Dear Paideia Community,

As you are all aware, we had an incident this week that reminded us that our primary concern as educators is the safety of our school community. While we have comprehensive safety procedures in place, Thursday's incident reminded us that our vigilance is necessary at all times. At a special staff meeting on Thursday, preventive procedures were reviewed with all staff members, and we will be following up with a more thorough review and training on safety procedures. Please join us at Tuesday's Board meeting to learn more about how we are addressing safety issues, as well as the role of the Board in ensuring school-wide safety.

On a much more upbeat note, Paideia Academy had a lot of great events and inspiring moments in teaching and learning this week. Monday was a full day and night of family engagement, between our Monday Morning Meeting, Coffee with the Director, and our PTO meeting. Our Monday Morning Meeting was led by the Kindergarten team and focused on the character strength of Curiosity. At our Coffee with the Director on Monday morning, we discussed a variety of topics, including: 1) the assessments we use to ensure that we can compare our students' progress and performance with other students at Paideia, throughout Minnesota, and throughout the nation (please see our Comprehensive Assessment Plan in our Curriculum Guide (which will be updated soon for 2015-2016), 2) how to support students in making healthy choices at lunch, 3) arrival and dismissal procedures and challenges, 4) volunteerism at Paideia, and 5) how to motivate middle school students' love of learning.

A huge thank you goes out to our Physical Education teachers, Lindsey Bowman and Sammy Swenson, who led a conversation at Monday night's PTO meeting about Health standards and legislation that requires schools to educate students on methods to prevent sexually transmitted diseases and infections (STDs/STIs). Those present reviewed the results of a survey we sent out to families and discussed some strategies for addressing this in our Health curriculum.

Thank you as well to all of you who attended last night's K-2 Music Concert and who consistently support your children's musical development. We are lucky to be able to partner with MacPhail to provide our students with such strong musical foundations, and we appreciate your engagement in their education.

Enjoy a wonderful long weekend with your families! We look forward to seeing you on Tuesday.

## From your Counselors

#### 3 Tips for Helping Your Child Manage Stress

Like adults, kids also struggle with stress. Too many commitments, conflict in their families and problems with peers are all stressors that overwhelm children. Of course, "a certain amount of stress is normal," said <a href="Lynn Lyons">Lyons</a>, LICSW, a psychotherapist who specializes in treating anxious families and co-author of the book <a href="Anxious Kids, Anxious Parents: 7 Ways to Stop the Worry Cycle and Raise Courageous and Independent Children">Lyons</a>, with anxiety expert Reid Wilson, Ph.D. It's normal to feel stressed about starting middle school or taking a big test, she said.

The key to helping kids manage stress is teaching them to problem-solve, plan and know when to say yes and no to activities and commitments, she said. It isn't to "make everything smooth and comfortable." Here's a few of the ways you can help your kids manage stress successfully.

#### 1. Stop overscheduling.

One of the biggest stressors for kids is being overscheduled, Lyons said. And yet, today, kids are expected to pay attention and perform in school for seven hours, excel at extracurricular activities, come home, finish homework, and go to bed just to do it all over again the next day. As Lyons said, "Where's the downtime?" Kids need downtime to rejuvenate. Their brains and bodies need to rest. And they might not realize this by themselves. So knowing when your child is overscheduled is important.

#### 2. Make time for play.

Lyons emphasized the importance of "play that isn't pressured." There's no lesson, competition or end goal, she said. Younger kids will do this naturally. But older kids may forget how to simply play. Combine play with physical activity, which is critical for well-being. Some ideas include: riding your bikes, throwing around the baseball, wrestling and hiking, she said.

#### 3. Make sleep a priority.

Sleep is vital for everything from minimizing stress to boosting mood to improving school performance, Lyons said. If your child isn't getting enough sleep, that's another red flag that they're overscheduled, she said. Again, reducing commitments helps. Also helpful is stressing the importance of sleep, and creating an environment that facilitates it. For instance, keep TV – and other electronics – out of your child's bedroom.

## From the Classrooms

## **Kindergarten**

**Math:** Mrs. Johnson's Math Group: We will start our unit on money. We will focus on coins this week – recognizing, distinguishing differences and labeling different types of coins.

