We have never had any of our Transactions bound during the seventy-three years that the Society has existed. The Report which you speak of has not come to hand yet, but no doubt will.

Dear sir:

In getting out special plate book for my nursery stock I have included the Peerless apple. The Rochester Lithographing Co. of Rochester, N.Y. advised me that they had been instructed by Mr. O.F. Brand & Son of Fairbault, Minn. who are the originators of the Peerless apple that they have the name "Peerless" copyrighted which does not expire until 1921. I wrote to Mr. O.F. Brand asking permission to get plates made or to buy the plates from him. I have his reply stating that he is surprised to see that I have violated their rights by offering Peerless apple trees for sale as I have never bought from them and never had permission from them to deal in the Peerless. They ask \$100. for the right to use their plates and consent to use the name Peerless. I have been growing Peerless apple trees for several years. First I bought the root grafts; afterwards I cut scions from my own trees. I have now 2000 three year old Peerless apple trees stored with other stock in frost proof cellar for next spring's delivery.

Will you kindly advise me if I have the right to sell the trees without first paying Mr. Brand \$100. for the privilege? I know of several nurseries who are offering for sale apple root grafts of the Peerless.
