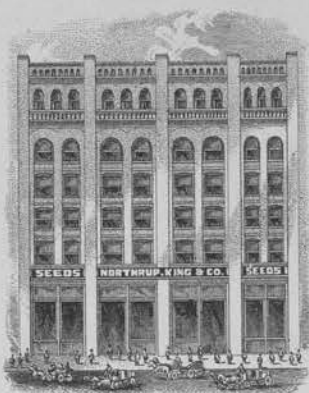

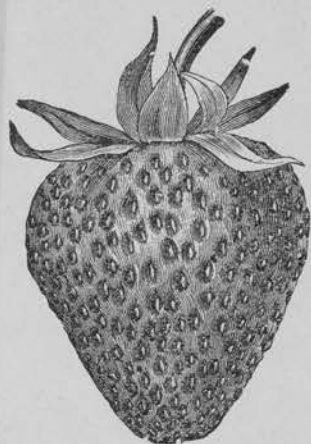

In issue of Mankato "Free Press" on Aug. 26th, I predicted the first snow-fall in Minn. to happen on November 15th, to the 16th, 1909.

You probably have known Hon. R. L. Frazee, the founder of the thriving village in Becker Co., bearing his name and died at Pelican Rapids? Mr. Frazee was my brother-in-law; the wives were sisters. My wife died eleven years ago. The parents of Mrs. Frazee and my wife came from Rhenish Prussia, (Essen - Krupp's Cannon Establishment) the parents were of nobility.

I was born in Rhenish Bavaria, in the territory from whence come the Rhine wine (hard mountains - "Neustadt", Wachenheim, Dürkheim, etc, This Territory (Rhein Pfalz) was once the northern part of the Province Elsass - (Alsace) France. After the defeat of Napoleon I at the battle of Waterloo (Belle Alliance) and the exiling of the Emperor of France, The Province Elsass was reduced, the north part of Department du bas Rhine et Donnersberg was annexed to the Kingdom "Bavaria."

germanique (ordre) Teutonique, ou converse.
I was born in A.D. 1826 Sept. 25. In the revolution
of 1848 in Rhenish Bavaria and Baden, I served
in the "Students" Legion, August Willich Colonel,
Franz Sigel, General. - In the civil war of the U.S.
served as Leader of the Band, 12. regt. Ky. Vols, Infantry,
1st. Brigade, (the 2nd Minn. Inft. was in 3d Brigade)
Papa Thomas' Division, Buell's, later Sherman's
Army Corps. - (Mills Springs, Ky, Shilow, Corinth.
Gen. Bishop of St. Paul knows me.

I established the first german newspaper north of
St. Paul, in St. Cloud, 1869. Principal of Publ. school
at New Ulm and Editor & Publisher of Minn.
Beobachter during twenty years of hard times.

Dear Sir:

By request of Mr. Geo. Athison, Pres. of the Mankato Fair, I have mailed this communication to your address and to inform you, that I shall forward also by Saturday (Express) a sample of Broomé's Seedling Pear; Native, grown in my garden in Mankato. You will please have the Exhibit entered for the "State Fair" and I desire, that you, Prof. Green and such other Judge of Fruit who is interested in Horticulture, shall test the Broomé's Seedling Native Pear as to its quality, etc.

The Pear tree is now eighteen ft high, 12 inches in circumference three feet from the ground, hardy and immune to the cold in winter, as my Seedling-Native Sweet Winter-Apple, which is the paramount Winter-Apple for Minn., and N. Dakota; it keeps good in a dry place until June of following year. About Christmas time the apple is fit for a King to eat. Now it is like sole-leather, but sweet. Sample will be found in package.

I have propagated a kind of "premature" Potatoe, oval, fine grain, color white. This potatoe was produced from the Ball, i. e., from the seed in the green balls, grown on the bush. If you or Prof. Green desire a Ball and if any person will try to make an experiment, you, and Prof. Green, will be welcome to. The seed in the first year will produce Tubers from the size of a Pea to the size of a half dollar, or big marble, according to fertility of soil and the distance of the plants apart, from each other. It is an interesting experiment. Further information is furnished, when desired.

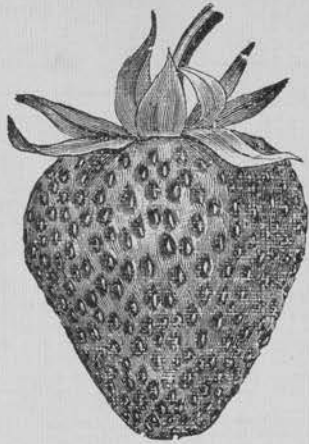
I do notice by my Grapes, that the season of 1909 is some tardy for ripening Fruit. Last past year my fine aromatic Muscatel Grape (raisin muscat) were fully matured and on exhibition at our Fair. First Premium awarded.

If Pears forwarded to you are not yellow, when State is over, cover the Pears in a box with cotton and place the box where there is warmth, and in 3-4 days the Pears will be so soft, that they melt in one's mouth.



- 7th. To secure uniformity of market grades that will be notably advantageous to seller and buyer.
- 8th. To establish a system of standards for seed grains and issue certificates for improved and pedigreed seed.
- 9th. To secure a uniform nomenclature for all standard varieties.
