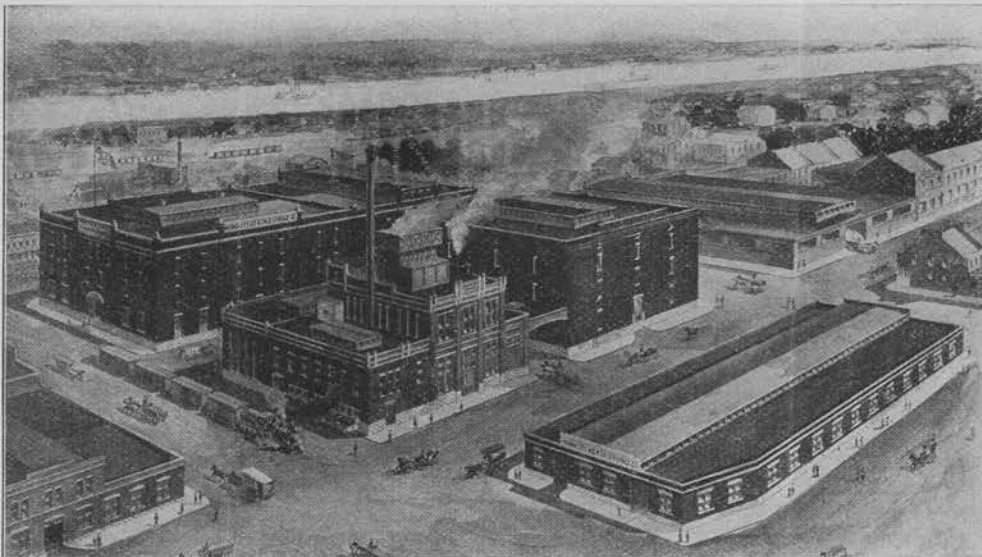

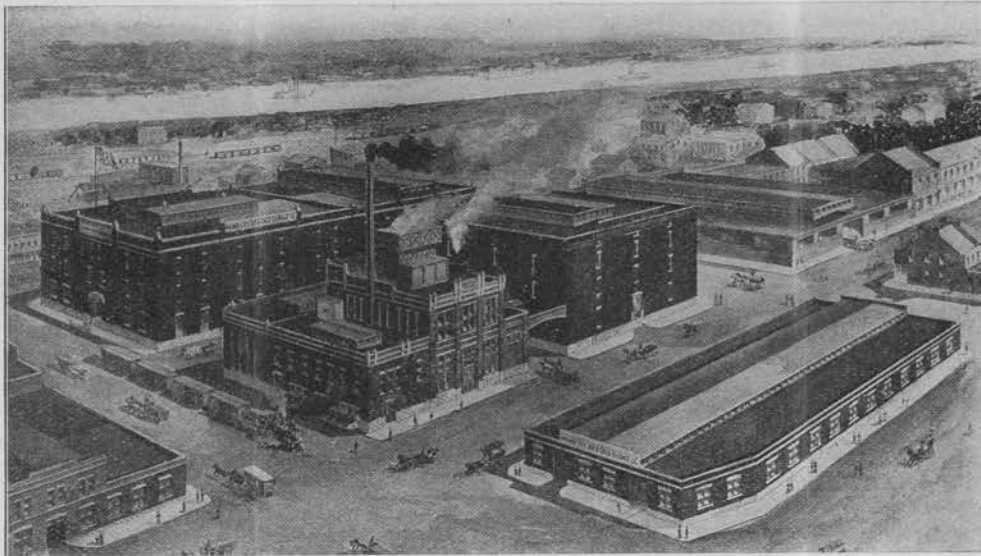

charges were .85 etc, my Trees were so
very heavily loaded that I have no others
of sufficient size for show purposes
The only Apples that bore fruit with me
were Dechess, Wealthy and Patten and they
are disfigured by local Hail to that degree that
they are disqualified for exhibition. I am not
a larger grower of Apples. I have room for only about
80 Trees. and I am now working largely so that half of
them more or less are out of bearing most of the time
I have 3 trees worked to Wealthy two years ago last spring
that bore me $\frac{3}{4}$ of a bushel each this year

I have yours of the 6th inst. Replying will say that I will ship to St. Louis Worlds Fair, one case of Downing Gooseberries tomorrow. In regard to Currants will say that I am at a loss to know whether or not to send them. They are now ripe enough to send but they are not of the quality I would like to have them for this purpose.

In regard to Raspberries will say they are not yet ripe but probably will be within a week. The only thing that troubles me is that the large field of Raspberries was not covered last winter and they were damaged consequently few berries. I have some which are all right but fear that I will not be able to get a full crate from one picking. Will advise you later in regard to this matter.

As to Cherries will state that there was considerable bloom but very few cherries and the birds are gathering most of them as soon as they are ripe. We will have plenty of plums.

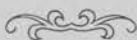

Replying I am sorry to say that I am not able to send the crate of Raspberries, as I find that we cannot get as much as a crate in one picking of suitable berries to send for that purpose. The Plums which are the De Sota and Forest Garden will not be ripe for some little time yet but will ship same as soon as they are ready. Will also try to ship you a bushel crate of apples. I presume you received the case of Downing Gooseberries and that they reached destination without being damaged. Was surprised to learn that the Strawberries arrived in bad shape. These were shipped rather on the green order and packed according to your instructions and nothing but delay in transit and rough handling could have destroyed them.

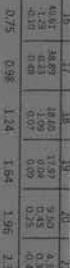

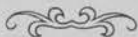
