early in November bent
them over and covered them
with dry soil, and I hope
they will come out all right

(over)

in the Spring.

I have quite a lot of Te-
topsky, Duchess and other apple
seed to plant in the Spring
but as the apples were bought
in the market, I could
not tell where they were
grown, so they could not be
used in the contest. I have
also some Sand Crab seed
from Mr Kenney, and
intend following up his
experiments.

I would be well satisfied
to originate a variety that will
be perfectly hardy here, even
though small and of poor qua-
lity.

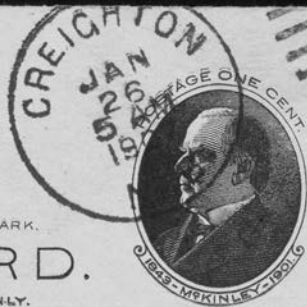

Dear Sir:-

I am likely to lose my head. Last fair time Mr. Collins came out and chose the space that he occupied for their news stand, and in the afternoon H. N. Owen came out and wanted the same space. Was very crusty and unkind in making his application to me, saying, he didn't see as we had any place in the building for them. I gave him a good place off by the east door, but he did not take any pains to make it attractive or to do business there. During the fair he came to me and said he wanted the space that Collins had for this year. I told him that I could not make him any promise because I did not know whether I would have charge of the building, and he would have to wait until after our new board was elected this year. Promptly on my return from our meeting last week I got a letter from him asking for the space that Collins had last year. Collins had also spoken to me last fall, saying he wanted to keep the space this year. Of course, you can see I would have a row on my hands to let Owens have it, and now I will have a row with Owens if I don't. I have written them both that I am not fully decided as to what we will do about a building, but I am in hopes the board will help us out this year by giving us the main building for agriculture.

I figure this way, they will ask the Legislature for a million and a half of money, and if they get any at all, it will be just enough to building a new main building and put in the sewer, in which case they might be able to let us have the main building for agriculture.

If we don't give Owen's the space that Collins had last year, he wants the space where young Randall had his ice-cream stand, on the other side of the door from Collins. I would like you to help me out again this year, the same as last year, not for the purpose of settling this unpleasant dispute, but any suggestions that you may have to offer will be thankfully received.

Regarding agriculture, the situation is this: Two years ago we had eleven county exhibits, some of them were rather poor. Last year we had seven counties, all of them good. There was the excellent exhibits of the vegetable growers associations, and two good individual exhibits of vegetable; a good tho small display of individual exhibits of grains and vegetables. I should think about one-half of the space assigned to individual displays had to be padded and poor at that. Now, of course, unless something can be done to bring out more agricultural exhibits, there is no need of any other building, but the agricultural department is so small compared with the other departments, and so poorly represented agriculture of the state that I don't feel satisfied

to sit down and let it go that way. Agriculture ought to have the main building. Two of the wings, the south and west, ought to be filled with county exhibits, one the northern division of the state and one the southern. Then bees should take the north wing of the building and vegetables the east wing. Then the tables in the center of the aisles, and the space in the center of the building should be filled by individual exhibits of vegetables, grains, and grasses. The bee-keepers are all of them tenacious about remaining with the horticultural exhibits. Members of both societies of the bee-keepers have talked with me and written me on this matter.

Between Owen and the Bee-keepers I think I shall soon wish that I was back in the Police department.

