He respectfully disagrees.

Commissioner Pulkrabek made the following points: 1) Washington County gets 7votes out of 100 on the Joint Powers Board. Hennepin and Ramsey Counties combined get 65. The Met Council gets 5 votes. That's 70 votes out of 100 for the three entities. 2) Part of the first \$31 million that will be put into this pot goes to the Met Council to bail them out. 3) The State of Minnesota has their hand in this also. Not only the first \$31 million goes to the Met Council, but then in perpetuity 1 to 2% of every dollar that goes in, goes to the State of Minnesota Department of Revenue to help collect the tax. 4) Some people have asked about putting this on a referendum. The State Legislature said that the seven metro counties have to vote on this, the rural counties can put it on a referendum if they choose to do so. 5) Approximately \$5 million will be collected from Washington County with a guarantee that it will only get \$1 million back. He added that the guarantee of \$1 million is only for the first three years. After that there is no guarantee of getting any money. 6) He thinks the most important thing is the Met Council transportation plan. Not only will Hennepin, Ramsey and the Met Council have 70 votes out of 100, but the plan has already been written and they are bound by it, according to the documentation. The Met Council transportation plan states there will be no light rail and no commuter rail in Washington County until at least 2030. The best Washington County can hope for is to get two or three express bus routes which cost, according to county staff, about \$600,000 a piece. Even if the county got three of them, that's not even \$2 million. 7) It was not mentioned, although it's peanuts compared to the money being talked about, the county will have to put \$50,000 up front to get into the agreement. It was also not mentioned that this Joint Powers Board will then have the

jurisdiction to start what he would call a mini-Met Council, another layer of government that is unaccountable to the people. He asked if Hennepin, Ramsey and the Met Council are the ones with 70 votes out of 100 how long will it be before they hire an executive director, an attorney, administrative staff, and lobbyists to get more money? He guesses it won't even be until the end of this year before another layer of unaccountable government is set up. 8) One thing that was pointed out, if Washington County gets into this there might be some new faces on the Board before the end of this year. But once you get into this organization it is three years before you can get out, three years notice. The taxpayers are on the hook for any loans or bonds that are taken out while any County Board member is sitting on that Joint Powers Board. 9) A couple of Forest Lake City Councilmembers indicated that about 300 cars a day park at the transit center and use the bus. He pointed out that county staff researched and less than half of the people who take the Forest Lake bus route are Washington County residents. Most of them come from Chisago County and Wisconsin. 10) A competitive disadvantage touched on briefly. Wisconsin has a 5.5% sales tax, the metro areas will be 6.75%. He asked if that won't determine the shopping habits of Minnesotans and Wisconites when they go to buy big ticket items? He believes it would. 11) This is not a zero sum gain. If Washington County does not vote for this, it's not like Ramsey and Hennepin and other counties get all the money and Washington County is out the door. Washington County will get \$57 million more dollars over the next 10 years for transportation that this Board and staff can decide how that is spent for roads and bridges within Washington County. 12) It was mentioned that Washington County will have a seat at the table. With only 7 votes out of 100 he feels those votes will not count for much. 13) Another argument raised is that this will relieve pressure on property taxes. The argument is that if this passes, county property taxes will be lessened. He asked how many people are buying that bill of goods. If that's true, he asked the Commissioners who are planning on supporting this, Commissioner Stafford, Commissioner Hegberg, and Commissioner Peterson, can he have a guarantee that they will support no increase in the counties levy, on people's property taxes for 2009? He has already made that commitment and so has Commissioner Kriesel. He has a suspicion that these three Commissioners will vote for an increase in the fall. 14) He has heard that this is a regressive tax. It hits people with lower incomes, the working poor, more than people with money because they will pay a higher percentage of their personal income in sales tax. He has heard from some Board members here how much empathy they have for people on fixed incomes, the disenfranchised, the down trodden—he asked where is their empathy now, because they are going to take it more in their pocketbooks than anybody else. 15) He noted that Scott and Carver Counties opted out and maybe they will look at it down the road. His predication is that two years from now the Washington County Board will be sitting here, at least he will, and they'll be asking themselves what have they gotten from the \$10 million the county has put in. He's guessing the answer will be absolutely nothing. No light rail and no commuter rail, there will be a feasibility study in the works, but nothing else.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he believes the Board should hold off on this vote until they see the updated transportation plan from the Met Council with new numbers, new projects, is Washington County even in the mix. He is prepared to vote this thing down right now. He wants to know from the other Commissioners who are planning on voting for this, he wants to know what the people from Washington County, the people

sitting in this room reasonably expect to get in say in the next two to five years for the \$5 million a year they are going to put into this thing. He would like those Commissioners to answer that one question. He also asked that the media put in the article who voted against the sales tax. He thinks if this vote passes, this is perhaps the single most fiscally irresponsible decision this Board has made since he has been on it for 10 years. Commissioner Pulkrabek indicated that he has received 216 e-mails asking the Board to vote no on this. He received 29 telling him to vote yes.

Commissioner Peterson thanked the folks who have called to express their concern about this issue. She has received 330 e-mails and phone calls both pro and con. She reminded the audience that is maybe a little over 1/10 of 1% of the county residents. Some of those calls and e-mails have not been from residents of Washington County. She also stated that she has worked on this transportation bill for the last five years. The transportation bill was put together by citizens who are local city and county officials, county and city engineers, people involved in the industry, and community organizations. They looked at what were the real needs of the transportation system, not only roads and bridges, but what is needed to be a viable community as the metropolitan area for the future. In 2006, \$1.6 billion a year was needed to invest for 10 years. The bill that was passed is a compromise bill. It does not come close to addressing the needs. That's the real issue. It was also determined that one solution was not the answer. The gas tax fund is going down, people are not consuming as many gallons of gas as in the past. They also had to look at the tab fees. When the tab fees were reduced during the Ventura Administration, that was a huge loss in transportation funding. The other issue is that the gas tax had not been raised since 1988. That dollar amount, that 20 cents that was passed in 1988 is now worth 12 cents. She feels it was high time that some of these needs were addressed. The group that studied the transportation bill looked at a 1/2 cent sales tax, with 1/8 going for transit, 1/8 going to projects of major significance, and 1/4 going for projects of major significance within each county. They weren't pleased they just got 1/4 percent sales tax for transit. She indicated that the dollars that her colleagues are so pleased about we have because the legislature gave the counties extra dollars out of a different pot of funds, and those dollars could go away.

(A person from the audience stood and spoke – The legislature didn't give the Board any money, they took it from us.)

The Board Chair stated that the public hearing was closed and asked the gentleman to sit down.

Commissioner Peterson stated the Washington County citizens are going to pay that sales tax whether they pay it here in Washington County, or shop in Dakota County which passed it today, Hennepin County which passed it today, Anoka County which passed it on March 25, and Ramsey County. Washington County citizens purchase products where they work. 66% of Washington County residents work in Ramsey, Hennepin and Dakota Counties. She feels the transit improvements that will be made in those counties will alleviate some of the congestion and save Washington County citizens gas money and it will help the environment by not having the cars sit stationary on county roads. This is not a bill that has been put in

place in the back room, in the dark of night by the legislature. This bill was carefully thought out by citizens throughout the State of Minnesota and it was put together by rural and metro representatives of government. The county does have transitways in the plan, Red Rock, Rush Line, the I-94 corridor and Highway 36. The county does have a choice, it decides whether to pay for transit off of the property taxes or use this 1/4 cent sales tax to start building a system and uniting the metro region together. Commissioner Peterson stated she appreciates the comments she has heard, and she has carefully thought them out, and she respectfully disagrees with those who are against the 1/4 cent sales tax. She stated she hopes they respectfully agree with her that she has carefully thought out the process. She indicated that she has participated in 12 hours of putting together a Joint Powers Agreement; it was a long arduous process. Safeguards have been placed in there: three counties must be in agreement, it cannot be passed by Hennepin and Ramsey Counties; and the super, super majority is a higher number and it has to be put together by at least three counties. She believes that as she looks at the future, as she looks at what is needed in the region, we need to invest in transportation that includes, roads, bridges, buses, trains, planes and an investment in the river. The 2030 Transportation Plan that was brought to the County Board is fiscally constrained based on the 2020 Comp Plans. She feels that Met Council put the cart before the horse, that they should have waited until the 2030 Comp Plans were done because she believes there will be changes in settlement patterns. She also believes that the transit plan should be based on current funding revenue and should be based on the Comp Plan of 2030.

Commissioner Kriesel commended the citizens who spoke tonight. They showed him that the citizens often have a better grasp than elected officials. He stated that one thing he is concerned about when talking about change, is the change that is left in the citizens pocket. He feels it is very important to recognize tonight that the option of joining this joint powers group doesn't expire until October 2, 2008. There is adequate time to do homework on this. He feels this was put on a fast track and staff did an outstanding job trying to seek answers that just are not available at this time. This Board needs to do its homework before committing citizens hard earned tax dollars that has enormous risk and little benefit. He believes a yes vote at this time goes contrary to the scrutiny of this issue that citizens not only expect but they deserve.

Commissioner Kriesel indicated that in his discussions with the Met Council he was advised that they will have completed the study in 2009 that will provide a lot of the answers to questions that he is seeking. Such as, what is the projected or estimated capital cost and operating expense that will occur when the system is built out as defined by the 2030 plan. Currently the tax is ¼ percent, \$100 million of revenue is generated, at some point the cost of paying off those bonds and the operating costs will force the tax to be raised in five to ten years, because there is no way ¼ percent is going to fund a \$3 billion 2030 plan. He asked about the I-94 corridor and was told that it would be very costly to bring rail to Woodbury, possibly hundreds of millions, and that the most likely outcome would be express bus service that will utilize existing roadways. The only benefit he could gather was that buses would be allowed to use the shoulders when traffic congestion is encountered. He feels that is third world technology, the ability to move buses on to shoulders that possibly should be used for emergency purposes. He also asked about the transit service that is

currently supplied to Woodbury, Stillwater and Cottage Grove. It was their opinion that these services would remain. He would hope so because they are currently being taxed by the Met Council taxing district. He asked if they are fulfilling Washington County citizen's needs, and could improvements be made on the current services. What is being accomplished if those services are already being met and we are paying taxes for them, what are we doing here?

Commissioner Kriesel stated another concern that stays under the radar is the 10% local match that is required up front on any local project. He asked how the county will find \$30 million local match that would be required on a \$300 million rail project, and that's probably under estimating the costs. Where will the county get it, the property taxes. He stated that what no one knows at this point is what the county will have contributed through the local match at the conclusion of the 2030 plan. He doesn't have a clue as to what they are entering into. A lot has been said about when citizens from Chisago County and Wisconsin come over to our areas they're going to pay sales tax here and Washington County citizens will go over to Hennepin County and pay sales tax anyway. The 39% of the Chisago County residents that are currently using the bus system up in Forest Lake, Washington County is subsidizing them. They might buy a latte at the coffee shop that will be near the hub, but they are not going to have to pay the 10% local match that Washington County citizens will. If the county wants to be at a table, the table they should be at is the nonparticipating counties like Chisago County and St. Croix County. Transit lines will be built that will reach out to the borders and Washington County will be subsidizing them. Cars will be off the freeways which might reduce congestion along I-94, but at Washington County's subsidized costs. The district he represents has 11 local governments. He would like to hear their opinions. The 11 governments that he represents are working on their Comp Plans and need to be heard on this. He feels if the county has until October to make a decision there is no reason that they cannot wait. There's a lot of discussion that the county has to be at the table. The table they are putting him at is like entering a game of Texas Hold'em, he's holding a pair of deuces, he's looking at a pair of aces and he's hoping he draws a third deuce. He asked what are the true consequences of not joining at this time; he could find absolutely no significant consequence. The same rules apply now that they would encounter in waiting. He believes they shouldn't even be considering this until they go through the budget. Will they be looking at a significant tax increase to maintain the current services, or worse yet, start laying off people and cutting programs. This argument about a seat at the table-you have to ask yourself why would the Joint Powers construct their by-laws to exclude or discourage future participation of Scott, Carver and Washington Counties. The very economic engine that is being built down there creates and brings great benefit to them, all trains lead to them. He fully expects that whenever the county joins this whether it's tonight, July, October, or next year, they will welcome the county with open arms. Forty-nine percent of the daily ridership in Forest Lake that they like to brag about is successful do not reside in Washington County. There are 300 riders that use that service. Washington County is providing rides to 150 Washington County citizens at a cost of \$1.1 million. If he was one of those riders, and somebody offered him half of that subsidized cost and offered \$4,500 he would probably car pool and save everybody a whole lot of problems. He stated that in a few years it may be determined by

Hennepin, Ramsey and Anoka Counties that a sales tax increase is necessary. How can Washington County opt out of that increase. He believes one thing is certain that the sales tax will increase whether Washington County agrees to it or not. If they determine that they need more funding they have to go to ¼, to ½ to 1, Washington County has to take it. Once they opt in it will be virtually impossible to get out. Washington County will be responsible for 5% of the amount of operating expense of the entire Metro Joint Powers systems that are built during the county's membership. If the county opts out in three years and they bonded for \$500 million, the county would be responsible for 5% and it would have to pay that off. So he believes that sales tax will continue to pay it off. Commissioner Kriesel stated it is his understanding that not just the capital bonding debt, but any operating expense that is acquired during the county's membership, that goes on forever, we have to negotiate our way out of that. He asked if that is correct.

Commissioner Peterson stated that once the county gives its notice they are done.

Commissioner Kriesel stated maybe he is wrong, he hopes he is. But he is not certain and is not sure if anybody is certain. If there's anything that he knows about this is that most people do not know enough. He believes that businesses as well as citizens fear the impact of this tax. Wisconsin has 5 1/2% and Washington County will be up to 6 \(^34\%\). He is concerned about the businesses in the district he represents. Downtown Stillwater is an example. They are suffering right now because of a poor economy. The property values go up, so their taxes go up. What's important to note is that the county administers State policy when it comes to property tax valuations. Those downtown businesses are hurting, and they don't need any other disincentives for people to come to downtown Stillwater or Oak Park Heights or anyplace else in his district to shop. You'll hear it said that there never is a good time to raise taxes. During a recession is the absolute worst time to raise taxes. There are a lot of citizens who are worried about staying employed. The mortgage foreclosures in Washington County doubled last year. What little discretionary money senior citizens have will be impacted by this. It might only be pennies, but sometimes that's the difference between them being able to afford medication and food. There are a lot of folks out there hurting. He believes that Hennepin and Ramsey will have huge economic development. The sales tax impact to Washington County—there is a \$54 million courts and government center expansion and the county has to pay sales tax on that. He feels this is ironic because the county has to pay \$1 million to the state in sales tax on materials the county is building to house the state's employees. The county is mandated to provide the facilities for state employees, and will have to pay the State \$1 million because they wouldn't waive it. He stated he would love to go out his back door, hop on a train and end up in Minneapolis. That's a worthy goal, but you have to live within your means. He believes you have to listen to the people and you have to recognize that one size doesn't fit all. Rail might be good thing for Stillwater, but he doesn't know if somebody living up in Marine that will have a whole lot of benefit. He believes that transit never eliminates congestion, it just manages it. People will still get in their cars and drive to where they are catching the transit. His hopes people will not consider his vote tonight a vote against transit, it's a vote to spend time and get the answers the Board needs to make a reasonable judgment on this.

Commissioner Stafford stated he has been with the county since 1975 and he believes that this meeting is not as contentious as the first Truth-in-Taxation hearing. He believes there has been a reasonable balance of input, even though it is obvious the people against this are in the majority here tonight. He appreciated the participation, but did not appreciate the fact that the Chairman asked the audience two or three times to keep its applause to itself. When Commissioner Pulkrabek tells you the county will get \$59 million from the State over ten years whether the county votes for this or not, that works out to \$5.9 million a year. If you look at construction statistics that the engineers put out, that yearly amount will finance one mile of fourlane highway. So, don't get too excited about the \$59 million, it doesn't amount to much when you talk about three, four or five hundred million dollars to build a bridge. The thing he is most disappointed about with Commissioner Pulkrabek is that he took this Board to task for this issue and tax tendencies without pointing out the fact that this group collectively for the last nine years has been instrumental in keeping Washington County with the lowest property tax rate in the State of Minnesota.

Commissioner Stafford stated that Mr. Dame asked for his reasons for supporting this. If Mr. Dame sends him a request for this in e-mail he will send them to him. He has made a list of pluses and minuses and has agonized over this for the three weeks they have been kicking it around. Over the weekend he started formulating an opinion, but felt he needed tonight to keep his mind open because something new might come up. It didn't, but he thought there's always a chance that a new twist would be thrown at him. He finally put something in type that seemed to resemble where his heart was. For the people that know him, he has never counted votes except at this table, when it comes to doing the right thing. He tries to gather all the information he can and do what he thinks is best for the county. He quickly went through the feedback he got from phone calls and e-mails and explained his reasons for voting for this proposal.

