Your favor of July 12th just received. I hope that the cherries, currants and gooseberries have reached St. Louis in good condition, but I think it is not advisable to ship any raspberries from here to St. Louis as we cannot ship in a refrigerator and I think it is impossible to ship raspberries without it. They cannot be picked green and when picked ripe and on the road 24 hours there won't be much left of them.

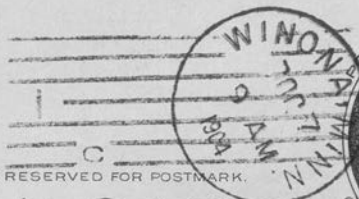

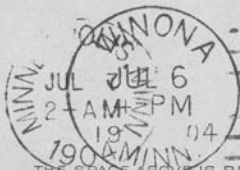

Dear Friend: - Today I shipped a 16 qt. crate of Homer Cherries to St. Louis. I did not pack them in cotton batten. Simply filled the boxes and covered them with cotton batten. If they are carefully handled they must reach there in good condition. I did not send any straw-berries. After I attempted three times I found that it was impossible in the conditions of weather we had to get strawberries from here to St. Louis.

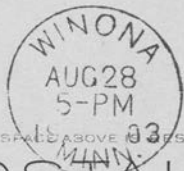

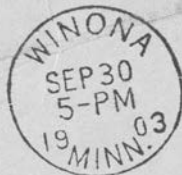
