

Dear Paideia Community,

What a way to end the first quarter! Our Monday Morning Meeting kicked off the week with a surprise electronic "visit" from one of our Paideia parents who is currently on deployment with the U.S. Army, a kick-off of College Month that included staff and parents sharing some of their college experiences, a celebration of Upper Academy students' academic achievements, and a presentation by our 1st graders on Kindness. We then followed up with a well-attended Coffee with the Director, during which we discussed the replication grant for which we are planning to apply, strategies to increase student enrollment, our school calendar, our Family Satisfaction Survey, the role of the PTO at Paideia, the evolution of expectations of charter schools, and the positive feel of Paideia this year. Thank you to those of you who participated in a great discussion!

Thank you as well to the adults who chaperoned our 5th/6th grade trip to the Audubon Center this week! Though the weather changed from warm summer to chilly fall just in time for this trip, it was a great experience for students, staff, and families alike. Students developed their confidence through challenging outdoor activities, strengthened their abilities to work as a team through team-building activities, and learned more about what it means to be a part of the natural world.

On Tuesday night, we had two committee meetings – School Culture & Communication and Operations. At our School Culture meeting we further discussed some of the topics brought up at our Coffee with the Director and continued work on policies to improve school culture and communication. At our Operations Committee meeting, we discussed some different ways we can utilize space to better meet the needs of our students with special needs, various options for increasing our internet bandwidth, and the development of an ad hoc committee to explore options for once our lease expires in 2018.

On Wednesday, all schools received their Multiple Measurement Rating (MMR) scores which are based on MCA test scores and measure each school's Proficiency, Growth, and Achievement Gap Reduction. Paideia Academy's MMR score for the 2013-2014 school year was 69.78%. As a school that receives Title I funds, this score designates us as Celebration Eligible. However, this score is significantly lower than the 85.4% we received last year based on our MCA scores, and we will do everything we can to improve it for next year. Below are comparisons of our scores for the past two years, with descriptions of each category below that.

We will need to continue to work together to improve each child's MCA scores as we, at the same time, prepare them to be well-rounded global citizens. One way for families to support this effort is to enact the ideas that teachers have provided below for activities to extend learning during break. During conferences, we will review with you your child's individual MCA data report, including strengths and areas for growth, as well as strategies to support them both in and out of class. Together, we will make sure your children are as prepared as possible to be academically successful both now and in the future.

Thank you for a wonderful first quarter of the 2014-2015 school year! Have a wonderful two weeks with your children.

Proficiency is measured as the percentage of student subgroups who meet the MDE-determined target, based on the grade level and the percentage of students taking the test.

Growth is measured as the average Z score for a school. A Z score of zero means that a student (or school) has made the expected growth, while a negative Z score means that he/she has made less growth than expected, and a positive Z score means that he/she has made more growth than expected.

Achievement Gap Reduction is measured as the growth (Z scores) of traditionally lower-performing student groups compared to the statewide average for traditionally higher-performing student groups.

Once the small group meetings are completed, I envision creating a committee comprised of parents/guardians and staff to review the data and determine what the next steps should be.

Counselors Corner

October is College Month!

Junior and senior years of high school are busy times for college-bound students and their parents. Between SAT's and ACT's, campus visits, and application essays, the college admissions process can quickly become a time-consuming, and stress-inducing process for all involved. But a well thought out college planning process doesn't have to be anxiety ridden, especially if it's begun years before a student starts to apply. If possible, parents should introduce their children to the prospect of college in middle school, if not years earlier.

Here's what to talk to your child about at each stage of schooling:

Elementary ~ A holistic approach to understand colleges might begin as early as elementary school. Now isn't the time to talk about grades, majors, and test preparation, but it is an ideal period to drop by local college campuses for sporting

events, camps, and other activities that might spark excitement in your youngster. Parents can also start to gradually introduce the idea of college by sharing their own college experience or those of a relative neighbor, or friend. Let children expect that college is a distinct possibility for them!

Middle School ~ The college conversation should begin to ramp up once your student enters eighth grade. As you talk with your child about the possibilities of college, don't forget to tie in financial conversations, no matter how awkward that might feel. As you talk to your child about family finances, first focus on the qualities a student should identify in a good college for them, not on what your family can and can't afford. Then, help your child to see which options may be viable if he or she gets good grades and receives merit-based aid. Early focus on paying for college will also get everyone thinking about scholarship opportunities, some of which are open to high school freshmen.



From the Classrooms

<u>Kindergarten</u>

Math: Students can work on counting to 10 (or higher!), writing numbers to 10 (or higher!) and counting objects. Students can also practice finding and drawing 2D shapes. Please see the Bingo Board for additional ideas.

Language Arts: Students can practice sight words and colors words, as well as letter names and sounds over break. Please see the Bingo Board for additional ideas.