Commissioner Stafford listed the following concerns he has received: 1) "I'm against light rail"—His answer is that this plan reaches way beyond light rail. It is not just the Hiawatha, it includes buses, commuter rail, high speed rail, and other forms of transit as well. A complaint that the Board has to front end 10% of a project if it was built in Washington County, you have to ask yourself where did the other 90% come from. It comes from other counties that are going to be paying for the project that don't like participating in Washington County anymore than his colleagues like participating with Hennepin and Ramsey Counties. The opt out clause was not put in to be detrimental to Washington County, the opt out clause is in there to protect us against Hennepin County. Because when Hennepin finishes Hiawatha, North Star and Central Corridor, and they are collecting 55% of the tax in the Twin Cities, if they opt out Washington County has been had. This rule was put in there to say that if a county pulled out they would still be obligated for the bonds that were approved when they held a seat at the table. That means Hennepin, Ramsey or any other big county that gets what they want and then wants to quit cannot. 2) "I'm against all forms of public transportation. I have my own a car, why should I pay to finance somebody else's bus ride"—His answer is that there needs to be many forms of transit in order to have a viable society. There may be a better way to finance these systems, but nobody in the United States has found it. With our addiction to gasoline, which is headed towards \$3.50 a gallon, and increasing gridlock on the roadways, it

is time to find a better system. 3) "Only counties and residents of counties that approve the tax will pay the tax"—He believes this is absolutely false. Counties do not pay the tax except on items the county purchases. Citizens pay the tax and it does not matter where you live. If you shop or eat out in Hennepin, Ramsey, Anoka or Dakota County, you will pay the tax. 4) "There is not much short term benefit to Washington County"—This is true. Mass transit initiatives will not have much immediate impact on this area, but in the long run projects like Red Rock, Rush Line, Highway 36 express routes and the I-94 corridor will be the focus of attention. If they ever get around to building the Stillwater Bridge it will be done with a lot of federal dollars, even though it is hardly a benefit to Nebraska, Nevada, or Nantucket. He stated that Washington County is not an island, it is part of a metropolitan community and must share in the development of the regional infrastructure. Commissioner Stafford stated that in this country a power plant has not been built or an oil refinery in 30 years. The Japanese have taken away our automobile market, and America's auto manufactures have less than 50% of the production and some of it is made in America with European or Asian auto parts. This country's power supply right now, a great deal of it in Minnesota, is coming from Canadian hydro power. So we are now addicted to Canadian power, Arabian oil, and Asian automobiles. He believes this country needs to get a little bit of self-sustaining enterprise or we'll become a third world nation. 5) "This agreement is slanted towards the big counties"—He stated this is also true. The Joint Powers Agreement has its flaws. However, the inequities in the organizational structure cannot be corrected from the sidelines. The county needs to be part of the system in order to change it. He would advocate to this Board that when it puts the two seats on the Board that one be from a Commissioner who supported the plan and one that opposes the plan. 6) "This is a bad time to raise taxes"—This is also true. He has been with Washington County for over 30 years and he cannot remember a time when anybody stood up and said this is a good time to raise taxes. He stated this is a sales tax, citizens have options to decide what to buy. Essential items such as food and clothing are exempt. Unlike the income tax or property tax where there is no choice, with a sales tax you make the decision of what, when and where to buy. This also gives those in Wisconsin who work here, earn their money here and shop here a chance to share in the cost of our transportation burden. 7) "This is not about the tax, it's the principle of it all"—He understands that. He is aware of the position that many people have on "no new taxes" and government's seemingly never ending thirst for citizen's dollars. The most onerous tax of all is the property tax. Under this program, property taxes cannot be used for operating expenses. This shifts the burden from property owners to all residents. 8) "So what is your position"—He has always tried hard to think of the county first. He is also here as a representative of District 5, the City of Woodbury, the Chamber of Commerce, the League of women Voters and others. He believes most of the citizens in his district support this very nominal tax. He believes the region needs mass transit. With this 1/4 % sales tax everyone will pay for the system and the passengers pay to use the system. This sales tax on \$50 is about 12 cents. Gasoline prices sometimes fluctuate that much per gallon in a day. Public transportation needs public support.

Commissioner Hegberg stated this is the most difficult vote he has had since the jail was built and arguments were had over whether to build and the size. He supported building that jail. After that elections came and

some Board members were not left on the Board and he expects that will probably happen this time. When he looks at the issue, what does he get out of the situation. Looking at the larger picture is it provides choices. Today we are captured by oil. There are no choices. He feels we are financing our own war in Iraq. He is very disappointed that is the way our society is. There's nothing that can be done about that unless we find different ways for our transit systems to work or ways to get people to work. He invested years ago in fuel cells that was suppose to be the answer. He made some good money, the stock went up, but no product. He sold. The stock today is \$2, \$3, or \$4 some of them are bankrupt. We look at technology to solve our problems but nothing has been developed yet. In the mean time this country is a hostage. It would be very easy for this nation to become totally frozen up by the lack of gasoline. All we have to do is have refineries blown up. There are no choices. We have to, as a nation, say we need choices so we don't become captive to our own enemies. There are environmental reasons some people laugh at it. He doesn't believe that man is causing global warming, but he does know that we've been coming out of the ice age since the ice age. If he takes an ice cube and puts it in his glass of vodka as it gets smaller it melts faster. There are issues on the environment and we need to look at it to see what can be done to deal with it. The buses today can be made to run on electricity. In California that is not uncommon. A lot run on natural gas, biodiesel, and E-85. They are all made outside of the United States. We talked about the value of the Canadian dollar versus America. We are totally dependent on a lot of Canadian dollars and that's the reason the value of their dollar has gone from 60 cents American to over a \$1 American today. How much further can we go. Are we going to continue to let the dollar slip by because we are buying oil and energy from other nations because we won't take and face the problems that we need to deal with. Electricity is just one of them. We are dependent on Canadian hydro because we don't face the issue. He has been for nuclear power for years and he still is because we have to look at different sources. The value of a dollar will keep decreasing and those individuals can continue to buy us out. Sales taxes are paid on non-essentials. The people who shop here will pay for and use the transit system because they will pay the tax. Those people who travel and use the Forest Lake Transit Center out of Washington County they probably shop at Wal-Mart, Target and the stores that are in that community. Those are the nearest stores all the way to North Branch and further up. If it's a real estate tax, Washington County citizens pay it. Chisago County won't pay any of it. Washington County real estate taxes are one of the lowest compared to Chisago County. He believes that Washington County has had an excellent management system and the Board has looked to staff as well as the Board members to guide and direct them so we do maintain our standards and get efficiencies out of our dollars. On Page 1, Whereas No. 5 of the Joint Powers Agreement says "Whereas, the Counties intend that the Board, as defined below, shall endeavor to award grants to promote geographic equity over time with respect to investments in transitways to implement the Counties' regional vision". He believes if Washington County is not at the table right away, they aren't going to look and say, let's look at the systems in Washington County. Most of Ramsey County's systems come into Washington County. Ramsey County has a vested interest in us protecting their transitways going into Washington County and making them work. If Washington County joins now they will become part of the by-laws committee which will help define transitways and we will be part of the planning process. We will not have that if we aren't at the table. He stated Washington County can back out of the process. Especially in the first two or three years

because we haven't funded any bonding debt. The North Star, Central it's already funded mostly through the bonding bill. Those bonds are already provided for by the State of Minnesota. The next transit systems will be determined by us as a group. Us as a group are all elected officials from counties and cities on the Grant Evaluation and Ranking System (GEARS) Committee. It will not be like the Met Council. That's what they insisted on when they looked at the transportation bill and looked at the options they had. We didn't want to become part of the Met Council because we wanted to have some voice in our decisions. Transit opens the road for businesses. Some of the trucking industry was on the Transportation Advisory Board in the early years. A Warroad Minnesota trucking firm was talking about moving their windows down to Chicago and they had to come through Minneapolis to do that. Their trucks got to the northern part of the cities from Warroad faster than it took to get through the cities and head to Chicago. He was having his trucks leave at 6:00 at night so they would hit Minneapolis/St. Paul at midnight. Having semis sitting and idling on the congestion of the freeways is not what we want. We have to figure out a way to avoid that. Transit maybe isn't the answer, but building freeways is going to be so expensive to add lanes to I-94, 694 where they have to condemn and take out blocks of housing. Now the new method of condemnation takes much longer. A little bit of road on the 7, 8 & 9 study is talking about two or three houses and the people don't want to give up their homes. What do you think it would be like to add lanes to the freeway system into the metro area. He is not sure if Washington County will get its share. But if he's at the table he will argue for our share and all of us sitting at this table will. If we are not at the table you can bet Dakota, Anoka, and Hennepin County will probably have the votes to make sure the transitways go to the west as has been happening for a number of years. Transit is currently paid by real estate taxes as well as the roads. Roads are paid 75% by real estate. Why is that—when the developer builds a home he has to put in the roads. Today the county requires the developer to put in stop lights, put in turn lanes into the developments, if we can. But we don't have control of the accesses to the county roads. That is a city issue and they have worked with the county to recognize that if these people want stop lights there is a waiting list of 44 that the developers aren't paying for which will take six years if we used all of the \$5 million per year to put in the stop lights. This organization is not the Met Council, it's a joint powers of elected officials. Roads don't solve congestion either. Every time another road is built they find it is filled up very shortly.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he is in banking. The rich don't pay taxes. As he looks at the tax returns, and look at the business and finance them, there are plenty of write-offs. Sales tax they do pay when they buy new trucks and depreciate it off their tax returns. The poor pay taxes, but they don't buy a lot of non-essential items, the rich do. He owns two boats, jet skis all the other play things that he wants. When he buys those things he will pay on the sales tax. The poor don't have those items, he does. The value of homes. When he was in foreclosure in banks in 1970's the value of homes was declining substantially, in half, in the areas of North Branch, Stacy, Wisconsin. Why, because it was a matter of being so far from their job and that's all they could afford. When they looked at a price of the house and where they could afford to buy they compared the prices of gasoline and their cost of transportation to and from work. Transit systems do give opportunities for those people to drive back and forth, or go to Forest Lake, buy a house and come down to the cities. It does create some demand and stabilizes some of the real estate values. If you go

up to Stacy and further north you only have to look and see what is happening to the values of their homes. That hits all of us in the pocketbook as well as the county. He does support it and when they go to the Joint Powers if Washington County does not get a fair shake you can be assured that he will vote to get out of it. It is an expensive bet, but Washington County should be able to get something out of a system more than what we are paying in now and getting very little. The taxing districts are paying in for transit and Washington County does not have the benefits that are on the west side.

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve the Declaration to be part of the Metropolitan Transportation Area and authorization to enter into a Joint Powers Agreement establishing the Counties Transit Improvement Board. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion.

The Board discussed this matter further.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked, as a rebuttal to Commissioner Stafford, if he honestly believes that the majority of people in Woodbury support this sales tax increase? In all due respect, he has got to be kidding. But, the bigger point is he has heard a lot of talk from the three Commissioners that look like they will vote for this about energy policy, oil prices, global warming, dreams, seats at the table. He is still waiting on an answer as far as the question he originally asked. What can the people in this room, and what can the people of Washington County reasonably expect to get for their \$5 million a year in the next two to five years? He has heard a whole lot of nothing so far, other than nebulous smoke and mirrors. He asked that any of the three Commissioners feel free to jump in and answer that question.

Commissioner Stafford said we could do that, but they are supposed to be debating the motion on the table.

Commissioner Pulkrabek thought originally they were going to debate this amongst the Commissioners, now he's told they are not going to debate it. That tells him the Commissioners do not have an answer. His second question is, which he asked before, if they believe in the argument that raising the sales tax will take pressure off the property taxes and not spend as much on transportation, Commissioner Kriesel and he have already made the commitment to not vote for a budget that has any increase in the levy. If the three Commissioners really believe their own argument, will any of them make a commitment to keep the levy at a zero percent increase.

Commissioner Stafford rose to a point of order. He doesn't mind discussing these issues with Commissioner Pulkrabek at great length. There is a motion on the floor and the conversation is supposed to be restricted to that motion. That has nothing to do about whether or not the county joins the joint powers.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he has asked those two questions two times, and he's hearing nothing for the first answer and no commitment as far as not raising taxes.

Commissioner Hegberg stated that will be discussed at another time, when they go to Commissioner Reports.

Commissioner Pulkrabek requested a roll call vote.

Commissioner Kriesel asked for a clarification. Is the Board saying that they will not have the opportunity to ask anything about what's been said here tonight? He has a real problem with that. He has heard things like a ¼ % sales tax is insignificant. When he looked at what peer cities staff brought forward, and pointed out that sales tax is not unusual to fund transit, virtually every one of those peer cities have 1% sales tax. This ¼% is bait so they can set the hook. There is no way we are going to have any significant benefit before the sales tax is increased. He doesn't buy that for a minute, neither does anybody else that studies this.

Commissioner Hegberg asked for further debate.

Commissioner Kriesel asked if they are going to limit their conversation on the most important thing that anybody on this Board has considered? He welcomes the Boards comments back to what he's said. If he said something they didn't agree with, let him know. He feels compelled that he has to represent the people he represents in his district and speak for them on some of the things that were said here that he disagrees with. There is absolutely no reason this has to be approved tonight and the county would stand a better chance negotiating the benefits that are going to be brought to Washington County. Then a decision can be made to join it. A lot of people are going to view this as a way to get distance between now and the election. He has heard that commissioners in other counties want to vote on this right now, because come November people might have forgotten about it. He believes that's not going to happen. He has heard about Japanese making automobiles, that we lost that market because of whatever. He's told the Board that we are going to lose our market, 3M and the rest of them, they are going to move over to Roberts, Wisconsin. Let's build rapid transit over there, because that's where the citizens are going to be shopping. Congestion on freeways—when did it become a part of his job description that he has to be concerned for congestion on freeways. That's a state and federal problem. He understands that Woodbury and a lot of high density communities feed into that and they have to share in some sort of vision and cooperate to get it done, but this belongs at the state level. The state should be talking with Wisconsin, and if it's going to be transit for Minnesota that has global benefit for all of Minnesota, environmentally and economically, this should not be piecemealed down to counties. He cannot justify it for the citizens that he represents that they have to pay their tax dollars to subsidize residents in Wisconsin or Chisago County. He understands that those people are going to spend money in our county and pay their sales tax. But he'll also tell you if you currently live in Hudson, why in God's name would you want to come to Minnesota and shop. You're going to stay at home and shop in your backyard because you will save 11/4% which he believes will rapidly become 2%. Why would you go to Hennepin County where you're going to pay an additional stadium tax. We are building this light rail so billionaires in downtown Minneapolis are guaranteed success with their

investments. He has nothing but the utmost respect for everyone on this Board. He feels bad how people are going to be viewed that have served this county admirably. He feels bad that this, for whatever reason, is where they stand because that's truly what they feel is in the best interest of the county. It's not often that they ever got crossways on an issue, but this is one of those times. He guarantees that when they walk away from this, they will remain friends, but he is seriously concerned that the public has to know. This does not have to be decided until October 2, 2008. That would give the Board time to adequately look at this and make a qualified judgment at that time. He would rather have that done than people lose an election coming up and then have enough votes to opt out. He asked that the Board do its homework and reconsider this.

Commissioner Hegberg called for the motion as moved by Commissioner Peterson and seconded by Commissioner Stafford to adopt **Resolution No. 2008-045** as follows:

Declaration to be Part of Metropolitan Transportation Area and Authorization to enter into Joint Powers Agreement Establishing Counties Transit Improvement Board

WHEREAS, the Minnesota Legislature has, by Laws of Minnesota 2008 Chapter 152, Article 4, Section 2, authorized metropolitan counties of Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Hennepin, Ramsey, Scott and Washington to impose a one-quarter percent sales and use tax, and an excise tax of \$20 per motor vehicle purchased or acquired from any person engaged in the business of selling motor vehicles at retail ("Sales Tax"), following the formation of a joint powers board by agreement among the counties; and

WHEREAS, Washington County is committed to the development of a system of transitways to better serve the residents and businesses of the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area and to efficiently move people and goods throughout the region; and

WHEREAS, the proceeds of the Sales Tax will be used to enhance and improve the transitway system and not supplant state and regional obligations, as required by Minn. Stat. § 297A.992; and

WHEREAS, Washington County intends that, in accordance with Minn. Stat. § 297A.992, subd. 6, the Sales Tax proceeds will be made available for the development and operation of transitways, including rail and bus rapid transit projects serving the residents and businesses of the Metropolitan Transportation Area, as defined by statute; and

WHEREAS, Washington County intends that a Counties Transit Improvement Board shall endeavor to award grants to promote geographic equity over time with respect to investments in transitways to implement the metropolitan counties' regional vision; and

WHEREAS, Washington County wishes to collaborate with the other metropolitan counties on the planning, implementation and funding of such transitway improvements through a joint powers board, to be known as the Counties Transit Improvement Board.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners does hereby declare Washington County to be a part of the metropolitan transportation area; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the Joint Powers Agreement Establishing the Counties Transit Improvement Board (Agreement No. \_\_\_\_\_) in substantially the form on file on the date hereof, with the County Administrator and the Chair authorized to agree to such minor technical modifications as

may be recommended by the County Attorney, and authorizes its Chair to execute said agreement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby approves an initial contribution of \$50,000 for the startup administrative expenses of the Counties Transit Improvement Board, subject to reimbursement from Sales Tax revenue.

The motion was adopted 3-2 with a roll call vote as follows: Commissioner Peterson, Yes; Commissioner Pulkrabek, No; Commissioner Hegberg, Yes; Commissioner Stafford Yes; and Commissioner Kriesel, No.

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve a resolution adopting a sales and use tax for the County of Washington. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion.

The Board discussed this motion further

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he is still waiting for an answer to his two questions.

Commissioner Stafford stated his mission on this Board is to continue to help this county maintain the reputation it has of having one of the lowest property tax rates in the State of Minnesota. He sees this as a separate issue and he's willing to keep his commitment to low taxes. He does not have to give up his commitment to public transportation to honor Commissioner Pulkrabek's desire to keep his reputation as the lowest taxed county in the state. He's with him.

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he takes that as a no.

Commissioner Stafford said he would support low taxes, he always has and he always will.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he does not support a zero levy, the Board cannot. The Board does not know what it will be looking at in the budget.

Commissioner Kriesel asked if it would be possible to put a condition of approval on this resolution. For example that this Board is willing to approve a ¼% sales tax; however, the Board wants to guarantee that this ¼% sales tax will not be raised until 2020. Is that a possibility?

Commissioners Peterson and Hegberg stated this is the resolution set by the State legislature.

Commissioner Kriesel stated he fears that this 1/4% is short term.

Commissioner Hegberg called for the motion as moved by Commissioner Peterson and seconded by Commissioner Stafford to adopt **Resolution No. 2008-046** 

# Resolution Adopting a Sales and Use Tax For The County Of Washington

The Board of the County of Washington hereby resolves:

# Section 1: AUTHORITY.

The Minnesota Legislature has, by Laws of Minnesota 2008 Chapter 152, Article 4, Section 2, authorized the County of Washington to impose a one-quarter percent sales and use tax, and an excise tax of \$20 per motor vehicle purchased or acquired from any person engaged in the business of selling motor vehicles at retail, occurring within the county, to assist in funding transit improvements, including debt service on obligations issued to finance such improvements. The County of Washington approved the Act in accordance with applicable law.

#### Section 2: <u>DEFINITIONS</u>.

The words, terms and phrases used in this Resolution shall have the meaning ascribed to them in Minnesota Statues, Chapter 297A and 297B, except where the context clearly indicates otherwise. In addition, the following definitions shall apply:

- Subd. 1: Act means Laws of Minnesota 2008 Chapter 152, Article 4, Section 2;
- Subd. 2: County means the County of Washington;
- Subd. 3: Commissioner means the Commissioner of Revenue for the State of Minnesota acting under the authority of an agreement entered into between the County (or a joint powers board) and the State of Minnesota pursuant to the Act, or such other person or entity designated to administer and collect the Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax, and Excise Tax;
- Subd. 4: Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax means the sales and use tax imposed and collected pursuant to this Resolution;
- Subd. 5: Resolution means this Resolution in its present form;
- Subd. 6: Retailer maintaining a place of business in the County or any like term shall mean any retailer having or maintaining within the County, directly or by a subsidiary or an affiliate, an office, place of distribution, sales or sample room or place, warehouse or other place of business, or having any representative, including an affiliate, agent, sales person, canvasser or solicitor operating in the County under the authority of the Retailer or its subsidiary, for any purpose, including the repairing, selling, delivering, installation, or soliciting of orders for the Retailer's goods or services, or the leasing of tangible personal property located in the County, whether the place of business or agent, representative, affiliate, sales person, canvasser, or solicitor, is located in the County permanently or

temporarily, or whether or not the Retailer or subsidiary is authorized to do business within the County.

