The property described in this Shipping Bill received in apparent good order (contents and value unknown), consigned as marked and numbered in the margin, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter contained, and which are hereby made a part of this agreement, also subject to the conditions and regulations of the published freight tariffs in use by said Railroad Company, to be transported over the line of this road to

Station, and there delivered in good order to the consignee or owner at said station, or to such company or carrier (if the same are to be forwarded beyond said station) whose line may be a part of the route to the place of destination of said goods or packages—it being distinctly understood and agreed that the responsibility of this company as a common carrier shall cease at the station where delivered or tendered to such person or carrier, but it guarantees that the rate of freight for the transportation of said packages shall not exceed rates as specified below and charges advanced by this company, upon the following

CONDITIONS:

- 1. The owner or consignee to pay freight or charges as per specified rates upon the goods as they arrive.
- 2. Freight carried by the company must be removed from the station DURING BUSINESS HOURS on the day of its arrival, or it will be stored at the owner's risk and expense, and in the event of its destruction or damage from any cause while in the depot of the company, either in transit or at terminal point, it is agreed that the company shall be liable only as warehousemen.
- 3. It is agreed and is a part of the consideration of this agreement that the company will not be responsible for the leakage of Liquors or Liquids of any kind, breakage of Glass or Queensware, the injury or breakage of Castings, Carriages, Furniture, Glass Show Cases, Hollow Ware, Looking Glasses, Machinery, Musical Instruments of any kind; packages of Eggs, Frames, Pictures, loss of weight of Coffee or Grain in Bags, Rice in tierces; nor for any decay of perishable articles; nor for the damage arising from the effects of heat or cold; nor for loss of Nuts in bags, or Lemons or Oranges in boxes, unless covered with canvas; nor for any loss or damage of Hay, Hemp, Cotton, or any article whose bulk renders it necessary to transport in open cars, unless it can be shown that such loss or damage occurred through the negligence or default of the agents of this company.
- 4. The company shall not be responsible for accidents or delay from unavoidable causes nor for loss or damage by fire not shown to be due to the default or negligence of the carrier. The responsibility of this company as a carrier shall terminate on the delivery or tender of the freight, as per this Shipping Bill, to the company whose line may be a part of the route to the place of destination of said goods or packages.
- 5. 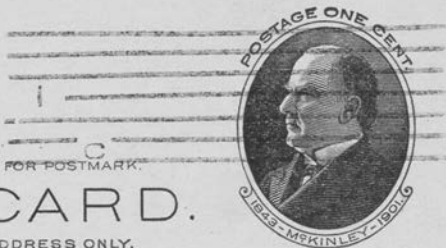

A W Lottum Dear Sir I opened your letter yesterday noon. I had previously carefully picked my Dutchess and placed in Bushel boxes. The 5 bushel that dropped off I took to Waterville and sold at 80c bushel. as I knew by experience I could keep the boll for several weeks in my corn crib up 5 ft from the ground, and holds one thousand bush corn. I went to work after dinner yesterday and sorted over, 13 boxes for the bbl that I sorted for you. as I wanted to get shape & color I have not stripped any apples except the 2 boxes to St Louis. It took me 1/2 day to pack out & wrap the apples and new bbls cost here the best we can do. the boxes 16c each so the expense is same as bbls. today I have to go to Waterville and take the bbl to the Exp office. I will place no price on the bbl Apples send what you think is right and I will be satisfied I adjusted the Express on the 2 boxes to St Louis and enclosed the rec for the amt I paid on them. I still have quite a few more shall come up Tuesday if I think I can store it to work on my leg. I picked 14 boxes No 20 on one tree about 3 boxes left on that tree the rest some 5 trees not yet picked the storm this time did not reach me