Science: Students could visit an apple orchard or pumpkin patch and focus on using their 5 senses to describe their experiences.

Social Studies: Students could practice drawing maps of various things such as their house or bedroom. Columbus Day is October 13th. Ask your child to tell you what they know about Christopher Columbus.

Advisory: Practice putting on and zipping up your jacket! Shoe tying practice is also a great idea!

Announcements:

- A Bingo-Style board was sent home over break. This is an **optional** packet full of different ideas to do with your kindergartner over break. Feel free to do as much or as little of it as you want. Students who complete five or more activities on the board will receive a fall pencil to use at school. These packets can be returned on October 20th.
- Parents, please keep October 28th on your calendars. We will be celebrating the 50th day of kindergarten on this day and would like to invite you to join us from 11:00-11:35AM for a Sock Hop. Please do not mention this to your child yet as we would like to keep it a surprise.

Inspirations: Happy Birthday Jordyn (10/5), Hazel (10/14), Faith L. (10/15), and Matthew (10/17). It has been a fun first guarter getting to know the kindergartners! Have a wonderful break!

First Grade

Math: Over break students should work on basic addition and subtraction facts to 10. You can make and use flashcards or use counters to solve. Students can also practice writing and solving addition and subtraction word problems.

Language Arts: Over break students should try to read every day. Students can practice writing in a journal about what they do each day.

Science: Over break students can review what they learned about ocean life. Ask your child about endangered animals and how we can help protect the ocean.

Social Studies: Over break students can practice reciting and identifying the 7 continents. Students can also work on map reading skills, like identifying the 4 cardinal directions.

Advisory: Over break you can talk with your child about the 10 ways to show kindness we presented at Monday Morning Meeting. You can also discuss the 4 Anti-Bullying rules we learned in quarter one.

Announcements: Have a wonderful and safe break.

Inspirations: Levi, Brielle, Lola, Gabe, Miles all retired clips this week! Way to go!!!

Second Grade

Ideas for Fall Break!

Math: Practice basic addition and subtraction facts for speed and accuracy, write number words correctly and neatly, write story problems that include addition and subtraction, practice adding 2- or 3-digit numbers with and without regrouping, and work on place value and addition IXL skills.

Language Arts: Read at least 150 minutes over break (and complete reading log), read or retell a story to a younger brother or sister or other family member, read and discuss a chapter book aloud as a family (talk about problem, solution, characters, etc.), watch a movie on a book that you have read and compare and contrast the book and the movie, write about your vacation or events you do over break, do Lexia, and work on IXL language arts skills related to capitalization, verbs, nouns, adjectives, and adverbs.

Science: Point out and discuss different kinds of clouds in the sky, have your child draw a picture and explain the water cycle, and discuss tools that help solve problems.

Social Studies: Use and discuss a map at a zoo or park (point out the key and compass rose), create a timeline that shows that events you did over break, and go to the library and check out books about Native Americans and MN and read and discuss together.

Advisory: Read books about and discuss friendships and have play dates with friends.

Announcements:

- --Please email your child's teacher with your top three choices for conferences if you haven't already done so. Conferences October 23 4-8pm and October 24 8am-12pm.
- --Students will not have regular homework over fall break, but we will send home a reading log for the students to keep track of their reading throughout the two weeks. We will expect students to read at least 150 minutes over break.

Third Grade

Math: Two-step word problems

Language Arts: Reading and writing, punctuation

Science: Creating a food chain for an animal of their choice

Social Studies: Creating a timeline of their life or their family member's life,

Advisory: Cursive

Inspirations: The third graders ended first quarter very strongly, they did a great job on their DDI tests this

past week! Way to go third graders!!

Fourth Grade

Math: IXL Have your student practice over break! Review: place value, estimation,

multiplication, division. Preview: graphs, algebra, fractions, and decimals.

Language Arts: IXL Have your student practice over break! Review: punctuation, capitalization, sentences, prepositions. Preview: word meanings

Science: Go online to play rock and mineral games. *Websites listed on back of research notes Check out books at the library

to identify Minnesota rocks and minerals. Go to a park and hunt for and identify rocks and minerals. Go to the science museum for hands on exploration. Visit Crystal Cave.

Social Studies: Check out library books about government, maps, and/or economics.

Read the newspaper to look for stories related to topics we have studied in social studies.

Advisory: Play a board or card game with a sibling, parent, grandparent, and/or friend. Build something with someone.

Announcements: Conferences are Thursday, October 23rd from 4-8pm and Friday 9am —12pm. Please email your students homeroom teacher with 3 available

Fifth Grade

Language Arts: Students should definitely be spending some time reading over break. Students may also practice IXL Language Arts. Also, take some time to enjoy the fall weather!

Math: During the break next week fifth graders would benefit from working on IXL. Students already know their usernames and passwords from class. Fifth graders should focus on the following skills: division, word problems, and multiplication properties.

