Dear Sir: At the Farmers Institute held  
her last week they were offering induceme-  
nts for people to join the State Hort. Society  
and offering an additional premium of Prof.  
Green's Amateur Fruit Growing. And now when  
I approach people to join our society they wish  
to know if I can give them this addition-  
al premium and I am unable to answer them  
and I write you for information on this  
point. We had a very successful meeting at  
Albert Reed, the attendance averaged 80 or over  
to the session. We are making every effort to  
raise our membership to 100 members  
Mr. Yahrke exhibited his Yahrke apple  
at Albert Reed. I consider it a valuable  
addition to the seedling list of our State  
(But I think that Prof. Green and W. Elliot  
are at fault in scoring this apple at 100  
points at this time. 100 points is supposed

to be the limit of excellence. But I am not prepared to say that the seedling Pomology of the State of Minnesota has as yet arrived at that stage. There should be room left for further improvement for our seedling Apples. And to my mind 75 or 80 Points is plenty high as a score for this Apple. I shall plant a few of the Trees, and will top work a few of my Trees, and will plant a few root grafts of the Yahuke this coming Spring whereby I may thoroughly test its merits
