In looking about for apples and plums for the exhibit at the World's Fair my thought turns to the old Gideon orchard and it seems to us that we ought to get a splendid show of fruit from that orchard, from the very earliest that can be gathered, as early as the first week in August, and other varieties as the season advances. The fact that the fruit growing there is largely crab apples cuts no figure in this case. Crab apples that are highly colored and handled so as to get to the fair in good condition will attract as much attention as any other kinds. Will you kindly let me know very soon what the prospect is with you and how soon you can probably make the first shipment? Of course we are very willing to pay for this fruit and the trouble of handling it, etc., though I know this will be of secondary importance with you. We hope to hear from you in regard to this. Are you going to make an exhibit at the state fair as usual this year? We are planning for as good an exhibit at the state fair as though there were no such thing this year as the World's Fair.
