

# From the Director

Dear Paideia Community,

Brrr!!! It sure has gotten cold this week. Of course, that hasn't stopped us from doing great things here at Paideia. Last night's Music concert, led by our wonderful MacPhail Music teachers, Troy Strand and Hannah Rosholt, demonstrated the amazing talents of our students and their willingness to take on challenge and work collaboratively toward a common goal. I was very proud of all of them – especially our newly-developed Choir who performed at their first concert last night. Thank you to all of the Band, Orchestra, and Choir students and families who made it possible!

This week also included a PTO meeting, Wendy's Night, School Culture & Communication meeting, and a Marketing & Enrollment meeting. It's been great seeing so many families investing their time in making sure that our school community is strong! Thank you for all your participation in these events.

Our Wednesday teacher collaboration session focused on using a protocol to examine student work and provide each other with feedback on how lessons currently meet students' needs and how lessons can be further improved or enhanced to support all students. As a staff, we are focusing on ensuring that our lessons challenge <a href="each">each</a> student appropriately and are aligned to the Minnesota state standards, MCA test specifications, and Core Knowledge sequence.

One of the questions that we are commonly asked is, "What is the difference between the Common Core Standards and Core Knowledge?" Here is a quick breakdown of the two. While this is certainly not a complete description of either, I hope it provides you with some resources to explore more if you'd like. Feel free to let me know if you would like additional information on or have questions about either or both.

Common Core State Standards (CCSS) – The Common Core Standards are K-12 standards designed to increase students' college- and career-readiness in English Language Arts (reading, writing, speaking, listening, and language), Math, and Literacy in History/Social Studies, Science, and Technical Subjects. The CCSS were developed after a group of state Governors met to discuss strengthening and aligning their states' educational standards, and have now been adopted by 45 states. They focus on skills that will prepare students for college and the types of reading, writing, and math that they will do as adults in a variety of careers. The Minnesota Reading and Writing standards are based on the CCSS English Language Arts standards, but our state has <u>not</u> adopted the CCS Math standards. Core Knowledge (CK) – The Core Knowledge (CK) sequence includes K-8 content that is distributed per grade level in an effort to provide all students in each grade level with shared knowledge of Language Arts, Math, Science, American History & Geography, World History & Geography, Visual Arts, and Music. The CK sequence is based on E.D. Hirsch's work on Cultural Literacy that resulted in a series of books entitled, What Your \_\_\_\_ Grader Needs To Know. The Core Knowledge sequence is not specifically aligned to the Minnesota standards. ### After school walkers

As our hours of daylight are waning, and it is getting darker much earlier, we wanted to send out a reminder about safe practices while walking after school. Many of our students who walk after school pass by the Dakota County Western Service Center and we wanted to remind students and families to be aware of the benefits and potential dangers of this, or any, area in our community. At the Western Service Center, there are hearings, social services meetings, child protection services, etc. When walking from school, please remember to:

- Stay in groups or pairs practice the well-known strategy of "safety in numbers."
- Pay attention to who else is around you do you know them? Do they look like they are being safe?
- Do not talk to someone unless you know them if you are approached by a stranger, walk away and look for someone else to help you. After school, there are always librarians right next door to the south at the Galaxie Library or the Apple Valley police department to the north.
- Be a reporter if you see anything out of the ordinary, please report it to an adult as soon as possible.
- Stay off your phone/iPod and listen to what is happening around you.

In order to kick 2014-2015 off with a bang, considering it will be our 10th year, the PTO voted to adjust our events for the rest of this year.


# Mark your 2014 Calendars

# Fifth Grade

**Language Arts:** Students have been working hard on reading their literature circle novels and completing their literature novel packets. All students should be bringing their packets home to start gathering any supplies they may want for a final project on their novel. Copies of the packets can be found on the 5th Grade Classroom Page.

**Social Studies:** Students will finish their study of early English colonies. They will learn about Plymouth then compare the colonies at Roanoke, Jamestown and Plymouth. They will have a test late in the week (check planners for details).

Science: Students will be finishing up their unit on recycling, renewable and nonrenewable resources.

**Math:** Students will be introduced to basic Algebra! We'll be using letters for numbers, and simplifying Algebraic Expressions.

**Advisory:** This month's character trait is Self-Control. Students continue to work on organization. Students have also been working on setting goals for making improvements in their schoolwork, and on character education.

**Announcements:** Please remember to check SchoolView for students' current grades, missing/late work, and upcoming assignment due dates. Remember to check all three strands— Process, Progress, and Performance.