Ms. Stevens' Math Group: We will start our unit on measurement, taking time to focus on length. We will use words such as longer than, shorter than, same.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Continue practicing writing, recognizing and counting to 100. Find something that is longer than your arm. Look for something in your house that is shorter than your foot. Can you find something that is the same size as you? Look for different types of money at home. Log-in to IXL to practice these skills: E.2, E.3, E.9

Language Arts: Sight Words: they/saw/went. Sight Word Reader: They Went to America!

Ms. Stevens' Reading Group: We will continue working with word family words, taking time to focus on short e word families (\_et, \_en, \_ed). We will also work on reading all of the word family words (when they are not grouped together) and work in our guided reading groups reading at our individual levels.

Mrs. Johnson's Reading Group: We will continue to work with word family words. This week, we will focus on the \_in word family (bin, fin, pin, etc....)

- ⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Continue to practice letter sounds! Read a story in the car while driving to school. Log on to abcya.com and play some reading games. Look for word family words in books. Log in to Lexia Reading and practice your reading skills.
- ⇒ Social Studies: We will continue working through our unit on American Symbols.

Advisory: We will continue to explore curiosity!

Announcements: Friendly Reminder: No school on Monday for President's Day!

## 1st Grade

**Math:** We will be finishing our unit on non-standard measurement tools (paperclips, cubes, etc) & comparing lengths (shorter/longer)

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Please work on IXL K.1-K.12 for extra practice at home

Language Arts: We are writing friendly letters & finishing up testing individual reading levels.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Please read with your child every day. Please work on Lexia for extra practice. Your child can also practice the Dolch Word Lists that were sent home at conferences.

Science: We will be discussing the moon and its phases.

Social Studies: We will be discussing presidents and talking about the election process.

Advisory: Monday Morning Meeting will be on curiosity.

**Announcements:** We are looking for volunteers to read to our class for Reading Rocks in February. You can volunteer to read by following the link <a href="http://vols.pt/i2WBJx">http://vols.pt/i2WBJx</a>

Inspirations: Ryanna, Annika, Lola, Brielle, Elliot & Jasmine all retired clips this week! Way to go!

## **2nd Grade**

**Math:** Students will finish their unit on skip counting and repeated addition and subtraction, including doing simple multiplication and start their unit on graphing.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Practice skip counting (by 3s, 4s, 6s, etc.) and create number patterns to finish (for example, 23, 26, 29, \_\_\_\_, \_\_\_\_). Also continue to practice addition and subtraction basic facts for speed and accuracy and IXL skills: skip counting/number patterns (A.1-A.14), rounding (N.2 and N.3), adding 2-digit numbers (G.1-G.5; G.9), and subtracting 2-digit numbers (H.1-H.5; H.9).

Language Arts: Students will do Daily 5 rotations and guided reading groups. They will practice using the meaning of a known prefixes to help them determine the meaning of new words and will continue to practice identifying the main idea/topic and details in informative texts. In addition, students will have their spelling test on Thursday and learn their new spelling words on Friday.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Read nonfiction books together and talk about the main idea and details and look for words with prefixes in books and sort them by prefix or base word. Also continue to work on Lexia and the IXL Language Arts skills related to nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, capitalization, and letters. (Email your child's teacher if you need their log-in information for either Lexia or IXL.)

Science: Students will learn about lifecycles.

Social Studies: Students will finish their unit on the Civil War.

Advisory: We will do star of the week.

## 3rd Grade

**Math**: Aldrich: Money test (Tuesday), meters, centimeters and kilometers Gasper: Finishing division and starting our money unit

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Please work on the IXL skill that was listed in this week's weekly homework. For students in Mrs. Aldrich's math class please have your students continue to practice solving addition and subtraction problems with money. For Ms. Gasper's math class please have your students continue practicing word problems and multiplication/division facts.

Language Arts: Students will be working on spelling, Daily 5 stations, guided reading groups, and friendly letter writing.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Have your student practice writing a friendly letter to a family friend or family member.

#### 3rd grade continued

Science: Students will be continuing to practice the steps of the scientific method and performing experiments.

Social Studies: Students will be continuing to learn about the Vikings.

Advisory: This week in advisory we will be working on handwriting, cursive and organization.

**Announcements**: Please remember to keep track of your students reading minutes and send it in to count for our reading rocks minutes on Friday!

