Dear Mr. Latham,-

Yours of the 5th in regard to the Fertile Fair is before me. It made me smile when your letter came, as the Fertile people had already written up here and Mr. Robertson thought he was getting out of the matter so smoothly by referring them to you. His scheme did not work as he expected. He has spoken at Fertile so many times that he doesn't think there is much more for him to say without making folks tired of him, and he thought a new speaker would be advisable on that account. However that is not the principal reason for his declining their invitation. We are putting in that drainage system this summer, and it is a big undertaking and means lots of work. Then as you probably know, we have been very much put out in our plans by the delay of the architect in completing the plans for the buildings we are to erect this summer. We still have to build the big dining room, \$46,000, the Supt.'s dwelling, \$4,000, the swine barn, \$1,000, and the machine barn, \$1,000. Mr. Robertson acts as Supt. of construction, and you can imagine something of the work connected with that. The buildings will not be ready for use for the fall term, and we have to face the proposition of going on with the course with no class room or apparatus for the second year's work. Mr. Robertson has been speaking at a great many places, but he tries to give each section its proper share of his time, and he feels that he cannot now accept any more invitations to well-known sections, and is cutting out such work as much as possible. These things I have mentioned, of course, are all extras. Besides that we have the regular work of the Station and the endless entertaining of callers, &c, &c.

These details may be a little tiresome to you, but I want you to thoroughly understand the situation and the demands upon Mr. Robertson's time, so you may know he does not turn down the Fertile invitation without good reason. He is tired out as it is, and I hope if any one else invites him anywhere it will be somebody who is going hunting prairie-chickens, or something of that delightful character, for a change.

Strawberries and raspberries are a fine crop in this section this year. Plums are also good, but as our apples are too young to bear I cannot speak positively about the apple crop. Ole Hagen of Hendrum reports a fine crop if they have time to mature. If they don't it will be the first time. Frost often catches fruit in the spring, but I never saw it do any damage in the fall. Crops are picking up generally, as we have so many, many hours of daylight up here.

Come and see us when you are in this vicinity, and see for yourself how many irons we have in the fire all at once.

Kindly accept this answer instead of a personal letter from Mr. Robertson, as he is busy this morning and you wished a speedy reply. He sends best wishes to you.

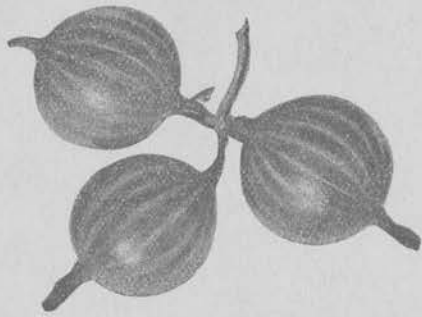



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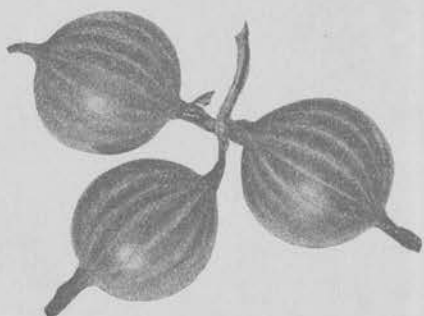
