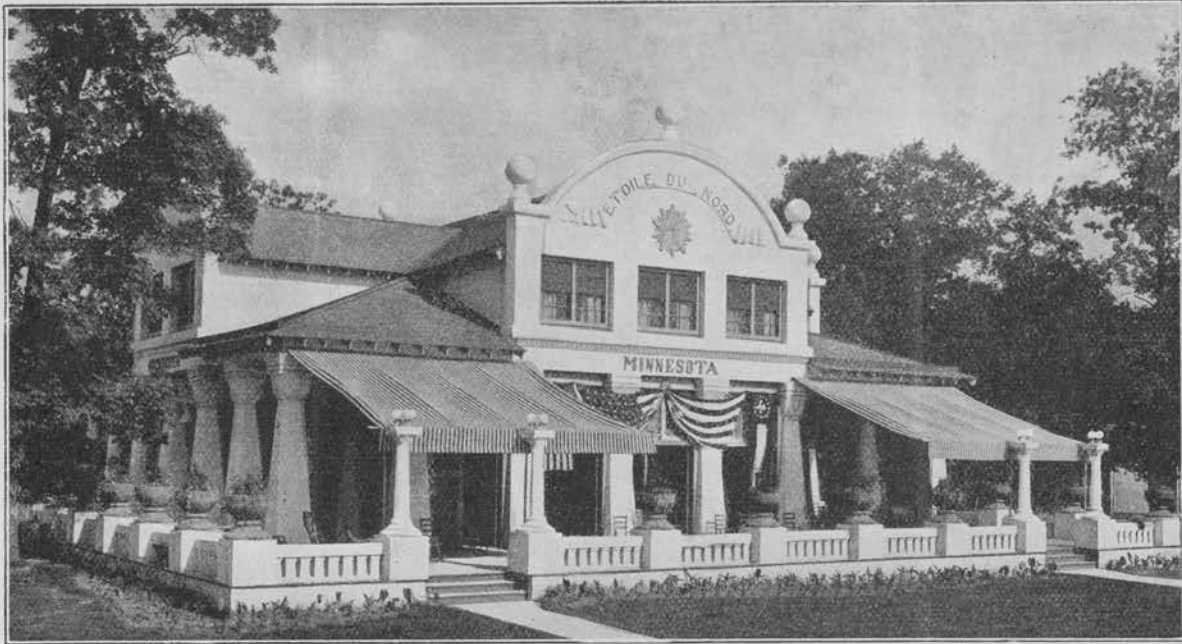

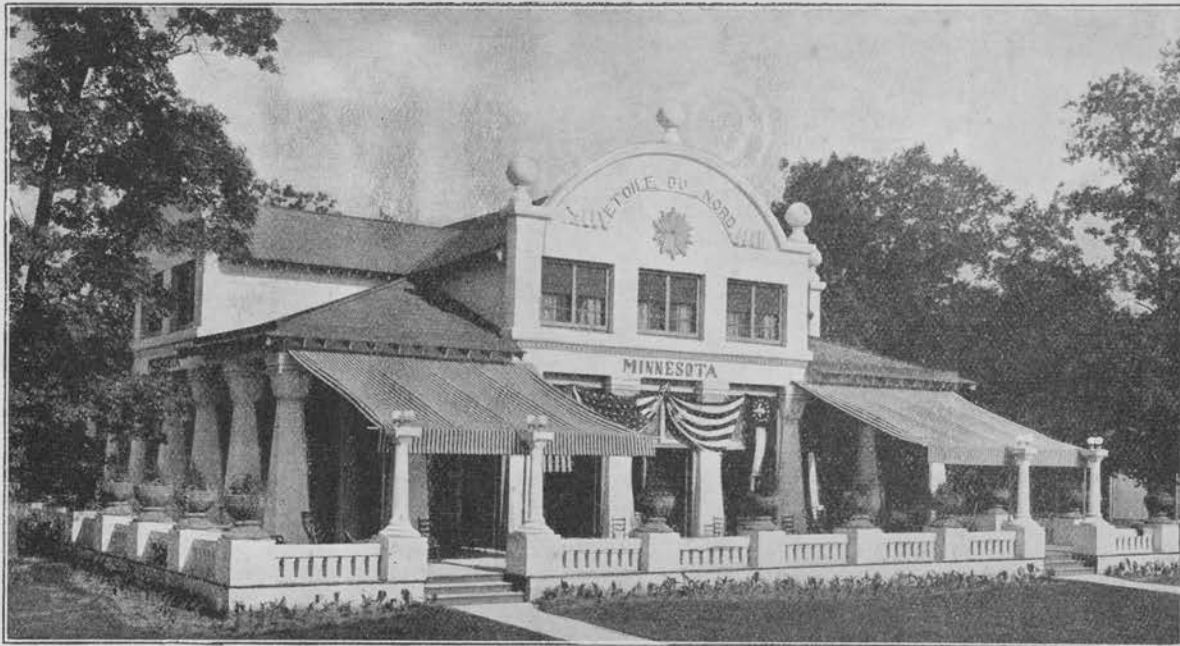

The same mail brought a letter from Mr. Randall, who has just returned from St. Louis. He and Mr. Cosgrove were there and looked over our exhibits with a view to seeing what we could use of the salvage at the Fair Grounds. You will be pleased as well as I with what he says, as follows, "We found the Horticultural Exhibit up to date and very attractive. Mr. Elliot was putting fresh apples, grapes, plums etc. upon the plates every day and was maintaining an exhibit which will convince visitors that Minnesota does grow fruit."

My memorandum shows that Mr. Elliot is to remain until the first of October and that Mr. Yahnke goes down there. I seem to be unfortunate in securing a good display of vegetables. Mr. Ballard failed to get together a good exhibit for us last fall and Mr. Bailey, who got together some vegetables at the Fair, did not succeed in making much of a display. At least, Mr. Randal criticises the agricultural display as lacking in vegetables and grains. I am going to write to Mr. Elliot and see if I cannot enlist his services in bolstering up the exhibit. If he cannot do it, can you suggest anyone that can?



Friend Latham:-

I received your favor of the 23rd ult. and also of the 4th inst. together with the vouchers. I expect that we will have a meeting of the Commission on Wednesday and probably Mitchell will be there so that I will take the vouchers up to him.

The matter of keeping apples in cold storage that you mention is certainly interesting and although I had concluded that it didn't pay and that I would not try it any more, it may be well to put some up in the most approved manner this fall. Our orchard is taking a rest this year. Only a few small trees bearing but they are very full. We haven't 25% in quantity of last year.

