From your Counselors

April's Character Trait is Forgiveness.

Kids are constantly asked to forgive others. When siblings upset them, we ask them to forgive. When friends aren't friendly, we ask them to forgive. When parents, teachers and grandparents make mistakes and hurt their feelings, we ask kids to go ahead and forgive them. And they do. But do they really understand what it means to be forgiving? Are they, in fact, forgiving other people, or are they following a script written by their parents?

Forgiveness is an important life skill, but it requires instruction, practice and patience. Telling one child to mutter, "I'm sorry," and another to respond with, "I forgive you," isn't actually a lesson in forgiveness. These moments teach kids what to say, but they do little to help kids understand the process of forgiveness.

Learning how to forgive is essential because it helps increase positive emotions. When people learn how to forgive and move forward, they experience greater happiness and less stress. They don't let negative experiences define them.

Modeling forgiveness is always important when it comes to helping children understand the process of forgiving, and not just within the family. Children should see and hear your stories about forgiveness with friends, co-workers and extended family. This normalizes the process and helps them internalize the steps to being forgiving.

Acceptance Helps... Accepting that something happened and is over is a powerful exercise. When we replay negative events in our minds, we get stuck in a loop. We rethink every step of the problem to look for the pivotal moment that could have changed everything. But "could haves" are useless at times.

Express Emotions... When we cue kids to immediately accept an "I'm sorry" from a friend, we miss one important piece of the forgiveness process. It doesn't feel good when others hurt our feelings, and we have a right to let them know exactly how it feels. Teach your children to state the feeling first and then work toward forgiveness. If a friend leaves your child out at school, for example, your child should say, "It really made me feel mad and sad when you told me that I couldn't play with your group. I didn't like that." Once the feelings have been addressed, you can talk to your child about what might have triggered the situation. In this case, maybe the friend wasn't feeling well, needed a break or felt jealous about something. Exploring the issue from two sides helps your child tap into empathy, and that increases.

Time Heals...Forgiveness is both an action and a choice. It takes time. Kids deserve the space to process their emotions at their own pace, and that might mean taking a break from a friendship for a while. Immediate forgiveness might work short term, but if kids don't have the time to actually work through their feelings, those feelings will return again and again. (all parenting .com)

From the Classrooms

Math: Mrs. Johnson's Math Group: We will continue working on addition and subtraction with numbers through 20. We started working with number bonds last week and will continue to work at this tricky concept this week! Ms. Stevens' Math Group: We will introduce addition with numbers through 8.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Log-in to IXL and practice skills. Practice addition and subtraction with numbers through 20 using different manipulates to help (buttons, spoons, pennies, etc...). Ask your kindergartener (in Ms. Stevens' math group) to tell you about Gus the Plus and Squeakel the Equal.

Language Arts: Sight Words: came Sight Word Reader: The Weather Came

Ms. Stevens' Reading Group: We will continue learning about consonant digraphs. We will review the story of the H Brothers and focus on the digraph /sh/. Mrs. Johnson's Reading Group: We will introduce the short u word family _ug. We will also continue building independent reading stamina – our goal is to reach 12 minutes of uninterrupted, independent reading time!

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Log in to Lexia Reading and practice your reading skills. Ask your student to tell you the story of the H Brothers. Look for digraphs in books, magazines and newspapers. Make a list of words that begin or end with SH. Practice building reading stamina by reading independently for 5 minutes a day and slowly adding a minute or thirty seconds on to it.

Social Studies: We will continue our unit on the seven continents. This week, we will focus on Europe. We will also talk about goods and services.

Science: We will continue our unit on Spring.

Advisory: We will begin the discussion about getting ready for first grade and what this means/looks like.

Announcements: Field trip permission slips, as well as chaperone opportunity forms came home with your child this week. Please take a second to look through these, fill them out and return to school. Parents interested in volunteering must let their child's teacher know by Friday, May 1st to be part of the lottery.

Inspirations: Happy Birthday Jesslyn (4/27)! We did a science experiment about rain this week that they students really enjoyed! Ask your child where rain comes from!

1st Grade

Math: We will be introducing Ch. 15

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Continue to work on IXL skills: Addition (B.16, B.17, B.26), Subtraction (D.20), Mixed Addition and Subtraction (F.6, F.8)

Language Arts: Students will do Daily 5 rotations focusing on long vowel patterns & key detail comprehension in reading.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Continue to work on Lexia and the IXL Language Arts skills. (Email your child's teacher if you need their log-in information for either Lexia or IXL.)

Science: We will be discussing the human body's muscular system.

Social Studies: We will be wrapping up and assessing our unit on the original 13 colonies

Advisory: We will have Monday Morning Meeting.