# Section 3: SALES & USE TAX AND EXCISE TAX.

There is hereby imposed an additional sales and use tax in the amount of one-quarter of one percent of the gross receipts from the sales at retail, and the storage, use, distribution or consumption of goods or services which are taxable, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 297A and occur within the County of Washington.

There is hereby imposed an excise tax of \$20 per sale of a motor vehicle at retail within the County of Washington. This excise tax shall be in lieu of the Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax.

The imposition, administration, collection and enforcement of these taxes shall be governed by the provisions of Minnesota Statute Chapters 297A, 270C, and 289A.

# Section 4: <u>SEPARATE STATEMENT: COLLECTION FROM PURCHASER; ADVERTISING NO TAX; MINIMUM UNIFORM TAX COLLECTION METHODS.</u>

The Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax, and Excise Tax, shall be stated and charged separately from the sales price or charge for service insofar as practical, and should be a debt from the purchaser to the seller recoverable at law in the same manner as other debts. In computing the tax to be collected as a result of any transaction, any amount of tax less than one-half of one cent must be disregarded and amounts of tax one-half cent or more must be considered an additional cent.

#### Section 5: EXEMPTION CERTIFICATES.

A fully completed exemption certificate taken from a purchaser to the effect that the property purchased is for resale or that the sale is otherwise exempt from the application of the tax imposed by this Resolution will conclusively relieve the Retailer from collecting and remitting the tax.

#### Section 6: PRESUMPTION OF PURPOSE OF SALE.

For the purpose of the proper administration and enforcement of Section 3 of this Resolution, it shall be presumed that all retail sales for delivery in the County are for storage, use, or other consumption in the County until the contrary is established.

#### Section 7: COLLECTION OF SALES AND USE TAX AT TIME OF SALE.

Subd. 1: Any retailer making deliveries within the County, any Retailer maintaining a place of business in the County, or any other Retailer otherwise doing business within the County, upon making sales or any items described in Section 3 which are not exempted from the sales tax imposed under that section and which are to be delivered or caused to be delivered within the County to the purchaser, shall at the time of making such sales collect the Sales and Use tax from the purchaser. The tax collected by such retailer shall be remitted to the Commissioner on behalf of the County.

Subd. 2: Any retailer required to collect Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax, and Excise Tax, and remit such tax to the Commissioner pursuant to this section, shall register with the Commissioner and provide such other information as the Commissioner may require.

# Section 8: AGENT OF RETAILER.

When in the opinion of the Commissioner it is necessary for the efficient administration of the tax, the Commissioner may regard any salesman, representative, trucker, peddler or canvasser as the agent of the dealer, distributor, supervisor, employer or other person under whom such salesman, representative, trucker, peddler or canvasser operated or from whom the tangible property is being sold is obtained, and may regard the dealer, distributor, supervisor, employer or other person as a Retailer for the purposes of this Resolution.

### Section 9: EFFECTIVE DATE, TRANSITIONAL SALES.

Except as otherwise provided herein, the Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax authorized by this Resolution shall apply to sales made on or after July 1, 2008 and shall be in addition to all other taxes now in effect. The Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax shall not apply to the following:

Subd. 1: The gross receipts from the purchase or lease of tangible personal property made under an enforceable contract entered into before <u>July 1, 2008</u>, provided that delivery or possession of items is taken on or before <u>August 1, 2008</u>.

Subd. 2: The gross receipts from the purchase of taxable services made under an enforceable contract entered into before <u>July 1, 2008</u> and for which payment was made before <u>July 1, 2008</u>, provided that the services were provided before <u>August 1, 2008</u>.

Subd. 3: The gross receipts from the purchase of construction materials used to complete a lump sum or fixed price construction contract that was signed and enforceable before July 1, 2008 and that does not provide for an allocation of future taxes, provided that the construction materials are used exclusively in performing the contract and the materials are delivered before December 31, 2008.

Subd. 4: The gross receipts from the purchase of utility services if the utility bill includes charges for services furnished before <u>July 1, 2008</u>; however, the Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax shall apply to all utility bills for periods beginning <u>July 1, 2008</u>.

# Section 10: COLLECTION AND ENFORCEMENT.

The Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax, and Excise Tax, imposed by the County pursuant to this Resolution shall be subject to the same interests, penalties, and other rules as are applicable to the State general sales and use tax imposed by Minnesota Statutes Chapter 289A and 297A. The Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax, and Excise Tax, imposed by the County pursuant to this Resolution shall be collected by the State on behalf of the County as provided by an appropriate agreement with the Minnesota Commissioner or Revenue.

# Section 11: TAX CLEARANCE ISSUANCE OF LICENSES.

The County may not issue or renew a license for the conduct of trade or business in the County if the Commissioner notifies the County that the applicant for such license owes delinquent Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax or Excise Tax as provided in this Resolution, or penalties or interest due on such taxes. For the purposes of this Section 11, the following terms have the following meanings:Subd. 1: Metropolitan Transportation Area Sales and Use Tax includes sales and use tax as provided in this Resolution. Penalties and interest are penalties and interest due on taxes included in this definition.

# Subd. 2: Delinquent taxes do not include a tax liability if:

- an administrative or court action which contests the amount of validity or the liability has been filed or served;
- b. the appeal period to contest tax liability has not expired; or
- the applicant has entered into a payment agreement and is current with the payments.

Subd. 3: Applicant means an individual if the license is issued to or in the name of an individual or the corporation, partnership or other entity if the license is issued to or in the name of a corporation, partnership or other entity.

A copy of the notice of delinquent taxes given to the County shall also be sent to the applicant taxpayer. In the case of renewal of a license, if the applicant requests a hearing in writing, within thirty (30) days of the receipt of the notice of delinquent taxes, then a contested case hearing shall be held by the Commissioner under the same procedures as provided in Minnesota Statutes, Section 270C.72 for the State sales and use tax imposed under Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 297A, provided that if a hearing must be held on the State sales and use tax, hearings may be combined.

#### **National County Government Week**

Commissioner Peterson moved to adopt Resolution No. 2008-051 as follows:

WHEREAS, county government employees are instrumental to providing services for citizens across the nation; and

WHEREAS, there are 3,066 counties in the United States of America that serve over 303 million citizens as an essential component of local government; and

WHEREAS, Washington County provides services and programs for more than 228,000 citizens, including approximately 60,000 children age 18 and younger; and

WHEREAS, Washington County values its employees who plan, administer, and deliver county services that address the essential needs of the children, families, and adults who reside in Washington County; and

WHEREAS, the National County Government Week theme for 2008 is "Protecting Our Children" to recognize county employees and services that help safeguard children in many ways.

#### Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update. The Governor line-item vetoed several items in the bonding bill including the I-94 transitway study for \$750,000. The board will meet with

Ramsey County this afternoon to talk about issues of mutual interest and concern. That meeting is scheduled for noon at the Oak Marsh Golf Club in Oakdale. Part of that discussion will include the fact that the bonding money for the Central Corridor light rail line was also eliminated as was the \$2 million for the rehabilitation/restoration of the Union Depot. The county has done well in that no county program aid has been scheduled for reduction in either the Governor's bill or either the Senate or House of Representatives. The House bill does include an additional \$40 million in county program aid starting in 2009 and then indexing that aid starting in 2010.

## Commissioner Appointments to the Counties Transit Improvement Board (CTIB)

Commissioner Stafford moved to appoint Commissioner Peterson and Commissioner Hegberg to the Counties Transit Improvement Board. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

#### Commissioner Appointment to the Grant Evaluation and Ranking System (GEARS) Committee

Commissioner Peterson move to appoint Commissioner Stafford to the Grant Evaluation and Ranking System (GEARS) Committee. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Pulkrabek absent.

#### COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Peterson noted that Pope County has a new justice center, the Northwest Regional Corrections Center. She indicated it was a nice building and facility. It leaves the counties open to take more short-term offenders as we build these new facilities. She complimented the staff on the Highway 8 at Interstate 35, Regional Significance brochure. She thinks it is outstanding. She asked that this brochure be brought to the joint meeting with Ramsey County. She thought it would be good to share with Chisago and Anoka Counties also.

Commissioner Kriesel stated he attended the May Township meeting where they discussed the 7, 8 and 9 county road projects. He attended the Farm Family of the Year awards last Friday. The Cahanes family was honored. Yesterday he met with Stillwater Mayor Ken Harycki and Representative Julie Bunn, Representative Matt Dean, and Senator Saltzman to discuss the Stillwater Bridge and transportation funding. He will be meeting with Afton Mayor Welter and meeting their new interim Administrator and a citizen resident to discuss Afton's main street initiative.

Commissioner Stafford reported that he and Commissioner Peterson will be video taping the Insight program to discuss the P.L.A.C.E. Program and the number of foreclosures in Washington County.

Commissioner Peterson reported that she will be attending the Association of Minnesota Counties Joint meeting on Wednesday, April 9 with the school board association, the township association and the League of Minnesota Cities.

Commissioner Hegberg asked the Public Works Director to review the CSAH 8 and I-35 issue in Forest Lake. While they were in Washington D.C. last week, they asked for \$2 million for design funds.

Don Theisen, Public Works Director, presented a brief overview of CSAH 8 and I-35. The biggest concern they have in this area is safety. Seventy-five thousand cars travel this section of the roadway a day and it is projected to go to over 100,000 in ten years. It is in the Minnesota Department of Transportation's top 5% of crashes of all of their roads. Cars traveling at 70 miles an hour only have seven seconds to transverse maybe three lanes. That's about 1/3 the distance that is needed. There are also connectivity issues. There is no way to go north off of CSAH 8 and no way to go east off of I-35. Broadway Avenue is the only road that crosses I-35 in the Forest Lake area. If that bridge goes down for whatever reason there is no way for people to navigate that area without circuitous routes.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that the other issues discussed in Washington D.C. were requests for \$2 million in Red Rock Corridor for park and rides and bus transit, park and rides in the Rush Line Corridor, the I-94 corridor, and \$8 million for high speed rail. They also asked for money for the Stillwater Bridge. He stated that next time they go to Washington D.C. they need to bring a fact sheet on the increase in cost for delaying the construction.

All of Lisbon Avenue North and Lomond Trail North as shown and dedicated on WRANGHAM ADDITION, according to the recorded plat thereof, Washington County, Minnesota, and

All of Lomond Trail North from its intersection with Manning Trail North, easterly to Big Marine Lake and northerly to its intersection with 177<sup>th</sup> Street North, all in Sections 5 and 6, Township 31 North, Range 20 West, Washington County, Minnesota.

Shall, effective May 1, 2008, be designated and constitute a Washington County Highway.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that to the extent authorized and permitted by law Washington County hereby agrees to hold harmless, defend and indemnify the Township of May from any liability or claims of liability from this resolution; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, to the extent authorized and permitted by law Washington County hereby agrees to waive its right to exercise its authority to return to the Town of May the control of and responsibility for the roadways that are subject to this resolution.

The foregoing Consent Calendar was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

### **COMMUNITY SERVICES**

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2008-054** as follows:

Resolution in Support of H.R. 5613 and S. 2819 the Protecting the Medicaid Safety Net Act of 2008

WHEREAS, regulations proposed by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) will alter the administration and financing of the Medicaid program and place severe restrictions on the ability of Washington County to provide essential core safety services to vulnerable populations, and;

WHEREAS, the proposed regulations, by reducing federal payments, would shift the costs of these essential core services to the state and counties, and;

WHEREAS, the citizens most affected by these regulations often have complex medical, behavioral, and social problems which necessitate critical services, including case management, in order to live successfully in communities and outside of institutional or hospital settings, and;

WHEREAS, with unemployment rising, home foreclosures at a record high, and real wages declining, Washington County is experiencing an increased demand for services for vulnerable citizens and a growing need for resources to assist them; and

WHEREAS, H.R. 5613 and S. 2819, the Protecting the Medicaid Safety Net Act of 2008, would place a moratorium until March 2009 on seven Medicaid regulations issued by CMS which would reduce Federal Medicaid funding to States for vital safety net programs and services to vulnerable citizens.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners urges Congress to support H.R. 5613 and S. 2819, delaying the implementation of regulations that will result in less federal funding for essential safety services to abused and neglected children, jeopardize the ability of people with disabilities to live independently in the community, and increase county costs for federal and state mandated programs.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to accept a grant of \$15,000 from the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) to implement the "Accreditation Preparation and Quality Improvement Demonstration Site Project". Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

### PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Commissioner Kriesel moved to adopt Resolution No. 2008-055 as follows:

Resolution to Acquire Right of Way on County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 18

BE IT RESOLVED that Washington County proceed to improve a portion of County State Aid Highway 18 between T.H. 95 (Manning Avenue) and CSAH 21 (St. Croix Trail South) located in Sections 19, 20, 21, 22, 28, 29 and 30, Township 28 North, Range 20 West in the City of Afton as shown on the attached map; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the officers of said county, including the County Engineer, the County Administrator and the County Attorney, shall proceed and are hereby authorized to proceed to acquire, by negotiations and purchase and if necessary the exercise of eminent domain, right of way to establish said highway plus sight corners, permanent slope, drainage and utility easements, and temporary construction easements. Such officers are specifically authorized to take such action and execute such instruments and plats if any be necessary, to acquire said right of way and associated easements.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

#### GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

# Update on the Minnesota Anniversary Project (MAP 150)

Stacy Becker, Citizens League, presented an update on the Minnesota Anniversary Project (MAP 150) that looked at more opportunities to learn from citizens and what they wanted to know about their property taxes. She stated that this project included Ramsey, Morrison, and Washington Counties. Citizens informed them that the main thing they wanted was context: they liked trends over time; a full picture of what they are paying for, moving costs from the state to counties, including what is happening to revenues if those revenues from the state are declining; they like information for bigger outside trends like per capita and inflation adjustments; and some liked comparisons and rankings between jurisdictions, but some did not. They really liked charts that took the full property tax, broke that out by jurisdiction, and showed how much was spent on schools, criminal justice/police, streets/public works, parks and fire. Ms. Becker stated they will be going back to the individuals who participated six months ago and ask them if it has helped them as they went through the last property tax cycle. That survey has not been completed, but she will get it to the Board when it is compiled. They have created a property tax web site, Minnesota Property Tax Facts, www.propertytaxfacts.mn where all this information is provided. This web site has a survey individuals can take and results are immediately available. Another area the citizens needed help in understanding was school referendums and getting accurate information. So they compiled information on school referendums that occurred in 2007 and that information is also available on their web site. Ms. Becker stated that as a result of the school test, they are in the process of developing a simple model that local jurisdictions can use to provide online information. They are also in the process of doing a citizen involvement survey which can be found on www.citizensleague.org. The Citizens League is considering looking into some policy follow up on the tax system, what it would take for there to be more consistency overtime so taxpayers knew what was coming.

#### Legislative Update

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update: A key issue the county is watching is the conference committee and activity on the supplemental budget from both the House and the Senate; some of that information will be shared with the Board during the 2009 budget process workshop next week; Washington County was a leader in establishing a fee for licensing of corporate foster care and there has been some effort on the part of the corporate foster care lobby to undo that fee; and the proposed legislation that would allow the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed District to move into Section 103B which is a metro watershed and allows them to levy for additional administrative fees is included in the Senate Omnibus Tax Bill, but it does not require what Washington County is seeking, that the watershed get County Board approval of their annual budget and their workplan.

Commissioner Hegberg stated he supports watershed district projects instead of studies. He wants to see Comfort Lake-Forest Lake get what they need, but on the other hand he would like to see the County's advocacy. At this point he is thinking that for Washington County, they might need to seek approval to look at all the watershed districts budgets and work plans in the county.

Mr. Schug stated that the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake Watershed legislation didn't start out as a county initiative. They just asked for the county's support of the special legislation. In the course of that discussion the County Board said it would support it, but with the condition that the County Boards of Chisago and Washington County would get to review and approve/deny the budget request and work plan. In discussions with other counties and county organizations, some feel there is a lot of merit to that issue because watersheds are appointed boards yet have taxing authority. There wasn't an opportunity to research and promote this statewide or at least metro wide. One thing they could do for the 2009 county legislative package is to take this to the member associations such as MICA and AMC to see if there would be general county wide support for that provision.

Commissioner Kriesel stated he supports everything that Commissioner Hegberg has stated. He would like to see a trend analysis on the watershed districts budgets over the last five years.

Commissioner Hegberg suggested that the County Board maintains its position, it does not agree with the bill, but it will not lobby against it.

#### COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported on the tax cut rally that he and Commissioner Kriesel attended this past Saturday. He also reported that he would not be able to attend the Foster Care dinner this week.

Commissioner Kriesel reported he would be attending the Foster Care recognition dinner.

Resolution Approving the 2009 Qualified Allocation Plan for Low Income Housing Tax Credits

WHEREAS, Congress has permanently extended the Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program by enactment of the Revenue Reconciliation Act of 1993;

WHEREAS, Treasury Regulations (the "Regulations") require allocators of low income housing tax credits, including the Washington County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (the "Authority") which allocates such credits on behalf of Washington County (the "County"), to provide procedures to allocate low income housing tax credits and monitor compliance of projects to which it has allocated low income housing tax credits pursuant to Section 42 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended;

WHEREAS, the Authority has determined it is necessary and appropriate to modify the Authority's previously adopted Low Income Housing Tax Credit Qualified Allocation Plan (the "Plan"); and

WHEREAS, the Authority has adopted the Plan, as amended, in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit A following a public hearing regarding the revision of the Plan for which not less than 14 days notice was published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Washington County, that the amended Housing Tax Credit Qualified Allocation Plan previously adopted by the Authority and attached hereto as Exhibit A is hereby adopted and approved.

3. Adoption of **Resolution No. 2008-057** as follows:

Authorizing Parking Restrictions on CSAH 15
After Reconstruction

SP 82-615-20, County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 15 from Trunk Highway 36 to 0.25 Mile North of CSAH 12 in Grant, Lake Elmo, Stillwater, and Stillwater Township, Minnesota

WHEREAS, this improvement will reconstruct CSAH 15 as a four-lane divided roadway; and

WHEREAS, State Aid Standards do not allow parking on four-lane roadways with a speed limit in excess of 45 mph. The current speed limit is 55 mph and is expected to remain the same after reconstruction; and

WHEREAS, Washington County staff supports this restriction; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Statute 169.04 (1) allows the county to regulate the standing or parking of vehicles on highways under its jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, CSAH 15 is under the jurisdiction of Washington County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the parking of motor vehicles shall be prohibited on both sides of CSAH 15, from Trunk Highway 36 to 0.25 mile north of CSAH 12.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the County Engineer to install and maintain the appropriate signs to delineate this parking restriction.

