Dear Sir:-

The "local board" have had under consideration informally a proposition to hold the coming summer meeting jointly with the Minnesota State Rose Society, and if the proposed plan meets the approval of the executive board it will probably be carried out. A joint meeting would not change materially the character of the meeting, which would be held as usual at the Experiment Station, the Rose Society participating to the extent of taking charge of the flower exhibit, with the approval of the management of the Horticultural Society, and providing a part of the amount to be offered in prizes. Last year the society offered about \$150 in prizes for flowers, and it is proposed to contribute approximately that amount to the exhibit this year, the Rose Society putting in enough to bring the total up to \$200, a very liberal proportion in our judgment considering the limited finances of the Rose Society. The Rose Society are glad to make this arrangement as it saves them the large amount of work entailed upon a few members in holding a separate exhibit, and they hope to recoup themselves in part by an increase in memberships at the meeting, - and we are willing that they should, especially as names added to their roll all come onto the roll of the state society.

The plan of the meeting outside of this arrangement provides for a dinner to be paid for by the membership as last year, and it is understood that at the Experiment Station they are working up a demonstration in the use of spraying apparatus, which will be a point of special interest in the forenoon, I believe. The usual short session will be held in the afternoon, and if the day proves to be a propitious one an unusual attendance is anticipated.

The prospect of flowers for the exhibit are not extra good at present, but we hope things may come out all right yet. As to the date of the meeting it is likely to be earlier than usual, but this fact cannot be at present determined.