**Inspirations**: The third graders have been doing a great job conducting science experiments and making hypotheses! The third graders have also been doing a great job at reading at home for our Reading Rocks competition!

## 4th Grade

**Math:** Transformation test is on Tuesday. Students will then begin working on perimeter and area.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Use review links sent via email to study for the quiz.

Language Arts: Students will be reading articles about their famous person or historical event. Students will learn about 'This is' poems.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Keep track of minutes read at home for Reading Rocks Contest!

**Science**: Students will be learning about mixtures and solutions.

**Social Studies:** Students will study maps and longitude and latitude.

**Advisory:** Students will work on teamwork.

**Announcements:** We are running low on items for our school stores. We welcome things like: school supplies, new or gently used games, puzzles, etc.

**Inspirations:** Students had a fun time celebrating Valentine's Day!

## 5th Grade

**Math:** Next week in math, we will be reviewing everything we have learned about fractions and decimals and we will take a test on these skills at the end of the week.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Review any assignments or quizzes that have been passed back to students. Work through the problems your student got wrong and have them explain how to do it correctly. Review IXL skills L.2, L.4, M.8, M.10, C.3, C.7, C.12, and C.13.

**Language Arts:** Students continue to work on improving their vocabulary, writing, and reading. We have been working on making inferences and looking into what the author is telling us with dialogue.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Students should do lots of reading at home. Students can be recording reading minutes on the reading calendars and their "Reading "Rocks" sheets. Students are also welcome to bring their *Daybooks* home to review skills with their parents.

**Science**: 5A students will be learning the science of Taxonomy: How organisms are grouped and categorized. They will have a quiz reviewing cells, taxonomy and map reading skills next week. Study guides will be sent home mid-week. 5B students are beginning a unit on MN resources and engineering.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Students in 5A will view this site as a class, work with your child one on one to review information. <a href="http://www-tc.pbs.org/wgbh/nova/assets/swf/1/classify-life/class.swf">http://www-tc.pbs.org/wgbh/nova/assets/swf/1/classify-life/class.swf</a>
Students in 5B may choose a state park to virtually tour. Have students make a list of natural resources that they can see available in MN. <a href="http://www.dnr.state.mn.us/state">http://www.dnr.state.mn.us/state</a> parks/virtual tours.html

**Social Studies:** This week we will be finishing up our look at the Constitution and start looking at some of the amendments, specifically, the Bill of Rights.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Read the first ten amendments to the constitution. Discuss how you see these used today. Watch: http://www.history.com/topics/us-presidents/james-madison/videos/america-gets-a-constitution

Advisory: In Advisory we will be working on organization and be talking about self-esteem.

**Announcements:** We will be going on a field trip to the play "Huck Finn" in March. Be on the lookout for permission slips.

## 6th Grade

**Math:** Next week in math, we will finish our angle unit with a quiz. We will then move on to finding the area of different types of polygons including parallelograms, triangles, trapezoids, and irregular figures.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Have your student work on IXL skills Z.6-Z.8 to review angles and Z.23 and Z.24 to work on new material.

**Language Arts:** Students continue working on their Literature Circle novels and packets. Please check Schoolview to see that students are making progress on their literature circle packets.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Students should be reading their novels at home to make sure they are keeping up with the assigned reading. Students should be recording reading minutes both for their February reading calendars and their Reading Rocks fundraiser.

**Science**: Both sixth grade classes will be learning about the laws of force and motion. This week we will be focusing on what net force is and how to calculate it. We will also be learning what unbalanced and balanced forces are and how they affect motion.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Students will enjoy these short videos from PBS. **Social Studies:** This week, students will be looking at the major concepts of the Progressive Era—things like Women's Suffrage, Monopolies, Government Corruption, and more.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Watch Mary Poppins. Research Clara Ueland, a Minnesota Progressive.

Advisory: In Advisory we will be working on organization and be talking about self-esteem.

Announcements: We will be going on a field trip to the play "Huck Finn" in March. Be on the lookout for permission slips.

