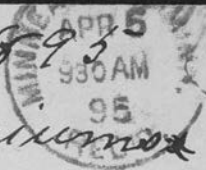

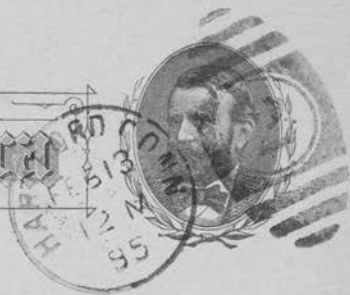

Dear Sir:-

I have been rather tardy
about writing, and ask pardon.

I have spoken to Geo. B. Tabman
the representative from my district,
and representatives T. H. Kelly of
St. Paul, and Charles Parker of
St. Paul Park, Washington Co., and also
to Senator Vic. Pottgieser of my dis-
trict, Senator H. F. Stevens of St. Paul,
and Senator Masterman of Stillwater,
Washington Co. Masterman said: "I'll
vote for it on your judgment"; Kelly
said: "All right". Stevens and Pottgieser
answered affably and favorably, giv-
ing the impression, at least, that they would
support it. Parker spoke of ^{the} many appro-
priations asked for, but expressed no opinion.

Talman, my man, told me to come over to the Capitol at 10 a. m. Saturday last, and he would introduce me to Mr. Scofield or Goodhue, a florist and botanist. Mr. Talman, however, made a vociferous speech to me in the lobby, and kindly called Billy Bircher to help me listen. If you don't know "Billy", he is Asst. Sergt.-at-arms of the Senate, and an old soldier, of course, like myself. I needed Billy's assistance, and felt a little tired as it was. I tried to get the floor several times, and I may have been out of order, still I managed to tell him he might do as he dam pleased. I was not thinking of your water power at Minneapolis. My friend Talman thinks he might ask with equal propriety for an appropriation for the typographical

union he belongs to. I add, with some hesitation and reluctance, that my honorable friend seems to lack that fellow-feeling said to make us kind, at least, for some of the farmer members of the legislature, and I fear he does not love a few of the people in Minneapolis as he ought to! This is entirely Confidential.

More to the point, he told me he would vote for the thousand dollars, and for the other five hundred, if convinced that it will be the proper thing to do.

He requested me to ask you to write to him and tell him what you do with the thousand, and what you propose to do with the five hundred.
