Government seed packages distributed - - - - -	1500.
Individual seed packages from other sources - - - -	7000.
Onion sets - - - - -	750. qt.
Strawberry plants - - - - -	25000.
Raspberry plants - - - - -	13000.
Bulbs and tubers - - - - -	400.
Miscellaneous plants - - - - -	100.
Trees - - - - -	150.

The things you have sent us have certainly been greatly appreciated and will be of great value to the part of the country. Through the Cloquet schools we have we have distributed 10000 strawberry plants and 5000 raspberry plants. Every place you go you see a little patch of berries. You realize that this has been a good season for them, too.

FINAL REPORT OF 1919 MID-SUMMER APPLE DISTRIBUTING

CAMPAIGN

\*\*\*\*\*

Realizing the desirability of securing sale for early summer apples, a crop which has too long been allowed to go to waste, the state Department of Agriculture began the issuance at the opening of the apple season of lists of retail grocers thruout Minnesota interested both in selling and in buying apples. The department felt that this plan would assure a means of handling the crop without undue waste or expense.

Because of the failure to report back to this department actual purchases or sales made it is impossible to determine accurately what actual movement of apples took place, but during the six weeks period of the campaign the department listed for sale 18,875 bushels of apples of excellent eating quality, which under ordinary circumstances would have been unable to find a market; and during the same period requests from buyers amounted to a call for 17,490 bushels. These figures indicate that the apple campaign was welcomed on both sides as a practical method of disposing of or securing Minnesota grown fruit.

The chief difficulties in the case of marketing the Minnesota apple crop had heretofore been the cumbersome and time-consuming road from grower to consumer. Summer, or early apples break down quickly and any delay between the time they are picked and used means a certain measure of loss. Because of the large losses incurred the wholesale trade does not care for this business and it remains for the people of the state to find a more direct and certain marketing route.

The department is satisfied that the measures taken this year point the way to a practical system of early apple marketing and steps will be taken in 1920 to broaden the work of the present season and render it more valuable both to the apple grower and to those desiring to purchase Minnesota grown apples.





As some of those who are sending plants may not be accustomed to shipping them, I would suggest that the roots should be wet and carefully protected with damp moss or chaff, or something of that sort where moss is not convenient to be had, and the roots packed tightly so that air will be excluded from them; the tops, however, should not be packed in that way, but left so that some air might get to them. Wax paper would help.

The distance, however, is short, and as you will send by parcel post or express, everything ought to reach its destination in good condition. I would suggest that you write Mr. Johnson a card when you send this. If you feel like adding to your contribution to this worthy cause by prepaying charges that will increase our obligation to you, otherwise this matter will be taken care of by the recipient of the goods. Will you please send me also a list of what you send, which will probably be published in the next issue of our monthly.




