From the Director


Dear Paideia Community,

Counselor's Corner

A Message from your Counselors: Cultivating Social Intelligence

Of all the skills we encourage our children to develop, social intelligence may be the most essential for predicting a fulfilling, successful life. It's also the aspect of development parents influence most profoundly, and it's crucial that we're aware of that, because our every word, move and gesture are being studied... *We're* the ones under the microscope, modeling everything we do and say. Surely this is the best motivation in the universe to be our most gracious, socially adaptive selves.

Counseling Highlights: This week is National School Counseling Week!

National School Counselor week is a national week set aside to raise awareness about Comprehensive School Counseling Programs. Stay tuned for more information next week!

Helpful Hints: Some Ideas on how to help your kids develop the social skills they need:

Foster good social skills from toddlerhood on. This is one of the most important skill sets your child will ever develop. It is infinitely more important to her future happiness than helping her develop her intellect.

Support his friendships. Honor and reinforce your child's developing friendships. Talk about them, remember them, create opportunities to play. Remember that children get aggravated with each other, just as adults do. It doesn't mean the end of a friendship, necessarily, just that they need help to work through the issues that come up.

Model respectful relating. Remember that your child will treat others as you treat her. In addition to the obvious everyday respect, that means that you give her criticism in private, not in front of others, including her friends. Which means you have to find tactful ways to talk to your young child and other kids about the way they are treating each other, to help them work out difficulties when they play together.

Teach your child that people are important. All parents have to choose their battles, so put up with messiness and dawdling if you must, but teach your child consideration for others. Model it for him early on, praise it, help him brainstorm to solve peer problems, and don't let your child intentionally or unintentionally disrespect another person. It you can't confront it as it happens without embarrassing your child, be sure to talk about it later. As kids get older, you may need to be very explicit about insisting that they acknowledge adults in their presence, as well as other kids. Often preteens and young adolescents need to be reminded of this, and to be given coaching on how to handle interactions that feel awkward to them.

Help your kids how to repair rifts in relationships. When we think about repairing relationships, we usually focus on apologizing. But premature apologies won't be heartfelt and may backfire by causing the child to hold a grudge. Giving them a chance to cool down first always works better. Apologizing is a very useful friendship skill that doesn't come easily to people in our culture. Children learn how to apologize by watching their parents. If you never apologize, they won't either. If you apologize graciously and often, to them and to others, they will too. The secret of helping kids learn to apologize is not making the apology into a punishment.

Math: Mrs. Johnson's Group: We will continue to work with solid (3D) and flat (2D) shapes and assess on shape recognition. We will continue working with number bonds to challenge our brains. We will start our next unit "Numbers to 100." Ms. Stevens' Group: We will continue to work with skip counting (counting by 2's, 5's and 10's), focusing on counting by 10's and 5's. We will also work in new math stations.

Language Arts: Sight Words: will, said. Ms. Stevens' Group: We will continue to work with vowel sounds, CVC words and word families. We will practice reading books at our levels and work with our Daily 5 rotations. Mrs. Johnson's Group: sight word reader: The Snowman. We will assess the sight words we have introduced so far and continue to work with letter sounds, especially tricky "y" and "w" and all the vowels. We will concentrate on hearing sounds in CVC words.

5th Grade

Math: Next week 5th graders will be focusing on real world problems involving decimals, fractions, and mixed numbers. In addition, we will gain practice in estimating decimals with a couple classroom hands-on activities, and will be learning Divisibility Rules. Please encourage your student to continue using IXL, especially sections C.1 – C.13.

Language Arts: Students have been working on making inferences and finding the main ideas of nonfiction text. Next week, students will be working on writing and vocabulary and practicing comparing and contrasting different texts. Reading calendars are due Monday, February 3rd.

Social Studies:Students will work on their 13 colonies project. They will create an online poster using Glogster then present it to the class. They will be in charge of teaching us what we need to know about their colony. The 13 colonies geography test will be pushed to Monday and all students were given a review page to study. Toward the end of the week, students will begin to learn about events that led up to the American Revolution starting with the French and Indian War (or Seven Years War).

Science: Students will learn about Minnesota prairies, forests and wetlands.

Advisory: Students worked on organizing their binders last week and next week they we will focus on the dangers of missing work and ways to avoid it.

Inspirations: It was inspiring to see 5th graders working hard in advisory to improve their study skills in middle school.

6th Grade

Math: We will take our Chapter 8 test. We then move on to chapter 9 where we will spend some time learning about area of parallelograms, triangles, circles, and irregular shapes. We will see how geometry ties into real world situations.

Language Arts: Students have been working on reading text critically, especially working on how authors making fictional characters come to life. Students are reading their literature circle novels and should be bringing those novels to class every day. Due dates on the literature circle novel packets have been adjusted to account for missed school days. Students should have made that adjustment in their packets. Reading calendars are due Monday, February 3rd.

