Dear Mr. Elliot:

Some four or five years ago I asked your committee for increased remuneration for reporting the annual meeting; the matter was referred to a committee, but nothing further was done about it.


I recently brought the matter to Mr. Latham's attention, and he stated it was something beyond his jurisdiction and that relief must come through the executive committee.

With the exception of two years, I have reported the meetings of the horticultural society for fifteen years, and the compensation at present is the same as it was at the beginning. During that time wages have advanced in all lines 51% and the cost of living has increased 37%. I have more work than I can attend to at double the rate I receive from the society. The prevailing rate for that kind of work is 25 cents per folio, but I made Mr. Latham a proposition to do the work for 20 cents per folio until further notice, which would be a compromise between the present rate and the prevailing rate for that kind of work.

All other organizations willingly pay the maximum figure, and I can see no good reason why I should interrupt work paying me a certain figure to do work that pays only half as much. Formerly I could better afford to do the work at a lower rate, but I have now an office to maintain with telephone service and high priced help, and it is simply a question of a "square deal" upon the part of the committee, and I believe the committee places as high a value upon a good report as does any other organization.

I will admit that sentiment enters largely into the case. Mr. Latham has done me many favors, which I thoroughly appreciate, I have many close friends in the society and meeting with them is an event I always look forward to with pleasure, but I will put it up to the nurserymen members of the committee whether they would during the busiest part of their season sell nursery stock at half price to some 2000 personal friends when others at the same time were ready and willing to pay full price. I don't want to get the impression that the committee is composed of "cheap skates" engaged in a "jew" practice, but I believe if they will look at the matter from the standpoint of their own business affairs they will make the same concession I have offered to make and will meet me half way.

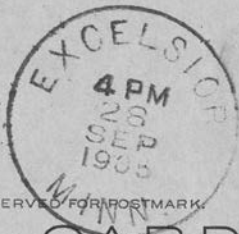

I sold them to him at \$100 per Bushel delivered in Minneapolis they weighed 2550 lbs or an average of 150 lbs each my friend now took them to Kellamy Station in 2 loads today I paid for new bbls 47c each and think the fit will be near 35c each bbl I had 66 bushel on about 50 trees. the cost to get them up there would be 27c bushel for bbl & freight and hauling cost 13c more per bbl took on by making 40c bushel. A Mr. Brown from Morristown offered me if I had any left 80c bushel without bbl or boxes at my house. 3 bush on bbl at 80c bushel is \$2.40 47c for bbl makes 2.87 I could not put a bbl on car for less than \$3.00 in a new bbl this would cost you 3.35 in Minneapolis. I think I will take a bbl to Kellamy in the morning at \$3.00 that will be as low a price as I can sell them I sold 2 bushel today to Mr. Burt Blain today for \$2.00 without boxes or bbl he asked for them I expect to go to Washington D.C. Monday if I do not send them tomorrow I cannot send them Kinely your S.H. Kenney