Announcements: We will be going on a 1st grade class field trip on May 28th to the Children's Museum in St. Paul. We would love chaperones to help us make this a fun day! Permission slips and more information will be coming closer to the date. Make sure you send warm clothes for outside recess as the MN weather is unpredictable!

Inspirations: Congrats to Alyse, Annika, Sammy, Mohamed, & Brielle on retiring clips this week!

2nd Grade

Math: Students will finish their unit on telling time and distinguishing between a.m. and p.m.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Practice telling time at home and discuss what time you do certain activities (such as eat dinner or go to bed). Also, review rounding, create and solve story (word) problems, and continue to work on IXL skills: telling time (Q.2-Q.6; Q8), counting money (P.3.-P.6), graphing (R.2-R.5, R.8-R.9), skip counting/number patterns (A.1-A.14), and rounding (N.2 and N.3).

Language Arts: Students will do Daily 5 rotations and reading groups. Students will review adverbs and practice using irregular verbs. In addition, students will have their regular spelling test on Thursday, and will get their new words on Friday.

Deportunities for learning at home: Identify and discuss parts of speech in writing. Identify the main idea or central message of books. Also continue to work on Lexia and the IXL Language Arts skills. (Email your child's teacher if you need their log-in information for either Lexia or IXL.)

Science: Students will learn about the lifecycles of insects that go through complete metamorphosis.

Social Studies: Students will learn about Ancient India (Core Knowledge).

Advisory: We will do star of the week.

Announcements: We continue to love donations of tissue boxes, more items for the treasure box, and portable CD players

Inspirations: Congrats to Adelyn, Ani, Ashton, Lydia, Emmie, Brian, and Kyla on retiring clips this week!

3rd Grade

Math: Math review games.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home**: Please work on the IXL topic listed on this week's homework. Students can also practice their multiplication and division facts.

Language Arts: The students will be working on spelling sorts, poetry, and daily 5.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Have your student practice identifying the main idea of a story they read.

Science: Students will be learning about the planets in the solar system.

Social Studies: Students will be finishing up our unit Earliest Americans. Stay tuned for the date for our unit test.

Advisory: We will be talking about the character trait forgiveness and bravery.

Announcements: Please remember to send in your student's field trip permission slip and let your student's homeroom teacher know if you would like to volunteer to chaperone the field trip!

Inspirations: The third graders did an awesome job with their MCA math tests!

4th Grade

Math: We will be working with fractions and decimals.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Use a recipe to make something. Budget to buy an item and figure out change you will receive.

Language Arts: There is MCA testing this week during Language Arts.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Have your student read, alone, aloud, listen to reading.

Science: We will learn about pulse and heart rate. The first quiz will be on Friday. Students may use notes for this quiz.

Social Studies: Students will continue to learn about castles and medieval England.

Advisory: We are working on how to have a good discussion with peers.

Announcements: Make sure your student gets a good night's sleep, eats breakfast, and is to school on time. The staff talent show is Thursday at 6:30pm, join us for a fun night!

Inspirations: Students have been working hard on their MCA tests this week!

5th Grade

Math: Next week in math we will be continuing our unit on three-dimensional shapes. This will include learning about faces, vertices, edges, nets, surface area, and volume.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Students can work on their knowledge of three-dimensional shapes at home by completing IXL skills B.9 and B.11. Students can also continue practicing for the MCA's next week on http://www.mathslice.com/mathmocktest.php.

Language Arts: Next week we will be working on poetic devices and beginning our Daily 5 stations. Students will also begin writing their own poetry.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Students should be doing lots of reading at home! Watch for May reading calendars.

Science: 5th grade students will be beginning their unit on earth surfaces and how they are formed.

Deportunities for learning at home: Visit this website to see some historic events that shaped the earth's surface. http://www.e-learningforkids.org/science/lesson/shaping-the-earths-surface/

Social Studies: Please continue to work with your students to help them develop their end-of-quarter project. This week we will be discussing entrepreneurship, profit, and other economic concepts.

Opportunities for learning at home: Have your students discuss the costs, risks, and rewards of starting a small business with someone you know who is a small business owner.

Advisory: Students will be working on organization skills and classwork.

Announcements: Make sure students have adequate sleep and a good breakfast before MCAs!

Inspirations: It was inspiring to see students working hard on MCAs.

6th Grade

Math: Next week in math we will be creating a math review book as a class. Each student will chose a topic we have covered this year and write a how-to paper along with create an illustration or example.

⇒ Opportunities for learning at home: Students can work on IXL skills at home based on the skill they are writing about in class. Encourage your student to tell you about the topic they are writing about! Students can also continue practicing for the MCA's next week on: http://go.hrw.com/hrw.nd/arbiter/pRedirect? project=courseware&linkType=assignment&id=340.

