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Secretary's Report, 1933 R. S. Mackintosh, Secretary

In order to save time at the Board meeting on November 13 I am sending my annual report to the members of the Executive Board before the annual meeting so that each may know about the various activities of the society and how they have been carried on during the year.

The Treasurer's Report is given on page 158 of the September-October issue of the magazine.

State Appropriation

It is necessary to go back into 1932 a few months to the time the budget request was submitted to the State Budget Commissioner for presentation to the Legislature of 1933. The budget submitted was based on the actual expenditures from the State appropriation of \$6500 allowed by the Legislature of 1931. During the fiscal year 1931-2 the expenditures were \$5951.32 thus leaving a balance of \$548.68, or a saving of nearly nine per cent. The Commissioner recommended that the society be given \$10,830 for the biennium. The Legislature only allowed \$8000 and unexpended balances so we shall have \$9596.50 available for 1934 and 1935. During 1932-3 we saved \$1107.85. Accordingly we shall have available \$4828 each year, or \$565 below the amount used during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1933.

In addition the Legislature provided that salaries of more than \$1200 be reduced 20 per cent. It meant a cut of \$300 in the salary of the secret ry. Because my salary from the University was reduced from \$1500 to \$750 with a corresponding reduction in time from one-half to one-fourth the President and Chairman of the Executive Board arranged with the Commission to raise the salary from \$1200 to \$1350. This is mentioned in detail so that you will have the facts before you. I am confident that much more than one-half of my time has been devoted to the work of the society. The salary of Mr. Latham, the former secretary, was \$1800 a year. (The secretary of the Iowa society received \$3725 during the year ending June 30, 1933. This year he is to get \$3100 of which \$2400 is from the society, \$600 from the Iowa Fruit Growers Association (if collections are made), and \$100 from other sources. The salary of the secretary of the Wisconsin society last year was \$3600 and this year it is to be \$2600. It is interesting to note that the appropriations in Iowa and Wisconsin are \$4000 a year the same as ours.)

After the salary adjustment of \$150 has been subtracted from the \$585 it leaves the sum of \$415 to be deducted from other items during the current year. By pruning here and there I am sure we can do reasonably well in maintaining the society.

Society Printing Fund

The most urgent problem now before us is to get sufficient money from memberships and advertising to pay for the printing of the magazine during the coming year. The following table explains why the revenue from memberships has gradually decreased because a larger proportion of the memberships come through the auxiliary societies.

Under our present plan all the expenses for printing and soliciting of advertising are paid out of the membership and advertising funds.

In order to keep within our means only nine magazines are to be issued this year.

Your executive committee asked the secretary to call the attention of the Bruce Publishing Co., to the fact that the income from advertising was not sufficient to pay the cost of soliciting. Mr.McCabe, the vice-president, wrote that his company would change from a regular charge of \$49.50 an issue to a 30 per cent rate. This concession will help reduce that expense considerably.

The balance, about \$500 is a "nest egg" which can be used for the first magazines in 1934 if current funds do not come in fast enough.

I did not realize that this "nest egg" would be so useful when I moved that current funds be set aside to build up the life membership fund so that the interest could be used to pay part of the cost of the magazine going to the life members. So far we have not had to draw on this fund to augment our current income. Mr. Edward Yanish, a board member at that time suggested in 1919, that the society purchase Liberty Bonds because they were below par. The Board purchased four \$1000 registered bonds at a total cost of \$3,718.63. The fund has been built up from interest earnings since that time. So far as known none of these bonds are in the recent call of the Treasurer of the United States. I believe a special resolution should be passed empowering the executive committee to take proper action in case any or all of these Liberty Bonds are included in any future calls. I suggest:

Old Reports

We have stored in the attics of the Administration and Horticultural Buildings at University Farm more than 5000 cloth and paper bound reports printed prior to 1931. At the present time they are not doing anyone any good. We have tired to move them but it has been impossible to do so. Would it do to offer them to members providing they pay the postage and a few cents additional for wrapping? When packed each book weighs about two pounds, consequently the postage to any zone can be easily figured. No doubt an extra charge of five cents would bring sufficient revenue to pay for packing.

