If it should continue to stay cool we are like to have a damaging frost, I have out 2 acres of melons and I do not expect any melons of the hole pease, others are complaining also, they bloom but do not set any melons. Tomatoes are going to be a light crop also. cucumbers plenty, I think the blight on apple trees has let up some, I have not seen its equal in old orchards, my trees seem to be ruined yours truly, John Geller,

My apple trees are bearing a few apples this year. The 3 year old trees seem to bear more fruit than the 4 years old trees. There are quite a few trees that are blighting. The Early Strawberry seems to blight more than the rest still quite a few trees of the Siberian are blighting and the Wealthy seems to stand better than any varieties I know.

I can not lay this to any thing else but the unusually cold and wet spring weather, they made such a strong growth and were so tender that when the hot sun came out must be the cause.

I have a large plum crop and if nothing happens I shall send some to the Fair. Cherries did not bear any.