When Mr. Hamlin came back from St. Louis he wrote me that he thought the door ought to be changed in the booth, but I wrote him that I thought that it better remain as it is for the present, at least, adding that our Company expect to put up an exhibit at the State Fair that we think will be a good and that if it proved to be a winner we might think it best to repeat it at St. Louis. From this he seems to have taken it for granted that we would do it. He has written Mitchell about it and I see Mitchell has given it out in the papers. It was not my idea to do this, however, until we had proved that it was something we liked and until I had a chance to see you and talk it over, so that I offer this as an explanation of anything you may have heard or seen regarding it.

I have just received a letter from Mr. Mitchell writing me about space for it, suggesting No. 44 where Pennsylvania now is; one-half of 18 or southeast corner of 37. I can plainly see that this would not do for there is a post right in the center of the space. Our exhibit will require 25 feet square and free of any post. It will consist of a plat-form similar to the one that we used last year, on which will rest a tower and windmill, the latter to be in motion. The base is 25 feet in diameter and the whole structure 28' and 3" high. Of course, before entering into this proposition it has to be considered as a matter of expense, whether we will have money enough to do this with. I feel sure that it will be a fine thing but if we don't have the money to do it with, of course, we will have to cut it out. I see Mitchell's last financial report, July 25th, that Horticulture has \$2918.37 with these bills added of \$142.92 making \$3061.29 that we have used of the \$5000.00, but some of our other departments are already in excess of the amount apportioned to them and we are feeling skittish about taking up more to do.

We haven't any early apple to send down, unless John has already sent some Tetofskys and we have no Blackberries. Sorry we cannot help you out.

In regard to State Fair. I don't know of any improvements to suggest in the treatment of the building. My head is too full of other things to dig that out. I should think friend Elliott would be the one to counsel as he is working in that line.

Will ship the evergreens as you suggest.