Loan Library

During the year 103 persons have barrowed 142 books from the loan library. It gives the members a chance to get these books at a very small cost because of the special postal rate on bibrary books in the first three postal zones of three cents for the first pound and one cent for each additional pound.

Bank Holiday

The "Bank Holiday" doubtless caused us to lose many members this year. A letter was sent to some of the members stating that we would keep their names on the roll for a while. We think most of them have remitted.

We had \$24.41 in the Contigent Fund deposited in the St.
Anthony Park State Bank when it closed. The bank re-opened under
the limitation that 30 per cent of the deposits be set aside in a
Trust Fund. The society had \$7.32 tied up but a dividend of 25
per cent was allowed so at the present time there is \$5.49 tied up.

Report of Meeting of Local Board.

The local committee of the Executive Board met this afternoon in the Horticultural Building at University Farm. Present; R. A. Wright, Chairman, LeRoy Cady, C. L. Smith, Ed. Yanish, W. H. Alderman and R. S. Mackintosh, Acting Secretary.

Bids from four firms for printing magazine and report were read and on motion it was voted to request the State Printer to award the contract to Harrison and Smith, Minneapolis, if he found their bid to be the lowest.

A budget for 1920 was presented by the Acting Secretary based on income and expenditures from the reports of the last three years.

This indicates that there are not sufficient funds outside of reserve funds to meet all obligations.

It was the unanimous opinion of the committee that the invitation extended by Professor Alderman that the office and library of the Society be moved from the Kasota Block to Room 10, Horticultural Building at University Farm. Room 10 is on the ground floor with a south exposure and of sufficient size to house the library, desks and supplies. It is to be furnished without cost to the Society. The plan is that Mr. Mackintosh move his office from the Administration Building to this room so that he can look after all activities to better advantage. The Committee requested that this matter be brought to the attention of the other members of the Board with a request that they express their opinion on this question prior to the next meeting of the Committee December 20th, Minneapolis.

The question of sending the magazine to all farm bureaus and schools maintaining agricultural teachers was discussed and action deferred one week.

On motion it was voted to meet December 20, in the office of the Society, at one o'clock P. M. and that the outside members attend if they care to do so.





BOOKS and BULLETINS to READ



Orchard and Small Fruit Culture, by Professors E. C. Auchter and H. B. Knapp, (John Wiley & Sons, New York, 584 pages, 1929).

One of the most comprehensive books yet published covering the culture of deciduous fruits. It is designed as a class book for students in colleges. For instance, the operations listed in Chapter I, devoted to harvesting, storing, and marketing the apple, are divided into four subdivisions: picking, packing, storing,

The following paragraphs from the preface describe more fully the objects of

"The growing of fruit is becoming in-creasingly the business of a specialist. The mastery of the problems connected with it requires the unremitting attention of those who would be successful. Diversity, when it is desired, can be secured within the enterprise through diversity in varieties and in kinds and types of fruit grown, so that the grower has a business that functions and requires attention the year round. Notable among trends in the industry is the increasing competition between fruits from all parts of the world and the increasing demand by the public for greater perfection and higher quality. These developments are compelling the grower to familiarize himself with the fundamentals that affect and control the growing of fruit and to adapt such knowledge to sound practice.

The authors have attempted to present the problems of the orchard and small fruit plantation just as the man would meet them who expects to get his living. educate his children, and take his full part in the life of his day by means of his fruit enterprise. Such a man must know sound practice. The authors have emphasized the applied phases of the business throughout. But since practices and methods must be determined by something more than a set of rules, it is essential that the student and grower should understand the fundamental principles underlying plant growth and fruit production. With such knowledge it will

be clear that the same practices might not be suitable under all conditions of environment. The interrelation of these practices will also be evident. The grower will be better able to decide upon the practices best suited to his conditions and to select those which will result in adequate tree growth and fruit production, whether they are the so-called "standard" practices or not.

