I have written Mr. Haralson today that there were 417 lots of plum trees to be sent by express called for by our membership and asked him whether or not he would think it best and be willing to put with these lots of plum trees the second premiums which is usually called for by our membership. If he will do this it will save a lot of expense and time in having this second premium sent separately, as well as save considerable on postage.

I will give you here the amount of the number of these different premiums which go with the large plum trees and which would be packed with the plum trees.



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

In the meantime the printers who held the contract for printing the reports in 1896 have gone on and printed them as usual during 1897 and 1898, relying on the present legislature making an appropriation to reimburse them.

A bill has now been introduced into both branches of the legislature appropriating \$2,750 for each of the two years, 1897 and 1898, for this purpose, and \$3,000 annually thereafter, the latter sum being made larger to pay for an increase of 1,000 in the number of copies to be printed, the additional 1,000 to be placed in the public school libraries.

OBJECT OF THE SOCIETY

This society, supported largely by the state, has for its work the securing and dissemination of knowledge pertaining to forestry, fruit and vegetable growing, the culture of flowers, etc., adapted to the soil and climate of Minnesota, and the origination and testing of horticultural products. It has no other purposes than as defined above.

The present membership of the society consists of over 3,000 of the most active and wide awake professional and amateur horticulturists throughout two Northwest.

The society holds annual summer and winter meetings, at which fruits, vegetables, flowers, etc., are exhibited, papers and reports on horticultural topics are read, and the personal opinions of the members secured in the discussions which forlow.

Committees, selected from the members, have special charge of investigations in various branches of horticulture, and a number of trial stations in different parts of the state, under the charge of members, are making practical tests of things new and desirable. The reports made by these committees and by the superintendents of the trial stations, along with the papers and addresses presented and discussions had at the meetings of the society, with other information of value, are compiled by the secretary and printed at the expense of the state. The society receives also from the state an annual appropriation to assist in carrying on its work.

Annual Members.—Any person may become a member of this society for the year 1914 by payment of the annual fee of \$1.00, which pays for the magazine for the year (except for such numbers as were issued prior to the dafe of membership and the issue exhausted), a handsome cloth bound copy of 'Trees, Fruits and Flowers of Minnesota' for the year 1913 (567 pages), sent prepaid, and all the other pr.vileges of membership for the year. The annual report is sent to members of auxiliary societies only upon prepayment of postage thereon, 17 cts.

All annual memberships expire the first day of the an-

nual meeting.

Life Members.—The life membership fee is \$10.00, payable in two annual installments of \$5.00 cach, if preferred. Upon payment of the full fee they are entitled to a file of the back reports, as complete as possible, some twenty-five volumes, constituting an invaluable horticultural library.

THE SOCIETY LIBRARY

Contains at present about 2,000 volumes. It includes reports of similar associations, standard works on horticulture and backs of reference.

Three card indexes have been prepared, viz.: (1), of our library: (2), of our society reports, including all the articles published in these reports; (3), of horticultural bulletins from all the State Experiment Stations.

The library is open to all, but is especially the home

PLANT PREMIUMS FOR 1914

New fruit trees and plants for trial:

All members, new or old, making application prior to April 1st, are entitled to two lots of plant premiums.

They will be sent postpaid (except as noted).

With the exception of the first four numbers in the following list all of the plant premiums offered this year to our membership come from the Minnesota State Fruit-Breeding Farm, an institution supported by the state for the express purpose of breeding new fruits. The varieties sent out are new fruits, etc. that give promise of being valuable, but the measure of their value is yat to be determined. Many of these varieties will be sent out accompanied by a metal label stached, and members are requested to leave this label attached to the article as reports in regard to their value may be called for at any time by the society.

2. Three high bush cranberries, one year seedlings.

3. Three Boltonia, a perennial flowering plant growing to the height of four to six feet.

4. Collection of six varieties of annual flower seeds.

 An assortment of scions sufficient to make fifteen to twenty grafts, including some of the following varieties; Black Ben, Delicious, Grimes Golden, McIntosh Red and Jonathan.

6. Six plants of strawberry seedling No. 3.

7. Four plants of raspberry seedling.

MINNESOTA STATE PRUIT BREEDING FARM.

This farm is owned and operated by the state for the sole purpose of breeding new varieties of fruits better adapted to the needs of this climate than those now planted. While it is under the management of the State Experiment Station it is operated with the advice of the State Horticultural Society, which was instrumental in securing its foundation by the tate. This farm is located at Zumbra Heights, some twenty-three miles west of Minneapolis on the Minneapolis & St. Louis road. In the six years since it was established it has already accomplished very much of value, and new fruit plants of a number of varieties of apparently large value are being sent out for trial to the members of this society, (see list on page three of this folder). Every member should certainly secure some of these plants and trees for testing and take part in this most interesting and valuable work of fruit-

PRIZES FOR SEEDLING FRUITS

Prizes Offered by the Society for Valuable Varieties of the Apple and Plum Grown from Seed.

1. ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS is offered as a Premium by this Society for a Seedling Apple Tree "as hardy and prolife as the Duchess," with fruit equal to "the Wealthy in size, quality and appearance, and that will keep as well as the Malinda."

2. ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (contributed by Mr. C. M. Loring of Minneapolis) is offered for a seedling plum, 3. ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS is offered annually (total \$700) for seven years for the best Late Winter Seedling Apple, under prescribed conditions.
