Dear Friend:-

Your correspondence to Mr. Underwood has been turned over to me and in reply will say that we will try to supply you with two bushels of apples and crabs each week, commencing as soon as the early varieties are in a condition to pick. Should we ship these direct to St. Louis by express? Please inform us at once. In regard to the eight bushels of fruit you want for Oct. 1st, we think we can supply you with some very nice Wealthies at that time.

We did not send down any of our Gooseberries or Currants as we did not deem them nice enough for exhibit. We will fill a refrigerator which we have here with some excellent raspberries and will ship them on July 18th. We presume you want us to pick these raspberries so as to leave the core with them. At least, that is the way we intend to do it as they will keep better and be more satisfactory in general. As soon as you send us your next refrigerator case we will fill that and continue to fill as soon as they get back and as long as our berries are nice enough for exhibition which will be along the middle of August.
