If you wish me to help out the exhibit by entering such specimens I will try and send down the following varieties to wit; Anisim; Ben Davis; Gideon; Plum Cider; Tetofsky; Duchess; Hibernial; Longfield; Mc.Mahon; Northwestern Greening; Pat-tens Greening; Okabena; Peter; Wealthy; Whitney and four or five Crab and seedling crabs. Think I can also have a few standard seedlings.

I may make a display in the Farmers collection of the honey department.

This effort I make is in the spirit of helping out, I do not expect to take prizes that will re-imburse me for time and expense.

In plums I can probably exhibit six or eight of the well known varieties with probably 10 or 15 plates of fair seedlings.

Will do the best I can, they say "Angels can do no more".

Dear Sir,

I enclose you stamp value 10 cents and shall be obliged if you will send me a packet of Apple Seeds, as per your supplement to the Minnesota Horticulturist for February.

I shall also be glad to receive premiums # 17 and 9. I did not make application for these premiums at a time I sent my subscription, as it slipped my memory, but presume this will not make any difference.

I am only an Amateur, and have been experimenting with seed from the Old Country, to see how it would work out in our Minnesota soil, and so far the result has been that after the first year, vegetables grown from seed in

this manner, grow to more than double the size they would attain in England. Last summer I grew some Vegetable Marrows from seed, that I had saved from 1905, out of fruit grown in that year, sent one from London, and I have in my room now two, one weighing 30 lbs, the other 20 lbs while the largest I ever saw over home, and that grown in the market gardens of Bedfordshire, only reached about 15 lbs in weight. I am going to use some of the seed from these two this year, and will wait the result with eagerness.
