Friend Latham. I arrived here Monday morning. I enjoyed the trip down here every thing being new to me. The exhibit was in awful shape. you can imagine the apples were on the tower and shelves for over two weeks without any thing being done to them. it kept me busy the first two days getting them replaced. now I work about 2 or 3 hours every morning taking of the rotten ones and putting others in their place. am working at some dis-advantage. The room where our display is in the centre of the Flower room. and they keep it at a temperature of 64 deg. in the night. and cold storage fruit does not stand up very well. in the Horticultural where they have no facilities for heating the fruit stand up well. we have a small display also in that room. I enjoy it very much indeed. and hear nothing but praises for Minnesota fruit. of course the display is ahead of anything here. everyone says so. Wisconsin has some nice apples. but very few of them. we have plenty of fruit to keep it going. and will do the best I know how. I only wish you had been here to tell me what to do. like at the State Fair. I make a display to day of Ralph's grapes

and entered them for a premium. I also had a barrel of Wealthy from Seth Kenney, but they were so poorly packed that I only could use a very few of them. it had been a fine lot when sent away. you know how we receive fruit for the fair I mean the condition of some exhibitors. The is a barrel of mixed varieties in cold storage from J. A. Howard which I expect will be fine. thought to put them on about the middle of the month. I had a bushel of Wealthy from W. Sarver excellent that were fine. not a bad one and so finely colored your son's grapes were good excepting Moore's Early I have met Mr. Van Deman. He is Judge of fruit and He says He will do everything He can for us. I had a long visit with Him. and every day He comes to see what we put up. I had no trouble with Mr. Hall at St Paul about my ticket. He had a round trip for me good for 30 days and time extended if they needed me longer for \$24⁵⁰ He gave me the 50%. He could not do any other way, because the money was made out for me. He could not get it till it had my signature. would like to come and work for you at our winter meeting. Hoping you