The subjects relating to practice have been approached and arranged on the seasonal basis and in the order in which the grower would give consideration to them, beginning with the picking of the fruit. Each one has been broken down into the major problems and operations of which it is composed. It has been customary in test-books to begin with the establishment of the fruit plantation. However, most growers are not establishing new plantations, but are caring for those already in place. Subjects such as Pollination, and the Growth of the Tree and the Forming of Fruit Buds, which do not lend themselves to a job analysis method of treatment, have been presented by an explanation of the scientific principles which underlie sound practice.

Landscape Design, by Henry V. Hubbard and Theodora Kimball, (Revised Edition, 1929, Macmillan

More than 400 pages of text and 36 halftone plates make up this treatise on landscape design. The text is well illustrated by numerous drawings carefully chosen. The authors write:

"We mean this book to present a general conception of landscape design which may enable a designer better to determine for himself the relations of the objects and ideas with which he is dealing, and better to prepare and use in a decisive way, in the individual problems of his profession, the natural aptitudes and acquired knowledge which are the tools of his trade. The book may also serve as a general introduction to the subject for those whose interest in it is purely that of appreciation and enjoyment of landscape design and of natural landscapes.

"

"In conclusion, may I express my thanks to your splendid Secretary, Mr. R. S. Mackintosh for the fine cooperation extended to our organization in this matter. May this splendid Memorial be retained in the future as an inspiration to our association, to your society, and to the citizens of our Great Commonwealth."

Minnesota State Horticultural Society Minutes of meeting, December 4,1934

Pursuant to an announcement made in the September (including October) issue of the Minnesota Horticulturist, pages 146-147, that an annual meeting of the society would be held in Room 211 of the Minnesota Union, University of Minnesota, at 8:00 o'clock P.M. December 4,1934, President Alfred Swanson at 8:15 P.M. noted that a quorum was present and called the meeting to order.

The first order of business was the consideration of the proposed amendments to the Articles of Incorporation. At the meeting of the executive board held at Red Wing, November 15, 1933, the secretary was instructed to confer with the Attorney General regarding changes in the Articles of Incorporation of the society in order to make certain changes. Mr. R.C.Frank, Assistant Attorney General, outlined a form to be followed in amending articles and by-laws. The proposed amendments were printed on page 147 of the September issue of the Minnesota Horticulturist, and in the program of the meeting of the society, November 13-15,1934 at the Hotel Lowry, St. Paul; and read at the opening session of the meeting of the society that same evening. In addition they were approved by the executive board at its meeting November 13, 1934.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP-Section 1. Any person may become an annual member of the society upon the payment of an annual fee of one dollar to the secretary-treasurer. Any person may become a lifemember of the society upon the payment of a fee of ten (10) dollars to the secretary-treasurer. Members of state or local societies interested in horticulture may become members of the society as a unit by the payment of such fees as the executive board may prescribe, to read, Any person may become an annual member of the society upon the payment to the Secretary-treasurer an annual fee as the Executive Board may prescribe. Any person may become a life member of the society upon the payment of a fee of ten (10) dollars to the secretary-treasurer. Members of state or local societies interested in horticulture may become members of the society as a unit by the payment of such fees as the executive board may prescribe.

ARTICLE VII, QUORUM. Number of members required for a quorum was increased from ten to twenty-five.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS. The last sentence "Two days written notice must be given each member of proposed amendments." was changed to the following: "At least ten days prior written notice by mail, or publication in the official publication, of the society, must be given each member of proposed amendments."

Mr. Mackintosh moved that amendments as approved by the executive board be adopted. Motion carried.

(Note: In addition to the members present there were 369 proxies from life and annual members in favor of the amendments to the Articles of Incorporation.)

The next order of business was the consideration of the adoption of the by-laws as approved by the executive board, November 13,1934 and read at the opening meeting of the society the same evening.

The Executive Committee met at 10:30 A.M. in the office of Olaf J. Olson, 20 West Fifth Street, St. Paul.

The secretary asked if it would be feasible, when new by-laws were adopted, to offer the schools of the state special discounts for soliciting memberships. The secretary was asked to prepare copy of circulars and plans to be submitted at a later date.