 Approval to allow the Parks Director to use up to 20 annual vehicle permits to promote and market the Washington County Parks Division.

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:05 a.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Hegberg, Stafford, and Kriesel. Absent none. Board Chair Hegberg presided. # **COMMUNITY SERVICES**

#### Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans Agreement

Kathy Vitalis, Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans (MAC-V) Executive Director, presented information regarding MAC-V. They assist veterans in transitional and permanent housing, eviction prevention, mortgage foreclosures, utility payments, transportation, food vouchers, clothing vouchers, employment assistance, tax and legal referrals, case management, and network of providers for referrals. She also requested that the Family Homelessness Prevention and Assistance Program grant funds that they received from Washington County in the amount of \$38,500 be reallocated to another organization because they were able to serve Washington County veterans through other federal and state sources.

Commissioner Peterson moved to terminate the agreement with Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans for Family Homelessness Prevention and Assistance Program funds. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

#### **Salvation Army Homeless Prevention Assistance**

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve an agreement with the Salvation Army to provide homeless prevention assistance with Family Homelessness Prevention and Assistance Program funding in the amount of \$38,500. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

#### PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

# Comments of Adequacy of the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Xcel Energy Ash Landfill Project in West Lakeland Township

Mike Welling, County Surveyor, reviewed the comments submitted to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, yesterday, May 5, 2008 regarding the adequacy of the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Xcel Energy Ash Landfill Project in West Lakeland Township.

Commissioner Kriesel stated that he also sent a letter to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency yesterday reiterating the request of West Lakeland Township that the final EIS contain a thorough analysis of the alternative sites to the one being proposed; and also, that an independent confirmation of the cost comparison of the alternatives listed in the draft EIS be conducted and included in the final EIS.

Commissioner Kriesel moved that the comments he submitted to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency be included as part of the county's comments regarding the adequacy of the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Xcel Energy Ash Landfill Project in West Lakeland Township as follows: reiterate the request of West Lakeland Township that the final EIS contain a thorough analysis of the alternative sites to the one being proposed; and, that an independent confirmation of the cost comparison of the alternatives listed in the draft EIS be conducted and included in the final EIS. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve the county comments submitted on May 5, 2008 regarding the adequacy of the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Xcel Energy Ash Landfill Project in West Lakeland Township. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

### **Household Hazardous Waste Facility Project**

Commissioner Stafford moved to approve a contract with Oertel Architects in the amount of \$299,000 to provide architectural and engineering services for the Household Hazardous Waste Facility Project. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

# Update on Campus 2025 Improvements and Change Order #1 with Veit and Company

Don Theisen, Public Works Director, presented an update on the Campus 2025 project. He noted the budget allocated for this project is on track. The schedule is to finish the Law Enforcement Center in May, 2009; the Courts Tower, June, 2009; North Wing 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, May 7, 2010; and the North Wing 1<sup>st</sup> floor, December 31, 2010.

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve Change Order #1 to a contract with Veit & Company, Inc. in the amount of \$93,870 for resistance piers and micropiles installed in the Law Enforcement Center building. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

# 2008 Public Works Transportation Division Construction and Maintenance Projects

Wayne Sandberg, Deputy Public Works Director, presented an overview of 2008 construction and maintenance projects including: CSAH 13, Radio Drive – project started in 2007 and will finish the tunnels, grading, landscaping final paving striping, with a grand opening in June; CSAH 18 bridge - is one of two structurally deficient bridges under county jurisdiction; there will be a 110 day construction period and it will remain open to traffic one way with signal and construction will begin after Memorial day; CSAH 18 reconstruction - parkway style design with three roundabout intersections; joint project with the City of Lakeland; project will start mid-June; CSAH 15 reconstruction - will be a four-lane divided roadway from Highway 36 to just north of CR 12; two additional traffic signals will be added; bicycle/pedestrian facilities; and access changes at six residential and two commercial driveways; CSAH 13 bridge lane - additional capacity for northbound Radio Drive; conversion of pedestrian way to travel lane; joint project with the City of Woodbury to construct south frontage road; and an additional turn lane to 3rd Street in Oakdale; CSAH 16/25 (Century Avenue) reconstruction – multi-year project, 2008 and 2009; Ramsey County lead agency; new schedule with no roadway work in 2008, but will do utilities, clear and grub, storm sewer, and crossings; road construction will begin in 2009 under traffic; Pavement preservation - CSAH 2, Forest Lake; CSAH 11, Stillwater Township; CSAH 13, Woodbury, CSAH 14, Bayport, CSAH 20, Cottage Grove, and CR 71, Afton/Denmark Township.

#### **Limited Use Permit**

Commissioner Stafford moved to adopt Resolution No. 2008-067 as follows:

Approval of MN/DOT Limited Use Permit Relating to Pedestrian Trail Along Interstate 94 at CSAH 13

WHEREAS, Washington County is a political subdivision, organized and existing under the laws of the State of Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, the Washington County Board of Commissioners has approved a plan that includes construction of a nonmotorized recreational trail in the right of way of Interstate Highway 94 to promote the orderly and safe crossing of the highway; and

WHEREAS, the State of Minnesota, Department of Transportation requires a Limited Use Permit for the construction and utilization of said pedestrian trail.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby enters into a Limited Use Permit with the State of Minnesota, Department of Transportation for the following purposes:

To construct, operate and maintain a nonmotorized recreational trail within the right of way of Interstate Highway 94 of the State of Minnesota from the south west ramp terminal to the south end of the south bound bridge along County State Aid Highway 13. Washington County shall construct, operate and maintain said trail in accordance with the Limited Use Permit granted by the Minnesota Department of Transportation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chair of the Washington County Board and the County Administrator are authorized to execute without further action of the Board the Limited Use Permit and any subsequent amendments thereto.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

# GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

#### Valley Creek Land Protection Collaborative Effort

Jane Harper, Principal Planner, reviewed the Valley Creek Land Protection Collaborative, which would consist of The Minnesota Land Trust, Belwin, and Washington County. She is also requesting that the county participate in an application to the Doris Duke Foundation for matching grant funds for land conservation efforts related to the Steltzner property (up to \$50,000) and Daley property (\$200,000) located in Afton along the Valley Creek Trout Stream.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve the county's involvement in the Valley Creek Land Protection Collaborative and approval of the county's participation in the application to the Doris Duke Foundation for matching grant funds for land conservation efforts. Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

#### Purchase of Pontius Property with Land and Water Legacy Program Funds

Ms. Harper reviewed the proposed purchase of the Pontius property located in southern Denmark Township.

A portion of this property will be a component of the trail segment between Point Douglas County Park and

the St. Croix Bluffs Regional Park. A conservation easement would be placed over the wooded portion of the property, creating, along with other projects along the St. Croix River, the potential for a two mile continuous ecological corridor from Point Douglas County Park north along the St. Croix River. Ms. Harper indicated there would be some reimbursement from the Metropolitan Council for the purchase price that is attributed to the trail portion.

Commissioner Peterson moved to approve the use of Land and Water Legacy Program funds to purchase fee title to the Pontius property; and adoption of **Resolution No. 2008-068** as follows:

# Resolution to Acquire Pontius Property for Washington County Parks Trails

WHEREAS, Washington County is interested in acquiring the property described herein in Denmark Township for inclusion into the Washington County Parks Trail System; and

WHEREAS, the owner has agreed to sell the property to Washington County; and

WHEREAS, the Land and Water Legacy Program has received application for this purchase and staff recommends this purchase for funding.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the officers of said county, including the Parks Director, County Engineer, the County Administrator and the County Attorney, shall proceed and are hereby authorized to proceed to acquire, by negotiations and purchase the Pontius property.

Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

#### **Legislative Update**

Jim Schug, County Administrator, provided a brief legislative update on the following items: the tax bill is being negotiated between the Governor, the Senate and the House; the House tax bill, which was approved, does include additional money for county program aid; the House tax bill brings the entire seven county metro area into the transit taxing district; the wheelage tax bill in the House now exempts all two-wheeled vehicles from the wheelage tax; the House tax bill also exempts construction material used in the North Star/Central corridor projects from sales tax; the short-term offender reimbursement has been compromised to around \$15 per day; and, in the MICA legislative update there was a reference to the fact that 8 day hold grants were not being used by Washington County, that was a misstatement, another county wasn't using those grants.

Commissioner Hegberg asked for information on how much the transit tax is on the real estate taxes.

#### **BOARD CORRESPONDENCE**

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

#### **COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS**

Commissioner Peterson reported on the AMC Legislative meeting last week. The State court system is doing a massive cutback in all of the courts throughout the counties.

Commissioner Kriesel reported on the Afton Planning Commission meeting that he attended last night to seek a permit for the 800 MHz Radio Stealth Tower. He commended Captain Pott for the great job he's done over the last two years trying to find a good fit for the tower in Afton. He's brought forth at least five different location scenarios over the past two years. Ultimately, it was decided that the county would pursue a stealth design tower which is in conjunction with Afton's existing ordinance. The Afton Planning Commission constructed 10 conditions of approval, which the county would comply with, only to see the vote turn out 5-3 against. He does not know what more the county can do when it is trying to comply with Afton's existing ordinance. This goes to the heart of not only the public safety and welfare of the citizens but of the law enforcement and emergency responders. There has to be a tower down there and this process has to move forward. The good news is this goes to the Afton City Council, and he's confident that those elected officials will do what's right and in the interest of its citizens, the lower valley citizens and the emergency responders.

Commissioner Stafford stated he visited the proposed site for the tower and feels that it is the most benign site he has ever seen. He does not believe people would know that tower is there unless they pointed it out to them. He hopes the Afton City Council realizes that the county has a duty to provide for the health and safety of its citizens and they cannot do that without a tower in Afton.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that he and Commissioner Kriesel also visited the proposed tower site last week. He didn't see how that tower could fall on anybody's home. He does not know how it could be made any more benign. He also reported on a press conference he attended held by Senator Vandeveer and Representative Dettmer regarding watersheds and their support of county board approval of watershed district budgets.

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Hegberg adjourned the meeting at 11:15 a.m.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that James R. Schug, County Administrator, be authorized to sign the Property Inspection Certificate on behalf of Washington County.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted 3-0; Commissioner Hegberg abstained; Commissioner Peterson absent.

# PUBLIC WORKS

# <u>Determination on Need for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet for an 800 MHz</u> <u>Telecommunication Radio Tower in the City of Afton</u>

The Board Chair presented a brief overview of today's hearing to determine the need for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet for the 800 MHz Radio Tower proposed by the Washington County Sheriff's Office in the City of Afton.

Captain Steve Pott presented a brief history of their efforts concerning the radio project in the City of Afton. The original plan for the county-wide plan contemplated a tall monopole on farm or vacant land. Their desire was to find sites that would provide the best service, and most effective coverage and connectivity for the system. They were aware that the Afton ordinance allowed a stealth design tower which is lower, but they felt it would be more appropriate for the performance of the system to look for a taller tower and a more traditional type tower. They talked with several landowners in the area they were interested in, and they were reluctant to cooperate due to some conversations and influences they had gotten from other residents of Afton. There was a property for sale, with lower ground than they had desired, but felt it was suitable for their needs. There were many construction challenges with that site. About that time he was advised by city staff that in order to move forward with a monopole of any type or size in Afton, they would need an ordinance change. They went before the Afton Planning Commission in December of last year, and they recommended against changing the ordinance to allow for a monopole. They went to the city council a couple weeks later, and the city council voted 3-2 to consider a change to the ordnance or a new ordinance, but they wanted to evaluate that along with an application for a site. Soon after that they received correspondence from the Sierra Club, the St. Croix Scenic Coalition and other groups that were opposed to a monopole of any type in the City of Afton. On December 27 they received a petition for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW). The petition identified the site as 15376 Afton Boulevard South. It was the piece of property they had been evaluating, but they had not made a purchase offer; however, the site was for sale and believes it is still for sale.

Captain Pott stated that the EAW petition cited that "the height and design of the tower and its location in a rural residential conservancy district and on steep and scenic bluffs, the proposal has the potential for significant environmental effects". Some of those things identified were the impacts on view sheds from CR 18 and also the impact of the view shed from the river. It also identified that there would be a need for an access road to access the tower. The petition also asserted that the Sheriff's Office refused to consider any other sites on higher ground and any other tower design. Captain Pott noted that their desire for the taller tower and monopole design was simply to make this site perform the same as other sites in the system. He believes most of the sites in the metro area are well over 100 feet tall. The original tower that they contemplated was about a 190 foot monopole on ground elevation of 1,000 plus feet. Also included in the petition were five sites that were recommended as alternatives. All of the sites with the exception of the Mount Hope Cemetery site were up in the Afton Hills area. All 25 of the signatures on the petition were from Afton Hill area residents. The Mount Hope Cemetery site may be a viable site, but there were two issues that needed more research. The microwave connection which is critical to the system probably cannot be achieved with a stealth design tower because the elevation is about 975 feet. They looked at the viability of putting in fiber, but it was estimated at \$500,000 to bury fiber. They also considered using Quest or Comcast resources but did not feel they were reliable or viable options for this project. There was also a question as to whether the city owned that property and it would have taken months if not years to determine who owned that property. Two of the sites did not have adequate tree growth to allow a stealth tower to be built. Another property led him to believe it would be a costly and difficult site. The only thing that would be above ground was the pine tree or monopine, the equipment structure would have to be underground and other issues with that site. The Morgan property is the site where they made application for the stealth tower. This property is as effective a site as any of the stealth sites that were identified. It meets their needs from a coverage perspective, it allows connectivity to the Woodbury tower, and the County Board approved a purchase agreement with the Morgans at the Board meeting last week subject to state, federal and local approvals for the tower.

Captain Pott stated the Afton ordinance goes to great length to protect the interests of the residents and the city. It is specifically geared toward cellular towers. There has been conversation as to whether it applies to the county or not, but they have chosen to continue down the road that even though it is a public safety radio tower they are bound by the requirements of the ordinance. On April 14 they made an application to the current city ordinance. Washington County was identified as the Responsible Governmental Unit for this EAW position. The County Board responded to the petition soon after it was filed by saying that the Board would consider it again when an application was actually made. They feel this application is significantly different to what was contemplated when the EAW petition was signed and filed. The issues of tree cover and slope do not exist on the property they have applied for. The property has good access from one side of the tree line they are hoping to use to mimic and hide the tower. The slope is about 9 percent, which is significantly different from the 18 plus percent slopes they were concerned about. The petition talks about its proximity from the scenic highway and the river. This particular site is about a half a mile from the closest point of CR 21 and it's even further from all of the other concerns identified in the petition. From hundreds or thousands of feet from the stealth

tower it will be indistinguishable. It will not be invisible as you get closer to it. The application was made and compliant with the information that they had at the time with the existing ordinance, and it uses one of the several sites recommended by the petitioners. For that reason, he asked that the County Board deny the request for an EAW for their tower project in Afton.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked who petitioned for an EAW, the city council? Captain Pott stated the petition is in the packet and Jon Erik Kingstad is the Representative of the 25 petitioners who are residents of Afton.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if the Board were to do an EAW, how long would it take, how much would it cost and who pays for it. Commissioner Hegberg stated that Ms. Pung-Terwedo would be the person to address that question, and she will be making a presentation shortly.

Commissioner Kriesel asked what is the extent of the base and the slab for the tower. Captain Pott stated the foundation is 38 sq. feet for the base. The generator would be sitting on a slab that would be about 80 sq. feet or less. The generator could be set on posts if the slab was an issue.

Commissioner Kriesel stated that the concerns raised in the petition have all been addressed by this new site and the stealth design. Captain Pott believes that many of them go away. The application they made is consistent with Afton's ordinance and believes their concerns have been addressed.

Commissioner Stafford stated he visited the site and spent quite a bit of time out there. He noticed that about 150 to 200 feet directly south of the proposed site the elevation increases quite a bit. Captain Pott stated that the highest point on this property is 982 and the issue with that site is the trees in that area are significantly shorter. The location they proposed takes advantage of the tallest trees. That elevation is 976.

Commissioner Hegberg asked if the 800 MHz is a state program? Captain Pott stated it is. Washington County will be the last of the metro counties to be on the system.

Commissioner Hegberg asked who provides the police protection services for the City of Afton? Captain Pott stated it is the Sheriff's Office by contract.

Ann Pung-Terwedo addressed Commissioner Pulkrabek's question. An EAW will cost \$3,000 to \$5,000 and it would take about three to four months to process. The cost would be paid by the Sheriff's Office with staff time to review and process the EAW.

Ms. Terwedo stated that in going back and looking at the data that was submitted in the petition for an EAW, the original tower was actually 199 feet tall and located at a different location than the one being discussed today. She displayed a map outlining the Afton Hills subdivision and the location of the site in the original petition and the location that has been selected for the proposed site. The site in the petition for an EAW was

for a 190 foot tower, monopole style and impacted the views. The tower being considered in the application is at a higher location, thereby reducing the height of the tower down to 88 feet 6 inches and making it look like a pine tree to blend with the environment.

Ms. Pung-Terwedo reviewed the petition in relationship to what the proposal is today and presented her findings relative to Minnesota Rules. (See memo to Washington County Board of Commissioners dated May 7, 2008 – Response to Afton Tower EAW Petition). Based on Minnesota Rules, and what the application is at the present time, staff recommends that the county deny the petition and make a negative declaration on the need for an EAW. They feel all the environmental issues have been addressed based on what the Sheriff's Office has done in trying to make a tower fit and blend in with the City of Afton.

Commissioner Stafford asked about Item 4 on Page 6 which talks about lights, reflectors, flashers, etc. Because of the height of the tower, it is not subject to the FAA lighting regulations. Ms. Pung-Terwedo stated that is correct, there are no lights on the tower.

Commissioner Hegberg asked that once the tower is built and as the surrounding trees grow, will the trees have to be trimmed because of the tower? Captain Pott stated that if the trees did in fact grow into the path of the microwave that would be an issue. He believes the trees have reached their maximum height.

Ms. Pung-Terwedo mentioned that an EAW is not mandatory for the height of this tower and it does not fit under the mandatory category under Minnesota Rules.

Frank Sando, 15318 Afton Hills, Afton – Mr. Sando stated that the petitioners for the EAW all live in the area where the location of the tower was. He never new about the petition until Captain Pott showed it to him the other day. The petitioners wrote that petition to get that tower, not stealth but a regular tower, off their properties. Then they walked around to this other area and showed Captain Pott the four properties on this side. He believes the petition was signed to get it off their property. Now it is back in his area. Mr. Sando stated he was not worried about the trees growing; they are worried about the trees dying. Then there will be an 88 foot stealth tower standing without any tree coverage. He does not believe this tower will be hidden from across Afton Hill's Drive. He asked how is a tree with a 51 inch base, when other trees in the area are 13 inches in diameter, a stealth tower. He believes this thing will stand out. Eight homes are on Afton Hills Court, four or five of them will be looking at that when they walk out their front doors. They didn't find out about this until April 17 in the newspaper. Now the county doesn't want to do an EAW because it will cost \$5,000 and take three to four months. The people on one side of the hill gave up the people on the other side of the hill. Mr. Sando stated they are all on private wells on Afton Hills. What impact will this have on wells, what goes into a tower like this. The Afton Planning Commission turned this down 5-3. He thought it would be nice if the County Board heard the comments made by the five people who voted against approving this.