**Inspirations:** It was inspiring to see students working to include others.

## 7<sup>th</sup> Grade

**Math:** Next week in 7<sup>th</sup> grade we will be working with finding percents (lesson 8.2) and finding a number when the percent is known (lesson 8.3). We will wrap the week up with a review and a quiz on lesson 8.1 through 8.3.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Students will be using the online textbook to take notes at home. Students may also work IXL skill 7<sup>th</sup> grade K.1 through K.6.

**Language Arts:** Grade Language Arts seems to be relating well to <u>Anne Frank, The Diary of a Young Woman.</u> They are reading it aloud, reading silently and reading it at home. We seem to be interested by the struggles.

Science: Students will be exploring Food Webs and, specifically, the special role that plants play in supporting life systems.

⇒ Opportunities for Learning at Home: Try creating your own food web at one of the following websites at <a href="http://www.harcourtschool.com/activity/food\_menu.html">http://www.harcourtschool.com/activity/food\_menu.html</a> and/or <a href="www.learner.org/courses/envsci/interactives/ecology/">www.learner.org/courses/envsci/interactives/ecology/</a>. For enrichment credit, write a brief description of three things learned from doing this activity. As we study photosynthesis, students are also asked to bring plant clippings from home, which we can root, and then begin to grow in the lab under our sun lamp.

**Social Studies:** 7<sup>th</sup> Grade Social Studies has been learning about the causes and conduct of WWI. This week, they will investigate the outcome as well as the political impact of it. This will be done with a look at primary and secondary documents including treaties and speeches.

⇒ **Opportunities for Learning at Home:** Students are always encouraged to keep up with world events. Students also have a list of "I Can" statements which can help you gain better understanding of what is done in class.

**Advisory:** Advisory is discussing hope this month.

**Inspirations:** Everyone has seemed eager and excited about coming back after break.

## 8<sup>th</sup> Grade

**Math:** Next week in 8<sup>th</sup> grade we will be working on Powers of 10 and Scientific Notation (lesson 7.2), Multiplication Properties of Exponents (lesson 7.3), and Division Properties of Exponents (lesson 7.4). We will wrap the week off with a review on Friday for a guiz we will have the following Monday.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Students will be using the online textbook to take notes at home. Students may also work IXL skill 8<sup>th</sup> grade F.1 through F.10.

**Language Arts:** 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Language Arts is learning how to understand Shakespeare, by reading the play, Twelfth Night out loud, through graphic novels, Shakespeare made Easy and viewing the play each Act. We also have mad story boards to help understand the plot.

**Science**: Students will be finishing their study of the Sun-Earth-Moon relationship by exploring tides. Students will then begin a multi-day lab by walking in the footsteps of Galileo and his study of Jupiter. There will be a Take-Home test handed out on Monday during class that all students must complete by Thursday. Students will be using a website that they have created this quarter in order to complete the assignment.

⇒ **Opportunities for Learning at Home:** This is the best time of 2015 to see Jupiter! Visit <a href="www.in-the-sky.org">www.in-the-sky.org</a> and go outside to look for it! For additional content enrichment, go to <a href="www.youtube.com">www.youtube.com</a> and find the documentary "7 Wonders of the Solar System" by the History Channel. For enrichment credit, take Cornell notes on the documentary, nothing whether or not you agree with their top picks and if there is another choice that you would have included.

**Social Studies:** 8<sup>th</sup> Grade will be beginning work on a new world region this week; Sub-Saharan Africa. They will begin with a vocabulary and mapping study before investigating the physical geography of the region and its impact on people.

⇒ **Opportunities for Learning at Home:** Students are always encouraged to keep up with world events. Students also have a list of "I Can" statements which can help you gain better understanding of what is done in class.

Advisory: Advisory is discussing the character trait hope.

## **Music**

**Kindergarten-2nd Grade:** We will reflect on our concert and what went well, Our essential questions will be "What went well, what could we do better?"

**Inspirations:** Thank you to all of K-2 students and teachers for such a wonderful performance! Thank you also to parents and staff who helped with set-up of the chairs and performance space!

**3rd Grade:** We will learn "My Dragon is Disconsolate" and "I Wish I Had a Dragon" from our Spring Musical and we will begin learning about how our pitches in our ostinato (DoReMiSolLa) can be written.

**Inspirations:** Well done to third graders for learning the songs "Nasty Little Dragonsong" and "A Dragon is in My Computer" for our concert!