Social Studies: During the second quarter, we will be learning primarily about the events surrounding the American Revolution and the formation of the United States! There is plenty of great reading to be done on this topic, and Disney put out a great live action movie called "Johnny Tremain" that would be an excellent resource. (There is also a book called "Johnny Tremain" that would be great for strong readers.)

Science: It is hard to believe quarter one is at a close! As we take a break for rest and refreshment, test your child's knowledge and skills by making observations, asking questions about the world around us and exploring through experiment!

Announcements: Thank you to all the chaperones who helped out on the Audubon trip.

Inspirations: It was inspiring to see students showing teamwork and learning about nature on the Audubon trip.

Sixth Grade

Language Arts: Students should definitely be spending some time reading over break. Students may also practice IXL Language Arts. Also, take some time to enjoy the fall weather!

During the break next week sixth graders would benefit from working on IXL. Students already know their usernames and passwords from class. Sixth graders should focus on the following skills: operations with decimals (adding, subtracting, multiplying, dividing), operations with fractions, greatest common factor, least common multiple, and prime factorization.

Social Studies: During the second quarter, we will be learning about the early dealings Europeans had with the people native to Minnesota, the Civil War, the U.S.-Dakota War, and Minnesota's journey to statehood! "Minnesota in the Civil War: An Illustrated History" would be a great introductory piece of reading and "Brackett's Battalion" would be excellent for strong readers.

Science: Time flies when you are having fun! Students have just completed learning about matter, what matter is made of and how matter changes. Now is a great time to investigate physical and chemical change through fun experiments. Break out your baking soda and vinegar and ask your child about how matter is changing right before their eyes!

Announcements: Thank you to all the chaperones who helped out on the Audubon trip.

Inspirations: It was inspiring to see students showing teamwork and learning about nature on the Audubon trip.



Seventh Grade

Math: In preparation for second quarter the 7th and 8th graders can access Khanacademy.com to review and watch video tutorials on the topics covered in first quarter and some that will be covered in second quarter.

Language Arts: Please read at home over break.

Science: We are on the verge of an exciting deep-dive into the world of genetics! Over break, I encourage students to discuss with their families any shared traits that they may have. Who can roll their tongue? Who has attached ear lobes? What are other similarities and differences?

Social Studies: Over Fall Break, 7th graders should reflect on what they have learned about government and citizenship. They should talk to their families about how they participate in their community. I would like them to investigate the upcoming elections and seek information on candidates to make an informed decision about who they are in support of.

Advisory: College Month!

Inspirations: Our 7/8th grade students have been showing excellent leadership within Paideia.

Eighth Grade

Math: In preparation for second quarter the 7th and 8th graders can access Khanacademy.com to review and watch video tutorials on the topics covered in first quarter and some that will be covered in second quarter.

Language Arts: Please read at home over break.

Science: During the past week, students have been creating a specific kind of rock. The core of the rock was made in class but all students are asked to put on the finishing touches during break. These rocks, along with a museum label about the rock, will be put on display during Conferences.

Social Studies: 8th Graders concluded the quarter with an in-depth investigation of poverty. Over Fall Break, I would like 8th graders to think about poverty in the Twin Cities as well as the world. I would like them to take the step into coming up with possible solutions.

Kindergartens learned a lot about lines and have started to learn more about color. Some of those lines include: horizontal, vertical, diagonal, zigzag, and curvy. Over break encourage your son or daughter to point out specific lines they see in everyday life. Also, encourage you son or daughter to continue to identify warm and cool colors. Warm colors = reds, oranges and yellows. Cool colors = greens, blues and purples. Plus they can always draw, draw and draw some more!

1st Grade/ 2nd Grade

The 1st and 2nd graders learned a lot about lines the first quarter. Some of those lines include: horizontal, vertical, diagonal, zigzag, curvy, hatching and cross-hatching lines. Over break encourage your son or daughter to point out those specific types of line they see in everyday life. Next quarter we will be looking at bugs- encourage your students to draw some bugs that have different details lines!

3rd Grade/4th Grade

The 3rd and 4th graders learned about value, texture and African art in their first quarter of school. Over break encourage your son or daughter to continue creating drawings that include value and texture. If possible take a filed trip to the Minneapolis Institute of Art (MIA) and see the African art there!

5th Grade/6th Grade

The 5th and 6th graders learned different drawing techniques and were briefly introduced to Gothic Architecture. Over break encourage your son or daughter continue to drawing using the techniques. The best way to become more comfortable with drawings is to keep drawing!

7th Grade/8th Grade

The 7th and 8th graders learned about architecture since the industrial revolution and a new drawing techniques called "zentangles". Over break encourage your son or daughter to teach you how to zentangle! If you have internet at home Google "Zentangle" and see all the possibilities.