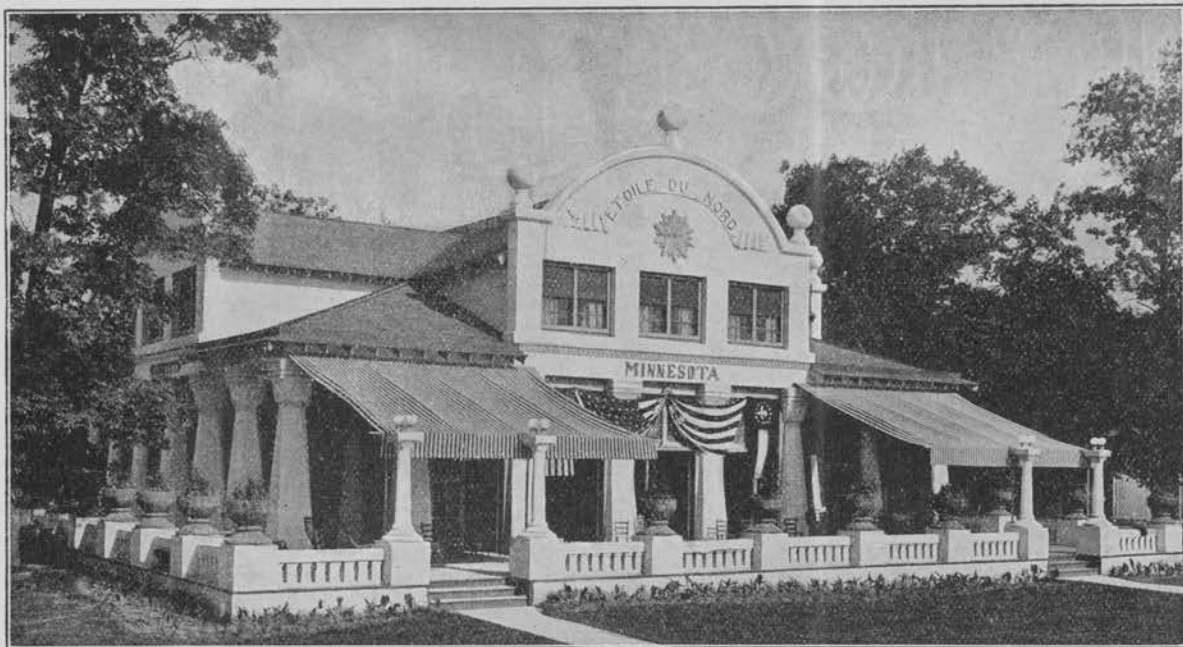

ST. LOUIS, MO. July 17th 1904

Friend Latham, I wanted to go to our State Fair & therefore thought best to come down here as early as possible. My Money came to hand just after I wrote you & I concluded to come right away. I was of no use here till after Cook left, & not much now. I try to help here a little in the forenoon, & have spent afternoons looking around. I think it would take me all summer to see it all. It is too widely separated, & much that I do not care to see at my age. The fruit surprises me. It is much better than I supposed could be shown. Washington has a fine Exhibit. Also Texas, Arkansas & California. Very much is spread out, & duplicated. Wisconsin has a fine show. The Berries attract much attention, & will be seen when the other parts of the exhibit are not noticed. Wis- shows a few Blackberries but not as fine as ours. When our apple exhibit comes in I hope it will make a good appearance. It is at present rather defective. The weather is very warm here & I do not know that I shall see much.

if the top is well thinned that thins the fruit and gives in my
opinion as many or more pounds of fruit that command the better
price I think this is why my apples are so much wanted

A W Lothorn Dear Sir last season I had 19 bush Gelosty this season I only had 2 bush or a little less they was sorted and sent the best to St Louis. I thought when they demanded \$1.50 in Advance it was enormous charge and today have written them if they charge more than from the City you would give them no more business and asked them to return 60 cts there was a bill that picked into nearly 2 the Russian cubs I saw I had to gather them to even get one box. I will have no more Gelosty. I have 30 to 40 bush Dutch they will soon be to send. I took few bush Windfalls to Waterville I got 80 c bush and thought that all they was worth. I probably will give one box of Dutch. some they must Wash. I packed the Gelosty very carefully. Note what he said about being well packed it is hard to get help. I have the money to pay but the harvest is good ways good. I have been short of help all the summer I think I will be to the Fruit Shop but I have not time to tend or make up on Apple Exhibit. if I can sell my Apples myself house to house I can get from \$100 up I am quite sure of that perhaps I can get that by the bushel and reserve boxes kindly yours I do not think I can go to St Louis for want of time S.H. Kenney

my Wealthy look like Wax Work

Wish you could come stay one night
and see my apple trees they are such finely trimmed
2 trees trimmed in like mounds in 1886 or 87 I never
know to any more than cut the little sprouts since
they have fruited my Fairbairn they are pretty full this season
I have not been in other orchards much but have
seen no Orchard so well trimmed about here
the Sunshine (When we have it) can reach all the apples
the Sugar corn & corn are backward Wheat best in 10 years
I think much will yield 25 to 30 bush potatoes are fine
the apples are large already the ground has not been
dry all Summer to check the growth this will
make a large yield than I counted on more
probably the Wealthy the best Apple on the earth
unless they had better in Eden. This is my estimate of Wealthy
no apple that I have seen in Minn compares with it for high Frosts

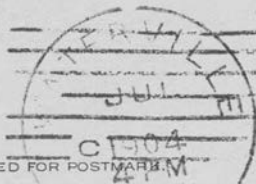
