

Friend Latham,
Recd. your letter all right
inviting me to attend the ^{summer} meeting of
our society - and I very much that I shall have
to deprive myself of the pleasure of doing so.
I left the "Home of the big Sioux" 18 days ago
on the sail boat Silver Spray for Key West
where we spent one day looking over that
fine city. Was shown here where the victims
of The Maine were buried. Then we boarded
Flagler's neat little ship, Miami for Havana
where we spent four days looking over that
beautiful - rich - queer old city. We found a guide
that was born at Washington D.C. - told him I was
a "tree crank" so he pointed right for the "Columbus
tree" that marks the spot where Christopher just
landed when he discovered this continent. This tree
is said to be over 400 years old - but holds its age
wonderfully well - is perhaps near 4 feet in dia-
meter & symmetrical. It is fed by two beautiful
legumes now in bloom - viz Royal Poinciana, and
Poinciana pulcherrima. Havana is one of the beauti-
ful cities I ever saw - thanks to Uncle Sam & Edward
Wood. The Royal Palms here are worth going
all the way from St. Paul to see!

Had never seen much of the East Coast of
 Fla. so took the Miami again for Miami
 where we spent one day - this is a promising
 new town - much greener from frost than
 Newbury. We next stopped at Palm Beach
 & West Palm Beach, where Flagler has scattered
 money with a prodigal hand! as two immense
 hotels & a private residence must plainly show.
 There is perhaps the greatest display of Boca
 nut trees in Fla. The two towns are divided by
 the beautiful little Lake Worth - I do not blame
 the great R R King for being "carried away"
 by this ideal spot. My guide was a Mr Smith
 supt for the Millionaire Adams - who has over
 a 100 acres here - he made his fortune selling gum.
 We then spent a day at Daytona - a pretty place
 where we were shown a great feat among the
 Cabbage Palmettos - a tree with a branch on either
 side of the main trunk - all of equal size. This
 tree is almost invariably destitute of branches!
 We then spent a day pleasantly at St Augustine
 the oldest City in America. We next looked over
 Jacksonville for the second time - this town has
 improved very much since the fire two years ago.

at Jacksonville we took the Ocean Steamer
Arapahoe for Boston - Here we were fortunate
enough to fall in with an intelligent Norwegian
who ^{voluntarily} showed us - by the aid of the numerous
L & Cars - Boston in a hurry. We dined grand
on "Boston baked beans" Such a grand display
of the old graceful white Elms, as we saw on
Boston Common - I never saw in on collection
before. We took in Bunker Hill monument of course
& many other things. Should have remarked sooner
that we took in a little town on our way
known as New York - but I will only mention the
name - as my time & space is too limited to fool
away on small burghs! We touched at Fall
River Junction - where some one told me they
made "lots of rags" Then Rutland Vt -
here is a good town. Then Burlington where
we spent a day - the most beautiful town
in the state - called at the Ag - Experimental
Sta - made some good acquaintance. Then - into
this place - & today shall visit my old home
at Deby - where I just saw the glorious sun rise 71
years ago last month - Decoration Day - Please write

Replying to your inquiry of the 22nd inst., we beg to say that our rate on Apples is 50¢ per barrel for the season beginning October 1st and ending May 1st. Apples on hand April 1st are subject to removal on thirty days notice; the rate after May 1st being 10¢ per barrel per month.

Our plant is between six and seven miles distant~~ly~~ from the World's Fair Grounds. Switching charges from our plant to the World's Fair Grounds are \$10.00 per car. By wagon you could probably have them hauled at 75¢ per hour per wagon.

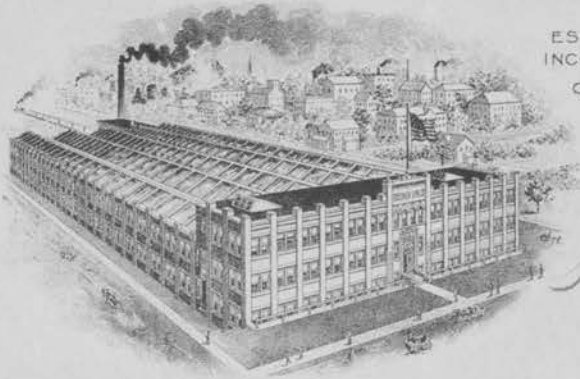