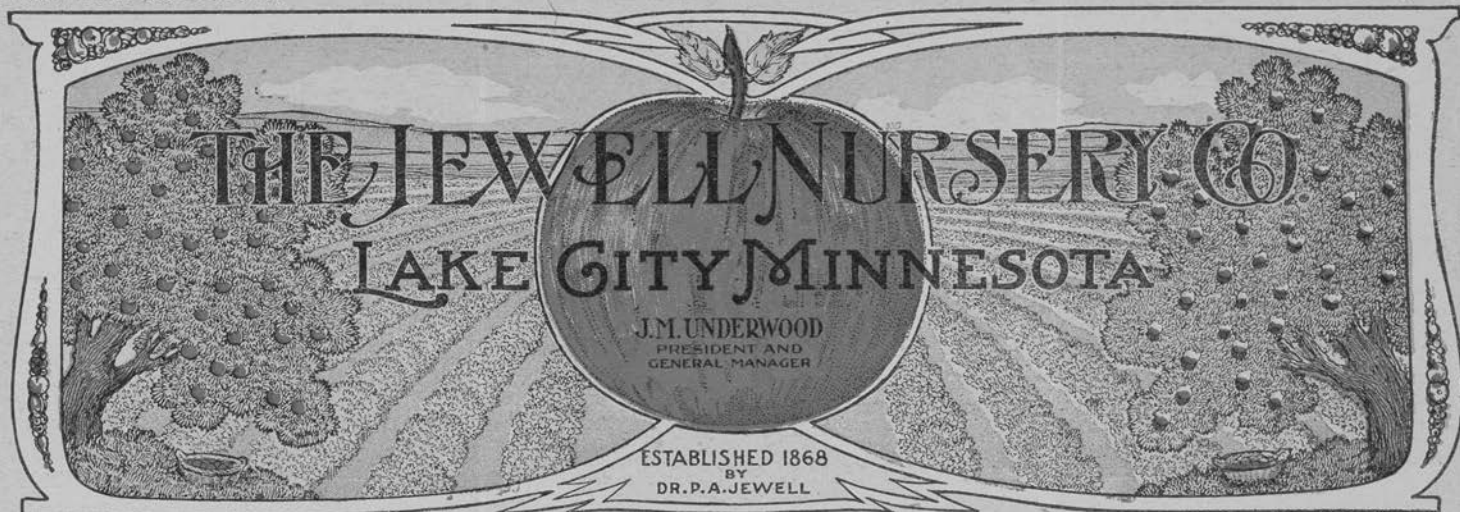

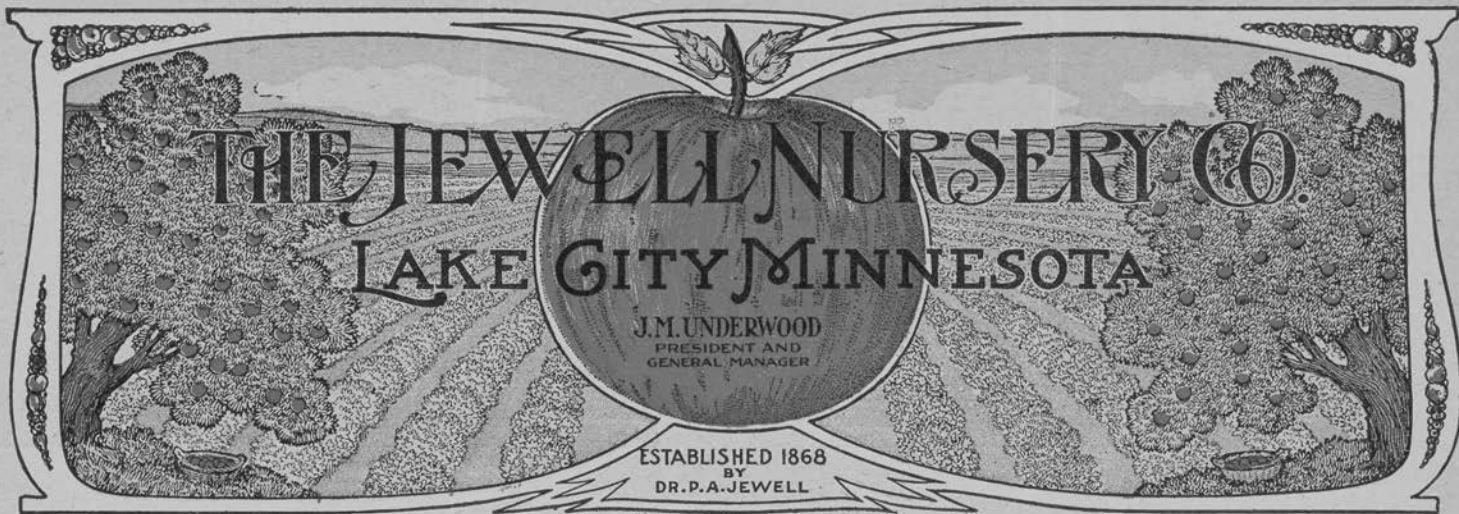


