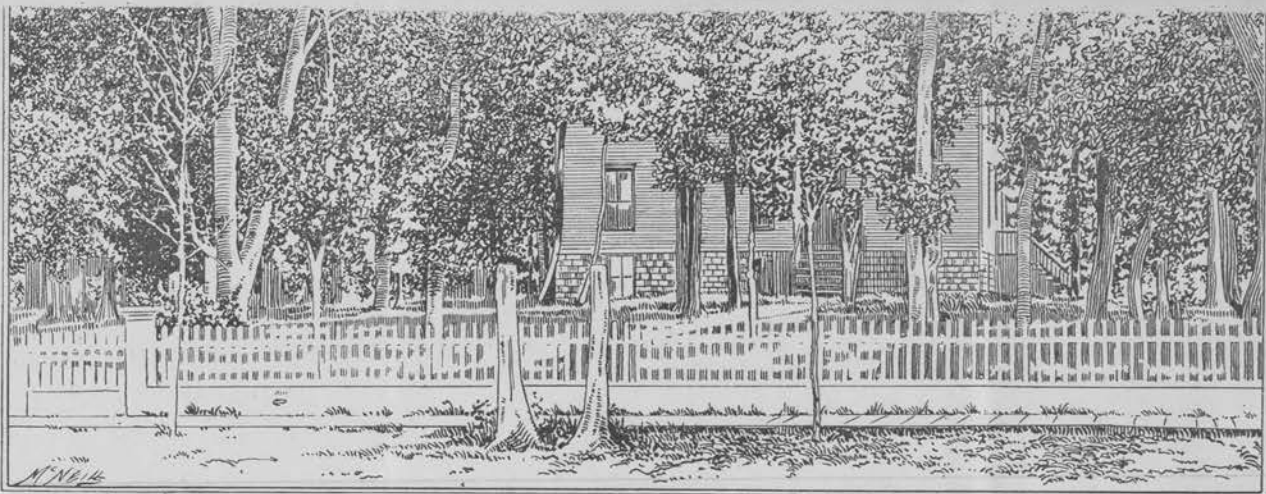

for the first twelve years we meet with many serious  
failure but all by not doing our work properly since  
then we have struck the key note to success and have  
not meet with the first failure We are now growing  
here in our neighborhood mostly on my own site  
and where I have top-worked for my near neighbors.  
We have the Jonathan, Let Seek no further, Red Head,  
Fall Orange, Binkler, Willowtuzz, N. W. Greening,  
Ben Davis, and many others nearly every  
variety here, <sup>named</sup> have been bearing before and ever since  
1884 & 5. We have these experiments in ten different  
orchards besides my own and any one doubting  
that the trees are not to all present appearance as  
healthy and hardy and as sound as the Duchess  
are that, in nearly ever case stand close along  
side. I will pay their expenses necessary for their  
examination. And what is of supreme importance  
just here is the fact that there is not a single  
tree of them all that stands on any thing like a first  
class location. As a rule, they are on 3-4-5 rate

As far as my report on Plums and Cherries is concerned it will be very meager on account of the failure of the fruit crop, in this vicinity, from divers causes. First came a hail storm while the trees were blossoming, then there were several nights of frost; then in the middle of summer a very severe hail storm

which defoliated the trees to a great extent. This hailstorm passed over 16 sections of land in our township. The only fruit I know about are some Duchess, some miles from here, which bore several barrells of appels. The same man has also some Plum trees but there are no fruit on them this year. You better get somebody else to report on Plums and Cherries also, so that the society will not get entirely disappointed.

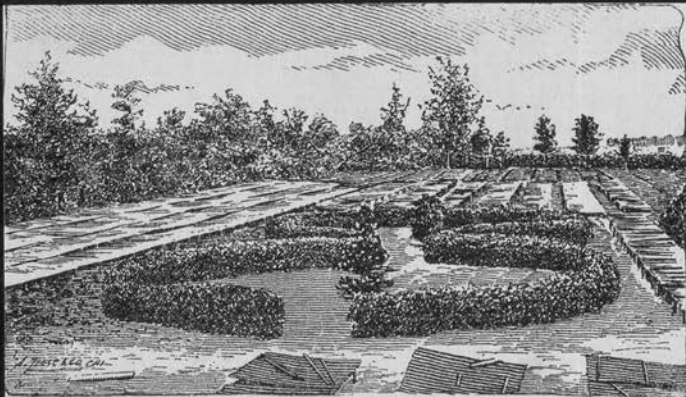

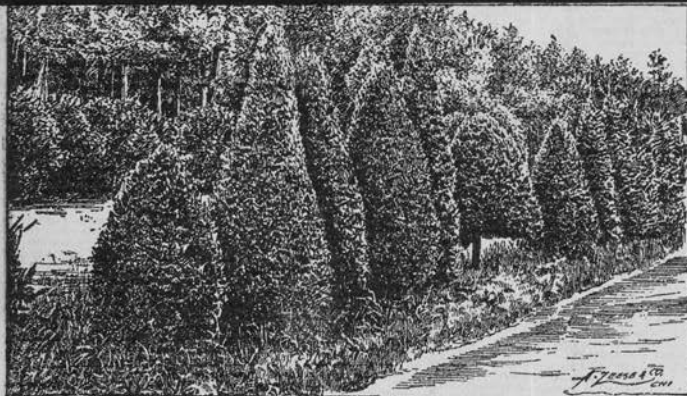
