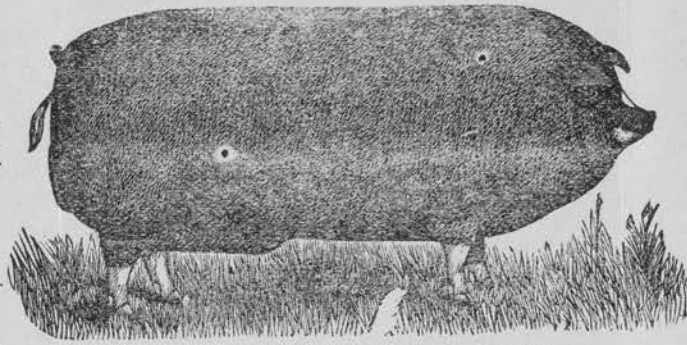

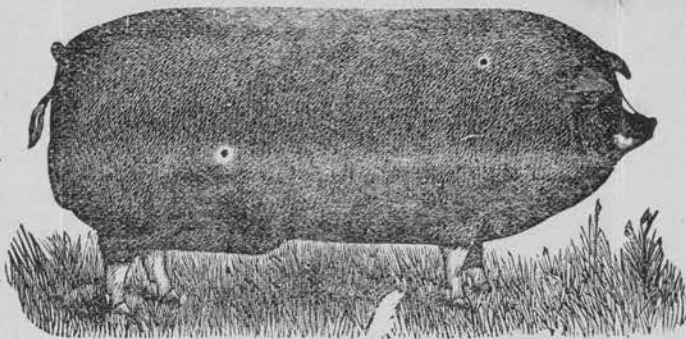
Mr Latham I don't think

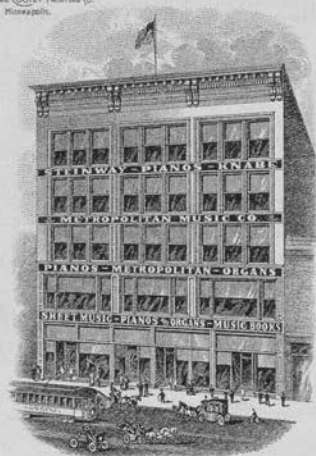

My trees are effected with a little green hopper, the leaves curl and some are dead, a few." My Orchard is on north side of the grove. protected also on East and West, but exposed to the north "I have a few wealthis and crows on south side of grove, which are badly blighted, while those on north are doing fine, I have as ~~a~~ fine a young Orchard as ~~can~~ be seen in this County of Redwood, I set them in 1903, the second year, some bad fruit. I bought stock of jewel and Wedge Nursery, they sold me trees not true to name, I ordered wealthis, but have none, from them, I think they should be more carefull, or be held responsible, for damage;

you advised me to use Tobacco, this I could not do, as you advised to dip branches it requires too much time, I have Twentyfive Plum Trees, they are all effected with a black insect I sprayed them, with coal oil Emulsion, soap oil and water, it was good for a short time now they are coming again, would it injure trees to repeat the above spraying? I would like the name of some good works, on spraying, and where they could be bought, I have One Plum Tree, that has fruit as large as any good sized Crab Apple, I bought it from Sioux City Nursery, they called it the Burbanks, do you know of any such Plums, I would like more of the same kind, they are a beautiful and fine fruit, Pleas give me the name of some nursery that has this Plum for sale, I will send you a sample of the fruit, when about ripe, I think to become a life member of the Horticultural Society, I will have a few new members by you!
