You know I won't be beat of my Aunt lots time on this job when I found a nice one I lay it one side till I got enough and one Layer over the box full if you have some eyes this box will cure them I have not Paid the Express on either Box yet have sold all my apples at 80 c in 3 days all will be delivered

A. W. Lothom I have now had my elbows adjusted in full thanks. I am still quite lame the same is stiff and I fear will always remain so. I feel thankful that my legs have been so serviceable so many years, I think I note you I packed my Apples 12th & 13 Sept that night which Wine came I had the apples saved for and only had 25 bush Winefalls that I sold at 30 cts bush on now sorting and selling at 40 c with 2000 more that when I take out a load I usually sell another load they are keeping well many of them in December but the Krebs about here have been hard to sell except Greenmounts which I bought 50 cts A. Bouker from you he said that Apples were plenty in Carver so ones he sold as low as 25 c bushel (that leads me to think that we must be prepared to use the calls for cider. I have lately bought a Gasoline engine 6 horse Fairbank & Morse the late improved type I like it much can grind feed pump Water Saw Wood & I could do more without it but think I can use it to advantage. That issue paper you sent me I sent most of it as you directed to Hammond but the Rule of Exclusion remains full and is Subject to your Order at any time

The Exhibit at St Louis must have added to your
Burdens very much, and I think we can safely
say Minn is an apple State, a thing a few years
ago I thought almost impossible after loosing
2 Orchards. My Present Wealthy Orchard is a source
of Revenue, but I think they will get very Plenty
in a few years we can make them into Cider
and then into vinegar. My Wife thinks it would
be almost a sin to make Cider because when it got
sour it might lead some one in a bad way
We see on the Saloons about the Golden Grain Belt Beer
but we think it right to raise the Golden Grain
I feel Proud of my Wealthy Orchard last year the Wind
caused to fall 112 bushel in one day. This year my Wife
said I think you are pushing the apples to early I put 300 boxes
in cellar 24 boxes in each side to see which keeps best I was
at present in favor of a well ventilated cellar that can be closed
in a hot day from the hot air which hastens decay I cannot
fully tell I found one box in cellar not a rotten apple in it
I think on 5 year old Molinda (Grafts on Dutchess) will be a heavy
crop next Season Time will tell but the Molindas are
like the Wealthy great Bears at present there are
but few Molinda trees outside of my Grafts so that I expect
a clear Market for those late keeping Apples our yield
I make the venture as the Dutchess are so much in
evidence so it was all they would bring on our Market
then on Dutchess they obtain such large
Plums was not soluble on our Market but the
large Wealthy will always sell I think


Dear Sir:--

I have fine lot Surprise plums I think there are best there I have been quite lame in left knee and don't yet know how well I will be for the State Fair I will see what I have later on I may go to St Louis in Aug at least I hope to I have planted considerable Sugar corn for the factory most of it looks fine I no longer run the factory getting to old for that work
