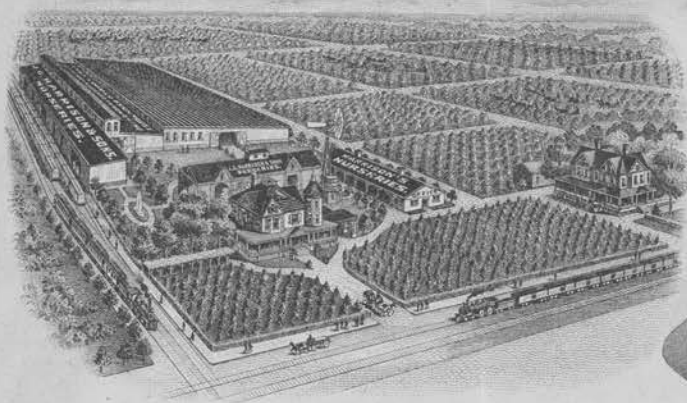

We are expecting some prominent men to address the Meeting.

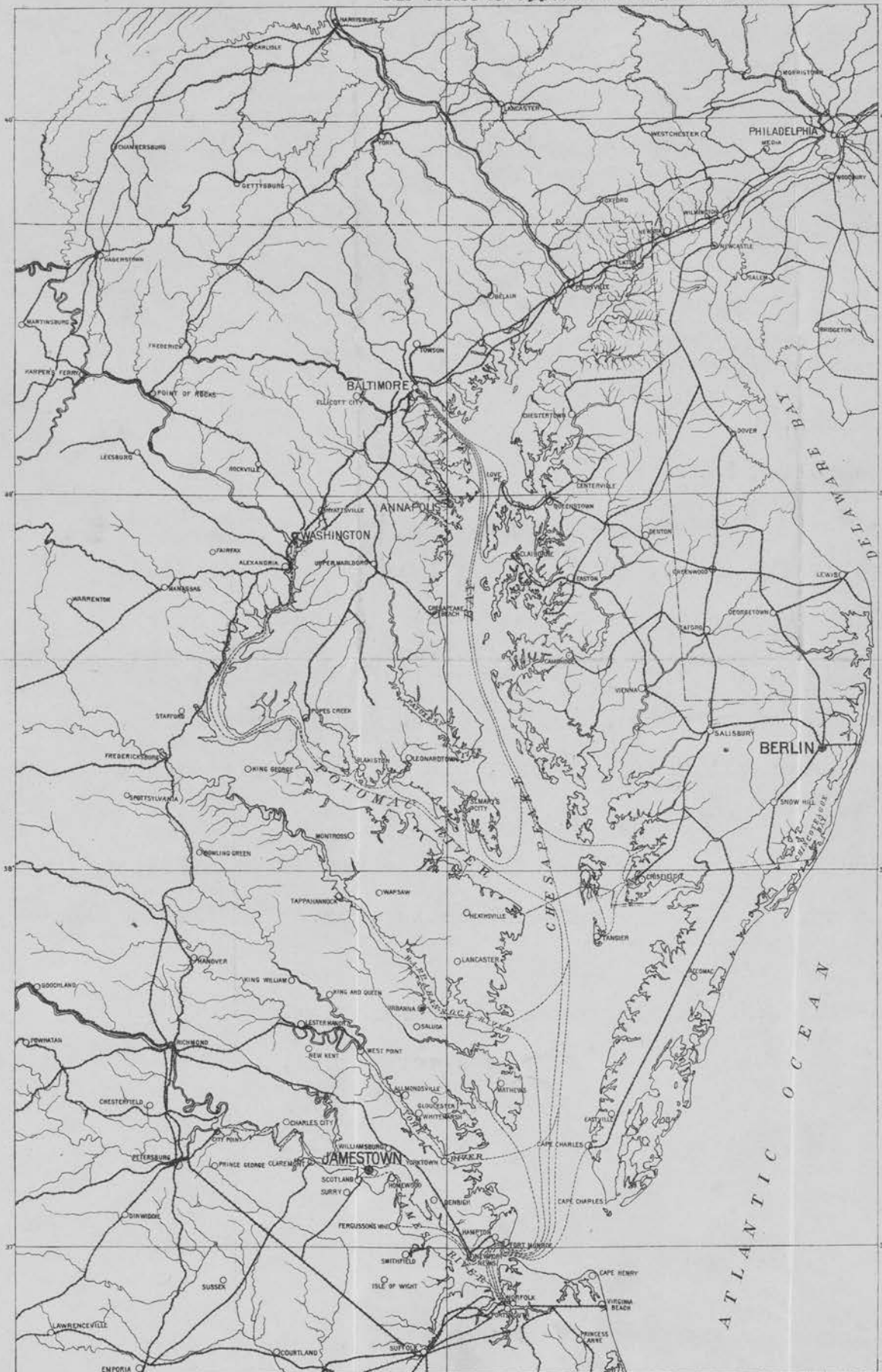

Dear Sir:

