

Probably the best ever seen in Minn. Much of mine is from 10 days to 2 weeks earlier in season than usual: & is now gone:

I tried to find out through Underwood if the Sweep Stakes would be admissible in glass: but he answers indefinitely. If glass is not recognized in the Sweep Stakes: I do not care to pay Expressage. I believe the question rests with the Supt^o of the Department: I shall probably enter the 15 varieties in glass

in my yard from seed it is just one tree,
which has been transplanted the third time
and is probably 9 years old, it blossomed the
first time this year, I had probably 60
apples on it but most of them dropped before
they were ripe (about the size of a walnut) I got
24 like these of last Sunday, the tree is
probably 12 feet high and has three prongs
at a height of about 4 feet from the ground,
the blossoms all appeared at the highest branches
at a south east exposure, the north end is pro-
tected by barns and dwellings. I would like to
know the variety or species if you can discover
it and let me know, how to treat the tree in the

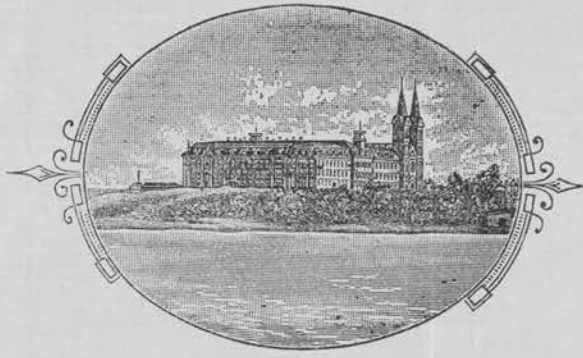
