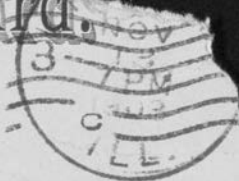

Referring to your application for reduced rates for the above named occasion:

We will take pleasure in announcing rate of fare and one third for the round trip on certificate plan for this occasion from in Minnesota on the condition that there shall be 100 or more in attendance by rail holding certificates of the standard form showing the purchase of tickets at regular rates (no certificates to be counted or honored which show the purchase of tickets at fifty cents or less..



My Dear Mr. Latham:-

I am glad to learn that you will receive and look after what little fruit I can send to the fair, and have this day shipped you by prepaid express to Hamline, a box, containing six samples of each of Wealthy, Charlamoff, Duchess, Hibernial, a Russian variety, name lost, and a few Tonka crabs.

My trees are all young and bearing for the first or second time, and on that account, and because we have had a very dry summer, the apples are of rather small size. Therefore I hardly think it would be worth while for me to enter the fruit for competition. However you can do what you think best in the matter, and if any fees are to be paid, I will send in the amount as soon as I know what the amount is.

I hardly think that standard apples have been grown so far north before in Minnesota as these. My trees are well loaded with apples, in fact some of them are overloaded, especially the Wealthy and unnamed Russian variety.

The tree is a wild plum which I dug out of the bush on the bank of the Red River. After planting it a sucker or shoot came up so I cut off the tree at the surface of the ground and that threw all the sap into the shoot. It is six years old since coming through the ground and has born for four years. The fruit is of a large red variety with a blue blush which can be rubbed off. It is a good bearer and I consider it nearly equal to the Desota, only it ripens in August.
