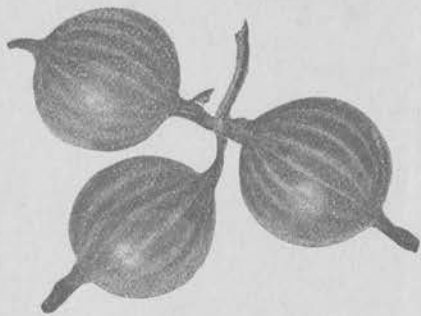

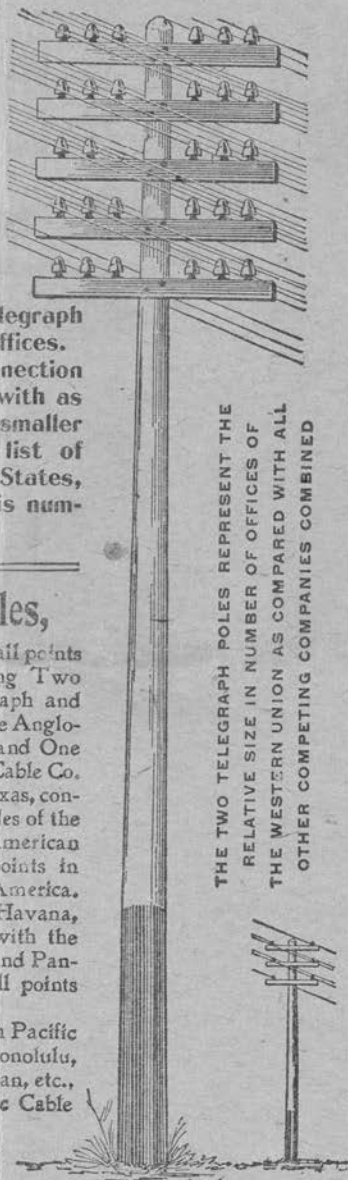

My dear Mr. Latham,

Yours of Feb. 10 is received, also copies of the Minnesota Horticulturist for January. Please accept my thanks for your promptness. Regarding the balance due me on remittance, please let it stand to my credit, as I do not care for back numbers unless I get a full sets of our back reports. I should like to know what a full set of your back reports would cost.

I am especially anxious to get very soon reliable information regarding the value of the fruit crop of Minnesota, particularly apples, and whether she exports or still has to import. I want this information very much to use with the Virginia Legislature next week. I am convalescing rapidly, and they want me to address the joint Finance Committees of the two houses before our bill is acted upon. I thank you very much for your letter of Feb. 6. I had already arranged to have a number of letters written to the legislators and hope to have 5,000 go to them during the next week. As the Chairman of the Committee on Literature of the American Protective Tariff League for many years, the Chairman of the Committee on Finance of the New York Board of Trade and Transportation, and an active member of the committee of the Chamber of Commerce in New York on Sound Financial Legislation during the gold standard fight of 1895 and 1896, I have had considerable experience in such matters.
