



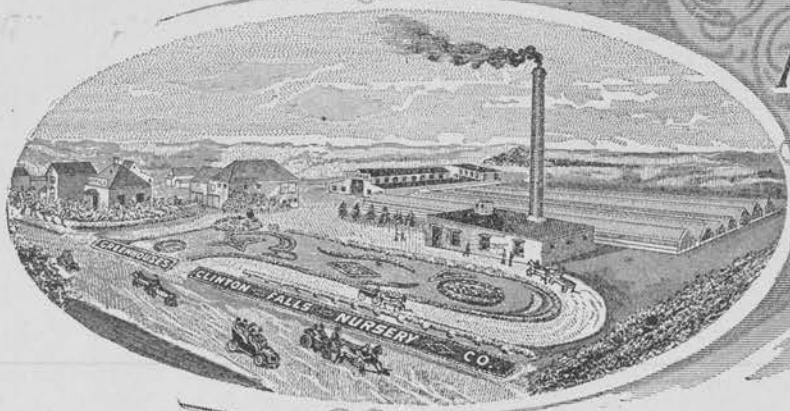

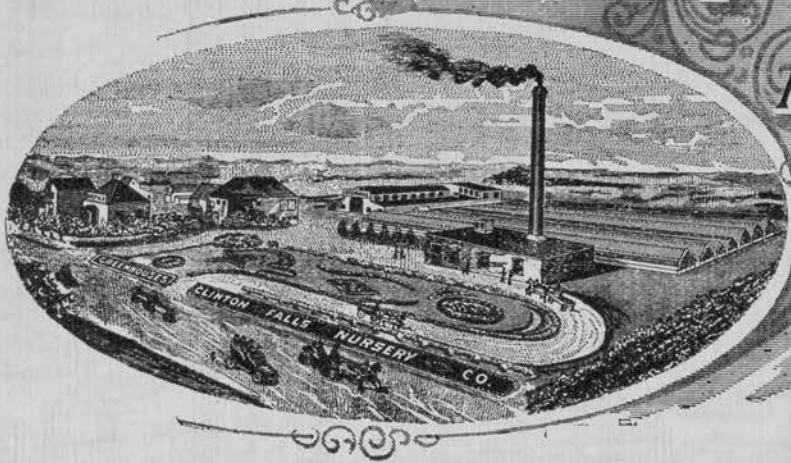

A. and the Success has been more than I could have expected. It seems to me to grow Commercial Apples by top Working now that we have found a way is one of the greatest Triumphs we have yet accomplished. if we can use cut roots and make one Graft make the whole top to grade Winter varieties and reach the same results as top Working on Mature Trees we have made so much of on Adirondack that the new Apples will have less value. It takes time to know just what we can do. The New Program is splendid. and I feel as if I cannot miss the good things. I have decided in a small way to plant crab seed I sowed one row of Alaska cut out in the way lot where I found the 2 Belgian Apples and the seed from Gould crab the seed about one bushel of Apples each kind and the seed out of 5 bushel Messers Winter I do not think this lot as good as Gould or Alaska but Prof Greenbrow the ball of the Gould as I have made no failure on this. Kind although I feel real well I do not think best to grow many seedlings

I am glad to know you send those Waterbury  
Monthlies some of these take a great interest in our work  
a good many of our Members have gone to top working and I expect  
to get valuable reports A J Howard is testing this way.

The Man that Packed My Apples was pleased to see me grow the  
Baldwin Apples after looking them over he said "the way I was getting  
those Baldwins I could grow my dirt he said the Baldwin sell made  
more money than any Apple that ever grew said "let a whole Orchard of them"

# Kenney's 27th Annual Circular

—On The—

## AMBER CANE INDUSTRY



WATERVILLE, MINN., JAN. 1, 190

Kenney's 27th year in the Sugar Cane Industry in the State of Minnesota, and the following awards: First Premium at New Orleans in 1885, Chicago World's Fair in 1893, and Paris in 1900, ought to convince anyone that Amber Cane Syrup is the best Cane Syrup in the world today, and if properly made, the very best table syrup. The large experience, the syrup all refined, makes it some more expensive than the common crude syrup made by the farmers but being rid of the impurities, it adds very much to the value as a table syrup. The present cost of wood for boiling, from \$21 to \$25 a day, cost of kegs and cans have more than doubled, also the price of labor, make it an impossibility to sell at less than the present prices, to-wit: \$3.50 for Five Gallons, f. o. b. cars; or 60c per gallon by the barrel. The crop of syrup at the Kenney Factory 1906 was 10,000 gallons—every gallon first-class and at present date mostly disposed of.

With the McCormick corn binder it makes it possible to harvest a large field of cane in a short time. Those that would see sample of the syrup offered I send in mailing case sample for 10c. I ship in five gallon kegs or cans. Two kegs cost same freight as one keg and as the five gallon kegs are less liable to get broken than the ten gallon, I send two five gallon in place of a ten gallon keg. Every keg this past fall and winter has reached its destination safely. The Early Amber Syrup, on account of its high Sacharine strength is much used to put in the Glucose Syrup three or four parts to one, this makes a cheap but not desirable syrup for one's stomach, the glucose being manufactured with sulphuric acid bringing bright's disease by destroying the tissues of the kidneys.—I had this from the State Board of Health. The state institutions at Red Wing and Faribault manufacture their own Amber Cane Syrup. The Early Amber Cane in my opinion is the best for Minnesota. My crop ripened last season in eighty-nine days. I have the Pure Seed—same as I planted largely myself and will send sample for 2c stamp.

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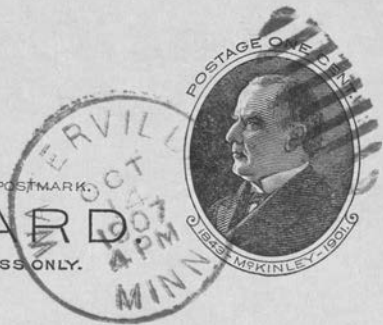

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