**Volunteer Opportunities:** Volunteers are needed in the Language Arts classroom to inventory textbooks. Mr. Leckband has some opportunities for copying and laminating.

**Inspirations:** It was very inspiring to see some 5th graders including new friends when playing at recess.

# **Sixth Grade**

**Language Arts:** Our unit on Ojibwe Mythology is coming to a close as students finish writing rough drafts their own original myths. Resources for writing this myth can be found on the 6th Grade Classroom Page. Students will have a unit test on reading and vocabulary skills at the end of next week.

**Social Studies:** Students will be in the computer lab on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. They will be working on a Minnesota Mapping Exercise that is about the Fur Trade and Minnesota Native Americans. Students will use interactive maps that provide details about historical places and events, geography, biomes, food sources, animal habitats and the fur trade. They will then use the information they have learned to answer questions. The online portion of the activity may be found at: http://www.mngeo.state.mn.us/ghol/fur trade.php. On Thursday, students will work on a study guide in preparation of a test on Friday.

**Science:** Students will be reviewing matter and force and motion.

**Math A:** will also be working on simplifying Algebraic Expressions, and working on equations and their solutions.

Math B: will be working with Numbers and Patterns, Exponents, and Properties of Math.

**Advisory:** This month's character trait is Self-Control.

**Announcements:** Please remember to check SchoolView for students' current grades, missing/late work, and upcoming assignment due dates. Please remember to check all three strands— Process, Progress, and Performance.

**Volunteer Opportunities:** Volunteers are needed in the Language Arts classroom to inventory textbooks. Mr. Leckband has some opportunities for copying and laminating.

**Inspirations:** Sixth graders were very inspiring by showing great cooperation and leadership during a group project identifying plot elements of Ojibwe myths.

# **Seventh Grade**

**Math:** Students will be working on finding the volume and surface area of cylinders this week. They will also learn about ordered pairs and how to graph them. Both 7A and 7B will have a quiz on these concepts on Friday. (IXL skills to practice: P.28, P.29, P.30, S.1)

Language Arts: 7th grade students will be finishing their rough drafts for their descriptive essay. They will be learning about precise word choice, transitions, and they will be editing their essay with peers. For double period classes, students will be typing their final drafts of the descriptive essay in an specific format, so that it looks like an academic paper. All typed descriptive essays are due 12/13/13. 7th grade students will be taking a test about figurative language as well. Students should be working on their independent writing project, which is due 12/13/13. (They may complete an additional project for extra credit points!)

**Science:** Students will finish discussing how all of our organ systems are interrelated. Then, they will move on to compare and contrast animal and plant cells. They will be using diagrams and microscopes to analyze the structure of these cells. Student of the week emails will be sent out Monday night!

**Social Studies:** This week in Social Studies we began learning about the Labor Movement in the United States in the late 1800s-early 1900s. Students read case studies in one of our classroom textbooks about labor events in history and worked in small groups to create brief, original readers' theater scripts and skits, which they performed for the whole class. We completed a Listen-and-Draw activity about Samuel Gompers, explored a PBS American Experience website about the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire, and spent some time reading the novel *The Truth About Sparrows* and our new *Upfront* current events magazine. Next we will watch the PBS American Experience documentary about the Triangle Fire and complete a film guide packet along with the documentary.

**Advisory:** The character trait this month is Self-Control. Students also continue to work on organizational and study skills activities during Advisory, as well as regularly checking grades and missing work on SchoolView.

Announcements: All 7th grade students must turn in and complete their missing assignments, test corrections, and missing tests by 12/13/13 at 3:30pm for all classes. There will not be any exceptions. Please check SchoolView to plan accordingly. Students must make an appointment with the content area teacher to arrange any test make-ups. The Scholastic Book Fair is going on this week in the Gym. Please remember to check SchoolView for students' current grades, missing/late work, and upcoming assignment due dates. Please remember to check all three strands— Process, Progress, and Performance. # **Eighth Grade**

- Math: 8A Math: The students will be continuing with Chapter 6 and working on solving systems of linear equations in various methods. The class will have a quiz on 6-1 to 6-4 on Thursday. 8B Math: The students will be working on finishing Chapter 5 (parallel and perpendicular lines and transformations of linear functions). The class will review concepts from 5-6 to 5-9 and have a quiz on those concepts on Thursday. (IXL skill to practice: V. 13)
