Dear Paideia Community,

Congratulations to the Paideia Academy Science Olympiad for their participation in the MN State Science Olympiad Tournament last Saturday at St. Olaf College! It was great spending Pi Day with our team as they competed in their respective categories: Anatomy, Elastic Launched Glider, Entomology, Fossils, Road Scholar, Solar System, Write It/Do It, and Green Generation. Thank you to our students, the families of our Olympiads and Mr. Nelson for supporting our students' scientific endeavors!

This week, our students have been taking their last DDI tests before MCAs start after break. Their teachers will be analyzing the data from these tests during their professional development day at the end of spring break to prepare for re-teaching week when we return. Each grade level is also providing optional work packets or activities for students to work on at home during break so they can keep their minds active and retain the content knowledge and skills they have developed. Students who turn in completed packets or activities to their teachers when they return from break will receive a yet-to-be named reward (depending on how many students are eligible). Please encourage your child to continue their learning during break, whether they are reading, problem-solving, writing, working on their optional activities, learning a new song on their instrument, or creating their own experiments!

Throughout the past two weeks, I have met with nearly all teachers to review their mid-year evaluations with them and to discuss how Ms. Chamley, Ms. Kegel, and I can assist them to support their students in meeting their individual student learning goals, as well as meet their own professional goals. These conversations have given us wonderful opportunities to discuss teaching and learning, collaboration among colleagues, professional development, and many more topics. It has been great to hear teachers talk about how their views of the revised programs have evolved throughout the year, how much they have learned from each other, and about the plans they have for next year.

The Board has called a special Board Meeting on Tuesday, April 14th at 5:30pm to discuss the approval of next year's programming plan per staff feedback. I hope you will join us there to join our discussion of academic excellence and what separates Paideia from other local schools.

News from the Board

I want to extend a HUGE congratulations to the all of the students and the PTO for the success of Reading Rocks! The students read over 200,000 total minutes and raised almost \$8,000. Kudos to the PTO, and in particular Marinda Schader and Cory Ehrhardt, for organizing and instituting this great fundraiser to get our kids reading.

This past Tuesday, the HR Committee met and discussed the programming for the next school year. After much discussion, it was decided to give the staff a chance to review the proposed programming before it was presented to the Board for approval. The HR meeting then rolled into the Board meeting. In response to the staff satisfaction survey results, the staff have been working on identifying a few areas for improvement for each Board committee to address. After a lot of hard work, several teacher and staff representatives presented the items they want to Board to work on, along with ideas for action plans and timelines. We thank the staff for all their hard work. These items will help guide the Board's work over the next year. The Board also went into a closed session to discuss contract negotiation strategy and proposals for Ms. Levy-Maguire's next contract.

Due to several factors, the Board will have another **Special Board Meeting on Tuesday, April 14, at 5:30 p.m.** The Board will be reviewing and voting on: (1) programming for next year; and, (2) approval of the 990 tax form. The Board will also be considering a proposal for Ms. Levy-Maguire's next contract.

The Special Board Meeting will be followed by the Finance Committee meeting at 6 p.m., which will be discussing the 2015-16 budget, and the School Culture and Communication meeting at 7 p.m.

Finally, we still need a handful of volunteers to staff a booth at the Apple Valley Home & Garden Show on Saturday, April 11. We are looking for volunteers to serve during a 9 a.m. - noon shift or a noon - 3 p.m. shift. These events greatly assist Paideia in getting its name out in the community and educating families on charter schools and Paideia's offerings, in particular. 
Looking for ways to enrich and engage your child during Spring Break?

From the Classrooms

Kindergarten

Math: Practice using non-standard measurement to measure things around your house: how many shoes long is your driveway? How many pieces of spaghetti long is your kitchen table? Practice counting objects in your house: how many shoes does your family own? How many pieces of fruit do you see in your refrigerator? Please see the bingo-style board that was sent home with your student for more ideas.

Language Arts: Read a story with a family member, keep a daily journal about what you do over break, write your sight words on the sidewalk using chalk, see the bingo-style board that was sent home with your student for more ideas. Review Sight Words: a, am, and, are, blue, brown, big, black, can, down, do, for, find, green, go, here, help, he, have, I, it, is, in, like, look, little, my, me, make, no, not, orange, on, purple, pink, please, play, red, see, said, she, saw, to, the, this, these, they, that, up, where, we, will, who, want, when, went, yellow, you, yes.

Social Studies: Practice saying the Pledge of Allegiance, go to the library and check out books on American Symbols, see the bingo-style board that was sent home with your student for more ideas.

Science: Go outside and explore, look for changes in the weather, watch for Spring changes around your home, see the bingo-style board that was sent home with your student for more ideas.

