Dear Sir:-

I am in receipt of your favor of the 22nd and it would be a pleasure to comply with your wish but I am very confident that I will not be able to get off at that time as I have other plans.

The growing of the american elm has been a specialty of our concern for nearly fifty years. My father was always very particular in selecting a tree from which to take the seed, to have the parent tree to be of a desirable habit and also to retain its leaves as long in the fall as possible. As you know, it is becoming more or less prevalent to obtain the same results by grafting. We have now in our nursery, some six distinct types which are all doing nicely and we eventually will do without seeding stock altogether. It will probably be a great many years hence before this custom will be prevalent among many nurserymen.

I thank you for your very kind interest in me and hope as you say, before a great while to have the pleasure of personally meeting the fellow members of the Minn. State Horticultural Society. I read with a great deal of interest, your bulletins as they are issued.
