The Kandiyohi County Horticultural Society met at Bonda Hall, Jan., 23rd., 1907, at 10 o'clock A.M. and had a very successful and instructive session. There were about twenty members present. The meeting was called to order by Pres. Frye. It was moved and carried that the minutes of the previous meeting be not read until afternoon session. Moved that the chair appoint two temporary executive members. Chair appointed John Wicklund and J. G. Bjornberg. Moved that the chair appoint a committee of three on resolutions. Chair appointed J. Ahlstrom, J. Wicklund and A. E. Rice. Moved and carried that we adjourn to 1:30 o'clock P. M.

The society served a lunch to its members in the dining room of the hall.

Secretary Selvig then called to order at 1:45 P. M.

The report of Secretary Selvig was read and adopted. The secretary then read the roll of the members of the Association.

The auditing committee made their report, which was adopted.

The Committee on resolutions reported the following, which were adopted:

Whereas, the State Horticulture Society at their annual meeting in December, 1906, passed a resolution to petition the State Legislature to purchase 100 or 160 acres land to add to the Experimental Farm for an Experimental Orchard, and whereas, we do believe that this County is geographically more centrally located than the present Experimental Station and that Kandiyohi County would be more suitable for the State at large for such an Experimental Station than the present one, and whereas, land could be purchased for a great deal less money than around the present Station; therefore, be it Resolved, that we, The Kandiyohi Horticultural Society, assembled at our annual meeting this 23rd day of January, 1907, do unanimously petition our Senator, Hon. L. O. Thorpe, and our Representative, Hon. C. E. Johnson, to draft bills and use their utmost influence to located such additional Experiment Station in Kandiyohi County, and the Society wishes to express its hearty appreciation of the aid and inspiration that Mr Birch has been to this

Resolved, That this Society favors making a proper exhibit of the Agricultural and horticultural products of this County at the next State Fair, and we earnestly recommend that an appropriation be made by the County Commissioners to aid in paying the expense of such an exhibit, and we recommend that the Chairman of this meeting appoint a Committee of five members to lay the matter before the Board of County Commissioners at their next meeting.

Resolved, That this Society extends its hearty thanks to Professor Samuel B. Green and Doctor J. C. Currier for their able and instructive addresses delivered at the Horticultural Fair held at Willmar, September 21st and 22nd, 1906.

Moved that the appointment of committees be left to the organization of 1907.

Secretary Selvig then made a report of his attendance at the State Horticultural Society.

A. H. Sperry was called upon and explained what he saw and heard in bugology at the State meeting.

President E. C. Wellin and Secretary O. R. Berkness of the County Fair Association each spoke on the good work done by the Horticultural Society, and suggested that they wished the society would assist the Street Fair Association if it decided to hold a street fair this fall.

Prof. H. S. Hilleboe gave an interesting talk on organization and applied it to the work of the Horticultural Society of this County. He showed what had been accomplished and what could be accomplished in the future.

The following resolution was adopted by a rising vote of the members of the meeting:

Whereas, Mr Chas. A. Birch has been a member of the Kandiyohi County Horticultural Society since its organization and rendered very valuable aid to the Society through his work and experiment along the line of horticulture and especially by his enthusiasm for the promotion of horticulture, and

Whereas, Mr Chas. A. Birch now contemplates leaving the State, the Society wishes hereby to express deep regret at the necessity of losing Mr Birch as a member, and the Society wishes to express its hearty appreciation of the aid and inspiration that Mr Birch has been to this

I am just on my way home from Chicago where I went to the saddest funeral I ever attended it was my only grandson, 19 years old & the most promising young man and best drunkard. Sick 3 wks. with Typhoid, Malaria, Mergittis and ended in tuberculosis. - the autopsy showed his system so filled he could never have regained his health - He was the picture of health. Muscles on him like a blacksmith, he kept up his gymnasium practice & was a perfect specimen of young manhood, he stood so high in the estimation of the whole community, the church, SS. College, Banks and Telephone Companies, that he received floral tributes from 31 different persons, societies and companies. He spent one season in a Bank I had in charge the night

Dear Friend;

It was with much surprise and still greater pleasure that I received your holiday remembrance in the form of a copy of "Queen Vashti". I have been reading it with much interest and finding much in it to approve and little to criticize. Mr. Philips is a worthy member of the old guard of the Minn. Hort. Soc. and that is a band of men that has my unqualified admiration.

I went twice to your house when I was in Minneapolis in July (or Aug.) 1906 and as I failed to see you either time I began to think I should never hear from you directly again. I see by the pages of the "Horticulturist" that you are still one of the best wheel horses in the promotion of horticulture and allied interests. Indeed, I should think that your zeal and usefulness were steadily growing

with the passing of time. I hope good health
blesses yourself and Mrs. Elliot and all your family.

I am reluctant to write anything of my-
self. However, I can say with reasonable accuracy
that I am not in jail. That I am doing any-
thing useful or profitable I can hardly add,
for I seem to have fallen very easily into
the easy, idle ways that are supposed to follow
migration to a mild climate. However my health
does not seem to suffer from my habits and
Mrs. Lacy is I think surely, though slowly im-
proving in health. Her niece is married and
lives in the house and lets rooms where we
lived for some four years. Mrs. Lacy's mother
celebrated her 90th birthday Nov. 2nd and a
month later fell to the floor and dislocated her
hip and we are now trying to nurse her
back to health. My own mother died last
summer in N. York where I have two sis-
ters bravely trying to run a 300 acre farm with
very scant and very independent hired help
both in doors and out.

You should come to California again, just to see the changes, if for nothing else. They seem to me to be marvellous. Los Angeles has built up and spread out almost beyond belief. I don't know if Santa Monica proper has developed in the same proportions, but it has extended along the beach for several miles under new names, as "Ocean Park", "Venice", "Manhattan Beach". These are all built upon the sand, between the bluffs and the ocean. When you were here I suppose Long Beach was hardly worthy of a name. Since I came it has grown from a city of less than 2500 people to more than ~~12000~~ 12000 and the business from one bank to seven or eight.

It is long past my bed time and hence I must close whether you are interested or not. Mrs. Lacy went to bed some hour or more ago, else I am sure she would join with me in wishing you both a "Happy New Year" sincerely though somewhat late.