Susan Sando, 15318 Afton Hills Court, Afton – Ms. Sando asked because they are on well, if there are any hazardous materials that would cause the aquifer to be ruined. Once the tower is up and it is made of plastic coated metal, does that plastic over time degrade and what would go into the soil with that. She stated there are no monopines in the State of Minnesota that they know of. In this climate, what happens to the material in making the towers and will that affect their soil. They live in a windy area on the hill and the wind through the branches, how will that affect birds or animals and will they be driven away. Also the noise from the generator, or the hum from the equipment in the garage; people may not hear it but how will it affect animals. She believes visually it does not look like a pine tree that is in their area. The visual impact on the neighborhood is horrendous.

Diane Dettmann, 15276 Afton Hills Court South, Afton – Ms. Dettmann stated she is here to ask the County Board to consider the need for an EAW on this site because this site is residential and it is a small lot. They are not a forested area. Her biggest concern is all of the unknowns that Frank and Susan have alluded to and mentioned. This area is not a forest. She asked what is the future of this site. Co-location is encouraged in Afton. Another tower could go up on the 1.6 acre lot with additional transmitters. In the EAW it asked for current and recent land use and compatibility. The current use of this land is residential. This tower is not compatible with the adjacent lands and that needs to be looked at. Water issues are addressed in the EAW. They would like more information on that. They want to know that their water resources are safe. Traffic was brought up on the EAW. Currently they live on a bad road in terms of its condition. It's one lane and narrow. She is also concerned about the safety issue with fuel being stored on site. Will there be a fence around this generator. This is a secluded area on this hill and there are no additional lights. Young people frequent this area and they like towers. She feels there are so many issues that need to be addressed more specifically. She feels that with the size of this project on this small residential lot an EAW should be considered and she asked for the County Board's cooperation on that.

Commissioner Hegberg asked about the generator—how large is it and what kind of noise does it make. Captain Pott stated that the ordinance specifically addresses the noise level and believes it is 65 decibels. All of the generators that he has been able to find and expects that would be bid as part of this project are quieter than that. There was concern about an explosion, file or leaking fuel—at the other sites the generators hold enough fuel for twenty-four hours of operation. They also have a double containment system so if there is some type of a leak the actual base of the generator contains the entire amount of fuel that is stored in the generator. The size of generator used at other sites is 35,000 watts.

Commissioner Hegberg asked about the material the tower is made of—he assumes the artificial tree is no different than an automobile as far as plastic covered material. Captain Pott stated it is his understanding that the towers are primarily steel and fiberglass. He does not have any information about the noise.

Commissioner Kriesel stated there was a concern about traffic. How often would a vehicle be there. Captain Pott stated that during construction there will be traffic and noise similar to building a house. As far as

ongoing traffic, once the system is up and operating it is basically a computer network that is connected by radio. A lot of it has remote diagnostics, and there are a significant amount of alarms that are available on the site including intrusion. There was a comment about kids climbing the tower. The towers are designed to minimize the opportunity for climbing without either ladders or bucket trucks. As far as ongoing maintenance—the radio system is a 15 voice channel. If they lose two, three or even a whole rack of those radios, they probably would not respond until the next day. If the entire site were to go down that would be a different story. So the middle of the night traffic would be insignificant. The service technician drives a passenger car and, not a big, noisy diesel.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if they get to pick the type of tree that will go in that area. Captain Pott stated that the Afton ordinance requires that it closely mimic trees in the area. As part of the application with the City of Afton, city staff would have to approve it before the bid was awarded. Examples shown at the Afton Planning Commission were older models and looked really bad. There are several different models of branches and needles available.

Commissioner Stafford stated that the generator has twenty-four hour fuel supply. Does that mean somebody has to come up there once a day and refill it? Captain Pott stated if it is running. The typical power outage would be a couple hours. It is a stand-by unit.

Commissioner Stafford stated that a question was raised about the life span of the surrounding trees. They are correct it is not forest. They all looked healthy, but he does not deny that some trees have a longer life than others. He asked is there a plan that could be implemented that would gradually replace trees, put some younger ones in now so the coverage will continue to be there. Captain Pott believes these are approximately 40 year old trees and he has no idea how long they last. There will be a challenge to put in any more trees. The city ordinance requires that the tower match trees that exist at the time the tower is built. The ordinance doesn't require the tower to come down if the trees come down.

Commissioner Stafford asked if Afton's ordinance define stealth as either a pine tree or a fire tower. Captain Pott stated the ordinance says "stealth design is a wireless communications facility that appropriately models or mimics in size, shape and color something in the immediately surrounding landscape which could legally be placed there at the time the application is submitted such as a silo in a farm setting or trees in forested land and is unrecognizable year round as an antenna or antennal monopole. It must be compatible with the historical, environmental and cultural character of the surrounding area".

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked how confident is he that this will pass when this goes to the Afton City Council, is approval contingent on county approval of an EAW? Captain Pott feels there is support for a tower that meets their ordinance. The Afton Planning Commission didn't actually recommend against the proposal, it voted against recommending approval of the application. Another issue that has come forward is there is discussion if there is a side-yard setback requirement. He is waiting for correspondence from the city

about that. The conversation he's had is they think it is a good proposal and despite some of the concerns of the neighbors, they think it's a site that does a pretty good job of being inconspicuous.

Commissioner Kriesel stated the County Board should be focusing on what's at hand and the political consequence of that. Who knows what that elected body will choose to do. He asked staff if what they have heard from the public today would change their recommendation that an EAW is not necessary? Also, if this is delayed three or four months what does that do to the system? Captain Pott stated the schedule for the implementation of the radio system contemplated the system being on the air in July of 2008, with final acceptance in August, 2008. Due to the difficulties they have had trying to find this site—most of the other 13 sites that are part of the system are either completed or near completion in anticipation of that July date. The new schedule is closer to February of 2009. If there are any further delays it would need to be added to the 2009 date.

Commissioner Kriesel stated that the rest of the system could be brought on line, but Afton would be without this service? Captain Pott stated the plan is not to turn it on until the system is complete. It would be difficult to have two systems running.

Captain Pott responded to comments he heard from the public. Regarding the public notice Mr. Sando mentioned that he read about it in the paper. They did meet all the notice requirements that the city has spelled out in their ordinance. It's been in the paper numerous times and perhaps it's one of those issues that unless it directly affects you it's not of interest. It is not a project that has moved forward under the radar. They had an open house in Afton that wasn't required to make everybody aware of what they were trying to do. He has spent many hours at the podium at Afton City Hall during Planning Commission meetings, and Council meetings. Regarding the co-location issue, he stated that the city ordinance requires co-location before another tower can be built in the city. As far as any co-location that would occur it would be subject to city approval. It's not as if the county can get the tower and then invite anybody they want and create some sort of a non-compliant facility. The reality is that this tower is so short compared to other towers that he does not know if it would allow co-location.

Ms. Sando stated that Captain Pott has told them that there has been at least one other property that just recently said to look at that property. There is another property that came back to him and said they were willing to talk. These are not residential areas and she would think that would be a much better option than destroying a residential area. She thinks Afton should have probably been first on the list to find a site. All the other sites are towers, water towers or existing antennas. Afton was the only one with a very restrictive code, they should have been looked at first and then build around it.

The Board Chair asked for further comments from the public; none were heard.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to close the public comment portion of this hearing to determine the need for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet for the 800 MHz Radio Tower proposed by the Washington County Sheriff's Office in the City of Afton. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

The Board discussed this matter.

Commissioner Stafford stated that the county's primary responsibility as a government is the health and safety of its citizens. This system will not work efficiently without a tower in Afton. It appears that nobody in Afton wants a tower. In visiting the site he feels it is the least offensive of any one he has been familiar with over the years. He cannot visualize this being a threatening structure.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to adopt Resolution No. 2008-071 as follows:

Denial of the Petition for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet (EAW) for the Washington County Sheriff's Office Proposed 800 MHz radio tower in the City of Afton.

WHEREAS, the Washington County Sheriff's Office desires to construct a 800 MHz radio tower in the City of Afton, Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Rule 4410.1100 requires the Responsible Governmental Unit to address a citizen petition for the need for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet when the Petition has been filed with and submitted by the Environment Quality Board to the designated Responsible Governmental Unit; and

WHEREAS, Washington County has been deemed the Responsible Governmental Unit by the Environmental Quality Board for the petition for an Environmental Assessment Worksheet; and

WHEREAS, the petition filed with the Environmental Quality Board requested that an Environmental Assessment Worksheet be prepared. The Petition's request was based on a different location and type of radio tower within the Afton city limits. The Responsible Governmental Unit reviewed the issues raised by the petition and those factors required to be considered under the Minnesota Rules as they apply to the location and tower in the application filed by the Washington County Sheriff's Office for the 800 MHz tower; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota Rule 4410.1100 requires the RGU to base its decision on whether there is evidence presented by the petitioners, proposer/Sheriff's Office, other persons or other additional information that demonstrates that because of the nature and location the 800 MHz tower, the tower may have the potential for significant environmental effects. The RGU is to take into account the factors listed in Minn. Rule 4410.1700 subp. 7 to wit:

- Type extent and reversibility of environmental effects;
- Cumulative potential effects of related or anticipated future projects;
- The extent to which the environmental effects are subject to mitigation by the ongoing public regulatory authority; and

The extent to which the environmental effects can be anticipated and controlled as a result of other available environmental studies undertaken by public agencies or the project proposer, including other EIS's.

WHEREAS, The 88 foot 6 inch radio tower is a "stealth" pine tree design. The pine tree tower will be 13-15 feet taller than the surrounding trees. The tree design is consistent with and will blend in with the surrounding vegetation of the Afton community and the St. Croix River Valley. The tower's location is outside of the St. Croix River District and does not destroy or effect the scenic landscapes, vistas, historic resources or roads in the Afton area, (specifically the tower is not seen from CSAH 18 as stated in the petition.) The stealth design of a pine tree is required and regulated by the Afton City Zoning Ordinance. The pine tree design would have minimal environmental visual impacts, and does not have lighting mounted on the tower. The tower would not be conspicuously visible from the number of scenic vistas, roads or landscapes in the Afton area; and

WHEREAS, the tower's stealth design and the site's specific's location was suggested by the citizen petitioners as "a feasible and prudent alterative" to the original site due to the location's higher base elevation. The higher elevation provides for a shorter tower and a tree stealth design that would not be visible from the scenic vistas, roads or landscapes; and,

WHEREAS, There will be no environmental effects or impact to the soil, trees or water but for one grouping of birch trees that will need to be removed. The birch trees are on the tower's property. The tower site does not require that an access road be constructed to provide access to the site. The location of the tower on the site does not consist of protected slopes of 18% or greater. The tower is located on a 9% slope; and,

WHEREAS, The site was evaluated by the Washington Conservation District for potential adverse water quality and erosion impacts. No environmental effect impacts were indicated by the Washington Conservancy District. The evaluation considered the need for a temporary construction access around the tower property's septic drain field, the addition of a permanent concrete tower pad and generator pad. It is determined that there will be no long term water runoff from impervious surfaces. If proper/routine construction practices are followed any adverse offsite impact would be easily avoided. There are minimal or no potential significant environmental effects to the soil, trees, slopes or water caused by the construction of the tower on this site; and

WHEREAS, At the present time there are no known future tower projects in the City to Afton, therefore there are no potential effects of related or anticipated future tower projects in the Afton community; and

WHEREAS, In its capacity as the underlying regulatory zoning authority, the City of Afton, can mitigate and address the extent of any possible environmental effects during its conditional use permitting process. The Afton city planner has recommended to the City ten conditions that must be complied with before the city would issue a conditional use permit. Any subsequent issues that comes up during the permitting process would be appropriately dealt with by the City of Afton. Therefore the local authority has the ability to mitigate any possible environmental effects; and

WHEREAS, The extent that the environmental effects can be anticipated and controlled as a result of other environmental studies undertaken by public agencies or the project proposer including an environmental impact statement, will be addressed by the FCC. The National Environmental Policy Act requires that as part of the FCC licensing review, an environmental assessment may be necessary. During this evaluation if the tower facility meets technical emission standards set by the FCC it is presumed safe; and

WHEREAS, based on the criteria in Minnesota Rules 4410.1100 and 4410.1700 subp.7, the 800 MHz radio tower project does not have the potential for significant environmental effects; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that based on the facts presented to the Washington County Board of Commissioners as the RGU, the citizens Petition for a request of an EAW for the 800 MHz radio tower in the City of Afton is denied and a negative declaration is made for the need for an EAW; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that based on the facts presented to the Washington County Board of Commissioners, the Board hereby makes a negative declaration with respect to the need for an EAW for the construction of an 800 MHz radio tower in the City of Afton; and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the citizen Petition request an EAW is denied.

Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

# **Big Marine Park Reserve Grand Opening**

John Elholm, Parks Director, provided an update on the Big Marine Park Reserve grand opening scheduled for June 7, 2008 beginning at 10:00 a.m. Also, the Historic Courthouse cannon dedication ceremony will be held on July 4, 2008 beginning at 10:00 a.m.

# **GENERAL ADMINISTRATION**

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update on the following items: the budget bill may result in either additional county program aid or a freeze on the amount of county program aid that was received last year; there is a possibility of levy limits; the Comfort Lake-Forest Lake watershed district becoming a 103B, which is a metropolitan watershed district, is still in the bill without the county's provision for county board approval of the budget; and the County Board did take a position with respect to the elimination of county approval on additions to DNR wildlife management areas, and the county position prevailed that there should not be one wildlife management area in the state that was different from the rest in requiring county board approval.

#### COMMISSIONER REPORTS - COMMENTS - QUESTIONS

Commissioner Pulkrabek stated he was disappointed that the Counties Transit Improvement Board has allowed Scott and Carver Counties to be non-voting members and have a seat at the table. The argument he kept hearing is that you need to have a seat at the table. Washington County residents will be putting in \$5 million to get a seat at the table and now Carver and Scott County get to play for free. He does not feel that is right.

Commissioner Kriesel agrees with Commissioner Pulkrabek's comments. He feels it is a disservice to the members of this Board that supported moving on to transit. He knows that he and Commissioner Pulkrabek are committed to make it successful, but they will be watching closing when they make decisions like that. He knows that both Commissioner Hegberg and Peterson spoke to that concern at their last meeting.

Commissioner Stafford introduced a new member of the press, Hank Long, from the Washington County Bulletin.

Commissioner Hegberg discussed the Counties Transit Improvement Board (CTIB) meeting that was held and Commissioner Peterson spoke to the issue of allowing Scott and Carver Counties a non-voting seat. The feeling of the board as a whole was that it will be a regional system and the Chair Peter McLaughlin from Hennepin County stated they wouldn't have any votes, and they wouldn't be able to speak unless they are recognized by the Chair. The by-laws haven't been completed, but there was discussion of allowing them to attend different committee meetings. Ramsey County felt that those committees were not necessary and that the full board should talk about the full project and he agrees with Ramsey County.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked how appointments to the Grant Evaluation and Ranking System (GEARS) Committee are made. He has had questions from local government officials who are interested in serving on that committee. Mr. Schug stated the law is fairly general and says that the elected city representatives, which is one from each county and then additional appointees for counties over 400,000 population, but those elected city appointees to the GEARS Committee are appointed through a meeting process that is convened by the Association of Metropolitan Municipalities AMM. No process has been set up and it is his understanding that at the June 16 meeting of CTIB they will have this on the agenda for additional discussion. The AMM will send a letter out to all of the metropolitan jurisdictions acknowledging that they will be convening this meeting and starting the process and getting interest. It is not a county appointment or CTIB appointment, it is an appointment by the Association of Metropolitan Municipalities. If the county wanted to make a recommendation, he assumes that there will be a group where you can send a recommendation with an applicant, but right now the procedure for making those appointment hasn't been established.

Commissioner Stafford explained that the composition of the Grant Evaluation and Ranking System (GEARS) Committee also has a Commissioner from each county. He noted that he is the interim Commissioner appointed to the GEARS Committee and since Commissioners Peterson and Hegberg are already members on CTIB, it would be important that either Commissioner Kriesel or Commissioner Pulkrabek be appointed as an alternate to the GEARS Committee. He likes the concept of getting Washington County's voice heard and it is a critical committee for defining the transitways.

Mr. Schug noted that an alternate needs to be appointed to the two Commissioners who are serving on the Counties Transit Improvement Board. As Commissioner Stafford mentioned, his is an interim role and it is likely that the GEARS Committee won't be getting to its work until later in the year. He would also suggest having a Commissioner alternate on that committee because there will be a lot of decisions and it would be important to have Washington County's situation and positions represented.

Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to appoint Commissioner Kriesel as an alternate to the Counties Transit Improvement Board. Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

Commissioner Kriesel moved to appoint Commissioner Pulkrabek as an alternate to the Grant Evaluation and Ranking System Committee. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent.

Commissioner Hegberg noted that the Law Enforcement Memorial will be held at noon on Thursday, May 15 at the Historic Courthouse.

#### **BOARD CORRESPONDENCE**

Board correspondence was received and placed on file.

#### ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to come before the Board, Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to adjourn, seconded by Commissioner Stafford and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Peterson absent. The Board meeting adjourned at 11:00 a.m.

#### **COMMUNITY SERVICES**

Commissioner Peterson moved to amend Washington County's 2007 Community Development Block Grant and HOME Investment Partnership Program Annual Action Plan to apply for a \$675,000 Section 108 loan for the Trailside Senior Living Project. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioner Hegberg abstained.

#### FINANCIAL SERVICES

Harley Will, Financial Services Director, presented the County Board with a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for the 2006 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. This award represents the 22<sup>nd</sup> consecutive year that the county has received this award.

#### PROPERTY RECORDS AND TAXPAYER SERVICES

Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services, reviewed 2008 legislation that included a new program providing a market value exclusion for property tax purposes for the homestead property of an honorably discharged veteran who has a service-connected disability rating of 70% or higher. The new statute is effective for taxes payable in 2009. The program provides the following market value exclusions: 1) veterans who are totally (100%) and permanently disabled are eligible for a market value exclusion of \$300,000; or 2) veterans who have a 70% or higher disability rating are eligible for a market value exclusion of \$150,000. In 2008, Veterans eligible must apply to the county by September 1, 2008 in order to be eligible for Pay 2009. In following years, a veteran would need to apply to the county by July 1.

