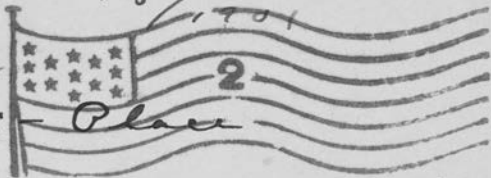

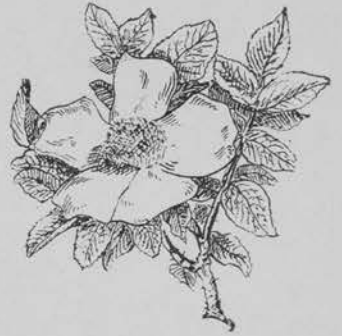

Saturday forenoon I put in around the legislature & must admit that I did not find much encouragement for obtaining the Assoc. appropriation.

Mr Roberts seemed to think we could get \$500 but not more. It will not come up before the house for passage but will go into the "Omnibus bill" if allowed.

I was also given to understand that the majority - Jacobson & his colleagues were not in favor of supporting a large number of the Boards & Associations that now seek same & that the Forestry Assoc. was dropped by the last legislature on that %.

Bush said he would see Jacobson & find out how he felt about increasing the Hort. appropriation instead.

The number of the Bill is 266 & it calls for \$1,000.

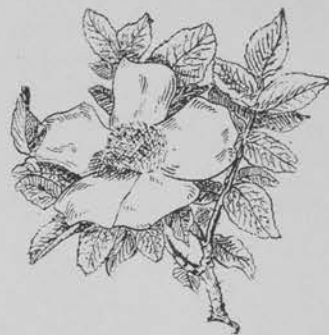

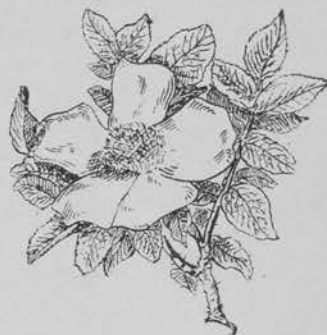
I believe I wrote you something along this line before the last annual meeting of the Assn, - that is, regarding existing conditions & the merging of me into the other.