Advisory: Go outside and PLAY! Play a game with your family members – practice sharing and taking turns.

Announcements: Please look for a bingo-style board that came home with your student full of activities to try over Spring Break. Remember, these activities are not required but are a fun way to get your entire family involved in what we have been learning about this past quarter.

Inspirations: Happy Birthday David (3/31) and Hasini (4/4)! Those pesky leprechauns paid us several visits in kindergarten this week! It was fun to watch the kindergartners get so excited over each of their visits!

1st Grade

Math: Work with your child to identify key words in a word problem to determine if they should add or subtract. Have your child practice lining up 2-digit addition and subtraction problems.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Continue to work on IXL skills: Addition (B.16, B.17, B.26), Subtraction (D.20), Mixed Addition and Subtraction (F.6, F.8).

Language Arts: Have your child read to your or someone else. Ask your child to retell the story in order and focusing on who the characters are and where the setting takes place. Continue working with the Dolch Sight word list.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Continue to work on Lexia and the IXL Language Arts skills. (Email your child's teacher if you need their log-in information for either Lexia or IXL.)

Science: Ask your student to tell you about the planets and the layers of the Earth; including the rocks found in the Earth.

Social Studies: Ask your child if they can tell you something they learned about Presidents Washington, Lincoln, Obama. **Advisory:** Talk to your child about tattling vs. telling.

Announcements: We had a great 3rd Quarter!!!! Be sure to complete and return the homework packet.

Inspirations: Congrats to Annika, Alyse, Ryanna, Chris, Elliot, Brielle, Lydia, and Addison for retiring clips this week!

2nd Grade

- **Math:** Do some math everyday over break! Practice math facts or skills through playing math games such as Salute, Addition War, Yahtzee, or Rack-o or using flash cards. Write story (word) problems about what you are doing over break and solve them. Count coins in a piggy bank and write the amount in dollars and in cents. Role play buying something or giving change using play or real coins. Practice rounding numbers to the nearest 10 or 100 and adding and subtraction with regrouping. Also continue to work on IXL skills related to money, skip counting, addition, subtraction, rounding etc.
- Language Arts: Read! Read! Read! Read fiction books and identify setting, problem, solution and any lesson or moral. Read nonfiction texts (magazines, newspapers, books) and identify main idea and specific details. Check out audio-books/books on CD from the library and listen and follow along in the book at home or in the car. Read and discuss a chapter book as a family or take turns having siblings read to each other. Write about your adventures over spring break, write a letter to a friend or relative, or write an informative paragraph about something you know a lot about or an opinion paragraph about a favorite thing. Also, practice IXL Language Arts skills related to capitalization, nouns, adjectives, verbs, adverbs, contractions, compound words, prefixes and suffixes, alphabetic order, and dictionary skills.
- **Science**: Plant some seeds and write down observations and draw pictures to show their growth each day. Take a nature walk or go to the science museum or the Works museum as a family.
- **Social Studies:** Find and label U.S. landmarks on a map (especially ones you have been to or are going to go to as a family!). Mark on a map where any out-of-state relatives or friends live and discuss what states or oceans are north, south, east, or west of that state. Also go to the history museum or check out biography or informational books related to social studies topics of interest (ex. Martin Luther King Jr., Susan B. Anthony, Civil War, Constitution, etc.).
- **Advisory:** Read books on and/or discuss friendship and positive friendly behaviors that will show others you want to be their friend. Role play what to do when there are conflicts with friends.
- **Announcements:** We are will be providing more information on quarter 4 field trips after break! We are very excited that we won a free field trip to the Ordway through Reading Rocks! Also, we would continue to love donations of tissue boxes and more items for the treasure box.
- **Inspirations:** Congrats to Cole, Emilie, Lucy, Rowan, Raegan, Isaac, Kyla, Ambrose, Sam B., Sam E., Abby, Jenna, Melody, Cedric, and Lydia on retiring clips this week!

3rd Grade

Math: Students can practice their multiplication and division facts. They can also review graphing and how to tell time.

- ⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home**: Please work on any IXL standards not yet completed. Your student can also work on their MCA practice packet to get ready for the MCA's!
- **Language Arts:** The students can practice their handwriting, writing letters to a family member or friend, writing a persuasive letter, writing a narrative story and describing the main idea and details in any books they have read.

- **Science**: Students can review the scientific method, the names of the bones in the human body, sound and hearing. We will start learning about our solar system in fourth quarter so they can also start memorizing the order of the planets if they would like!

- Advisory: Students can practice writing their cursive letters and discussing how they have used kindness over spring break!