#### **PUBLIC WORKS**

Wayne Sandberg, Deputy Public Works Director, reviewed the status and outcomes of the feasibility study for the removal/salvage options of Bridge No. 5600 located in St. Paul Park/Inver Grove Heights. The Bridge is still standing but is closed to traffic. Pedestrians on the Dakota County side still use this bridge. There is ongoing maintenance of this bridge including operation of the navigation lights and security concerns. In 2000 this bridge went tax forfeited and the US Coast Guard ordered that it be removed in 2001. The State of Minnesota now owns the bridge, however the counties manage property that goes tax forfeited. A feasibility study was needed because of the age and uniqueness of the bridge, alternatives to removal of the bridge needed to be investigated, costs, and to identify what agencies needed to be involved which includes approximately 30 thus far. The feasibility study will be concluded in June. Mr. Sandberg stated that Washington County is not considering the re-use of this bridge and feel that removal urgency is important for safety and obstruction reasons and to comply with the removal order. Dakota County is looking at re-use and have set a June 1 date to make a decision. Bridge 5600 is eligible for the National Register of Historic

Places and before it can be removed a Section 106 process has to be completed. A mussel survey will need to be completed and they are working with State Aid to identify funding for the removal. Current full removal funding is as follows: Minnesota Department of Transportation, 50%; Washington County, 25%; and Dakota County, 25%. An open house will be held on June 9.

Commissioner Pulkrabek left the meeting at 10:00 a.m.

# **GENERAL ADMINISTRATION**

Jim Schug, County Administrator, presented a brief legislative update on the following items: the tax bill and budgeting bill were approved this past weekend; there will be a levy limit for three years at 3.9%, but there are adjustments for 50% household growth and 50% of the commercial/industrial property increases due to new construction, and in addition, there are a number of adjustments that are made including bonding indebtedness payment, market value based referendum levy, increases in matching fund requirements, PERA employer contribution rate increases, and operating cost increases in the county jail; MICA was successful in getting all maintenance of effort requirements suspended during the next three years; there will be an increase in county program aid; the Metropolitan Transit Taxing District was not expanded to the entire seven county metropolitan area; the Housing and Redevelopment Authority levy authority was increased from .0144% to .0185% of taxable market value; the limit on economic development tax abatements was increased to the higher of \$200,000 or 10% of net tax capacity; there is a provision in the supplemental budget bill that would prohibit construction of the new ash disposal facility that Xcel was seeking in West Lakeland Township for a few years; corrections funding for short-term offenders was reduced—for the remainder of 2008 the county will receive \$30 a day for state prisoners who are housed in the county jail to serve out their last six months of their sentence and that will drop to \$11 or \$12 a day in 2009; there were cuts to the courts; there was an increase in exemplary damages for violations of the data practices act; and legislation was passed that allows county jails to return unused/unopened pharmaceuticals for credit.

#### **COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS**

Commissioner Peterson reported on the MELSA meeting she attended last week. There is great diversity on how libraries are governed in the Metropolitan area. There are now four county boards that have assumed the responsibility of being the Library Board, Scott, Carver, Washington, and Hennepin. She believes there will be issues that will come before the MELSA Board in the future that could have impacts on the counties' relationships.

Commissioner Kriesel reported on the Law Enforcement Memorial he attended last week at the Historical Courthouse. He mentioned that the Stillwater Historical Preservation Society is presenting the Historic

Courthouse with an award for preservation this evening. He will also be attending the Afton City Council Meeting this evening on the 800 MHz Radio System tower.

The Board recessed at 10:35 a.m.

WHEREAS, a corresponding layout showing the agreed-upon access locations has also been developed; and

June 3, 2008

WHEREAS, the implementation of the MOU and layout will bring access along the subject corridor into conformance with State and County standards; and

WHEREAS, the subject segment of Trunk Highway 61 is identified by MN/DOT as a road to be transferred to Washington County jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, the Hugo City Council has approved the MOU and layout.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby authorizes the County Board Chairman and County Administrator to sign the Memorandum of Understanding thereby signifying approval of the layout and MOU.

Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT

#### **Local Water Management Plans**

Commissioner Kriesel moved to approve the comments to the City of Oakdale and City of St. Mary's Point regarding their Local Water Management Plans and approve comment letters drafted on behalf of the Commissioners, to be signed by the Board Chair. Commissioner Stafford seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

#### GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

#### **Hugo Tornado Update**

Commissioner Hegberg moved to adopt Resolution No. 2008-078 as follows:

Resolution Declaring a State of Emergency

WHEREAS a Tornado on May 25, 2008, impacted the population of Washington County and the City of Hugo, Minnesota; and

WHEREAS the Tornado and Severe Thunderstorm event has caused a significant amount of public property damage; and

WHEREAS the Washington County Emergency Management program through the Department of Public Health and Environment requests the Washington County Board of Commissioners to declare Washington County in a STATE OF EMERGENCY for the Tornado event of May, 25, 2008;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners declares Washington County in a State of Emergency for conditions resulting from the Tornado event of May 25, 2008.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously.

Commander Cheri Dexter, Washington County Sheriff's Office, presented a brief overview of events that occurred immediately following the tornado that struck Hugo on May 25, 2008. Commander Daniel Starry, Commander Marvin Stutz, Commander Patrick Olson, and Emergency Manager Deb Paige were also in the audience and on site during this event. Commander Dexter noted that in addition to the Washington County Sheriff's office, 13 other law enforcement agencies responded immediately. Several different volunteer agencies were used during the week. She indicated the work couldn't have been done without them.

Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator, reported that residents, volunteers, city personnel and county staff came together, rolled up their sleeves, and got done what needed to be done. It was amazing to see the compassion, cooperation, and the dedication. The Sheriff's office was everywhere. She thought she was putting in long days, but Sheriff Hutton was always there before she was, and he was always there long after she left. She started taking phone calls Sunday evening to coordinate the Governor's visit. She pulled in Maggie Aitkens, Public Information Coordinator, who assisted Hugo in getting their website updated, made sure the information was accurate, helped develop flyers and newsletters that were delivered to the homes in the most critically hit area, and then developed talking points for the city officials. Public Health and Environment did an incredible job. Deb Paige and the Emergency Management Center were on site to provide guidance and as a resource to Hugo employees. Public Health staff helped out doing household hazardous waste collections, categorizing the waste and moving anything that might be hazardous out of that community. They also provided tetanus shots on the day of the event. Property Records and Taxpayer Services staff were on-site on Monday. They worked with the local city assessor and the Red Cross to categorize the homes that were either completely demolished or in such bad shape they will likely have to be demolished. Mr. Corbid and his staff also accompanied members of the Small Business Administration to determine if there might be some federal assistance. Community Corrections was involved. They had their Sentence-to-Service crews up there immediately Monday morning and they will be working up there through today. Sentence-to-Service crews have put in over 1,000 people-hours to help with the clean-up. Public Works helped with debris removal and swept the streets every night because of problems with tires popping as they ran over nails and other construction debris. Community Services has stood ready to help. The Red Cross gets in there and provides immediate assistance to the survivors of the tornado, but they may need more housing support and other safety net services, so Community Services will continue to be used in the coming weeks and months. The Information Technology Department helped staff set up the Emergency Operations Center in Hugo, and responded to computer problems. The geographic information staff helped do the maps that showed the path the tornado took across Hugo. Financial Services helped set up a tracking mechanism in case there is an ability to get some state reimbursement. Human Resources responded in terms of risk management. Commander Dexter mentioned that some vehicles were damaged. Commissioner Hegberg immediately contacted her on Sunday evening. He was out there almost all day Monday helping with the Governor's visit, and he was back on Tuesday.

The County Board commended staff, the City of Hugo, and all the volunteers who helped out in this crisis.

## **Big Marine Park Reserve Grand Opening**

Jim Schug, County Administrator, announced that the grand opening of the Big Marine Park Reserve is scheduled for Saturday, June 7, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The event will occur at the swimming beach. There will be a dedication ceremony at 10:45, a tree planting at 11:30, and a ribbon cutting at 11:45. There will be activities for families and children, music, an arts and crafts tent, rain garden and wildlife walks, a playground scavenger hunt, and a number of exhibits. The featured speaker will be Sven Sundgaard, the weather meteorologist for KARE 11 TV and former resident of Washington County.

Mr. Schug stated that the Metropolitan Council has issued an invitation to the County Commissioners for a meeting that will be held on June 19 from 8:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. at the Washington County Headwaters Service Center in Forest Lake. Discussion will include a district dialogue with the representatives of Metropolitan Council Sherry Broecker and Georgeanne Hilker.

#### **COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS**

Commissioner Peterson stated that next year Washington County will have the Chairmanship for the Association of Minnesota Counties Region X Board. This Board might want to discuss who it would like to represent the county in that capacity. She has had a lot of e-mails about the intersection of 70<sup>th</sup> and Hardwood and would like to discuss that with staff. She noted the passing of a long-time Cottage Grove resident Orv Gieser. He will be missed.

Commissioner Pulkrabek reported that he attended the Republican State convention last Thursday through Saturday. He attended a rally for Ron Paul which was held outside of the convention. The DFL convention will be held this coming weekend at the same place in Rochester.

Commissioner Stafford noted the passing of former County Administrator Neal Erdahl.

Commissioner Kriesel reported on a meeting he attended with the new Minnesota Department of Transportation Commissioner Tom Sorel and Deputy Commissioner Khani Sahebjam. Others attending were the County Administrator, Public Works Director; Stillwater Mayor Ken Harycki, and Stillwater Councilperson Mike Polehna. They discussed the Stillwater Bridge and it appears that the bridge could be started in 2014. In the next couple of weeks they will have that bridge inspection complete and it will be interesting to see what condition the Stillwater Bridge is in.

Commissioner Hegberg reported that the Sheriff's dive team will do clean up in Oneka Lake because a lot of debris was blown into the lake. He asked that the Hegberg Classic be listed on the agenda as an event because more than one Commissioner will be attending on June 16.

WHEREAS, the City of Afton Ordinance further requires "Upon abandonment or discontinuation of use the carrier shall physically remove the facility within 90 days from the date of abandonment or discontinuation of use."; and

WHEREAS, the City of Afton agreed to waive the Performance Bond requirement in lieu of a Resolution committing Washington County to pay all costs associated with removal of said tower, if the tower will no longer be used.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Washington County will remove said Public Safety Radio Tower when it will no longer be used.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Washington County will pay all costs for removal and restoration of the site as required by the City of Afton Ordinance.

 Approval to amend the Joint Powers Agreement with the State of Minnesota, Commissioner of Corrections, to house Minnesota Department of Corrections Offenders in the Washington County jail for a daily per diem extending the agreement through June 30, 2009.

WHEREAS, the County Law Library Board of Trustees recommends that the Self Service Center be returned to the Law Library, effective July 1, 2008; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners approves the transfer of the Self Service Center to the Law Library effective July 1, 2008, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Washington County Board of Commissioners authorizes approval of the agreement for the operation, management and funding of a Self Service Center.

WHEREAS, CSAH 18 between TH 95 (Manning Avenue) and CSAH 21 (St. Croix Trail South) is scheduled in the CIP for reconstruction in 2009 due to poor underlying material and pavement; and

WHEREAS, CSAH 18 from TH 95 to CSAH 21 in Afton is a naturally scenic roadway that is richly abundant in historical and environmental resources; and

WHEREAS, Washington County's Linear Park System includes the described segment of CSAH 18 in its system; and

WHEREAS, the designation of CSAH 18 as a Natural Preservation Route will allow the county to provide a balance between the needed safety and structural improvements and the preservation of historical and environmental resources; and

WHEREAS, the Afton City Council supports Washington County in designating CSAH 18, from T.H. 95 (Manning Avenue) to CSAH 21 (St. Croix Trail South) as a Type III Natural Preservation Route.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners hereby find that:

- The Type III criteria as defined in State Aid Operations Rules, Chapter 8820, are substantially met for this segment of CSAH 18 in the City of Afton.
- 2. The segment of CSAH 18 between T.H. 95 and CSAH 21 shall be recommended to the Commissioner of the Minnesota Department of Transportation as a Type III Natural Preservation Route.

The Washington County Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 9:00 a.m. in the Washington County Government Center, County Board Room. Present were Commissioners Peterson, Pulkrabek, Hegberg, and Kriesel. Commissioner Stafford absent. Board Chair Hegberg presided. Also present were James Schug, County Administrator; Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator; George Kuprian, Assistant County Attorney; Doug Johnson, County Attorney; Dan Papin, Community Services Director; Patrick Singel, Deputy Community Services Director; Mjyke Nelson, Information Technology Director; Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Rebecca Ault, Property Records and Taxpayer Services; Patricia Conley, Library Director; Don Theisen, Public Works Director; Wayne Sandberg, Deputy Public Works Director; John Elholm, Parks Director; Mike Rogers, Senior Planner; Chief Deputy Sheriff Mike Johnson; Lowell Johnson, Director of Public Health and Environment; Kay McAloney, Human Resources Director; and Maggie Aitkens, Public Information Coordinator II.

The Board recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### **COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC**

Senator Katie Sieben, District 57, reported on a recent trip to Washington D.C. to lobby for Midwest Regional Rail which consists of high-speed passenger rail. She indicated that many other states are already operating high-speed rail throughout the Midwest region. She feels it is time that Minnesota get on board and invest in high-speed rail. It is estimated that this project would bring over 1,500 permanent new jobs to Minnesota and have \$145 million of development potential. There is a concerted effort by other counties in Minnesota to have the proposed route come through Rochester and up into Minneapolis. She feels it is important to maintain the route up along the Mississippi River and up into the Twin Cities. She will be happy to work with the County Board to do whatever she can to assure that when high-speed rail does happen, that it will come through Washington County to benefit its residents.

Keith Carlson, Executive Director, Minnesota Inter-County Association, and Bob Vanasek and John Tuma, MICA Lobbyists, presented a report on the actions of the 2008 State Legislature and the impact on MICA county members. Mr. Carlson described how the legislature solved the State's budget deficit by raising tax revenues, raised non-tax revenues, had minor transfers from other funds, and the largest part of the solution was drawing down the State's budget reserve.

(Commissioner Pulkrabek left the meeting at 10:00 a.m.)

#### WASHINGTON COUNTY LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

John Kaul, Washington County Lobbyist, reviewed the 2008 State Legislative Session and its impact on Washington County.

#### **COMMUNITY SERVICES**

Wayland Campbell, Department of Human Services Director, Child Support Enforcement Division, presented a brief overview of the federally mandated review to measure and evaluate compliance with child support enforcement program requirements. Compliance with policy requirements in nine areas was examined during the review process, and Washington County achieved compliance in all areas. Mr.

Campbell presented the County Board Chair with a Certificate of Achievement for Outstanding Compliance with State and Federal Child Support Regulations as Measured in the Minnesota Self Assessment Review Process.

#### **Historic Civil War Era Cannon**

Commissioner Kriesel moved to adopt **Resolution No. 2008-090** as follows:

Proclamation on the Acceptance and Placement of the Historic Civil War Era Cannon

WHEREAS, the Muller Post, No. 1, of the Grand Army of the Republic of Stillwater donated a Civil War 8" Siege Howitzer to the Washington County Board of Commissioners for placement at the Washington County Courthouse in 1901; and

WHEREAS, in 1917 the Board of Commissioners donated the Siege Howitzer to the World War I scrap drive; and

WHEREAS, the American Legion, Post 48 of Stillwater donated a captured 105 mm German Field Artillery Cannon and carriage to the Washington County Board of Commissioners for placement at the Washington County Courthouse in 1932; and

WHEREAS, in 1942 the Washington County Board of Commissioners donated the German Field Artillery Cannon to the World War II scrap drive; and

WHEREAS, in 2008 a Civil War Flank Howitzer will be donated to the Washington County Board of Commissioners for placement at the Washington County Historic Courthouse.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners does hereby accept the donation of this cannon and proclaim its grateful appreciation to the volunteer "Cannon Committee" and the community donors who have made possible the acquisition of this historic cannon as a remembrance of the 1861–1865 Civil War that was fought to preserve the union of the United States of America; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners does hereby order the placement of this Civil War era cannon on the grounds of the Washington County Historic Courthouse in honor and remembrance of the Washington County residents and all Minnesotans who have served their country in all of the wars that have been waged to preserve and protect these United States; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Washington County Board of Commissioners places this cannon on this historic site with the hope that no cannon or other weapon will ever again need to be fired to preserve the union of the United States of America.

Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Stafford and Pulkrabek absent.

Jim Schug, County Administrator, announced that a dedication ceremony unveiling the cannon will be held on July 4, 2008 at the Historic Courthouse beginning at 10:30 a.m.

#### **July 1 County Board Meeting**

Commissioner Peterson moved to cancel the July 1, 2008 County Board meeting. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it was adopted unanimously; Commissioners Stafford and Pulkrabek absent.

#### <u>COMMISSIONER REPORTS – COMMENTS – QUESTIONS</u>

Commissioner Peterson wished Mayor Bill Hargis, City of Woodbury, the best in his upcoming surgery.

Commissioner Hegberg reported on the Metropolitan Council meeting held in Forest Lake last week. They discussed Section 8 affordable housing, affordable housing in general, transportation issues for the east side of the metropolitan area, and a new sewer station in New Brighton. He announced that the Forest Lake Library usage is up nearly 80% and it was estimated that it would be 30%.

Commissioner Kriesel asked about the Counties Transit Improvement Board (CTIB). He mentioned that the discussion with Metropolitan Council last week sounded like the numbers for the Red Rock Corridor wouldn't justify it. Commissioner Hegberg stated it probably wouldn't justify train traffic, but bus traffic would be best. Train systems need high density housing, and Washington County has tried to keep that rural atmosphere.

Commissioner Kriesel asked when the Grant Evaluation and Ranking System (GEARS) Committee appointments will be made. Commissioner Peterson noted that at the CTIB meeting last week the Association of Metro Cities announced the process for appointment to that. She believes the selection committee will meet at the end of this month.

(Commissioner Pulkrabek returned at 10:40 a.m.)

Commissioner Pulkrabek attended the Oakdale Summerfest this past weekend and rode in the parade with former mayors as Grand Marshall's.

# OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF APPEAL AND EQUALIZATION WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA JUNE 17, 2008

Kevin Corbid, Property Records and Taxpayer Services Director, addressed the County Board Members at 10:45 a.m. stating that the Assessment Division Staff was ready for the start of the County Board of Appeal and Equalization Meeting.

Commissioner Dennis Hegberg called the 2008 Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization to order at 10:45 a.m. with the following members present: Commissioner/Chair Dennis Hegberg, and Commissioners Myra Peterson, Bill Pulkrabek, Richard Stafford, Gary Kriesel, and Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke.