Language Arts: Next week students will be diving deeper into "The Odyssey." We'll also be working on writing a narrative poem about a sport or activity.

⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Students should be doing lots of reading at home! Watch for May reading calendars.

Science: 6th grade students will be completing an engineering project to create a table out of newspaper and cardboard.

Deportunities for learning at home: Prepare students for our own engineering project by engineering a shelter. Instructions can be found at the following website. https://www.teachengineering.org/view_activity.php?url=collection/csm_/activities/csm_amazon/csm_lesson3_activity1_tg.xml

Take a family trip to The Works, a science and engineering museum in Bloomington. The museum features lots of hands on fun for kids!

Social Studies: This week, the changes World War II brought to Minnesota and how Minnesotans were involved.

Opportunities for learning at home: If you have a friend or family member who is old enough to have remembered life in Minnesota during this time period, have a conversation with them about how they saw things changing.

Advisory: Students will be working on organization skills and classwork.

Announcements: Make sure students have adequate sleep and a good breakfast before MCAs!

Inspirations: It was inspiring to see students working hard on MCAs.

7th Grade

- Math: Next week we will be looking at Squares and Square Roots and the Real Number system. If we have time we may look at some more complex probability like the fundamental counting principle and needing factorials to solve problems like these
- ⇒ **Opportunities for learning at home:** Students may use IXL and other internet sources to further practice at home outside of their regularly scheduled assignments.
- Language Arts: Seventh and Eighth Grade Language Arts classes are continuing their practice of writing five paragraph essays. They are currently writing essays about their breaks. Next they will write about colonizing Mars, this year's Socratic seminar topic. Both classes are improving reading and writing skills by working through their Daybooks.
- **Science:** During Week #2, students were introduced to the evidence supporting evolution, which includes the similarities seen between species (comparative anatomy), the continuity of the fossil record, and DNA testing. During this week students will take a "deeper dive" into the fossil record and the work of paleontologists. We aim to begin studying natural selection by the end of the week.
- ⇒ **Opportunities for Learning at Home**: Explore the Fossil Record through an interactive site created by the University of California and sponsored by the National Science Foundation. Go here: http://www.ucmp.berkeley.edu/education/explorations/tours/fossil/
- **Social Studies:** 7th Grade Social Studies will be continuing their study of WWII and the Holocaust. After having looked at the major leaders, students will be investigating the home front of the war as they move closer to the end.
- Deportunities for Learning at Home: Students are always encouraged to keep up with world events. Students also have a list of "I Can" statements which can help you gain better understanding of what is done in class.

Advisory: Advisory is discussing forgiveness this month.

Announcements: All 7th & 8th grade students will be gathering on Tuesday, June 2, during periods1-3, for a special discussion on the colonization of Mars. Students will use the Socratic oratory skills they have learned in their classes this Spring. They will demonstrate how they make connections from the text to the world. Students are asked to dress up for this event and bring \$3 for a special pizza lunch.

8th Grade

Math: Next week we will be looking at Multiplying Polynomials and Special Products of Polynomials. If we have time we may also look at Factors and Greatest Common Factors.

- Deportunities for learning at home: Students may use IXL and other internet sources to further practice at home outside of their regularly scheduled assignemnts.
- **Language Arts:** Seventh and Eighth Grade Language Arts classes are continuing their practice of writing five paragraph essays. They are currently writing essays about their breaks. Next they will write about colonizing Mars, this year's Socratic seminar topic. Both classes are improving reading and writing skills by working through their Daybooks.
- **Science**: Students will participate in two engineering challenges and then engage in a day of reflection for the DDI test to be taken at the end of May.
- ⇒ **Opportunities for Learning at Home**: The Department of Engineering at the University of Cambridge has a great interactive engineering activities, including games and exciting up-to-date news. Check it out here: http://www-g.eng.cam.ac.uk/mmg/teaching/peterstidwill/interact/interact/interact.htm
- Social Studies: 8th Graders are continuing their work on South and Central Asia. This week will focus on the Indian economy, including Bollywood, and a look into the Caste System that has been in place for many years. Students are always encouraged to keep up with world events. Students also have a list of "I Can" statements which can help you gain better understanding of what is done in class.

Advisory: Advisory is discussing the character trait humor.

Announcements: All 7th & 8th grade students will be gathering on Tuesday, June 2, during periods1-3, for a special discussion on the colonization of Mars. Students will use the Socratic oratory skills they have learned in their classes this Spring. They will demonstrate how they make connections from the text to the world.
