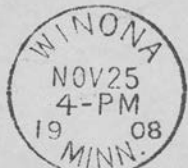

Dear Sir:—

Your favors of recent dates received but neglected to answer your inquiry as to the Homer Cherry.

We have not kept a record of the fruit picked from the orchard year by year.

We figure on 3 crops out of 5 years and have not been disappointed since I can remember of this as a little better than the Healthy which is 3-6. We do not look for dependable crops until 5 or 6 years after planting and if the trees are small ~~when~~ set it will be a year longer. If you will be cherries on before this but the birds usually get these. I saw a cherry on small root sprout this year about 2 ft high.

One small orchard bore for the second time this year on an average of 13 to 20 quarts per tree. The older the tree the more blossom buds set. I visited the oldest Homer cherry orchard, the trees were red in some cases, more fruit than leaves. A tree about

12 years old will yield about 2 crates (600)

The plums are ripening fast and will be
busy this week. Will see you Saturday.