Chairperson Hegberg welcomed all attendees, and explained the power of the Board. The Board is not empowered to adjust taxes or unrelated issues - they will only deal with valuation and classification issues for the 2008 Assessment Year.

Property owners wishing to appeal were asked to make an appointment to appear by contacting the Assessor's Office prior to the appointment deadline. Five minute timeframes have been scheduled in which any relevant information pertaining to their appeal can be presented. The first appointment is scheduled for 10:45 a.m. The morning appointments will run through 12:05 p.m. At that time the Board will break until 1:00 p.m. The last appointment on the agenda is scheduled for 1:10 p.m.

Any property owner(s) in attendance who are not scheduled to appear on today's agenda will be heard at the conclusion of the scheduled appointments.

The County Board of Appeal and Equalization will consider any pertinent information submitted by a property owner along with the information provided by the Assessor's Office.

There will be a second meeting of the Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization to be held on June 24<sup>th</sup>, 2008 at 10:45 a.m. At that meeting, the Board of Appeal and Equalization will review the recommendations from the County Assessor and make a final decision on each appeal. If the property owner is not satisfied with final decisions of the Board, they may appeal to the Minnesota Tax Court.

County Assessor, Bruce Munneke, introduced the assessment staff in attendance: Sylvia Schreifels (Assessment Technical Support Supervisor and Recording Secretary for today's meeting); Rollie Huber (Deputy County Assessor); Al LaBine (Residential Supervisor); Don Lovstad (Residential Supervisor); Ann Miller (Commercial Appraiser), and Residential Appraisers Amanda Cundy, Mike Bjork, Sam Scott, Jason Langer, Tim Berggren, Sally Zoller, Lisa Janssen, Christy Hanger, and Senior Real Estate Technician Lynne Freezy

Kevin Corbid, Director of the Property Records and Taxpayer Services Department, and Larry Austin, Department of Revenue Representative, were also in attendance.

County Assessor Bruce Munneke welcomed everyone to the 2008 Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization. He stated that these proceedings bring to an end the 2008 Assessment. Payable 2009 Assessment Notices were mailed out in March. During this appeals period the appraisal staff received 1800 phone calls regarding value and classification. There were 19 Local Boards and four Open Book Meetings, starting on April 7<sup>th</sup> and ending on May 6<sup>th</sup>. Originally 62 persons requested appointments to appear today. Letters were sent to those applicants requesting pertinent information relevant to their appeal. The Minnesota Department of Revenue Property Tax Fact Sheet was also sent out to help applicants prepare their appeal.

County Assessor Munneke further stated to the Board that today there are 22 applicants on the agenda. This is their final step at the County level – Tax Court would be their next step. Notebook binders have been provided to the Board containing relevant information for each appeal.

Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke administered the oath to the Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization Members, and the required certification forms were signed.

CASE #1 – Denmark Township – (Parcel 31.027.20.33.0004 - Estimated Market Value \$420,300 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by James Eilers. Mr. Eilers is appealing the value of his property, and he provided handouts to the Board and Assessor that listed MLS sales of houses in Afton and Denmark. He indicated the percent of change between list and sales prices. He also commented that an appraiser had been out to his house and there had been discussion related to a reduction due to removing a lookout basement factor. Commissioner Kriesel asked him how current his sales information was, and Kevin Corbid commented that they should fall within the sales period at the end of 2006 through 2007. Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked if Mr. Eilers had copies of sales information. He indicated that with the information he used, he tossed out high and low sales and averaged the remainders. Commissioners Hegberg and Peterson suggested that he sit down with an assessor staff member today, and he also provide the appraiser with a copy of his research. Commissioner Pulkrabek commented that the Minnesota Revenue fact sheet for "Preparing an Appeal" is very helpful, and that owners can't just pull numbers from the internet.

CASE #2 - City of Grant - (Parcel 33.030.21.34.0003 - Estimated Market Value \$825,400 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Christine Flug at 11:05 a.m. Ms. Flug is appealing the classification of her property. She handed out maps to the Board and pointed out the areas in agricultural production claiming she measured those areas herself. She also stated she boarded horses, and had cows and chickens. Commissioners Hegberg and Pulkrabek commented on the State guidelines related to acreage in agricultural production, and income requirements. Ms. Flug stated the assessor only looked at old aerial

photos, and determined she was farming seven acres. She stated the amount of area being farmed since the aerials were taken has changed.

CASE #3 – City of Oakdale – (31.029.21.14.0050 – Estimated Market Value \$216,200 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by John Spadino at 11:10 a.m. Mr. Spadino is appealing the value of his property. He provided the Board and Assessor with handouts of comparable properties, and stated he went through the whole city of Oakdale. He referred to a substandard housing development in the vicinity of his house, and also spring water problems that affect his yard. Commissioner Pulkrabek commented that all his information will be looked at. Commissioner Stafford commented on the fact that his value was lowered \$8500 since last year. Mr. Spadino stated that others were lowered more. Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked him what he would want his value lowered to, and he stated at or below \$211,600.

CASE #4 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 12.032.21.32.0001 - Estimated Market \$516,200 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by William House at 11:15 a.m. Mr. House was accompanied by his son, and he is appealing the removal of agricultural classification from his property. Mr. House stated that it is a hardship to lose his agricultural rating. The property consists of 38.7 acres on which water plants are harvested, left to compost for one year, and then fed to worms to create nutrient-rich soil. He also harvests seeds from wild and native plants, and sells those seeds to nurseries and the State. Commissioner Peterson commented that it appears you are dealing with specialized plants. Commissioner Hegberg questioned the income derived, and Commissioner Kriesel asked if there were 10 acres in production. Commissioner Peterson stated that it is not the density, but what is generated, and that the assessor staff needs to go out and look again. The Houses commented that the assessors do not know what they are looking at, that they don't see animals, crops, silo, etc. Commissioner Stafford commented that this is a unique situation. Department of Revenue Representative Larry Austin commented that harvesting wildflower seeds may qualify for agricultural classification and they should contact the DOR. He also questioned if the wetlands/lake was meandered and how that would affect boundaries.

CASE #5 - City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 05.027.21.33.0064 - Estimated Market Value \$376,800 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Tanweer Janjua at 11:25 a.m. Mr. Janjua is appealing the value of his property. He had one copy of an appraisal from a real estate agent, and the Board asked for copies of that appraisal. The house was built in 2006, and Mr. Janjua paid \$417,500 for it. It is currently being assessed at \$376,800 which is \$40,700 less than he paid for the property. Commissioner Hegberg asked Mr. Janjua what he thought the property was worth – he stated \$300,000. Commissioner Stafford commented that would be about a 25% drop in value in two years. Commissioner Hegberg said they would look at his information and get back to him.

CASE #6 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 08.032.21.44.0075 - Estimated Market Value \$20,300 for Assessment Year 2008) (Parcel 08.032.21.44.0076 - Estimated Market Value \$21,100 for Assessment

Year 2008) (Parcel 08.032.21.44.0077 - Estimated Market Value \$163,600 for Assessment Year 2008) 11:30 a.m. Washington County Residential Property Appraisal Supervisor Don Lovstad read a letter from Leone Fulks at her request. The owner did not provide any information about area land values, or raise questions about tax rates. A specific concern was parcel .0075 which had an increase in taxes despite a decrease in taxable market value, but this was due to the fact it qualified for limited market value in payable 2007. Commissioner Hegberg questioned if the contiguous parcels were buildable.

CASE #7 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 15.032.21.22.0002 - Estimated Market Value \$1,299, 400 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Richard Tschida at 11:35 a.m. Mr. Tschida is appealing the value of his property. He owns 1.55 acres on Forest Lake with 213 feet of frontage. An inspection of the property this year resulted in several changes because records lacked a whirlpool tub and half bath, but an adjustment had to be made for usable square footage which in fact was vaulted space. Mr. Tschida presented photos to the Board that showed the drainage easement on his property. He also pointed out the issues caused by rain water being diverted, and sewage in his front yard due to a power outage. He gave the assessor information on comparables sold in the last 12 months. He claimed that his neighbors are not all being valued the same. He went on the say he has experienced a 400% increase in value in eight years and he is not convinced his 35 year old house is worth that value - he has structural damage, mold in the basement, etc. He presented more photos of his problems, and said his house could not be sold for the assessor's value. His neighbor's house has been on the market for a year and he has had no offers. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if the information on the comparables was given to the assessor. Commissioner Stafford asked if he had two sewer systems on his property.

CASE #8 – City of Lakeland Shores - (Parcel 02.028.20.11.0016 Estimated Market Value \$1,729,300 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by John Camp at 11:55 a.m. Mr. Camp stated he had difficulty connecting and talking to the assessor this past year due to the time he had been devoting to personal issues. He has an appraisal from last summer and also comps. He feels recent remodeling done on his house would not raise his value. Commissioner Hegberg recommended that he talk to the assessor and give him a copy of his appraisal

CASE #9 – City of Grant – (Parcel 21.030.21.22.0009 Estimated Market Value \$17,400 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by David Erickson at 12:00/noon. Mr. Erickson owns two parcels in the City of Grant. The parcel he is appealing is a vacant lot situated contiguous to his homestead. He claims this parcel is unbuildable as it does not meet minimum lot requirements. Mr. Erickson distributed handouts to the Board that tracked the historical EMV and taxable market values of the parcel along with the percentages of change. Commissioner Pulkrabek commented that the Board appreciates the thoroughness of his data, and asked if he had other values of unbuildable lots. The current value of this parcel is \$17,400, but Mr. Erickson wants it set at the 2007 value claiming it is landlocked, unbuildable, and the market is flat.

CASE #10 - City of Woodbury - (Parcel 13.028.21.33.0022 Estimated Market Value \$590,300 for Assessment Year 2008) Charles Jents was scheduled to appear before the Board at 11:30. Mr. Jents did not appear and the case is dismissed.

CASE #11 – City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 05.027.21.33.0042 Estimated Market Value \$430,900 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance at 12:15 p.m. by Alex Balandin. Mr. Balandin is appealing the value of his property, and he provided the assessor with a listing of similar homes in the area, some the same model, and with lower values. Commissioner Hegberg asked if those homes had the same builder, and suggested he have appraisal staff look at his comparable parcels that have the same builder.

Case #12 - City of Woodbury - (Parcel 13.028.21.33.0043 Estimated Market Value \$386,400 for Assessment Year 2008) Srinivasa Bukkuri was scheduled to appear before the Board at 11:40. Mr. Bukkuri did not appear and the case is dismissed.

Case #13 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 03.032.21.24.0001 Estimated Market Value \$802,600 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Madeline Frounfelter at 12:20. Ms. Frounfelter is appealing the value of her house, and the removal of agricultural classification. She stated the property has been farmed since 1981; she now leases two acres to a neighbor who raises alfalfa hay. Her income is \$500. Ms. Frounfelter also has pasture and a barn. She is adjacent to 15 acres of wetland. She made reference to a Legacy Program to which she applied, and following that her land value decreased but the value shifted to her house. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked her if she turned in an appraisal.

Case #14 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 09.032.21.42.0025 Estimated Market Value \$928,900 for Assessment Year 2008) Joseph Pribyl was scheduled to appear before the Board at 11:50. Mr. Pribyl did not appear and the case is dismissed.

Case #15 – City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 20.027.21.43.0004 Estimated Market Value \$1,905,300 for Assessment Year 2008) Blue Vessel LLC was scheduled to appear before the Board at 11:55. Blue Vessel LLC did not appear and the case is dismissed.

Case #16 - City of Woodbury - (Parcel 16.028.21.43.0056 Estimated Market Value \$341,200 for Assessment Year 2008) Eugene Zakharenko was scheduled to appear before the Board at 12:00. Mr. Zakharenko did not appear and the case is dismissed.

At 12:30 p.m. the County Board Members and others in attendance adjourned for lunch. The proceedings will reconvene at 1:00.

At 1:05 p.m., Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services, approached the podium and gave an update regarding proceedings for the afternoon. The Gregory Mitsch appeal is next on the agenda. The Diane Hoey appeal has been cancelled. The status of the Sunbelt Sales appeal is not known. At this point there are six "walk in" appeals.

Case #17 – City of Woodbury – (Parcel 13.028.21.22.0001 Estimated Market Value \$858,100 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Gregory Mitsch at 1:05. Mr. Mitsch is appealing the value of his property. He handed out an analysis done by a certified residential property appraiser. The area where his property is located now has sewer and water, and is rezoned for multiple residences. He referred to other similar sized parcels that are being valued less than him. His neighbor's acreage is valued at \$76,000/acre, and the Mitsch parcel is valued at \$103,000/acre. Commissioner Kriesel asked Mr. Mitsch what he thinks his property should be valued at, and he replied \$500,000 to \$600,000 total value. Commissioner Hegberg inquired about his access to his house – 200 feet off street. Two other five acre parcels near the Mitsch property are now being considered for redevelopment and splitting.

Case #18 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 07.032.21.42.0012 Estimated Market Value \$200,000 for Assessment Year 2008) Diane Hoey cancelled her appearance.

Case #19 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 07.032.21.42.0013 Estimated Market Value \$941,800 for Assessment Year 2008) Diane Hoey cancelled her appearance.

Case #20 - City of Birchwood - (Parcel 30.030.21.24.0015 Estimated Market Value \$313,000 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Brian Hunder at 1:15 p.m. Mr. Hunder is appealing the value of his property. He looked at other properties in the area, and also talked to his assessor. Many of the comparable parcels that sold were distressed sales according to the assessor. Sales such as such as foreclosures or relocations are not looked at as comparables because they are not considered an "arms length transaction". Commissioner Hegberg asked for copies of the information that Mr. Hunder brought in for the Board Meeting.

Case #21 – City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 17.027.21.13.0093 Estimated Market Value \$234,100 for Assessment Year 2008) Sunbelt Sales was scheduled to appear before the Board at 1:10 p.m. Sunbelt Sales did not appear and the case is dismissed.

Case #22 – City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 17.027.21.13.0102 Estimated Market Value \$426,500 for Assessment Year 2008) Sunbelt Sales was scheduled to appear before the Board at 1:10 p.m. Sunbelt Sales did not appear and the case is dismissed.

Walk In # 1- City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 21.032.21.24.0016 Estimated Market Value \$383,500 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Kyle Severson at 1:20. Mr. Severson is appealing his value. He gave handouts to the Board containing information on ten comparable parcels. Mr. Severson did not attend the Forest Lake Local Board of Appeal and by Statute cannot appeal at the County Board level. Deputy Administrator/ Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked Mr. Severson if he would allow an appraiser out to his house. The 2009 value for payable 2010 will be looked at.

Walk In #2 – City of Woodbury – (Parcel 05.028.21.42.0038 Estimated Market Value \$327,600 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance at 1:25 by Darren Castro. Mr. Castro is appealing the value of his property. He handed out information to the Board and appraisal staff. An adjustment had previously been made to his property lowering it from \$369,000 to \$327,600. Mr. Castro stated the area where his property is located is basically entry level owners. His handouts included information on market trends, foreclosures and how home values were being affected. He stated that some of his comparables sold less that the assessor's value so he assumes his value is also off. Commissioner Hegberg thanked Mr. Castro for the information provided to the Board.

Walk In #3 - City of Newport - (Parcel 36.028.22.31.0017 Estimated Market Value \$280,800 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Christine Heuer at 1:35 p.m. Ms. Heuer is appealing the value of her property. She recently purchased the property in June of 2008, and it was a foreclosure sale. She brought a copy of her appraisal and Commissioner Hegberg requested a copy for the Board.

Walk In #4 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 20.032.21.31.0003 Estimated Market Value \$1,051,300 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Ben Shardlow for Headwaters Industrial at 1:40 p.m. The value of this property is being appealed. A representative of Headwaters attended the Local Board in Forest Lake, and has been in communication with the assessor. Additional consideration is being requested for the wetlands, the parcel is landlocked, and there is a City assessment of \$124,000 for streets, utilities and improvements.

Walk In #5 – City of Oakdale – (Parcel 32.029.21.11.0059 Estimated Market Value \$390,000 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Karl Evert at 1:45 p.m. Mr. Evert is appealing the value of his property. This property was previously reduced from \$429,600 to \$390,000. Mr. Evert feels that assessing practices aren't taking into account the current market. He purchased this property last summer and had an assessor out in the fall. Mr. Evert also attended an Open Book Meeting for Oakdale, and stated that the assessor told him there was no decline in Oakdale values. Commissioner Pulkrabek commented that he lives in a nice neighborhood. Mr. Evert gave handouts to the Board with information on six sales, and additional information on market trends from the Minneapolis Area Association of Realtors. Since the market has declined, he questioned his value now versus what he paid one year ago.

Walk In #6 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 01.032.21.32.0002 Estimated Market Value \$328,800 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Mike Riley at 1:55 p.m. Mr. Riley is appealing the change in classification of his property from agricultural to residential. He asked why his agricultural classification was not an issue for 23 years. He confirmed that only seven to eight acres are tillable. He is not disputing that he does not have 10 acres in production, but his change in classification happened so fast that he needs time for a fix to meet requirements. Commissioner Hegberg asked Mr. Riley about his agricultural income, but Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services, clarified the income requirement pertains to property in the green acres program.

Walk In #7 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 01.032.21.24.0004 Estimated Market Value \$384,000 for Assessment Year 2008) (Parcel 01.032.21.24.0005 Estimated Market Value \$51,500 for Assessment Year 2008) (Parcel 01.032.21.24.0006 Estimated Market Value \$157,400 for Assessment Year 2008) Appearance by Kirk Almendinger at 2:05 p.m. Mr. Almendinger is appealing the change in classification on his parcels from agricultural to residential. He stated that he has talked to his attorney. He feels he qualifies for the agricultural class due to acres and income, but may not qualify for green acres. The assessor determined that there are approximately six acres in production, thus per Minnesota Statute – the parcels fail to qualify for the agricultural classification.

At 2:10 Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services stepped up to the podium to address a few housekeeping issues. He asked that the Commissioners leave their notebook binders and that updates will be added for next week's meeting. All walk in appearances will be checked to verify if they appeared at their Local Board.

Commissioner Stafford questioned County Assessor Munneke on the rise and decline in the market. He also asked the Assessor if distressed sales are used.

Commissioner Pulkrabek complimented the assessors on their job and dealing with the public.

Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked the Commissioners what they want to see next week, i.e. sales/comparables, attorney opinions, etc. She also commented that Commissioner Stafford would not be attending the Board next week, but he has taken notes and made comments.

Commissioner Kriesel asked that the assessor provide sales comparables as offsets for the distressed sales.

Commissioner Peterson commented that there are people whose property is mortgaged more than their current worth, they made poor decisions, and now there are bank sales. She also asked that the assessor pay attention to the agricultural special use appeal.