Social Studies: Students will participate in their first Evaluated Class Discussion (ECD). All students have prepared for the ECD by completing the comprehension and opinion questions about the Dakota-US War. Please ask your student how it went. We will move onto our RAFT writing project. Students will study many people associated with the Dakota-US War then take the perspective of one and communicate with their selected audience in an appropriate manner about the war. For example, a student might choose to be Abraham Lincoln and write a letter to the Dakota people to explain why he pardoned some of the accused warriors and let others hang. This writing project will require students to use historical facts and evidence in their writing. They will also practice and work on their writing skills (proper punctuation, grammar, spelling, sentence structure).

Science: Students will learn about potential and kinetic energy.

Advisory: Students worked on organizing their binders last week and next week they we will focus on the dangers of missing work and ways to avoid it.

Volunteer Opportunities: Mr. Leckband has opportunities for chaperoning students to the library on Friday, January 31st. He also has opportunities for reading to and with 5th grade students on Tuesday mornings and Thursday afternoons. Please contact him at: nleckband@paideiaacademy.org for details.

Inspirations: Mr. Leckband was inspired to see students working hard at reviewing skills they did not master last quarter.

7th Grade

Math: 7A & 7B: Students will continue with Chapter 7 with units on Similar Figures, Scale Drawings, 3D Figures and Scale Models. 7th graders will have a quiz on these concepts later on in the week. We will then be moving on to transformations on a coordinate plane. Students may practice at home with the following IXL skills: J.13, P.12, P.13, P.14

Language Arts: We will continue studying poetry in the Daybook lessons and practicing writing poetry as well. Students will take Spelling #3 and WOTW #3 quizzes at the beginning of the week, and they will be given Spelling #4 and WOTW #4. Reminders: All students should be reading a book, either nonfiction or fiction. They will be documenting their reading minutes and page numbers on their January reading calendar. An extra copy can be downloaded and printed on the 7th grade Language Arts website. The January reading calendar is due 02/04/13.

Social Studies: Due to all the missed days of school in the past week, we are still working to finish up with all that we had planned for the days we weren't here! This week in Social Studies we began learning about the Women's Suffrage Movement in the United States by completing a listen-and-draw activity and watching some short video clips to introduce the topic; students also enjoyed our weekly current events activities; we are focusing on asking more questions in class, both verbally and in writing. Students also began station work, examining and analyzing a variety of primary source documents from the women's suffrage movement in the United States, including photographs, speeches, and articles from the time period. Next week we will continue learning more in-depth knowledge about women's suffrage in the U.S.; we will examine more primary and secondary source documents, including some readers' theater pieces, online resources, and the movie, *Iron Jawed Angels*.

Science: In science next week, students will continue learning about ecosystems and interactions between populations of organisms. After that, they will learn about food webs and energy transfer between organisms.

Advisory: Students continue to work on character education, community/team-building, organization and study skills, Olweus Anti-Bullying curriculum, and checking grades in Advisory.

Announcements: Volunteer Opportunities: Ms. Hood would appreciate help making copies and tidying up her classroom! Thanks!

Inspirations: Ms. Hood was inspired by the way 7th graders persevered while analyzing some tough primary source documents about women's suffrage in the U.S. during station work in Social Studies this week

8th Grade

- **Math: 8A:** Next week students will be focusing on Powers of 10 and Scientific Notation, Multiplication Properties of Exponents, and Division Properties of Exponents. We were unable to get to these units last week due to cancelled school. Students will be taking a quiz on these concepts this week. The following IXL skills may be practiced at home: F.8, F.9, G.1, G.2, G.3, G.4.
- **8B:** Due to cancelled school last week, students will be taking the quiz on Solving Systems by Graphing and Substitution on Monday. The remainder of the week we will be focusing on solving systems by elimination and solving special systems. Students may continue to practice the following IXL skills at home: Y.1, Y.2, Y.3, Y.8, Y.9, Y.10, Y.11
- Language Arts: This week, students will analyze week 2 Words of the Week, which will be assessed at the end of the week. Students will also review author's purpose of a text and evaluating evidence, which will be assessed at the end of the week. Students will prepare and conduct their first Socratic Seminar, and they will receive peer feedback about the discussion. We will finish the Daybook unit 3 and students will prepare for the reading assessment. Reminders: All students should be reading a book, either nonfiction or fiction. They will be documenting their reading minutes and page numbers on their January reading calendar. An extra copy can be downloaded and printed on the 8th grade Language Arts website. The January reading calendar is due 02/04/13.
- **Social Studies:** This week in Social Studies the *Geography, Alive!* Ch. 2 Mapping Lab was due. This chapter reviewed physical features and types of maps. Students also focused on asking questions about current events issues. We began listening to an audiobook version of the short novel, *The House On Mango Street*, by Sandra Cisneros; this will help support our studies of both North America and Latin America. Students used a word list and categorizing graphic organizer to identify theme, mood/tone, and message of the novel; students did a great job with this new activity, had good conversations about the book and made some solid predictions about what the book will be about as we read further in it!
- **Science:** In science next week, students will begin identifying rocks and minerals and the processes that formed them. After that, they will begin learning about seasons and weather patterns.
- **Advisory:** Students continue to work on character education, community/team-building, organization and study skills, Olweus Anti-Bullying curriculum, and checking grades in Advisory.