I have your card of 9th inst, to hand, in regard to the plate, I can not buy it, so you are free to sell it, to best advantage. If I ever should have the opportunity to have an illustrated article in the Horticulturist, would like to buy it for my own use — This plate is from the Powers crab taken in July about the 2th 2 years ago. The branches did rest on the ground with its load of fruit and has done so every year since. I also had a good crop of the Greenwood and Striped Anis that I sent you pictures of last summer sold for 5 dollars worth from this one tree of Greenwood in the fall about 4 dollars from the Anis, and some fruit for our own trial use. on account of the heavy yield in the last 3 years seems to take a rest as all fruit buds are used up and must take a years rest to recuperate or make fruit buds. However others will take this trees or sorts place so we will not be exempt from fruit. Plums seem to be full of fruit buds this year although the trees Blossomed full last spring, but no fruit set. Snow is now gone here, and is very wet. mice has done great harm in many places on account of a high snow. The country is just swarmed with mice, in most cases they have dug down from the top or worked through the snow in all directions Jack Rabbits were the bad. I remain yours truly Ole J. Hagen

P.S. Something I never tried to burn the mulching off my strawberry patches ^{spring} this year, as mice seem to will destroy them ^{plant} to rid them from mice. I don't know which ^{would} do the greatest harm.

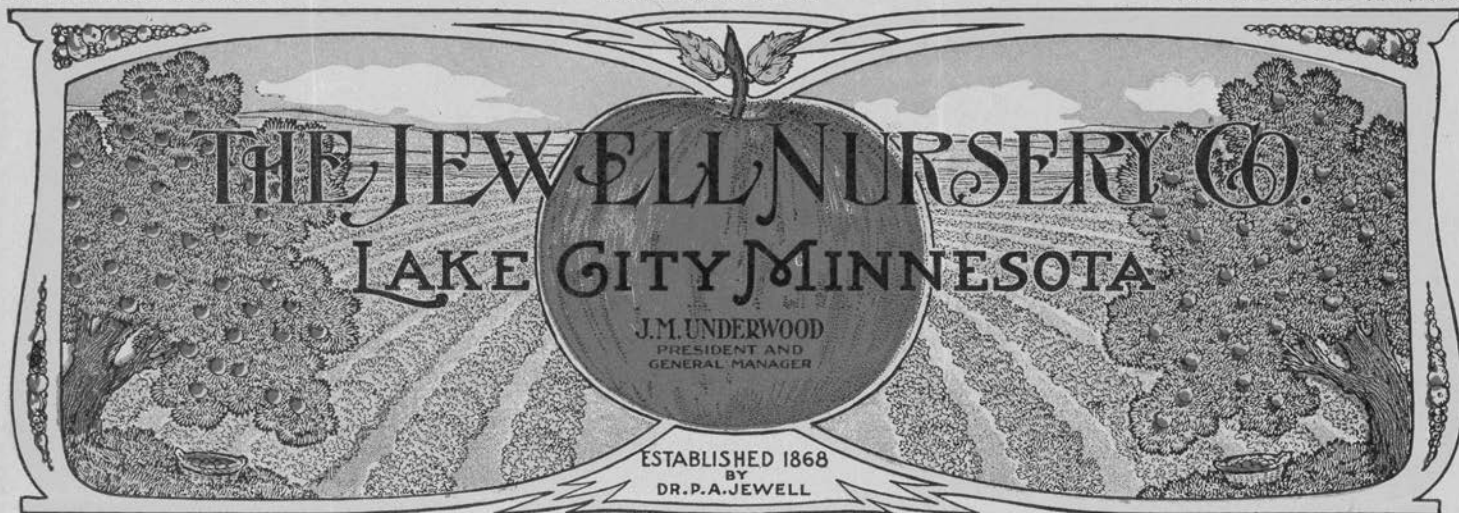

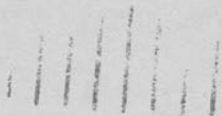