At 2:20 Commissioner Hegberg asked if there were any more cases to be heard. Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services, asked for a motion to recess. Commissioner Myra Peterson made the motion to recess. Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer, seconded the motion. All Board Members were in favor, and the motion carried.

## WASHINGTON COUNTY 2008 COUNTY BOARD OF APPEAL AND EQUALIZATION 2<sup>ND</sup> MEETING JUNE 24, 2008

Commissioner Hegberg called the 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization to order at 11:05 a.m. The following members were present: Commissioner/Chairperson Dennis Hegberg; Commissioners Gary Kriesel, Myra Peterson, Bill Pulkrabek, and Molly O'Rourke, Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer.

The assessment staff in attendance today are: County Assessor Bruce Munneke, Assessment Technical Support Supervisor/Recording Secretary for today's meeting Sylvia Schreifels, Deputy County Assessor Rollie Huber, Residential Supervisors Al LaBine and Don Lovstad. Also in attendance are County Administrator James Schug, and Property Records/Taxpayer Services Director Kevin Corbid.

Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Tax Payer Services stepped up to the podium to give a brief summary of last week's meeting. 22 appointments were scheduled and there were nine "no shows" of the 22. There were seven "walk in" appeals. Property owners who cancelled their appeal or did not appear for their appointment at last week's County Board of Equalization Meeting - their case is considered closed. Regarding active appeals, all additional information presented to the assessor since the last meeting was reviewed by the assessor before he made his recommendations, and updated notebook binders that contain information and recommendations have been delivered to the Board.

County Assessor Bruce Munneke will summarize each appeal including the seven "walk ins", and we will need motions from the Board.

The Board has also been given copies of the spreadsheets required by the Department of Revenue that contain information on all of the County Board Maintenance Changes and Open Book Meeting Changes. The County Board Changes are changes made in Local Board areas, but the property owners did not receive Amended Notices ten days prior to their meeting. Also some changes are due to a change in a neighborhood that carried over to other properties in the neighborhood. Approval of these changes can be handled as a group or the Board may choose to handle some individually.

Appeal #5 has an updated Narrative. Additional handouts for the Board include a copy of an e-mail from County Attorney George Kuprian in response to a request from Commissioner Dennis Hegberg who asked Attorney Kuprian to analyze the issue of what constitutes agricultural land for purposes of the 2a property tax classification. Also a copy of Minnesota Statute 274.01 is being handed out for the Board's reference.

The Resolution Form and County Board Certification Forms will need to be signed by the Board Members before the Board adjourns at the conclusion of today's meeting.

CASE #1 – Denmark Township – (Parcel 31.027.20.33.0004 - Estimated Market Value \$420,300 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a two story single family residential house. The owners, James and Deborah Eilers, are requesting a reduction in value. The assessor has recommended that the value be reduced from \$420,300 to \$417,800 due to removing a lookout basement factor. Commissioner Pulkrabek made a motion to approve the assessor's recommendation. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion and it carried.

CASE #2 - City of Grant - (Parcel 33.030.21.34.0003 - Estimated Market Value \$825,400 for Assessment Year 2008) The owner of this property, Christine Flug, is appealing the change in classification from agricultural to residential. It is the assessor's recommendation that the property receive a split classification, carving out a portion to be commercial due to her horse boarding operation. Since the remaining land does not total the 10 or more acres in agricultural production which is required for an agricultural classification, it will be classified as residential. A homestead update was sent out to the property and returned to the assessor as undeliverable. Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke questioned the change in homestead status, but since the owner does not occupy the property, the residential portion will not receive homestead status. Commissioner Pulkrabek made a motion to accept the assessor's recommendations. Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

CASE #3 – City of Oakdale – (31.029.21.14.0050 – Estimated Market Value \$216,200 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a single family split level house owned by John and Cyndra Spadino. Commissioner Pulkrabek questioned why one of the owner's comparables was not used, but it was not a sale. The owner has not presented any supporting documentation for his appeal, so the assessor has recommended that there be no change to the current value of \$216,200. Commissioner Peterson made the motion to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if all the people appealing are sent letters informing them of the decisions being made at this final meeting. County Assessor Munneke said they are sent letters, a number to call with questions, and information on appealing to Tax Court.

CASE #4 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 12.032.21.32.0001 - Estimated Market \$516,200 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is owned by Mr. William House, who is appealing the change in classification of his 38.7 acres from agricultural to residential. The assessor has now recommended a change from residential to agricultural classification. Commissioner Peterson made a motion to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

CASE #5 - City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 05.027.21.33.0064 - Estimated Market Value \$376,800 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a two story single family residential home owned by Tanweer Janjua. The owner had presented comparables, but made no adjustments to account for differences in characteristics. After reviewing the subject property and performing a sales comparable analysis, the assessor recommends no change to the 2008 estimated market value. Commissioner Hegberg made a motion to accept the assessor's recommendation of no change, and the motion was seconded by Commissioner Pulkrabek. The motion carried.

CASE #6 – City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 08.032.21.44.0075 - Estimated Market Value \$20,300 for Assessment Year 2008) (Parcel 08.032.21.44.0076 - Estimated Market Value \$21,100 for Assessment Year 2008) (Parcel 08.032.21.44.0077 - Estimated Market Value \$163,600 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a single family residential rambler situated on 0.62 acres over three parcels. The owner, Leone Fulks, is questioning her tax amount, and did not provide any information about area land values. The assessor has recommended no change to the 2008 market value. Commissioner Peterson made a motion to accept the assessor's recommendation and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

CASE #7 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 15.032.21.22.0002 - Estimated Market Value \$1,299, 400 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a modified two story single family residential parcel located on Forest Lake. The owner, Richard Tschida, disputes his value due to the drainage easement located on his land, and he presented a list of sales of improved properties on water which the assessor did not consider as comparables. The assessor recommends the value be adjusted from \$1,299,400 to \$1,274,900 due to a correction to records involving a whirlpool tub, half bath, and vaulted space. Commissioner Peterson made the motion to accept the assessor's recommendation. Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion and it carried.

CASE #8 – City of Lakeland Shores - (Parcel 02.028.20.11.0016 Estimated Market Value \$1,729,300 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a two story single family residential parcel, owned by John Camp. The assessor made an interior inspection of the house on June 18<sup>th</sup> and reviewed a fee appraisal submitted by Mr. Camp. The assessor is recommending a reduction in the current 2008 market value of \$1,729,300 to \$1,607,400. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried. Commissioner Peterson asked for

clarification regarding when a building permit is filed – what is the difference between improvement versus replacement, and how does it affect value?

CASE #9 – City of Grant – (Parcel 21.030.21.22.0009 Estimated Market Value \$17,400 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a piece of vacant land contiguous to David Erickson's home site. The assessor reviewed the property and valued it along with the property owner's contiguous improved parcel taking into consideration that it will be treated as one building site. This parcel located in Grant – the first acre has a site value and all excess that is not waste or water, is valued at \$15,000 per acre. Mr. Erickson's payable 2008 value is being abated on this parcel due to information received about it being unbuildable. The 2008 estimated market value will remain at \$17,400. Commissioner Peterson made a motion to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion. The motion carried.

CASE #10 - City of Woodbury – (Parcel 13.028.21.33.0022 Estimated Market Value \$590,300 for Assessment Year 2008) Charles Jents was scheduled to appear before the Board at 11:30 on June 17<sup>th</sup>. Mr. Jents did not appear, and the assessor recommends no change. Commissioner Peterson made a motion to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

CASE #11 – City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 05.027.21.33.0042 Estimated Market Value \$430,900 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a two story residential parcel, owned by Alex Balandin. The assessor recommends that the value remain at \$430,900 due to sales of similar homes in the area. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Case #12 – City of Woodbury – (Parcel 13.028.21.33.0043 Estimated Market Value \$386,400 for Assessment Year 2008) Srinivasa Bukkuri was scheduled to appear before the Board at 11:40 on June 17<sup>th</sup>, but Mr. Bukkuri did not appear. The assessor is recommending no change. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Case #13 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 03.032.21.24.0001 Estimated Market Value \$802,600 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a modified two story house located on 28 acres. The owner, Madeline Frounfelter, has appealed both valuation and classification. The assessor has adjusted values to reflect the area of sub-marginal land, and is recommending a reduction of the 2008 market value of \$802,600 to \$682,300. Commissioner Kriesel moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Case #14 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 09.032.21.42.0025 Estimated Market Value \$928,900 for Assessment Year 2008) Joseph Pribyl was scheduled to appear before the Board at 11:50 on June 17<sup>th</sup>. Mr.

Pribyl did not appear. The assessor recommends no change. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Case #15 – City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 20.027.21.43.0004 Estimated Market Value \$1,905,300 for Assessment Year 2008) Blue Vessel LLC was scheduled to appear before the Board at 11:55 on June 17<sup>th</sup>. Blue Vessel LLC did not appear and the assessor recommends no change due to the fact a minimum assessment agreement was signed on this property August 8, 2006. This case was dismissed.

Case #16 - City of Woodbury - (Parcel 16.028.21.43.0056 Estimated Market Value \$341,200 for Assessment Year 2008) Eugene Zakharenko was scheduled to appear before the Board at 12:00 on June 17th. Mr. Zakharenko did not appear, and the assessor is recommending no change. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Case #17 – City of Woodbury – (Parcel 13.028.21.22.0001 Estimated Market Value \$858,100 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a two story single family residential house located on a land area of 219,107 square feet. The owner, Gregory Mitsch, is appealing the value of his property. The assessor feels the parcel is equitable with other five acre parcels within the City of Woodbury that are able to be developed, and therefore is recommending no change. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Case #18 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 07.032.21.42.0012 Estimated Market Value \$200,000 for Assessment Year 2008) Diane Hoey cancelled her appearance on June 17<sup>th</sup>, therefore the assessor is recommending no change. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the recommendation of no change, it was seconded, and the motion carried.

Case #19 - City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 07.032.21.42.0013 Estimated Market Value \$941,800 for Assessment Year 2008) Diane Hoey cancelled her appearance on June 17<sup>th</sup>, therefore the assessor is recommending no change. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the recommendation of no change, it was seconded, and the motion carried.

Case #20 - City of Birchwood - (Parcel 30.030.21.24.0015 Estimated Market Value \$313,000 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a rambler style, classified single family residential. The owner Brian Hunder, is appealing the value of his property. The assessor stated that the comparable sales provided by Mr. Hunder were either foreclosures or relocations, thus not representing "arm's length sales". The assessor is recommending no change to the 2008 value. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Case #21 – City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 17.027.21.13.0093 Estimated Market Value \$234,100 for Assessment Year 2008) Sunbelt Sales was scheduled to appear before the Board at 1:10 p.m. on June 17<sup>th</sup>. Sunbelt Sales did not appear nor did they provide any supporting documentation. The assessor felt the owner was more concerned with tax consequences versus valuation. The assessor is recommending no change. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke seconded the motion. The motion carried and the case is dismissed.

Case #22 – City of Cottage Grove – (Parcel 17.027.21.13.0102 Estimated Market Value \$426,500 for Assessment Year 2008) Sunbelt Sales was scheduled to appear before the Board at 1:10 p.m. on June 17<sup>th</sup>. Sunbelt Sales did not appear nor did they provide any supporting documentation. The assessor felt the owner was more concerned with tax consequences versus valuation. The assessor is recommending no change. Commissioner Peterson moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke seconded the motion. The motion carried and the case is dismissed.

Walk In # 1- City of Forest Lake - (Parcel 21.032.21.24.0016 Estimated Market Value \$383,500 for Assessment Year 2008) The assessor's recommendation to the Board is for no change to the market value of Mr. Severson's property. He did not attend the Forest Lake Local Board of Appeal, and by State Statute the County Board of Appeal does not have authority to make changes to his property. Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked if an appraiser had looked at his house, and what value did they come up with? County Assessor Bruce Munneke responded that it has to be looked at for a 2009 payable 2010 value. Kevin Corbid, Director of Property Records and Taxpayer Services referred to Minnesota Statute, and stated the Board cannot take action on Mr. Severson's appeal, and that a Department of Revenue Representative who attended last week's Board confirmed this. Mr. Severson purchased this property in April of 2008, and claims he did not receive a Valuation Notice for his property, and that is why he did not attend the Forest Lake Local Board. Additionally Mr. Severson is interpreting the Statute differently stating that since he did not receive a Valuation Notice an exception has to be made for his appeal. Commissioner Peterson also agrees that he should be allowed to appeal, and commented that she disagrees with the Statute. Commissioner Hegberg commented that Mr. Severson closed on his property 4/15/2008, but it was not recorded until 4/29/2008 which was well after the Valuation Notices were mailed out. According to who was on record as the owner, the Notice was mailed to where it should have been mailed, and that was the Bank because this was a bank foreclosure sale. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if we could hold this appeal and look at it later. Commissioner Peterson said that since it was a bank sale, it was a distressed sale. Commissioner Hegberg stated that Mr. Severson cannot appeal to the Board. Commissioner Kriesel asked if there were comparables, and County Assessor Bruce Munneke said there was no sales analysis. Property Records Taxpayer Services Director Kevin Corbid said that the Board must complete their work today. Mr. Severson was not on the Forest Lake sign in sheet at their Local Board, and if a change was submitted to the Department of Revenue for him, it would be rejected. The Board asked for

an explanation of the appeal processes for Local Board of Review versus Open Book. It is each municipality's decision as to what process they choose. Commissioner Pulkrabek made a motion to accept the staff's recommendation, but the motion was not moved on. Mr. Severson stated that he will be going to Tax Court and will ask for reimbursement of filing fees and for his time. Deputy Director/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked if there was any precedent for Tax Court waiving filing fees. Property Records Taxpayer Services Director Kevin Corbid stated that he was unaware of their ability to waive fees. Commissioner Peterson commented that Cottage Grove is an Open Book Appeal area, and questioned why Forest Lake was a Local Board of Appeal area. Director Kevin Corbid said that Forest Lake had a local assessor for a number of years and during that time could not be an Open Book Appeal area. Commissioner Hegberg asked if the County has talked to Forest Lake about becoming an Open Book Appeal area, and Commissioner Pulkrabek asked what the process is. Commissioner Pulkrabek also asked to have comparables done, and to give results to Mr. Severson. Commissioner Kriesel stated that the Board must operate within the framework of the law, and that any change today would be arbitrary. Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked if staff could have comparables done by June 30<sup>th</sup>. Director Kevin Corbid suggested they consider an abatement that would go before the Finance Committee, although this type of situation is not covered in policy. Commissioner Pulkrabek said Mr. Severson should just go to Tax Court. Commissioner Kriesel made a motion to accept the staff's recommendation. Commissioner Peterson again asked for comparables and seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Walk In #2 – City of Woodbury – (Parcel 05.028.21.42.0038 Estimated Market Value \$327,600 for Assessment Year 2008) The assessor is recommending no further reduction to the property of Mr. Darren Castro. After reviewing sales in the neighborhood the assessor determined that the property is within an acceptable range. Previously, staff corrected building characteristics and lowered the 2008 EMV from \$369,000 to \$327,600. Mr. Castro stated that the assessor did not use two of his comparables that were closer to his property. He also stated that the market has changed. County Assessor Bruce Munneke stated that the CAMA system being used measures and takes out subjectivity when looking at comparables. He also confirmed again that the sales period to be looked at is from October 2006 to September 2007. Commissioner Kriesel asked Mr. Castro how long he lived there – ten years. Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked Mr. Castro what he thinks the property is worth, and he stated \$285,000 at the upper end. Commissioner Pulkrabek said he can understand frustration when people come in with comparables, and the assessor's comparables are determined better – they should know why. Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke moved to approve the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Walk In #3 - City of Newport - (Parcel 36.028.22.31.0017 Estimated Market Value \$280,800 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a one story single family residential parcel owned by Christine Heuer. The assessor is recommending that the estimated market value for 2008 be lowered from\$280,800 to \$176,800. Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Walk In #4 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 20.032.21.31.0003 Estimated Market Value \$1,051,300 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is vacant land, recently platted, and classified commercial located in Forest Lake. The assessor's staff has reviewed documentation provided by the owner on this parcel. The recommendation is for a downward adjustment of the 2008 estimated market value from \$1,051,300 to \$709,500. Commissioner Pulkrabek moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Walk In #5 – City of Oakdale – (Parcel 32.029.21.11.0059 Estimated Market Value \$390,000 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject parcel is a residential parcel located in the City of Oakdale, and owned by Karl and Elizabeth Evert. The estimated market value was reduced to \$390,000 after a review of the owner's fee appraisal. Staff further reviewed the neighborhood following the June 17<sup>th</sup> Board Meeting, and determined the \$390,000 to be accurate and was supported by recent sales of similar homes in Oakdale. The assessor is recommending no further change for assessment year 2008. Commissioner Kriesel moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Hegberg seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Walk In #6 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 01.032.21.32.0002 Estimated Market Value \$328,800 for Assessment Year 2008) The subject property is a 19.5 acre parcel located in Forest Lake and owned by Michael and Lynn Riley. The assessor has determined that there are approximately 7.5 acres in agricultural production, and with less than ten acres in production per Minnesota Statute, the parcel fails to qualify for an agricultural classification. The assessor recommends no change to the classification. Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke moved to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Walk In #7 – City of Forest Lake – (Parcel 01.032.21.24.0004 Estimated Market Value \$384,000 for Assessment Year 2008) (Parcel 01.032.21.24.0005 Estimated Market Value \$51,500 for Assessment Year 2008) (Parcel 01.032.21.24.0006 Estimated Market Value \$157,400 for Assessment Year 2008) The properties being appealed are three parcels in Forest Lake owned by Kirk and Chere Almendinger. Although the three parcels total approximately 14.8 acres, the assessor has determined that there are only approximately six acres in agricultural production, and per Minnesota Statute the parcels fail to qualify for an agricultural classification. The assessor recommends no change from residential to agricultural classification on all three parcels. Commissioner Pulkrabek made a motion to accept the assessor's recommendation, and Commissioner Kriesel seconded the motion. The motion carried.

County Assessor Bruce Munneke asked the Board to act on the 2008 Maintenance Changes. Commissioner Peterson made a motion to approve the changes, and Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke seconded the motion. The motion carried.

County Assessor Bruce Munneke asked the Board to act on the 2008 County Board Changes. Commissioner Pulkrabek asked if the Board could change a Local decision. Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke asked how many changes were made. She made a motion to approve the changes, and Commissioner Peterson seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Deputy Administrator/Auditor Treasurer Molly O'Rourke passed out the Resolution and County Board of Appeal and Equalization Certification Form to be signed by Board Members.

Property Records and Taxpayer Services Director Kevin Corbid stated there was no further business. Commissioner Myra Peterson moved to adjourn, and Commissioner Pulkrabek seconded the motion. All Board Members concurred and the 2008 Washington County Board of Appeal and Equalization closed on June 24, 2008.
