Sir. I want to get some of those true Siberian Crab seedlings to experiment with. And I can't make out whether any is due me or not. Perhaps if I pay up my \$5.00 before March the 1st. you will send me some.

Please let me know with regard to this. And also any information you can give with regard to that "Pennock Hybrid" of Mr. Anderson, wonder if he propagated it? What seedling Apple according to your judgment would be the best to set out in an Orchard for money of all shown at winter meeting? Perhaps this is an unfair question. You need not

Answer if it is.

I am going to get some of them if I can make arrangements with the Owners. I am starting a Nursery and I want all of the kinds of special merit I can get I expect to have a large Orchard. Of course I can easily see that the winters here sap the vitality of all Orchard trees that I have more or less. There are some of the Crabs I believe that will withstand the cold pretty well Transcendent, Martha, Virginia, Sweet Russet and etc. All my Transcendent I expect to top work to keep from starting Blight if I can it hasn't made its advent in my Orchard yet but am looking for it this next summer I expect to devote the most of my time to Apples and Plums from now on I am a Beekeeper by trade and of course am a sort of a Crank and I take

To the various work of Orcharding
as natural as a Duck to water
Am trying to decide just what
varieties of Pelen to mix up to make
a likely combination, and which tree
to use for the Parent, of course the
time of blossoming will help to decide
that as I cant tell now (not having not-
iced) which kinds blossom together

Am of course impatient for Spring to
come so that I can go to work
Expect to try all of the likely kinds
of apples that I can get hold of, for
in this I think I can be of the
most use for nearly all you
fruit men are away south of
here and we want what is hardy
for our Central and Northern Country.
Am very much in Hopes that the
Siberian Crab will help us out
for I am persuaded that a tree

hardy enough to have its own
natural Root system will be away
ahead of our present methods, for
I find that some Grafts fail
altogether to Root from the Cions
And lots of them Root very poorly from
the Cions the Early Strawberry Roots
exceptionally well And the Virginia
Crab very poorly, was in hopes the
Virginia would be good at that as I
wished to use it for streets to top work
a good deal. When we get seedlings
absolutely hardy then we can grow them
and top work and all will be
well. I think lots of the Compas
Cherry they fruited for me last summer
and were fine indeed, but the tree is
tender and brittle in the wind all
of mine but one went all to pieces
and that one is split, it seems to make
such a rampant growth that a hard wind
tho smashes it down. A. J. McKibben


