In the seedling apples where it says, "A specimen of wood three years old (at least 6 in. long taken from the tree bearing the apples shown," would be better if omitted for it is not alone a nuisance but also deceiving. I have seen specimens of wood accompanying ^{the plates} which were never grown on the tree the apples came from for when I afterwards examined the tree I found not a bit of sound wood on it and the sample shown was the best on the table.

The hardiness of the tree can only be judged by seeing the whole tree.
