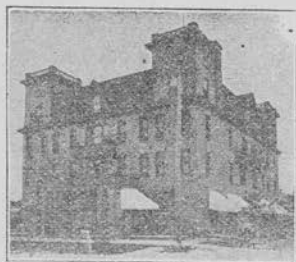

To the Minnesota Horticultural Society,
and auxiliary organizations:

His Excellency, Gen. Johnson, acting upon in-
structions from the Legislature of 1904-5, ap-
pointed a commission to devise plans for
a proper celebration of Minnesota's 50th year
as a member of the Federal Union. Our glorious
state was admitted to the Union in 1858.
It is proposed to fittingly celebrate the
Semi-centennial event in 1908. The commission
would be pleased to have you discuss
the proposition and then give expression, through
