Dear Paideia Community,

Happy early Thanksgiving! Since we only have a 2-day week next week, we will not be publishing an additional newsletter next week. However, teachers have included information for both next week and the following week so you will be informed of what is coming up in your children's classrooms.

On Tuesday, we had an extremely productive Board meeting, at which the Board approved a number of items, including: a revised Honor Roll Policy, a revised Acceleration Policy, a change to using Holt Math (instead of Singapore Math) in 5th grade beginning 2014-2015 (per approval from our authorizer, Friends of Education), a revision to a staff break policy in the Personnel Manual, and a 176-day academic calendar for 2014-2015. We began some important discussions about special education, appropriate communications between families and staff, report cards, and planning for our next school year. (I especially appreciate them pinch-hitting for me as I recuperate from my illness.) We look forward to welcoming several new families in January during our enrollment period! Please keep an eye out for communications from our Marketing & Enrollment Committee about our 2014 Information Nights that will focus on open enrollment for 2014-2015.

Lastly, I'd like to thank the PTO for hosting an incredibly successful Movie Night last Friday! From what I hear, it was standing room only, and everyone had a monstrously great time.

I hope you enjoy a relaxing weekend with your families and a wonderful Thanksgiving wherever you are.

Upper Academy is graded on an A-F grading scale.

If you are viewing the overall class grade (first image), "M" means "Meets Standards." If you are viewing the course definitions (second image), "M" means "missing assignment." This is true of "E" as well. If you are viewing the overall class grade, "E" means "Exceeds Standards." If you are viewing the course definitions, "E" means "Exempt" from the assignment.



Counselor's Corner

A Message from your Counselors: December's Character Trait is Self Control

When kids melt down in the middle of a crowded store, at a holiday dinner, with extended family, or at home, it can be extremely frustrating. But parents can help kids learn self-control and teach them how to respond to situations without just acting in impulse.

Teaching self-control skills is one of the most important things that parents can do for their kids because these are some of the most important skills for success later in life.

By learning self-control, kids can make appropriate decisions and respond to stressful situations in ways that can yield positive outcomes.

For example, if you say that you're not serving ice cream until after dinner, your child may cry, plead, or even scream in the hopes that you will give in. But with self-control, your child can understand that a temper tantrum means you'll take away the ice cream for good and that it's wiser to wait patiently. Please see our Helpful Hints on how to help kids learn to control their behavior.

Counseling Highlights:

Mrs. Largent has been discussing the concept of bucket filling in the lower academy classrooms. Bucket filling is an easy to understand concept: Everyone carries an invisible bucket that holds our good thoughts and feelings. When our buckets are full, we feel happy and when our buckets are empty, we feel sad. Children quickly understand that they can fill buckets when they do and say things that are kind, considerate, caring, and respectful. They also learn that when they are mean, inconsiderate, uncaring and disrespectful, they dip into buckets and remove those good feelings. Even the youngest child understand that actions and words can either fill a bucket or dip into it. Helpful Hints: Helping Kids Learn Self Control

<u>Ages 3-5:</u> You can continue to use timeouts, but rather than enforcing a specific time limit, end timeouts once your child has calmed down. This helps kids improve their sense of self-control. And praise your child for not losing control in frustrating or difficult situations.

<u>Ages 6-9:</u> As kids enter school, they're better able to understand the idea of consequences and that they can choose good or bad behavior. It may help your child to imagine a stop sign that must be obeyed and think about a situation before responding. Encourage your child to walk away from a frustrating situation for a few minutes to cool off instead of having an outburst.

<u>Ages 10-12:</u> Older kids usually better understand their feelings. Encourage them to think about what's causing them to lose control and then analyze it. Explain that sometimes the situations that are upsetting at first don't end up being so awful. Urge kids to take time to think before responding to a situation.

<u>Ages 13-17:</u> By now kids should be able to control most of their actions. But remind teens to think about long-term consequences. Urge them to pause to evaluate upsetting situations before responding and talk through problems rather than losing control, slamming doors, or yelling. If necessary, discipline your teen by taking away certain privileges to reinforce the message that self-control is an important skill.

Seventh Grade

- **Math:** For the next two weeks (November 25—December 6th) the 7th grade students will be studying volume and surface area of cylinders, ordered pairs and graphing on a coordinate plane. Both 7A and 7B will have a quiz on these standards on Friday, December 6th. (IXL skills to practice: P.27, Q.25, Q.27, P.30, S.1, S.2, S.3)
- Language Arts: 7th grade students will be finishing their rough drafts for their descriptive essay. They will be learning about precise word choice, transitions, and they will be editing their essay with peers. For double period classes, students will be participating in station activities: spelling, journal writing, speaking and analyzing new vocabulary terms "Words of the Week", and connecting with the text through Daybook lessons. Spelling and vocabulary terms will be accessed towards the end of the week. Students will be analyzing a new grammar concept, which will be assessed. Students should be working on their independent writing project, which is due 12/13/13, and the daily reading passages week 7. (They may complete an additional project for extra credit points.) The November reading calendar is due 11/26/13 with a parent signature.

- **Science:** In 7th grade science, students will begin presenting their organ system projects. Students will also begin shark dissections as soon as sharks arrive. After organ projects students will begin learning about cell structure in plants and animals.
- **Social Studies:** This week in Social Studies students completed Jots & Doodles to help make their thinking visible while watch the PBS documentary *The Abolitionists*. Students are HIGHLY engaged with this documentary! Through it they are learning about abolitionists such as Angelina Grimke, Theodore Weld, Frederick Douglass, William Lloyd Garrison, and Harriet Beecher Stowe. Next we will work more with primary sources from the Abolitionist Movement and continue reading our novel, *The Truth About Sparrows*. Our Essential Question for this quarter is: How has change happened throughout U.S. history? After Thanksgiving Break we will move on to studying topics including Women's Suffrage and the Labor Movement.
- **Advisory:** In Advisory students continue to do activities related to Character Education, Organizational Skills, and Anti-Bullying. Recently we have been discussing Leadership, Citizenship, Positivity, Time Management, and Empathy. Advisory teachers are also helping students check planners and grades, and go over MCA scores and First Quarter Report Cards.

Eighth Grade

- **Math: 8A:** For the next two weeks (November 25—December 6th) 8A will be studying solving systems of equations by graphing, substitution, elimination and solving special systems. 8A will have a quiz on lessons 6-1 to 6-4 on Thursday, December 5th. (IXL skills to work on: 8th grade: Y.1 to Y.11): For the next two weeks (November 25—December 6th) **8B:** will be studying: slope-intercept form, point-slope form, slopes of parallel and perpendicular lines, and transforming linear functions. 8B will have a quiz on 5-6 to 5-9 on Thursday, December 5th. (IXL skills to work on: 8th grade: V.2-V.13, Algebra: S.1-S.19).

- **Social Studies:** This week in Social Studies we worked hard to finish the memoir we've been reading about Japanese Internment Camps in the U.S. during WW2, entitled *A Farewell to Manzanar*. Students have been reading independently, in small groups, and with audiobooks to complete their reading, and have been completing reading packets and other written work along with their reading to promote higher engagement with the text. Students also began their choice of a new mapping lab about either The Great Lakes or National Parks. After Thanksgiving Break we will move on to studying the physical and human geographies of Latin America, including Central America, The Caribbean, and South America.
