think it is all right if you intend to have
them planted only one or two inches deeper than
in nursery so the stock will be exposed above
ground & thus test their hardiness. When
ground is plowed deep as is generally done
where planting trees the ground will settle more
than an inch or two - & I presume it is your
intention to have them well exposed. If the
law makers don't hurry there may be some trees
they will not reach.