The secretary requested funds to use in visiting affiliated societies and localities when new clubs may be formed. Approved.

The bid of the Bruce Publishing Co., St. Paul for printing the magazine for the ensuing two years was approved, providing funds are available.

It was voted to reduce the fee affiliated members are to pay, if membership premiums are wanted, from fifteen cents to ten.

The following from the Duluth Garden Flower Society was read and placed on file:

"Our delegates to the annual meeting in St. Paul recently brought back to us the discussion of the board as to the raising of dues for member societies for the coming year, or the amendment to the constitution to that effect. The matter was quite thoroughly discussed at the last meeting of the Executive Board, and the discussion was terminated by a unanimous vote of the Executive Board of the Duluth Garden Flower Society that the board of the Horticultural Society be advised that the Duluth Garden Flower Society wishes the annual dues of the member societies left at thirty cents per member.

Will you please take our action to the next meeting of the board, and have it so recorded."

The secretary asked if a new by-law should be added regarding the approval of the abstracts submitted for state funds. The secretary was instructed to prepare and approve abstracts as he had been doing in the past.

It was voted to pay the secretary twenty-five dollars for use of automobile during 1934.

The Secretary asked for permission to apply to relief agencies for the assignment of help to index the books and bulletins in the library as well as to prepare abstracts of certain articles and reports. Approved providing suitable help is available.

The report of committee on premiums prepared by J.D.Winter was read (page Items 1, 2, and 3 were discussed but referred to Executive Board

Items 4 and 5 were approved.

The secretary reported that the 1934 membership roll had been examined to find number of names duplicated. It was found that 31 members were members of more than one affiliated society, or a total of 42 duplications. List of duplications given on page

Dear Mr. Mackintosh:

For sometime we have been intending to present in writing some thoughts in connection with the present policy of MINNESOTA HORTICULTURIST in accepting advertising in which prices are quoted. It seems that the trend on the part of advertisers is very definitely toward the desire to quote prices. Our experience during the past months indicates that we are losing some advertising because of it, as specifically two advertisers agreed to run copy if they could quote prices. These firms are reliable, recognized growers, and in one instance the firm in question is headed by a man very active in the Minnesota State Horticultural Society.

After all, there are many reasons why a legitimate, recognized firm should be permitted to quote prices on his merchandise. Summarized briefly, they are as follows: First, it is customary trade and advertising practices that when an article is offered for sale the advertiser states his price. Second, it is generally the opinion that results from advertising would be materially increased if prices were included in the advertising messages. This, after all, is very important to MINNESOTA HORTICULTURIST because in many instances we have had advertisers state that they get no response whatsoever from their copy. Third, it is entirely feasible to offer close supervision over statements in the advertising so that they are properly qualified, and do not make any statements that cannot be absolutely backed up 100% by the advertiser. Fourth, we do not believe it is the desire of the publication or any individual connected with it, to take advantage of the situation, but it is detrimental to the possibility of building up the natural leadership which should be enjoyed by MINNESOTA HORTICULTURIST. To be successful a publication must have the interest and support of the field as well as its readers.

Now, Mr. Mackintosh, perhaps you can supplement these points with thoughts of your own, because you have been in the field a lot longer than we have. It might be well for us to discuss them somewhat more fully before they are taken up at any meeting.

Legislative Committee Meeting Fruit Breeding Station June 27, 1936 The committee met at 11:00 o'clock a.m. with Mr. Loss, chairman presiding. Members present: Bj. Loss, T. L. Aamodt, J. D. Winter, F. The question of preparing a budget for the next biennium for the 1937 Legislature was discussed from many angles. Mr. Loss mentioned the need of having a summary prepared to show the value of all horticultural interests of the state. On motion of Mr. Rosacker it was voted to submit to the executive board a request that a comprehensive prospectus to be prepared of all horticultural activities of the state for submission to the Legislature in 1937. Professor Alderman moved that the president appoint a committee of three to purchase a movie camera and lantern equipment. Motion carried. Mr. Aamodt appointed R. S. Mackintosh, T. E. Carpenter, and L. R. Fischer.
